Assistant Director, Battelle Memorial Institute, Columbus, Ohio; born St. Paul, Aug. 2, 1900. B.S. (Wis.), 1924; M.S. (Wis.) 1925 and Ph.D. (Wis.) 1928. A distinguished metallurgist. Holder of Siemens Gold Medal and Citation for outstanding research in foundry metallurgy.

## NEFF, GROVER CLEVELAND

President, Wisconsin Power and Light Co., Madison; born Milford, Indiana, Aug. 12, 1886. B.S. in C.E. (Purdue) 1907 and C.E. (Purdue) 1911. A recognized leader in the electric utility field with special interest in Rural Electrification.

## SEEGER, EDWARD W.

Vice President, Cutler-Hammer, Inc., Milwaukee; born Bucyrus, Ohio, May 22, 1892. Graduate in mechanical and electrical engineering, Ohio State University, 1913. Holder of many patents and author of numerous technical articles. An active member of the engineering profession, interested in the education and professional development of young engineers.

## STOREY, OLIVER W.

Chemical and Metallurgical Engineer, Chicago; born Grafton, Wis., Sept. 15, 1888. B.S. in Ch.E., 1910 (Wis.) and Ch.E. 1913 (Wis.). Author of many technical articles and holder of many patents. A long time research engineer and officer of Burgess Laboratories and Burgess Battery Co.

## TRANE, REUBEN N.

President, Trane Co., La Crosse; born in La Crosse, Sept. 13, 1886. Graduate in mechanical engineering, 1910 (Wis.). Organizer of the Trane Co. at La Crosse, 1913. Regent Gelatt presented the report of the Educational Committee.

Regent Gelatt presented the following recommendation of the Educational Committee and moved its adoption:

That upon recommendation of the President of the University, the recommendation of the University Faculty dated November 6, 1950 (EXHIBIT E attached), concerning a program for educating elementary school trachers, be approved.

The motion was seconded by Regent Arveson and Regent Kleczka requested a roll call. A called vote was taken, Regents Arveson, Campbell, Gelatt, Grady, Laird, Watson and Werner voting "Aye"; Regents Jones, Kleczka and Sensenbrenner voting "No". The motion was declared carried.

Upon motion of Regent Gelatt, seconded by Regent Jones, it was VOTED, That upon the recommendation of the Faculty and Dean of the College of Agriculture and the President of the University, the names of the following departments in the College be changed as follows:

Regent Jones presented the report of the Business and Finance Committee.

Regent Jones presented and moved the adoption of the following recommendation of the Business and Finance Committee relating to the management and administration of University Trust Funds:

That the management and administration of University Trust Funds, including the consolidated and segregated funds, be delegated to the Business and Finance Committee and that the said Committee be authorized and empowered to do all things necessary within the limitations imposed by law or by the terms of the specific gifts and bequests accepted by the Board of Regents to administer the funds so received and under the control of the Regents in an efficient and prudent manner. That the Business and Finance Committee be authorized to delegate such powers and responsibilities regarding the management and administration of University Trust Funds to the Trust Officer or other administrative officer or employee of the University as the Committee may in its judgment deem appropriate, and that the Committee be authorized to employ investment counsel. That the Secretary of the Regents be directed to keep a separate record of the actions taken by the Business and Finance Committee on all matters relating to University Trust Funds and to distribute memoranda of such actions as soon as practicable to all members of the Board of Regents for their official information.

The motion was seconded by Regent Campbell and Regent Grady asked that the recommendation be amended by adding the words "with the approval of the Board" after the word "authorized" in the first clause of the second sentence of the recommendation because, in his opinion, the authority to appoint employees could not be delegated to a committee of the Board. Upon motion of Regent Jones, seconded by Regent Kleczka, the motion, amended to read as follows, was adopted:

That the management and administration of University Trust Funds, including the consolidated and segregated funds, be delegated to the Business and Finance Committee and that the said Committee be authorized and empowered to do all things necessary within the limitations imposed by law or by the terms of the specific gifts and bequests accepted by the Board of Regents to administer the funds so received and under the control of the Regents in an efficient and prudent manner. That the Business and Finance Committee be authorized, with the approval of the Board, to delegate such powers and responsibilities regarding the management and administration of University Trust Funds to the Trust Officer or other administrative officer or employee of the University as the Committee may in its judgment deem appropriate, and that the Committee be authorized to employ investment counsel. That the Secretary of the Regents be directed to keep a separate record of the actions taken by the Business and Finance Committee on all matters relating to University Trust Funds and to distribute memoranda of such actions as soon as practicable to all members of the Board of Regents for their official information.

Upon motion of Regent Jones, seconded by Regent Kleczka, it was VOTED (1) That the resolution adopted by The Regents on August 15, 1946, authorizing the sale and transfer of securities in the name of The Regents of the University of Wisconsin be rescinded.

(2) BE IT RESOLVED, By the Regents of the University of Wisconsin, a body corporate, created by Ch. 36 of the Wisconsin Statutes, that the Secretary of the Regents of the University of Wisconsin, the Trust Officer of the University of Wisconsin, the Vice President of Business and Finance of the University of Wisconsin, and the Controller of the University of Wisconsin, each be and hereby is authorized and empowered in the name of the Regents of the University of Wisconsin to buy, sell, assign, transfer and set over unto any person, persons, or corporation, registered boulds of any description and stock or stock rights or interests therein in any corporation, now or hereafter standing in the name of or held by the Regents either in a corporate capacity or as trustee or as agent; to affix the seal of the Regents to any paper necessary for such purposes, and to designate and direct some person to make the transfer on the books of the Regents when required so to do.

Upon motion of Regent Jones, seconded by Regent Kleczka, it was VOTED, That the Vice President of Business and Finance be authorized to sign a supplemental agreement with the U.S. Geological Survey for an investigation of water resources in the State of Wisconsin, each party to expend not to

exceed \$1,040 for the remainder of the fiscal year 1950-51, in addition to previous allotments of \$15,450 by each party.

In response to an inquiry by Regent Kleczka, the Vice President of Business and Finance explained the statutory authorization for such cooperative arrangements with the U.S. Geological Survey.

Upon motion of Regent Jones, seconded by Regent Watson, it was VOTED, That the following budget for the 1951 School of Banking, to be conducted on the Madison Campus in the School of Commerce during the period August 20 to September 1, inclusive, be approved:

Upon motion of Regent Jones, seconded by Regent Kleczka, it was VOTED, That \$4,000 be appropriated from unbudgeted receipts in the 5-C Intercollegiate Athletic revolving fund for estimated architects office charges in connection with the additions to the Stadium.

Upon motion of Regent Jones, seconded by Regent Kleczka, it was VOTED, That upon the recommendation of the Dean of the College of Agriculture, the 3-K Dairy and Farm Sales revolving fund budget for 1950-51 be increased as follows:

Upon motion of Regent Jones, seconded by Regent Werner, it was VOTED, That in accordance with the last will and testament of Charles K. Adams, deceased, and upon recommendation of the Scholarships and Fellowships Committee, \$10,000 be allotted from the principal in the C. K. and Mary M. Adams Fellowship Fund to establish the President Adams Fellowship in Greek Language and Literature #3, and that this fellowship account participate in the distribution of income for the year 1950-51.

Upon motion of Regent Jones, seconded by Regent Kleczka, it was VOTED, That an account for life subscriptions to the Journal of Land Economics be established in the Consolidated University Trust Fund; that payments for life subscriptions to the Journal be credited to this account, and that the income be made available annually for expenses incurred in connection with the publication of the Journal of Land Economics; and that on the death of a lifesubscriber his subscription payment may be transferred to income on approval of the Regents.

Upon motion of Regent Jones, seconded by Regent Campbell, it was VOTED, That the Attorney General be requested to represent The Regents of the University of Wisconsin and to take whatever steps are necessary or desirable in protecting the interests of the Regents in the Lelah Starks Estate; and that the President or the Secretary be authorized to sign any and all legal papers or documents required in connection therewith.

Upon motion of Regent Jones, seconded by Regent Campbell, it was VOTED, That \$30.00 be allotted from the Wisconsin Idea Theater Fund for prizes for an original playwriting contest in Winnebago County.

Upon motion of Regent Jones, seconded by Regent Kleczka, it was VOTED, That authority be granted to complete the plans and specifications for the remodelling of the Electrical Engineering Building, and that, if the plans and specifications are completed before the next Regent meeting, the administrative officers be authorized to advertise for bids for this work on a fixed-price basis or on a cost-plus basis if it does not appear possible to obtain satisfactory bids on the fixed-price basis. The estimated cost of this project on the basis of revised remodelling plans is \$172,000.

Upon motion of Regent Jones, seconded by Regent Kleczka, it was VOTED, That the Regents of the University of Wisconsin go on record as favoring legislation providing for the payment of elementary and high school tuition by the State of every person of school age residing at State institutions or upon tax-exempt lands belonging to the State similar to the proposed legislation embodied in Bill No. 323,5 introduced in the 1949 session of the Wisconsin Legislature, and legislation providing for payment by the State for debt services for elementary and high school purposes on account of such persons, and that this viewpoint of the Regents be communicated to the appropriate Committees of the 1951 Legislature.

Regent Watson asked that he be recorded as present but not voting because in his positions as Superintendent of Public Instruction and as a member of several other state boards he had sponsored other legislation on this subject.

It was suggested that the administrative officers, in presenting the above action of the Regents to the Committees of the Legislature, should call the attention of the Legislature to the distinction between certain properties operated by private corporations on state-owned land and those operated under the complete control of state agencies.

Upon motion of Regent Jones, seconded by Regent Kleczka, it was VOTED, That the administrative officers be directed to appear before the appropriate Committees of the 1951 Legislature in opposition to Bill No. 613, A relating to school takes on tax-exempt lands and Bill No. 614, A relating to State property exempt from taxation, because of the alternative proposal which has been suggested by the Regents on the subject covered by these Bills.

Upon motion of Regent Jones, seconded by Regent Kleczka, it was VOTED, That the following resolution be adopted:

WHEREAS, the facts as to the creation of a trust by Elsie S. Wyse for the benefit of Frank O. Wyse and Clarinda C. Wyse have been presented to the Circuit Court of Milwaukee County (Clarinda C. Wyse, Guardian ad Litem for Frank O. Wyse and Clarinda C. Wyse, Petitioner, vs Irving A. Puchner and Marshall & Ilsley Bank, Executors and Trustees of the Estate of Elsie S. Wyse, and "The Regents of The University of Wisconsin", a body corporate of the State of Wisconsin, Respondents - Case No. 225-793); and

WHEREAS, The Court has rendered a decision upholding the validity of the creation of said trust; and

WHEREAS, The Regents, beneficiaries under the Last Will and Testament of Elsie S. Wyse, Deceased, are not disposed to question the decision of the Court in said case;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, That, in the event the Executors and Trustees of the Estate of Elsie S. Wyse appeal the decision of the Court in said case, the Attorney General be requested not to join in such appeal on behalf of The Regents of The University of Wisconsin.

(The above resolution was adopted by the Regents of the University of Wisconsin after consultation with the office of the Attorney General.)

Regent Grady made the following statement:

"Mr. President, I desire to offer a resolution in relation to the affixing of a tablet on the replica of the original statue of Abraham Lincoln that now stands gracing Lincoln Terrace. Before offering it, it might be well to review a few of the facts in relation to it which may be somewhat surprising to many people in the state, as it was to me. It appears that in 1909, through the efforts of Richard Lloyd Jones, a distinguished alumnus, former editor of the Wisconsin State Journal at Madison, an effort was made to secure the consent of the State of Kentucky for a replica of this statue. They had exclusive rights for it and the sculptor had a royalty that he could impose. It was through this great effort of Mr. Jones that the State of Kentucky, after contact was made with many of its legislators and through its Governor, gave its consent to the reproduction of the statue which now appears upon this campus. That was in 1909. After the consent was secured, Mr. Adolph A. Weinman, the sculptor, waived his royalty as it was going to the State of Wisconsin. It was reported that he had been offered \$15,000 for this replica from another state. Mr. Thomas E. Brittingham, who was then a Regent of this University, advanced the money necessary for the casting of the replica and the transportation of it, amounting to something over

\$6,500. Although that occurred in 1909, there appears no reference in the records of even an expression of appreciation and thanks to the State of Kentucky, to the sculptor, Mr. Weinman, to Mr. Jones who procured it, or Mr. Brittingham who advanced this fund. There appears no tablet showing our appreciation of the kindness and cordiality of the State of Kentucky, and for forty-two years we have no record of having shown any appreciation by a recorded expression of gratitude and, therefore, I desire to offer a resolution at this belated hour.

## RESOLUTION

"WHEREAS the replica of the statue of Abraham Lincoln, sculptured for the State of Kentucky and located at Hodginville, Kentucky, his birthplace, was secured for this University through the efforts of Richard Lloyd Jones, a distinguished alumnus, in obtaining the consent of Kentucky to its duplication, in securing the release of royalties by its great sculptor, Adolph A. Weinman, and

"WHEREAS the expenses incident to its casting and transportation were borne and provided through the generosity of Thomas E. Brittingham, then a Regent of this University, and

"WHEREAS this replica bears no inscription recognizing the kind gesture of our sister State of Kentucky, the efforts of Richard Lloyd Jones, the concession of its sculptor, Adolph A. Weinman, or the generosity of Thomas E. Brittingham,

"THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that there be promptly provided and affixed to the base of the statue of Abraham Lincoln that now graces Lincoln Terrace a tablet of suitable size and material which shall bear an appropriate inscription expressing our appreciation of the courtesy and cordiality of the State of Kentucky, the efforts of Richard Lloyd Jones, the concession of the sculptor, Adolph A. Weinman, and the generosity of Thomas E. Brittingham.

"BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that a copy of this resolution and a photograph of this replica with the affixed tablet be presented with an expression of the deep gratitude of the University to the State of Kentucky, Richard Lloyd Jones, Adolph A. Weinman, and to each of the surviving members of the family of Thomas E. Brittingham."

Upon motion of Regent Grady, seconded by Regent Kleczka, the resolution relating to the Lincoln statue was unanimously adopted.

Regent Werner offered the following resolution relating to the membership of Walter J. Hodgkins on the Board of Regents:

- "WHEREAS, Walter John Hodgkins was a member of the University of Wisconsin Board of Regents from 1939 to 1951, during two of which years he served with distinction as president of the Board;
- "WHEREAS, he brought to the Board a wide experience in Wisconsin business and industry and a keen knowledge of human relations in a broad area of the state;
- "WHEREAS, he always gave freely of his time and energy to all phases of University work, brought his far-seeing counsel to bear on University problems and services, and was a constant inspiration to his colleagues; and
- "WHEREAS, his philosophy as a public servant was based on the solid premise that the best interests of the state and of its University are one and the same and can only be served together;
- "NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, That the Board of Regents of the University of Wisconsin, in meeting assembled on April 7, 1951, commend and congratulate Walter John Hodgkins for a task well done, and that this statement be spread upon the record and suitably published."

Upon motion of Regent Werner, seconded by Regent Campbell, the resolution relating to the membership of Walter J. Hodgkins was unanimously adopted.

Regent Kleczka offered the following resolution relating to the services of Daniel H. Grady as a member of the Board of Regents and expressed his pleasure that Mr. Grady could hear, while still present as a member of the Board, what his colleagues think of him and of his services as a member of the Board:

"WHEREAS, Daniel H. Grady has devoted his valuable time and boundless energy as a University of Wisconsin Regent over a greater number of years than any other private citizen in the University's history;

"WHEREAS, he has been, through these years, a wise, honorable, conscientious, far-sighted, and loyal friend of higher education in Wisconsin and has played a major part in the development of the state's major educational institutions;

"WHEREAS, his keen legal mind, his decisive thinking, his sense of dignity and humor, and his companionship will be missed by his colleagues on the University of Wisconsin Board of Regents; and

"WHEREAS, his colleagues wish to make their gratitude for his counsel and companionship known to all:

"NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, That the Board of Regents of the University of Wisconsin, in meeting assembled on April 7, 1951, commend and congratulate Daniel H. Grady for a task well done, and that this statement be spread upon the record and suitably published."

Upon motion of Regent Kleczka, seconded by Regent Campbell, the resolution relating to the services of Daniel H. Grady as a member of the Board of Regents was unanimously adopted.

Regent Grady, in his usual eloquent manner, responded as follows:

"Mr. President and members of the Board - it has often been said that there is a certain sadness about doing anything for the last time, and, while I fully appreciate that I have served with this Board long enough to entitle me to the release from further obligations, I look back upon the associations on this Board of Regents with the greatest delight. I know full well that during the period that I have served, in some instances I found my views conflicting with others, but there has never been an instance in which I did not accord to others the full right to express their views; I believe that men of honor will ever and always appreciate and grant to others the right to entertain their opinions no matter now widely they may differ from our own. I leave this Board with a feeling of the greatest and deepest appreciation of the many kindnesses which have been extended to me throughout the years. I know that when we reach my age, according to life's sun dial, I am facing the West, but I may say to you that I hope you will recognize the danger of my passing away and that you will not forget to come and see me. My associations on this Board through twenty-one and more years have been of a character so dear to me that I assure you that I will never forget my obligation to call and see you in so far as I can, and I hope you will not forget to call and see me. I think that every man has experienced the regrets, that I have experienced a thousand times, in determining that on a certain day in the near future he will call and see someone - only to find that he delayed the visit too long. Now many of you pass through the little town in which I live and I implore you and I beg of you to call and see me. I think my thought this morning can be expressed in a poem 'Around the Corner' written by Charles Hanson Towne. May I quote this stanza:

> 'Around the corner I have a friend, In this great city that has no end; Yet days go by, and weeks rush on, And before I know it a year is gone,

And I never see my old friend's face,
For Life is a swift and terrible race.
He knows I like him just as well
As in the days when I rang his bell
And he rang mine. We were younger then,
And now we are busy, tired men —
Tired with playing a foolish game,
Tired with trying to make a name.
"Tomorrow," I say "I will call on Jim,
Just to show that I'm thinking of him."
But tomorrow comes — and tomorrow goes,
And the distance between us grows and grows.

Around the corner! - yet miles away "Here's a telegram, sir - "
"Jim died today."

And that's what we get, and deserve in the end - Around the corner, a vanished friend.

Do come and see me! I thank you all."

The Regents applauded Regent Grady's remarks and honored Regent Grady by rising.

The Secretary read a request dated February 28, 1951, from the editorin-chief of The Daily Cardinal, requesting permission for the press to attend
Regent committee meetings. (Copy on file.) A question was raised as to whether
the request covered only committee meetings of the Board or whether it was intended to cover informal conferences of the Regents, or both committee meetings
and the informal conferences. Mr. Jack D. Zeldes, who had submitted the request
as editor-in-chief of The Daily Cardinal, was present and was questioned by members of the Board regarding his intentions in this connection. After some discussion it appeared that Mr. Zeldes had considered the informal conferences of the
Regents to be committee meetings and had intended his request to cover both committee meetings and informal conferences. Upon motion of Regent Watson, seconded
by Regent Kleczka, it was

VOTED, That, in so far as possible, there be a definite schedule of the informal sessions of the Board of Regents preceding the formal Regent meetings and that such informal meetings be open to the public and the press with the Regents retaining the statutory right and obligation to go into executive sessions when the nature of the matters under consideration demand that they go into

executive session.

Upon motion of Regent Kleczka, seconded by Regent Jones, the meeting adjourned at 11:45 A.M.

# PROPOSED REVISION OF THE REQUIREMENTS FOR THE DEGREE OF BACHELOR OF SCIENCE (CHEMISTRY COURSE)

The purpose of the Course in Chemistry is to give students a broad basic training in chemistry which will be adequate for those who desire to enter the chemical industry, or to teach chemistry in secondary schools, or to continue their training by doing graduate work for advanced degrees. It does not profess to train chemists for specific industries, for each industry has its special problems and methods. An intensive four-year training is adequate for those who do not wish to become specialists and for those who do not wish to do research; research requires a considerable amount of graduate work. Students who do exceptionally well in their undergraduate work are encouraged to go on with graduate studies so that they may qualify for more responsible positions.

The Course in Chemistry (with properly chosen electives) also provides a good preparation for the subsequent study of medicine. By election of certain commercial subjects, an excellent preparation for administrative and executive positions in industries which are based on chemistry may be obtained. Most industries now have chemical control laboratories and many maintain their own research staffs. Several industries maintain central research laboratories to serve the entire industry. Positions in such laboratories are desirable as they often lead to excellent positions in the industry. The demand for men at both the bachelor's level and the doctorate level has been heavy in recent years.

In order to broaden the educational program, the course provides for a substantial amount of elective and required work outside the field of chemistry. Three options are offered—a general option, an option for food chemists, and an option for fermentation chemists. The work of the freshman year is identical in each of the three options.

This course meets the standards set by the American Chemical Society for undergraduate professional training in chemistry.

REQUIREMENTS. 130 credits are required for graduation. Students frequently find it desirable to satisfy part of the requirements during one or more summer sessions. High school mathematical preparation is required.

The equivalent of at least courses 10a and 10b in German is required, but high school work in this language may be counted toward this requirement.

Admission to the junior year is restricted to students who have at least a 1.5 grade point average for the first two years' work in all chemistry, mathematics, and physics courses combined.

- (a) Of the total elective credits not more than 15 may be taken in Chemistry, Biochemistry, Chemical Engineering, Mathematics and Physics combined. Students who plan to do graduate work in Chemistry are advised to elect one year (8 cr.) of French or Russian. It is strongly recommended that the student elect courses in the fields of American history, political science and economics.
- (b) Senior thesis (Chem. 100) may be elected for 3 to 6 credits but only by students with an overall grade point average of at least 2.25 and only with the consent of an instructor under whose direction the work will be done; Chem. 100 is strongly recommended for those who can qualify. Grades of B or better in Chem. 120, 121, 122, and 123 are required for election of Chem. 126. Chem. 126 is a prerequisite for 3 credits of thesis in organic chemistry. The election of other chemistry courses is limited only by Note a and the prerequisites for each particular course.

# Document 993 - April 2, 1951 REPORT AND RECOMMENDATIONS OF THE MEDICAL SCHOOL AND THE COLLEGE OF LETTERS AND SCIENCE Report of the Joint Committee for the Study of the Premedical Program

### INTRODUCTION

This report is the result of a study suggested by the Committee on Functions and Policies in its second report Chapter X, Page 11 as follows:

#### THE PREMEDICAL CURRICULUM

"A large number of able students are enrolled in the Premedical course. Many of these after a highly successful academic career find that under present competitive conditions they have failed to gain admittance to the Medical School of the University of Wisconsin or to any other medical school of good standing. This leads to a degree of frustration that is rarely found in other groups of equal industry and ability.

The committee believes emphatically that the premedical work should not be narrowly professional and should be devised to lead, without material loss of time, to other professional opportunities.

It has been suggested that students should not enter upon a premedical course until their sophomore year, at which time more evidence as to the likelihood of ultimate admission into a medical school would be available than at the beginning of the freshman year -- the time at which they now enroll in premedical work. It has also been suggested that premedical students should designate a major other than Medical Science at the beginning of the junior year, with the understanding that a major in Medical Science may be substituted at the beginning of the senior year if they are admitted to the Medical School. The faculty member designated as the premedical adviser would continue to serve as their adviser throughout the junior year; major department consultants would confer with them regarding the major proposed as a substitute for Medical Science.

The committee recommends that the Medical School and the College of Letters and Science undertake a study of the premedical program in order that those students who later are not admitted to a medical school or who change their objectives will have received the greatest possible value from their studies."

# ANALYSIS OF 1949-50 STUDY PROGRAM

The committee made an analysis of the subjects carried by students classified as "premedical" during the 1949-50 school year. Both required and elective credits were included. The results are tabulated as follows:

# ADMISSION REQUIREMENTS OF THE AMERICAN MEDICAL COLLEGES

The committee made a summary of the college courses required for admission to the seventy-nine medical schools of the United States. Courses recommended to the premedical student but not required were also listed. The data was taken from a publication, "Admission Requirements of American Medical Colleges" 1950 edition, issued by the Association of American Medical Colleges. It is appreciated that such a compilation does not provide a complete and accurate picture but we believe it furnishes perspective and is of value for general comparative purposes. The results are tabulated by subject.

#### 1. Chemistry

All schools require theoretical and laboratory courses in general and organic chemistry. Some schools require quantitative and/or physical chemistry. The range of required credits in chemistry is wide, 9-27. The present requirement at Wisconsin is 17-22 credits. Fifty medical schools recommend additional courses in chemistry beyond their requirements.

# 2. Biology

All schools require courses in general biology or zoology including laboratory work. Some schools require comparative anatomy or vertebrate embryology. The range of required credits in biology is 6-16. Approximately one-half of the schools require 8 credits. The present requirement at Wisconsin is 8-10 credits. Forty-three schools recommend courses beyond their requirements.

#### 3. Physics

All schools require theoretical and laboratory courses in physics. The range of credits required in physics is 6-10. The majority of schools require 8 credits. The present requirement at Wisconsin is 8-10 credits. Seven schools recommend advanced courses in physics.

#### 4. Mathematics

Fourteen schools require a college course in mathematics. Two schools have announced a requirement effective in 1951 and 1952. The range of credits required in mathematics is 3-10. The present requirement at Wisconsin is 3-4 credits. Forty-two schools recommend mathematics.

#### 5. English

All schools require English composition. Some schools require advanced composition or literature. The range of credits required in English is 6-15. The majority of schools require 6 credits. The present requirement at Wisconsin is 12 credits. Twenty schools recommend additional courses beyond their requirements.

#### 6. Foreign Language

Forty-three schools require courses in foreign language. The range of credits required in foreign language is from 6-16. Five schools express the requirement as a reading knowledge, presumably in either French or German. John Hopkins Medical School requires a reading knowledge in both French and German. Eighteen schools recommend but do not require courses in foreign language. Seventeen schools neither require nor recommend foreign language study. The present requirement at Wisconsin is 14 credits in either French or German.

#### 7. Social Studies

Sixteen schools require courses in the social studies. The range of required credits in the social studies is 3-18. Thirty-eight schools recommend social science courses. There is no requirement in the social sciences at Wisconsin at present.

The by-laws of the Association of American Medical Colleges define the entrance requirements of member schools in part as follows:

"The minimum of collegiate credits required for entrance to medical schools and colleges in membership in the Association shall be not less than two full academic years, which shall include English, theoretical and practical courses in physics and biology, and in general and organic chemistry, completed in institutions approved by accrediting agencies acceptable to the Executive Council of the Association."

These requirements are obviously such as to permit member institutions considerable latitude in establishing the curriculum which, in their judgment, meets the needs of the premedical student. Medical educators have often indicated that as broad an educational experience as possible including the fundamental science courses represents the ideal program. Because so many medical schools have recommended advanced courses (in their catalogs) especially in the sciences, medical educators have been accused of paying only lip service to the ideal they set forth.

#### PREPROFESSIONAL TRAINING AT WISCONSIN

The committee believes that the collegiate program at Wisconsin would best meet the needs of the preprofessional student if it provided for the essential training in the fundamental sciences and for as broad and liberal an experience as possible in other fields of knowledge.

The essential courses in the fundamental sciences were defined by the committee as a semester of general zoology, a semester of vertebrate embryology, a year of general chemistry, a semester each of organic and quantitative chemistry, and a year of general physics, all at the college level. The committee also considered it essential that the preprofessional student have some background in words and terms peculiar to the field of medicine. A great many such words have their roots in Latin and Greek. It was concluded therefore that the present requirement of a course in the origin of Latin and Greek medical terms should be continued for those students who have not had two years of Latin in high school or its equivalent.

To provide the opportunity for as broad an education as possible, in addition to the aforementioned courses, the committee recommends that any course of study leading to the baccalaureate degree in the College of Letters and Science be accepted as meeting the requirements of preprofessional study for medicine. Ninety credits of college work must be completed before a student is eligible to enter the medical school. If the student enters the medical school after having earned ninety credits toward the baccalaureate degree he must have satisfied all of the requirements for that degree except that of the major. The first year in the medical school and the fourth year in the college of Letters and Science are concomitant, and the work of that year satisfies the requirement of the major in medical science.

The student who desires the B.A. degree can meet the requirements with the average fifteen credit semester program if he has had two years of Latin or modern foreign language in high school. If he has not earned language credits in high school he is still able to qualify for the B.A. without exceeding the normal credit load of 16-17 credits per semester. The additional elective credits in the B.S. General Course, provided for under the proposed program, would allow a student to pursue a related field of study beyond the elementary level. Proficiency in some subject gained through relatively advanced study was considered to be a desirable objective for some students.

It was the consensus of the committee that the program outlined above would provide the preprofessional student in medicine with the opportunity to get a sound foundation for professional study. However, should he, because of his own choice or because of inadequate performance, find it desirable or necessary to transfer to another field of study such a transfer could be accomplished with a minimum loss of time and/or credit.

# RECOMMENDATIONS

In order to implement the proposed changes in our present requirements and procedures the committee specifically recommends:

1. That the classification "premedical" be abolished.

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COMMENT: The committee concurs in the opinion expressed by several educators that college education should not be "pre" anything; rather it should be preparation for life. The committee suggests that college students who expect to matriculate in the medical school be registered in the B.A. or B.S. General Course during the first two years. Such students would be assigned to a group of advisers who will work in close cooperation with the assistant dean of the medical school. It is anticipated, by the committee, that this group would implement the program proposed in this report. At the beginning of the junior year the student would be admitted to the major in medical science if his scholastic record was satisfactory. Such a classification does not imply admission to the medical school. The assistant dean of the medical school would be the adviser to all junior students registered for a major in medical science.

- 2. That the specific courses prerequisite for admission to the medical school be defined as follows:
  - a. Zoology; a semester course in general zoology, (5 cr), and a semester course in vertebrate embryology (3-5 cr).
  - b. Chemistry, a year course in general chemistry (8-10 cr); a semester course in organic chemistry (4-5 cr) and a semester course in quantitative chemistry (3-4 cr).
  - c. Physics; a year course in general physics (8-10 cr).
  - d. Origins of Greek and Latin Medical Terms (3 cr). Required of candidates who have not had two years of high school Latin or its equivalent.
  - e. Mathematics (3-4 cr).
- 3. That the present requirement in organic chemistry of a year course be reduced to a semester course and that the revised requirement read:

Organic chemistry, must include a theoretical and laboratory course, or courses, in both aliphatic and aromatic compounds, 4-5 credits.

4. That the present requirement in foreign language be replaced by the general degree requirements of the College of Letters and Science.

Language study, we feel should be regulated by the general degree requirements of the College of Letters and Science. It is assumed, however, that advisers will point out, not only the educative value of the languages, but the fact that many students will have to have a knowledge of them, notably those planning to attend medical schools where language is an admission requirement; those expecting to do medical research; those who may go to graduate school to work for a Ph.D. in another field; and those who wish a B.A.
