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

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

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

Stories of 100 Years Ago Around Geneva Lake

Under the heading, "Sixty Years Ago," this series of articles giving reminiscences of pioneer life at the head of Geneva lake was written 40 years ago by Cyrus Church, pioneer settler, for The Observer, the first newspaper published in Walworth. The Walworth Times and Bay Leaves and Geneva Lake Observer, are cooperating in reprinting these interesting stories of early days.

THE INDIAN IN THE TREE-TOP

Near the lake shore on what was long known as Porter's or Fontana Park, now owned by W. F. Furbeck, stands a large white oak tree, with a crotch in the top of it. The tree has changed in appearance since I first saw it. The crotch is nearer together, as it has grown to be much larger than it was 60 years ago.

A straight butternut log, about six feet long, with ends cut square and smooth was used for a coffin. About one-third of it was split off and the log dug out in workmanlike manner. In this the body of the boy was placed, and with it a pipe, some tobacco, bow and arrows, and some silver ornaments. The piece that had been split off was then put on and fastened with wooden pins.

Log Placed in Tree

The log was then placed in the top of the tree, one end in the crotch, the other resting on a limb just large enough to support it. There is no appearance of this limb now and I think it was cut off to let the log fall. It was on the west side of the forks of the tree.

Near the park was an Indian garden. This I planted and cared for in the season of '37, as I was working by the month for Mr. VanSlyke. The trail that I followed ran close to the tree and I necessarily walked along under the tree frequently. At this time the worst stages of decomposition had set in, and the stench was very disagreeable.

Sometime about the last of June a couple emigrant wagons, or "prairie schooners," as they were called, hauled by several ox teams came along that way. There was a number of men in the company, and

they camped one night not far from the tree. The next day we missed the log from the tree-top and I suppose these men were the villains who dropped it and robbed it of its treasure.

Sometime later Dr. Wood gathered up the bones, and boiled and cleaned them up. I saw them a number of times.

Some years afterward a phrenological lecturer by the name of Kellogg came along and delivered a lecture in Davis' hotel, which was then but a small affair. It was occupied by Judge Douglass. A full house was present and the room was lighted with tallow candles. Dr. Wood gave him the boy's skull to compare with others which the lecturer had to illustrate the difference in character. He would insert a lighted candle in them. He showed that the Indian's skull was far more transparent than the others. The lecturer said that this skull showed a wonderful degree of native intelligence. He pronounced the boy to be 14 or 15 years old. Warren Wood took the skull to Baraboo with him.

Reader Marked Claim

Deacon John Reader came to this place, marked a claim here and was gone when I came. He returned sometime in June. He told me that while here he cut a small tree, leaned it against the tree containing the body and climbed up to examine it. He pried off the top of the log and saw the body as I have described it.

He thought it to be a boy about 14 or 15 years of age and said it looked very natural and was a beautiful corpse. It must have been placed there just before they left about the last of November, and had been frozen ever since. (This was about the middle of February.)

He said he placed the cover back as nice as it was before. He was probably the only one who ever saw it in the tree.

Mrs. VanSlyke said that Big Foot was often at their house, and was there the day before he left. He was very sorrowful to think of leaving. He could speak English, and she learned from him that it was his son that was placed in the tree.

A little west of this tree on the hill was Big Foot's residence in plain view of the lake and with beautiful surroundings. The workmanship was admired for its genius and perception. It was about 12x20 ft. in size. The frame was constructed of small poles woven together. These were covered with bark.

Big Foot Chief of Tribe

One piece about 4 feet wide and 7 feet long, I had the pleasure of sleeping on for about five months. Surrounding this tent were a number of others, merely rough poles stuck in the ground and covered with mats made of woven flags. Most of this covering had been taken away, leaving only that that was old and worthless.

Big Foot was chief of one branch of the Pottawottamie tribe, and this was headquarters for them. The trails centered in here from every direction. There was one double trail called the army trail.

All the others were single trails and showed much travel. I am sorry I never had the opportunity to see the old chief. The Indians were removed by government soldiers, with teams to carry the feeble ones, about the last of November 1836. It was one of the most powerful Indian tribes in the country, but only a few small bands are now left.

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



FORTY YEARS AGO IN WMS BAY From The Observer, June 17,1898

"The Y.M.C.A. Camp opens today. An announcement to this effect was crowded out last week, but we have been aware that for several days past janitor Dunlop and his force of men have been especially busy making preparations for the summer. The new dining hall and kitchen are in perfect readiness and Sidney Hotton, the genial steward, looks fully four inches taller as he steps proudly through his new domain. Mr. and Mrs. Hotton were early arrivals this week. Mrs. Hotton Sr., who is superintendent of the kitchen, came last week, and the entire force of kitchen, dining room and laundry employees are now here.

The College Student Conference convenes today, June 17, and continues in session until the 26. A larger enrollment than ever is expected and the number undoubtedly will go over 300. The Camp is not open for members and guests until the conference closes.

The interim of four days will be very quiet and will be used in getting ready for the Y.W.C.A. Summer School, which is in session from July 2 to 12.

From now on until Sept. the Camp will be a busy place whose members will not only be enjoying all the advantages of Geneva Lake as a summer resort, but will be gaining spiritually as well."

Holiday Home opens today. Mrs. Chase, the matron, accompanied by Mr. and Mrs. Wm Steele, came out last Saturday. All is now in readiness for the first section, composed as usual of 80 working girls, and women, escorted by the Superintendent, Dr. Prince. The force in charge of the Home is practically the same as last year.
