

SMOKING AREA UPDATE

Union South is now 100% smoke free and Memorial Union will be totally smoke free soon. Smoking areas in the Games Room at Memorial Union have been eliminated, but smoking is still allowed in the Rathskeller. By the beginning of the summer session, 1992, smoking will not be allowed in either building.



RENOVATION UPDATE

Construction on the first floor Commons Desk/ Lobby Area of Memorial Union is finally underway. Work began November 20 on the new women's restroom and will continue in the Deli/Commons area by the start of the new semester. "We're looking forward to Phase I being done by the middle of March with Phase II beginning in late spring or early summer," Dick Pierce, Memorial Union Operations Manager, said. The construction is not expected to cause any interruption of services.

Meanwhile, the air conditioning project that was started in Great Hall and Tripp Commons this summer will be completed in January, as will the refurbishing of Great Hall including new paint, new carpet and new drapes.


