Approval of Minutes

Upon motion by Regent Davis, seconded by Regent Dreyfus, the minutes of the annual meeting of the Board, held on June 8, 1990, were approved as distributed.

Introduction of Senator Jauch

Welcoming State Senator Robert Jauch, Chair of the Senate Educational Financing, Higher Education and Tourism Committee, Regent President Lyon noted that Senator Jauch is a long-time friend of education in Wisconsin.

Senator Jauch began his remarks by stressing the importance of Regent visits around the state, both as means to understand better the significance of the institutions to their surrounding areas, and as a means to demonstrate interest in the special strengths and needs of the various institutions. In the case of UW-Superior, the university has a particularly great responsibility to the community because of the size and diversity of the area. Having the University reach out to assist in economic development and community survival is extremely important to the people of northern Wisconsin. The Regents' visit, he commented, has done much to boost confidence in the Board's responsiveness to the special needs of this part of the state.

Complimenting the Regents for their willingness to contribute so much time and effort to the well-being of the UW System, he observed that the position of responsibility as a Regent is second to none in the state and requires careful balancing of interests in determining what is really important for the System as a whole. "The University is one of our greatest strengths, and we cannot cheerlead enough about the importance of this University System to the State of Wisconsin. Wherever I go and describe the richness of Wisconsin, it is always the University of Wisconsin System and our educational system that becomes the fundamental selling point about what is great about Wisconsin." That had occurred, he noted, because the public and the Legislature have been willing to support quality programs matched by few others in the nation. The challenge in the upcoming years, he remarked, will be finding ways to assure the resources and management to do an even better job in an environment marked by competition, not only for quality students and faculty, but also for scarce state dollars.

Senator Jauch urged the Regents to view as their primary responsibility identification of the actual needs of the University of Wisconsin System and strong advocacy for those needs. It then is up to the Legislature to determine the priorities of overall state spending.

Recognizing management flexibility as an important concern of the Regents, Senator Jauch stated his agreement that the Legislature should not make decisions at the management level, but he pointed out legislative concern about losing accountability. He thought legislators would be willing to leave greater accountability in the hands of the Board of Regents if they believe the Regents have identified needs, set priorities among them and have assured efficient management of the resources allocated by the Legislature. If the Board were to become overly cautious in presenting budget requests, he warned that the effect would be to politicize the budget process, resulting in legislative attempts to define priorities for the UW System, thus pitting small campuses against larger ones. Priorities must be decided by the Board of Regents, he emphasized, and not by legislators who will look to their localized interests rather than at the UW System as a whole.

Senator Jauch commended the Regents, President Shaw and his staff for the success of enrollment management and the efficiency with which the UW System is operating now compared to several years ago. He felt comfortable that there is a plan in place to use resources in a way that maximizes the return on the state's investment.

Expressing appreciation for the cooperation received from members of the Board in the Committee appointments he had made, Regent President Lyon remarked that the Committee composition provides an excellent balance of thought and the best application of the human resources that constitute the Board. With an expanded staff, he noted, there is the opportunity more effectively to serve the Regents in development of independent studies, in-depth review of documents, and follow-up to specific items. He asked that Committee members work through their respective Chairs in the assimilation of staff requests. Executive Assistant Bove is to contact Committee Chairs following each meeting to ascertain those agenda items needing further attention. In the coming months, he added, most of the time allocated to major studies will be devoted to the Supplies and Expense Task Force and analysis of the biennial budget request. A revised responsibility statement is to be forwarded to Regents prior to the September meeting, with any suggestions for change to be communicated to the President of the Board.

Regent President Lyon then referred to a listing of anticipated agenda items for the coming year which had been compiled at his direction, with input of Regent staff and System Administration, and which had been reviewed by the Committee Chairs. He asked Regents to advise him, Vice President Nicholas or the Committee Chairs of any suggested additions or other changes Campus With - Planned with the Regults prior To 1911-93 fundation P:3

To meet the ongoing need for Regents to receive quality exposure to the inner workings of each campus, Regent President Lyon proposed that members of the Board make a planned visit to each campus prior to finalization of the 1991-93 operating and capital budget requests. The agenda is to include a facility tour and discussion periods with campus administration, faculty, academic staff, and students, the object being to receive input and become better informed of the concerns of campus leadership. The intent is for two or three Regents to be present for each visit. The Office of University Relations was to contact the members of the Board to ascertain visitation preferences, agenda preparation and preliminary scheduling.

With regard to his expectations and goals for the coming year, Regent President Lyon stated that primary consideration must be given to "passage of an operating and capital budget that adequately funds past initiatives and allows further implementation of the quality theme.

"More than in the two previous budgets in which I have been associated, the 1991-93 asking will complement monetary requests with a strong 'freedom to act independently' component. During the Shaw administration, I believe the University System has earned the right to ask state government for greater freedom to allocate granted resources in the institution's intelligent best interest.

"Through enrollment management, strengthened admissions standards, improved credit transferability, revised mission statements, performance evaluated upon quantifiable goals, and a host of other initiatives, this Board and its System administrators have proved that they can govern. I trust that the Legislature and the Administration, in considering the biennial budget, will be appreciative of the substantial change that has taken place as we seek to decouple compensation, be allowed to react quickly to new and unmet needs, and efficiently maintain the infrastructure.

"The major area of discussion in the coming months will be enrollment management. When the dust settles, I hope that this Board comes down on the side of enrollment opportunity for Wisconsin citizens who meet our more stringent admission standards. If students achieve our predetermined benchmarks, they must not be denied access. We should not be bashful in requesting general purpose revenue support to stabilize costs to students and to guarantee access and a quality education for those students who qualify.

"As the budget is processed, funding contributors should gain confidence in our ability to manage the System as we enact quality assessment policies and procedures, and implement curriculum changes proposed by specific discipline reviews and the established programmatic review procedures that we have in place.

"A common theme of the Weinstein and Schilling presidencies (perhaps longer, but that predates my experience) was that the Board of Regents is nonpartisan in its deliberations and advocates what it collectively believes to be in the best interest of its shareholders--the citizens of Wisconsin and the users of its services--160,000 students. That approach has served us very well, and I will do everything possible to maintain the working climate that I have inherited. I thank you very much, in advance, for your cooperation."

Announcing establishment of a Regent-led Task Force to examine supplies and expense expenditures for the UW System, Regent President Lyon noted that this important budget area applies to a wide range of expenditures, including purchase of classroom equipment, travel expenses for faculty and academic staff participation in conferences, repair of laboratory equipment, and purchase of office supplies and computer software. Noting that the Task Force is the culmination of work in the past year by former Regent President Schilling and others to shape the project,

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President Lyon said its purpose is to examine in a thorough, systematic and objective manner supplies and expense needs and ways for addressing those needs in a more efficient, cost-saving manner.

To help ensure the Task Force's objectivity and to draw on the widest possible range of views and expertise, the Task Force is to be co-chaired by two Regents and will be comprised of UW and Department of Administration officials, along with legislative and private sector representation. Regents Gelatt and Steil had agreed to serve as the Regent co-chairs of the Task Force. President Shaw and DOA Secretary Klauser were to nominate individuals from their staffs to serve as Task Force members. Regent Lyon had confirmed the participation of one private sector member, Robert Bush, Chairman of the Board of Schreiber Cheese, and one legislator, Representative Sue Rohan. He also was to invite another private sector representative to serve.

"This will be the first time," he stated, "that the Board of Regents establishes and leads an inter-governmental public sector/private sector task force. I believe this will be an effective mechanism for undertaking an objective study on an issue of strong interest to the Board. I would like to extend to Regents Gelatt and Steil and their Task Force colleagues the Board's support in their efforts to clarify the problems and identify constructive solutions in this important budget area."

Associates to the Beard of Regents Bylaws *Reserved of general anerdments*, R 5549, p.54EX B Presenting the proposed Bylaw amendments, Regent President Lyon outlined the following changes which would be made: deletion of a specified starting time for Board meetings; deletion of the provision for reading of the minutes of the last meeting; provision for officers to begin their terms immediately following the annual meeting; replacement of the word "Chairman" with "Chair"; and other revisions which would not change procedures but simply would update the language of the Bylaws and conform them with current practice.

It was moved by Regent Weinstein and seconded by Regent Dreyfus that the following resolution be adopted by the Board:

Resolution 5549: That the Bylaws of the Board of Regents be amended as set forth in the attached document.

(A copy of the revised Bylaws is attached as EXHIBIT B.)

Regent Davis referred to standards for deciding whether or not to grant requests for Regent review of a personnel or student appeal when consideration by the Board is discretionary. In that regard, the Bylaws provide for consideration of several factors in making the determination. As Chair of the Personnel Matters Review Committee, he had not interpreted the Bylaws to mean that these shall be the only factors considered, but rather had interpreted them to mean that the Regents shall consider these factors but are at liberty to consider others as well.

Put to the vote, Resolution 5549 was adopted unanimously.

Regent Schilling presented the following resolution, which was adopted with a standing ovation for Regent DeLong:

Resolution 5550: Whereas, Delmar E. DeLong has served with distinction on the Board of Regents of the University of Wisconsin System since 1988 in his capacity as President of the State Board of Vocational, Technical and Adult Education; and

> Whereas, he has played a key role in enhancing positive relationships between the UW System and the VTAE System, including the landmark agreement facilitating transfer of credit while maintaining the distinct missions of the two systems; and

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Whereas, he has enriched Regent deliberations with thoughtful and perceptive insights based on his knowledge and experience as a leader in the State Legislature and on his professional expertise in the fields of law and business; and

Whereas, his commitment to public service and to post-secondary education is demonstrated by the dedication and vigor with which he has served as a member of this Board and of the Education Committee, willingly devoting a great deal of time and effort to Regent duties, in addition to his demanding leadership responsibilities as President of the VTAE Board;

Now, therefore, be it resolved that the Board of Regents of the University of Wisconsin System hereby commends and thanks Delmar E. DeLong for the meritorious service and good counsel he has provided as a member of this Board for the past two years; and

Be it further resolved that, with great appreciation for the many contributions he has made to benefit the UW System, the Board of Regents grants to Regent DeLong, upon his retirement from the Board, the status and title of Regent Emeritus.

Regent President Lyon presented a plaque to Regent DeLong in appreciation for his distinguished service on the Board from 1988-90.

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Stating that his term on the Board had been both interesting and educational, Regent DeLong thanked the Board members and administrative staff for the help they had given him. He expressed special appreciation to Regent Schilling for his counsel, guidance, and the outstanding service he had rendered as a member of the State VTAE Board. "I believe that we have made some very positive steps in cooperation between the two systems. We go hand in hand. We have distinctly separate missions, and those missions should be fulfilled by each board. But that does not preclude cooperation between the two systems, and I have already seen that improve tremendoulsy. It is good for the VTAE and UW systems. I would like to feel that, in my tenure on the Board of Regents, we have taken a step forward and are ready to take some larger steps in the future."

Report of the Chair of the Educational Communications Board supplasing needfor cropension, p, 7

As an example of the benefits of cooperation between the Educational Communications Board and the UW System, Regent Clusen, Chair of the Educational Communications Board, described the arrangements being made at UW-Superior which will increase the prospects for Wisconsin Public Radio to be heard among residents of northwestern Wisconsin.

Currently, the signal of the campus station KUWS-FM is receivable by persons within about 15 miles of the campus. Under the new arrangement, this station will reach many more people by late 1990. Up until this year, the station had been entirely student operated and used as a laboratory for students in the Communication Arts Program. Now, it is being upgraded in both power and studio facilities, with a primary coverage area of a 40-50-mile radius of Superior.

The station has joined the Public Radio network and is to begin broadcasting programs in September. This was made possible through an operating agreement between UW-Superior and the ECB. Station operation now will be managed by a three-person staff as part of the Public Radio network, with the University continuing to own the physical plant and being responsible for funding all capital improvements. Students will continue to have a vital role in the operation of the station, and the station will continue to be a part of the Communication Arts Program. When completed, the project will allow residents of northwestern Wisconsin to receive both the talk and the music portions of Wisconsin Public Radio. A modern production facility located at UW-Superior will enable production of programming to be carried to the rest of the state through the Wisconsin Public Radio network.

This is an excellent example, Regent Clusen noted, that shows what can be accomplished without great expenditure by application of cooperative efforts.

Regent President Lyon congratulated Regent Clusen on her reelection in June as Chair of the Education Communications Board.

Report on Implementation of Higher Education Bond Program, PP 8-9

Noting the Board's early advocacy of the college bond program, Regent Schilling recalled that the Board had been asked by the Joint Finance Committee several years previously to consider the prospect of prepaid tuition. The conclusion was that such a program should not be adopted, but that a college bond program should be considered. With the capital budget, the Board submitted sample legislation, which was improved and adopted by the Governor and the Legislature.

After the first bond sale, several legislators raised concerns, and a report was done by the Legislative Audit Bureau. While media accounts had been quite negative, Regent Schilling commented that a careful reading of the audit report would show the sale actually to have been a great success. Normally, he pointed out, a \$65 million bond issue would be purchased by approximately 200 orders, whereas the \$65 million higher education bond series was purchased by 16,000 orders. It was clearly the most widely distributed Wisconsin bond series ever issued and may have been the most broadly distributed general obligation bond issue anywhere in the United States. In terms of getting the bonds into the hands of small investors, this bond issue had been highly successful.

With regard to the allegation that too many bonds were sold to big-time investors, Regent Schilling noted the rule requiring each underwriter to fill small orders first, which were defined as orders of less than \$4,000 at maturity. A \$1,000 denomination bond could be purchased for as little as \$250. Fifty-two percent of the \$65 million was sold in small orders.

Large orders were defined as those for more than \$4,000. Of this group, Regent Schilling pointed out, the average order was about \$8,000 at maturity. Orders of such size clearly were not placed by big-time investors.

The demand for the bonds was overwhelming, with the entire series sold in three days. Those unable to buy a bond, he explained, were thwarted by this heavy demand, not by large investors buying the bonds. The remaining demand would be satisfied by future bond sales.

Regent Schilling felt suggestions by the Legislative Audit Bureau and the Department of Administration would help to make a good program even better. These included a maximum order size, a toll-free number, more advance publicity, and a special emphasis on rural distribution.

Commenting that the program is good for the university and the state, Regent Schilling added that it is aimed at people with resources to save, while the Series E bonds are a better investment for lower income people.

Regent Weinstein asked how much of the issue was sold to big-time investors.

Replying that the portion was small, Regent Schilling observed that the larger purchases should be viewed in light of the likely cost of college in 20 years. According to the Audit Bureau report, there were 21 purchasers who bought amounts of \$50,000 or more; 10 who bought amounts between \$40-49,000; 17 who bought amounts between \$30-39,000; and 41 who bought amounts between \$20-29,000.

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Regent Clusen asked if the assumption was that the lower amounts were bought by people who actually intended to use the bonds for college costs.

Replying in the affirmative, Regent Schilling explained that the bonds are double tax-exempt only in the hands of individuals, not corporations. Secondly, they can be cashed prior to maturity only by taking them to a bursar at an educational institution.

Regent Clusen asked if there is any legal way to make them available only to people who intend to use them for an educational purpose.

While that could be attempted, Regent Schilling replied, capital finance experts cautioned that too much paperwork would make it difficult to market the bonds efficiently. The assumption was that the only reason a person would purchase such bonds in small amounts would be to buy them for the intended purpose.

Regent Nicholas asked if there were figures on the cost of distribution. He had the impression that dealers participated in the sale as a favor to promote and extend the program.

Regent Schilling noted the Legislative Audit Bureau comment that there was not enough monetary incentive for underwriters to sell small orders, which was the reason a few of them did not follow the rules in every respect. The Legislative Audit Bureau suggested more compensation for small orders and less for large orders. However, most had followed the rules, and the sale was carried out very efficiently.

In response to a question by Regent Flores, Regent Schilling stated his understanding that there is no established secondary market for bonds in \$1,000 denominations. However, bond owners who do not want to use the bonds themselves are likely to sell them to people who wish to use them for college, since they are most valuable for that purpose.

Introducing Chancellor MacTaggart to speak on UW-Superior goals, President Shaw thanked UW-Superior for the hospitality shown and congratulated them for taking the initiative in development of an academic quality program

welity program. Tation to Bound on university Grades, pp 10-13

Chancellor MacTaggart expressed pleasure for the opportunity to host the Regent meetings and reviewed the past, present and future plans for UW-Superior as being in three parts: (1) the era of decline; (2) the contemporary era; and (3) the era of the future which relates to quality, called the era of the "Superior Plan."

Referring to the era of decline, he said it provides a strong motivation to be continually energetic, creative, and future oriented. Throughout much of the 1970s, due in part to the changes in tuition policy and the winding down of the Vietnam War, UW-Superior experienced a year-by-year shortfall in enrollment. Newly-built dormitories on the south campus became unused in a few short years. There was an air of impending doom on the campus as increasingly the infrastructure was out of balance with the student population. In 1971, Regents declared fiscal emergency and about one-quarter of the faculty and staff departed the institution. No tenured faculty members left, but several were retrained into new disciplines. The budget was cut by approximately \$2 million and several important programs were curtailed or eliminated, along with talk of closing the campus. During that period, Northwest Wisconsin experienced a savage decline as well. One by one, main street businesses closed, employment and population plummeted. Through all of this, the faculty and staff at UW-Superior and their fellow citizens never lost their faith in themselves, or their potential for creative action.

The second, contemporary period dates from about 1985 to the present. For UW-Superior, it has been a period of methodical growth, of rebuilding and of aggressive efforts to work in partnership with the Regents for economic improvement and for social progress. The contemporary period has been characterized by four themes: (1) strengthening academic quality; (2) strengthening and diversifying the enrollment base; (3) strengthening the quality of student life, particularly dormitory life; and (4) providing leadership to the region.

The first goal--to strengthen academic quality--focuses on a two-part effort. One has been attracting better-prepared students; and the other has been strengthening the programs that greet those students when they arrive. Because of the generosity of the UW-Superior Foundation, approximately 50 high school valedictorians or salutatorians from around Northwest Wisconsin have been enrolled. Overall, the ACT scores of UW-Superior freshmen are improving, as is the retention of all of the students, and particularly the talented students. The faculty has initiated a superb assessment program and has instituted an honors' program to challenge the increasing number of better-prepared students. They have initiated a new general education program which pays more attention to international understanding, to multicultural education, and to the basic hallmarks of an educated person: skill in reasoning; skill in communications.

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The second goal--to build and diversify the enrollment--is being accomplished by increased numbers of high-quality students. To achieve the enrollment goals, admission standards actually have been increased. Articulation agreements with the chief source of transfer students--the two-year programs throughout the district--have been developed. Public communications programs and special efforts to reach out to the Native Americans in this part of the state have resulted in the highest enrollment in ten years, and agreements with the Lac Courtes Oreilles Community College have helped to result in the highest enrollment of Native Americans ever seen.

Goal three--improving the quality of student life, particularly residence hall life--has been to make the dormitories not only a safe and comfortable place to live, but an effective place to learn as well. Some of the programs include creation of an honors' floor and an international floor, which will allow students from overseas to live in close proximity with students from the United States. There will be a new campus safety program, a leadership program for dormitory residents, and computer labs in the dorms hooked up with the mainframe, for use during the harsh Northern Wisconsin winters. There will be quiet floors, study lounges and the conversion of parts of Ross Hall to small suites for nontraditional students, to improve the quality of their life.

The fourth goal--to assert regional leadership on the problems of this part of the state--is being taken very seriously by the Northern Institute for Economic Development. There is also continued support in that effort by UW-Extension. The American Indian Studies Program will help to address some of the divisions between Indians and non-Indians in the area. The Business Incubator Program will help to create jobs and wealth as ideas move from conceptualization to the market place. Wisconsin Public Radio is giving a voice to Northern Wisconsin that did not exist before, and an electronic telecommunications system will be particularly useful in Northern Wisconsin where the communities, economic opportunities and the schools are spread so far apart.

The Chancellor continued by stating that the economy and life of Northwest Wisconsin have improved mightily since the recession of the 1980s. He believed that UW-Superior has played a role in this revitalization. "We pledge ourselves to continue to be active partners with the political, economic and civic leadership in continuing that effort."

The greatest challenge in 1990 and beyond, he stated, is embodied in a concept called the Superior Plan, which involves the increase of expectations at every undergraduate class on campus and will result in increased performance by every undergraduate student. The plan is consistent with the academic quality program being developed by System Administration and other academic leaders. There are two sources of inspiration for the Superior Plan. "Recently, I asked a Japanese business leader what it would take for the United States to return to a position of economic prominence in the world. 'Well, that's easy,' he replied, 'all you have to do is spend less, save more, work harder and learn more effectively.' At UW-Superior, we are particularly focusing on the 'learn more effectively' part of that recommendation."

The second source of inspiration is knowing that higher expectations will lead to higher achievements. The core of the Superior Plan is that admission standards are not changed, but rather, the ordinary competent,

motivated American student is enabled to do better than they might have otherwise. Examples of this as they might be realized in the classroom include some of the following: a literature professor might require, earlier on, that students come to terms with Melville's dark vision in *Moby Dick*. A mathematics instructor might require that a student solve 85 percent of the problems in order to get a certain grade, as opposed to a possible 80 percent. A more challenging computer scinece assignment may take the place of a less challenging one. In business, the case study might involve the analysis of detailed financial information, as opposed to just a more qualitative overview. Higher expectations will vary by discipline, the level of the course, with faculty judgments, but in every instance, these higher expectations will be identifiable and they can be examined.

Coupled with efforts to improve student performance is a faculty and staff development program to enable faculty to find new ways to support students in their struggle to achieve more, as well as to alert them to alternative methods of teaching and new learning strategies for students. UW-Superior's well-developed assessment program will be able to determine the results of this project and where there is a need for mid-course corrections. At the very least, the Superior Plan will result in students who are uniformly better-prepared to meet the challenges of a more competitive world. It is believed that, as the regional and perhaps national media give attention to this project, it will become an important theme in the larger educational reform movement in the United States.

Chancellor MacTaggart concluded by stating that the Superior Plan epitomizes the character of UW-Superior and, in some way, the character of the region. He believed that intelligence and creativity, coupled with sustained effort, can yield remarkable results.

Regent Weinstein asked about the current enrollment and what the Chancellor would like it to be.

In response Chancellor MacTaggart said that current enrollment is about 2,500 students, headcount, and under the enrollment management plan, that would be substantially what would be maintained. It does not include the approximate 600 Extended Degree students, primarily from the northern part of the state who cannot commute. A larger enrollment would be contingent on three things: one is the physical capacity of the campus. There is generous space, but over the years, some has been converted from its original intended purposes to other uses. An example is that one of the dormitories is now used to house faculty and, if enrollment were to increase, that would have to be converted back to dormitory use.

A second constraint would be the size of the staff, which was reduced because of the financial emergency status.

The third constraint would be the market itself. Northern Wisconsin is a region in which the rates of decline in high school graduates is higher than in the rest of the state, and with the current standards, stability is a more realistic expectation.

Predicting that enrollment in UW-Superior will be in growing demand in the future, Regent Weinstein asked if there had been anything broader envisioned because of that demand.

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Chancellor MacTaggart agreed that the Superior Plan and other efforts will make UW-Superior more attractive in the future and increase enrollment pressure. He suggested that, as enrollment management is being considered over the next four or five years, that might be the time to see if the pressure is deep enough to justify a major change in the target.

President Lyon thanked Chancellor MacTaggart for his interesting presentation on UW-Superior's well-planned program to meet the challenges of the future.

Generate by President, United Council of UN Student Government - Commenter by new President, Brende Kesty p. 13 (

President Shaw introduced Brenda Leahy, the new President of the United Council of UW Student Governments. A student at UW-Stevens Point, Ms. Leahy's major is in public administration and political science. She had served as student government president at UW-Stevens Point in 1989-90.

Ms. Leahy stated that she looks forward to working with the Board and representing the UW System students. She invited Regents to attend United Council meetings which are held monthly on campuses around the state.

Regent Dreyfus suggested that Ms. Leahy provide a list of United Council meetings to the Regents.

REPORT OF THE BUSINESS AND FINANCE COMMITTEE

Regent Gelatt, Chair, reported for the Committee.

Issues Paper: Regulatory Environment and Management Flexibility, p. 13

The Business and Finance Committee, with all Regents invited to participate, discussed the Issue Paper on Regulatory Environment and Management Flexibility. There was a general consensus that the UW System should move forward to request additional flexibilities from the state. Such flexibilities will not jeopardize accountability or quality, but will provide management with the tools necessary for the UW System to function effectively in the 1990s.

- Budget

Approval of the 1990-91 Fee Schedule and Operating Budget, R.5552, pp 13-14

Regent Gelatt reported that the Business and Finance Committee, with all Regents invited to participate, considered the 1990-91 fee schedule and operating budget. President Shaw outlined the key points of the 1990-91 budget, which implements 1989 legislative and Regent decision rules. GPR and fees account for 51 percent of the total budget. The remainder comes from self-supporting activities, which provide about 11,160 jobs to the

The proposed tuition increase averages 5.9 percent. Room and board rate increases average 4.9 percent. The hospital budget includes a rate increase of 5.8 percent, significantly less than the projected increase of 8-10 percent.

There was considerable Regent discussion on the proposed budget. Regent Weinstein asked System Administration to provide a survey comparing MBA fees to Law School fees at other institutions. Upon conclusion of the Committee debate, Resolution 5552 was approved on a 9-6 vote.

It was moved by Regent Gelatt and seconded by Regent Clusen that the following resolution be adopted by the Board of Regents:

Resolution 5552: That, upon the recommendation of the President of the University of Wisconsin System, the 1990-91 operating budget, including auxiliary reserves and rates for academic tuition, segregated fees, room and board, parking, and University Hospital, as reflected in the document <u>1990-91 Operating Budget and Fee Schedules,</u> July 1990 be approved. The 1990-91 amounts are:

Regent Weinstein requested that the Regents be provided at the September meeting with statistical information and options on tuition policy.

With regard to inflation rates, Regent Vos cited figures supplied by a reputable private firm of 4.7 percent for 1990, and 4.2 percent for 1991. The Department of Labor's national figure is 5.5 percent. Suggesting that a composite be found to guide the Board's decision on spending increases, he urged the Board to heed the wishes of citizens and students to limit spending.

Regent Weinstein commented that he had heard only one student objection to the tuition increase. He did not believe there was substantial opposition to the proposed rate.

Regent Dreyfus suggested using the same inflation figure being utilized by the Department of Administration in developing the executive budget.

Regent Nicholas cautioned against using projected inflation rates. He considered it more prudent to base decisions on current figures.

Resolution 5552 was adopted on a roll call vote, with Regents Clusen, Davis, Dreyfus, Flores, Gelatt, Gundersen, Lyon, Schilling and Weinstein voting "Aye" (9) and Regents DeLong, Doughty Luckhardt, Krutsch, Nicholas, Steil and Vos voting "No" (6).

Regent Gelatt presented as consent agenda items Resolutions 5553 and 5554, which were unanimously approved by the Business and Finance Committee.

Endowments______ Request for Study on Expenditure of Quesi-Endowments, P.16

Regent Gelatt noted that the Committee directed System Administration to study the possibility of placing further restrictions on expending the principal of quasi-endowments--gifts for which the University is given the right both to spend income and principal. The Business and Finance Committee prefers that in certain circumstances spending be restricted to income only.

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Endriments

Adoption of Endowment Spending Plan, R 5555, pp 16-17

The Business and Finance Committee had requested System Administration to prepare alternative endowment reinvestment plans for review. Currently all income earned on the endowment is available to campus departments for expenditure, a practice which limits potential annual growth and future spending of the endowment. By adopting a stabilization reserve, the purchasing power of the endowment will be maintained.

Adoption by the Board of Regents of the following resolution, which was unanimously approved by the Committee, was moved by Regent Gelatt, seconded by Regent Vos and carried unanimously:

Resolution 5555: That, upon the recommendation of the President of the University of Wisconsin System, effective with the 1991-92 fiscal year, a Small Fraction Spending Plan (Endowment Reinvestment) be implemented for Trust Funds. The plan will be phased in over two years; a 5.5% spending fraction the first year; 5.2% the second year and then maintained at 5.0%. The fraction will be applied to a three year moving average of endowment valuations (36 monthly valuations). Income earned in excess of the fraction will be added to endowment principal in a Stabilization Reserve. The formula for determining the annual amount for the stabilization reserve is:

> Total Principal Earnings - Consolidated University Trust Funds

Less: Investment Advisory and Administrative Fees on Principal Funds

Less: Small Fraction amount

Equals Addition to the Stabilization Reserve

Departments, with approval of the chancellor's delegate, may withdraw funds from the Stabilization Reserve for special circumstances upon a minimum 30 days advance notice. In years when income earned is less than the fraction, a portion of the Stabilization Reserve (net remaining balance for each amount) will be used to maintain the spending rate. The spending fraction and asset allocation ratio will be periodically reviewed with any changes to the spending fraction being acted on at the September Regent meeting. Individual accounts which mandate usage of the annual income will be excluded from the plan.

Regent President Lyon and Regent Gelatt extended appreciation to Regent Vice President Nicholas for his leadership in development of the endowment spending plan.

Regent Vice President Nicholas pointed out that if a spending plan had been in effect for the last ten years at a five percent rate, the endowment fund would be \$12-13 million larger. He considered the plan to be a prudent and far-sighted means of enhancing the endowment principal.

Quarterly Internal Audit Update p, 17

Regent Gelatt reported the status of audits in process throughout the UW System, which were summarized for the Business and Finance Committee by Internal Audit Director Brunkow. Capital inventory audits had been completed, with final audit reports to be issued after the financial policy paper on equipment inventory has been reviewed and revised. The Legislative Audit Bureau (LAB) had completed and issued final audit reports on federal financial aid for a number of institutions. The LAB had also completed a statewide audit of privitization of services.

WHadison Licensing Program for UN Logos p. 17

Melany Newby, UW-Madison Vice Chancellor for Legal and Executive Affairs, presented to the Business and Finance Committee an informational report on the campus licensing program for its trademarks, logos and names. The purpose of licensing is both to maintain a positive image and to generate income. Ms. Newby noted that the campus had entered into a licensing agreement in March 1988 with the Collegiate Licensing Company. Royalties were about \$87,000 in 1988, increasing to approximately \$233,000 in 1989. The first \$125,000 of royalty revenue was used by the Athletic Department for student services and scholarships. The remaining revenue was used by the Chancellor for administrative costs of the licensing program and for student scholarships.

In discussion at the Board meeting, Regent Weinstein stated his understanding that the small businesses, which had relied on the campus' previous decision that the logo was in the public domain, would be grandfathered into the program.

> Regent Gelatt explained that, unlike copyright law, there is no provision in trademark law for putting marks in the public domain. To the extent University marks are being used simply for business identification, he believed the University will grant a license at no cost. To the extent the marks are being used to enhance the merchantability of the product, licensing would be sought.

benefits for faculty and staff because not all UW System institutions have met the requirements for vaiver of the sick leave cap. Now that this report has been submitted to the Board, System Administration can seek removal of the cap for teaching academic staff and faculty. Eight institutions, plus System Administration, have received the waiver for non-teaching academic staff. Associate Vice President Wright indicated that all institutions should meet the conditions within 18 months.

Report of the Vice President

Vice President Poellnitz outlined the tentative 1990-91 agenda for the Business and Finance Committee.

Adjustments to Tripp Trust Fund, p, 18

Regent Gelatt reported that in closed session on trust fund matters, the Committee moved the Tripp Trust Fund income balance of \$311,274 from the income fund to the principal fund, in order to enhance the potential earnings of the Trust. One of the features of the endowment trust funds is that, of the approximately \$130 million, about \$30 million is unexpended income. It has been the practice in the past for all unexpended income to be invested in fixed income securities.

Following questions from members of the Business and Finance Committee, it was determined possible for departments to transfer some of those funds at their discretion to a principal account and invest it not only in securities but in equity, which generally produces much higher earnings over time. The Tripp Fund currently has more in unexpended income than in principal, and the Committee decided to transfer the unexpended income into a principal account. The Trust Officers are to notify each department having trust accounts, of the possibility of transfering funds for which they have no immediate need and which they intend to keep for the long term.

REPORT OF THE PHYSICAL PLANNING AND DEVELOPMENT COMMITTEE

The Committee's report was presented by Regent Gundersen, Chair.

The Committee was presented the final report on fall 1989-90 drop rates, which showed course credits dropped by undergraduates decreased this year by one-half of one percent, the credits dropped in the fall 1989-90 term declining to 4.9 percent from 5.4 percent the previous fall. The Committee was assured that Regent policy to reduce drop rates below 5 percent is being implemented satisfactorily.

Equal Opportunity Folicy Compliance Review, pp 21-22

Regent Davis reported that the Education Committee heard an informative presentation by Dr. Marian Swoboda on compliance review of equal employment opportunity policies. It was noted that for the past 15 years it had been the policy of the Board of Regents that the ratio of women and minorities in the faculty should begin to approximate the available pool. The report concluded that, if progress in the next 15 years equals that of the last 15 years, it will take 64 years for women to reach the availability rate of 39.4 percent in the population, and it will take minorities an additional 21

years to reach their 11.1 percent availability rate. Dr. Swoboda said issues of retention and compus climate must be given the same attention as issues of hiring. From a cost-effectiveness perspective, the data suggested that more time, effort and resources should be put into retention than recruiting to stem the unacceptably high loss of women and minority faculty. It was noted that it is the responsibility of the managers on site to create a climate conducive to retaining employees.

Regent Weinstein asked Dr. Swoboda to prepare a proposal as to how performance in meeting those goals might be evaluated and incorporated into discussions of compensation for senior administrators. She also was asked to develop suggested questions, the answers to which might determine if Regent policies are, in fact, being implemented. The report showed some disparity between policy compliance and result achievements, raising the question of whether appropriate policies are in place.

The Committee also agreed by consensus that all institutions should conduct exit interviews to provide documentation of the reasons for leaving the UW System.

Regent Davis emphasized that his vote to hear the appeal carried no implication that he had made any judgments as to the merits of the case. From the briefings and oral argument on whether to grant a review, he had only concluded that there were certain points of concern on which he felt a review of the record was warranted.

Stating discomfort with the process, Regent Weinstein noted that, while the Regents had established teaching, research and public service as the substantive bases for tenure, application of those factors to faculty tenure decisions is determined within the individual institutions. What remained for the Regents to consider in this type of appeal was the question as to whether the process was fair and the decision was made without prejudice. From reading the Committee report, he was persuaded that if the process was flawed, it had been corrected in a timely manner. He asked if Regent Davis suspected there may have been prejudice in the decision.

Regent Davis felt enough questions had been raised to merit a review of the record, which would permit a conclusion to be reached as to whether or not there was material prejudice.

Stating agreement with Regent Weinstein's concern about the process for handling appeals, Regent Davis noted that there is only one remedy if the Board found a decision to be arbitrary or inconsistent with policy. Since authority for the granting of tenure rests with the department and chancellor, the Board can do no more than return the matter to the campus for reconsideration by the same officials who already have made judgments. Regent Davis emphasized that he is not comfortable with this situation.

In Regent Steil's judgment, the campus had gone to great lengths to give Dr. Iaquinta a fair hearing, as well as fair warning regarding his work. He thought the Acting Chancellor had used his authority judiciously and should not be second guessed.

While he did not disagree with the interpretations of the information before the Committee made by Regents Dreyfus and Steil, Regent Davis had reached a different conclusion on the sufficiency of this information to make a judgment. He felt certain statements and allegations warranted review of the record.

Regent Dreyfus referred to his eleven years of experience as a chancellor, during which time he had made hundreds of tenure decisions in a period of both high growth and high turnover. When a chancellor's decision differs from the faculty decision, there is a natural tendency, he observed, to suspect personal prejudice within the mind of the chancellor. Stating that a chancellor weighs very carefully a decision not to accept a majority recommendation of the faculty who are closest to the person requesting tenure, he emphasized that there is no single responsibility for any chancellor more important than being certain of the quality of the faculty. If there is any question as to the fairness of the process, the tendency is to redo it. In this case, he concluded that the Acting Chancellor went to great lengths to ensure fair treatment of Dr. Iaquinta. While the original process may have been flawed, he believed any defect was corrected when the process was redone. He saw no evidence of prejudice against Dr. Iaquinta.

Put to the vote, <u>Resolution 5563 was adopted</u>, with Regents Davis and Flores voting in opposition.

CHAPTER I

MEETINGS AND BUSINESS OF THE REGENTS

Annual Meetings

Section 1. The annual meetings of the Board of Regents of the University of Wisconsin System shall be held, unless otherwise specially ordered, on the Friday following the first Monday in June.

Regular Meetings

Section 2. Regular meetings of the Regents shall be held on the Friday following the first Monday in each month, unless otherwise specially ordered.

Special Meetings

Section 3. A special meeting of the Regents of the University of Wisconsin System may be called at any time, upon request of at least five members of the Board or by the President of the Board. The notice calling any special meeting of the Board shall normally be served by the Secretary on each member of the Board in writing, by mail or by personal service at least five days before the time of the meeting. Where, in the judgment of the President of the Board, following consultation with available members of the Executive Committee, it is determined that a special Board meeting is required with notification of less than five days, but not less than two days, such a meeting may be called provided the subject is limited, all available members of the Board are queried by phone or personal contact and two-thirds of those contacted agree. Unless the call of a special meeting is limited, it shall be valid to act on any subject within the power of the Board.

Place of Meetings

Section 4. All meetings of the Board shall be held in Madison, unless otherwise ordered by the Board.

Quorum

Section 5. A majority of the members of the Board shall constitute a quorum.

Parliamentary Rules and Order of Business

Section 6. General parliamentary rules as set forth in Robert's Rules of Order, current edition, and as modified by rules and regulations of the Board shall be observed in conducting the business of the Board in session. 1

The order of business at all meetings shall be as follows:

- (1) Calling of the roll
- (2) Approval or amendment of the minutes of the proceedings of the last meeting
- (3) Report of the President of the Board
- (4) Report of the President of the University System
- (5) Report of the Secretary
- (6) Reports of standing committees
- (7) Reports of special committees
- (8) Additional resolutions

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- (9) Communications, petitions, and memorials
- (10) Unfinished and additional business

CHAPTER II

-4-

Officers of the Board and Their Duties

Section 1. The officers of the Board shall consist of a president, a vice president, a secretary, and such assistant secretaries as the Board from time to time shall determine, and a trust officer and such assistant trust officers as the Board from time to time shall determine.

Mode of Election

Section 2. The officers of the Board shall be elected by ballot at the annual meeting, and shall hold their respective offices for one year and until their successors shall be elected. Their terms of office shall begin immediately after the annual meeting at which they are elected.

Duties of the President of the Board

Section 3. The President of the Board shall preside at all meetings, shall appoint the members of all standing and special committees of the Board, shall be an ex officio voting member of all committees, and shall discharge the ordinary duties of such officer in the pursuance of parliamentary law. The President of the Board shall, with the President of the University System, sign all diplomas and, with the Secretary countersigning, shall sign all contracts and instruments authorized or issued by authority of the Board, except such contracts and instruments as the Board or its Executive Committee may authorize any officer or employee of the University System to sign. The President of the Board shall, with the President of the University of Wisconsin System, present budget requests to the Governor and the Legislature and shall act as spokesperson for the Board before the Governor and before all legislative groups in matters of educational program planning, the use of existing facilities and personnel, budgetary issues, and building priorities.

Duties of the Vice President of the Board

Section 4. The Vice President of the Board shall be an ex officio voting member of all committees and shall, in the absence of the President, perform all the duties of the President.

Duties of the President Pro Tem

Section 5. In the absence of the President and the Vice President the Board may appoint a president pro tem, who shall perform the duties of presiding officer of the Board.

Duties of the Secretary

Section 6. It shall be the duty of the Secretary to give at least ten days' notice of the regular meetings of the Board, to keep a record of the proceedings of the Board at all of its meetings, to keep a separate record of the proceedings of the Executive Committee, and a record of the proceedings of each of the standing committees; to keep the corporate seal and by countersigning execute with the President of the Board instruments and contracts ordered by the Board; and to preserve all documents pertaining to his or her office. The Secretary shall perform such other duties as are imposed on him or her by law and the rules and orders of the Board.

The Secretary shall, as soon as practicable after the record of proceedings of meetings has been perfected, transmit, by mail, to each regent a copy of the record of the meetings of the Board, and of the committees thereof. The Secretary shall maintain an up-to-date codification of all policy actions of the Board as referred to in Section 1. of Chapter V of the Bylaws.

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Assistant Secretaries

Section 7. The Board shall, at the same time and in the same manner as it elects its Secretary, also elect such number of Assistant Secretaries as it shall deem necessary. The duties of the Assistant Secretaries shall be to assist the Secretary in the performance of his or her duties, and they shall perform such duties as may be assigned to them by the Secretary or the Board of Regents. In the absence of the Secretary, an Assistant Secretary shall act as and perform all the duties of the Secretary.

Trust Officer and Assistant Trust Officers

Section 8. It shall be the duty of the Trust Officer to receive, manage, and maintain records of all trust funds of the University of Wisconsin System and to perform such other duties relating to trust funds as are imposed upon him or her by law and the rules and orders of the Board or the Business and Finance Committee of the Board. The Assistant Trust Officers shall assist the Trust Officer in the performance of his or her duties and shall perform such other duties as may be assigned to them by the Trust Officer, the Board or the Business and Finance Committee of the Board.

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CHAPTER III

Committees of the Board

Section 1. There shall be six standing committees of the Board of Regents as follow:

a. Education Committee consisting of such members as are appointed annually thereto by the President of the Board following the annual meeting. The President and Vice President shall serve as ex officio voting members and the President shall designate the Chair and Vice Chair of the Committee.

b. Business and Finance Committee consisting of such members as are appointed annually thereto by the President of the Board following the annual meeting. The President and Vice President of the Board shall serve as ex officio voting members and the President shall designate the Chair and Vice Chair of the Committee.

c. Physical Planning and Development Committee consisting of such members as are appointed annually thereto by the President of the Board following the annual meeting. The President and Vice President of the Board shall serve as ex officio voting members and the President shall designate the Chair and Vice Chair of the Committee.

d. Executive Committee consisting of the President of the Board, who shall serve as Chair, the Vice President of the Board, the Chair of the Education Committee, the Chair of the Business and Finance Committee, the Chair of the Physical Planning and Development Committee, the member of the Board who shall have most recently been the President of the Board and one other member of the Board appointed by the President of the Board. In the event that there shall be no member of the Board

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who shall have previously been President of the Board, such position on the Executive Committee shall be filled by a member of the Board appointed by the President of the Board.

e. **Personnel Matters Review Committee** consisting of at least three members appointed annually thereto by the President of the Board following the annual meeting. The President and Vice President of the Board shall serve as ex officio voting members. The President shall designate the Chair of the Committee.

f. Committee on Student Discipline and Student Governance Appeals consisting of at least three members appointed annually thereto by the President of the Board following the annual meeting. The President and Vice President of the Board shall serve as ex officio voting members. The President shall designate the Chair of the Committee.

Special Regent committees may be created from time to time as necessity demands by an affirmative majority vote of the Board, and the President shall appoint the members thereto and the Chair thereof. A Special Regent Committee shall not be created for any matter which is properly before any of the standing committees.

Meetings of the committees may be called by the Chair or by the Secretary of the Board upon the request of two members, or upon the request of the President of the University System.

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Duties of the Education Committee

Section 2. The Education Committee shall have charge of consideration of all matters of an educational nature related to the instruction, research, and public service functions of the University System; the academic personnel; and to student services and welfare. The Chair of the Education Committee may create one or more subcommittees to consider any matter properly before the Education Committee and shall appoint the subcommittee members and the chair from among those members of the Board serving on the Education Committee.

Duties of the Business and Finance Committee Section 3. The Business and Finance Committee shall have charge of consideration of all matters related to operating budget, finances, trust funds, business operations, audit oversight and reviews, and to non-academic personnel.

Authority is delegated to the Business and Finance Committee to hire investment counsel, subject to Board approval, and to give discretionary authority to investment counsel in the purchase and sale of securities within guidelines determined by the Committee. The Chair of the Business and Finance Committee shall appoint an Audit Subcommittee and may create one or more other subcommittees to consider any matter properly before the Business and Finance Committee. The Chair of the Business and Finance Committee shall appoint the subcommittee members and the Chair from among those members of the Board serving on the Business and Finance Committee.

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Duties of the Physical Planning and Development Committee Section 4. The Physical Planning and Development Committee shall have charge of consideration of all matters related to the capital building program. This includes approval of budgets, advance planning, design reports, funding and capital budget development policies, and authorization to bid and construct in connection with projects for new construction and improvements of \$30,000 or more; location of new buildings and improvements; facilities namings; gifts-in-kind of facilities and property; campus development and transportation plans; real estate transactions, including sale, purchase, exchange, lease, zoning, relocation costs, and condemnation; easements and land use permits; telecommunication system acquisitions; steam sale agreements; assessable improvements; and Wisconsin Environmental Policy Act implementation. The Chair of the Physical Planning and Development Committee may create one or more subcommittees to consider any matter properly before the Physical Planning and Development Committee and shall appoint the subcommittee members and the Chair from among those members of the Board serving on the Physical Planning and Development Committee.

Duties of the Executive Committee

Section 5. The Executive Committee shall have the powers of the Board, when the Board is not in session, and shall provide for the execution of orders and resolutions not otherwise specially committed or provided for. A separate record of the proceedings of this Committee shall be kept by the Secretary, and the same shall be submitted to the Board for inclusion in the record at the next regular or special meeting.

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Duties of the Personnel Matters Review Committee

Section 6. The President of the Board may refer faculty and staff personnel matters involving requests for hearing, petitions for review, and appeals to the Board to the Personnel Matters Review Committee.

a. Mandatory review. Where an opportunity to be heard, a review or an appeal to the Board is required by the Board's administrative rules, such as UWS 4.08, 5.14(3) or 11.10, *Wisconsin Administrative Code*, or under Board policies, the Committee may conduct the hearing, review or appeal. All such proceedings shall be conducted upon the record of the matter created at the institutional or administrative levels. The Committee shall prepare recommended findings and a decision, and shall transmit them to the full Board for final action.

b. Discretionary review. Where consideration of a matter by the Board is discretionary either under the Board's administrative rules, such as UWS 5.14(2), 6.01(5), 6.02, 11.07, or 12.05(8), *Wisconsin Administrative Code*, or under Board policies, or on any other basis, it shall first be determined whether the request for Board consideration should be granted. In making the determination, the following factors shall be considered:

(1) The case involves substantial constitutional claims;

(2) There is a serious concern that the chancellor has abused his/her discretion or exceeded his/her authority;

(3) The decision made at the institutional level could have systemwide implications; or

(4) The final institutional decision is based upon facts not supported by the record, resulting in material prejudice to the individual seeking review.

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c. If the Board determines that a request for Board consideration should be granted, the Committee may conduct the review or hearing. All such proceedings shall be conducted upon the record of the matter created at the institutional or administrative levels. The Committee shall prepare recommended findings and a decision, and shall transmit them to the full Board for final action.

Duties of the Committee on

Student Discipline and Student Governance Appeals

Section 7. The President of the Board may refer requests for hearing, petitions for review, and appeals involving student discipline or student governance matters to the Committee on Student Discipline and Student Governance Appeals.

a. Student discipline matters.

(1) Mandatory review. Where an opportunity to be heard, a review or an appeal to the Committee on Student Discipline is required by the Board's administrative rules, such as under ss. UWS 17.09 or 17.10(1) - (5), Wisconsin Administrative Code, the Committee shall conduct the hearing, review or appeal. All such proceedings shall be conducted on the record of the matter created at the institutional or administrative levels. The Committee shall prepare findings and a decision, which shall be final. (2) Discretionary review. Where consideration of a student discipline matter is discretionary under the Board's administrative rules, such as under ss. UWS 14.10 and UWS 17.10(6), Wisconsin Administrative Code, the Committee shall first determine whether the request for consideration should be granted. In making the determination, the following factors shall be considered:

- (a) The case involves substantial constitutional claims;
- (b) There is a serious concern that the chancellor has abused his/her discretion or exceeded his/her authority;
- (c) The decision made at the institutional level could have systemwide implications; or
- (d) The final institutional decision is based upon facts not supported by the record, resulting in material prejudice to the individual seeking review.

(3) Where the review of a student discipline matter is discretionary, the Committee shall prepare a recommendation as to whether the request for review should be granted, and shall transmit it to the Board for action. If the Board determines that a request for consideration should be granted, the Committee may conduct the review. All such proceedings shall be conducted upon the record of the matter created at the institutional or administrative levels. Unless the request for review is withdrawn, the Committee shall prepare findings and a decision, and shall transmit them to the Full Board for final action. b. Student governance appeals.

(1) Mandatory review. Where review of a student governance matter is required by the Board's policies, such as by Regent Policy Document 86-4, *Guidelines for Implementation of 36.09(5), Wisconsin Statutes*, the Committee may conduct the review. All such proceedings shall be conducted upon the record of the matter created at the institutional or administrative levels. The Committee shall prepare recommended findings and a decision, and shall transmit them to the full Board for final action.

(2) Discretionary review. Where review of a student governance matter is discretionary under the Board's policies, such as Regent Policy Document 86-4, *Guidelines for Implementation of s. 36.09(5), Wisconsin Statutes*, the Committee shall first consider whether the request for Board review should be granted. In making that determination, the following factors shall be considered:

- (a) Whether there is a serious concern that the chancellor or the president has abused his/her discretion or exceeded his/her authority; or
- (b) Whether the decision of the chancellor or the president could have systemwide implications.

(3) Where the review of a student governance matter is discretionary, the Committee shall prepare a recommendation as to whether the request for review should be granted, and shall transmit it to the full Board for action. If the Board determines that a request for review should be granted, the

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Committee may conduct the review. All such proceedings shall be conducted upon the record of the matter created at the institutional or administrative levels. Unless the request for review is withdrawn, the Committee shall prepare a recommended decision, and shall transmit it to the full Board for final action.

CHAPTER IV

Amendments

Section 1. These Bylaws may be added to or amended at any meeting of the Board by an affirmative vote of a majority of the members of the Board provided, however, that proposed amendments shall be specifically set forth in the notice of such meeting.

Suspension of Bylaws

Section 2. The Bylaws or any of them may be suspended at any meeting by an affirmative vote of two-thirds of the total members of the Board and not otherwise.

CHAPTER V

SYSTEM ADMINISTRATION

President of the University of Wisconsin System

Section 1. The President of the University of Wisconsin System has full executive responsibility for the operation and management of the System. He or she shall carry out the duties prescribed in Wisconsin Statutes for this

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office, and such other duties as may be assigned by the Board or be implicit in policy actions of the Board. The President of the System shall see to the appropriate staffing of System administrative offices, and direct and coordinate the activities of these offices as needed to fulfill his or her responsibilities. All items to be brought before the Board of Regents for action, except matters which come to the Board pursuant to its administrative rules or existing policies and those initiating in the Board itself, should reach the Board through the President of the University of Wisconsin System and carry his or her recommendation. If an item arises at or is related to an institution, the President shall ensure that it has first been through the established institution governance process and carries the Chancellor's recommendation; if it has not been through the institution governance process, the President shall request that it be so considered by the institution. On appeals of matters which have been through the institution governance process, the President shall verify that all institution procedures have been exhausted and will then determine whether, in the President's judgment, the Board of Regents should consider the matter. A decision by the President that the matter should not be considered by the Board can be appealed directly to the President of the Board. If the President of the Board determines that the matter should not be considered by the Board, any member of the Board may request that the matter be considered by the Board. A request that an item be considered by the Board which comes from other than the President or any member of the Board must be in writing. Persons making such requests shall be advised in writing of determinations by the President of the System and President of the Board regarding their requests. Failure by the President of the System or the President of the Board to act on a written request that an item be considered by the Board within sixty days of its receipt shall be deemed a denial of the request.

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Vice Presidents

Section 2. The President shall, with the approval of the Board, establish such vice presidential offices as may be necessary to provide administrative direction and coordination for the several major functions of System administration as these are defined by the President and the Board. The President shall assign such responsibilities to each of the vice presidents as may best promote effective administration of the responsibilities of his or her office, and shall, with the approval of the Board, title each vice presidential office in the way best suited to designate its major area of concern.

Staff Services to the Board of Regents

Section 3. The President shall, with the approval of the Board, designate a vice president as principal staff officer for the Education Committee, the Business and Finance Committee and the Physical Planning and Development Committee of the Board or, in the event of the unavailability of an appropriate vice president, an associate vice president or other major administrative officer to perform this function. The persons so designated shall provide to the committee, and be prepared to respond to such other requests for information or interpretation as the committee or its members may require. The Vice Presidents shall designate staff to serve as recording secretaries of these three committees.


