Thursday, June 20, 1957, 10 A.M.

President Gelatt presiding

PRESENT: Regents Gelatt, Jensen, Jones, Laird, Renk, Runnebohm, Steiger, Watson, Werner.

ABSENT: Regent Wanvig.

Upon motion of Regent Werner, seconded by Regent Steiger, it was  
VOTED, That the minutes of the regular meeting of the Board held on  
May 11, 1957, be approved as sent out to the Regents.

---

President Gelatt made the following statement:

"The next item of business has to do with the election of officers for the forthcoming year. I want to express myself, first, as being very appreciative of the fine cooperation that I have had from this Board of Regents and from the administration, of course, and also to again second what Regent Werner said on a similar occasion two years ago: 'To be President of this Board is one of the highest honors that a citizen of the State of Wisconsin can be given by his fellow citizens.' I feel also that, having served two years, it is time for someone else to pick up the responsibility and share in the honor of being President of this Board. It takes a considerable amount of time. I must spend more time with my family; and I have personal affairs to which I should devote more time. I again express my appreciation for the work that has been done by all members of this Board. I know that what has been accomplished could not be

done by a board that is not active in all its parts - not just in one or two sections. Nominations, excluding my name, are open for President of this Board."

Regent Steiger nominated Regent Renk for President of the Board for the ensuing year. The nomination was seconded by Regent Werner. Upon motion of Regent Jones, seconded by Regent Rennebohm, it was

VOTED, That the nominations for President be closed and that the Secretary be instructed to cast a unanimous ballot for Mr. Wilbur N. Renk for President for the ensuing year.

President Gelatt declared Regent Renk elected President for the ensuing year.

Regent Jensen nominated Regent Steiger for Vice President of the Board for the ensuing year. The nomination was seconded by Regent Jones. Upon motion of Regent Rennebohm, seconded by Regent Watson, it was

VOTED, That the nominations for Vice President be closed and that the Secretary be instructed to cast a unanimous ballot for Mr. Carl E. Steiger for Vice President for the ensuing year.

President Gelatt declared Regent Steiger elected Vice President for the ensuing year.

Regent Jones nominated Clarke Smith for Secretary for the ensuing year. The nomination was seconded by Regent Laird. Upon motion of Regent Watson, seconded by Regent Werner, it was

VOTED, That the nominations for Secretary be closed and that the President be instructed to cast a unanimous ballot for Mr. Clarke Smith for Secretary for the ensuing year.

President Gelatt declared Mr. Smith elected Secretary for the ensuing year.

Regent Werner nominated Mr. Joseph S. Holt for Assistant Secretary for the ensuing year. The motion was seconded by Regent Rennebohm. Upon motion of Regent Steiger, seconded by Regent Jensen, it was

VOTED, That the nominations for Assistant Secretary be closed and that the Secretary be instructed to cast a unanimous ballot for Mr. Joseph S. Holt for Assistant Secretary for the ensuing year.

President Gelatt declared Mr. Holt elected Assistant Secretary for the ensuing year.

President Fred called the attention of the Regents to the annual report to the Trustees of the Wisconsin Alumni Research Foundation by the Research Committee, copies of which had been distributed to the Regents. He requested Dean Elvehjem to describe the report. Dean Elvehjem briefly described the scope of the report and pointed out the difficult job the Research Committee has in assigning the large amount of funds involved to various research projects. President Fred noted that the Wisconsin Alumni Research Foundation funds had made possible not only outstanding research results, but also the training of many graduate students.

Regent Jones commented on the contributions made to the well being and progress of the University of Wisconsin by the Wisconsin Alumni Research Foundation. He reviewed the organization of the Foundation and the various types of financial aid and other services it had contributed to the University since its organization. In conclusion he stated:

"As a citizen of this state, as one interested in the University, I want the management of Wisconsin Alumni Research Foundation to know that I deeply appreciate the splendid contributions that have been made by that organization. I do not know of one other University in all America, publicly or privately supported, that has had the advantage of an organization that has shown the resourcefulness that this has in doing just one thing and that was to serve the Alma Mater of those men who founded it!"

Vice President Peterson presented the report of the Vice President of Business and Finance.

Upon motion of Regent Jensen, seconded by Regent Rennebohm, it was VOTED, That items I. to VI., inclusive, of the Report of the Vice President of Business and Finance (EXHIBIT B attached) be approved, ratified and confirmed.

The Vice President of Business and Finance presented the report of budget transfers for May, 1957, for the information of the Regents. (See Exhibit C appended to EXHIBIT B attached)

The Secretary reported that a suggestion had been presented for revising the dates and places of the Regent meetings for the coming year and distributed copies of a proposed recommendation. President Gelatt indicated that the suggestion was made to avoid conflict with three two-day meetings of the Coordinating Committee for Higher Education, because it was felt that it would be asking too much of Regents, who were also members of the Coordinating Committee, to attend Regent meetings in months when two-day meetings of the Coordinating Committee were held. The proposed schedule would eliminate three of the Regent meetings. Upon motion of Regent Rennebohm, seconded by Regent Steiger, it was

President Gelatt presented the report of the Executive Committee.

Upon motion of Regent Watson, seconded by Regent Renk, it was  
VOTED, That the following action of the Executive Committee be confirmed:

RESOLVED: That the Plat of First Addition to Midvale Terrace  
certified to by Andrew Dahlen on May 17, 1957, is hereby ap-  
proved.

Further, that the Declaration of Covenants, Restrictions and  
Easements hereto annexed and filed with the minutes (EXHIBIT D)  
is approved.

Further, that the President or Vice President and Secretary  
shall execute the owner's certificate on the said plat and  
shall execute the said Declaration on behalf of the Regents as  
owners and thereafter cause the same to be recorded.

VOTED, That the following action of the Executive Committee be confirmed:

Regent Laird presented the report of the Educational Committee.

Upon motion of Regent Laird, seconded by Regent Renk, it was  
VOTED, That, upon recommendation of the University faculty, the opening  
and closing dates of the University be advanced one week beginning with the academic  
year 1958-59, at which time the dates will be the same at both Madison and Milwaukee.

Upon motion of Regent Laird, seconded by Regent Jensen, it was  
VOTED, That, upon recommendation of the University Faculty, the require-  
ments in physical education and military science be the same for both the University  
at Madison and the University of Wisconsin - Milwaukee as presented on page 2 of  
Faculty Document 1280 (EXHIBIT F attached).

Upon motion of Regent Laird, seconded by Regent Steiger, it was  
VOTED, That, subject to the approval of the Attorney General, the Vice  
President of Business and Finance be authorized to sign an agreement with other in-  
stitutions of higher education including, but not by way of limitation, Indiana  
University, University of California, Ohio State University, Harvard University,  
Princeton University, University of Chicago, and the University of Michigan, provid-  
ing for participation by the University of Wisconsin in a non-profit corporation for  
the purpose of establishing, equipping, and operating an observatory for astronomi-  
cal and related scientific research to be known as "Association of Universities for  
Research in Astronomy, Inc.", with the understanding that the cost to the University  
of Wisconsin will not exceed \$12,500, chargeable to gift funds, payable over a 5-year  
period.

Upon motion of Regent Laird, seconded by Regent Renk, it was  
VOTED, That the Vice President of Business and Finance be authorized to  
sign a cooperative agreement with Mekoosa-Edwards Paper Company, Port Edwards, Wis-  
consin, for cooperative forestry research. The agreement is for a period of twelve  
years from June 20, 1957, subject to cancellation by either party on two years'  
notice.

Upon motion of Regent Laird, seconded by Regent Jones, it was  
 VOTED, That the following appointments by the President of the University

Upon motion of Regent Laird, seconded by Regent Renk, it was  
 VOTED, That the following recommendations of the Educational Committee be  
 adopted:

1. That the bequest by the late Susan Swarthout, of La Crosse County, Wisconsin, to the University of Wisconsin Medical School, for the establishment of the "Susan Swarthout Educational Fund", be accepted in accordance with the Last Will and Testament of Susan Swarthout, Deceased; and that the Secretary be authorized to accept and sign receipts for this bequest in the name of The Regents of The University of Wisconsin, and do all things necessary to effect the transfer of this bequest to the University of Wisconsin.
2. That the bequest by the late Henry C. Moeller, of Baraboo, Wisconsin, given in memory of Henry C. and Corwin G. Moeller, to the Cancer Research Department of The University of Wisconsin, be accepted by The Regents of The University of Wisconsin in accordance with the terms and conditions of the Last Will and Testament of Henry C. Moeller, Deceased; and that the Secretary be authorized to accept and sign receipts for this bequest in the name of The Regents of The University of Wisconsin, and do all things necessary to effect the transfer of this bequest to the University of Wisconsin.

3. That the bequest by the late Herman V. Niss, of Milwaukee, Wisconsin, for heart research in the University of Wisconsin Medical School, be accepted by The Regents of The University of Wisconsin in accordance with the terms and conditions of the Last Will and Testament of Herman V. Niss, Deceased; and that the Secretary be authorized to accept and sign receipts for this bequest in the name of The Regents of The University of Wisconsin, and do all things necessary to effect the transfer of this bequest to the University of Wisconsin.

Upon motion of Regent Laird, seconded by Regent Jensen, it was VOTED, That, in order to provide additional space for the School of Music, the second and third floors of the building at 823 University Avenue be leased from the University of Wisconsin Foundation on a year to year basis beginning July 1, 1957, at an annual rental of \$4,245 (to be prorated the first year on the basis of space made available), with the Foundation paying for heat, hot and cold water, and sewerage charges, and the University paying for other utilities and interior remodelling.

Upon motion of Regent Laird, seconded by Regent Renk, it was VOTED, That Charles A. Wedemeyer, Director of Correspondence Study and Recorder University Extension Division, be appointed University representative on the State Radio Council.

Upon motion of Regent Laird, seconded by Regent Renk, it was VOTED, That the following recommendations of the Educational Committee be adopted:

1. That Philip C. Rosenthal, Professor of Mining and Metallurgy, be granted leave of absence, without pay, from July 1 through August 31, 1957.
2. That Burr W. Phillips, Professor of Education, be granted leave of absence, with pay on the summer session basis, for the period September 1, 1957 to September 1, 1958; salary \$4,530 charged to instruction 1957-58 budget, and \$5,280 charged to Summer Session Trust Fund.
3. That Otto A. Mortensen, Associate Dean of the Medical School and Professor of Anatomy, be granted leave of absence, without pay, from August 1, 1957 through July 30, 1958.

4. That G. Lawrence Rarick, Professor of Physical Education (Men) (Women), be granted leave of absence, without pay, from November 18 to December 28, 1957, and from January 6 to February 8, 1958.
5. That Lorentz H. Adolfson, Director (Faculty) of the Extension Division and Summer Sessions, be granted leave of absence, without pay, from August 1, 1957 to June 30, 1958.
6. That Raymond J. Stanley, Associate Professor, Radio-Television Education, be granted leave of absence, without pay, from August 1, 1957 to July 31, 1958.

Upon motion of Regent Laird, seconded by Regent Watson, it was VOTED, That the following recommendations of the Educational Committee be adopted:

1. That Selig Perlman be appointed John R. Commons Professor of Economics; and that he be placed on part-time research and part-time teaching basis for the academic year 1957-58; salary as provided in the 1957-58 budget.
2. That Gilbert H. Doane be appointed University Archivist, beginning July 1, 1957; that he be employed on a research assignment for the summer of 1957 at a salary of \$1,679; that his appointment as University Archivist be on the academic year basis, beginning with the 1957-58 academic year; salary as provided in the 1957-58 budget.
3. That Louis Kaplan be appointed Chief Librarian of the Memorial Library and Director of University Libraries, beginning July 1, 1957; salary as provided in the 1957-58 budget.
4. That Robert P. Lee be appointed Director (Faculty) of the Wisconsin Center Building, beginning July 1, 1957; salary \$8,500 per annum, twelve months' basis; provided in the 1957-58 budget.
5. That Henry J. Duwe, Business Manager and Instructor (Faculty), Extension Division and Summer Session, be appointed Acting Director and Business Manager (Faculty), Extension Division and Summer Session, July 1, 1957 to June 30, 1958; salary as indicated in the 1957-58 budget.
6. That William R. Butler be appointed Dean of Men, University of Wisconsin - Milwaukee (Assistant Professor), beginning with the academic year 1957-58; salary \$6,500 for the academic year, as provided in the 1957-58 budget.
7. That Carl R. Rogers be appointed Professor of Psychology and Psychiatry, beginning with the academic year 1957-58; salary \$14,500 for the academic year; charge to Brittingham Funds, 47-2411.

8. That Roland K. Meyer be appointed William S. Marshall Professor of Zoology, beginning with the academic year 1957-58, for a five-year period; salary as provided in the 1957-58 budget.
9. That Margaret H'Doubler Claxton, Emeritus Professor, Physical Education - Women, be employed as Visiting Consultant in Dance on a special service contract for a two-week period during Semester I and a two-week period during Semester II of the 1957-58 academic year; salary \$1,000 for the service; charge to Instruction (S&W), 1957-58 budget.
10. That F. H. Elwell, Dean Emeritus, School of Commerce, be employed on a special service contract on part-time basis for the fiscal year 1957-58, his duties to consist largely of work with the School of Banking and other selected adult programs; at a salary of \$6,000 for the period; provided in the 1957-58 budget.
11. That Hans F. Kirchberger, Emeritus Lecturer, Political Science, Extension Division, be employed on a special service contract to teach in the Extension Centers at Manitowoc and Sheboygan, Wisconsin, on a part-time basis during the 1957-58 academic year; at a salary of \$2,700 for the period; provided in the 1957-58 budget.
12. That M. Starr Nichols, Assistant Director, State Laboratory of Hygiene, be employed on a special service contract on full time basis for the academic year 1957-58; at a salary of \$10,720 for the period; provided in the 1957-58 budget.
13. That Herbert D. Orth, Emeritus Professor of Drawing and Descriptive Geometry, be employed on a special service contract, on a part-time basis, for the first semester of the academic year 1957-58 in the Department of Drawing and Descriptive Geometry; at a salary of \$1,940 for the period; provided in the 1957-58 budget.
14. That Morton O. Withey, Dean Emeritus, College of Engineering, be employed on a special service contract for the fiscal year 1957-58 on a part-time basis in the College of Engineering; at a salary of \$5,600 for the period; charge to Fund 484-765.

Regent Jones presented the report of the Business and Finance Committee.

Upon motion of Regent Jones, seconded by Regent Werner, it was VOTED, That, upon recommendation of the University Campus Planning Commission, the final plans and specifications for the Addition to Sterling Hall be approved, and that authority be granted to advertise for bids, subject to the requesting of sufficient alternate bids to bring the estimated cost for this project within the funds available.

Upon motion of Regent Jones, seconded by Regent Werner, it was  
VOTED, That, upon recommendation of the University Campus Planning Com-  
mission, authority be granted for employment of an architect to prepare a site  
development and preliminary sketches for new dormitories to house up to 1,000 men  
students and to be located west of Elm Drive in the area assigned for dormitories  
on the Master Plan, it being understood that alternate site plans will be developed  
both on the basis of closing or relocating the road between Elm Drive and Stony  
Point and on leaving the road open, and that the development will be confined to  
the limits of the area allotted to Residence Halls.

Upon motion of Regent Jones, seconded by Regent Rennebohm, it was  
VOTED, That the Executive Committee be authorized to act for the Board in  
the approval of a schedule of costs and in granting authority to Wisconsin Univer-  
sity Building Corporation for the award of contracts for construction and equipment  
of the new Chabourne Hall (Project Wis. 47-CH-15).

Upon motion of Regent Jones, seconded by Regent Steiger, it was  
VOTED, That Wisconsin University Building Corporation be authorized to  
file applications and revised applications on behalf of The Regents of The Univer-  
sity of Wisconsin with the Housing and Home Finance Agency, Office of the Adminis-  
trator, College Housing Program, for loan assistance as indicated below under  
Title IV of the Housing Act of 1950 for the construction at the University of Wis-  
consin of the following student housing facilities;

- a. Third Married Student Apartments consisting of 400 units of student  
family apartments, to be located in the Eagle Heights area, at a  
total estimated cost of \$3,600,000, for which \$1,800,000 loan assist-  
ance is to be requested of Housing and Home Finance Agency, and  
\$1,800,000 is to be borrowed from other sources.
- b. Dormitories East of Tripp consisting of two dormitories for 600 women  
and food service facilities for 800 students at a total estimated cost  
of \$3,000,000, for which \$1,500,000 loan assistance is to be requested  
of Housing and Home Finance Agency, and \$1,500,000 is to be borrowed  
from other sources. (Previously covered by Housing and Home Finance  
Agency Application No. Wis. 47-CH-16.)
- c. Combined project of Dormitories South of Kronshage for 500 men, pres-  
ently covered by Housing and Home Finance Agency application No. Wis-  
47-CH-37(D), consisting of two dormitories and food service building,  
and Dormitories West of Elm Drive, consisting of three buildings for  
housing and feeding 1,000 men at a total estimated cost for the com-  
bined project of \$6,950,000, for which \$3,475,000 loan assistance is  
to be requested of Housing and Home Finance Agency, and \$3,475,000  
is to be borrowed from other sources.

Upon motion of Regent Jones, seconded by Regent Renk, it was VOTED, That the Executive Committee be authorized to act for the Board in the approval of resolutions relating to the lease of land and the sublease of land and improvements for the Married Student Apartments (HHFA Project No. Wis. 47-CH-17(D)).

Regent Jones moved the adoption of the following recommendation of the Business and Finance Committee, and the motion was seconded by Regent Renk:

a. That the following Schedule of Costs be approved for moving and re-erecting the steel barns from the East Hill Farm to the Charmany Farm:

b. That the following contracts be awarded to the low bidders for moving and re-erecting the steel barns and that the Vice President of Business and Finance be authorized to sign the contracts:

Regent Steiger stated that he would have to vote "No" on this recommendation, as he had done in the Committee meeting, because it seemed like too much money to spend for that purpose. Regent Renk indicated that the Business and Finance Committee had closely scrutinized this recommendation because they thought too much money was involved, especially in the item for concrete foundations, and he stated that the Committee had suggested that consideration be given to using concrete blocks for the walls.

The question was put on the above motion and it was voted, with Regent Steiger voting "No".

Upon motion of Regent Jones, seconded by Regent Renk, it was  
VOTED, That the offer of the Madison Board of Park Commissioners to re-  
move the ski slide from Muir Knoll without cost to the University and to erect the  
slide in Hoyt Park where it would be available to University students and the  
general public be accepted; and that in recognition of the gifts by the Class of  
1932 and others toward the cost of the present ski slide on Muir Knoll the Regents  
agree to allocate, subject to the availability of appropriations, up to \$1,000  
toward the cost of a new University ski slide, when and if built, or to apply to  
the cost of other outing facilities or equipment for University students.

Upon motion of Regent Jones, seconded by Regent Renk, it was  
VOTED, That as a safety measure the use of the University swimming pier  
east of the Memorial Union Terrace (old YMCA pier) be limited to persons over  
seventeen years of age and that appropriate signs be posted on the site advising  
the public.

Upon motion of Regent Jones, seconded by Regent Rennebohm, it was  
VOTED, That the Wisconsin 4-H Club Foundation, in accordance with its  
offer to construct and make available to the University certain facilities at Camp  
Upham Woods, be authorized to construct a service building and a cabin on the Camp  
Upham Woods property in accordance with plans and specifications approved by the  
College of Agriculture and the Department of Physical Plant Planning, with certain  
materials and equipment for these projects to be purchased by the University from  
gift funds given for such purposes.

Upon motion of Regent Jones, seconded by Regent Werner, it was  
VOTED, That, upon the recommendation of the College of Agriculture, the  
Vice President of Business and Finance be authorized to sign an agreement with  
Gerald Grosse, Madison, Wisconsin, for the daily delivery of dairy products from the  
Department of Dairy and Food Industries to other campus departments and to public  
carriers during the period July 1, 1957 to June 30, 1958, for which services the  
University is to reimburse Mr. Grosse in accordance with the following schedule of  
payments:

- a. \$615 per month for the months of July, August and September, 1957
- b. \$705 per month October 1957 through June 1958.

Upon motion of Regent Jones, seconded by Regent Werner, it was VOTED, That, upon recommendation of the administration of the University of Wisconsin - Milwaukee, the proposal by Ace Foods, Inc., dated May 6, 1957, to provide food services at both the Kenwood and Downtown campuses of the University of Wisconsin - Milwaukee be accepted, and that the Vice President of Business and Finance be authorized to sign the agreement.

Upon motion of Regent Jones, seconded by Regent Renk, it was VOTED, That the American Express Company, Foreign Traffic Department, 143 Liberty Street, New York 6, New York, be authorized to act as forwarding agent for The Regents of The University of Wisconsin for export control and customs purposes; and that the Secretary be authorized to execute a power of attorney for this purpose.

Upon motion of Regent Jones, seconded by Regent Renk, it was VOTED, That the administrative officers of the University be authorized to conclude arrangements with Dane County in the matter of the University lands needed by the County for widening County Highways M and S, that the Executive Committee be authorized to act for the Board in approving the financial arrangements, and that the President or Vice President and Secretary or Assistant Secretary be authorized to sign the necessary conveyances.

Upon motion of Regent Jones, seconded by Regent Werner, it was VOTED, (a) That the schedule of costs, totalling \$2,100,000, for the construction and equipping of the men's residence and dining halls (EXHIBIT G attached) to be located south of the Kronshage dormitories (Project Wis. 47-CH-37) be approved.

The motion was seconded by Regents Steiger, Laird, Werner and Rennebohm and voted unanimously.

Declaration of Covenants, Restrictions  
and Easements for the Plat of

FIRST ADDITION TO MIDVALE TERRACE

A Subdivision of the City of Madison  
Dane County, Wisconsin

---

The Regents of The University of Wisconsin, hereinafter referred to as the Regents, owners of the property known as First Addition to Midvale Terrace, a subdivision in the City of Madison, Dane County, Wisconsin, on behalf of themselves, their successors and assigns, for the purpose of preserving the value of the lots in said subdivision, do hereby covenant, grant, declare and provide that all lots in said subdivision shall be used only for the purposes and in the manner set forth herein.

1. Except with respect to Outlot A, no profession or trade nor any noxious or offensive activity shall be carried on upon any lot, nor shall anything be done thereon which may be, or may become, an annoyance or nuisance to the neighborhood.

2. No trailer, basement, tent, shack, barn, garage or outbuilding, or any part thereof erected in said plat shall at any time be used as a residence, temporarily or permanently, nor shall any residence of a temporary character be used as a dwelling.

3. No lot as platted shall be resubdivided without the consent of the architectural control committee; this covenant shall not be construed to prevent the use of more than one lot as a building site subject to the approval of the architectural control committee.

4. The Regents or their successors shall establish by appointment a committee to be known as the architectural control committee. If there shall be a vacancy on the committee the remaining members or member of the committee shall have full authority to act until the vacancy is filled. Action of the committee shall be by a majority vote.

The committee may select an architect registered in the State of Wisconsin as its representative to act with the full authority of the committee.

The architectural control committee shall exercise its powers herein in accordance with the following purposes and standards:

- (a) To assure the most appropriate development and improvement of the First Addition to Midvale Terrace plat.
- (b) To protect each owner of a lot against improper uses by any other owner.
- (c) To preserve so far as practicable the initial beauty of the subdivision.
- (d) To guard against the erection thereon of poorly designed or poorly proportioned structures, or structures built of improper or unsuitable material.

(e) To encourage and secure the erection thereon of attractive, adequate sized homes and other structures, which conform and harmonize in external design with other structures to be built in the subdivision which are properly located upon the lot in accordance with its topography and finished grade elevation.

(f) To provide for high quality improvements which will protect the investments made by purchasers of such lots.

5. Except with respect to Outlot A, no structure shall be erected, moved on, placed or altered upon any land in the subdivision until the architectural control committee or its designee shall in the light of the purposes and standards of this section approve the exterior design and the materials of such structure, and approve a plot plan showing the location of the structure, together with the finished grade level. A copy of such plans and specifications together with a plot plan shall be furnished by the owner for filing with the committee.

No fence, wall or hedge shall be constructed or planted on any lots nearer to the street than the setback line, unless similarly approved.

6. The Regents may elect to surrender the selection of the architectural control committee to any duly organized community association governed by a majority vote of all lot owners, or to the majority vote of said lot owners.

7. Except with respect to Outlot A, all external construction and landscaping for a structure on any building site shall be completed within one year from the date of issuance of city building permits unless delay in completion is due to war, strikes, or act of God.

8. An easement is hereby granted over the rear 5 feet of each lot in said subdivision for the installation, maintenance, and repair of utilities and drainage facilities.

9. These restrictions shall be binding on all persons claiming under them for a period of 25 years from the date this declaration is recorded, after which said restrictions and covenants shall be automatically extended for successive periods of 5 years, unless the owners of a majority of lots in the subdivision prior to the expiration of any term shall by majority vote duly recorded agree to amend or repeal said restriction.

10. These covenants and restrictions run with the land and shall be binding on all persons having an interest in said subdivision until terminated in accordance with paragraph 9.

11. These covenants and restrictions may be enforced by any lot owner by proceedings at law or in equity against any person or persons violating or attempting to violate the same, either to restrain the violation or to recover damages.

12. Invalidation of any one of the covenants or restrictions herein, or any severable part thereof, by judgment or court order shall in no way affect any of the remaining provisions, which shall continue in full force and effect.

13. All lots are further subject to the applicable zoning laws and ordinances of the City of Madison and to the building code of the City of Madison.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON REQUIREMENT AND CREDIT  
FOR PHYSICAL EDUCATION AND CREDIT FOR ROTC IN THE UNIVERSITY OF WISCONSIN

In 1956 President Fred was authorized by faculty action to appoint a committee of five to study and report to the faculty on the question of credit for courses offered by the military departments. The immediate occasion for this study was a letter from Colonel Archibald to the President, a copy of which was included in the agenda of the January 1956 Faculty Meeting. Although Colonel Archibald's request related only to the Air Force ROTC, it was decided that the study should include the three military services.

The committee began its work in March 1956. It reviewed the previous actions of the faculty of the University regarding credit for military science and met with representatives of the Department of Air Science, the Department of Military Science and Tactics and the Department of Naval Science. It was the purpose of the committee to obtain all possible information concerning course content and the qualifications, the training and the methods of appointment of the teaching members of the military departments.

In April and May 1956 your committee corresponded with a subcommittee of the University of Wisconsin--Milwaukee which had been appointed to study there the problem of credit for ROTC and for Required Physical Education. Your committee informed the committee in Milwaukee that it had met with representatives of the three branches of the military departments on the Madison campus but it had not reached any definite conclusions. Up to this time your committee had not been requested to consider the problem of credit for Required Physical Education.

In October 1956 your committee was informed that "At the last meeting of the University Faculty the following motion was approved: That the special committee appointed to study the question of credit for courses offered by the Military Departments at Madison be asked to expand its study to include the question of Physical Education requirements in Madison and Milwaukee, and that the membership of the committee be enlarged to cover the expansion of its assignment."

Your original committee of five members was enlarged to include one additional member from the University Faculty in Madison and three additional members from the University of Wisconsin--Milwaukee. The expanded committee of nine members now added to its previous study of the Military Science departments in Madison a study of the Military Science department in the University of Wisconsin--Milwaukee and the departments of Physical Education for Men and for Women both in Madison and Milwaukee.

After the committee had completed its study and had considered the information it had obtained as well as the suggestions and requests received from the members of the departments involved, it voted unanimously to recommend to the Faculty of the University the following requirements in Military Science and in Physical Education for Men and for Women:
