The managers, therefore, have only one duty to perform, namely, to provide the theatergoing public with the best entertainment available. It is gratifying to note that they are doing this, and that the mushy bills which have been given for years throughout the country, and which served to debase rather than uplift the public taste, are being displaced by better intellectual fare. Good shows may look for good business next season just as bad shows may expect to go to
