Badgers Square Off With Michigan in Home Finale

The Wisconsin football team (7-3, 3-3 Big Ten) takes on Michigan (8-2, 6-0) today at 11 a.m. The game will be televised by ESPN. Dave Pasch, Andre Ware and Erin Andrews will handle the commentary.

UW is receiving votes in both the Associated Press poll and the *USA Today/Coaches' Poll*. Michigan is ranked 13th in both polls.

This will be the Badgers' final home game this season. They are coming off a 38-17 loss at No. 1 Ohio State last week. Michigan has won eight consecutive games and came from behind to defeat Michigan State, 28-24, last week.

THE SERIES

This will be the 61st meeting between the two teams with Michigan leading the series 48-11-1 ... the Wolverines lead the series 21-4-1 in Madison ... Michigan has won seven of the last eight meetings with UW but the Badgers won the last time the two teams met at Camp Randall Stadium (23-20, Sept. 24, 2005) ... five of the last six meeting have been decided by seven points or less ... neither team has scored more than 27 points in any of the last eight meetings ... for the 32nd consecutive time, Michigan enters its game against Wisconsin ranked in the Associated Press top 25 ... UW co-defensive coordinator Mike Hankwitz is a Michigan graduate and started his coaching career as a grad assistant under UM's Bo Schembechler

Former Badger Ron Dayne, the 1999 Heisman Trophy winner, will have his number 33 officially retired in a halftime ceremony today.

Key Notes to Consider

◆ Wisconsin's 24-1 record at Camp Randall Stadium since the start of the 2004 season is tied for the best home record in the country in that time span (Boise State is also 24-1). Southern California (20-1) is the only other team in the country with just one home loss in that span.

• • •

This year's senior class has accumulated a 38-10 record in its four years. That ties the UW record for most wins by a senior class in school history.

The Class of 2000 went 38-12 over its career while last year's class went 38-13.

• • •

◆ The Badgers have won 13 straight games at Camp Randall Stadium, the third-longest home winning streak in school history. It is also the fourth-longest current streak in the country. Wisconsin's last home loss came against Iowa on Nov. 12, 2005.

◆ Wisconsin will officially retire former Badger Ron Dayne's number 33 in a halftime ceremony on Saturday. Dayne, the 1999 Heisman Trophy winner, is the all-time leading rusher in Football Bowl Subdivision history with 6,397 career yards (bowl games not included). Dayne will be the sixth former UW football player to have his number retired, joining Elroy Hirsch (#40), Allan Shafer (#83), Dave Schreiner (#80), Alan Ameche (#35) and Pat Richter (#88). - ◆ With seven wins, Wisconsin is bowl-eligible for the sixth consecutive season and the 11th time in the past 12 years.
- ◆ Saturday will be the final home game for 19 Badger seniors: C Marcus Coleman, TE Andy Crooks, P Ken DeBauche, QB Tyler Donovan, DL Nick Hayden, LB Casey Hogan, WR Paul Hubbard, LS Steve Johnson, LB James Kamoku, OL Danny Kaye, DL Brandon Kelly, K Taylor Mehlhaff, DB Joe Sibley, P Paul Standing, DB Ben Strickland, WR Luke Swan, DL Jamil Walker, DL Kurt Ware and OL Andrew Weininger.


UW is attempting to go undefeated at home for the second consecutive season. The last time the Badgers went two seasons without a home loss was 1950-51 (8-0-1).

• • •

◆ During its 13-game home winning streak (since the start of 2006), UW has scored at least 30 points 10 times. The Badgers are averaging 33.3 points in those games, compared to 12.8 for their opponents.

◆ Since the beginning of the 2004 season only Ohio State has more wins than Wisconsin (38) among Big Ten schools. UW's 38 wins are tied for eighth-most in the country since 2004, behind only USC (43), Texas (41), Auburn (40), Ohio State (40), Boise State (40), LSU (39) and Oklahoma (39).

◆ Bret Bielema's 17-1 record to start his head coaching career is the second-best coaching start for a Big Ten coach in history. Only the legendary Fielding Yost of Michigan, who went 55-0-1 from 1901-05, had a better beginning to a career.

Offensive Notes

♦ Wisconsin ranks second in the country in time of possession, holding the ball for an average of 33:58. The Badgers have held the T.O.P. edge in nine of their 10 games this season.



Wisconsin's 93-yard touchdown drive to open the second half at Ohio State was its longest scoring drive of the season.

The Badgers have 12 touchdown drives of at least 75 yards this season.



♦ Junior Travis Beckum leads all tight ends in the country with 62 catches and 765 receiving yards this season. In just two seasons as a tight end, Beckum has 1,668 career receiving yards, good for ninth place on UW's all-time receiving yardage list.

♦ Wisconsin struck for two of its longest plays of the season on back-to-back drives against Ohio State in the third quarter. Paul Hubbard's 50-yard catch on the first drive after halftime was the longest reception of his career and the second-longest pass play for the Badgers this season. Travis Beckum's 46-yard catch later in the quarter was UW's third-longest passing play of the season.

♦ After not scoring a touchdown in his first two seasons, fullback Chris Pressley has two TDs in the last three games. His two-yard touchdown reception in the

third quarter was the first TD catch of his career.


Defensive Notes

♦ After not recording a tackle for loss in the first three games of the season, junior linebacker DeAndre Levy has accounted for 9.0 TFLs for a total of 52 yards. He has at least 0.5 TFLs in each of the last seven games.

♦ Wisconsin has given up a combined 391 passing yards in the last three games (130.3 per game). This season the Badgers are giving up only 190.3 yards through the air, good for 18th in the country and third in the Big Ten.

♦ Senior defensive tackle Nick Hayden recorded nine tackles at Ohio State, the second-highest total of his career. He also recorded a sack and knocked down a pass at the line of scrimmage. After going a stretch of 17 games without a sack, Hayden has four sacks in the last six games.

♦ Junior defensive end Matt Shaughnessy leads the Badgers with 11 tackles for loss this season. He has at least one TFL in seven of the Badgers' 10 games this season.

Special Teams Notes

♦ Taylor Mehlhaff, who has made six consecutive field goals, is now 15-of-17 (.882) on the season. That is the second-best season FG percentage in UW history, behind Matt Davenport's .905 in 1998. For his career, Mehlhaff is 44-of-57 (.772) on field goals, second only to Davenport in career FG percentage in school history.

♦ Punter Ken DeBauche completed his first career pass on the Badgers' fake punt in the first quarter at Ohio State. He had been 0-for-3 in his career, with single incompletions in each of his first three seasons.

Backup punter Paul Standring, a special teams standout, was on the receiving end of DeBauche's pass. It was the first career reception for Standring.

♦ Mike Newkirk recorded his first career blocked kick when he got a hand on Ohio State's fourth quarter field goal attempt. It was the Badgers' fourth blocked kick of the season.

Chancellor John D. Wiley



Chancellor John D. Wiley has more than four decades of experience with the University of Wisconsin-Madison, having been a graduate student, a professor, and an administrator during his illustrious university career. Assuming office on January 1, 2001, he is the 27th person to lead the university since its founding in 1848.

As UW-Madison's chief executive officer, Wiley is responsible for the overall vision and direction of the university. He represents the institution for a variety of constituents, including alumni groups, chambers of commerce and service clubs, the state legislature and governmental bodies, the UW System Administration, and the UW System Board of Regents. A prominent figure in higher education, he chairs both the Big Ten Council of Presidents and Chancellors and the board for the Council on Higher Education Accreditation, and is a member of the National Security Higher Education Advisory Committee. He also serves on several local and community boards, including the William T. Evjue Foundation and the Greater Madison Chamber of Commerce. He also has been deeply involved in

fundraising from individual and corporate donors and charitable foundations.

From 1994-2000, Wiley served as UW-Madison's provost and vice chancellor for academic affairs. In this role as the university's chief operating officer and deputy chancellor, he worked closely with deans, faculty, academic staff, and student committees in the exercise of shared governance and the overall management of the institution. Prior to becoming provost, he was dean of the Graduate School and the university's senior research officer, and from 1986-89, he served as associate dean for research in the College of Engineering.

Wiley received his bachelor's degree in physics from Indiana University in 1964. He attended graduate school at UW-Madison as a National Science Foundation Fellow, receiving master's and doctoral degrees in physics in 1965 and 1968, respectively. He joined the technical staff of Bell Telephone Laboratories at Murray Hill, N.J., from 1968-1974, and then spent a year at the Max Planck Institute in Stuttgart, Germany as an awardee of the Alexander von Humboldt Senior U.S. Service Award for Research and Training.

Joining the UW-Madison faculty in the Department of Electrical and Computer Engineering in August 1975, Wiley began a productive career in teaching and research, focusing on topics related to semiconductors and other materials and processes important to the electronics field. He is a co-founder of several highly successful research centers, including the Center for X-ray Lithography and the Engineering Research Center for Plasma-Aided Manufacturing. From 1982-86, he chaired the Materials Science Program, a graduate-level, interdepartmental-committee program for master's and doctoral degrees.


I am committed to helping ensure that our teams achieve the highest standards of excellence, not just in competition, but also in integrity, values and character.



Director of Athletics Barry Alvarez



Earry Alvarez is in his fourth year as Director of Athletics at the University of Wisconsin and second with the additional title of head football coach. Alvarez, who began his career as athletic director in April of 2004, served as athletic director and football coach in 2004-05 and in 2005-06.

Alvarez's first year as Director of Athletics (without the football duties) was a memorable one as Wisconsin won four national titles (men's cross country, men's and women's hockey and women's lightweight rowing) during the 2005-06 athletic campaign. The Badgers also won five conference titles.

The UW maintained its winning ways in 2006-07 with the men's track and field team winning its first NCAA title. The women's hockey team repeated as NCAA champions as Wisconsin finished 16th in the Directors' Cup rankings.

Badger student-athletes also showed their capabilities off the field of play during the fall of 2007 when they registered the highest cumulative grade point average for a fall term in department history. Thirteen teams also finished with record high grade point averages for either the fall or spring semester.

Alvarez guided Wisconsin's football fortunes for 16 seasons (1990-2005). He has been at the forefront of the revival of the Badger athletic program during his entire tenure in Madison. He piloted Wisconsin to three Big Ten and Rose Bowl titles (including back-to-back in 1998-99) en route to becoming the winningest football coach in school history (118-73-4 record).

Alvarez was just the 10th coach in Big Ten history to win 100 games at one conference institution. His 8-3 (.727)

- Was a head coach in the 1995 Blue-Gray Game, 1996 East-West Shrine game, 2000 Hula Bowl and 2004 Florida Gridiron Classic
- Alvarez and his wife, Cindy, endowed a football scholarship at UW in the spring of 2000
- Babcock Hall, which houses the UW's nationally acclaimed dairy school, developed an ice cream flavor in honor of the Badger head coach in 1994. It was named Berry Alvarez, and the flavor was a mixture of raspberry, strawberry and blueberry.
- A finalist for ESPN's College Football Coach of the Decade Award in 1999. He was one of 18 coaches named to a new position in 1990 and was the only one still at the school that hired him when he retired in 2005.
- Named one of the "100 Most Influential Hispanics" by *Hispanic Business* in October of 2001

record in bowl games with the Badgers is the best in college football history (among coaches with at least 11 bowl appearances). The 2004 AFCA Region 3 Coach of the Year, he also was the 1993 national coach of the year, a two-time (1993 and 1998) Big Ten coach of the year and a finalist for ESPN's coach of the decade (1990s) honor.

Alvarez is a 1969 graduate of the University of Nebraska, where he played linebacker and went on to earn his master's degree. He received a Distinguished Alumnus Award from his alma mater in 2003.

Alvarez and his wife Cindy are co-campaign chairs in the effort to bring a Gilda's Club, a free support center for families dealing with cancer, to Madison. Alvarez also serves on the board of directors for the MACC Fund (Midwest Athletes Against Childhood Cancer).

Alvarez and his wife are the parents of three children—daughters Dawn (Mrs. Brad Ferguson) and Stacy (Mrs. Mike Delzer); son Chad (wife Stephanie). Barry and Cindy are grandparents to Joe and Jake Ferguson; Grace and Jackson Delzer; and Scarlet and Barry John Thomas Alvarez.

Head Coach Bret Bielema

One would be hard-pressed to draw up a better head coaching debut than the one Wisconsin's Bret Bielema fashioned in 2006.

The third-youngest head coach in Bowl subdivision football, Bielema has proven that age is just a number. He has shown that determination, hard work, organization and enthusiasm—all traits Bielema embodies—count the most when sizing up an individual's qualifications.

Bielema guided the Badgers to a 12-1 overall record and 7-1 mark in the Big Ten (good for a second-place tie with Michigan). Wisconsin capped its record-setting 2006 season with a 17-14 win over Arkansas in the 2007 Capital One Bowl. No previous Wisconsin team had won more than 11 games in a season. In addition, Bielema became just the third rookie head coach in NCAA Division I history to pilot his team to 12 victories.

Bielema's efforts were rewarded when he was named the 2006 Dave McClain Big Ten Coach of the Year. Bielema also was named one of five finalists for the Bear Bryant National Coach of the Year Award and was a finalist for the 2006 Schutt Sports Division IA Coach of the Year Award.

Wisconsin surprised most observers outside the program by setting school records for overall wins (12) and regular-season victories (11), as well as tying the UW mark for conference victories (seven). The Badgers did it with a defensive unit that ended the 2006 regular season ranked among the top three nationally in pass defense, pass efficiency defense, total defense and scoring defense. And they

did it with an offense led by a pair of seniors (QB John Stocco and All-America tackle Joe Thomas), a young but talented offensive line, the Big Ten Freshman of the Year (P.J. Hill) at tailback and an emerging corps of receivers, including John Mackey Award semifinalist Travis Beckum.

Bielema was Wisconsin's defensive coordinator in 2004 and 2005, a period in which the program produced a 19-6 record under former head coach Barry Alvarez. The 2004 Badgers were sixth nationally in scoring defense and ninth in total defense. The 2005 club, which earned Wisconsin's first shutout since 1999, finished its 10-win season with a 24-10 victory over No. 7 Auburn in the 2006 Capital One Bowl; UW limited the high-powered Tigers to just 236 yards of total offense.

During Bielema's two years guiding the Badger defense, two players (DE Erasmus James and DB Jim Leonhard) earned first-team All-America honors and two others (DT Anttaj Hawthorne and DB Scott Starks) were first-team All-Big Ten selections. While coaching the Badgers' linebackers, Bielema developed Mark Zalewski and Dontez Sanders, both of whom earned honorable mention all-conference acclaim.

Bielema was co-defensive coordinator at Kansas State under former head coach Bill Snyder from 2002-03. The Wildcats were 22-6 during Bielema's time there and finished in the top 10 nationally (in



both 2002 and 2003) in scoring and total defense. The Wildcats won their first Big 12 title in 2003. Among Bielema's standout players at Kansas State were first-team All-American Josh Buhl, 2003 NFL second-round draft pick Terry Pierce and second-team All-Big 12 selection Bryan Hickman.

Prior to his years at Kansas State, Bielema spent nine seasons as an assistant coach at his alma mater, Iowa, where he worked for head coaches Hayden Fry and Kirk Ferentz. The 1997 Hawkeyes posted three shutouts and ranked No. 4 nationally in scoring defense. Bielema coached Fred Barr (first-team All-Big Ten), Vernon Rollins and Matt Hughes (both honorable mention All-Big Ten) at Iowa.

Head coaches for whom Bielema has worked—Alvarez, Snyder, Ferentz and Fry—have combined to win 553 games and guide their teams to 42 bowl games, so the second-year Badger mentor has learned from some of the best in the business. The last four teams (2002-06) for which Bielema has coached accumulated a 53-13 record.

Bielema earned four letters (1989-92) after joining the Iowa football program as a walk-on. He earned a scholarship after his first year and was a member of Iowa's 1990 Big Ten championship team. A starter as a junior in 1991, he was a team co-captain as a senior. Bielema signed a free agent contract with the Seattle Seahawks and later completed his playing career with the Milwaukee Mustangs of the Arena Football League. Bielema has participated in 10 bowl games as a player or coach.

A 1992 graduate of Iowa with a bachelor's degree in marketing, Bielema was born in Prophetstown, Ill., on Jan. 13, 1970.

Alexander was a graduate assistant coach at his alma mater, Southern California, from June 1995 to February 1998.

He played for two bowl-winning teams (1992 Freedom Bowl and 1994 Cotton Bowl) and has coached for four bowl-winning squads (1996 Rose Bowl, 2000 and 2003 Las Vegas Bowls and 2004 Insight.com Bowl).

A native of Oak Creek, Wis., Sprague had 115 tackles in 41 games for the Badgers from 1998-2002. He earned honorable mention All-Big Ten honors in 2002 and was a member of the Badgers' Big Ten and Rose Bowl championship teams in 1998 and 1999.

Bill NAYES is in his second year as assistant athletic director/director of football operations at Wisconsin.

NAYES is responsible for team logistics and day-to-day operations. 



Freshman Linebacker Culmer St. Jean

Born in the Bahamas, Culmer St. Jean and his family moved from Haiti to Florida when he was about four years old. With language (Creole), family and lifestyle best describing the St. Jean family culture, Culmer said striving to be a perfectionist has a lot to do with how his parents, Dirogene and Ydora, raised him and his four siblings.

"When they (our parents) grew up, they were always taught to be very close with family," Rose, Culmer's older sister, said. "They told us we could have friends, but to be much closer with family because they will always have your back."

Culmer describes his mom as a "warm-hearted, nice lady" who made sure he had good values growing up. He said

she always told him "don't do anything that you don't want anybody else to do to you."

Rose, who is just 11 months older than Culmer, describes Culmer as a "mama's boy" who gets anything from time and affection to clothes from her.

"I talk to my mom every day and I talk to my sister Rose all the time," Culmer said. "Both are big supporters of me."

Being that Culmer's two eldest siblings, Diro and Esland, live in the Bahamas, and that the youngest sibling, Vinsin, is still in high school, Culmer and Rose grew up as the best of friends.

Culmer said that Rose played a big role in his playing Division I football at the UW.

"She stayed on top of me, made sure I got up in the morning to go to meetings and to lifts," he said. "Anything that needed to get done, she would get it done."

A big part of Rose and Culmer's relationship is their love for sports. Because their parents worked a lot in order to give their family a good life in the United States, the two spent more time than average at practice and working out until their parents could pick them up from practice.

"We always had a basketball hoop in the back," Rose said. "We'd throw the football around. I always try to tell people, that when he played quarterback, I taught him how to throw because I was always his target. We'd stand in the back and throw back and forth, back and forth."

Since Culmer began playing football at Wisconsin, the backyard pickup games and work outs have become more of a special event rather than regular occurrence. Culmer makes it home four times a year, at Thanksgiving, Christmas, spring break and for three weeks in the summer.

And because the St. Jeans have such a large family, Culmer's homecomings involve not only his immediate family, but his uncles, cousins, nieces and nephews

who all live in the same neighborhood in Florida.

But, how big is big? Well, Culmer's mom was the second girl of 13 in her family, and each of her siblings have no less than five kids, which makes for a huge family, and that is just one side.

Growing up, all the cousins got together in the streets to play ball. To get a grasp on this large family, when Culmer was in high school, he played on the same team with at least nine or 10 cousins at a time.

"All my cousins were athletes," Culmer said. "We all lived around each other, on the same streets, so in the backyard we played football and basketball. My biggest influence was my cousin Steve Octavien, who plays football at Nebraska."

Today, everyone related to Culmer and anyone friends with the family, cheers for No. 15 and the Badgers.

"Everybody my sister (Rose) talks to turns into Wisconsin fans," Culmer said. "My girlfriend's parents are Wisconsin fans. Everybody I know is Wisconsin fans. The only thing is that my cousin goes to Nebraska, so we have to even it out, so we are Wisconsin and Nebraska fans."

Although his parents have made it to just one game in the last two years, doesn't mean they care any less about Culmer and Wisconsin football games. In fact, for the Wisconsin vs. Indiana game on Oct. 27, Rose said the family had nearly 60 people over to watch the game together.

"We call everyone," Rose said. "Everybody comes to the house. We have on our Badger hats, our football buttons, our (Wisconsin) t-shirts. All of my brother's high school friends come over. We have the grill fired up, lots of food, we have drinks, we have everything. And everyone's watching the game. And we do the 'Let's Go Badgers' cheer after every touchdown. It gets very loud in there!"



In 2005, Sports Illustrated on Campus said that Wisconsin has the best gameday atmosphere in the Big Ten Conference. That's quite a statement, but that may not go far enough. The fact is there may not be a better way to experience college football than spending a day at Wisconsin's fabled Camp Randall Stadium.

First of all, Wisconsin fans love a good time and they love to watch the Badgers win. There are plenty of both at Camp Randall. Badger backers arrive early — they are legendary tailgaters — and stay late, with thousands remaining inside the stadium to sing and dance as the UW Marching Band conducts its festive "5th Quarter" routine.

And there is nothing like the often-imitated-but-never-duplicated madness that is "Jump Around." Between the third and fourth quarters of every home game, thousands of Wisconsin fans, band members (and sometimes even players) jump to the 1990s hip-hop tune by House of

Pain. The stadium rocks and rolls and shakes and bakes!

Badger fans are also loyal. Camp Randall Stadium has witnessed crowds of at least 70,000 in every game since the 1993 season-opener, a span of 14 years and 88 games. Seventy-eight of those games have been sellouts, including the last 25 in a row. The stadium record was set at the 2005 Iowa game when 83,184 fans packed the facility for former head coach Barry Alvarez's final game.



Camp Randall Stadium ...

Home of the Badgers

One of college football's finest facilities – Camp Randall Stadium – completed a four-year, \$109 million renovation prior to the 2005 football season. The improvements are plentiful: new FieldTurf, new suites and club seats, new video scoreboards, new offices, increased seating capacity and better fan amenities like concession areas, restrooms and traffic flow.

The enhancements have not detracted from Camp Randall's charm but rather the stadium's character has been enhanced greatly by the improvements, ensuring that future generations of Badger fans will have a first-rate facility at which to watch the Badgers play on Saturdays.

Camp Randall was originally used as a Civil War training site. In fact, some 70,000 soldiers trained at the camp, which also included a hospital and a prison for Confederate soldiers on its grounds. Named for Alexander Randall, the state of Wisconsin's first wartime governor, Camp Randall Stadium opened in 1917 and was officially dedicated when the Badgers defeated Minnesota, 10-7, on Nov. 3.



Badger Nickname

The nickname "Badgers" was borrowed from the state of Wisconsin, which was dubbed the "Badger State." The name didn't come from the animals in the region, but rather from an association with lead miners in the 1820s. Without shelter in the winter, the miners had to "live like Badgers" in tunnels burrowed into hillsides.

Bucky Badger

Although badgers in various forms had been the University of Wisconsin mascot for decades, the version that is currently known as Bucky, sporting a cardinal and white sweater, was first drawn in 1940 by professional illustrator Art Evans.

In 1949, a student wore a badger outfit with a papier-mâché head at the homecoming game. A pep rally was held to determine the mascot's name—Buckingham U. Badger.

Bud Song

An integral part of any Wisconsin band performance is the playing of the Bud song. The tune is a spinoff of the song "You've said it all," a jingle with words and music originally written by Steve Karen for Budweiser beer commercials. The song has become legendary at the UW because of its polka-like rhythm.

Fifth Quarter

The Wisconsin band has become nationally famous for its post-game celebration called the Fifth Quarter. Win or lose, fans sing, dance and cheer the band as it plays traditional favorites like "On, Wisconsin" and the Bud song.

On, Wisconsin

The tune was composed in 1909 by William Purdy, with the words written by UW alumnus Carl Beck, who rewrote them in 1951. Some 2,500 schools and colleges have adopted the music and changed the words to suit their needs.

Hall of Fame

The UW Athletic Hall of Fame was established in 1991 to recognize and honor former student-athletes and staff for their exemplary athletic achievement and contributions to the University of Wisconsin Athletic Department.

Badgers Give Back






Senior Offensive Lineman Danny Kaye



What does the rugged 6'8" 323-pound offensive lineman Danny Kaye consider his most prized possession? Of all things, it's his tiny cat, named Boo-boo.

Kaye received Boo-boo as a Christmas present from his girlfriend three years ago. He has been a vital part of Kaye's life ever since. "He's my cat, not a family cat. "He's so funny. I just look at him and laugh. If we're not playing fetch then he'll be laying still and sleeping." But, at bedtime, the big guy and his cat go their separate ways. "I go to bed, and he goes to his favorite spots around the house," said Kaye. "He's my pride and joy."



Freshman Defensive Back Aaron Henry

It's not everyday someone unabashedly admits to having odd sleeping habits. But, freshman defensive back Aaron Henry openly describes the "very, very weird" motorcycle sound he makes when he sleeps.

Fifth-year senior Kurt Ware has known the answer to the question "What do you want to be when you grow up?" for a long time now.


"I want to coach after I graduate," Ware said. "I hopefully want to coach with this program here and start out as a student assistant like Joe Stellmacher is doing now."




Something to Remember

**Hubbard, Crooks, Coleman and Swan prepare to end
their exciting careers at Wisconsin**

The end of a senior year can be emotional for just about anyone. In sports, bringing a season to a close can also be emotional. Combine these two elements and you find the situation many Badgers are currently in.

Andy Crooks, Marcus Coleman, Paul Hubbard and Luke Swan are four of the 18 Wisconsin seniors who will run through the tunnel one last time at today's game. Although the players are from different backgrounds and will likely end up in different places after graduation, their time as Wisconsin football players is something they can all share. Something to remember.

As the season has inched towards its conclusion, the players have seen their roles as leaders emerge into something new. Hubbard, a wide receiver from Colorado Springs, Colo., joined the Badgers as a walk-on, knowing he had plenty of years of football ahead of him. As his senior season began in August, Hubbard took a moment to re-evaluate his outlook on the team. After realizing he had only one season left to play, the former UW long-jumper made a conscious effort to make his last season one for the books. But in the Badgers' second game of the season, Hubbard suffered an injury which would keep him on the sidelines for five games. This had Hubbard, or "Hubb" as his teammates call him, again re-evaluating his role on the football team.

Luke Hubbard, Crooks suffered an injury at the start of his senior season. Hubbard approached Crooks after his injury at UNLV and the two spoke about how to get through the tough time.

"We were sitting there, thinking to ourselves, 'this is not how we planned our senior seasons,'" Hubbard explained. "We had to push ourselves through it and just think about the positives of what we had to work with."

Weeks later, Swan was faced with a similar situation. The Fennimore, Wis., native found himself watching the games from the sidelines, complete with crutches and a leg brace. Unlike Hubbard and Crooks, Swan's injury was one that would keep him off the field for the remainder of his senior season.

Despite his career-ending injury, Swan has been able to sustain his role as an influential team leader. Prior to the Northern Illinois game, Swan spoke to his teammates about their intensity on each and every play. The senior understood how quickly a player's career could come to an end.

"I challenged the guys," he said. "I asked them, 'If you knew right before the next play that it would be your last play, how would your intensity change?'

The message Swan shared hit home with many of his teammates, especially with the other seniors.

Hubbard echoed Swan's comments.


"We've all taken a bigger role in team leadership because we have been in that situation. We don't want anyone else to go through what we've gone through, and we don't want them to make the same mistakes that we did."

Mistakes included, the seniors would not trade their experiences at Wisconsin for anything else. Swan, who began his career as a walk-on in 2003, never imagined the route his career would take. But, injury and all, fan-favorite Swan would not ask for a different experience with the Badgers.

"If someone would have told me at the beginning that it'd work out the way it did, I'd say, 'where do I sign up?' I'd do this all over again. It's been a great time, and I love the guys, and all the seniors I came in with. I wouldn't trade it for the world."

All four seniors have found their own way, meeting in Camp Randall Stadium for their final home game. While not all of the seniors will get to play in this memorable game, the emotions felt will still be shared by all.

Coleman, Crooks, Hubbard and Swan have watched as five (or four in Crooks' case) different senior classes have said their goodbyes to the fans at Camp Randall. Each player will have family and friends in attendance, supporting them as their careers draw near the end.

"It's our last year, so we all know it's kind of our last 'hoorah,'" said Coleman. The center has started in 23 consecutive games, entering today's match-up. The Plymouth, Minn., native has been a respected leader since taking over the reigns of the offensive line in 2006.

The emotions built prior to today's game will be intense, but the seniors know they can lean on each other, and the fans, who have stuck with them through each of their years.

"I can't believe this is going to be my last game here," said Coleman. "It's going to be an exciting game. The crowd's going to be unbelievable and the emotions are definitely going to be high."

Taking their final run through the tunnel will not be easy for the seniors.

"To take the field, and run out of that tunnel and see the crowd in red, it's an amazing feeling," said Crooks.

Swan agrees.

"Being able to walk out of the tunnel for the last time is going to be emotional," said Swan. "Probably different than I had envisioned it, I guess. But I think it'll be a special time to be able to look back on some things. I'll just want to soak everything up."

Hubbard will be joined by his mother, who will be in attendance for only the second time in his entire football career. In addition to family support, the Badgers lean on support from the fans. The fans, which have been cheering for the team from the beginning, are something that all of the players will remember.

"I'm just glad we've had the fans that we have had at Camp Randall," said Hubbard. "They've supported us through the highs and the lows."

All 18 seniors will get a chance to thank their family, friends and fans at today's game. Although each player will likely end up in a different place after this season, they will always have their memories at Wisconsin to look back on.



Badgers in the NFL Update



Buffalo wide receiver Lee Evans caught a season-high nine passes for 165 yards in a 33-21 victory over Cincinnati.

Evans Breaks Out

After being mired in a slump for the first six weeks of the season, amassing only 17 receptions for 211 yards, Buffalo wide receiver **Lee Evans** has caught fire in the Bills' last two games.

In the Bills' most recent 33-21 victory over Cincinnati, Evans notched season-highs in receptions (nine) and yards (165) and also caught his second touchdown of the season.

A week earlier against the New York Jets, Evans had five catches for 138 yards, including an 85-yard touchdown strike from quarterback J.P. Losman late in the fourth quarter that helped the Bills secure the 13-3 win.

Dayne Crosses Century Mark

With starter Ahman Green seeing only limited action due to a sore knee, Houston running back **Ron Dayne** received the bulk of the carries and responded with his best performance of the season, rushing 21 times for 122 yards and one touchdown in a 24-17 victory over Oakland.

It was the 1999 Heisman Trophy winner's first 100-yard game of the season and the fourth of his career. Dayne also crossed the century mark against Oakland last season.

"Anytime you can get 100, it feels pretty good," Dayne told the Texans' offi-

cial web site. "I'm just happy and glad that we got the win."

On a season-long 39-yard dash, Dayne flashed the combination of power and speed that made him such a force during his four-year career at Wisconsin.

"We know his ability, and when he hits it, he hits it," quarterback Sage Rosenfels said. "He's a load to take down. There were a couple of arm tackles that he just ran through."

Dayne's effort helped Houston record 178 rushing yards, a team season-high.

Sorgi Signs Contract Extension with Colts

Indianapolis quarterback **Jim Sorgi** signed a three-year contract extension last week that will keep him as Peyton Manning's primary backup through the 2010 season. Had he not been signed, Sorgi would have been eligible for unrestricted free agency next spring.

"It's nice to have some security," Sorgi told ESPN.com following a win over Carolina. "It's a good situation for me."


Since being selected by the Colts in the sixth-round of the 2004 NFL draft, Sorgi has only seen sporadic playing time due to Manning's streak of 152 straight regular-season starts, second all-time to Favre's current run of 245.

For his career, Sorgi has completed 60-of-92 passes for 628 yards, with five touchdown passes and one interception.

Sorgi set career highs by completing 22 of 31 passes for 237 yards in a Christmas Eve game against Seattle in 2004.

Alumni Give \$85 Million to Name Wisconsin School of Business

The Wisconsin School of Business at the University of Wisconsin-Madison has received an unprecedented gift totaling \$85 million from a small group of alumni who have formed the "Wisconsin Naming Partnership" to support the school's mission.

The Wisconsin naming gift is the first of its kind received by a U.S. business school. Conventional business school naming gifts adopt the name of a single donor in perpetuity. By preserving the Wisconsin name for 20 years, this gift leaves open the option of future naming gifts.

UW-Madison Chancellor John D. Wiley calls the gift "a creative act of philanthropy and a major milestone for our university."

"One of our trademarks is that our students connect with and learn from real-world leaders," said Michael Knetter, dean of the Wisconsin School of Business. "The commitment made by the partners is a reflection of their enduring engagement with the school that helped them launch their own successful careers."

The 13 gifts were made by: Paul and Carol Collins; Wade and Beverly Fetzer;

Pete and Pat Frechette; Jon and Ann Hammes; Ted and Mary Kellner; Paul and Julie Leff; Sheldon and Marianne Lubar; John and Tashia Morgridge; Albert O. "Ab" and Nancy Nicholas; John and Anne Oros; H. Signe Ostby and Scott Cook; and two donors who wished to remain anonymous. Each partner committed a minimum of \$5 million to join the partnership. The partnership underscores the connection between alumni and students.

"We were inspired by the commitment Wisconsin business students have for the school," says founding partner Ab Nicholas. "They have shown that they are willing to pay for quality. And so are we. We hope this naming gift inspires an even broader group of alumni to give back to the university that helped shape who they are today."

Professor's film on Native American soldiers to air on PBS

As a United States soldier in the second decade of the 20th century, Edward DeNemie chased Pancho Villa and fought in all seven major battles of World War I. He took shrapnel in his ear and lost a lung in a German gas attack. He saw some of his best friends die, all while serving a country of which he was not a citizen.

That is because he — like 12,000 other soldiers who volunteered for military service during World War I — was Native American.

Patty Loew, a veteran television journalist and an associate professor of life sciences communication, has long wondered what motivated men such as DeNemie, who also happens to be her grandfather, to fight for a country that did not grant them citizenship until 1924. To explore these questions, she produced "Way of the Warrior," a one-hour documentary that premiered nationally on the PBS network in November.

While some chose to serve in guard units for a steady income, Loew said, many others were motivated by tribal values of obligation, service and protection.

"There is a really heavy layer of warrior/service culture that exists in many Native American communities," says Loew, a member of the Bad River Band of the Lake Superior Ojibwe.

Another common theme that emerges from Loew's interviews is the danger many Native American soldiers encountered in combat. Loew said Native American soldiers were more likely to be placed in frontline positions, which she attributes to fantastical notions about Native Americans' bravery and skill in the frontier. The casualty rate of Native American soldiers was five times higher than that of U.S. forces as a whole during World War I, she noted.

Yet Loew was struck by the rituals employed by many tribal communities to cope with such horrors. Those returning from war were sometimes given new names and ritual baths, which were meant to cleanse their souls of the atrocities they had witnessed.

"Really, they are a form of group counseling," she says. "They were a way to protect the community from this poisonous experience." Indeed, she said the veterans she interviewed who underwent these rituals generally reported fewer problems with post-traumatic stress disorder in the years after their service.

Journalism Students Hone Reporting Skills at Freakfest

For one group of University of Wisconsin-Madison students, attending the city's sometimes-raucous Halloween celebration was a classroom experience instead of a barroom crawl.

About 10 news reporting students in the School of Journalism and Mass Communication gained hands-on reporting and editing experience by providing team coverage of Freakfest on Oct. 26-27 and posted their stories, pictures and video to a Web site they created.

Students in two sections of Intermediate Reporting, taught by Steven Walters and Patricia Hastings, mapped their coverage of the annual celebration, which has sometimes devolved into street violence and vandalism.

Hastings and Walters hoped the project would provide their students with the experience of planning coverage and reporting on an unfolding live event.

"There's really no substitute for hands-on reporting experience of live events. Part of it is the dynamic of learning how to change gears on the fly, if events call for it," Walters said.





Badgers Recognized Among the Nation's Best!

Every great program is built on the shoulders of outstanding players. It is no different at Wisconsin. With the remarkable success of the football team in recent years has come national recognition for a number of Badger players.

In 2006, many UW individuals were recognized for their contributions to the school-record 12 wins. Chief among those players was offensive tackle Joe Thomas. Thomas was a consensus first-team All-American and became the first UW player to win the Outland Trophy, presented to the nation's top lineman.

Two returnees, junior tight end Travis Beckum and sophomore running back P.J. Hill also garnered national recognition last year. Hill was named national Freshman of the Year by Rivals.com and also earned Big Ten Freshman of the Year honors. Beckum, in his first season as a tight end, was a second team All-American and John Mackey Award semifinalist.

In his first year at the helm, UW head coach Bret Bielema was named Big Ten Coach of the Year and was a finalist for the Bear Bryant national Coach of the Year Award.

The most decorated former Badger is running back Ron


Dayne. The NCAA's all-time leading rusher, Dayne won the 1999 Heisman Trophy in a landslide, outdistancing runner-up Joe Hamilton of Georgia Tech by more than 1,000 points. As a senior, Dayne also won the Maxwell, Walter Camp and Doak Walker Awards.

Dayne was the second Heisman Trophy winner from UW as Alan Ameche took home the award in 1954.

In recent years, Badger players have been fixtures on national award lists. UW players have been finalists for the Rimington Trophy (best center), Outland Trophy (interior lineman), Lombardi Award (lineman), Chuck Bednarik Award (defensive player), Bronko Nagurski Trophy (defensive player), Ted Hendricks Award (defensive end), Fred Biletnikoff Award (receiver), Lou Groza Award (placekicker), Mosi Tatupu Award (special teams) and

Ronnie Lott Trophy (defensive player).

In addition, Badger players walked away with two major awards in 2000. Cornerback Jamar Fletcher earned the Jim Thorpe Award as the nation's


Robert Butler (elected in 1972) was a three-year letterwinner at tackle and won all-league (1912-13) and All-America (1913) laurels.



Pat Harder (elected in 1993), an All-America fullback, was the Big Ten's scoring and rushing champion in 1941.




Dave Schreiner (elected in 1955), the two-time All-America end, was the Western Conference's MVP in 1942.



Pat Richter (elected in 1990) was a two-time All-America end and led the nation in receiving as a junior.






This Week in Badger History



Aaron Stecker, now a member of the New Orleans Saints, had a 100-yard kickoff return for a touchdown for the Badgers on Nov. 11, 1995.

NOVEMBER 10-16

Nov. 10, 1990 — Terry Butler set the men's school record in the one-meter diving event with six dives totaling the score of 343.95.

Also on this date in 1962, the Wisconsin football team defeated No. 1-ranked Northwestern 37-6 in the Badgers' Homecoming game.

Nov. 11, 1995 — Aaron Stecker is the most recent Badger of the three to top the longest kickoff return list with a 100-yard return for a touchdown when the Badgers beat Minnesota 34-27.


Nov. 12, 1983 — Brigitte Lourey of the women's volleyball team set the individual record for most kills in a single game with 34 against Iowa on this date in 1993.

Nov. 13, 1999 — Wisconsin tailback Ron Dayne became the NCAA's all-time leading rusher in the Badgers' 41-3 win over Iowa at Camp Randall Stadium. Dayne rushed for 216 yards on 27 carries, breaking the record, formerly held by Texas' Ricky Williams on a 31-yard carry coming at 4:32 of the second quarter. He finished with 6,397 career yards (not including bowls). Then-Madison mayor Sue Bauman declared this date "Ron Dayne Day" in honor of his accomplishment.

Nov. 14, 1953 — The Badger football team upset No. 1-ranked Illinois 34-7 in Madison, en route to a 6-2-1 record.

Nov. 15, 1947 — Clarence Self set the single-game kickoff return yardage record with 178 yards against Michigan on this date.

Nov. 16, 1998 — The Wisconsin men's basketball team opened up its win over UW-Milwaukee with a 21-0 run in the first 8:59 of the game, the best start in a game for the UW in the Dick Bennett era.



Nov. 13, 1999 was declared "Ron Dayne Day" by former Madison mayor Sue Bauman.


Meet the Michigan Wolverines



- Ann Arbor, Mich., is the home of the University of Michigan. Ann Arbor is the founding city and base of Borders Books, the second-largest bookstore chain in the United States.



Michigan Stadium was built in 1927 with an initial capacity of 84,401. In 1956, the capacity was raised to 101,001 and a press box was built. 1992 brought the addition of another row of seats, upping the capacity to 102,501. New locker rooms, along with medical facilities and FieldTurf were added in 2003. In that same year, Michigan Stadium set an NCAA single-game record for attendance as 112,118 witnessed the Wolverines beat Ohio State 35-21 to win the Big Ten title. Since Nov. 8, 1975 there have been 207 consecutive crowds of over 100,000 at Michigan Stadium. The current capacity is 107,501.



Behind the Scenes With ...

Tim McCann, Vice President of Capital Sound Drum & Bugle Corps, has worked at the concession stands at Camp Randall Stadium for roughly 20 years. Being a veteran, the Gameday Program decided to find out what life was like on the other side of the stand.

How long have you been selling concessions?

It's been about 20 years, but it seems like just yesterday that I wrapped my first hot dog.

What organization do you represent and does the organization get a percentage of the sales?

Capital Sound Drum & Bugle Corps, Madison, Wis. (www.CapSound.org). The National W Club pays the organization a percentage of the sales for the day. Today the percentage is 10 percent. For a calendar year, Capital Sound can net around \$25,000-\$30,000.

What is your location? Have you always been at that stand?

At Camp Randall, all three of our stands are located on the new Level 5 Concourse, near sections Q, V, and X. At the Kohl Center, we are located at stands 126 and 219. We've moved a couple of times. With all the renovation that has occurred at Camp Randall, the stands we use to be in are no longer, thank goodness. Let's say, they were not the greatest.

How did you get started?

I was a member of the West Madison Optimist Club. As a member, you needed to perform volunteer work, so I worked at their stand, which I believe they still manage today, on the West side of the stadium. My daughters then joined an organization from Madison, the Capitolaires Drum & Bugle Corps. They ran a stand, that has since been gutted, a back up generator sits in its place, but we ran that stand for many years. Then a couple of years in some cramped quarters, before we moved to our new stands.

What is the most popular item?

Well, I would have to say the hot dog. No, make that, the brat. Actually the nachos. Well, they are all popular.

How do you stay updated with the game?

Our stand at Camp Randall, on level 5, actually looks out right onto the field, so we feel as if we are apart of it all. We can see and hear all that goes on. It's just great. We can also walk a few feet out of the stand, to the sitting area, and again see the entire field.

What time do you arrive at the Stadium and what does your pre-game prep consist of?

At each stand we have four or five volunteers show up four hours prior to kick-off to set up. The rest will arrive about three hours prior to kick-off. First thing we do is receive the W Club book, which has the inventory for the game, at check in. Then we get the starting cash from the cashier and walk to the stands. We start the warmers, count all the products, maybe count them twice, clean the counters, start wrapping hot dogs and brats, making up nacho trays, preparing pretzels, putting out candy,



placing the bottled water & lemonade in ice, and if it's cold out, making room for the hot cocoa. That's a great deal of fun!

Do you sneak some food for yourself?

The W Club allows the volunteers to have either a brat or a hot dog. We never take a nacho chip and some cheese ... never.

Any famous people come to your stand? Do you have regulars?

Our Governor, Mayor Dave, Bucky Badger, Senator Herb Kohl, and Barry Alvarez. The trumpet line from the UW Marching Band. Yes, we do have regulars. As a matter of fact, if one of our counter people is missing for that game, they ask if something's wrong, and will they be back for the next game. Like a family.

Any favorite memories?

Memories ... well for all the years that I have been volunteering the greatest memories that I have is the friendships that have been developed. Many, many people that I shall never forget. The UW students that came to the stands, always exciting to say the least. Being a part of football Saturday. Having my car towed, because I was late, thought I'd be OK. That's just a real bad feeling when you come back to where you thought you parked and it's gone. But most memories a great.

What keeps you coming back?

Sometimes you question this, like when you have a Friday night hockey game, followed by a Saturday football game, followed by a Saturday night hockey game. It makes you think. Enjoyment, socializing, being a part of the UW excitement. But most important is that what we make for the Capital Sound Drum & Bugle Corps. The money goes to an organization that provides the learning skills for music, life, and the future of some very important young men and women. That's what keeps me coming back.

How many people work the stands?

The stands for Football require 10-15 volunteers per game, per stand. At the Kohl Center we need 10. Please stop by, say hello, we'd love to serve you a brat or hot dog.





A Great Time to Be a Badger!

In 2006-07, the University of Wisconsin continued its winning ways, claiming two NCAA championships. UW has now won five national titles over the last two seasons. The Badgers also added two individual national titles and won four conference crowns last year.

Wisconsin won the 2007 NCAA Indoor Men's Track & Field Championship, crowning the first national title for a UW track and field team. The title was also the first-ever for a Big Ten Conference team.

Senior Chris Solinsky earned two individual national titles in 2007. He won the 5,000 meters at the NCAA indoor championships and claimed his second consecutive title in the 5,000 meters at the NCAA outdoor championships.

The women's hockey team became the first UW program to repeat as NCAA champions since 1985 when it won the 2007 title. The Badgers claimed their second straight title, becoming the third school to repeat at national champions.

Wisconsin also won Big Ten titles in men's cross country, men's indoor track and field and men's outdoor track and field as well as the WCHA title in women's hockey.

In addition, five UW programs also set records for most wins in a season—men's basketball (30), women's basketball (23), football (12), women's hockey (36) and wrestling (19). The football team captured its second consecutive Capital One Bowl title while the men's basketball team was ranked No. 1 in the country on Feb. 19, a first in school history.

The Big Ten Conference

The Big Ten Conference is an association of 11 world-class universities whose member institutions share a common mission of research, graduate, professional and undergraduate teaching and public service. Intercollegiate athletics has an important place within the mission.

Founded in 1896, the Big Ten has sustained a comprehensive set of shared practices and policies that enforce the priority of academics in student-athletes' lives and emphasize the values of integrity, fairness and competitiveness. Big Ten universities provide approximately \$94 million in direct financial aid to more than 8,400 men and women student-athletes who compete for 25 championships, 12 for men and 13 for women. Conference institutions sponsor broad-based athletic programs with more than 270 teams.

Big Ten Universities

- are members of the nation's only conference whose constituency is entirely composed of institutions that are members of the AAU, a prestigious association of major academic and research institutions in the United States and Canada.

- have more than four million living alumni and over 300,000 undergraduate students attending Big Ten universities.

- house on their campuses 10 of the nation's 35 largest academic libraries. Collectively, conference libraries hold nearly 70 million bound volumes and the institutions work collaboratively to build and share their resources with other league members.

Big Ten Athletics

- Over the past two years, the Big Ten has reached a series of milestone media agreements to provide the conference with its greatest television exposure ever, including extensions with CBS (for basketball) and ABC/ESPN (for football, basketball and volleyball) and the creation of the

Big Ten Network, a national network devoted to Big Ten athletic and academic programs. The Big Ten Network operates 24 hours a day, 365 days a year since it launched in August of 2007. It will showcase a wide array of sports as well as original programming produced by conference institutions and represents a 20-year partnership between the Big Ten and Fox. The conference's new media agreements will result in the broadcast of more than 500 events nationally and regionally beginning with the 2007-08 academic year, compared to 300 events in the final year of the previous agreements.

- The NCAA collects two types of graduation rates—the federal graduation rate, which accounts for all entering freshmen who receive aid and graduate within six years, and the Graduation Success Rate (GSR), which reflects the mobility of student-athletes by accounting for transfers. Based on the most recent federal graduation rate average for the 1996-99 entering freshmen classes, Big Ten student-athletes graduated at 71 percent. In comparison, the student body at conference institutions graduated at 73 percent while all Division I student-athletes graduated at 62 percent. The Big Ten's GSR was 82 percent compared to the Division I average of 77 percent.
- The Big Ten recognized 2,018 Academic All-Big Ten honorees during the 2006-07 academic year, the highest total in the last decade. Over the past five years, the Conference has annually acknowledged more than 1,800 student-athletes as Academic All-Conference honorees.

BIG TEN NETWORK

Launched in August 2007, the Big Ten Network is dedicated to covering the Big Ten Conference and its 11 member institutions.

The Big Ten Network will provide unprecedented access to an extensive schedule of conference sports events and shows; original programs in academics, the arts and sciences; campus activities; and associated personalities. Sports programming will include live coverage of more major men's and women's events than ever before, along with news, highlights and analysis, all complemented by hours of university-produced campus programming.

The network is available to all cable and satellite carriers and television distributors nationwide, with most programs offered in stunning high-definition television. The Big Ten Network is a joint venture between subsidiaries of the Big Ten Conference and Fox Cable Networks.



- The Big Ten claimed seven team national championships during the 2006-07 season, just one shy of the conference record of eight national titles established during the 1955-56 campaign, while also finishing as the runner-up in five other sports. The Big Ten has earned at least four national crowns in eight of the last 10 seasons. Big Ten national champions in 2006-07 included Michigan State men's ice hockey, Minnesota wrestling, Northwestern women's lacrosse, Penn State fencing and men's gymnastics and Wisconsin women's ice hockey and men's indoor track and field. The conference has also produced team national crowns in the sports of basketball, cross country, field hockey, football, golf, soccer, softball, synchronized swimming, tennis and volleyball over the last decade.

- Big Ten Conference schools are among the national attendance leaders in football, men's and women's basketball and women's volleyball. During 2006-07, more than 8.7 million fans attended Big Ten home contests in those sports.





Chris Chambers (right) has accumulated more than 5,000 career receiving yards in his six seasons as a Dolphin and played in the 2006 Pro Bowl.



35 AMECHE

#35 Alan Ameche

Alan Ameche, the 1954 Heisman Trophy winner, was a three-time All-American and ended his career as the NCAA's all-time rushing leader. He led the Badgers to the 1953 Rose Bowl and rushed for 133 yards in that game. The four-time NFL Pro Bowl pick was inducted into the College Hall of Fame in 1975.

40 HIRSCH

#40 Elroy Hirsch

Elroy Hirsch played only one season (1942) at UW, but he was one of the most beloved sports figures in school history. Hirsch, nicknamed "Crazylegs," rushed for 786 yards for Wisconsin's 8-1-1 team in 1942. He starred for nine years with the L.A. Rams and later served as UW's Director of Athletics (1969-87).

88 RICHTER

#88 Pat Richter

Pat Richter, who led the nation in receiving as a junior, was a consensus All-American in 1962. A two-time first-team All-Big Ten selection, he paced the conference in receiving in 1961 and 1962. A member of the Washington Redskins for eight seasons, Richter later returned to UW to serve as director of athletics (1989-2004).

80 SCHREINER

#80 Dave Schreiner

Dave Schreiner, the two-time All-America end, was named Western Conference Player of the Year in 1942. Schreiner lettered three years at the UW as an end, both on offense and defense. He is a member of the National Football Foundation and W Club Halls of Fame. He was voted to the UW's all-time team in 1969.

83 SHAFER

#83 Allan Shafer

The memory of former quarterback Allan Shafer is continued with the "Living Memorial" Scholarship that is given in his name. Shafer was fatally injured during the 1944 Wisconsin-Iowa game. Shafer is one of two Badgers (Jay Seiler is the other) to die from a football-related injury.

ALL-TIME TEAM

In conjunction with the centennial celebration of college football in 1969, Wisconsin fans selected the school's all-time team. The 11-man unit features 1954 Heisman Trophy winner Alan Ameche, who was voted "All-time Greatest Player."

DAN LANPHEAR (1957-59): Madison native was a 1959 All-American before pro career with Oilers

ARLIE MUCKS, SR. (1914): All-American on gridiron and silver medalist at Olympics (discus)

PAT RICHTER (1960-62): Hall of Fame inductee both on field and in classroom ... former Badger A.D.







Radio Coverage

For the 14th year in a row, exclusive radio coverage of Badger football can be heard on the 55-station Wisconsin Radio Network. The Department of Athletics and Learfield Communications / Badger Sports Properties entered into an agreement for radio broadcast rights for football and basketball in 1994.

WIBA-AM (1310 AM) and WIBA-FM (101.5 FM) are the rights holders in the Madison market, and WTMJ (620 AM) carries the games in Milwaukee.

NCAA Guidelines



What Every Badger Fan Should Know

With increasing numbers of NCAA rules governing outside intervention in recruiting, coaches cannot afford to have any extra "help" in recruiting elite student-athletes to the University of Wisconsin. The penalties are too severe.

Here are some tidbits of information concerning you and Badger athletics ...

You are a "representative" of the UW's athletics interests (i.e., booster) if any of the following apply:

- a) you are an alumnus of the University of Wisconsin;
- b) you have ever made financial contributions to the athletics department, to an athletic booster organization of the UW, or to a UW athletics program;

c) you have ever helped to arrange employment of enrolled student-athletes and/or National Letter of Intent signees;

d) you have ever been involved in any way promoting the Badger athletic program.

Once an individual is identified as an "athletics representative/booster," the person retains that identity forever, even if that person no longer contributes to or supports the athletics program.

NCAA Bylaw 13.01.5 states: In Division I, a representative of the UW's athletics interests is prohibited from making in-person, on-or-off campus recruiting contacts, or written or telephonic commu-

nications with a prospect or the prospect's relatives or legal guardians.

A prospect is any student who has started classes for the ninth grade. In addition, any student younger than ninth grade could become a "prospect" if they receive any benefits from an institution or a booster. Student-athletes enrolled in preparatory school or two-year colleges are also considered prospective student-athletes.

What Can You Do?

If you know of a high school or junior college student-athlete who might want to attend the UW, the only permissible activity for a representative is to call the appropriate UW coach.

Extra Benefit Rule

A representative of UW athletics interests cannot provide an "extra benefit" to a prospective or enrolled student-athlete. An extra benefit is any special arrangement by an institutional employee or a booster to provide for a student-athlete or a student-athlete's friend or relative a benefit not expressly authorized by NCAA legislation. Some examples of prohibited activities are:

- a) providing gifts or reduced cost services;
- b) providing a loan, or arranging for or co-signing a loan;

c) employing relatives or friends of a prospective student-athlete as an inducement for the enrollment of the prospect;

d) providing use of an automobile;

e) providing rent-free or reduced-rent housing;

f) providing tickets to an athletic, institutional or community event;

g) entertaining or contacting a prospective student-athlete or a prospective student-athlete's family on or off campus;

h) offering student-athletes, or their relatives or friends, the opportunity to purchase items, even at face value, not adequately publicized as available for sale to the general public; or

i) promising to provide any of the above.

According to NCAA rules, the University of Wisconsin Athletic Department reserves the right to withhold any benefit or privilege associated with their athletic department (i.e., booster clubs, ticket privileges, etc.) from individuals that are involved in a violation of NCAA legislation.

Employment

A representative of athletics interests is permitted to provide employment for student-athletes under the following conditions:

- The student-athlete's compensation can't include any remuneration for value or utility that the student-athlete may have for the employer because of the publicity, reputation, fame or personal following that he or she has obtained because of athletics ability;

- The student-athlete may receive compensation for only work actually performed; and

- The student-athlete's compensation must be at a rate commensurate with the going rate in that locality for similar services.

With more than 700 student-athletes competing at the UW, the Department of Athletics encourages businesses to hire Badger student-athletes. 

Camp Randall Stadium Policies



Conduct Code

In order to keep Wisconsin football games as enjoyable as possible for our fans and their families, we ask that you respect others around you. If a ticket holder's conduct endangers or disrupts players, coaches, officials or other patrons, the University reserves the right to remove the ticket holder from the premises. No refund will be made in such cases. Stadium violations (body passing, throwing objects, and possession of alcohol 21 or older) and object passing may result in a \$181 fine.

Smoke-Free Facility

Smoking is prohibited in all state-owned buildings, including Camp Randall Stadium. Designated smoking areas are located within the stadium perimeter.

Entry / No Re-entry

Please enter the gate printed on your ticket to allow for the most efficient entry to the stadium. Gates open 90 minutes prior to kick off. Fans may not leave the stadium and then re-enter during the game. If an emergency arises, check with gate security.

Express Lines

Fans are encouraged not to bring any carry-ins. Fans with no carry-ins will enjoy the use of Express Lines at all gates, with the exception of the student entrance at Gate 5.

Alcohol

No alcohol may be brought into the Stadium. Possession may result in police arrest and a fine of \$181. The fine for first offense for underage possession/consumption of alcohol is \$243.

Guest Services Center

For general game day information, visit the Guest Services Center located under Section YZ, in the south end zone concourse.

Emergencies

In the event of a medical emergency, immediately notify a security guard, usher, police officer or paramedic in your area. UW Health First Aid Stations are located in the upper deck at Section FF, in the 5th level concourse behind Section T, and under Section YZ in the south end zone concourse.

In case of an emergency it is possible to contact a patron during a game if you know their exact seat location by calling (608) 265-8676. No announcements will be made over the stadium sound system.

Lost and Found

If you lose an article on game day, please go to the Guest Services Center located under Section YZ, in the south end zone concourse, or call (608) 265-8676. For lost-and-found inquiries on non-game days, please call or visit the Camp Randall Welcome Center in Kellner Hall (608-262-1866).

Items Not Permitted

For the safety and security of all patrons, certain items are prohibited, including, but not limited to: any food or beverage items, cans, bottles, coolers, thermoses, backpacks (gym, duffel and tote), luggage, strollers, laser pointers, banners, flags, signs, noisemakers, weapons, balloons, beach balls or umbrellas. All patrons entering Camp Randall Stadium are subject to search. Storage facilities are not available for checking prohibited items.



Vern Woodward was one of seven inductees of the class of 2007 into the University of Wisconsin Athletic Hall of Fame in August. Woodward competed for two seasons, 1936 and 1937, in the heavyweight division at Wisconsin. He won the All-University Title during his time as a Badger student-athlete.

Following his successful Badger boxing career, from 1938-1956, Woodward mentored youth through a program called 'Little Badger Boxers.' This program taught self-defense, self-discipline, and self-worth to youth in the Madison area.

In 1947, Woodward rejoined the Badger family, becoming an assistant boxing coach at UW. He held this position until 1958 when he was named head coach. At the helm of the Badger Boxing program, Woodward's teams won 8 NCAA team titles. Woodward also coached 36 individual NCAA champions while at Wisconsin.

In 1959, Woodward became President of the Intercollegiate Boxing Coaches Association. In 1975, the Wisconsin Association of Boxing Officials and Coaches named Woodward 'Man of the Year.' In 1988, Woodward was named to the National AAU Boxing Hall of Fame.

The National W Club is a proud sponsor of the University of Wisconsin-Madison Athletic Hall of Fame. The National W Club is the UW's letter winner organization. All former Badger student athletes are eligible to

Dayne's Dazzling Dozen

Coming up with a list of former Badger running back Ron Dayne's most memorable games at Wisconsin is like trying to name the most memorable of the Boston Celtics' 16 NBA titles or the most noteworthy of the New York Yankees' 26 World Series titles. First, there are too many from which to choose. And, secondly, how do you compare one to another?

Nonetheless, we're a society that loves to compare and rank players, teams and performances. So, as we count down toward today's official number retirement, we thought we'd have a little fun with this and try to come up with a list of a dozen of the 1999 Heisman Trophy winner's "Most Memorable Performances" as a Badger.

This list, along with more details from each game, also appears on uwdraggers.com.

12. Oct. 24, 1998 - UW 31, Iowa 0

Dayne rushed for 164 yards and a touchdown on 39 carries to lead Wisconsin to its first win at Iowa since 1974.

11. Sept. 28, 1996 - Penn State 23, UW 20

Dayne burst upon the national scene as a true freshman with his 23-carry, 129-yard, two-touchdown performance against 3rd-ranked Penn State on ABC.

10. Sept. 13, 1997 - UW 56, San Jose St. 10

Dayne rushed for 170 yards in the first quarter, including an 80-yard touchdown on the first play from scrimmage, en route to 254 yards and three TDs on the ground. He averaged an astounding 12.7 yards per carry for the game.

9. Dec. 27, 1996 - UW 38, Utah 10

Dayne finished his freshman campaign in style, running for a Copper Bowl-record 246 yards and winning bowl MVP honors. It allowed him to end the 1996 campaign with a Big Ten-record 2,109 rushing yards (bowl game included), eclipsing the old conference mark of 2,066 yards set by Michigan State's Lorenzo White in 1985.

8. Jan. 1, 2000 - UW 17, Stanford 9

Dayne took home his second consecutive Rose Bowl MVP award, rushing 34 times for 200 yards and a touchdown.

7. Nov. 9, 1996 - UW 45, Minnesota 28


Dayne carried the ball a school-record 50 times, accounting for 297 yards and three touchdowns. In the first half, the Badgers handed the ball to Dayne on 31 of their 41 plays. "That young kid's special," Badger head coach Barry Alvarez said after the game. "He's just starting. He's got a lot of playing time left. As long as he keeps nodding to me, I know he's OK. He's pretty durable. I didn't think at any time he was tired."

6. Nov. 30, 1996 - UW 59, Hawaii 10

Dayne entered the Badgers' game with Hawaii needing just 93 yards to become the NCAA's all-time leading freshman rusher. He got that and then some, setting the school record for rushing yards in a game with 339 on just 36 carries (he didn't play in the fourth quarter).

5. Oct. 2, 1999 - UW 42, Ohio State 17

Trailing No. 12 Ohio State 17-6 at the half, Dayne was instrumental in the Badgers' comeback, carrying the ball 21 times for 125 yards and scoring four touchdowns during the second half.



4. Nov. 6, 1999 - UW 28, Purdue 21

UW clinched at least a share of the Big Ten title with this win over No. 17 Purdue. Dayne helped the Badgers control the clock and keep Purdue's high-octane offense off the field by running for 222 yards and a touchdown on 32 carries.

3. Oct. 23, 1999 - UW 40, Michigan St. 10

11th-ranked MSU entered the game with the No. 1 rushing defense in the country. Not after this game. Dayne carved up the Spartans' defense for 214 yards and two touchdowns on 34 carries.

2. Jan. 1, 1999 - UW 38, UCLA 31

UW entered the 1999 Rose Bowl as decided underdogs against No. 6 UCLA. Dayne dominated the game, though, rushing for 246 yards (one shy of the Rose Bowl record) and four touchdowns to lead the Badgers to the upset.

1. Nov. 13, 1999 - UW 41, Iowa 3

It doesn't get much better than this. On an unusually warm mid-November day, Dayne rushes for 216 yards, becoming college football's all-time leading rusher with a 31-yard carry in the second quarter. For good measure, the Badgers clinch the Big Ten title and a return trip to the Rose Bowl.


