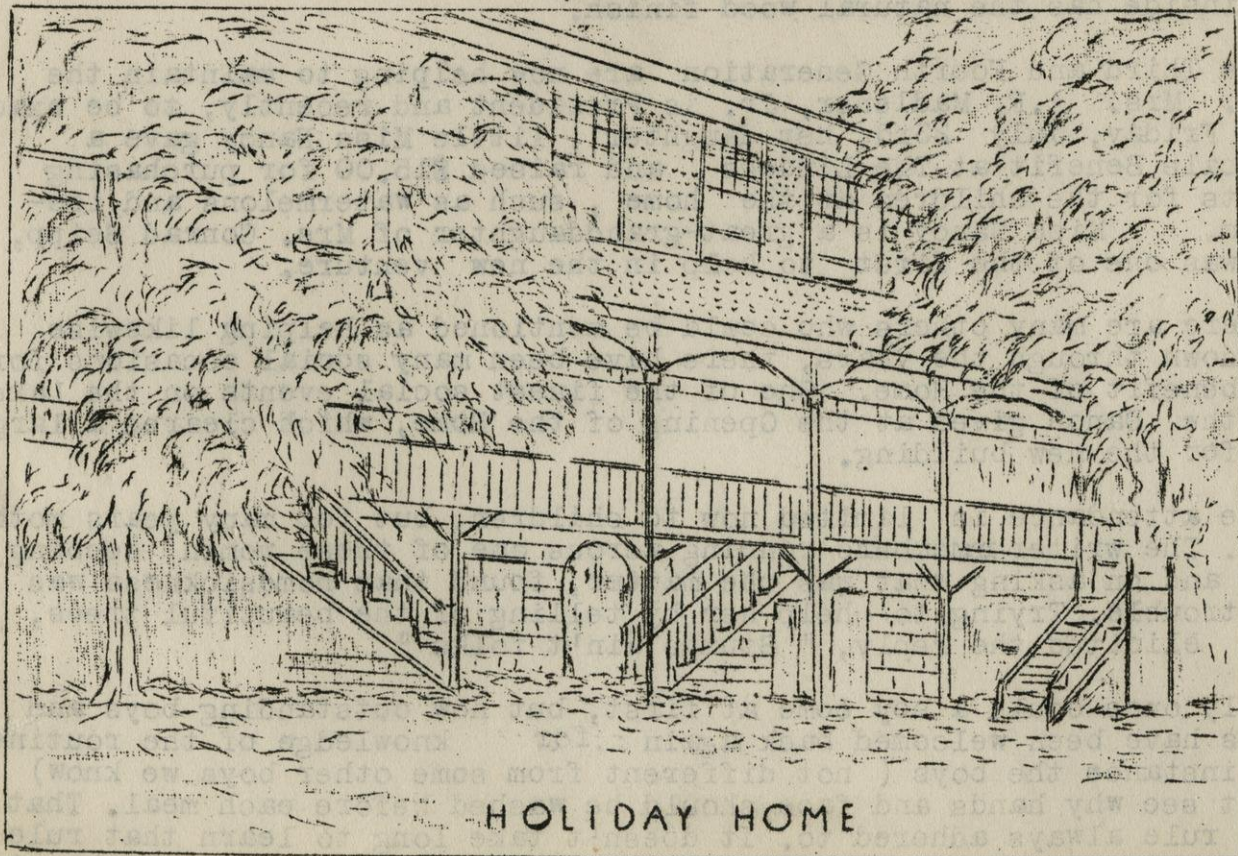

HOLIDAY HOME

THEY ARE SHARING LAKE GENEVA

Maybe this isn't just the way that group of women who were with Mrs. Edward E. Ayer on a cruise of Lake Geneva fifty years ago would have expressed the idea that came to them when the guardian angel of Chicago's poor children whispered into Mrs. Ayer's ear "Why not share our lovely, cool and peaceful lake with the poor, underprivileged of the big city?" Just which one of the ladies with Mrs. Ayer thought of the idea first is not known, but Mrs. J.S. Rumsey and Mrs. John R. Wilson caught the spirit at once and together they planned for a meeting to which several other lake shore ladies were invited and Mrs. S.W. Allerton was the hostess.

Some who were at that first meeting (the editor would like the complete list) were Mrs. Thos Withrow, Mrs. Buckingham Sturges, Mrs. Chas. French, Mrs. N.K. Fairbank, Mrs. W.S. Mc Crea, Mrs. George Parker, Mrs. Ayer, Mrs. Wilson and Mrs. Rumsey, besides the hostess.

Most of the ladies had some connection with Chicago's Social Settlements or organizations working with the underprivileged and had first hand information as to the great benefit which would accrue to a tired mother, boy of the street or little girl who had grown prematurely old caring for the flock even younger than she.

Next year Holiday Home will celebrate its 50 th season of work for it did not take long for such a group to get started and ready for the boys and girls.

The Committee on Buildings planned well for after the half century it serves the needs very satisfactorily. It was well constructed and inside has the natural wood finish.

The Third and Fourth Generation are now helping to maintain the work. Mrs. A.F. Madlener, Jr. is President and recently, to be exact last Friday, July 23rd, her daughter, little Miss Nancy gave a Musicales Benefit at The Lindens and raised \$15.00 for purchasing treats for the children at the home, such as watermelons and ice-cream. Miss Nancy is a great-granddaughter of Mrs. Conrad Seipp, who was one of the first to help in the new venture.

There are many others who could be mentioned as helping likewise for down through the years, there have been many social occasions for the benefit of the Home. One of the finest social events on the Lake was the Dance given at the Opening of the Home, which cleared a large sum for the new building.

The attendance is limited now to children, but for many years mothers came. The writer remembers running across one of these women sobbing away and on asking what was the matter, found that homesickness was the trouble. Trying to help her by telling of the beautiful trees, etc. elicited the reply, "Stumps ain't folks"

Only once could a boy come at first, but now outstanding boys and girls have been welcomed back again for knowledge of the routine. For instance the boys (not different from some other boys we know) can't see why hands and face should be washed before each meal. That is a rule always adhered to. It doesn't take long to learn that rule especially if one of the last year's group puts them all wise to it.

The personnel of Holiday Home has numbered during the years many who

have gained renown in social work as most all employed have been college boys or girls with inclination toward social work.

Not often does Holiday Home have the same superintendent for as many years as during the seven years Mr. S.E. Le Gault has been on the staff. It happens that Mr. Le Gault is on the Physical Director's Staff of Northwestern University and has his summers free to help in this work. He is ably assisted by his wife. Others forming the staff are a cook and assistant, seven counsellors, nurse, laundress, night watchman and superintendent of grounds.

The children are selected by various welfare agencies and Sunday school who send the lists to the Home. Transportation on train and boat are furnished each one. On arriving they change clothes to suits or dresses furnished by the Home and hang their own at the head of their cots. Clothing needing attention is repaired. Money brought with them can be banked and drawn out for the semi-weekly trips to town.

There are four dormitory rooms, each with a name, Wren, Robin, Lark and Eagle and there is keen rivalry between these rooms. There is a banner with which goes special privileges for the day for the room which passes highest on inspection. The boys and girls make their own beds. The dishes are also washed by the boys and girls (taking turns).

Punishment is given by taking away privileges. If you happen to see a boy cleaning up the yard or sitting on a stairs by himself you can bet he is being punished. Very few have to be sent home.

The religious life isn't neglected but one's religion is respected. Catholics go to Fontana. The protestants have their own service at the home.

Every precaution is taken against fire. Each room has three exits and outside stairs front and back. The night watchman is ever alert and fire drills are held for each group. The buildings can be cleared in a minute.

Good times are had by every group. Swimming, Games, Hikes, Nature Study, Camp Fires, Stunt Night are the order for all groups.

Sharing one's garden has been the order on most all Lake Geneva Estates for all the years. Many plant extra rows of corn, etc. for the Home.

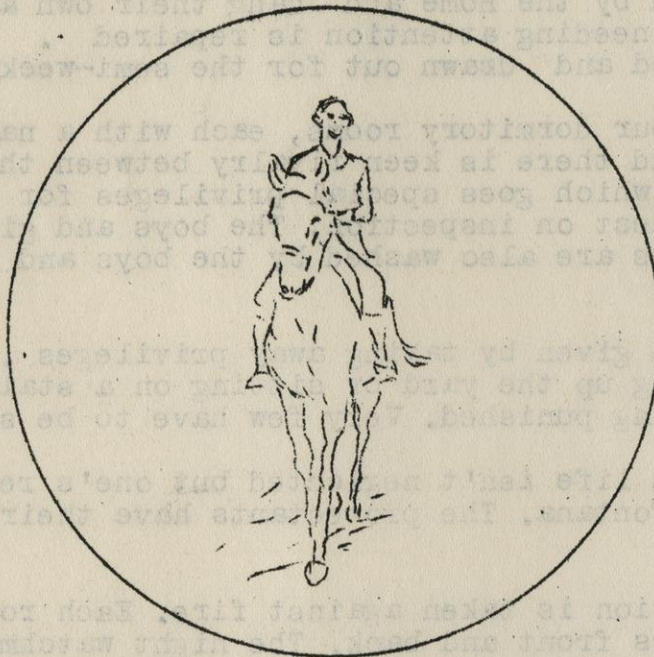

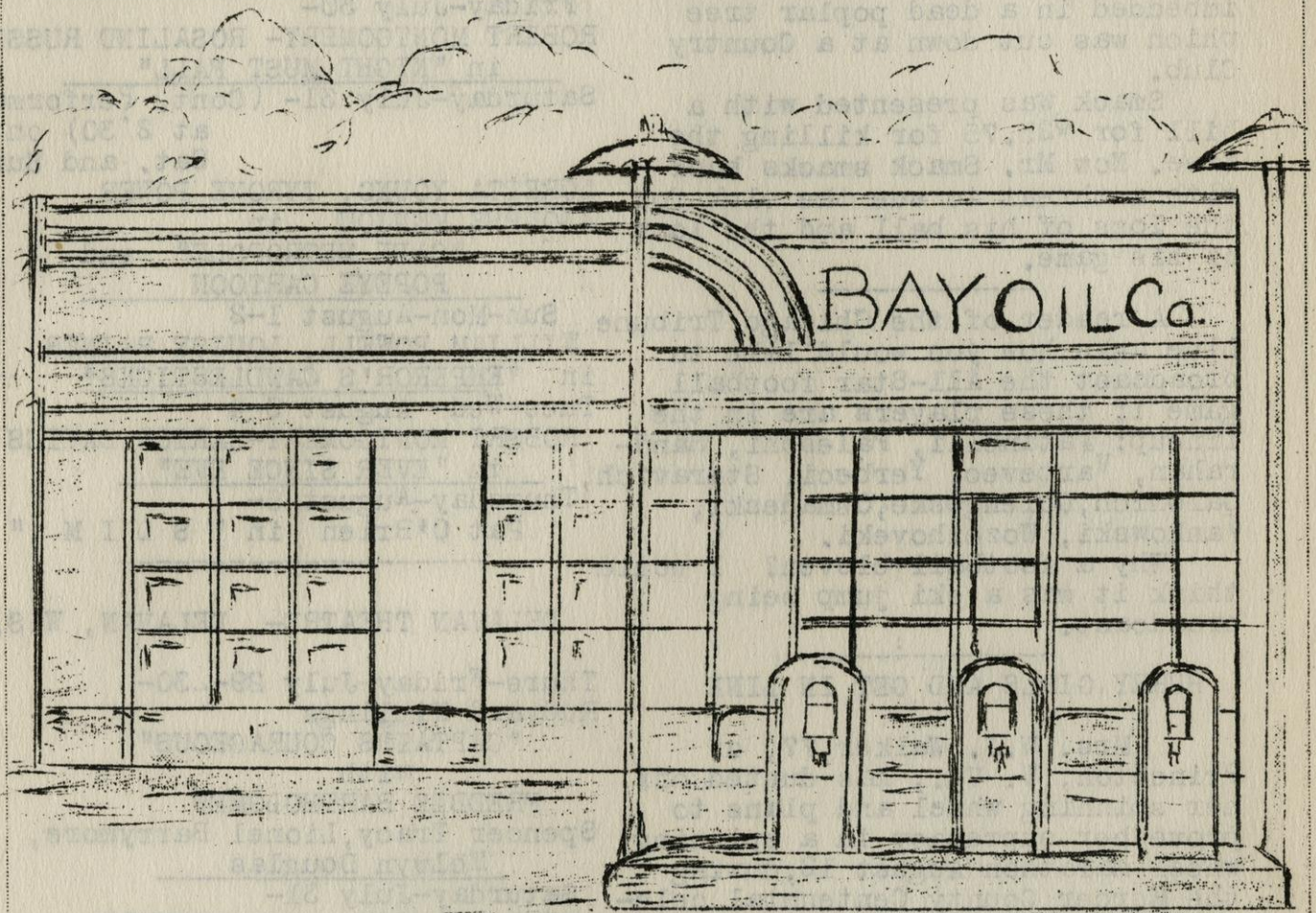

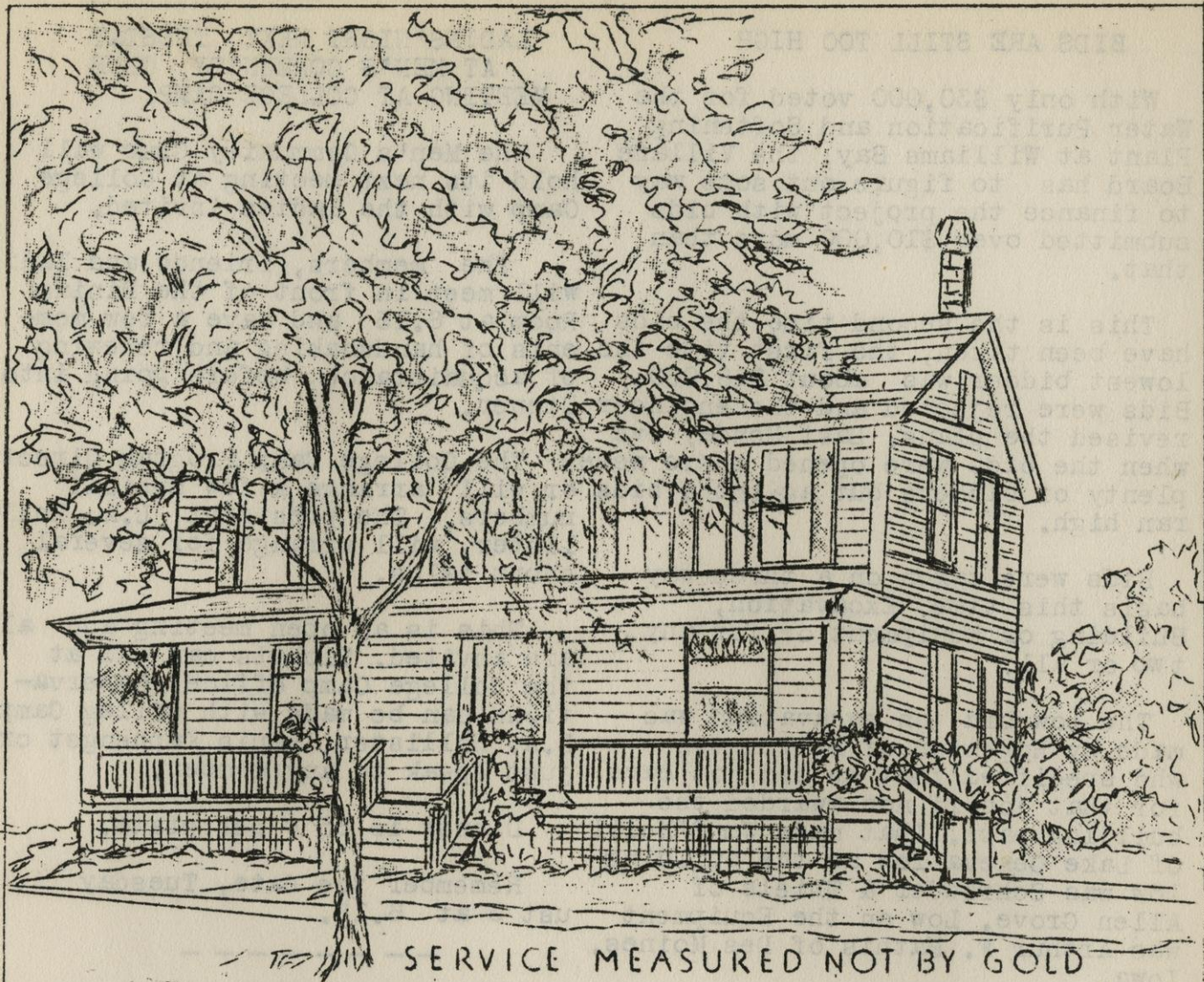

BIDS ARE STILL TOO HIGH

With only \$30,000 voted for the Water Purification and Softening Plant at Williams Bay, the Village Board has to figure out some way to finance the project with bids submitted over \$10,000 more than that.

This is the second time the bids have been taken, the first time the lowest bidder was about \$48,000. Bids were rejected and the engineer revised the plans. Last Monday eve when the bids were opened there were plenty of bidders but again the bids ran high.

Bids were taken on a three-way basis this time. Excavation, Building or Equipment or for any two or all.

The low bid on excavating was made by Hoganson of Burlington who specified that he did not care for that job if not awarded the building part. That made Wm O'Neill of Lake Geneva low as the building low was Schroeder & Thiele of Allen Grove. Low on the Equipment was Arthur F. Mathis of Des Moines, Iowa.

Adding all low bids makes a total of \$48,145.00.

The Board adjourned until Thursday night, July 29 to make a study of the plans and ways and means of financing.

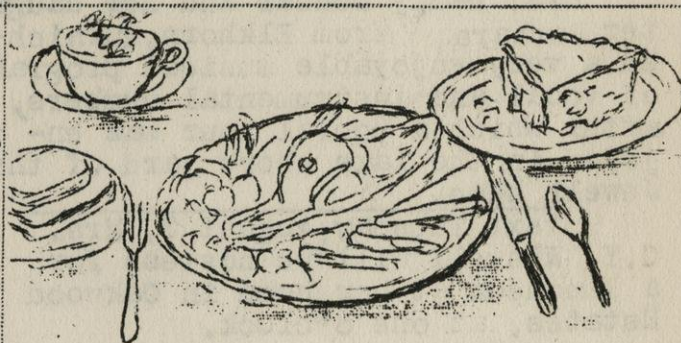

A quilt show is to be held in Lake Geneva the week of Thursday, August 5, at Horticultural Hall. It is to be a display under the sponsorship of the Women's Club. Mrs. Christy Madison is Chairman.

DIM YOUR HEADLIGHTS

The following bill has recently passed both houses of the Wisconsin Legislature by unanimous vote and has been signed by the governor-

"Whereas, more than 85 per cent of highway accidents occur at dark and a great number of these accidents are due directly to the failure of owners and operators of motor vehicles to properly equip such vehicles with lights or to properly operate the motor vehicle lights as provided by law: and

"WHEREAS, Section 85.06 (2) (a) of the Wisconsin statutes provides that every motor vehicle shall be equipped with at least two headlights in good working order which shall display a white light of sufficient illuminating power under normal atmospheric conditions to reveal a person, vehicle or substantial object 200 feet ahead of the headlight; and

"WHEREAS, Section 85.06 (2) (h) of the Wisconsin statutes provides that an operator of a motor vehicle on the highways when approaching and about to pass another person operating a motor vehicle traveling in the opposite direction shall dim, depress, or tilt the front headlights of his motor vehicle so that the rays projected therefrom will not blind the person whom such driver is approaching and about to pass, and that sufficient light shall be maintained to see object 75 feet ahead of the vehicle; and therefore, be it

"RESOLVED, by the assembly, the senate concurring, that all sheriffs, county and local traffic officers in this state be and

they are hereby requested and directed forthwith, by whatever methods they may deem proper and effective, to rigidly enforce the provisions of section 85.06 of the Wisconsin statutes relating to lights and dimming or depressing of lights on motor vehicles, as a means of lessening accidents on the public highways in Wisconsin."

Failure to properly dim or depress automobile headlights on the highway is punishable by a fine of from \$10 to \$100.

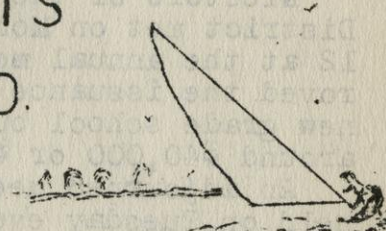

NEWS AROUND THE LAKE

The Lake Geneva Yacht Club made off with top honors, winning two firsts in the opening day's events in the Inland Lakes invitational regatta for cup boats at the Oconomowoc Lake club course last Saturday.

In the morning race, Scorpio, a Lake Geneva entry, piloted by Ross tarrant, finished in the lead, covering the six mile course in 2 hours, 6 minutes, 10 seconds, and in the afternoon duplicated his feat by crossing the finish line in 1 hour, 50 minutes and 35 seconds.

Bruce Adams won the "E" boat race on Sunday, July 25. This was the first race to be sailed on a Sunday for the past three weeks owing to a lack of wind, but there was plenty of wind last Sunday for the races.

Both the "A" and "C" boat races were called off on Saturday due to lack of wind.

Electors of the Fontana School District met on Monday night, July 12 at the annual meeting and approved the issuance of bonds for a new grade school building to cost around \$40,000 or \$50,000.

An adjourned meeting will be held on Tuesday evening, August 3, at which time definite plans will be ready for consideration. The new building will probably be built on the present site but further up the hill.
