Saturday, December 9, 1950, 10 A.M.

PRESENT: Regents Arveson, Campbell, Gelatt, Grady, Jones, Kleczka, Watson, Werner.

ABSENT: Regents Hodgkins, Sensenbrenner.

Regent Hodgkins was unable to get to Madison because of the weather and Regent Sensenbrenner was absent due to illness.

Upon motion of Regent Watson, seconded by Regent Kleczka, it was VOTED, That the minutes of the November 11, 1950, meeting of the Board of Regents be corrected by changing Leaves of Absence No. 2 on page 7 to read:

That Clifford S. Liddle, associate professor of education, be granted leave of absence, eight days without pay, during the period November 12 to November 25, 1950, inclusive, in order that he may take special training requested by the Navy.

Upon motion of Regent Jones, seconded by Regent Gelatt, it was VOTED, That the minutes of the regular meeting of the Board held on November 11, 1950, as corrected, be approved.

- (a) \$ 1,000.00 Mrs. Fred Parst, Oconomowoc, Wisconsin, to be used for payment of expenses in connection with publishing the "Monatshefte" in the Department of German. (Fund 15-570)
- (b) 100.00 The First National Bank of Neillsville, Wisconsin, for the establishment of a scholarship in the Farm Short Course. The scholarship shall be known as "The First National Bank at Neillsville Short Course Scholarship" and shall be awarded to a young man upon his selection and enrollment in the Farm Short Course as approved by the Dean of the College of Agriculture. (Fund 15-569)
- (c) 10.00 Mrs. Arbutus A. Kemmerer, Evansville, Indiana, to be added to the Bess Tyrrell Burns Memorial Fund. (Trust Fund)
- (d) 250.00 Government of France, for a continuation of a scholar-ship program for outstanding American students of French residing at the Maison Francaise. Either graduate or undergraduate students are eligible for the award which is to be made upon the recommendation of the faculty of the French Department by the Committee on Loans and Undergraduate Scholarships or the Graduate School, as the case may be. (Fund 15-874)

- (e) \$ 150.00 Employers Mutual Liability Insurance Company of Wausau, Wisconsin, to purchase library material in the field of insurance for the School of Commerce. (Fund 15-567)
- (f) 1,600.00 Professor Glen W. Vergeront, Madison, Wisconsin, for the establishment of the Elizabeth Vandenberg Vergeront Annual Award for 4-H Club Leadership. The recipients of the award are to be a freshman boy and girl selected on or before May 1 each year by the Dean of the College of Agriculture and the Director of the School of Home Economics upon the basis of scholarship during the preceding semester, and shall be limited to students who have completed three years of 4-H Club work including one year of active participation as Junior Club Leader.

Two awards of \$25 each shall be made on or before May 1, 1951, and shall be taken from the principal of the fund. The same procedure shall be followed in 1952. Awards for subsequent years are to be made from the income of the fund, one-half of such income to be given to the girl and one-half to the boy. (Trust Fund)

- (g) 1,200.00 Citizens National Bank of Marshfield, Wisconsin, for 12 scholarships of \$100 each to be awarded to Farm Short Course students during the 1950-51 session. Scholarships are to be available for:
 - a. Two students who reside in Clark County
 - b. Two students who reside in Marathon County
 - c. Two students who reside in Wood County
 - d. The six 1949-50 scholarship winners, upon their return for the completion of the second year of Short Course training. (Fund 15-843)
- (h) 50.00 Phi Kappa Phi, Honorary Senior Fraternity, for the annual Phi Kappa Phi undergraduate scholarship award. (Fund 15-165)
- (i) 3.00 Anonymous contribution to be added to the Medical School Library Building Fund. (Fund 15-764)
- (j) 150.00 The Madison Chamber of Commerce for the establishment of two scholarships, beginning November, 1950, in The Farm Short Course. The scholarships will be known as "The Madison Chamber of Commerce Scholarships" and are to be awarded upon the recommendation of the Loans, Fellowships and Scholarships Committee of the College of Agriculture to farm boys (preferably over 17 years of age) who were exhibitors in the Junior Livestock Show, and who have distinguished themselves in the production of livestock used for meat. (Fund 15-564)

- (m) 1,250.00 National Cash Register Company, in support of research in the School of Commerce. (Fund 15-572)
- (n) Mrs. Cecelia N. Barton, Green Bay, Wisconsin, gift of forty-three volumes of business books for the Commerce Library.
- (o) 125.00 Gillett State Bank of Gillett, Wisconsin, for the establishment of the Gillett State Bank Short Course Scholarship to be awarded to a student enrolled in the 1950-51 session of the Farm Short Course. (Fund 15-573)
- Gift of 100 shares of common stock of Mission Corpora-(p) tion and 121 shares of common stock of Cuneo Press, from Mrs. Elsie Bullard Morrison (U.W. Class of 1910) for the establishment of another scholarskip in the School of Journalism and for the establishment of a prize fund in the School of Journalism. The sum of \$5000 is to establish a trust fund, the annual income of which is to provide a scholarship in the School of Journalism, with preference given to men students and with the selection of the recipient to be made by a committee to be headed by the Director of the School of Journalism. The balance of this gift is to establish a trust fund, the annual income of which is to be awarded as a cash prize at the close of each school year, to a student with a major in Journalism who, by vote of a committee of five persons (two of whom shall be students), has during that school year made the most outstanding record for scholarship, service to others, and encouragement of high journalistic standards, with students of all four undergraduate classes eligible for consideration without discrimination as to sex, creed, race or color. (Trust Fund)
- (q) 1,000.00 University of Wisconsin Foundation, a gift from a friend of the University to help equip the former "Executive Mansion" as a Graduate Center for the University of Wisconsin as a Memorial to Mr. Kemper K. Knapp. (Fund 15-488)
- (r) 1,320.00 University of Wisconsin Foundation, Grant No. 1, from the Homer Adkins Memorial Fund for the support of the Homer Adkins Fellowship in Chemistry, for the year July 1, 1951 to June 30, 1952; the recipient to be selected by the Department of Chemistry and the Fellowship (Cont.)

(r) (Cont.) - to provide a stipend of \$1200 with the balance of the grant to be used to pay the incidental fees of the recipient. (Fund 15-575)

Upon motion of Regent Kleczka, seconded by Regent Campbell, recommendation No. 1, Gifts (a) to (r), inclusive, listed under Gifts and Grants was adopted.

- (a) \$ 5,000.00 The American Foundrymen's Society, Chicago, Illinois, in support of research on malleable cast iron, beginning November 15, 1950, in the Foundry Laboratories of the Department of Mining and Metallurgy. (Fund 15-565)
- (b) 1,200.00 National Cranberry Association, Hanson, Massachusetts, for the establishment of a graduate fellowship in support of research on the pharmaceutical aspect of ursolic acids and other by-products of the cranberry industry during the period December 1, 1950 to December 1, 1951, in the School of Pharmacy. (Fund 15-566)
- (c) 10,500.00 The Nutrition Foundation, Inc., New York City, in support of research concerning "Relationships between amino acids and enzyme systems" in the amount of \$3,500 per year during the calendar years 1951, 1952 and 1953, in the Department of Biochemistry. (Fund 15-568)
- (d) 4,800.00 Oscar Mayer & Company, Madison, Wisconsin, for the support of an industrial research project during the period February 1, 1951 to January 31, 1954, which will have for its purpose a study of the effect of processing treatments on the physical and chemical properties of meat proteins in the Departments of Dairy Industry and Animal Hustandry. (Fund 15-571)
- (e) 50.00 Mr. D. C. Everest, Rothschild, Wisconsin, as an addition to the previous grant of \$1,500.00 for the establishment of a research fellowship which has for its purpose the study of forest tree breeding in the Scandinavian countries during the period November 15, 1950 to December 31, 1951, under the supervision of the Department of Genetics. This additional grant is to be used in accordance with the terms and conditions of the Memorandum Agreement accepted by the Regents on October 14, 1950. (Fund 15-551)

(f) \$ 1,350.00 - Hussmann Refrigerator Company, St. Louis, Missouri, for the support of an industrial research project during the period November 15, 1950 to June 30, 1951, in the Department of Dairy Industry, on methods for reducing ice crystal formation in ice cream in order to improve the quality of the product. (Fund 15-574)

Upon motion of Regent Watson, seconded by Regent Gelatt, recommendation No. 1, Grants (a) to (f), inclusive, listed under Gifts and Grants was adopted.

RECOMMENDATION AND REPORT OF THE VICE PRESIDENT OF BUSINESS AND FINANCE

I. Report of Actions Taken

1. Contracts and leases signed with the United States Government for research work, educational programs, and for services requested by the Government for military personnel and veterans, and for other educational services of the University:

- a. Supplemental Agreement No. 2 to Army Chemical Corps Contract No. W-18-064-CML-210 setting the total actual cost to the Government at \$3200 and terminating the subject contract.
- b. Amendment No. 11 to Navy Bureau of Ordnance Contract NOrd-9938, providing for extension of the term of the subject contract through September 30, 1951, an increase of \$81,000 in the estimated cost to cover continuation of the work under Task WIS-1 through the extended term (no additional funds being provided to cover continuation of performance under Task WIS-2), and revision of the "Buy American" clause.
- c. Supplement No. 1 to Project No. 1 under Atomic Energy Commission Contract No. AT(11-1)-64, providing for studies of "Metabolism of Organic Acids in Higher Plants and Microorganisms" in the Departments of Biochemistry and Agricultural Bacteriology during the period January 1, 1951 through December 31, 1951, for which the Government will make available \$6750.
- d. Supplement No. 1 to Project No. 2 under Atomic Energy Commission Contract No. AT(11-1)-64, providing for "Studies of Biological Nitrogen Fixation with Isotopic Tracers" in the Departments of Biochemistry and Agricultural Bacteriology during the period January 1, 1951 through December 31, 1951, for which the Government will make available \$5400.
- 2. In accordance with the authority granted by the Regents on September 27, 1947, for the Vice President of Business and Finance to sign contracts and leases not in excess of \$2500, the following contracts and orders have been signed:
 - a. Rental from Milwaukee Recreation Company of Antlers Ballroom, Antlers Hotel, Milwaukee, for use by the Midwaukee
 Extension Center for a Welcome Dance on February 9, 1951.

 - b. Rental from the Milwaukee Auditorium Board of Engelmann Hall and use of public address system in the Milwaukee Auditorium Building in the evening of January 17, 1951, for "On Wisconsin Night" sponsored by the Milwaukee Extension Center for Milwaukee high school seniors no charge for admission.

Upon motion of Regent Kleczka, seconded by Regent Gelatt, actions 1 and 2 listed under the recommendation and report of the Vice President of Business and Finance (I. Report of Actions Taken) were approved.

II. Contracts, Leases and Agreements

1. That the action of the Regents on July 15, 1950, authorizing the Vice President of Business and Finance to sign an agreement with the United States Geological Survey for a cooperative investigation of water resources of the State of Wisconsin during the period July 1, 1950 to June 30, 1951, be amended to authorize the Vice President of Business and Finance to sign such an agreement under which each party shall expend not to exceed \$15,450 instead of \$15,000, for this work during the period of the agreement.

Upon motion of Regent Jones, seconded by Regent Watson, recommendation No. 1 listed under the recommendation and report of the Vice President of Business and Finance (II. Contracts, Leases and Agreements) was adopted.

The Secretary reported that the Governor had appointed Mrs. George A. Chatterton, Madison, Wisconsin, to membership on the Board of Visitors for the unexpired term, ending June 30, 1951, of the late Miss Maude M. Munroe.

Regent Jones presented the report of the Business and Finance Committee. Upon motion of Regent Jones, seconded by Regent Kleczka, it was VOTED, That the 16-C Agricultural Extension budget for 1950-51 be increased by \$2500:

\$ 500 - Salary and Wage Budget 2000 - Supplies and Expense Budget;

on account of additional Federal appropriations for Agricultural Extension work.

Upon motion of Regent Jones, seconded by Regent Gelatt, it was VOTED, That the bequest by the late Adalin Brown White of the City of Madison, Wisconsin, to the Regents of the University of Wisconsin, in the amount of \$5000, the income of which is to be used for a scholarship to be known as the

"Elizabeth Brown Memorial Scholarship in Romance Languages," be accepted by the Regents of the University in accordance with the terms and conditions of the Last Will and Testament of Adalin Brown White, deceased; and that the President, the Secretary or the Assistant Secretary be authorized to sign receipts in the name of the Regents for the funds received under this bequest or do all things necessary to effect the transfer of this bequest to the Regents.

Upon motion of Regent Jones, seconded by Regent Campbell, it was VOTED, That the Executive Committee be authorized to act for the Board in the award of contracts, approval of schedule of costs and related matters in connection with the addition to the Home Economics Building, for which bids will be opened on December 20, 1950.

Upon motion of Regent Jones, seconded by Regent Watson, it was VOTED, That \$1200 be allotted from 1-E Unbudgeted Receipts to Buildings and Grounds for the purchase of fuel which cannot be charged to the 1-AB sum sufficient appropriation.

Upon motion of Regent Jones, seconded by Regent Gelatt, it was VOTED, That \$6153 be allotted from the Reserve for War Contracts 16-D for remodelling in the Service Building to provide additional office space for the Department of Buildings and Grounds.

Upon motion of Regent Jones, seconded by Regent Kleczka, it was VOTED, That the administrative officers be directed to request the Legislature to again consider the provisions of Substitute Amendment No. 1,S to Bill No. 599,S, 1949 legislative session, relating to exemption of transfers of property to certain out-of-state institutions from inheritance and gift taxes.

Upon motion of Regent Jones, seconded by Regent Campbell, it was VOTED, That the administrative officers be directed to request the Legislature to amend Section 36.06(4), Wisconsin Statutes, relating to the use of Men's and Women's Dormitories at the University, by adding the following after the semicolon in the first sentence of the Section:

"excepting that the board of regents may set aside a small quota of accommodations, not to exceed 6 percent, for assignment to students who are residents of other states or are from countries and territories outside the continental limits of the United States."

Upon motion of Regent Jones, seconded by Regent Kleczka, it was VOTED, That the following rates for room and board in University Residence Halls for the 1951 Summer Session be approved:

Upon motion of Regent Jones, seconded by Regent Kleczka, it was VOTED, That the Vice President of Business and Finance be authorized to sign an agreement between the Regents of the University of Wisconsin and Carl Bernard, Madison, for leasing of the boathouse concession at the University boathouse for the period beginning November 1, 1950 and ending October 31, 1951.

Upon motion of Regent Jones, seconded by Regent Watson, it was VOTED, That the action taken by the administration in adjusting rents in faculty houses operated by the Division of Residence Halls, in order to equalize the rents for such housing accommodations, be approved.

Upon motion of Regent Grady, seconded by Regent Kleczka, the following statement concurring in the action of the Faculty of December 4, 1950, for the establishment of a Committee on Human Rights was unanimously adopted:

"At a meeting of this Board on November 11, 1950, the following resolution was unanimously adopted:

'The Regents commend the spirit which prompted the students and faculty in recommending the protection and preservation of human rights in the University of Wisconsin.

The Regents are unanimous in their belief that the faculty and officers of the University of Wisconsin, throughout the long years of its history, have made an outstanding record in the safeguarding of human rights. Our University has historically served, regardless of race or creed, all who have sought its instruction. Its students now include members of all groups and segments of society, accepting each other and learning together. The Regents are proud of the ability of any student on our campus to gain recognition upon his or her individual merits, and are pleased with the growth in understanding upon our campus — an understanding so sorely needed in America and in the world.

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, That the University of Wisconsin shall in all its branches and activities maintain the fullest respect and protection of the Constitutional rights of all citizens and students regardless of race, color, sect, or creed; and any violation thereof shall immediately be reported to the administration and the Regents for appropriate action to the end that any such violation of Constitutional rights shall be promptly and fully corrected, and future violations prevented.

The Regents are gratified to note that the Faculty at their December meeting unanimously passed a resolution 'to implement the resolution on human rights passed by the Regents on November 11, 1950' and are happy themselves unanimously to concur in that resolution. It reads:

'That a Committee on Human Rights be established, consisting of three faculty members and two students (panel of students to be nominated by Student Board) appointed annually by the President, with the following duties: (1) by fact-finding and education to work toward elimination of racial and religious discrimination against members of the University community; (2) to keep the Faculty informed by occasional reports regarding the status of the human rights problem in the University community and make recommendations on matters of policy connected therewith; (3) to consider alleged violations of the human rights of members of the University community, and to report its findings to the University's administrative officers.'

The Board of Regents will by appropriate action fulfill the obligations and assurances of establishing the policies of this University pursuant to the resolution of this Board adopted November 11, 1950."

The Secretary reported that President Sensenbrenner had requested, in writing, that he be recorded as favoring the action of the Faculty establishing a Committee on Human Rights and that Regent Hodgkins had approved the Faculty recommendation by telephone.

Upon motion of Regent Grady, seconded by Regent Arveson, the meeting adjourned at 10:45 A.M.
