# President Sensenbrenner presiding

Communications were received from Regents Holmes and Werner in explanation of their absence.

Upon motion of Regent Callahan, seconded by Regent Campbell, it was VOTED, That the minutes of the annual meeting of the Board held on May 25, 1945, be approved as sent out to the Regents.

#### RECOMMENDATIONS OF THE PRESIDENT

# - Administration and General -

1. That J. Kenneth Little be appointed Director of Student Personnel Services and Registrar effective July 1, 1945; salary at the rate of \$6,500 per annum, 12 months' basis; to be charged to item vice Merriman; and that Mr. Little be continued as Associate Professor in the Department of Education without salary for the academic year 1945-46.

Upon motion of Regent Grady, seconded by Regent Kleczka, recommendation No. 1 listed under Administration and General was adopted.

2. That J. Kenneth Little be paid \$271 for services rendered in correlating student personnel services during the period June 16 to June 30, 1945; charge to Regents Unassigned.

Upon motion of Regent Grady, seconded by Regent Callahan, recommendation No. 2 listed under Administration and General was adopted.

#### - Dean of Men -

1. That the resignation of Willard W. Blaesser, assistant dean of men and coordinator of the personnel council, be accepted; to take effect August 1, 1945.

Upon motion of Regent Cleary, seconded by Regent Callahan, recommendation No. 1 listed under Dean of Men was adopted.

#### - Business and Finance -

1. That the Director of Business and Finance be authorized to sign a proposal and contract with the Veterans Administration for the furnishing of correspondence study courses and lessons to World War II veterans on the basis of the regular charges and procedures that apply to correspondence study work in the University, including payment in advance and no refunds for uncompleted lessons. (This replaces the action of March 21, 1945, relating to this subject.) (Confirming approval by the Executive Committee.)

- 2. That the Director of Business and Finance be authorized to sign a lease with the National Farm Loan Association, Group 317, Wisconsin Rapids, for the rental of thirty-nine acres of land in Wood County, known as the Barbara Hasselberger Farm and described as the NE<sup>1</sup>/4 NE<sup>1</sup>/4 of section 22, all in township 25 North, range 3 East, (excluding one acre), at a rental of \$100 for the period April 1 to December 1, 1945.

- 3. That the Director of Business and Finance be authorized to sign a renewal contract with the United States Government for correcting Armed Forces Institute lessons and papers during the fiscal year 1945-46, with an option to the Government to renew the contract for such period as it may deem advisable, subject to such revision in the schedule of compensation as may be mutually agreed upon.

  Adopted.
- 4. That the Director of Business and Finance or the Associate Director of Business and Finance be authorized to sign proposals, agreements, contracts and contract supplements with the United States Government for educational programs and services requested by the Government and approved by the President of the University for military personnel and/or veterans assigned to or enrolled in the University of Wisconsin and for other educational services of the University.

  Adopted.
- 5. That the Director of Business and Finance be autlpurchase of dermit equipment.

6. That upon the request of the departments concerned, and with the consent of the employees named, the employment of the following civil service employees who have reached retirement age be continued to the dates indicated:

- 1. That the following gifts and grants be approved:
  - (a) \$ 2,750.00 The Jane Coffin Childs Memorial Fund for Medical Research, New Haven, Connecticut, to provide a fellow ship in cancer research for the period July 1, 1945, to June 30, 1946.
  - (b) 850.00 American Guernsey Cattle Club, Peterborough, New Hampshire, for the renewal of an industrial fellowship in the departments of genetics and dairy husbandry, for 12 months, beginning July 1, 1945, to study the genetic factors present in the blood of cattle; and that the Director of Business and Finance be authorized to sign the agreement.
  - (c) 2,400.00 Nutrition Foundation, Inc., New York City, for a research grant in the department of biochemistry for a two year period, beginning July 1, 1945, to study the character of compounds containing bound biotin and other vitamins; and that the Director of Business and Finance be authorized to sign the agreement.
  - (d) 2,500.00 The Borden Company Foundation, Inc., New York City, to be distributed annually as a \$500 award to the senior student in medicine who has carried out the most meritorious project in research; the student to be selected by the faculty of the Medical School.
  - (e) 1,500.00 National Dairy Council, for the establishment of an industrial fellowship in the department of biochemistry, to study the relation of milk in the diet to dental caries for the period July 1, 1945, to June 30, 1946; and that the Director of Business and Finance be authorized to sign the agreement.

The President presented a memorandum regarding Mr. Harry Partch and his research work relating to the field of music (Copy of memorandum on file.) Upon motion of Regent Callahan, seconded by Regent Cleary, it was

VOTED, That Mr. Partch's appointment for 1945-46 be approved at a salary of \$2,000 for the fiscal year; to be charged to the accumulated income in the Anonymous Trust Fund. (Subject to any action of the Board of Regents in relation to patents.) It is understood the Research Committee will provide \$1,500 for materials and assistance.

Upon motion of Regent Kleczka, seconded by Regent Callahan, approved.

Upon recommendation of President Fred, and upon motion of Regent Jones, seconded by Regent Cleary, it was

VOTED, That Vincent E. Kivlin be promoted from Assistant Dean to Associate Dean of the College of Agriculture.

President Fred reported that a cooperative arrangement has been worked out with the Wisconsin Canners association for a study of the effect of DDT on the value of pea vines as livestock feed, all expenses to be paid by the Wisconsin Canners Association. Upon motion of Regent Jones, seconded by Regent Hodgkins, it was VOTED, That the cooperative arrangement be approved.

At the annual meeting of the Board held on May 25, 1945, the following gift was accepted:

"Minnetta Sammis Leonard, Eva Andrus Leonard and Barbara Dorrit Leonard Reynolds, \$1000.00, first mortgage five per cent bond of the New York Central Railroad Company, the income to be used for 'The Sterling Andrus Leonard Prize Contest'; the prize to be awarded annually to the student who writes the best essay upon a subject approved by the English Department."

Mr. Peterson called the attention of the Regents to an oversight in the above action by not including the following:

"If for any reason in the future, the holding of the prize contest shall be discontinued for two successive years, the corpus of this gift shall be returned to the donors or survivors of them."

He also read a letter from Minnetta Sammis Leonard and the other donors, dated June 11, 1945, in which she offers as an alternative that if the acceptance of the bond is not approved by the Regents, the amount of \$50 will be offered each year for the prize and the bond will be retained by the donors. Upon motion of Regent Grady, seconded by Regent Hodgkins, it was

VOTED, That the action taken by the Regents on May 25, 1945, be rescinded and that the alternate proposal of \$50 in cash each year be accepted.

The fund is known as 20.41 (21) Rural Electrification Coordination, Chapter 283.

Upon motion of Regent Grady, seconded by Regent Kleczka, adopted.

Upon recommendation of the Superintendent of the Wisconsin General Hospital, and upon motion of Regent Cleary, seconded by Regent Campbell, it was VOTED, That the per diem charge at the Wisconsin Orthopedic and Children's Hospital for state and county patients be increased from \$4.20 to \$5.00 per day, beginning July 1, 1945.

Mr. Peterson presented a proposed cooperative agreement with the U. S. Geological Survey and the Wisconsin Geological and Natural History Survey for investigation of geology and mineral resources in Wisconsin and stated that the legislature had made an appropriation of \$15,000 for this purpose. Upon motion of Regent Kleczka, seconded by Regent Callahan, it was

VOTED, That the agreement be approved and that the State Geologist be authorized to sign it.

Upon recommendation of the Director of Business and Finance, and upon motion of Regent Cleary, seconded by Regent Hodgkins, it was

VOTED, That the Summer Session budget be increased by \$900 to provide for necessary increases and other adjustments; charge to Regents Unassigned 1945-46.

Upon recommendation of the Secretary, and upon motion of Regent Cleary, seconded by Regent Hodgkins, it was

VOTED, That before the annual distribution of income is made for 1944-45 \$3000 be transferred to University Trust Funds, Principal, Suspense Account, to provide for possible losses on the sale of farms.

Regent Cleary, Chairman of the Finance Committee, presented the following report of the Finance Committee:

REPORT OF THE FINANCE COMMITTEE TO THE BOARD OF REGENTS
June 27, 1945

The over-all pattern and content of the 1945-46 operating budget of the University was established by the 1945 Legislature in the adoption of the Executive Budget Bill.

After passage of the Budget Bill members of the Finance Committee of the Regents conferred from time to time with University administrative officers regarding policies and procedures to be followed in the preparation of the detailed budget.

The budget data presented to the President by the deans, directors, and division heads included five-year salary histories of all members of the faculty recommended for merit increases and signed statements of the reasons for the recommended salary adjustments. The President conferred with all the deans collectively regarding all the faculty merit increases and then conferred with each dean individually regarding the increases in his college.

The/analyses were received by the members of the Finance Committee early last week. The Committee met in the President's office on June 20 and conferred at length with the President, the Director of Business and Finance, and the Budget Officers. Immediately thereafter the analyses were sent to each Regent.

The Finance Committee held two conferences with the faculty committee in charge of the School for Workers in Industry and with representatives of labor organizations regarding the future development of the School.

The Finance Committee recommends as follows:

- 1. That the 1945-46 budget as amended after discussion by the Board of Regents be approved.
- That the Director of Business and Finance be authorized to file the necessary schedules of civil service step increases with the State Bureau of Personnel.
- That the Director of Business and Finance be authorized to request the State Emergency Board to transfer funds from the appropriation made by Section 20.415 (3) to other specific appropriations in accordance with the budget and as authorized by statute.
- That the President of the University appoint a committee to study the further development of the School for Workers in Industry.
- That the Director of Business and Finance be directed to request the opinion of the Attorney General on the legal aspects of charging a part of general University administration costs to revolving fund enterprises.

That the Finance Committee be authorized to make minor corrections and changes in the budget within the approved totals.

Upon motion of Regent Hodgkins, seconded by Regent Kleczka, it was VOTED, That the report be approved and the budget for 1945-46 be adopted. A called vote was taken, all Regents present voting and voting "Aye".

Regent Jones presented the report of the Constructional Development Committee. He stated that on January 8, 1945, the Campus Planning Advisory Committee presented a report recommending a site for the new Chemistry Building. Upon motion of Regent Jones, seconded by Regent Kleczka, it was

VOTED, That the Constructional Development Committee be authorized by the Board of Regents to re-refer this report back to the Campus Planning Commission, successor to the Advisory Committee, for further study after which a subsequent report will be considered by this Board.

Regent Jones referred to an outline for discussion at the conference on June 26, 1945, with the Campus Planning Commission in re the new construction program and stated that it was the judgment of the Commission that in the planning for buildings on the campus the element of quality should not be sacrificed. He stated further that the Commission had taken cognizance of the fact that the Legislature has made specific appropriations for an addition to the Wisconsin General Hospital, a Short Course Dormitory and improvements to the Radio Station, and that the Legislature has earmarked \$600,000 of the new \$8,000,000 new construction appropriation for the specific purpose of providing a Dairy Building and equipment.

The Campus Planning Commission recommends that the plans for the structures and projects listed in Group I below be given first consideration and that attention then be given to the buildings listed in Group II:

Regent Grady, Chairman of the Committee on Welfare and Student Life, stated the report on the Theta Chi case would be deferred until Regent Holmes, a member of the committee, could be present.

The question was raised as to whether there would be any summer meetings of the Board of Regents. Upon motion of Regent Grady, seconded by Regent Kleczka, it was

VOTED, That the President of the Board be authorized to call a special meeting of the Board if such a meeting is required before September 29, 1945.
