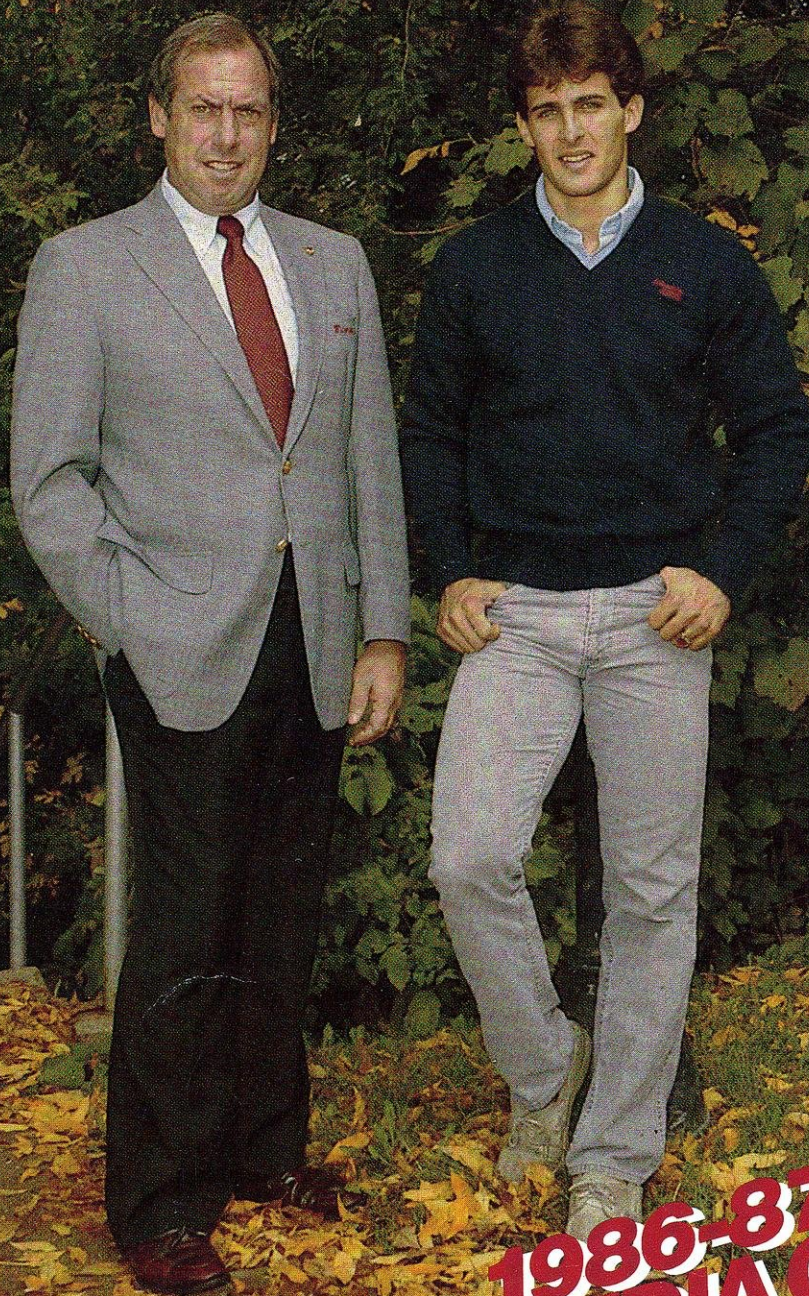

COVERING THE BADGERS

WORKING PRESS

Wisconsin's working press-radio-television facilities are limited at the Dane County Memorial Coliseum. Press should enter the Coliseum through the Player's and Official's entrance at the North end of the building.

WORKING TICKETS

All Requests for working press credentials for Wisconsin Hockey must be made through the UW Sports News Service office at least one week in advance of the game(s) you wish to cover. Upon acceptance of applications, appropriate tickets are either mailed or held for pick-up at the Player's Entrance to the Coliseum. Working press tickets contain assigned seat locations.

RADIO

Visiting radio stations will be admitted upon the recommendations of the visiting school. Broadcast locations are assigned

based on involvement with the co-op line arrangement. Tickets will be held at the Sports News Service office or at the Player's Entrance of the Coliseum the day of the game.

PHOTOGRAPHERS

Photo passes are limited because of space at the Coliseum. Photographers are asked to consider the paying customers when working in the Coliseum. Requests will be granted on a priority first-come, first-serve basis.

PARKING

There is no reserved press parking at the Dane County Memorial Coliseum.

PLAYER INTERVIEWS

Player interviews may be conducted in the media interview room outside the Wisconsin dressing room following each game. No press will be permitted inside the Wisconsin locker room.

Media representatives will be able to interview Wisconsin players after each

game following a short post-game meeting. Player interviews may also be conducted during the week following practice—or approximately 5:30-6:00 pm.

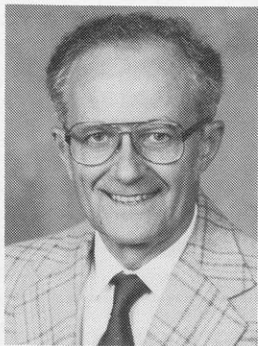
INTERVIEWING THE COACH

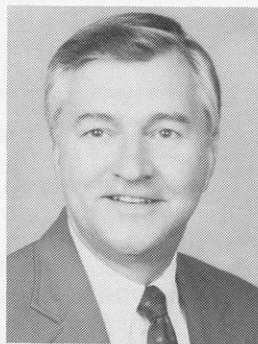
THE SPORTS NEWS STAFF

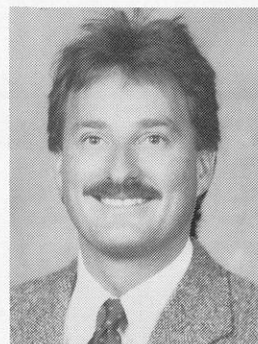

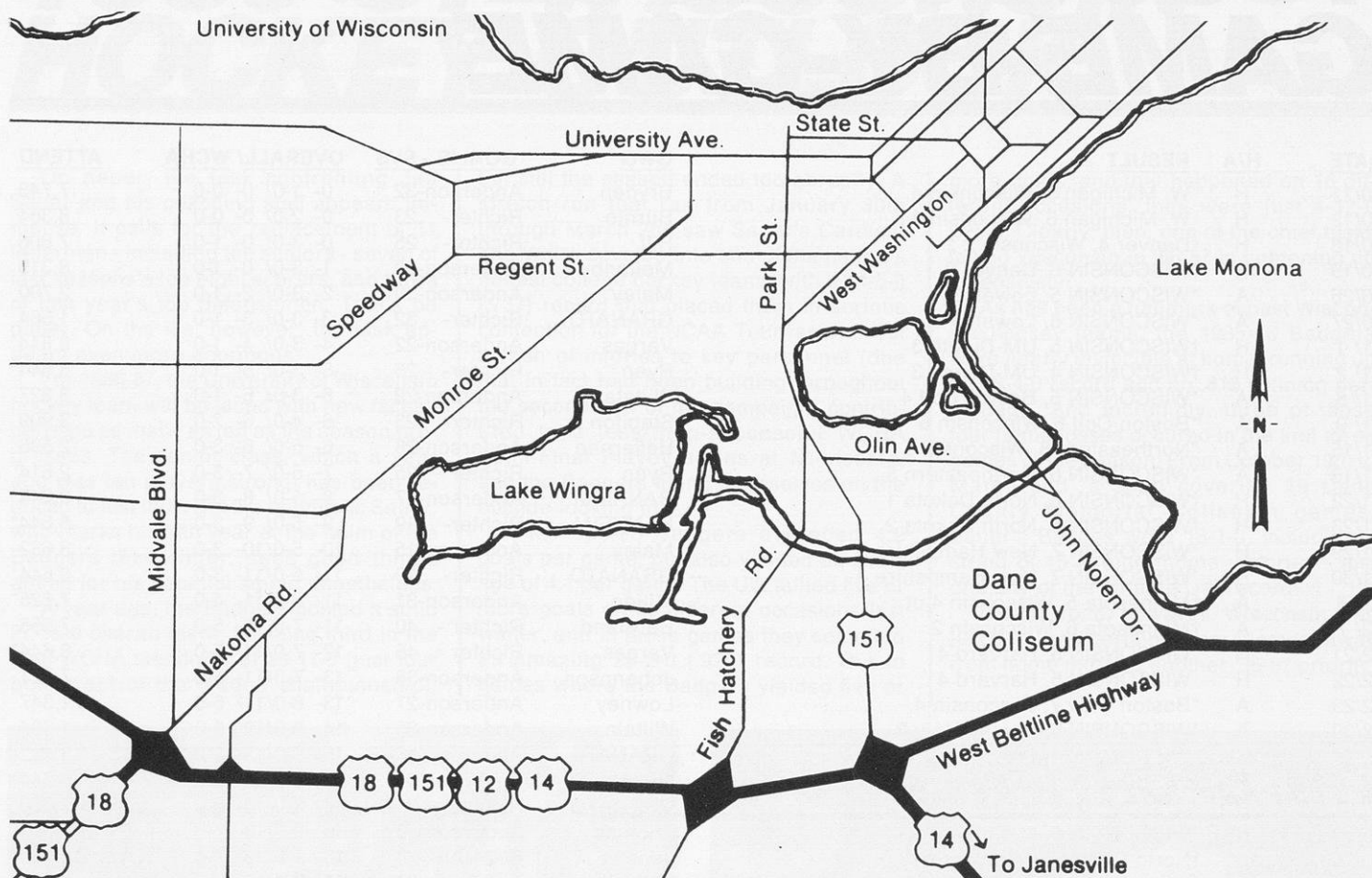


DOUG SPENCER, in his fourth year as Sports Information Assistant, came to the University of Wisconsin from Colorado Springs in September of 1982.

1986-87 WISCONSIN HOCKEY OUTLOOK

On paper, the task confronting Jeff Sauer and his coaching staff appears immense. It calls for the replacement of 11 lettermen - including ten seniors - seven of last season's top eight scorers, and three of last year's top defensemen. That's on paper. On the ice, however, the task appears even more enormous.

For 1986-87, the University of Wisconsin hockey team will be laced with new faces - perhaps as many as ten as the season progresses. The senior class, which a year ago was ten players strong, has been reduced to just four. But the optimistic Sauer, who marks his fifth year at the helm of the Badgers this winter, sees good things ahead for his youthful squad nonetheless.

A year ago, the Badgers posted a solid 27-15-0 overall mark, finishing third in the final WCHA standings at 23-11-0 (just four points out of the league championship),

but still the season ended too abruptly. A stretch run that ran from January 30th through March 2nd saw Sauer's Cardinal and White develop into one of the nation's hottest college hockey teams with a 14-5-0 (.737) record that placed them in serious contention for the NCAA Tournament. But a rash of injuries to key personnel (one that in fact had been building throughout the second half of the campaign) contributed to a less-than-successful WCHA Semi-Final Playoff series at Minnesota, and the Badgers found themselves on the outside looking in.

The 1985-86 Badgers averaged 4.9 goals per game, but also yielded an average of 4.1 per game. The UW tallied five or more goals on 25 different occasions last winter, and in those games they compiled an amazing 23-2-0 (.920) record. But in games where the Badgers yielded five or

more goals, and that happened on 16 different occasions, they were just 4-12-0 (.250). Clearly, then, one of the chief tasks facing Wisconsin in '86-87 is tightening up defensively.

As has been a hallmark of past Wisconsin hockey teams, the 1985-86 Badgers were nearly invincible at home, running up an 18-4-0 record and an .818 winning percentage. And incredibly, three of those four home losses occurred in the first three games of the season. From October 19th to March 2nd, a span covering 19 Dane County Memorial Coliseum games, Sauer's Badgers were 18-1-0, including a string of 15 straight home victories - just one shy of the all-time UW record!

On the road, however, Wisconsin was just 9-11, and certainly improvement away from home must be another '86-87 priority.

Fourteen lettermen return to the fold this winter, led by All-America and Hobey Baker candidate Tony Granato. Selected by his teammates to captain the Badgers in 1986-87, the shifty forward enters his senior campaign with career scoring totals of 72 goals and 75 assists for 147 points. A member of both the 1985 and 1986 US National Hockey Teams, the 5-10, 175-pound Granato powered in 25 goals and 24 assists for 49 points in just 33 games a year ago - missing nine contests late in the season with a broken collarbone. He looks to become the sixth player in Wisconsin hockey history to crack the 200 career point mark.

Two other post-season honor candidates, junior forward Paul Ranheim and sophomore goaltender Mike Richter, figure to step to the forefront of college hockey players. One of the WCHA's

swiftest skaters, the 6-0, 205-pound Ranheim averaged better than a point per game last winter with 17 goals and 17 assists in 33 games - missing nine games late in the season with a knee injury. Richter, meanwhile, earned the WCHA's "Rookie of the Year" award, posting an overall record of 14-9-0 in 1,394 minutes (he was 11-6-0 in WCHA games), a 3.96 goals-against average, and an .886 save percentage. Both players also performed exceptionally well for the United States' team at last year's World Junior Hockey Championships in Hamilton, Ontario.

Other key returnees at the forward positions include lettermen Pat Ford (10-28-38), Steve Tuttle, Paul Graveline, Todd Geisness, Glenn Revak and Andy Akervik. Sauer must have increased offensive production from these six players as they move into leadership roles in '86-87. Ford

and Tuttle should be capable of reaching the 20-goal plateau while Graveline and Geisness proved their worthiness as two of the team's better defensive forwards a year ago. And for Revak and Akervik, improved statistical performances should earn them regular spots along one of Sauer's forward lines.

Two additional players, junior Tony Scheid and red-shirt freshman John Byce, are also given good chances to crack the Badger lineup. Scheid, who did see action in seven varsity games a year ago, was one of the UW's top junior varsity players, while Byce, the leading scorer for his Madison Memorial state high school championship hockey team in 1985, concentrated his first-year athletic endeavors with the Wisconsin baseball team.

Six freshman recruits will also battle the returning veterans for spots in the lineup. They are John Parker of White Bear Lake, Minnesota; Steve Rohlik of St. Paul, Minnesota; Tom Sagissor of Hastings, Minnesota; Gary Shuchuk of Edmonton, Alberta; Kurt Stahura of E. Sandwich, Massachusetts; and Chris Tancill of Livonia, Michigan.

Defensively, the biggest questions facing Sauer in '86-87 will be finding effective replacements for Marty Wiitala, Tim Thomas and Matt Walsh. The Badgers must shore up in their own end, and immediately, Sauer will look to returning lettermen Gary Bunz, Paul Stanton, Ken MacKenzie and Kurt Semandel, while senior Eric Faust and sophomore Gregg Poss also could provide additional experience. Wisconsin will certainly miss the offensive abilities of Wiitala (15-39-54) and Thomas

(11-38-49), with Stanton being the top returning scorer among the defensemen with four goals and six assists to his credit a year ago.

Expected to post strong challenges for blueline time this winter are freshmen Rob Mendel of Los Angeles, California and Shaun Sabol of Minneapolis, Minnesota.

Perhaps the strongest area on the ice for the UW will be in goal. Junior Dean Anderson, who sports a career record of 34-19-0 is back along with last season's WCHA "Freshman of the Year" Mike Richter. This pair should give Sauer one of his best 1-2 combinations since arriving at Wisconsin in 1982.

Anderson has earned two varsity letters, and last year posted a 13-6-0 record and a 4.25 goals-against average in 20 games. Richter, meanwhile, came on strong the second half of the season, playing in 24 games with a 14-9-0 record, a 3.96

goals-against average and an impressive .886 save percentage. He also backstopped the US to a strong showing in the 1986 World Junior Hockey Championships last December.

Also looking to earn a spot between the pipes is freshmen Roger Rougelot out of Salt Lake City.

Wisconsin will again face one of the nation's toughest schedules, opening with 14 straight WCHA games and closing with eight of their last 12 games on the road, and featuring non-conference tilts with eastern powers Yale and Cornell. The Badgers will play 28 WCHA games in all, meeting each WCHA opponent in home and home series, and seven games against Hockey East opponents.

HEAD COACH JEFF SAUER

One of the most respected and influential coaches in the collegiate game today, 1986-87 marks the fifth year for Jeff Sauer as the guiding force of the University of Wisconsin hockey program.

In four seasons at the UW helm, Sauer's teams have averaged nearly 27 victories per year and have compiled an impressive 106-59-5 record and a .638 winning percentage. His 1985-86 squad put together a 27-15 overall mark and a 23-11 third place WCHA finish.

The Badgers' 27 victories in '85-86 marked the ninth time since 1971 that Wisconsin teams have won at least 25 games, and was the 16th time in the past 19 seasons that the UW has won 20 or more games. Under Sauer, the Badgers have won at least 21 games all four seasons.

Coach Sauer was honored this past spring with the opportunity to serve as assistant coach to Dave Peterson for the 1985 USA Hockey Team that participated in the annual IIHF (International Ice Hockey Federation) World Championships in Prague, Czechoslovakia. A mixture of professionals and amateurs, the '85 U.S. National Hockey Team put together a fine fourth place finish - just out of the medal picture and behind World Champion Czechoslovakia, runner-up Canada, and third place Russia. Also included on the U.S. team were Badgers Tony Granato and Tim Thomas.

Sauer enters the 1986-87 campaign just 27 wins shy of 300 career victories, putting him in select company in college hockey circles. Only 43 years old, Jeff will also mark his 16th season as a Western Collegiate Hockey Association Head Coach in '86-87, qualifying him as the "Dean" of league coaches.

In his first year at Wisconsin in 1982-83, Sauer accomplished what no other first-year college hockey coach had done before. His Badgers captured the 1983 NCAA Championship, earned the No. 1 ranking in the final poll, and posted one of the best marks in school history at 33-10-4. It marked the fourth national championship for Wisconsin since 1973. Four members of that team - Pat Flatley, Chris Chelios, Bruce Driver and Marc Behrend - played in the 1984 Winter Olympic Games in Sarajevo and have since become stand-out players in the National Hockey League.

Known for their second-half peaks, Sauer's Wisconsin hockey teams have put together some impressive second-half spurts. His first team, '82-83, compiled a 23-4-2 record and an .828 winning percentage after Christmas; his youthful '84-85 club ran up a 19-9 mark and a .679 winning percentage after November 30th; and just this past season, Sauer's Badgers went 14-5-0 (.737) from December 30th to March 2nd.

Among his other list of "notables" in the coaching profession are: Head Coach of the South team at the 1983 National Sports Festival; member of the 1984 U.S. Olympic Hockey Committee; 1983 Chairman of the WCHA Coach's Committee; and a stint on the NCAA Ice Hockey Rules Committee. Jeff also directs his own hockey school in Madison and works with the Stan Mikita Hockey School for the Hearing-Impaired in Chicago.

Sauer had big shoes to fill when he left a comfortable position at Colorado College to replace the almost legendary Bob Johnson in 1982. But his character, determination to succeed and his positive rapport with the public and the media have proved he was the ideal choice. At Colorado College, where he had served as the Tigers' Head Coach since 1971, Jeff won more than 180 games and was twice named WCHA "Coach of the Year". His first award came following his rookie season of 1971 and the second following the 1975-76 campaign when Colorado College

posted a fine 23-14-0 record and finished third in the final WCHA standings. Sauer also guided his '80-81 Tigers to third place in the WCHA.

Wisconsin hockey fans will probably never forget the almost legendary "Black Sunday" in March of 1981 when Sauer's CC Tigers came back with a miraculous 11-4 upset over the Badgers in the Dane County Coliseum to claim the two-game, total-goals playoff victory. (Wisconsin had won the opening game 8-2.)

A 1965 graduate of Colorado College, Jeff earned a Bachelor's degree in Sociology. During his undergraduate years in Colorado Springs, he competed in both varsity hockey and baseball for the Tigers.

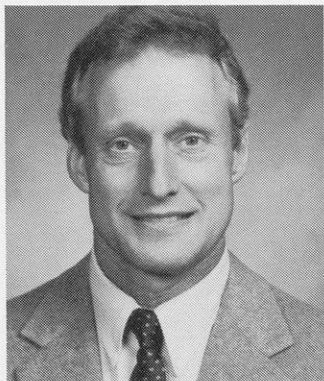
In 1966, Sauer began his coaching career as an assistant to Bob Johnson at Colorado College. Then when Johnson took over the head coaching duties at Wisconsin, Sauer again served as his assistant coach.

Jeff and wife, Jamie, are the parents of two children - Chip, 11, and Beth, six.

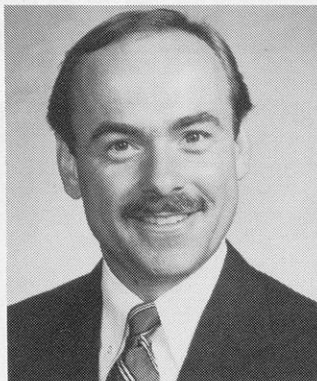

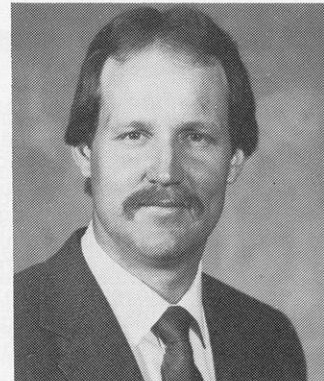
A key to the Badgers' continued success at the goaltending position in recent years has been Bill Howard, who marks his fifth year with the Wisconsin hockey program.

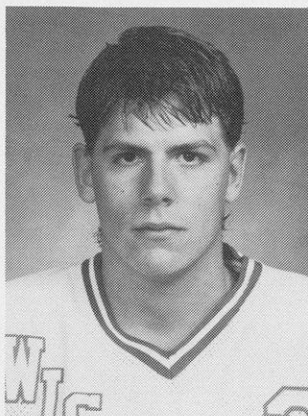
Following graduation from the UW, Ian spent two seasons playing professional hockey in the minor leagues, but an injury ended his playing career in the spring of 1981.

THE WCHA

Recognized as the premier collegiate hockey league in the United States, the Western Collegiate Hockey Association proudly marks its 28th year in 1986-87.

WCHA-member teams have claimed an unprecedented 19 NCAA Division I Championships in the past 27 years, including ten of the last 14. And since the NCAA Tournament began in 1948, the WCHA has claimed 29 national collegiate ice hockey titles! Three member institutions - Wisconsin, North Dakota and Minnesota - have accounted for nine national championships since 1973. The Badgers earned the NCAA Championship in 1973, 1977, 1981 and 1983; North Dakota took the crown in 1980 and 1982; and Minnesota captured the national title in 1974, 1976 and 1979. In NCAA final four competition, the WCHA has had two teams in the final four an impressive 33 of 38 times since 1949!

The names of ex-WCHA players are legendary. Although the list is too numerous to mention everyone, you can start with John Mayasich, Bill Hay, Bill Masterton, Gordon "Red" Berenson, Lou Nanne, Tony Esposito, Keith Magnuson,

Wayne Thomas, Dennis Hextall and Ron Grahame. Since 1950, the WCHA has had more than 125 of its players earn All-American honors, while another 70 have played on U.S. Olympic Hockey Teams (14 WCHA players were on the 1980 United States Gold Medal Team). And for good measure, a check of National Hockey League rosters at the conclusion of the 1985-86 season found more than 70 former WCHA stand-outs on NHL Teams. By school, they were:

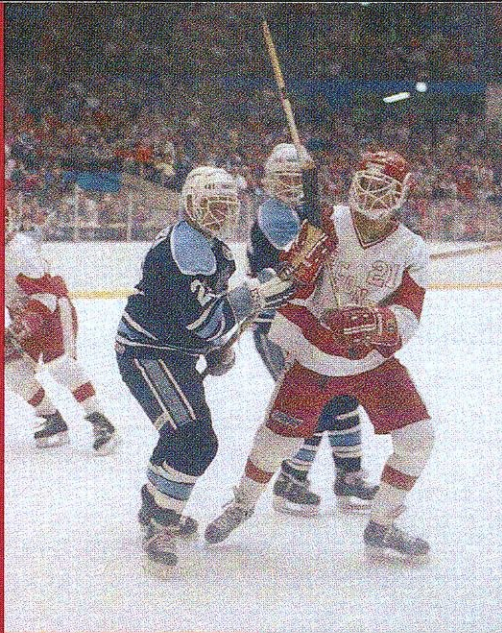

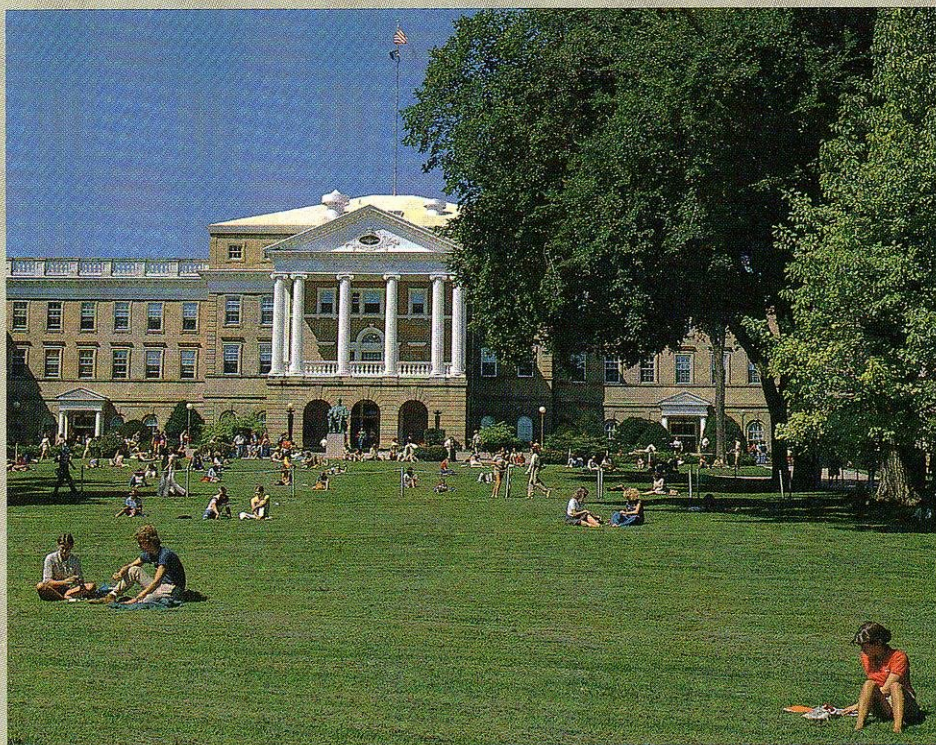


The Dane County Coliseum—one of college hockey's premier arenas—with seating for 8,644.

Wisconsin has ranked among the top ten universities in the United States in every scholarly reputational study since 1910. Combining the results of seven major ratings since 1925, Prof. David Webster of the University of Pennsylvania, writing for the June 1983 *Change* magazine, ranks the University of Wisconsin fourth in the nation - behind Harvard, California-Berkeley and Yale, and tied with the University of Chicago. Some 4,128 courses and 12,607 sections were offered in the fall of 1985. Majors were available in 151 bachelor's, 191 master's, and 123 doctor's degree programs.

The University of Wisconsin, one of the world's leading institutions of higher education, is dedicated to the support of academic freedom.

Established in 1848, the first class of 17 students assembled February 5, 1849. Today, the University of Wisconsin includes 13 schools and colleges, 133 academic departments, more than 45,000 students and 14,000 employees, nearly 4,000,000 volumes in 22 libraries, a \$750,000,000 budget, and research and development expenditures totalling \$185,000,000 (third largest in the U.S.).

UW departments ranked among the top ten in the nation in the 1983 *Assessment of Research-Doctorate Programs in the United States* include Sociology (1st), German, Chemical Engineering and Geography (2nd), Statistics (4th), Plant Pathology, Molecular Biology and Biochemistry (5th), Spanish and Portuguese (6th), Zoology (7th), Political Science, Chemistry and Economics (8th), Mathematics (9th), and History (10th).

The UW's international activities extend the boundaries of the campus to all parts of the globe. The campus has about 3,600 foreign students from 125 countries, offers some 50 foreign languages for study, and has the largest overall number of international studies faculty and largest number of faculty of any university in East Asian, South and Southeast Asian, African and Latin American studies. Junior year abroad programs are offered for students going to Brazil, China, England, France, West Germany, Hungary, Israel, India, Italy, Spain, Sweden, Norway, Nepal, Thailand and Mexico and Quebec for summer study.

The UW's Center for Health Sciences is one of the Midwest's leading centers for patient care, education of physicians and other health professionals, research and public service. It includes the Medical, Nursing, Pharmacy, and Allied Health Professions schools; UW Hospital and Clinics; State Laboratory of Hygiene; UW Health Service; and Wisconsin Clinical Cancer Center - one of 21 designated cancer centers in the country.

More than 400 campus organizations offer a wide variety of activities for Wisconsin students - including social, political, philosophic or religious, sports, honorary, ecological, philanthropic, drama and music groups plus fraternities and sororities. Film societies show 400 titles a year, and the intramural recreation program services some 35,000 students and staff at five indoor recreational facilities every month.

The University's intercollegiate athletic program includes men's competition in football, basketball, hockey, track and field soccer, swimming, tennis, crew, wrestling, baseball, cross country, golf, gymnastics and fencing.

The Elvehjem Museum of Art houses the University's collection of more than 10,000 paintings, prints, drawings, sculpture, and decorative arts dating from 2300 B.C. to the present, and maintains an active schedule of temporary exhibits.

University Theater, School of Music, and the Dance Division offer a wide range of performances throughout the year. Facilities include the Ronald E. Mitchell and Gilbert Hemsley theaters in Vilas Communication Hall, Mills Concert Hall, Morphy Recital Hall, and the Eastman Organ Recital Hall. The Wisconsin Union Theater, with 1,300 seats, hosts visiting concert artists, orchestras, professional theater and dance companies, conferences, lectures and films.

The Wisconsin Union has been providing a variety of services and an extensive program of social, cultural, and recreational events for students. Memorial Union, on the shores of Lake Mendota, is a center of activity for some 18,000 people every day. Another 10,000 enter Union South, and more than 11,000 meals are served daily in the Wisconsin Union's 11 restaurants and delis.

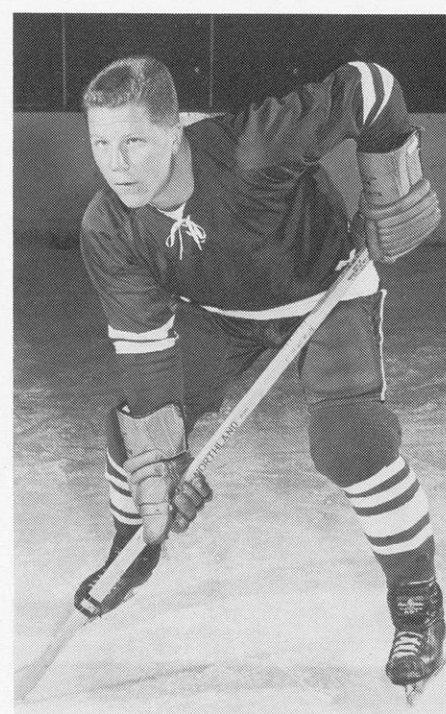

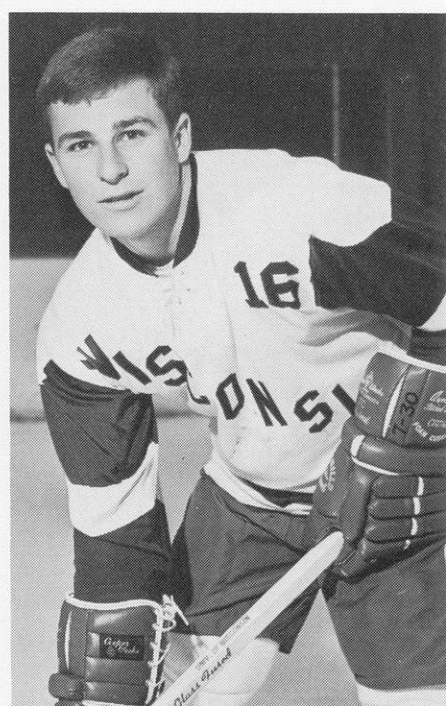

BADGER HOCKEY HISTORY



GREAT MOMENTS IN WISCONSIN HOCKEY



DEAN TALAFIOUS STUNS CORNELL WITH OVERTIME GOAL IN 1973 NCAA SEMIFINALS.

March, 1962—Wisconsin Athletic Director Ivan Williamson announced the return of hockey as an intercollegiate sport after a 28-year absence.

December 6, 1963—A rebound goal by Chan Young 5:10 into the sudden death period gives Wisconsin its first modern collegiate win, a 3-2 victory over Macalester.

February 22, 1964—Wisconsin concluded its first season of hockey in the modern era with an 8-5-3 record.

December 11, 1964—In an effort to upgrade their program, the Badgers scheduled eight games against WCHA teams, but unfortunately, the Badgers lost all eight of those games.

February 22, 1966—After 13 straight losses to WCHA teams, the Badgers finally post a victory, a 5-4 overtime win over Minnesota. Jim Petruzates scored

on a break-away just two minutes into the overtime period.

April 1, 1966—Following the retirement of John Riley, Bob Johnson was named head coach of the Badger hockey program.

March, 1968—Wisconsin hockey hit the national spotlight as Bert DeHate, a sophomore center from St. Paul, MN, wins the national scoring title with 77 points on 47 goals and 30 assists. DeHate hits for seven hat-tricks, a Badger record, as the team goes 21-10.

March 30, 1969—After another successful season, including an 11-9-2 mark against WCHA teams, the Badgers were admitted to the WCHA.

March, 1970—Wisconsin places fourth in the WCHA and qualifies for the national tournament, where they post a third place finish. Defenseman John Jagger of Sault Ste. Marie, Ontario becomes the first Badger player to win All-American honors.

March, 1972—The Badgers make their second NCAA appearance in three years, but again come away with a third place finish.

March, 16, 1973—Wisconsin stuns Cornell 6-5 in overtime to advance to the NCAA finals. A goal with five seconds left in regulation time by sophomore Dean Talafous ties the game. Talafous then tallies the game-winner with 33 seconds left in overtime.

March, 17, 1973—With a 4-2 win over WCHA rival Denver, Wisconsin wins the NCAA championship for the first time in the school's history.

March, 25, 1977—After missing the NCAA playoffs for three years, the Badgers make it to the final four again. Les Grauer scored the tying goal against New Hampshire and Mike Eaves won it in overtime.

4-3, as the Badgers advanced to the finals.

March 26, 1977—Senior Steve Alley culminated the Badgers' finest season ever with a goal 23 seconds into overtime to give Wisconsin a 6-5 win over Michigan for their second NCAA title. Wisconsin finished the season at 37-7-1 and was the first team to capture the Big Ten, WCHA and NCAA titles in the same season. Three players were named to the All-American squad. Johnson was named Coach of the Year, and his son Mark was named Freshman of the Year.

March 25, 1978—Wisconsin fans took Providence by storm for the NCAA tournament, and were proclaimed the "World's Greatest Hockey Fans". Mike Eaves finished his career as the school's all-time scoring leader, while he and Mark Johnson were All-Americans. Wisconsin was fourth in the NCAA's.

March, 1979—Record crowds saw the Badgers (25-13-3) play as 21 of the 23 home games were sell-outs and the average crowd of 8,654 was just eight short of a sell-out. Mark Johnson closed out his Badger career as the top goal scorer in Wisconsin history. He was named to the All-American squad again and was the college "Player of the Year".

March 27, 1981—Wisconsin returned to the NCAA final four after defeating the best team in the East, Clarkson, 9-8 in a total goal series at Potsdam, NY. After a 5-1 win over Northern Michigan, the Badgers advanced to the finals again.

March 28, 1981—The Badgers regained the NCAA crown for the third time with a 6-3 win over Minnesota. The "back door" Badgers proved they were the champions after defeating the #1 teams in the ECAC (Clarkson), CCHA (Northern Michigan) and WCHA (Minnesota). The season also marked the end of the ten-team WCHA, as the three Michigan schools and Notre Dame dropped out to join the CCHA.

March 27, 1982—Badgers finish 2nd in NCAA tournament, and compile the second best record in Wisconsin Hockey history at 35-11-1. Center John Newberry and Defenseman Bruce Driver receive All-American status.

June 1, 1982—Bob Johnson resigns after fifteen years at Wisconsin. Johnson had guided the Badgers to three NCAA Championships and the best attendance of any college hockey program in the country.

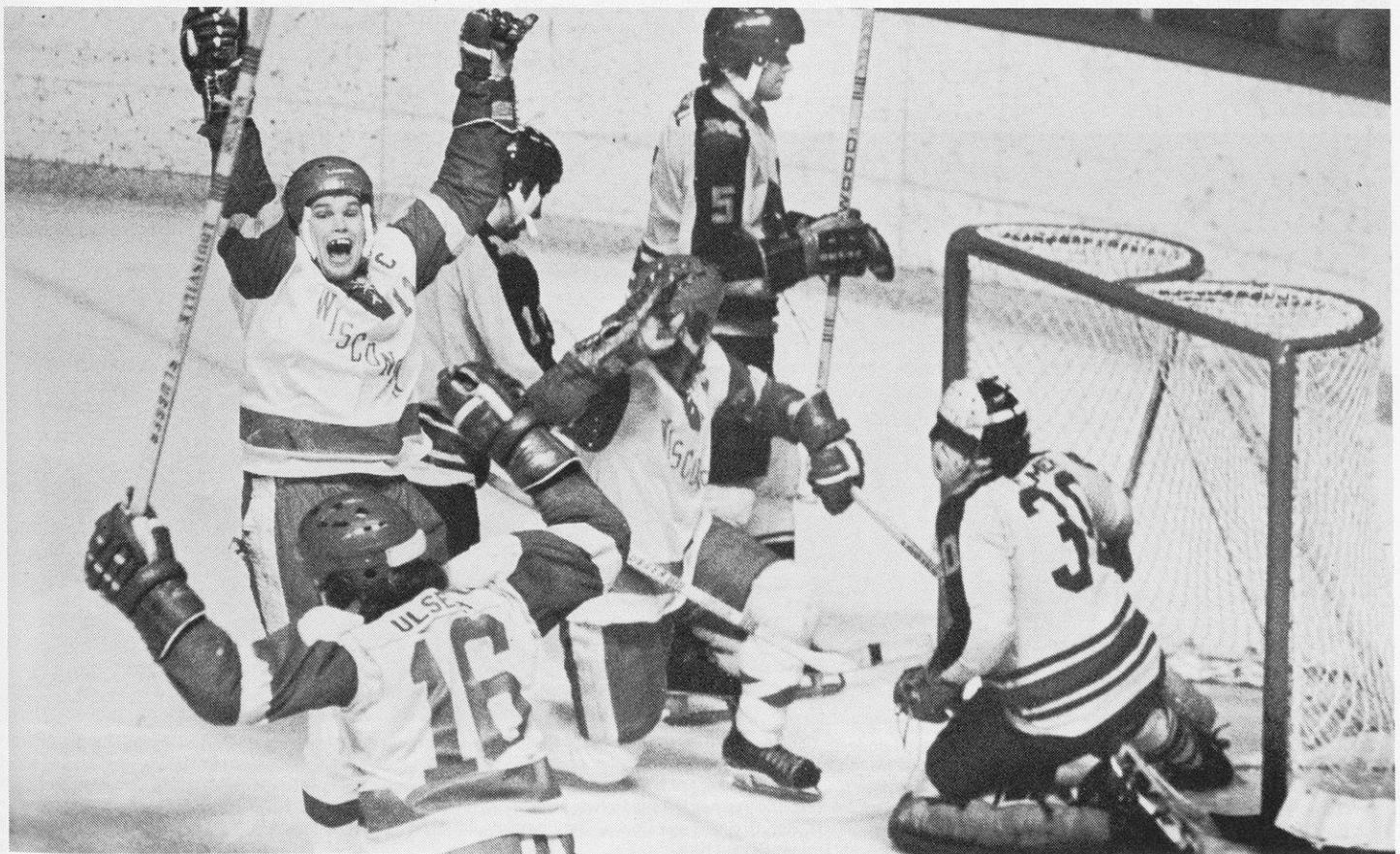
July 8, 1982—Jeff Sauer, Head Coach at Colorado College and former assistant to Bob Johnson at Wisconsin, is named as the second full-time coach of the Badgers.

March 5, 1983—Sophomores Chris Chelios and Paul Houck score the tying and winning goals as the Badgers beat North Dakota 6-5 in triple overtime to advance to the WCHA Playoff championships in Minneapolis.

March 24-26, 1983—After sweeping Minnesota in Williams Arena to gain the WCHA Playoff Championship and the No. 1 seed in the West, first-year Coach Jeff Sauer's team swept St. Lawrence 6-2, 7-1 in the NCAA Quarterfinals in Madison to move to the final four for the third straight year. In Grand Forks, ND, the Badgers claimed their fourth NCAA Championship since 1973 with a 2-0 win over Providence in the semi-finals and a 6-2 victory over Harvard in the finals. Senior goaltender Marc Behrend was named the Tournament MVP for the second time in his career.

January 7, 1984—Wisconsin becomes the first and only American college team to defeat the 1984 U.S. Olympic Team when the Badgers stun USA 4-2 before 8,732 at the Coliseum.

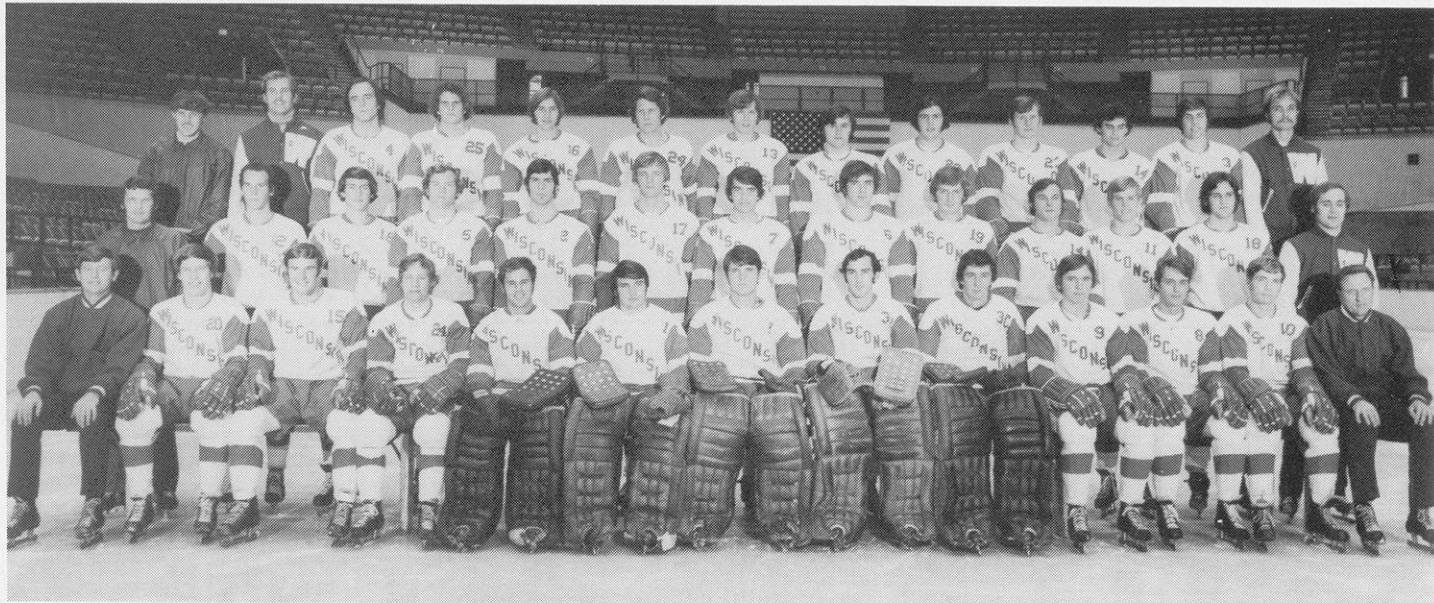
November 23, 1985—The University of Wisconsin records its 500th victory since starting hockey in 1963 with a 6-2 victory over WCHA rival North Dakota in the Dane County Coliseum.

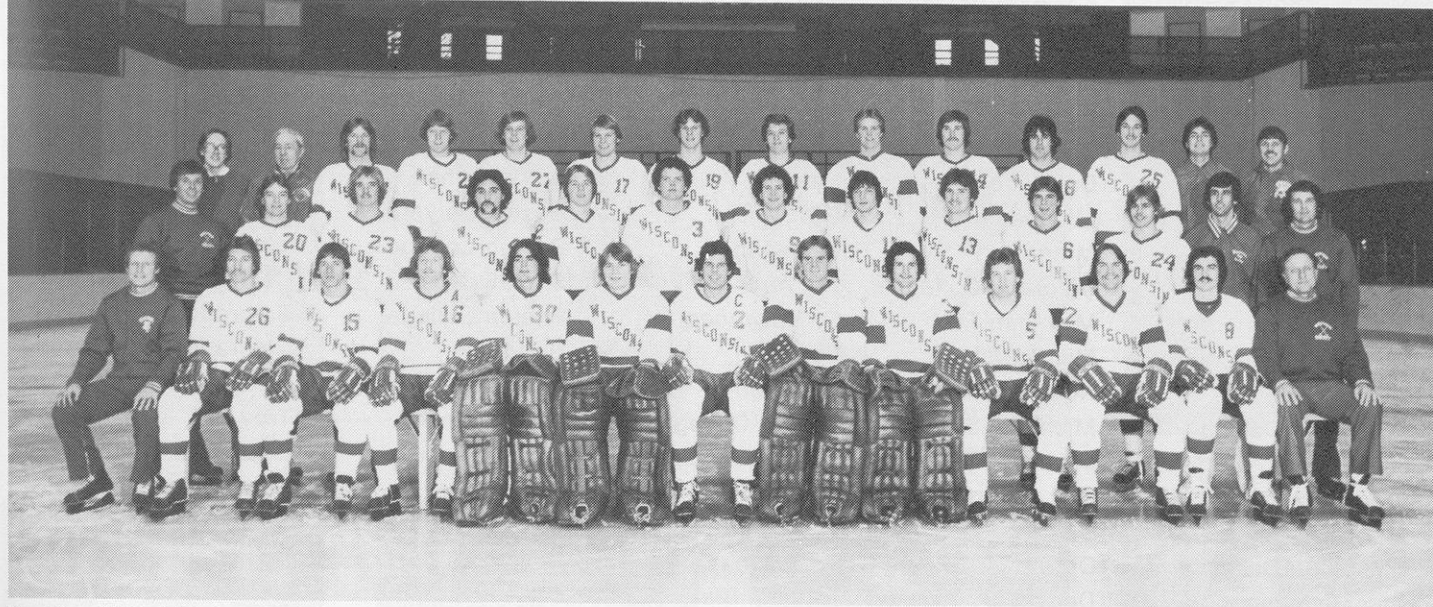

HOME OF THE BADGERS **THE DANE COUNTY COLISEUM**



Home ice for the University of Wisconsin Hockey Team is the modern Dane County Memorial Coliseum, one of college hockey's finest facilities and the site of NCAA attendance records for 17 consecutive seasons.

With theater-style seating for 8,644, the Coliseum is the second largest collegiate ice facility in the nation. The ice surface is 200' by 85'.

Inside, the Badgers make use of dressing room facilities that rank second to none. Each player is assigned an individual stall (3½ × 6) for his equipment and personal belongings. Also located adja-

cent to the Wisconsin dressing room is a modern training room which includes a whirlpool and all the various modalities and exercise equipment for treatment of rehabilitation of injuries. The Badgers also make use of a fully-equipped weight room inside the Coliseum.

Recognized as the home of some of the nation's very best collegiate hockey fans, the Coliseum and the University of Wisconsin hockey team have attracted record crowds every year since the Badgers joined the Western Collegiate Hockey Association for the 1969-70 season.

The University of Wisconsin has set American college hockey attendance records for 17 consecutive seasons dating

back to 1970. More than 3¼ million fans have watched Badger Hockey in the Coliseum since 1967, and since 1969, the UW has drawn 3,065,303 for 371 home dates (not counting exhibitions) - an average of 8,421 per game.

In 1981-82, the Badgers drew 240,095 fans for 28 home games to set an all-time NCAA single season record, while the 1978-79 average attendance of 8,654 is both an NCAA and University of Wisconsin record.

Witnessing a Badger hockey game in the jam-packed Dane County Coliseum is like nothing else in college hockey.
