Dear Ada James:

Did I tell you that I had pulled a little spring attached to Mr. Nye? I had a letter to-day, from a man who is very influential in the politics of Northern Wisconsin, telling me that I wrong Mr. Nye in assuming that he will not support the Suffrage Referendum. As a matter of fact, so ran the letter, he supported it last time, and is not only ready to vote for the referendum measure now, but when woman suffrage without the referendum. 

No one was more missed than you at our conference, and my personal regret was very great that we could not have had your help. The Ohio and Indiana contingency was I absent. Perhaps it is cruel to tell you that, notwithstanding our missing you, and the real loss that your absence was, we did have an excellent conference. It was much better attended than the one in Chicago, and there was a better arrangement of subjects, and more valuable results came.

The first day we passed the hat to get enough money to pay the expense for programs and postage, and secured enough to advance cash to the next year's programs. The last day Agnes Ryan asked the various State Organizations to take \$100.00 worth of stock in the Woman's Journal, and she secured pledges for \$1200.00 in a short time, the South leading the way. This will greatly rejoice Alice Blackwell's heart. Agnes says that the economy they are enforcing has cut down their deficit to \$120.00 per month, and that by the new scheme she has pushed she expects to be even able to do what one woman in the Conference wanted done, and that was to pay dividends. I assured them, however, that the only dividends they would get would be the rewards of good conscience, and that they must understand that they were making donations when they took stock.

The St.Louis women did themselves proud. They had the most elegant homes in the City, near at hand, open to the delegates, and were constant in their effort to make the meeting a success. Our beloved National President sent us her greetings, so that you see we are rising in popular estimation. I, myself, moved that the recipient of the telegram, Mrs. Gelhorn, of St.Louis, thank her and wish her success in Michigan.

The Program Committee for next year is this Mrs. Gelhorn, Petty Jacobs, the President of Alabama, who gave the most splendid Secretary's Reports, and our own little Harriet Grimm. We are working in the young bloods, you see. The two older women, however, insisted that Harriet Grimm must be chairman, and everything

Dear Better Half:

The conference at St. Louis was very n pleasing and helpful in every way. There was nothing particularly startling about it, but a large number of good practical talks were given, some of which will, I am sure, be helpful to us. On the whole, I think the character of the addresses and discussions was of a more practical, definite. nature than last year, showing the advance that the various states have made. Wisconsin did not show up so well as at Chicago for the good reason that some of our best and finest were not there. However, Mrs. Gudden, Mrs. McCreary, Dr. Cook, and Miss Heide all made good sensible talks. Mrs. Gudden attracted a great deal of attention and Mrs. McCreary e fluency and alertness won for her plenty of friends and admiration. One of the propositions which most interested me was discussed by Miss Clay of Kentucky and warmly supported by Mrs. Trout of Illinois. It was to the effect that nondue naying societies are better for suffrage work than those which have dues; the idea being that you get a larger membership in that way and also get more money, because, on the whole, people give more if asked in a more general way than if simply solicited for a little fifty cent or one dollar due. This is something that we must take up at the board meeting. I am anxious to have the meeting called and will attend to it just as soon as the bill is disposed of . I have a dressmaker engaged for the last two weeks of April, but if the bill is disposed of, I think we must have a board meeting soon. I have a bundle of material from the general association, some of which, I am going to inclose to you. Am I exofficio a member of the executive committee of the National Association, and who are the other members? A blank has been sent me similar to the one I am inclosing you for a vote.

I am going to Milwaukee to speak to the Milwaukee branch on the 19. I think the branch is to be reorganized. Am having no luck at all with the finance committee: I have just one name enrolled, Mrs. Ben Hopper, of Washington, a very good member. Three or four women to whom I have written have have not yet answered my letter. I have written to Miss Bain asking her to suggest a Kenosha member and I am going to do the same with the Milwaukee women.

Mrs. Bass had nothing to say about the Progressive party, but she asked me if it were really so hat the Progressives were opposing the measure. I shall be so glad for your sake as well as for many other reasons when the legislative end of it is finally disposed of.

Dear friend;For it is thus the Suffragists of the nation as well as the children of the nation regard you.

During our recent campaign we appealed to you several times as doubtless you remember.

Because of the organized opposition of the Brewers and the Retail Liquor Dealers we lost our campaign for equal suffragwe but we are asking our legislature to again submit the question in 1914. We have reached a critical stage in the legislature. The bill has passed the Senate and will come to a vote in the Assembly early next week. We counted on the LaFollette Republicans, the Progressives and the Sociali and very much to our surprise the Progressives are not all standing by us.

Mr. Mahon, chairman of the committee on elections, reported unfavorably on the suffrage bill although he supported it two years ago, Mr. Mahon is a progressive and the Governors spokesman in the Assembly, when it was found that two other Progressives in the Assembly had also withdrawn their support, the bill was held up and telegrams were sent Colonel Roosevelt and the National Progressive headquarters (see enclosed clipping)

What part have the Denver women plaid in your political car career?

What part can they be counted upon to play in politics?



I assure you I will cherish them with the ut ost care and would return them to you this minute if it were not that we have two most important things to do within the next week, for which they are much needed, and I am sure you will be willing to let us hold on to them a bit longer.

First, we are preparing a very careful and thorough pamphlet on the relation between the liquor business and suffrage and we need exact quotations from "Progress" in order to do it.

Then we have been asked by the National Brewers Association for a conference between their officers and our officers and it will probably come off the last of next week. They have written to Dr. Shaw absolutely denying that the brewing interests have opposed woman suffrage and taking her to task for stating publicly that the reverse was true. We need to have these copies on hand at that interview. We have also sent to Montana for the terribly incriminating magazine "The Forum" and hope to have it arrive in time. We are all very sorry that Dr. Shaw is not here herself but we shall have several representative people at the interview and it will be carefully reported. There have been some rather astonishing advances from the brewers recently to the Men's League and the whole situation looks very exciting, to say the least.

Please do not say a word to anybody about this coming interview. We want to keep it entirely quiet until after it is over, for obvious reasons.

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

The Headquarters of the Woman Suffrage Party of Brooklyn occupy the entire second floor of NO. 27 Lafayette Avenue, which is a three-story building directly opposite the Academy of Music. The first floor is occupied by a piano firm, the third by a caretaker. There is no saloon on Lafayette Avenue within two blocks of the Headquarters in either direction.

The Chairman of thre Woman suffrage Party of Brooklyn is Mrs. H. Edward Dreier, sister- in- law- of Mrs. Raymond Robbins, President of the Nat. Trade Union League. Mr. Dreier is a member of the New York Bar.

There is no suffrage meeting place over a saloon in , or in a saloon in Brooklyn, and none of our of icials are connected with the liquor business.

We cannot understand how the factions opposed to woman suffrage can obtain the slightest credit for their wild rumors after having been caught in such deliberate falsehoods.

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To the Editor:

"Why should Wisconsin of all states vote almost two to one against equal suffrage" Your editorial on Woman Suffrage from which this statement in quoted calls for an explanation.

While Wisconsin has been freed from political domination of the railroads and the insurance comapnies, the Brewing interests control the State government to as great an extent as other special interests ever did.

In the manufacture of fermented liquors, Wisconsin ranks third in the United States. The Malt Liquor industry of Wisconsin are capitalized at 85,894,000. This represents the opposition to the enfranchisement of women in our state.

The suffragists carried on an active campaign for seventeen **years** months, and although they were made to feel the powerful hand of these interests, it was impossible to smoke them out. They knew and we knew the nature of the opposition could be exposed to the best element of the state, they would rally to our support.

The following is a symposium of the suffrage fight as carried on between the liquor interests of the state and the women. In the legislature, when the bill seemed about to pass, the La Crosse Brewers sent letters to the members urging them to vote against the bill, for women if enfranchised might neglect the home. (Since when have the the liquor dealers the best interests of the home at heart?)

The bill passed. Then it was found that many newspapers in the state misrepresented the suffrage movement willfully. In some instances this was at first incomprehensible inasmuch as the owners, editors and stockholders were known to be in sympathy. In reply to mux insistent inquiries, the women were told that it was the policy of the paper to oppose their enfranchisement. But who controls the policies of the papers if not the owners? The answer is to be found in the great advertisements of the Schlitz Brewing Company, Pabst Blue Libbon etc.

Anonymous literature was circulated in violation of the corrupt practises act toward the end of the campaign, literature that was branded by Judge Lindsey in Milwaukee as as "yard of infamous lies". At much expense this literature was traced to its source by the women, and it was found that it had been paid for by Mr. Wm. Austin, the famous brewery lobbyist, and was circulated by an officer of the German American Alliance. Just previous to election, the saloons were placarded and woman suffrage was fought over the counters.

Why did suffragists lend themselves to this fantastic makebelieve? Could they foresee the tragic significance to their cause of a prematurely celebrated victory--its effect upon the enemies ever manoeuvering to keep women out of the fall elections?

The primaries are now past and women did not participate in them. Are they to be denied a voice in the approaching elections? The celebrants of the Great Victory must answer.

But the Victory Convention was not to halt its fateful progress with this one devastating blunder. It was to add yet another blunder, the last more tragic than the first. Again it lent itself admirably to the plans of the enemy by taking steps toward its own dissolution. It relegated its principal object-for-being to a board, and proceeded to change its purpose, its constitution and even its name.

And the name it assumed was the name which is shame for a great national suffrage organization to bear until every woman in the land has the right to bear it honestly. The name is "The League of Women Voters". A state, so it seems, has only to ratify, whereupon the women of that state may dissolve the suffrage organization and turn their energies into a program of general reform, regardless of whether they are voters or not, or whether other women in the states which have not ratified are thus abandoned.

Such little things tell the tale: As I stood in the picket line at the Chicago Convention, woman after woman came up to me to ask me to wear a Wood feather, or a Johnson or Lowden button.

When I told them I could not vote, and therefore could not properly support a candidate, some smiled pityingly upon me and said, "Oh, that's too bad. You know we can vote in my state," and went away and left me alone on the sidewalk.

To others who walked up carrying Hoover half-sandwich signs, I asked "Why do you not help all women, instead of just one man? Won't you carry a banner for women?" And they shook their heads and also left me alone with my banner.

What strange and tangled web is this one in which we are caught? Is there no escape from it? Must we be deemed to remain in it as long as the lords of politics decide to keep us there? Shall the great issues in which our very life's blood are involved, be settled for us in the 1920 elections, and our voices be silent?

I cannot believe that women will allow this. They will free themselves and they will rally, and as they advance in phalanx on phalanx, well may the political party who blocks their way, tremble and quake! The picket line of hundreds will grow to thousands until party dare withstand them!
