

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

SONG


..... (After song exit into cafe)

Let Beld Like Here I'll Me - thing as a waithy person en the Heard singing -- all strike picture, enter from


restaurant singing, at end she has come to C stage)

Anter at C, head of Purity Brigade, carries a drum majors staff, march down C)


SONG

We have come to offer you that guidance. (Curtsey)

(up L) That might be cosy, but hardly according to Hoyle. But perhaps I might suggest that these people turn their backs for a moment.




(Turning) People kindly look the other way.
(Bus) Take Harry down to R.) Now I have a plan.

Yes, a plan to restore you to your rights, and to your father s favor. Listen! to-morrow night the Portuguese Count are to give a lawn party in honor of Cora Angelique at Marragansett Pier. But you can't help yourself. (Turns and calls to chorus) Oh, people you may look now!

......have killed him.

(L. going to Karl C) Oh sir, I'm sure you would not kill anyone.

(Karl follows her) But I don't want to be loved. (Goes L. quickly)


(Enter with others) murder.

(To Harry L) I'm going to shock your father now.

(LC. to Ica R) Hush! (To Ica) Why of course we'll stay for the lawn party, that is if its going to be awfully jolly, with lots of fizz and all that sort of thing.




(Starts-Harry detains her)

Well I can't prevent you riding on the railroad.


..... one of them. Well now you silly boy, you don't expect me to occupy both of them, do you?
