

Last year Zenith's team took 2nd place in the league, being defeated by Coolerator in the championship play-off. The season this year begins on May 23rd.




Approximately 75 persons attended the farewell party given last Friday night for 4 of our employees who are leaving in the near future for the armed forces.

After "Windy" Stover left, the Electrical Shop was pretty quiet..but that was before Vern Mohnk came to work.



There will be a Grievance Meeting and a meeting of all officers of the union today (Friday) at 8 PM in Woodmen's Hall.


