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

LET'S DO SOMETHING ABOUT IT

From time to time the editor of "Bay Leaves" has published articles on the Constitution of the United States of America and citizenship just as have most every newspaper, but print and talk do not seem to be getting us very far.

Many men and women whose views we read or hear seem to stress the fact that we have more to fear from within in this country than from without. We are a part of a great nation, a country to which men and women from all corners of the earth have come to cast their lot. They have been welcome in the past- most of us unless we are pure Indian stock, are descendants from brave men and women who were immigrants - we welcome now the few whom we can let in according to our immigration laws. The great sacrifices that some have made to get into this country illegally, shows that it must be a country worth such effort to get into.

But do we who are born here, who have become citizens through naturalization appreciate our CITIZENSHIP? If there is grave danger from within, it must come from men and women who have not adopted our principles of government as the lofty purpose in their conduct with their fellow citizens.

It is to do something about this matter of good citizenship that the editor presents in this issue of " Bay Leaves " a plan for helping to get before all United States the basis of our representative form of government copies of the Constitution together with comments by our great statesmen.

We are herewith presenting to you readers of " Bay Leaves " as the first to know about it, " THE KNIGHTS OF AMERICA ".

KNIGHTS OF AMERICA

"Knights of America" is a fraternal organization of those citizens in the United States of America who believe that the principles of government given to us by our great statesmen, who helped to form the United States of America, in the Constitution of the United States, who band themselves together as did the Knights of Old to swear allegiance to the support of the Constitution and to guard, and if need be defend it, from enemies within and without these United States.

To better understand what it is we guard and defend, it is necessary that we know thoroughly what the principles, given to us in the law of the land, really are, and what our great statesmen interpret them to be. Therefore, the first great aim of this organization is to stimulate the reading and study of the Constitution.

This brings us to aim No. 1: make the Constitution available to every home in these United States. It should, together with the comments of our statesmen, be on every reading table in the United States in a neat readable form.

To further a knowledge of good citizenship according to these principles aim No. 2 is to establish Book Shelves in every community on Citizenship.

To further help spread such knowledge aim No. 3 recruits speakers who will lecture before schools and other groups on Citizenship.

Aim No. 4 is to encourage a study of the Constitution by giving prizes for essays.

Aim No. 5 is to give public recognition of those young voters who have attained the voting age since last election preceding.

Aim No. 6 is to enlist interest in voting on the part of all in their respective communities.

Aim No. 7 is to encourage those not yet citizens to become so and help, if need be, by a loan, to be paid off in small payments, to cover the costs.

The "Knights of America" is naturally non-partisan. It is not secret in any of its gatherings or exercises. It is non-sectarian but presupposes, as did our forefathers, the existence of a great and good Supreme Being.

Membership is open to all who will support the Constitution and help the organization carry out the above sevenfold program.

"Knights of America" will be incorporated under the "Laws of Wisconsin", and charters granted to local groups of 20 or more who wish to form Councils for carrying out the above aims in any given community.

We are off on the first lap which is to secure 1,000 charter members at \$1.00 each, and 1,000 Contributing Members at \$5.00 each for the establishing of a fund for printing a large number of the copies of the Constitution and distributing same. A Committee of local business men with the addition of several Summer residents on Lake Geneva will supervise the fund and see that it is spent as outlined above.

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

BILL 529 A WILL CREATE FINANCIAL CHAOS FOR VILLAGES AND CITIES

If bill 529 A which has just been introduced into legislature become a law, it would mean a complete breakdown of local government in Wisconsin. This measure proposes to fix a limit on real estate taxes that may be levied in any community of \$15 per \$1,000 valuation, with the further limitation that the tax on any homestead could not exceed \$5.00 per \$1,000 valuation. While debt charges for outstanding debts would be exempted, this limitation would apply to all debt charges hereafter incurred. Since the average tax rate at the present time in the cities of the state, for example, is \$33.15 per \$1,000 valuation, the enactment of any such bill could only mean one thing, namely that in order to keep within this limitation, villages, towns, counties, school districts, metropolitan sewerage districts, and other units including the state which now levy general property taxes, would now have to discontinue more than half the present activities. If relief and social security costs are to be kept at the present level, it might well mean the closing of schools, the cutting down of police and fire departments, shutting off of street lights, the abandonment of parks and recreational activities.

(Note : This is one man's idea of the bill. Do you have an answer for its defense. It will be published in next week's issue if you have.)

Noble applying for incorporation and it received 22 signatures. A survey was made by County Surveyor William Childs. An accurate census was made by L.A. Hollister and Easton Johnson an attorney from Whitewater. The Judge granted the petition and the survey and plat were filed with the Recorder of Deeds. A second petition calling for an election was signed by Alfred Pihl, S.J. Noble, Walter E. Jewell, Andrew Carlquist, Arthur Anderson, G. Henne, L.A. Hollister and A.B. Carlson.

On June 26th a subscription list was passed and \$81 was secured to pay for the incorporation expenses. The incorporation was granted in November, 1919. The first officers elected were: President, Storrs B. Barrett, Clerk, Oliver J. Lee, Treasurer, Arthur Anderson; Wm G. De Groof who did not qualify and A.H. Arneson was appointed; Constable, Carl M. Bjorge; Supervisor, J.A. Parkhurst; Justice of Peace Dan Beard who did not qualify and L.A. Hollister was appointed; Trustees, Henry W. Granzow, H.V. Brumgard, Edwin B. Frost, John Andell, John Lackey.

Without giving all details as to length of service the following have served in their respective offices, in some places they have been in office two or three times at different intervals.
