Hirsch Guides Wisconsin Athletic Program

Elroy "Crazylegs" Hirsch is dynamic, enthusiastic, direct, forceful, and a practical leader.

His successful "Operation Turn-Around" is now in its third year and he's accomplished the task of leading Wisconsin's athletic program back into a position of national prominence.

Elroy accepted the athletic directorship on February 28, 1969 and was the overwhelming choice of Badger alumni and fans for the job. He's the seventh man to serve as athletic director in the school's history.

His boundless energies have taken him into every area of the State of Wisconsin and the nation in the past year meeting high school coaches, administrators, athletes, fans and followers on their home grounds. "Operation Turn-Around" carried the Badger leader into over 60 communities encompassing over 80 high schools personally visited.

He is a living legend to followers of Wisconsin football and to sports fans and people throughout the entire state even though he played just one season — as a sophomore in 1942 — for the Badgers.

His career has been one of success.

Wisconsin fans, especially the older generation, remember him as the great triple threat halfback on Harry Stuhldreher's 1942 football team that won eight games, lost only to Iowa, and tied Notre Dame.

He played at Michigan in 1943, as a Marine trainee, and he not only played football, but basketball, track and baseball. He won his "M" in each sport, the only athlete ever to accomplish such a feat at Michigan.

He had a successful professional football career, first as halfback with the Chicago Rockets of the post-war All-America Conference, and later with the Los Angeles Rams for nine seasons as one of the all-time great ends.

He was a successful executive with the Rams, first as general manager of the team, and later as assistant to the president of the team, a job he relinquished to accept the job as Wisconsin athletic director.

How did Elroy Hirsch receive the nickname "Crazylegs"?

It happened in the Wisconsin-Great Lakes game at Chicago in October, 1942 as Hirsch reeled off a 61 yard scoring run. Francis Powers of the Chicago Daily News coined the phrase which was to remain with him throughout his career in the press box that afternoon.

As Hirsch recalls, "One of my feet was going one way, the other one in another direction on that run. I must have been a sight running down the sidelines."

And now that Elroy Hirsch is Wisconsin athletic director, does he prefer to be called Elroy or "Crazylegs"?

He answered that question easily for a reporter at a press conference when accepting the job: "Any name is better than Elroy."

Hirsch's play as a 19-year-old sophomore on Wisconsin's 1942 football team carried the Badgers to the brink of the national championship

that season. Only a 6-0 defeat by Iowa at Iowa City deprived the Badgers of Big Ten and national championships. The Wausau native rushed for 766 yards on 141 carries — his best was 174 yards on 22 attempts vs. Missouri — and his overall contribution added 226 yards passing, 390 yards on receptions and runbacks of punts, kickoffs, and interceptions plus eight touchdowns, five by rushing and three by passing.

His play on Michigan's 1943 football team helped the Wolverines to a 6-0 conference record and a share of the Big Ten title with Purdue. The team's only loss was to Notre Dame and again the team he played for was ranked No. 3 in the final Associated Press poll behind Notre Dame and Iowa Seahawks.

Hirsch signed with the Chicago Rockets of the All-America Conference after the war, but the three years he spent carrying the ball for the Rockets — 1946-48 — were not happy ones. **Hirsch** suffered a fractured skull, a back injury, a badly torn right leg ligament, and enough other aches and sprains to keep him immobilized on the bench or in the hospital for the major portion of his three years with Chicago.

Hirsch broke with the Rockets in the summer of 1949 and signed with the Los Angeles Rams. Because of his injury-weakened right knee, **Clark Shaughnessy**, then Rams' head coach, put **Hirsch** on a daily running routine, dreamed up a special headguard to protect **Hirsch** from further injury, and switched him to an end position.

It was at end that "Crazylegs" was to attain new heights in his career. The Rams, in transition to the modern passing game, often split him wide as a receiver and finally moved him permanently to end — establishing him as the first flanker.

Hirsch was one of the athletes — like **Otto Graham** and **Sam Huff** and **Gino Marchetti** — who brought special talents to the sport in the 1950's as it changed from two-way players to offensive and defensive specialists under free substitution.

The flankers have done much to provide glamor for the sport, their lithe bodies racing rapidly downfield to haul in a pass, and **Hirsch**'s talents insured his place in that development.

In 1951, **Hirsch** displayed all his talents as he put together one of the finest seasons in National Football League history. He gained 1,495 yards on receptions, an all-time record approached only by **Bobby Mitchell** of the Washington Redskins (1,436 yards in 1963) and **Hirsch** had only twelve games to set the record, not 14, like **Mitchell**!

That same season **Hirsch** caught 17 touchdown passes to tie the league record set by **Don Hutson** of the Packers in 1942. He also caught at least one touchdown pass through 11 consecutive games over the 1950 and 1951 seasons.

Hirsch grabbed 343 passes for 6,299 yards and 53 touchdowns during his career with the Rams.

He retired in 1957. He was named into the Wisconsin Hall of Fame in 1965 and to professional football's Hall of Fame at Canton, Ohio in 1968.

More recently, he was honored by being named to the all-1950's team commemorating the National Football League's 50th anniversary season and subsequently, to the all-time All-Star NFL team as selected by designated voters in cities holding NFL franchises.

"Crazylegs" also proved himself a talented actor — he made three movies: Zero Hour, Unchained, and the famed Crazy Legs, released in 1953, in which **Hirsch** played himself.

Hirsch joined the Union Oil Company in 1957 as director of sports and special events. He left Union Oil to accept the position of general manager of the Los Angeles Rams in 1960. When the club was sold to **Daniel F. Reeves** in 1963, **Hirsch** became his assistant.

As general manager, **Hirsch** was responsible for budget, negotiation of all contracts with players and coaches, supervision of the scouting system and college draft, and all other club business.

Elroy was married to the former Ruth Stahmer on June 27, 1946. The couple has two children — Win Stephen, 21, and Patricia Carolina, 13.

WISCONSIN VARSITY BASKETBALL STAFF



JOHN POWLESS HEAD COACH

Wisconsin's eighth basketball coach **John Dale Powless** is a native of Flora, Illinois, where he excelled as a prep athlete in football, basketball and tennis.

The 39-year-old Powless played collegiate basketball and tennis at Murray (Ky.) State University and ranks as one of the school's all-time greats in both sports. He was one of five charter members in the school's athletic Hall of Fame which was originated in 1967.

He was a four year regular in basketball and in three years of varsity tennis never lost a tennis match and reigned as Ohio Valley conference singles champion for three straight seasons. He also had a share of the conference doubles title in the sport during the same three years.


John was a standout 6-5 forward as a basketball player and led Murray State to the 1955 Kentucky Invitational title in a meet hosted by Louisville — later the NIT champion the same season. He missed playing in the 1956 NCAA meet when the Thoroughbreds lost the final game of the conference season and had to settle for second place behind Morehead State. His college coach was **Rex Alexander**.

His basketball career was cut short in his senior year when he suffered a broken neck in a game against West Texas State at Murray.

over Air Force Academy in the 1960-61 season.

His prep coaching career totalled 96 victories against 45 defeats for seven years. He coached three years at Pittsville High School with one Marawood Conference championship team before moving to Rhinelander in 1965 where he won two Wisconsin River Valley conference titles in four years.

Dave guided the Wisconsin freshman teams to 9-3 and 11-1 records during the past two seasons and he moves up to the varsity staff this year replacing Dave Brown who has joined the staff of the Dallas Chaparrals of the ABA.

He is the son of August VanderMeulen, principal of Madison's LaFollette High School.

TED VOIGT FRESHMAN COACH

Freshman Coach **Ted Voigt** begins his first season on the Badger staff this year. Named in July to the position, he replaces Dave VanderMeulen who was promoted to assistant varsity coach when Dave Brown left that position to become director of player personnel for the Texas Chaparrals of the American Basketball Association.

Ted prepped at Wauwatosa East High School and was a member of the talented outfit that captured the consolation title of the 1965 state public high school basketball tournament.

Ted earned three varsity letters at Wisconsin, two under John Erickson and the third under John Powless. Although he was never a regular, Ted started many games, played in 49, and scored 177 points as a 6'8" forward-center swing man.

Ted tallied a final-second basket that enabled the Badgers to defeat Michigan 80-79 at Detroit's Cobo Hall on March 4, 1967, as a sophomore.

BADGER BASKETBALL OUTLOOK FOR 1971-72

After a frustrating season in 1970-71 and without **Clarence Sherrod** or a proven big man in 1971-72, head basketball coach **John Powless** faces a difficult task in preparing for his fourth season as the Badger mentor.

However, more depth, more balance, and more quickness make **Powless** optimistic about his 1971-72 team. "This is the first total group—top to bottom—we've had here," he said. "I'm very optimistic and have great confidence that this group of players can get the job done and the players believe in themselves."

Eight lettermen, including four of the top scorers and rebounders from last year's team, and a group of highly touted sophomores give **Powless** an unusual number of talented players from which to mold a first division Big Ten team for the first time since 1968 at Wisconsin.

Last Year's Frustration

Last year the Badgers tied with Iowa and Michigan State for seventh place in the Big Ten with a 4-10 record. "We came so close to having a good season," **Powless** recalls, "but that doesn't show in the won-lost record."

The Badgers in compiling a 9-15 record over-all lost eight games by six points or less, including five in conference play. Especially heartbreaking was the 90-89 loss to Michigan in the Badgers' conference opener, decided on a last-second goal-tending call against Wisconsin.

Sherrod Gone

Departed via graduation is guard **Clarence Sherrod**; and this is sure to mean changes for the Badgers this year, especially in regard to balance.

The Milwaukee (Lincoln) product spent the last three seasons rewriting the school record book. He became the school's highest Big Ten and over-all single season and career scorer.

The Badgers came to rely on **Sherrod** in all facets of the game. He was an excellent press-breaker and the floor leader. He handled much of the rebounding duties, becoming the highest rebounding guard in Badger history. So filling **Sherrod's** shoes will not be an easy job or one that is to be done by one man.

Certain to take on much of the responsibility is Captain **Bob Frasor**, a 6-3 senior from Blue Island, Ill., who prepped at Chicago's Mount Carmel high school. Noted for his tenacious defense, **Bob** in the past has been reluctant to

shoot and **Powless** expects more scoring this year from **Frasor**, who is a fine shot but averaged only 6.8 last year.

The other guard spot is up for grabs with two exciting sophomore candidates battling three lettermen.

Gary Anderson, a 6-4 All-Stater from Madison (LaFollette), could take up much of the back court rebounding and scoring slack caused by **Sherrod's** departure. He averaged 23.3 points to lead the freshman team in scoring last year and tied for second in rebounding with an 11.8 average.

Lamont Weaver, a 6-1 Beloit (Memorial) product, played in an outside league last year because he was not eligible for freshman competition. Consequently, **Powless** fears **Weaver** may start slowly this season before he regains the form that performed the heroics that won the 1969 Wisconsin state high school title for Beloit.

Rod Uphoff, 5-10 of Madison (Edgewood), **Dave Baumgarten**, 6-0, Evansville, and **Pat Cannon**, 5-10 of Brookfield (Milwaukee Marquette), provide the competition for the guard spot and the unusual depth in the back court.

The Search For A Big Man

Like last year, **Powless** is without a proven big man at the important center spot. A year ago, senior **Glen Richgels** stepped in and performed well enough to be named Wisconsin's Most Valuable Player, leading the Badgers in rebounding and ranking third in scoring.

This year the search may start and end with **Kim Hughes**, a 6-11 sophomore from Freeport, Ill., who led last year's freshmen in rebounding with a 16.3 average and ranked second in scoring with an 18.0 average.

Twin brother **Kerry Hughes**, also 6-11, will battle for the starting center post and lend support at forward with his fine shooting. And backing up these young giants—typical of the Badgers' depth this season—will be a letterman, 6-7 junior **Pat Rohan** from Madison (West).

Strength At Forward

The Badgers' forte this season should be at forward where last year's starters and a starter two years ago return.

Leon Howard, a very quick 6-5 junior jumping jack from New York (DeWitt Clinton), ranked second to **Sherrod** in scoring last year with a 14.8 average and he was third on the team in rebounding.

Gary Watson, a 6-7 junior from New York (LaSalle Academy), who is more rugged and strong than **Howard** though not quite the shooter, was fourth in scoring with a 12.0 average and was second to **Richgels** in rebounding with an 8.3 average.

Lee Oler, a 6-5½ senior from Fox Lake, Ill., was a sophomore starter at forward and is mobile enough to play guard. If he does not crack the starting lineup again, he will give the Badgers the proven depth needed to survive the rugged Big Ten season.

Steve Wilhelm, a 6-6 forward from Fall Creek, should provide additional scoring punch to an already potent front line. The sharp-shooting sophomore averaged 13.7 points a game for the freshmen last year.

Craig Manwaring, a 6-6 senior from Trenton, Ill., could provide additional depth at forward if he can escape the injuries that have hampered him throughout his career.

The Badgers should be an exceptionally fine shooting team this season, especially at the perimeter with good shooting guards and forwards. Last year's team scored more points than any team in Badger history and this team should shoot even better.


With unusual depth which could allow a letterman reserve at every position and which will not require dependence on one man, the Badgers should be improved in 1971-72.

Certainly the new heroics of **Howard**, **Watson**, **Frasor**, **Oler**, and the rest of **Powless'** cagers will brighten up the fieldhouse scene this winter and help Badger fans forget last year's frustration.





His freshman teams at Cincinnati compiled a three year record of 36-9 including a 15-0 record during the 1962-63 season.



WISCONSIN HOCKEY COACH

In the five years that **Bob Johnson** has been head hockey coach at Wisconsin the Badger hockey program has grown beyond anyone's wildest dreams. During Coach Johnson's tenure the Badgers have won over 100 games, never had a losing season, have won twenty or more games for the past four years and led the nation in average attendance the past two years and topped the nation in total attendance this past season.

After three years as an "independent" in college hockey, Johnson's Badgers joined the tough Western Collegiate Hockey Association (WCHA). In their first year in the WCHA, 1969-70, the Badgers surprised the hockey world by finishing fourth (all other first-year teams finished last) and took third place in the NCAA tournament at Lake Placid, N. Y. In the 1970-71 season Wisconsin placed even higher in the final WCHA standings by taking third place. In their first year in the WCHA the Badgers drew 86,465 in 13 home games, an average of 6,651. Last season was even greater as 109,540 fans attended 16 home games, an average of 6,871.

Johnson, 40, is a native of Minneapolis, was an All-Star hockey player at Minneapolis Central High School and captain in his senior year. He also excelled in football and baseball.

He played collegiate hockey at North Dakota in 1950-51, and at the University of Minnesota in 1952-53 and 1953-54. The Gophers won the WCHA title both years Johnson played. He also won letters in football and baseball at Minnesota.

Following Army duty in Korea and a short fling in minor league baseball with the Chicago White Sox organization,

Johnson turned to coaching and began his career at Warroad, Minnesota, High School in 1956. A year later he became head coach at Minneapolis Roosevelt High School where his hockey teams won 51 of 60 conference games in six seasons through 1962-63.

Johnson left Minneapolis in 1963 to serve Colorado College as both hockey and baseball coach for three seasons. His hockey teams posted a combined 29-51-3 record. His baseball teams were highly successful and in both 1964 and 1965 he was named "Coach of the Year" for the NCAA College Division Rocky Mountain District. He also assisted in football and taught in the physical education curriculum with the rank of Assistant Professor.


Johnson received his Bachelor of Science degree from Minnesota in 1954 with a double major in physical education and social studies. He gained his Master's in 1961 and his Ph.D. in 1963 both from Minnesota in physical education. He is currently a full Professor of physical education at Wisconsin.

He is the author of two books, **Coaching High School Hockey** and **Ice Hockey**, the latter published in 1968. His unbounding enthusiasm for the game of hockey and his gregarious personality have helped win fans for Wisconsin hockey from throughout the state.

Bob and his wife, Martha, are the parents of five children.

Bill Rothwell was named assistant Wisconsin hockey coach on May 21, 1971, replacing former assistant Jeff Sauer, who accepted the job of head hockey coach at Colorado College.

An accomplished tennis player, Rothwell played for the First U.S. Army team in 1956 and for the University of New Hampshire tennis team in 1965-68, serving as captain in 1968. He also served as tennis professional at Rye Beach, New Hampshire Country Club from 1964-71 and was assistant tennis coach at Ohio State University during the 1971 season. Rothwell also played baseball for the U.S. Army 82nd Airborne Divisional team in 1957 and 58 and soccer at the University of New Hampshire in 1965-68.

Rothwell received a Bachelor of Science degree in physical Education from the University of New Hampshire in 1968, a Master of Arts degree from Ohio State University in 1969 and a Doctorate degree from Ohio State in 1971.

He was married on June 12, 1971.

Badger Hockey Team Hopes for Another Successful Season

"Hockey this year will be bigger and better," are the enthusiastic words of Head Coach **Bob Johnson** upon looking forward to the 1971-72 season. Improving on last year's third place finish may be difficult, but the Badgers have the manpower to do so.

The 1971-72 squad is an improved one over last season's 20-13-1 team, but it lacks "superstars." The task of replacing defenseman **John Jagger**—Wisconsin's only hockey All-American—will be tough. An equally challenging problem is finding a man to step in for last year's most valuable player and leading scorer, center **Jim Boyd**. In addition, a replacement for "Big Red" **Gary Engberg**, the Badgers' flamboyant goaltender last season, must be found.

The front line will be the Badgers' forte this season as a wealth of starters return. In **Coach Johnson's** words, "We've got size, strength, and scoring power. We're going to have a good scoring team." At left wing, the strongest position on the team, four regulars return, including Co-Captain **Jim Young**, **Tim Dool**, **Phil Uihlein**, and **Stan Hinkley**.

Young, a 5-11, 180, senior from Dafter, Mich., finished third in team scoring last season following an outstanding sophomore season when he finished fourth. He is a good skater and a top all-around player.

Dool, 5-9, 170, is a junior entering his third season of varsity competition. He's a very aggressive player and has become one of the favorites with Wisconsin fans.

Uihlein, 5-11, 190, from Milwaukee, and **Hinkley**, 5-9, 155, from Ponoka, Alberta, both broke into the varsity lineup for the first time last season. **Uihlein**, a senior, played in thirty games gaining valuable experience as did the very aggressive then-freshman **Hinkley** in twenty-six games. In addition, freshman **Don Deprez**, Stony Mountain, Manitoba, and junior **Tom Kuklinski**, Mosinee, will be battling for starting berths.

On the right wing, Wisconsin's leading WCHA goal scorer, **Norm Cherrey**, returns along with another junior, **Jim Johnston**.

Cherrey, 5-17, 170, from Beausejour, Manitoba, has played in every game for Wisconsin the past two years. He is definitely a candidate for WCHA and All-American honors and was drafted in the eighth round by the Vancouver Canucks in the amateur draft in 1971.

Johnston, 5-10, 175, from St. James, Manitoba, was among two freshmen to play every game two years ago, the other being **Cherrey**. He is one of the top skaters on the team and was drafted in the sixth round by the NHL Chicago Blackhawks in the 1971 amateur draft.

Additional returnees battling for a right wing spot are sophomore **Billy Reay, Jr.**, Chicago, Ill., junior **Chris Wright**, Milwaukee, and **Doug Kelso**, Madison. The former and latter have seen limited varsity action and all three have gained much experience with the Badger JV's.

In the key center position **Jim Boyd** must be replaced. However, two fine centers are returning in **Lloyd Bentley** and **Gary Winchester**.

Bentley is a 5-10, 175, junior from Sault Ste. Marie, Ontario. "Max," possessing one of the strongest shots on the team, tied for sixth last season among Badger scorers.

Winchester, 5-10, 165, from Calgary, Alberta, though only a freshman last season, played in every game but one in matching **Bentley's** scoring production at 29. He twice scored hat tricks last year in tallying three goals against Brown and four versus Northeastern.

Also after the center spot are senior **Pat Lannan**, Calgary, Alberta, who can also play right wing; sophomore **Bob Shaughnessy**, Blind River, Ontario, the top junior varsity scorer last season; **Tom Chuckel**, a senior from Eagle River, who is a hard worker but has seen limited action; and **Dean Talafo**, a freshman All-Stater from Hastings, Minn., with outstanding credentials. **Talafo**, by all indications, may be well be a starter this season.

The goaltending position is up for grabs, with the only veterans returning being sophomores **Jim Makey** and **Doug Spitzig**, each of whom saw limited varsity action last year.

Makey, 6-0, 175, from Dunville, Ontario, started last year's campaign as the Badgers' number one goalie but missed several games after an injury at Notre Dame and then alternated with **Gary Engberg** the remainder of the season.

Spitzig, 5-8, 150, from Saskatoon, Saskatchewan, saw

very limited varsity action last season as he played in only one period, although he did perform well for the Junior Varsity squad.

Two freshmen, **Dick Perkins**, St. Paul Park, Minn., and **Doug McFadden**, from Peterborough, Ontario, will be strong challengers for a starting berth in the net. Madison sophomore **Loren Seagraves**, who saw brief action with the JV's last season, may lend additional depth.

The loss of starting defensemen **John Jagger** and **Dan Gilchrist** poses a problem for the Badgers, but regulars **Jeff Rotsch** and **Brian Erickson** return to form the core of what may turn out to be a very strong defensive unit.

Rotsch, the 6-0, 180, senior co-captain from Minneapolis, Minn., has developed into an outstanding defenseman after winning the most improved player award two years ago. He could be a candidate for WCHA honors this season and was drafted by the NHL St. Louis Blues in the 1970 draft.

Erickson, 6-2, 200, from Calgary, Alberta, came on to be a steady, dependable defenseman and was named the Badgers' most improved player last season, after seeing only limited action his sophomore year.

Al Folk, a 6-0, 185, senior from Des Moines, Iowa, can be utilized at either left wing or defense and saw action in all but three games last year. Sophomore **Dave Arundel**, 6-1, 190, from Minneapolis, Minn., was the Junior Varsity's top defenseman last season. Both seem likely to move into regular berths.

In addition, two outstanding freshmen, **Tom Machowski**, from Chicago, Ill., and **Bob Lunde**, from Minneapolis, Minn., will be sure to see a lot of action. Add to them junior **Ernie Blackburn**, Bemidji, Minn., who saw extensive Junior Varsity action last year, and the Badgers have the needed depth at this vital position. In **Coach Johnson's** words, "The defense is a question mark, but maybe when it's all over the defense will be better (than last year)."

Johnson's team this year will be bigger and better with a strong scoring punch. It should have the needed depth defensively and in the nets to again place in the tough WCHA's first division and maybe improve on last year's third place finish. It will be an exciting season and again the 100,000 mark in attendance—last year 109,940 people saw the Badgers in action, tops in the nation—will undoubtedly be broken by enthusiastic Badger fans. Hopefully the season will end in Boston at the NCAA finals.

RAYMOND PETE BAUER Head Gymnastics Coach

Pete Bauer is in his first season as Wisconsin's gymnastics coach, succeeding his father George Bauer who stepped down after eleven seasons.

George Bauer ranks as Wisconsin's most successful gymnastics coach, posting a 75-62 dual meet record. The "Golden" years of his tenure were in the 1963, 1964 and 1965 seasons when the Badgers compiled a 31-10 dual meet record.


Pete Bauer lettered in each of those three seasons and is one of the outstanding trampolinists in Badger history.

After his graduation from Wisconsin in 1965, the younger Bauer served with the Air Force for five years, two of which were in Southeast Asia. 


JACK PETTINGER Head Swimming Coach

Jack Pettinger was appointed the Wisconsin head swimming coach in 1969. In his first season he guided the Badger tankmen to an 8-4 season and a fifth place finish in the Big Ten Championships. Last year the Badgers posted a 7-5 record under Pettinger with a sixth place finish in the Big Ten Championships and a 16th place finish in the NCAA Meet.

Coch Pettinger is a graduate of the University of Michigan where he was a member of the Wolverines' 1959 and 1961 NCAA championship teams in the butterfly and distance freestyle events. He graduated with an A.B. degree in history and since has received an M.S. degree in physical education from Indiana.

Before coming to Wisconsin Pettinger served as an assistant coach under the renowned James "Doc" Counsilman at Indiana which has won 11 straight Big Ten championships and four straight NCAA crowns. While at Indiana Pettinger also participated in much study and research on the mechanics, physiology, and psychology of competitive swimming.

Pettinger and his wife Jane are the parents of three sons and a daughter.

JERRY DARDA Diving Coach


Jerry Darda came to Wisconsin in 1964 as diving coach on head coach John Hickman's swimming staff.

The 32-year-old Chicago native graduated from Purdue in 1960 with a degree in metallurgical engineering. Following a year in industry, he earned his master's degree in physical education while teaching at Niles North High School and Evanston High School in Illinois.

Before coming to Wisconsin Darda worked on a volunteer basis at his former high school, Fenwick of Oak Park, Illinois, where he developed Ken Stitzberger, the 1964 Olympic diving champion.

At Wisconsin Darda has developed several outstanding divers, including Julian Krug, Steve McCoy, Donald Dunderfield, and Dave Bush. In last year's NCAA meet all of Wisconsin's 23 points for 16th place came from the diving events.

In August of 1970, Darda was selected by the American Diving Coaches Association to coach the United States' divers at the World Student Games in Milan, Italy.

Junior **Greg Johnson** placed fourth in long jump at 25' 1 1/4" and freshman **Patrick Onyango** placed fifth in the triple jump at 51' 1 1/2".

WISCONSIN TRACK STAFF

WILLIAM PERRIN Head Track Coach

Bill Perrin is beginning his first season as the Wisconsin head track coach after serving for two years as an assistant to Bob Brennan who succeeded Charles "Rut" Walter in 1969 in building Wisconsin to a national track power.

The 39-year-old native of Wood River, Ill., served for seven years as assistant track coach at Indiana before coming to Wisconsin. He worked with the Hoosier field event men, and his athletes set school records in five of the six field events during his stay there.

The new Badger mentor is a 1956 graduate of Missouri Valley College in Marshall, Mo., where he starred in football as a single wing tailback and in track as a pole vaulter while earning a bachelor's degree in education.

Following graduation he served for two years in the U.S. Army, beginning his coaching career as head of the Camp Yokohama track and field team while serving in Japan in 1957.

Perrin returned to college to obtain his master's degree in 1959 from Northeast Missouri State Teachers College; and as a graduate assistant there, he served as field events coach for the school.

Coach Perrin then moved to Alton, Ill., where he coached cross country and track. In three years there his teams finished second, fourth, and third in the state high school track meets.

In only two years at Wisconsin, Perrin has coached nine Big Ten champions in the field events, including Big Ten indoor and outdoor record-holders Patrick Onyango in the triple jump and Pat Matzdorf — who is also the record-holder — in the high jump.

Perrin is well-known among the track and field world, especially for his published writings on training devices and for his invention of a trainer which is in wide use by pole vaulters who favor the fiberglass pole.

He is married and the father of four children.

DANIEL R. MCCLIMON Head Cross Country Coach Assistant Track Coach


Dan McClimon was named to the Wisconsin coaching staff this summer to assist head coach Bill Perrin in track and to serve as head cross country coach.





DUANE KLEVEN Head Wrestling Coach

Duane Kleven became Wisconsin head wrestling coach in 1970, and in his first season he guided the Badgers to a 13-4 record, tying the school record for most wins in a single season.

The 31-year-old Stoughton native was an outstanding high school wrestler, and he was a member of varsity wrestling teams at Wisconsin where he received his bachelor's degree in physical education in 1961 and master's degree in physical education in 1963.


After a year of coaching at Madison's Wisconsin High School, military service followed for Kleven; but he still found time for coaching baseball and football while serving with the First Cavalry Division in Korea in 1963.

He resumed his wrestling coaching career at Racine Park High School in 1964, and in five years there, his teams compiled a 39-5-2 dual meet record and captured two state titles. In those five years, five individual performers won state titles under his guidance.

Kleven joined the college coaching ranks in 1969 at Wisconsin State University-Oshkosh, and the Titan wrestlers had their finest season ever in the one season he was coach: a 10-7 dual meet record, a second place finish in the state collegiate meet, a third place finish in the Wisconsin State University meet, and a 13th place finish in the NAIA national meet.

During the course of his career, Kleven has been a featured speaker and instructor on wrestling clinic staffs throughout the state, including the Badger Wrestling Clinic in Madison and his own "Titan Takedown School" at WSU-Oshkosh.

He is married to the former Mona Jacobson of Stoughton and they are the parents of a daughter and a son.

RUSS HELICKSON

Assistant Wrestling Coach

Russ is a native of Stoughton, Wisconsin, and won the gold medal at the 1971 Pan-American Games in Cali, Colombia, at 198 pounds in freestyle wrestling. He later finished third in the World Games in Sofia, Bulgaria.

Earlier in 1971, Russ won the 220-pound title in the U.S. Greco-Roman championships and was runner-up in the 198-pound classification in the U.S. freestyle competition.

The 23-year-old Hellickson was state prep champion at 180 pounds in 1966 with a 29-0 record and was a member of Wisconsin's football and wrestling teams his first two years in school. He won three major "W" awards in wrestling and was team captain in 1969-70.

His three-year varsity record was 47-10-1 including nineteen pins. He was Wisconsin State Collegiate champion at 191 pounds in both 1968 and 1969 and was named the meet's outstanding wrestler both years.

In Big Ten competition Russ placed second at heavyweight as a junior in 1969 and in 1970 was second at 191 pounds. He reached the quarter-finals of the 1969 and 1970 championship meets before being eliminated.

Russ is married to the former Nancy Crichton of Stoughton.

Tim Drone and **Gary Gutknecht** led Riverdale to a second place finish in the 1971 Wisconsin state high school wrestling meet. **Tim** won the championship at 167 pounds with one of his victories over **Laurent Soucie** who eventually finished third. **Gary** was the 155 pound champ.

Steve Evans was an undefeated Wisconsin state high school champion in both 1970 and 1971, compiling a 60-0 record for those years. **John Skaar**, a Badger letterman last year, was the undefeated Wisconsin state champion in 1968 at 138 pounds.

Jerry Guth has been a Badger letterman in both his freshman and sophomore seasons at heavyweight, but faces stiff competition from three newcomers this year. **Mike Jenkins** won the Wisconsin state high school championship at heavyweight in 1971. He defeated in the first round of that tourney previously unbeaten **Rodney Ploessel**, a 300-pounder from Cassville who will also be after **Guth's** spot this season. Finally, **Mike Webster**, starting center on the Badger football team and third place finisher in the 1970 Wisconsin state high school wrestling meet, will provide even more competition.

Joe Heinzelman, a Badger letterman last season as a freshman, was undefeated in his senior year in high school at Lake Mills until he was forced to default in the semi-finals of the Wisconsin state high school tourney.

Nyal Kessinger has had a career of near misses. In 1969 he placed second in the Wisconsin state meet at 120 pounds with a 29-1 record. In 1970 he placed third in the state at 123 pounds with a 29-1 record. Last year as a Badger freshman he placed second in the Big Ten at 126 pounds.

Rich Lawinger made three trips to the Wisconsin state meet while at Mineral Point high school. In 1968 he lost in the first round of the 133 pound class, finishing with a 23-3-1 record. In 1969 he lost in the quarter-finals of the 138 pound class, finishing at 26-3-1. In 1970 he was the undefeated champ at 145 pounds. Taking up where he left off, **Rich** was the Big Ten consolation champ in his first season as a Badger.

Ed Vatch was an Illinois state high school champion last year, the national junior freestyle champ as well; and he placed third in the world junior freestyle championships in Japan.

Roger Wendorf and **Pete Leiskau** are two-time Badger letter winners and 1971-72 co-captain-elects. **Pete** also served as the Badger captain for the 1970-71 season and was elected Most Valuable Wrestler, Most Dedicated Wrestler, and awarded the George Martin Scholarship for 1971—a tribute to his scholarship, wrestling ability, team loyalty, dedication, and team contribution.





Meyer earned his bachelor's degree in mathematics at Northwestern in 1959 and received his master's degree two years later there combining math with physical education.

While completing work on that degree, Meyer assisted former major league star and then Wildcat coach Freddie Lindstrom during the 1960 and 1961 campaigns. He has since served as a teacher and coach at Evanston Township high school and has continued his study while traveling extensively in Europe.

In 1965 he spent the summer in eleven foreign countries studying and comparing physical education programs. In 1968 his studies included Czechoslovakia, Hungary, and the USSR. In 1969 he compared Scandinavian physical education programs at the University of Oslo's International Summer School, where he was co-recipient of the Jens Eeg Memorial Scholarship Award.



Andrew O'Dea, older brother of the fabled Pat, was Wisconsin's crew coach from 1895-1898 and he rowed as an amateur in Melbourne, Australia, with the famous Yarra Yarra Boat Club.

Wisconsin's first race against collegiate competition was in 1896 when the Badger oarsmen traveled to New Haven, Connecticut, to gain a twelve-length victory over Yale's freshman boat on Lake Saltonstall.

Bennett served as assistant track coach under Riley Best and Charles "Rut" Walter at Wisconsin for 18 years before being named freshman golf coach in 1969 and to the head position a year later.

An all-around athlete at Green Bay West High School where he excelled in football, basketball and track, Bennett enrolled at Wisconsin in 1942 and played freshman football before being called into Army service where he served 34 months with the Corps of Engineers.

He resumed his collegiate career in 1946 and won three major "W" awards in foot-

ball and track. He was a member of Wisconsin's 1949 track team that shared the Big Ten indoor championship with Ohio State and he won two Big Ten indoor and outdoor individual pole vault titles.

Bennett received his bachelor's and master's degrees in physical education from Wisconsin. He is now an instructor in the physical education program at Wisconsin in addition to his coaching duties.





JOHN DESMOND Head Tennis Coach

John Desmond is the 14th head tennis coach at the University of Wisconsin. He was appointed in the summer of 1968 to succeed John Powless, who assumed the head basketball coaching responsibilities. At that time Desmond was only 28 years old—the youngest man ever to be named a Badger head coach for more than an interim period.



Desmond

Desmond is a former tennis player, graduate, and freshman coach at Minnesota. He lettered in tennis three times, was captain of the 1962 squad, and advanced to the semi-finals of the Big Ten Tournament in 1962 where he was defeated by Northwestern's Marty Reissen.

In the summer of 1962 Desmond coached the Junior Davis Cup team, and the following year he coached the Minnesota freshman team. After serving as an assistant tennis professional at the Wayzata Country Club in the summer of 1963, Desmond was drafted into the Army for two years and served in Europe where, in 1964, he teamed to win the All-European Army Doubles championship.

In his three seasons at Wisconsin, Desmond has coached the Badgers to a 38-22 record in dual meets.
