# MINUTES OF THE ANNUAL MEETING of the BOARD OF REGENTS OF THE UNIVERSITY OF WISCONSIN SYSTEM

## Madison, Wisconsin

## Held in the Clarke Smith Room, 1820 Van Hise Hall Friday, June 10, 1977 9:02 A.M.

#### President McNamara presiding

President McNamara introduced and welcomed to the Board of Regents Marilyn Fitzgerald, Platteville, and David E. Beckwith, Milwaukee.

Upon motion by Regent Lavine, seconded by Regent Hales, it was VOTED, That the minutes of the meeting of the Board of Regents of the University of Wisconsin System held on April 15, 1977, be approved as sent out to the Regents.

REPORT OF THE PRESIDENT OF THE BOARD

Regent Neshek moved adoption of the following resolution, the motion was seconded by Regent Lavine, and it was voted:

Resolution 1453: WHEREAS, Caroline T. Sandin of Ashland is leaving this Board after serving for nine years as a Regent of the University of Wisconsin and of the University of Wisconsin System, and

> WHEREAS, in addition to the valuable contributions she has made as a member of these governing boards and as a member of the Education Committee of this board, Mrs. Sandin took time from her responsibilities as the wife of a physician and mother of seven children to serve the cause of education as president for eight years of the Ashland Board of Education and on committees of the Wisconsin School Boards Association and the State Department of Public Instruction,

BE IT RESOLVED, that the Board of Regents expresses appreciation to Caroline T. Sandin for her wise counsel, commends her for her devoted and distinguished service to the citizens of Wisconsin, and grants to her the status of Regent Emerita.

Regent Neshek moved adoption of the following resolution, and the motion was seconded by Regent Beckwith:

Resolution 1454: WHEREAS, Frank J. Pelisek of Milwaukee served eight years as a Regent of the University of Wisconsin and the University of Wisconsin System, and

> WHEREAS, he had a leading role in the establishment and early direction of the University System, serving as a member of the statutory Merger Implementation Committee, as chairman of a special committee which drafted the implementation law, as vice president of the new Board of Regents and as the Board's second president, from 1973 to 1975, and

WHEREAS, his experience and skill as an attorney, state government adviser and civic leader contributed much to the rise of this Board and University System to national prominence in higher education,

BE IT RESOLVED, that his fellow Regents thank and commend Jack Pelisek for his dedicated and outstanding service and leadership on the governing boards of the former University of Wisconsin and the present University of Wisconsin System and grant him the status of Regent Emeritus.

Regent DeBardeleben made the following statement: "I too would like to join in the second of this, and I suspect there are many other members of the Board who would. I think that this resolution really does not do justice to the contributions that Jack Pelisek has made to the University of Wisconsin System and the State of Wisconsin. I've been on this Board with many differing viewpoints on things from those held by Jack Pelisek, and I continued to differ with him on many things throughout the time that we served together. I came to respect him as a person of extraordinary ability and dedication, and I would like to have these remarks made a part of the record."

The question was put on Resolution 1454, and it was voted.

Vice President Neshek assumed the Chair.

President McNamara moved adoption of the following resolution, the motion was seconded by several Regents, and it was voted:

Resolution 1455: That in recognition of his countless and immeasurable contributions to the people of this State as the first president of the University of Wisconsin System, the members of this Board salute, commend and thank John Carrier Weaver for his devoted and courageous leadership during a period of historic transition in higher education administration in Wisconsin, and hereby authorize and approve his change of status from System President and Professor to President Emeritus and John H. Lathrop Professor in the UW System, together with continuance of his professorships at UW-Madison, UW-Milwaukee and UW-Green Bay. The Regents further grant him a leave of absence for academic year 1977-78. Vice President Neshek called for nominations for the office of the President of the Board of Regents. Regent Walter nominated Bertram N. McNamara, and the nomination was seconded by Regent DeBardeleben and Regent Fish.

Regent Gerrard nominated Edward E. Hales, and the nomination was seconded by Regents Lavine and Grover.

The vote by secret ballot resulted in nine votes for Regent Hales, seven votes for Regent McNamara, and Regent Hales was therefore declared President of the Board effective July 1, 1977.

President McNamara resumed the Chair.

President McNamara called for nominations for the position of Vice President of the Board of Regents of the University of Wisconsin System.

Regent DeBardeleben nominated Joyce Erdman for Vice President, and the nomination was seconded by Regent Walter.

Regent Grover nominated Milton Neshek, and the motion was seconded by Regents Lawton and Fish.

The vote by secret ballot resulted in ten votes for Regent Neshek and six votes for Regent Erdman. Regent Neshek was declared Vice President of the Board for the term beginning July 1, 1977.

President McNamara called for nominations for the positions of Secretary and Trust Officer; Assistant Secretary and Assistant Trust Officer; and Assistant Trust Officer. Regent Lawton nominated Joseph Holt for the positions of Secretary and Trust Officer, Robert Winter for the positions of Assistant Secretary and Assistant Trust Officer, and Charles Stathas for the position of Assistant Trust Officer, the nominations were seconded by Regent Gerrard, and they were voted unanimously on a voice vote.

The report of the Higher Educational Aids Board meeting held on May 13, 1977, was received for the record. (EXHIBIT A, attached)

Professor Robert Baruch stated The Association of University of Wisconsin Faculties would like to join with the Board in commending President Weaver for his service to the University System, and that at the last delegate assembly a resolution was approved unanimously commending him for his service. He stated TAUWF would also like to welcome the new President of the System, Edwin Young, and assure him of their continued cooperation as President of the UW System.

President McNamara stated the recommendation of a change in the status and role of the Board of Visitors comes as a recommendation from President-elect Young and is concurred in by President Weaver and Vice Presidents Smith and Percy. He recalled that at the time of merger the matter of whether or not to continue

the Board of Visitors came up, and because of more pressing matters it was continued in its old role as an agency of the Board of Regents, with the understanding that it would concern itself primarily with the Madison and Milwaukee campuses and peripherally with those two-year institutions that had formerly been a part of the Madison Campus. As merger became more complete, the role of the Board of Visitors became something of an anomaly in that it appeared to be a special arrangment for some campuses, but not for others. He continued that a system-wide Board of Visitors seems unwise and would be upsetting to some existing organizations on some campuses. Fifteen individual Boards, appointed by and answering to the Regents, would be cumbersome and would be difficult to coordinate and administer. He stated it seemed the wisest course to return the Boards back to their original purpose, which was an arm of the chancellor, appointed by him and working with him. Those campuses which have Boards could continue them and those that wanted to have them as new organizations could do so. He said he understood that the present Board of Visitors would become the Board of the Madison Campus and the other institutions could select their own. For the information of the members of the Board, President McNamara reviewed the similar organizations now in existence on various campuses.

Regent Neshek moved adoption of the following resolution, and the motion was seconded by Regent Erdman:

That previous resolutions relating to the establishment, composition and duties of the Board of Visitors be rescinded; and, that each Chancellor be authorized to appoint an appropriate Board of Visitors.

Regent Erdman requested that the minutes reflect that we would urge the campuses which do not have advisory boards, or friends of the campus, or some kind of citizens'board, to consider the type of friendly organization which they would like associated with their campus, because these groups are effective in many kinds of ways - - in approaching legislators, in fund raising, in the classroom, in raising the intellectual quality of the community, and in cultural matters; so this should be encouraged on all campuses.

Regent DeBardeleben stated that he was opposed to the resolution because he felt it is philosophically wrong and is going to lead to an impairment -- a diminution of quality in the UW System. He continued that he believed the statement that in the original concept the Board of Visitors is an arm of the Chancellor is incorrect. The Board of Visitors originally, at least with respect to the Madison Campus, was jointly appointed by the Governor and the Board of Regents, and it was a Board that was created to report to the Board of Regents. He continued that the philosophical basis for the Board of Visitors is that there should be a citizens' board of inquiry which has the power to go into the various departments of the University, to visit classes if they choose to do so and investigating what is going on from a lay standpoint. He continued that it is a citizens' board of inquiry which does not have the power to intermeddle in academic affairs, but has the power to look around and make a report to the Board of Governors, which is this Board. If you say that the Board of Visitors is going to be an arm of the Chancellor, where is the citizens'board of inquiry input? There is none, so far as this Board is concerned, except insofar as the Chancellor may feel that a report from the Board of Visitors should come to the attention of this Board. He stated he believed the Board of Visitors of the UW-Madison have been a valuable institution. He stated he did not mean to impugn any chancellor in saying this, but that he felt the function of the Board, the philosophical function, is to report to this Board the results of its investigations.

Regent Erdman stated this is the first time she had heard this viewpoint presented, noting that she had read the minutes of the Board of Visitors for two years, and had seen them fulfill a function far different from that described by Regent DeBardeleben. She continued that she had never seen in the minutes a reflection of classroom inquiry; rather they are lectured to by Nobel Prize winners, they are taken to the Milwaukee campuses where they are given tours, look at the library, etc. She said they have a general overview for which there is not at all a classroom basis. She continued that we had heard a splendid report from President Brewster of the Board of Visitors a year ago in which he suggested they would follow the lines of inquiry of what research was being done on the Madison and Milwaukee campuses, and they followed up in a friendly, non-probing kind of fashion. Regent DeBardeleben stated he was not suggesting or advocating that the Board of Visitors visit classrooms, but that he meant that this is within their power, and perhaps the fact that we haven't heard a critical report means they haven't found anything that needs to be criticized. He stated the tradition has been to ask them to investigate certain subjects, but not to act as press agents.

Regent Lavine stated that he was sure Chancellor Young and Chancellor Baum would not make a suggestion of this sort if they did not feel it was appropriate. He stated he had served on similar boards prior to becoming a Regent and they had made inquiries as well as looking into things on a request basis. He said he felt these boards are valuable, but now that we have a merged system we have a responsibility across the entire System, and that the proposal ought to stand on its merits. Chancellor Young stated that following one university campus is about all that one lay board can do. He stated that one could argue that the Board should report to the Regents, but that if there is to be one Board of Visitors reporting to the Regents, it probably ought to cover the entire System. He stated he agreed philosophically with Regent DeBardeleben as far as reporting and felt that the Board should not be a sort of handmaiden of the Chancellor.

Regent Fish stated there is no clear delineation of the duties of the Board of Visitors except what someone has told them, and since merger each President has told them that they were to look after the affairs of the Madison and Milwaukee Campuses primarily, and not concern themselves with other campuses. Regent Fish agreed with Regent DeBardeleben that when the Board of Visitors was established the Governor and the Board of Regents shared the appointments to the Board of Visitors and it covered the old Chapter 36 institutions, Parkside, Green Bay, Milwaukee, and Madison. During the discussion on merger, the Board of Visitors portion of the statute was left in existence, but it was not determined how they would function in relation to a thirteen campus system, as compared to a four campus system. He recalled that when that matter came before this Board it was suggested that the Board of Visitors be detailed to the campuses at Milwaukee and Madison. He stated he objected because he believed the Board of Visitors should represent all of the campuses if it was to stay in existence. He stated he had talked to members of the Board of Visitors and they indicated there is no way they could do the job at 13 campuses. He said each campus could have friends of the campus or whatever they may be designated and where a situation so justified, the Board of Visitors could take what steps were necessary in the fields of inquiry and information to this Board as required. He said he was uncomfortable with the Board of Visitors being responsible for just two campuses, Madison and Milwaukee, and was uncomfortable now, because in essence we are just eliminating the Board of Visitors and we are eliminating a group of citizens, lay people, that really have been historically charged with assisting the Regents. He said he did not know how the Board of Visitors can function with thirteen campuses, that he did not like the way it was, and was not satisfied with this so-called compromise.

Regent Johnson stated the present system is unworkable. If this should pass, he felt it would be well that the various chancellors and campuses take note of the remarks made here and that he felt they could stimulate greater interest. Regent Beckwith stated that he supported the position of Regent DeBardeleben. He said some of us will not see it as necessary or appropriate for the Board of Visitors to fulfill an audit function, but it may be appropriate at some times. He continued that we should not in effect eliminate that function, and that we do so by having the Board of Visitors become, in effect, appointees of the chancellor. Regent Gerrard observed that we ought to hold this over for a month and come back with something more positive than what we have here.

Regent DeBardeleben moved that the motion be tabled, the motion was properly seconded, and it was voted.

President McNamara recognized Anthony Brewster, President of the Board of Visitors. Mr. Brewster indicated that he spoke for himself, not for the entire Board of Visitors. He stated the Board of Visitors, as presently constituted, have one overwhelming desire and that is to serve in any fashion that the Board of Regents may determine. He said if the Board has been circumspect it is because it has a problem of a definition of what it is supposed to do. He recalled the Board of Visitors was created in 1836 but never met. In 1856 it was recreated to provide an independent citizen body to investigate and examine curriculum, discipline, and teaching, and to report annually. That worked for twenty years and in 1876 it was reorganized to include three Regents plus a citizen representative from each congressional district. The mission was to attend examinations, make suggestions in regard to teaching, curriculum, discipline, and to point up the various needs perceived as a result to the Regents. In 1912 the Board of Visitors was again reorganized to include twelve members, three appointed by the Governor, three by the Regents, and six by the Alumni Association for six-year terms. In 1971 it was again reorganized, with fourteen members appointed by the Regents. He stated that there is a need to define what role, if any, the Board of Regents wishes the Visitors to play. He said the Visitors will serve in any capacity desired. Mr. Brewster said that he did not believe it makes a great deal of sense to have a systemwide Board of Visitors because doing so would be acting in a manner contrary to the spirit of merger and you might well be creating a body that would be competitive and would not serve the System nor any one else. He said it would be a monster that would not inure to the benefit of anybody. He continued that on the other end of the spectrum might be a far more limited Board of Visitors that can shape itself in terms of the particular needs of a particular institution. He conceded that in so doing you might create a series of feudal states, but somewhere between the systemwide and the highly particularized boards lies the area of enlightened inquiry. He asked that the Board of Regents be mindful of the fact that at least on the existing Board it no longer concerns itself principally with bird baths, and that if it has come to a higher visibility, it is because it has undertaken tasks that are helpful to the Board of Regents and which the Board cannot undertake itself because of the heavy weight and burden carried by the Board of Regents. He noted that in Wisconsin there are a great number of people that stand ready to serve and this is a resource that should not be overlooked. He said the principal request of the Board of Visitors is that the Regents decide what they wish the Visitors to do, and the reasonable needs of the chancellors of the outlying campuses are a very significant part of any consideration.

Regent Lawton inquired as to the attendance record of the Visitors. Mr. Brewster responded that when he first came on the Board in 1972 he was made aware of the fact that enormous resources of the University were aimed at entertaining a particular group once a month, and much as he loved the University, he did not need that kind of entertainment. He said they are changing that focus and that for himself and an increasing number of the Visitors there is a commitment for at least a day and a half a month of preparation and reflection prior to each meeting. Regent Gerrard stated that he felt the problem of attendance is a reflection on the Board of Regents. He said he did not feel that we have given them directions and they therefore do not feel needed at the meetings because of a lack of purpose. Mr. Brewster stated that the Visitors' mission assignment has become clouded as to where they should go and how far. He noted that in the recent past the Board of Visitors as presently constituted has considered early registration, early examinations, a recommendation prior to merger for the inclusion in the University family on a more significant basis of the Green Bay and Parkside Campuses, the elimination of hours for women in residence halls, the reflection of public attitudes toward the University System and its funding, a movie on the University of Wisconsin at work, and the enrollment study produced under the direction of the Board of Regents. He noted the Visitors are now midstream but treading water on the research report.

Regent Neshek inquired if a series of mini boards are created should they be responsive directly to the Board of Regents or to the various chancellors. Mr. Brewster responded that ultimately everyone is responsible to the Board of Regents. He stated it might be appropriate to consider a Board of Visitors for the Centers, with one member from each area where a Center is located. He said he was highly sympathetic with the chancellors in terms of their need to identify with the local people, and that this can be encompassed in a way that permits citizen input as well as chancellor direction. He added that it also makes sense for there to be a Board of Visitors for Milwaukee and for Madison. He continued that it makes some sense to have a twenty-seven unit reporting system that has some local autonomy, some local flexibility, and some local affirmation, but that is difficult to do on the basis other than the Board of Regents.

Regent Lavine stated that the discussion has been helpful and inquired if there was the possibility of dual reporting to the chancellors and to the Regents. President McNamara thanked Mr. Brewster on behalf of the members of the Board for his most informative report.

President McNamara confirmed that the next meeting of the Board would be held on July 22, 1977.

President McNamara advised the Board that there are two potential vacancies on the University Hospitals Council of Trustees as the terms of Ex-Regent Pelisek and Mr. Thomas Shropshire will expire on August 15, 1977.

President McNamara offered sincere and warmest congratulations to Regent Hales on his election as President of the Board and stated that in his judgment Regent Hales would make an outstanding President, and that he would give his complete support to Regent Hales in his new office.

REPORT OF THE PRESIDENT OF THE SYSTEM

President McNamara, noting that we have formally named President Weaver to the John Lathrop Professorship, asked Dr. Weaver to comment on the historical significance of that Professorship and Dr. Lathrop. President Weaver stated that he welcomed the chance to thank the Board most sincerely for the designation of the John H. Lathrop Professorship, which is new to the University and to the University System and one which to him has special significance and which he hopes will continue to have significance in the future. He noted John H. Lathrop was the first President of the University of Wisconsin and the coincidence that surrounds it is interesting. The University of Missouri was founded in 1839 and the University of Wisconsin in 1849, ten years later. John H. Lathrop was the first President of the University of Missouri and ultimately moved to the frontier town of Madison to become the first President of the University of Wisconsin. President Weaver stated that he had served as the fourteenth President of the University of Missouri and the fifteenth President of the University of Wisconsin. so it is again a case of life coming rather full cycle as the Regents honor him with the Lathrop Chair. He expressed great gratitude to the Board for that honor and a great desire to serve well in that capacity.

Regent Lavine moved adoption of the following resolution, the motion was seconded by Regent Johnson, and it was voted:

Resolution 1456: That the Report of Non-Personnel Actions by Administrative Officers to the Board of Regents and Informational Items Reported for the Regent Record be received for the record; and that actions included in the report be approved, ratified, and confirmed. (EXHIBIT B, attached)

President Weaver called upon Chancellor Lee Sherman Dreyfus for a report on University of Wisconsin-Stevens Point. Chancellor Dreyfus' report consisted of an audiovisual presentation explaining the campus, its faculty, students and mission.

### REPORT OF THE EDUCATION COMMITTEE

The report of the Education Committee was presented by Regent DeBardeleben.

Regent DeBardeleben moved adoption of the following resolution, and the motion was seconded by Regent Walter:

That, upon recommendation of the President of the UW System and the Chancellor of UW-Superior, the UW-Superior faculty policies and procedures document, except for Section UW-Superior 3.06(4), be approved as required under UWS 2.02.

Regent DeBardeleben noted the resolution comes before the Board on a divided vote and gave the following background. The President of the System, the Chancellor and the faculty of UW-Superior recommended that the language appearing in the agenda materials be adopted as Section 3.06(4), which reads as follows: "In cases where the institution has been unable to recommend tenure for a faculty member in his or her sixth year of probationary service for reasons unrelated to the individual's performance or qualifications, the notice of non-renewal as a faculty member shall not prevent the concurrent or subsequent proffer of alternative employment status upon recommendation of the faculty of the employing department and the Chancellor with the consent of the affected person. Such employment is subject to the condition that if such alternative is for more than 50% time and if it involves teaching responsibilities comparable to those previously carried, it may not be extended for a period of more than three years without the proffer of tenure."

Regent DeBardeleben reported Senior Vice President Donald Smith had given a very complete background as to the standards of the AAUP adopted in 1940 and discussed the development of this alternative device, that is the three years added to the seven years of probationary employment as a humane alternative for use when due to fiscal restraints, having nothing to do with professional judgment, it is not possible for a Chancellor to corroborate the tenure recommendation, and it was argued in the Committee meeting that this suggested alternative would preserve the prerogative of an instituion to continue employment for the individual during a period of limited transition and would then result in the granting of tenure. He stated there were two appearances on behalf of the faculty at Superior, namely, Professors Ron Mershart and Michael Behr spoke in support of the proposal, describing it as the policy best serving the interests of faculty members at Superior. They asserted the effect of the proposal was not to extend the probationary period from seven to ten years. Regent DeBardeleben noted there were appearances in opposition to the proposal by Professor David Fellman, UW-Madison, a former national president of AAUP, and by Professor Bruce Black, UW-Oshkosh, who is the current President of AAUP Conference. Regent DeBardeleben reported Professor Fellman pointed out that in his judgment the Administration's proposal violates the AAUP standards in calling for seven years probationary period, and it also is in violation of Section 36.13(2)(b) of the Wisconsin Stats., which provides for a seven year probationary period, and is also in violation of our own rules, Section 3.04, of the Wisconsin Administrative Code, which provides for the seven year probationary period.

Regent DeBardeleben reported Senior Vice President Smith countered with the argument that this was not in fact a violation of the probationary standard because it does not represent a deferral of a determination as to the particular person's qualifications to get tenure, but rather was something that was done in the light of conditions that were beyond the control of the campus or the individual. Regent DeBardeleben said there was extensive discussion of this proposition and questions as to whether this was not indeed unprecedented in higher education in Wisconsin as well as the United States. He said there was discussion of the uniqueness of the Superior situation, of legal, institutional autonomy considerations, and of the effects of the campus declaration of fiscal emergency. Regent DeBardeleben reported the original resolution introduced in the committee meeting, which included the language proposed in Section UW-Superior 3.06(4) quoted above, failed on a vote of 4-1, and that the revised resolution shown above had been approved unanimously.

Regent Lavine stated that he wished to speak in favor of the UW-Superior proposal and that he disagreed with his colleagues on the committee in opposing it. He noted that he had visited the campus and heard a long discussion on this topic, and what they are really trying to say is something we are going to hear a lot of in the next few years as a couple of other campuses are already talking

about this problem. He stated that as he understood it, we face the fact that this campus does not have the flexibility in their budget to do just about anything -they are really down to the barest bones. He said many of us who have spent a lot of time privately and publicly defending tenure are going to have to go through a very careful thought process to separate the defense of tenure and the support of the AAUP principles, and that he did both of these things trying to make the system for tenure real and not simply theoretical. He noted that he had visited the previous day with the AAUP statewide conference held in Madison and it is not true that they say seven years up or out, since members of the national staff of AAUP had advised him that Berkley has an eight year up or out and Princeton has a nine. That is apparently something that a school may decide for itself. He stated Superior is not asking for a change in the seven year rule and will make the hard decisions at the seventh year. He continued that what they are simply saying is what do they do with dramatically changing enrollments, with the possibility, and in some cases the fact, of fully tenure dense departments on the one hand, and on the other hand the institution has spent six or seven years training, upgrading, and helping faculty members gain skills in public service in publishing and teaching, and then we say all that has to go by the board even though that person is competent, because they haven't got a slot they can offer him, but they know a year and a half later someone is up for retirement. Regent Lavine stated they are simply saying we would like a little flexibility because we cannot get it in our budget and are not asking that they can carry those three year things on forever.

Regent DeBardeleben stated that he did not try to go into detail in presenting the arguments that would meet, at least that the opponents of Mr. Lavine's viewpoint would assert would meet his arguments. He stated that in fairness if we are going to reconsider the matter in the depth that the Education Committee did, we ought to hear from everybody, that is, not just Regent Lavine on the details of this thing, because he did not feel it was fair just to get one detailed view or presentation on this matter. He said he recognized that Regent Lavine, for reasons beyond his control, could not be at the Committee meeting, but if we are going to have an indepth discussion, we ought to hear from Professor Fellman and from Professor Black, and perhaps we ought to have a broader discussion from the members of the Committee than we ordinarily would have. Regent Lavine stated that he was under the misapprehension that any Regent has the right, not just as a member of the Committee, as normally happens at this table, to discuss in any depths anything that he supports. Regent DeBardeleben responded that he was not challenging Regent Lavine's right to speak, he merely wanted to make sure that the majority on the Education Committee viewpoint is fairly presented.

Regent Lavine said the question he had was that there are a number of Regents who view this matter with a great deal of seriousness and it would seem that if a full discussion is appropriate for the Board, we ought to have it.

Regent DeBardeleben stated that we do have a statute in this state which says that the probationary period is seven years; we do have an Administrative Code requirement that it be seven years; and we do have a standard of the AAUP professors, admittedly not obligatory on every institution in the country, but one that we have adopted. He said maybe that standard is wrong and it should be changed, but if so, to the majority of the Committee that issue ought to be met forthrightly. He continued that it seemed that the members of the Committee were not persuaded that this is indeed something different from merely extending the probationary period, and that we should not subvert what has seemed for over 30 years to be a sound principle, merely to make an accommodation for one institution. If there is going to be a change in the standard, it ought to be faced that way. He stated there are more important individual academic rights involved here. There are questions of important individual rights, there are questions of whether granting three more years of probationary status does not have, may not have, the effect of chilling the academic freedom of a member of the staff because of his being dependent from year to year on this traumatic decision-is the chancellor going to renew me for another year.

Regent Erdman stated that she felt we should open this up for full discussion inasmuch as the material that the non-members of the Education Committee received did not include much of what Regent DeBardeleben had alluded to. She said any question of tenure is of such vital importance to the entire System that the Board of Regents must hear the total argument before acting. She said she would like to hear from the Superior people, from Vice President Smith, and to hear the complete background before making up her mind.

Senior Vice President Donald Smith suggested that one way of handling the matter might be to amend to read approval of the Superior policies "except for Section UW-Superior 3.06(4), which is tabled for consideration at the July 22 meeting of the Board". He stated there was extended discussion and that he felt members of the Committee and he could summarize and probably speak fairly to it, but it is such a difficult and critical issue that it would be better to hear firsthand from the people who provided testimony to the Committee before making a final decision. Regent Lavine concurred, stating that any time we deal with tenure it would be advisable to have a chance to hear the people originally involved, especially the faculty, since this is a faculty matter.

Regent Beckwith stated that it was his understanding that anyone interested in the matter will be invited to testify at the next meeting of the Board.

With the consent of the maker of the motion, and of the second, the resolution was amended to read as follows:

Resolution 1457: That, upon recommendation of the President of the UW System and (Policy-New) the Chancellor of UW-Superior, the UW-Superior faculty policies and procedures document, except for Section UW-Superior 3.06(4), which is tabled for consideration at the July 22 meeting of the Board, be approved as required under UWS 2.02.

The question was put on Resolution 1457, and it was voted, as amended.

Regent DeBardeleben reported that in the Committee meeting on the previous day there had been a presentation by the Urban Corridor Consortium (Parkside, Milwaukee, Oshkosh, and Green Bay). He reported Associate Vice President Robert Polk introduced Dr. Martine Meyer (consortium coordinator), Vice Chancellor Jerry Anderson (UW-Oshkosh), Vice Chancellor William Walters (UW-Milwaukee), Acting Vice Chancellor John Campbell (UW-Parkside), and Vice Chancellor Werner Prange (UW-Green Bay).

Regent DeBardeleben stated that Senior Vice President Donald Smith had made reports to the Committee as follows:

- (1) Progress Report on System Planning Study of Professional Performing Arts Programs (BFA/MFA/BM/MM)
- (2) Progress Report of the System Advisory Committee on American Ethnic Studies

## (3) Information Report on Academic Changes Approved by Central Administration, 1976-77

Two corrections in the above report were made, as follows:

The indicated change of the UW-Milwaukee Department of Religious Studies to a Department of Comparative Study of Religions is an error. The Department of Religious Studies stands. A new coding for a program in Comparative Study of Religion has been established and should be noted.

At UW-Platteville, the College of Industry and College of Business and Economics are combined into a College of Business, Industry and Communications--not Business, Industry, and Economics.

- (4) Resolution Commending Professor William T. Lenehan, UW-Madison, by the College Writing Association/Wisconsin Association of Departments of English
- (5) Appointment of Basic Skills Task Force
- (6) Information Reports on:
  - (a) Faculty Promotions, Tenure Designations, and Other Changes of Status
  - (b) Emeritus Designations (EXHIBIT C, on file)

Regent DeBardeleben pointed out that the following changes in the list were noted:

Add the name of James J. McNeary (UW-Madison) promoted from Assistant Professor to Associate Professor (T), College of Engineering.

Professors Clarence E. Johnson and David A. Stuiber were deleted from the Madison list since they are also listed under UW-Extension.

The name of Edward F. Obert (UW-Madison) was removed from the Emeritus list since he will not retire this year.

- (7) Faculty Comment re: UWS 5.18 Reappointment Rights: The Association of UW Faculties
- (8) Faculty Comment re: Regent Policy on Tuition Reimbursement for Job Related Course Work (Unclassified Personnel Guideline #8)

Professor Anatole Beck, because of the lateness of the hour, consented that the question on Regent Policy on Tuition Reimbursement for Job Related Course Work be deferred until the next meeting.

Regent DeBardeleben reported Professor John Cummings, UW-Whitewater, Academic Program Director of the Pigeon Lake Field Station Consortium (eleven UW institutions), reviewed the history and activities of the field station operations at Pigeon Lake, Clam Lake, and Taylor Lake, and discussed the reasons for recommending transfer of responsibility for Clam and Taylor Lakes to UW-Stevens Point, keeping the Pigeon Lake facility as a responsibility of the Consortium.

He indicated that UW-Stevens Point has agreed to assume the Clam and Taylor Lake responsibility.

Regent DeBardeleben moved adoption of the following resolution, the motion was seconded by Regent Walter, and it was voted:

Resolution 1458: That, upon recommendation of the President of the UW System and the UW Pigeon Lake Field Station Consortium, Resolution #400 (2-9-73), approving the Articles of Agreement of the Clam Lake-Pigeon Lake Field Station Consortium be rescinded, and that the Articles of Agreement forming the basis for the consortium of UW institutions to administer academic programs and operate physical facilities at Pigeon Lake Field Station, be approved. (Copy of agreement on file with the papers of this meeting.)

Regent DeBardeleben moved adoption of the following resolution, the motion was seconded by Regent Lavine, and it was voted:

Resolution 1459: That, upon recommendation of the President of the UW System, (Policy-New) Academic Planning Statement #3.1 (ACPS-3.1), Implementation Guidelines for Faculty Development and Renewal, dated May, 1977, be approved. (Copy on file with the papers of the meeting)

Regent DeBardeleben moved adoption of Resolution 1460 relating to acceptance of Proffer by Trustees of the William F. Vilas Trust Estate for support of scholarships, fellowships and professorships (<u>EXHIBIT</u> <u>D</u>, attached), the motion was seconded by Regent Beckwith, and it was voted.

Regent DeBardeleben moved adoption of the following resolutions, the motion was seconded by Regent Beckwith, and they were voted:

Resolution 1461: That the Board of Regents of the University of Wisconsin System gratefully accepts the gift by the Trustees of the William F. Vilas Trust Estate (copy dated April 25, 1977, on file), of \$16,000.00 for the academic year 1977-78, for the encouragement of merit and talent, or to promote appreciation of and taste for, the art of music, in connection with University instruction therein, to be used for the following purposes:

- 1. At the University of Wisconsin-Madison, School of Music, six master classes and lectures by eminent American performers, music historians, and music critics (\$8,500.00)
- 2. At the University of Wisconsin-Milwaukee, Music Department, for a proposal entitled "The Tanglewood Symposium Revisited" (\$7,500.00)

Total \$16,000.00

Resolution 1462: That, upon recommendation of the President of the UW System and the Chancellor of UW-Madison, the Board of Regents of the UW System request that the Trustees of the William F. Vilas Trust Estate make available to the Board of Regents the sum of \$13,220 for a research expedition to Cameroon, Africa for Vilas Professor Jan M. Vansina for the period December 1977 to August 1978. Regent DeBardeleben moved adoption of the following resolutions, the motion was seconded by Regent Walter, and they were voted:

- Resolution 1463: That, upon recommendation of the President of the UW System and the Chancellor of UW-Madison, Louis W. Busse, Professor of Pharmacy, Center for Health Sciences, UW-Madison, be appointed to the Edward Kremers Professorship in Pharmacy, effective July 1, 1977, salary as determined in the 1977-78 budget.
- Resolution 1464: That, upon recommendation of the President of the UW System and the Chancellor of UW-Madison, George Ignatius Lythcott, Professor of Pediatrics, Medical School, Center for Health Sciences, UW-Madison, be appointed to the Edward Jenner Professorship of International Health, effective July 1, 1977, with salary as determined in the 1977-78 budget.
- Resolution 1465: That, upon recommendation of the President of the UW System and the Chancellor of UW-Madison, Pauline Rubbelke Maier be appointed to the Robinson-Edwards Professorship of American History, College of Letters and Science, UW-Madison, with the rank of Professor, with tenure, effective with the beginning of the fall semester, 1977, salary as determined in the 1977-78 budget.
- Resolution 1466: That, upon recommendation of the President of the UW System and the Chancellor of UW-Madison, Thomas H. Williams be appointed to the Robert Beyer Professorship in Managerial Accounting and Control, School of Business, UW-Madison, with the rank of Professor, with tenure, effective with the beginning of the fall semester, 1977, salary as determined in the 1977-78 budget.
- Resolution 1467: That, upon recommendation of the President of the UW System and the Chancellor of UW-Milwaukee, authorization to recruit for a Dean of the School of Library Science, UW-Milwaukee, is approved.
- Resolution 1468: That, upon recommendation of the President of the UW System and the Chancellor of UW-Parkside, authorization to recruit for a Dean of Student Life, UW-Parkside, is approved.

There was no Regent request for involvement in the recruitment of the Dean of the School of Library Science at UW-Milwaukee or the recruitment of a Dean of Student Life at UW-Parkside.

REPORT OF THE BUSINESS AND FINANCE COMMITTEE

The report of the Business and Finance Committee was presented by Regent Hales.

Regent Hales recalled that most of the members of the Board had been present at the Committee meeting on the previous day, and participated in the discussion and vote on the matter of the UW-System investments in South Africa. In addition to the Regent viewpoints on the issue, presentations were made by a representative of the Revolutionary Student Brigade, and by James Eagon, the President of the United Council of Student Governments, endorsing the recommendation that the System divest itself of its holdings in those companies doing "significant" business in South Africa. A summary of the comments made at the meeting prepared by Senior Vice President Donald Percy is attached as <u>EXHIBIT E</u>.

Regent Hales moved adoption of the following resolution, and the motion was seconded by Regent Lawton:

That the University Administration develop and implement a plan for prudent divestiture of any existing holdings in companies doing significant business in South Africa and that it develop guidelines for assuring compliance with s. 36.29(1), Wis. Stats., in future investment activities.

Regent DeBardeleben moved that the above resolution be tabled until the October 1977 meeting of the Board, and the motion was seconded by Regent Johnson. The motion to table failed on a roll call vote, with Regents DeBardeleben, Erdman, Fish, Johnson, Neshek and Thompson voting "Aye" (6), and with Regents Barkla, Beckwith, Fitzgerald, Gerrard, Grover, Hales, Lawton, McNamara and Walter voting "No" (9), and with Regent Lavine absent.

Regent Fish stated that we are all supportive of nondiscrimination and people's rights, but he found it difficult to believe that we can conduct our nation's foreign policy, and if it is suggested that we cease doing business with nations whose policy we disagree with, and if their actions are inconsistent with our policy, then Congress should ban foreign investments, not the Board of Regents. He said if we pass this resolution, we would also have to rule out dealings or potential dealings with China, Israel, the United Arab Republic, Nigeria, and a great variety of nations, because their policies may not conform to our ideas of what a nation's policies ought to be. He continued that if we carry the idea to domestic matters, then we should not invest in companies operating in Maine, because the Indians have a lawsuit against the Commonwealth of Maine, or Wyoming, because of the constitutionality of the strip mining law in Wyoming, or Georgia, because the welfare payments have been deemed inadequate by HEW, or Milwaukee, because of the federal action on school discrimination. He recalled that a number of years ago he supported not retaining investment counsel for these very types of reasons, and moved at that time that we ought to have the State Investment Board make the investments for us of funds that were given to us, and if the State Investment Board did not care to, or were constitutionally unable to do so, that we ought to work to change that situation. He recalled it was determined at that time that the State Investment Board could make the investments for us, but they declined to do so. He said that he did not believe that any investment counselor could deliver adequate service under Section 36.29 and in conformance with the prudent person rule and we are subject to law suits either way. He said he would like to see the list of investments that the Investment Board has in the same companies. They maximize returns for retirement benefits for state employees and we should try to maximize benefits for educational purposes. Obviously we cannot do that under this law and no matter what we do, we are in trouble. He said he supported tabling the resolution for that reason. He continued that he believed we ought to be able to find some device of letting the Investment Board or

someone else do our investing for us, so that we don't have to fight this issue, South Africa this year, next year United Arab Republic, and the year after that something else. He said he hoped we could find a device to remove the problem of making investments where we have on one hand an obligation to the people who have contributed funds for specific purposes, and on the other hand the prudent person regulation, which requires that if we don't generate proper sufficient sums of money from these funds, the Board could be held liable, as have many other Boards been held liable under the prudent person rule. He said he was extraordinarily uncomfortable with the resolution and was going to vote "No" on it.

Regent Lawton stated that what Regent Fish was saying is exactly what the resolution says. We want very much to develop a way of doing this, and as a member of the Business and Finance Committee, he looked on this as a mandate for the administration and the Regents to come up with a plan conforming to the state law, unless it can be changed as suggested by Regent DeBardeleben. He continued the Investment Board may be our way out, or other things that were suggested in the meeing on the previous day as far as investigating corporations to see if indeed their policies are discriminatory. He said this resolution directs us to develop and implement a plan, if possible, and to develop guidelines for the administration thereof.

Regent Fish stated that he would have to respectfully disagree with Regent Lawton as the resolution says we are going to divest ourselves of any holdings doing significant business in South Africa, whether through the State Investment Board or in other fashions and that if we are looking for other things to do, then we ought to be supporting a tabling motion to discover what other things we can do.

Regent Beckwith stated that he, like Regents Fish and DeBardeleben, questioned the wisdom of the statute as a matter of public policy, but did not believe it is our responsibility or duty as Regents to question the wisdom of the statutes at this point. That is another aspect of the business and we can go to the Legislature for that, but the statute is on the books, we have asked the Attorney General what it means, and he has given us an official opinion saying what it means. We may question the wisdom of that opinion, but we have no other legal opinion. He has said that so long as that statute is on the books, he believes it is intended to cover investments by companies who do significant business in South Africa, regardless of whether they intentionally discriminate or not, but simply by virtue of the fact that they are there. He continued that he did not know the background of the statute, but from what he had heard yesterday and today, he doubted that was the intent of the draftsman, but if that is correct, then we should ask the Legislature to modify this statute to meet the intent, which he believed probably was to preclude investments in companies who deliberately discriminate as a matter of policy, rather than finding themselves discriminating as a matter of compliance with local law. He stated the statute is on the books, the Attorney General has told us what it means, and he did not see how we could ignore that. He said we may well go to the Legislature, but that it appeared that we have to implement the statute or plan for the statute until it is changed. He pointed out we are not, by this resolution, divesting ourselves of any investments now, and there will be no implementation until the Regents have considered and approved a plan for divestiture. He said there were three points which he felt we ought to have our investment advisors render an opinion on. He stated he would like to know, whether in their opinion it is possible for investment advisors to identify companies or nations that have discriminatory laws, as part of the plan to divest foreign investment. He said South Africa is a blatantly obvious example. He continued that, as Regent Grover pointed out yesterday, there are undoubtedly many other examples as well over half of the world discriminates. Secondly, he would like to know whether it is possible to get an opinion from our

investment advisors as to the identity of companies that have active policies of discrimination. He said he hoped that the answer in this year of 1977 in America is none, but that somebody has to tell us that. Third, he said he would like to know from our investment adviser their opinion whether full implementation of the Attorney General's opinion, whether precluding investments in companies that have any operations of significance in any country that has discriminatory laws, will in effect take us out of the securities market. He said if that is the case, it appeared we have a powerful argument to go to the Legislature and have the statute modified, so that it complies with what he felt was its intent. Regent Beckwith stated that he did not believe we can solve our problem by going to the Investment Board as they will have to operate under this statute, and whether they administer the fund or someone in Boston administers the fund, they will have to live with the statute.

Regent Barkla stated that she was impressed with Regent Beckwith's explanation of the resolution, but she had supported the resolution yesterday and intended to support it today, but not because it has anything to do with acting only on a legal opinion. She said she was not uncomfortable with attempting to influence foreign policy in this country and that she felt companies doing business in South Africa certainly are attempting to influence foreign policy. She noted Regent Fish said it isn't very often a citizen can influence foreign policy in this country, and if we can do it in this way, she would support the resolution.

Regent Erdman stated that she had voted for the resolution on the previous day and to table it this morning because in the Business and Finance Committee it was made abundantly clear by Endowment Management and Research Corporation, our investment counselors, that they cannot effectively in any way carry out the charge that they have been given in handling our funds. They have told us in no uncertain terms that if they have to work with this statute, that they cannot handle our account because it would eliminate investment in so many large corporations that it would be impossible for them to have a diversified portfolio. She said we must address ourselves seriously to the type of hypocrisy that we are going to deal with if we precipitously pass this in light of what we know. We will have to divest ourselves of the stock that we hold in IBM, which has one of the finest records for nondiscrimination of any firm in this country for hiring minorities and giving assistance to them of all kinds. She noted IBM does less than 1% of its total business in South Africa, and yet we would have to divest ourselves of this holding. She said we would deposit the \$500,000 realized from the sale of IBM with the State Investment Board, which would put it with other funds in their general overall portfolio and therefore we will in a sense be laundering the money which was just taken out of the companies, which are supposedly discriminating by doing business in South Africa. She said it appeared we need more time to go back to the Attorney General and to talk to the Legislature to see if we can't work ourselves out of an impossible quagmire that we are getting ourselves into and therefore she had voted to table the motion, in the hope that we can modify the whole thing in a way to make it workable.

Regent Hales stated that he wholeheartedly joined in the comments made by Regent Beckwith. He said we have significant problems in dealing with these investments in South Africa, but we have legislation on the books with which we have to comply. He said that he was concerned that if we table the resolution, we may be contrary to the recommendation or direction of the Attorney General's opinion. He quoted from the opinion as follows: "application of this rule, along with the policy directions contained in 36.29(1) would require the Board of Regents to begin to dispose of investments in companies which practice or condone discrimination in a prudent manner." He said it appeared to him that we are under an affirmative obligation to do something and to do something as fast as we can. He said he hoped the Board would adopt the recommendations that Regent Beckwith brought forth in terms of getting some clarification from our investment counselors as to the countries that discriminate and things of that nature, but did not see any alternative but to pass the resolution and vote against tabling the resolution. He said we may also want to consider amending the resolution that we seek some statutory change or clarification of that legislation.

Regent Grover stated there are many other countries in which corporate investments are being made that practice gross discrimination and that we are a little hypocritical when we have a sure thing--kick South Africa, you can't go wrong--and ignore the realities of other kinds of very inconsistent policies that exist in other countries of the world. He said he was not going to vote against this resolution at this time because it seemed we have a mandate to do what we have to do but he would then like to see the Board of Regents drop that issue and confront it on a broader horizon. He said he will be requesting the Business and Finance Committee by letter to request the Attorney General to investigate the policies of at least five or six other governments in this world which practice gross discrimination of one form or another. He said by doing that ultimately we would bring things to a head in the Legislature in having a more reasonable and more prudent language change in the statutes.

Regent DeBardeleben stated that he was concerned with the interpretation Regent Hales was putting on this resolution when he said that it ought to be adopted because the Attorney General told us that we have to begin to dispose of these investments. He said that he did not feel that we should begin disposing of investments and did not think the Attorney General opinion, which he still regarded as political rather than a legal opinion, says that. He referred to the paragraph of the Attorney General's opinion which reads "you also ask what evidence of nondiscrimination the Board should require as a precondition for investment. The burden is on the Board", not on the Attorney General, "to make a determination of fact as to whether discrimination exists with respect to any particular investment." He pointed out that determination has not been made. He continued we have a blanket statement that everybody discriminates that is doing business in South Africa because that is the policy of the government. He said there has been no factual determination made as to any particular corporation as to what it does or does not do. He stated as he read the opinion, the Attorney General has not treated the subject of how the words "practices or condones through its actions" are to be construed, whether that refers to a voluntary action on the part of the corporation, or whether it refers to something the corporation is required to do regardless of what it might voluntarily want to do. Regent DeBardeleben said we might want amplification of the Attorney General's opinion, which as Senior Vice President Percy suggested, was hurriedly written at midnight on butcher paper and then transcribed, and that we ought to have something a little better than that.

Regent Gerrard objected to that statement and was ruled out of order by the Chair. Regent DeBardeleben stated that he felt we should consider whether certain things ought to be done before we make the kind of commitment that this resolution asks us to make. He said he felt it proper that we make a factual determination as to whether corporations in which we have investments are discriminating in light of a proper definition of what those words in the statute do mean. He said that in the desire to do something, we are approving a resolution which is subject to varying interpretations, and the fact that Regent Hales cited the language of the Attorney General's opinion to the effect that we must begin disposing of stocks in support of this resolution indicates that one interpretation at least is that we may not be waiting until we have explored all the alternatives, including the very real alternative of having the University, through its administration or Regents, go to the Legislature and get an amendment to the law. Regent DeBardeleben

stated that one of the amendments we may want to seek might be one which would confer discretion on the Board in its investment policies to do things that are in furtherance of the state and university's purpose to promote human rights. He continued that we have plenty of room within the Attorney General's opinion to take a little time to make factual determinations which have not yet been made. He said he did not believe we should do something today that is so ambiguous that we can go away from this meeting with some members of the Board thinking that we have taken an action that is going to result in the beginning of divestment of certain investments, while others might think we are going to investigate and explore alternatives. He concluded that he continued to think that the proper step would be to table the resolution so that we can approach this matter in a proper, studious, carefully considered manner. Regent Barkla's attempt to make an inquiry was ruled out of order by the Chair.

Regent Hales stated that in the Business and Finance Committee meeting while discussing possible divesting of certain investments, it was the consensus that it was not our intention to sell all of our holdings on the market within a very short time. He noted that we are still directed by the prudent person law in disposing of any securities. He noted the Attorney General's opinion stated that we have a positive obligation to do something and that by delaying any action we would put ourselves in a position of dragging our feet and not attempting to address it. He noted the law is on the books, is difficult to deal with, but it is a law.

Regent Lawton confirmed that it was not the intention of the members of the Business and Finance Committee to dump all of our stocks or tolerate investment counselors doing so. He stated he was quite amazed by Regent DeBardeleben's treatment of the law in that previously in the meeting he was quoting the state law regarding tenure and stating that we had to follow it, but now we have a state law we don't like, so let's not obey it. He also noted that Regent Beckwith's three questions have been discussed in the Business and Finance Committee closed session and it had been agreed they should be followed. It was agreed that a substitute resolution would be prepared during the recess for lunch for consideration later in the meeting. Other subjects were then discussed, but the discussion following the recess for lunch is continued in these minutes for the sake of continuity.

Regent Hales moved adoption of the following substitute resolution, and the motion was seconded by Regent Beckwith:

Resolution 1469: That the Central Administration develop and present to the Board:

- 1. A plan for prudent divestiture of any existing investments in companies doing significant business in South Africa
- 2. Guidelines to assure compliance with s. 36.29(1), Wis. Stats., in future investment activities
- 3. An assessment of UW System or investment counsel capability to make necessary determinations regarding discriminatory policies or practices of companies and discriminatory laws of the countries in which they do significant business.
- 4. An assessment as to whether compliance with s. 36.29(1), Wis. Stats., impacts in such a way as to effectively preclude investments in the commercial securities market
- 5. A statement of the steps necessary to achieve clarification or amendment of s. 36.29(1), Wis. Stats.

Regent Barkla inquired if there is a time limit on the above resolution and was advised by Senior Vice President Percy that at a minimum they will have a progress report at the July meeting. Regent Beckwith stated that whatever one may think of investments by this Board in companies that have operations in South Africa, there is another perhaps equally serious question and problem of how this Board can administer an investment policy for funds of the University which is sufficiently diversified and well managed to give an adequate return without having some very clear guidelines as to how this action will apply to other countries. The question was put on Resolution 1469, and it was voted unanimously.

Regent Hales reported that Hospital Superintendent Gordon Derzon made a presentation at the Committee meeting on the previous day relative to the University Hospitals' budget, noting that the proposed budget calls for a more major increase than needed in the most recent request -- a total weighted average increase of 10.6% as opposed to 5.9% last year. Superintendent Derzon attributed this to a 9.6% inflationary rate, and a projected 4.3% decrease in patient volume. He reported an aggressive program to reduce costs during the current year to reflect decreased patient population has reduced the level of increase that is being sought. He noted that one of the reasons for the decreasing patient population is the significant reduction in the average length of stay. Two years ago it was approximately ten days, while for the coming year it is projected to average 8.4 days, which is an approximately 20% reduction in the length of stay per patient admission. It was also noted that the state's share of the total revenue has been reduced from a level of 7.5% three years ago to approximately 5.6% for 1977-78, which means that the hospitals' educational expense related to training new health care providers, etc., is becoming more and more the burden of the patient. Regent Hales reported Regent Lawton commended the Hospital Administration for its efforts in holding down the daily rates in view of the shorter hospital stays and expressed concern that from the standpoint of the Medical School and its need to have teaching materials available. the trend toward fewer patient days could pose problems and there may be need for future Regent involvement to try and change this.

Regent Hales moved adoption of Resolution 1470 relating to the 1977-78 budget request for University of Wisconsin Hospitals, (attached as  $\underline{\text{EXHIBIT}}$  F), the motion was seconded by Regent Lawton, and it was voted.

Regent Hales noted that the late Enid Pomeroy McTaggart bequeathed the "rest, residue and remainder" of her estate to the Department of Medical Research at the University of Wisconsin. The estate is estimated at approximately \$100,000.

Regent Hales moved adoption of the following resolution, the motion was seconded by Regent Lavine, and it was voted:

Resolution 1471: That the bequest of the late Enid Pomeroy McTaggart, Janesville, Wisconsin, to the University of Wisconsin be accepted by the Board of Regents of the University of Wisconsin System in accordance with the terms and conditions of the Last Will and Testament of Enid Pomeroy McTaggart, Deceased; and that the Secretary or Assistant Secretary be authorized to sign a receipt on behalf of the Board of Regents of the University of Wisconsin System for this bequest, and to do all things necessary to effect the transfer of this bequest to the University of Wisconsin-Madison.

Regent Hales reported that the late Ruth M. Rowland bequeathed to the University of Wisconsin-Oshkosh her limited editions library.

Regent Hales moved adoption of the following resolution, the motion was seconded by Regent Lavine, and it was voted:

Resolution 1472: That the bequest of the late Ruth M. Rowland, Oshkosh, Wisconsin, to the University of Wisconsin be accepted by the Board of Regents of the University of Wisconsin System in accordance with the terms and conditions of the Last Will and Testament of Ruth M. Rowland, Deceased; and that the Secretary or Assistant Secretary be authorized to sign a receipt on behalf of the Board of Regents of the University of Wisconsin System for this bequest, and to do all things necessary to effect the transfer of this bequest to the University of Wisconsin-Oshkosh.

Regent Hales reported that the total receipts for Gifts, Grants, and U.S. Government Contracts for the year were up \$22 million over last year's total, and that \$17 million of this increase was in federal dollars. The areas of increase were Extension \$1.5 million; Instruction \$6.3 million; Physical Plant \$1 million; Research \$10 million; Student Aid \$5 million.

Regent Hales moved adoption of the following resolution, the motion was seconded by Regent Lavine, and it was voted:

Resolution 1473: That, upon recommendation of the President of the System, the gifts, grants and contracts presented at this meeting (copy filed with the papers of this meeting) be accepted, approved, ratified and confirmed; and that, where signature authority has not been previously delegated, appropriate officers be authorized to sign agreements.

Regent Hales stated that the next resolution is necessitated by a provision built into the merger statutes at the request of the System to leave no doubt about the effective date of salary adjustments in the absence of an approved state budget. The System must have a mechanism whereby it can be documented that the Board has established actual salaries as of June 30, 1977. The proposed salary adjustments are based on the Regent proposal since the DOA recommendations are not yet known. He reported Senior Vice President Percy indicated to the Committee that those salaries which require individual approval (approximately forty-one individuals in the state executive salary group or over \$45,000) will be available for review at the July meeting. Regent Hales reported that prior to committee action, Edward Muzik presented a resolution adopted by the Delegate Assembly of TAUWF recommending that the Regents not specify the proportions in which salary increases are to be distributed but to leave the distribution to the individual campuses. He reported Senior Vice President Percy indicated that in compliance with the 1977-78 Annual Budget Policy, AB-1.0, increases would be distributed on the basis of at least 3.5% up to a maximum of one-half of the total funds available (4.5%) on the basis of merit.

Regent Hales moved adoption of Resolution 1474 relating to salaries for unclassified staff (attached as <u>EXHIBIT</u> <u>G</u>), the motion was seconded by Regent Erdman, and it was voted.

Regent Hales reported that the Vice President and Controller had presented reports in the Committee meeting on the previous day relating to the transfer of collection and billing procedures for NSDL accounts to the HEAB as of July 1, 1977; the quarterly report of State Investment Fund earnings on Auxiliary Operation balances for the quarter ending March 31, 1977, and the monthly report on year-end balances, which show a projected free balance of \$347,000.00 as of the end of May.

Regent Hales noted that our investment counseling contract terminates on June 30, 1977, and it is important that we have counsel to advise us on the administration of the endowment fund.

Regent Hales moved adoption of the following resolution, and the motion was seconded by Regent Lawton:

Resolution 1475: That, subject to necessary State of Wisconsin approvals, the Endowment Management and Research Corporation, Boston, Mass., be employed to furnish investment counselling services for the University of Wisconsin System trust funds, with authority to purchase and sell securities on a discretionary basis, subject to guidelines furnished by the Business and Finance Committee, for the period July 1, 1977, to June 30, 1978, at a cost of no more than 0.4% of assets managed.

After a short discussion of the performance record of investment counsel, the question was put on Resolution 1475, and it was voted.

Regent Hales reviewed in some detail the history of the tax-deferred annuities matters since 1973, and the discussion at the committee meeting on the previous day, to which all Regents had been invited. Presentations at that meeting were made by Michael Bleicher, Chairman of the UW-Madison Commission on Faculty Compensation and Economic Benefits, Edward Muzik, Executive Secretary of TAUWF, and Richard Ranney, Chairman of the Wisconsin Association of Life Underwriters Tax-Deferred Annuity Committee, all of whom appeared in favor of the resolution.

Regent Hales moved adoption of Resolution 1476 relating to implementation of authority to enter into or continue agreements to effect the purposes of section 403(b), Federal Internal Revenue Code, relative to tax-deferred annuities (TDA's) (attached as <u>EXHIBIT H</u>), and the motion was seconded by Regent Erdman.

Regent Lavine inquired as to the advisability of limiting the number of insurance companies on each campus to the best three to five companies. President McNamara responded that there had been great range of variance expressed by the various campuses and that the final result represents a compromise acceptable to the parties involved.

The question was put on Resolution 1476, and it was voted.

The meeting recessed for lunch at 12:24 P.M. and resumed at 1:30 P.M., with all Regents present.

By voice vote the members of the Board approved the recommendation of the President that the request for appearances relative to the South African investment matter made by Katherine Hoffman, appearing for herself, and a representative of the Revolutionary Student Brigade be denied.

Regent Hales reported that in the committee meeting on the previous day Vice President and Controller Lorenz reviewed the Auxiliary Enterprises Budgets which cover Segregated Fee Supported Programs, Residence Halls, Parking Service Operations, Student Center/Unions, Book Stores, Text book Rentals, Fleet Car Operations, Intramural and Intercollegiate Athletics. It was noted that since the time of merger the Auxiliary Operations have moved from a state of precarious financial condition to a firm financial foundation, with the 1976-77 operations being very successful. There followed, in the Committee meeting a review of the budget presented by Associate Vice President Osterheld.

Regent Hales moved adoption of the following resolution, and the motion was seconded by Regent Thompson:

Resolution 1477: That, upon the recommendation of the respective Chancellors and the President of the System, the University of Wisconsin System's operating budget for the fiscal year July 1, 1977, through June 30, 1978, for Auxiliary Enterprises and Segregated Fee Operations, including user charges and other items reflected in Book C, 1977-78 Annual Budget Documentation, dated May 20, 1977, as presented to the Board and on file with the records of this meeting be approved. Any new programs to be funded by the segregated fee or user charge are subject to review and prior approval by Central Administration; and that Central Administration, together with the campuses, be authorized to revise and approve budgets in accordance with actual enrollment experience for the first semester 1977-78, or other significant economic factors which necessitate a budget change.

A person who attempted to address the members of the Board relative to the South African investment matter was ruled out of order and escorted from the room.

Regent DeBardeleben requested clarification of the last paragraph on page C-31, which reads "It would appear that those campuses desiring to make increases beyond the Regent guidelines did so." He was advised by Vice President Lorenz that the sentence refers to the proposed budget, and those that did so in making up the proposal were shown on page C-29.

The question was put on Resolution 1477, and it was voted.

Regent Hales moved adoption of the following Resolution, and the motion was seconded by Regent Neshek:

Resolution 1478: That, upon the recommendation of the President of the System and in response to the resolution of the May meeting of the Council of Chancellors, Resolution 1146 be rescinded so that, consistent with the general Regent policies, each University of the System will be responsible for determining its own intercollegiate athletics program and budget level, subject to appropriate Central Administration policy and budget guidelines, and consistent with the institution's internal decision making processes.

Regent DeBardeleben inquired if there were any new arguments advanced that were not advanced at the time Resolution 1146 was adopted as to why that is a bad policy. Senior Vice President Donald Smith responded that one new argument is that we now have a resolution unanimously adopted by the Council of Chancellors, which he would summarize as being similar to the objection Central Administration raised in the first place dealing with a very small corner of a very large annual budget whereby we create an overburden in the management of that budget by singling out for special notation and rationalization this one item out of literally hundreds of decision items the Chancellor has to engage in. He said another new factor is that we have since the time of the original resolution had a considerable report to the Board of Regents, a considerable report to the Council of Chancellors from the Women's Physical Education people in the System who have been working assiduously on the nature of their problems and the nature of their organization development they are seeking under Title IX. Chancellor Lee Dreyfus stated that in carrying out the sense of the mission of this Board relative to Title IX there is a growing divisiveness on some campuses that the funds for that development must be taken from the already existing men's programs, and it creates personnel divisiveness that is beginning to surface and affect both men's and women's athletics. He said that on many of the campuses there is the feeling that this is a part of the program which comes under the academic program and under the primary responsibility of the faculty and faculty government structure. He noted the faculty have the authority to control these programs as they do all others. He continued that having made their recommendation, there is then the feeling that this ought to move through the decision making processes on the campuses normally followed in any other program in which the faculty has the primary responsibility, moving through the Chancellor and on to Central Administration, and ultimately to the Board. He said there is general opposition to the necessity to come to the Board for the decision to increase a .5% position.

Chancellor Dreyfus noted there is a difference in the support levels between the several campuses and that issue was not brought out at the time the resolution was adopted. He continued that there is a distinction between difference and inequity. An inequity is the difference which is imposed by policy that creates differences. If it is self-imposed, then it becomes a difference, and not an inequity --it is a decision of a particular campus, and essentially we are back to the issue of campus autonomy. Senior Vice President Donald Percy pointed out that at the meeting in May it was pointed out that the present Board policy is unduly restrictive. It is a pre-condition and the campuses would rather come forward and have the Board look at this like any other item. He also noted that the Council's action in supporting the decision should not be interpreted as endorsing an increased level of GPR support in athletics.

Regent DeBardleben recalled that at the time of adoption of Resolution 1146 there was specifically discussed at that time the necessity of taking money from the men's program in view of the federal legislation. With respect to Chancellor Dreyfus' point that this is an academic matter and therefore immune from careful Regent scrutiny, he recalled that Dr. Robert Maynard Hutchins, the man responsible

for eliminating Intercollegiate Athletics from the University of Chicago, held the view that universities are places of higher learning, that they have to do with inquiry and discussion of knowledge and with academic matters, and not too much concerned with such matters as intercollegiate athletics or with too much emphasis on vocationalism. He noted there are people who disagree with that view, but would hope that the Chancellors might concede that Intercollegiate Athletics, if it is a curricular or academic matter, certainly is a different breed of curricular or academic matter than most of the things we deal with in this University, and that he did not feel they have ever been considered to be sacrosanct as far as Regent discussion is concerned. Regent DeBardeleben said that it was his point of view that no GPR money should be used for Intercollegiate Athletics and that the taxpayers of the State of Wisconsin, in the guise of supporting an institution of higher learning, should not be required to underwrite football games and other forms of Intercollegiate Athletics, and if one recognizes as he does that it is not practical to get this Board to outlaw Intercollegiate Athletics, or at least to outlaw the use of tax money to support it, then the next best thing is to try to keep it where it is and not let it balloon any larger. He said it was in this spirit that the Board adopted Resolution 1146. He stated you can say its not a very big item and because it isn't very big we should not object to spending a little money on it, but he felt there is a question of principle involved. He noted that without the resolution the total support of Intercollegiate Athletics at UW-LaCrosse would rise 35.65%, at UW-Eau Claire it would go up 14%, at UW-River Falls it would go up 14%. He inquired how can we in good conscience permit the existence of a situation in these days of financial stringency, as far as our academic programs are concerned, ever permit Intercollegiate Athletics to go up that much, whether it is a half position, one position, or five positions, or no positions. He said that he felt this cannot be justified and was going to vote against the resolution.

Regent Barkla inquired of Chancellor Dreyfus if it is necessary when preparing the budgets that the campuses must separate out the support programs for Intercollegiate Athletics in order to prepare the Title IX report. Chancellor Dreyfus responded in the affirmative. Regent Barkla stated that she agreed with Regent DeBardeleben about Intercollegiate Athletics as a general principle, but that if we have it, women ought to be supported to a greater degree than they are at this time, and that the Chancellors would be better off continuing the present system and taking it back as a matter of campus decision. Regent Barkla inquired of Chancellor Dreyfus if the faculty had come to the Council of Chancellors saying the Board of Regents was interfering with the system of governance. Chancellor Dreyfus responded that at Stevens Point, the answer is "Yes", noting that the matter is subject to faculty control and primary responsibility as are all others. He noted the Board had made a very definite exception here--it has a uniqueness and that he was concerned that where you have one exception, you may have two or more.

Regent Lavine agreed that it is unique, but we have done it before and it was his recollection of the law that the faculty has the initial responsibility, but the Board has the ultimate responsibility in that it must pass on it so that he did not take it as an argument that we should not do this. He said it is appropriate that this is an area of policy, because we have to pass on both the content and the dollars. Regent Lavine said the validity of Resolution 1146 is at the time of passage we had not had any great outcry of reasons why it should be changed. He noted that the departments would like larger appropriations, but if we are going to change we are going to have to address a value judgment, not of no physical education nor no Intercollegiate Athletics, but whether we want to spend a significant larger amount. He noted that all campuses have problems with limited dollars. He said that if the Board is going to back away from the present policy it really must face the fact that we are going to take dollars away from other academic programs for physical education, and that he did not feel that should be done.

Regent Erdman stated that we are not in a position to judge departmental requests of this nature, and are unable to decide whether Eau Claire or LaCrosse needs an increase. She said this is something we absolutely should leave to the Chancellors, because this is just as much an academic interference into a faculty prerogative as any other kind of interference. Regent Erdman stated that when Regent DeBardeleben mentioned LaCrosse he was talking about Intercollegiate Athletics, but that of the 36% increase mentioned, 32% of that is for intramural athletics. She stated that most physicians will agree that you cannot separate the mind and the body, and more and more psychiatrists are beginning to realize that you can't treat the mind alone. She said we are promoting healthy informed human beings, and when you try to isolate minds in a kind of atmosphere that is only intellectual, you are doing harm to the total person. She recommended letting the Chancellors make their own decisions on what should be an institutional decision.

Chancellor Lindner noted that when budgets are made up in February, every department and unit that is given a budget can determine what their expenditures can be and write position descriptions so that they are into the business of hiring people and defining their duties for the next year. In the case of athletics the whole planning process comes to a halt and as people are interviewed for positions in physical education, the question of whether or not there will be a position for coach of the women's cross country team is a moot point until the matter is presented to the Board. Regent Lavine stated that he would not oppose the idea of intramural athletics supported by state monies because he agreed the mind and body are connected and perhaps the way to get rid of Resolution 1146 is to say that we will have no Intercollegiate--we will have only intramural athletics. Regent Erdman stated that she was opposing that because intramural leads to Intercollegiate Athletics, and that when you start athletics in the physical education classroom you go on to competition.

The question was put on Resolution 1478, and it was voted on a roll call vote, with Regents Erdman, Fish, Gerrard, Grover, Hales, Johnson, Lawton, McNamara, Neshek and Thompson voting "Aye" (10), and with Regents Barkla, Beckwith, DeBardeleben, Fitzgerald, Lavine and Walter voting "No" (6).

REPORT OF THE PHYSICAL PLANNING AND DEVELOPMENT COMMITTEE

The report of the Physical Planning and Development Committee was presented by Regent Fish.

Regent moved adoption of the following resolution, the motion was seconded by Regent Lavine, and it was voted:

Resolution 1479: That, upon the recommendation of the UW-Platteville Chancellor and the President of the University of Wisconsin System, authorization be granted to plan, bid and construct the 1977 Student Center Movable Partitions Repair Project at UW-Platteville for an estimated total project cost of \$34,500 from Program Revenues.

Annual Board 6-10-77

Regent Fish stated UW-Stevens Point considers the naming of the new Reserve in memory of Fred Schmeeckle to be particularly appropriate because of his active interest in Conservation Education Departments at Stevens Point from 1923 to 1959. He noted the option to sell the former Steiner Hall to The Chileda Institute was not exercised since it is moving to another area and has no further interest in the former Steiner Hall.

Regent Fish moved adoption of the following resolution, the motion was seconded by Regent Hales, and it was voted:

Resolution 1480: That, upon the recommendation of the UW-Stevens Point Chancellor and the President of the University of Wisconsin System the name "Schmeeckle" be transferred from the presently named residence hall and that the following described area on the UW-Stevens Point campus be named the Schmeeckle Reserve in honor of the late Fred J. Schmeeckle:

> All property between North Point Drive on the north and Maria Drive on the south, with the exception of the site of the Maintenance/ Stores Building, totalling approximately 186 acres

and that the name "Steiner" be transferred from the resident hall on Fremont and Clarke Streets on the UW-Stevens Point campus to the building presently known as Schmeeckle Hall, to continue to honor the late Herbert R. Steiner.

Regent Fish moved adoption of the following resolution, the motion was seconded by Regent Erdman, and it was voted:

Resolution 1481:

That, upon the recommendation of the UW-River Falls Chancellor and the President of the University of Wisconsin System, the Vice President for General Services be authorized to sign an extension of the agreement with the Tri-County Council on Alcoholism and Drug Abuse (Dunn, Pierce, and St. Croix Counties) from August 1, 1977 to July 31, 1978, with two one-year renewal options. This agreement provides for continued use of a residence hall on the campus of UW-River Falls as a Half-Way House facility.

Regent Fish stated the next resolution relates to building safety at UW-Milwaukee, and will provide for construction of code-required emergency exits from the Campus Elementary School Day Care Center at UW-Milwaukee. The Tainter House Restoration, UW-Stout, is to be supported in part from the proceeds from the sale of the former Chancellor's residence.

Regent Fish moved adoption of the following resolution, the motion was seconded by Regent Johnson, and it was voted:

Resolution 1482: That, upon the recommendation of the UW-Milwaukee and UW-Stout Chancellors and the President of the University of Wisconsin System, authorization be granted to plan, bid and construct the following two projects, at the budget level and from the funding sources indicated:

#### UW-Milwaukee

Emergency Exiting Provisions and Screening, Campus Elementary School Day Care Center, at a cost of \$23,500 from State Building Trust Funds.

#### UW-Stout

Tainter House Restoration Project, at a cost of \$74,950 from Louis Smith Tainter House Restoration Fund (\$48,004) and Federal Historic Preservation grant (\$26,946)

Regent Fish moved adoption of Resolution 1483 relating to authorization for leases of space, UW Center System, UW Extension, UW-Madison and UW-Superior (attached as <u>EXHIBIT</u> <u>I</u>), the motion was seconded by Regent Fitzgerald, and it was voted.

Regent Fish stated that in the Committee meeting on the previous day, Mr. Tom McIntosh, who chaired the UW-System Energy Budgeting Task Force, commented briefly on the Task Force Report, and presented the following recommendations relating to System energy conservation efforts:

- -- that overall System responsibility be placed at a vice presidential level with assistance provided by a technical field team and a Systemwide committee for audit, review and policy recommendations;
- -- that a similar structure be established at the campus level with faculty, staff and students to have major input in reviewing and recommending program policies at the campus level; and
- -- that there be a reallocation of resources (money or people) to provide engineering and support talent who are qualified to supervise the technical aspects of operation and maintenance.

Regent Fish said the Report calls for an 18% reduction in energy consumption on a Systemwide basis over a 4-year period, and suggests that "quick fix" and minor cost refit procedures should result in a 5% annual reduction during the next two years. "Quick fix" is defined as those things that can be done in existing systems such as removing light bulbs, installing time clocks, etc.

Regent Fish said it was generally believed by members of the committee that energy conserving measures implemented to date have been primarily cosmetic, and that no substantive savings have resulted. He continued that there was considerable discussion by the Committee regarding energy conservation. Concern was expressed by several members as to whether the suggested goals were achievable and noted that because of the sum sufficient appropriation for utility costs, it is difficult for a campus to take money out of its budget to buy time clocks

necessary to control energy usage. He said building design had been discussed and it was felt that the task force would continue to monitor to a reasonable and rational level, energy consumption, and report to Central Administration on wasteful practices that could be eliminated.

Regent Fish moved adoption of the following resolution, the motion was seconded by Regent Erdman, and it was voted:

Resolution 1484: That, upon the recommendation of the President of the University of Wisconsin System, the <u>Report of the University of Wisconsin</u> <u>System Task Force on Energy Budgeting</u>, dated March 1977, be adopted. (Copy on file with the papers of the meeting)

Regent Fish reported the Committee next received the Annual Report on Leased Space for the UW System, which was started a number of years ago review ing and reporting leases on an ongoing basis. He stated there are currently 52 leases in effect for the UW System covering 485,320 square feet of space, at an annual cost of \$1,593,689, as compared with a year ago when we had 48 leases covering 472,000 square feet, at a cost of \$1,536,000. He noted that a number of years ago we had a considerably greater number of leases, which have been decreased and now appear to have been stabilized. Regent Fish reported that 29 of the leases are on the Madison Campus and of these 15 leases cover 200,000 square feet which are directly connected with the Center for Health Sciences. When the new unit is completed, 8 of the 15 leases will be terminated, with 7 ongoing. Regent Fish reported the members of the Committee felt the lease report was very good, the cost to the University has been held down, and the number of leases is nominal for an institution of this size.

Regent Fish stated there had been a request made by the Chairman of the Higher Education Subcommittee of the State Building Commission for a clarification of the April 1977 action relating to the cost of renovating Old Main and Nelson Hall at UW-Stevens Point. He said it was believed the action we took had been quite clear, and that it should be clearly understood that the Board has not approved any remodeling of Nelson Hall at this time--it is to be reviewed by the Board at the appropriate time.

Regent Fish moved adoption of the following resolution, and the motion was seconded by Regent Grover:

Resolution 1485: That, upon the recommendation of the President of the University of Wisconsin System and the UW-Stevens Point Chancellor, and in response to the letter from Representative Michael Early addressed to President Weaver, the Regents reaffirm the action taken by the Board at its April 15 meeting, when a request to the State Building Commission for release of advance planning funds for the renovation of the center portion of the Old Main Building was approved, and affirm that request now with specific reference to the issues posed in Representative Early's letter: namely, the present estimate of \$1,830,000 as the cost to renovate the basement and first and second floors of the center section of Old Main and, secondly, the program uses proposed for Nelson Hall upon the completion of the Old Main renovation. Regent DeBardeleben stated that inasmuch as there is no change, as Regent Fish had pointed out, he would still vote against the resolution.

The question was put on Resolution 1485, and it was voted, with Regent DeBardeleben voting "No".

Regent Fish reported that the Committee had received a report on the status of the Clinical Sciences Center project. He stated that at its April 26, 1977 meeting, the State Building Commission approved advance planning for the Clinical Sciences Center of the Center for Health Sciences, UW-Madison, contingent upon:

- (1) Approval of a Concept and Budget Report by the Commission;
- (2) Approval of the sharing agreement with the Veterans Administration;
- (3) Proof that \$4.2 million of gifts and bequests are available from the University, and the remaining \$2.2 million of the \$6.4 million estimated project cost will be provided from residual tax-supported general obligation borrowing.

He stated that the architect for the project has undertaken design of the additional two modules and is in process of completing a Concept and Budget Report for that segment of the project. The Bureau of Facilities Management has instructed the architect to plan the bidding and construction under a fast-tracking approach. We believe everything is going well in that area.

Regent Fish reported that the Committee had received a report on the status of the Clinical Sciences Center project.

Regent DeBardeleben moved adoption of the following resolution, and the motion was seconded by Regent Fitzgerald:

Resolution 1486: That the Board recess into closed session to consider personnel matters as permitted by Section 19.85(1) of the Wisconsin Statutes.

The resolution was voted on a roll call vote, with Regents DeBardeleben, Erdman, Fish, Fitzgerald, Gerrard, Grover, Johnson, Lawton, McNamara, Neshek, and Thompson voting "Aye", and with Regents Beckwith and Hales and Lavine entering the meeting following the vote. Regents Barkla and Walter absent.

The meeting recessed into Executive Session at 2:35 P.M.

The meeting resumed in open session at 3:15 P.M.

President McNamara reported that the following actions had been taken during the closed session:

Resolution 1487: That, upon recommendation of the President of the UW System and the Chancellor of UW-Extension, Marvin T. Beatty be appointed Dean, Division of Community Programs, UW-Extension, effective July 1, 1977, salary to be determined in the 1977-78 annual budget. Resolution 1488: That, upon recommendation of the President of the UW System and the President-Designate of the UW System, the Board approves continuation of the appointment of Leonard Haas as Chancellor of UW-Eau Claire through the year 1978-79.

The meeting adjourned at 3:17 P.M.



SUBJECT: HEAB Meeting on May 13, 1977

The Higher Educational Aids Board met in the Governor's Conference Room, State Capitol Building, Madison, Wisconsin, on May 13, 1977.

Regent members present were Arthur DeBardeleben and John Lavine.

Subsequent to the February Board meeting, developments occurred to cause the Board to reconsider its February 4, 1977 action directing the repurchase of the \$5 million in student loan notes sold under the Private Lender Purchase Program. The Secretary of the Department of Administration requested the Board to reconsider its action observing that the repurchase was contrary to the spirit in which the Land Commission made its \$7 million commitment to the Board and that there was uncertainty surrounding the revenue bonding proposal. On March 22, 1977, the Land Commission rescinded its action providing \$7 million to the Board but recommitted \$2 million for 1977-78 and extended an invitation to HEAB to return to the Commissioner for additional Recognizing these circumstances, funds for student loans as needed. the Board adopted the staff recommendation that it rescind its action directing the repurchase of \$5 million in student loan notes.

The Board adopted the WHEG II committee and staff recommendation regarding the equity models to be used in preparing 1977-78 WHEG awards for dependent and independent students. In addition, the Board selected the College Scholarship Service as the single service agency responsible for processing the common student financial aid form and providing supporting services to the WHEG II and Tuition Grant programs for 1977-78 and 1978-79.

The Board considered the possibility of extending the length of time nontraditional students are eligible for the WHEG supplemental (TIP) award. Existing policy states that "All students selected as initial recipients who maintain a satisfactory academic record shall have their grants renewed once for the equivalent of one additional academic year. The amount of the renewal grant shall be based on a reevaluation of the student's need." The WHEG II Ad Hoc Committee and the staff recommended

that no change be made, pointing out the difficulty of determining eligibility among third year students, the dilution in funds available to first year students thus reducing access, and the resulting redistribution of funds among various institutions. However, Esther Kaplan and other Board members spoke in support of extending eligibility citing the expectation of an increase of \$340,000 in SSIG funds, underutilization of WHEG TIP funds, need for additional flexibility in the program, the loan default study report finding that nontraditional students are more frequently in default, and the need to retain nontraditional students in educational programs. Regent Lavine inquired as to the reason for the disposition of the underutilized WHEG II TIP funds by replacement of state Mr. Jung reported that several institutions had problems in repackaging loans. student aid programs late in the semester. Regent Lavine stated that the Board had responsibility to serve disadvantaged students and that institutions should be able to handle the repackaging of financial aids for students as necessary. He requested the staff to seek an explanation from each of the institutions which reported delivery problems. The Board tabled the original motion to make no change in existing policy and directed the staff to review the utilization of WHEG TIP funds and to report back at the July Board meeting.

The Board adopted the Tuition Grant Ad Hoc Committee and staff recommendation regarding the formulas to be used in determining Tuition Grant Awards on an interim basis pending the formal Attorney General's opinion on eligibility of VTAE students for Tuition Grant Awards. The Board was requested by the Director of WBVTAE to determine if certain VTAE students are eligible to participate in the Tuition Grant program. Two groups of VTAE students pay higher tuition charges than undergraduates at UW-Madison; those who are not residents of the vocational district in which they are enrolled and therefore must pay "out-of-district" tuition of \$1,400 to \$1,900; and those who are enrolled in specialized technical courses which charge higher tuition and instructional related fees, e.g., MATC dental hygiene--\$800.

The Board approved the staff recommendation that it submit an application to the U.S. Office of Education for funds to develop a training program for the state's financial aid administrators.

The Board reviewed procedures for establishing reduced payment programs for borrowers with delinquent loans. Regent DeBardeleben inquired as to the nature of recourse available to the borrower regarding any differences of opinion with loan collectors. Regent Lavine requested that the staff set up a formal procedure and that borrowers be informed of their right of appeal. Mr. Jung suggested that the effectiveness of the HEAB collection program will suffer due to difficulty in collection from borrowers well informed of appeal rights and stated that no other collection agency informs the person of their right to review. The Board adopted a motion by Regent DeBardeleben that directed the staff to devise and submit to the Board for consideration a protocol whereby borrowers will be advised of their right for review of delinquent loan repayment programs.

The staff prepared an update on the 1977-79 biennial budget for the Board which noted: (1) the intent of the Joint Finance Committee to eliminate authority to use general fund advances for student loans after the first issue of revenue bonds; (2) adoption of a session law directing the Board to report steps taken to insure that institutions follow a standardized methodology to determine loan amounts, greater consistency be obtained in the student budgets used by institutions, and lenders receive timely notification when borrowers withdraw from an institution; and (3) the limitation of the Lender Servicing Program to the servicing of Wisconsin lenders and lenders in other states which provide loans to Wisconsin residents.

The Board received a staff prepared summary of the Legislative Fiscal Bureau study of the State Student Loan Program. This report focused on the following items:

- 1. Historical development of Wisconsin's state direct loan program and loan programs operated by the other states.
- 2. Criteria used to determine student need.
- 3. The role of state direct loans and other state and federal programs in meeting need.
- 4. The role of private lenders in meeting need.
- 5. Potential adjustments in loan eligibility criteria and other administrative procedures.
- 6. Revised estimates of loan capital need based on 1976-77 experience.
- 7. Potential funding sources for state loans.

The Board discussed the program impact of having standard budgets for both loans and grants.

The Board received a report on the 1975-76 balance of payments computation of the Minnesota-Wisconsin Interstate Compact. The average number of Minnesota residents enrolled in Wisconsin public institutions was 3,960 in 1975-76. The total nonresident tuition waived by UW amounted to \$6.1 million. Minnesota institutions enrolled 1,830 Wisconsin students and waived \$1.9 million of tuition. Final payments are negotiated in conjunction with settlement of the income tax reciprocity arrangement between the two states.

The HEAB meeting was adjourned at 11:25 a.m. and the members reconvened in a meeting of the Wisconsin Higher Education Corporation (WHEC).

WHEC received a progress report on the development of the Lender Servicing Program. The Board accepted revised estimates in development and operational costs prepared by the staff. In addition, the Board approved staff recommendations that WHEC waive transfer charges for all lenders presently serviced by the First National Bank of Minneapolis and that the new loan fee be reduced from \$1.40 to \$.40.

The Board considered at length and finally approved the staff recommendation that WHEC decrease the insurance premium required to student borrowers from 1% to .5% beginning with the 1977-78 academic year. Considerations reviewed by the Board included potential decreases in the reinsurance rate due to increased default rates, administrative costs, impact on proposed revenue bonding and need for student involvement via a user fee.

The meeting was adjourned at 12:20 p.m.

# SUMMARY OF BUSINESS AND FINANCE COMMITTEE DISCUSSION OF INVESTMENTS IN SOUTH AFRICA

Yesterday's discussion was wide-ranging and difficult to summarize. The vote of 14 Regents participating was 11-3 to proceed to develop a plan for prudent divestiture of our trust fund holdings in companies doing significant business in South Africa. The following points were made during the debate:

#### A. Supportive of the plan for prudent divestiture

- 1. The law and the Attorney General's opinion seem clear in this instance; some felt it more a political than legal opinion.
- The AG has determined that companies "doing business in South Africa are <u>legally obligated</u> to practice discrimination against native black and coloured workers employed by those companies."

(It was suggested during the debate that we ought first determine that the companies were, in fact, "practicing discrimination." The Central Administration has indicated they took the Attorney General's finding of "legal obligation" to be sufficient, but that they would be willing to write each company to determine whether they fall under the discriminatory laws and are complying with them.)

- 3. The only question to be resolved is what constitutes "significant business." It is assumed that the plan developed by Central Administration will speak to that question.
- 4. It was the recorded sense of the motion that whatever plan was developed would be returned to the Board prior to any divestiture actions being proposed.
- 5. The purpose of the resolution as written and understood is to comply with the law as interpreted by the Attorney General.

#### B. Supportive of alternative approaches:

- 1. It was suggested and moved that the Board ought to divest itself of all private holdings and invest in U.S. Government securities on the grounds that discrimination is present in some form in all corporate activities. The amendment failed.
- 2. It was urged that the Board defer committing itself to divestiture <u>at this time</u> and explore and/or pursue the following steps:
  - a. Seek a change in an overly broad law so that we would not eventually be forced out of all investment activities

- b. Rally other institutions with holdings in South Africa to bring maximum pressure on companies doing business there to use their influence to get the government to change its policy. (It should be noted that most companies oppose the policy, but are legally obligated to follow it if they wish to do business in South Africa. In short, it is not the companies whose policies are at issue relative to discrimination. On the other hand, the companies do have the option of withdrawing their operations from South Africa. Materials and commentary relative to the debate suggest that the return on investment has been relatively good for firms investing in South Africa. This may explain their reluctance to withdraw.)
- c. Try, through voting of our proxies each time a corporate resolution germane to discrimination is before us, to influence company initiatives with the South African government.
- d. Before <u>committing</u> ourselves to divestiture we should review the <u>total</u> plan for divestiture. (The sense of the motion was clarified by Regent Beckwith to assure that the Board would review the plan prior to its implementation.)

NOTE: The University of Wisconsin Hospitals 1977-78 budget is based on anticipated salary increases of 6½%. If the final settlement rate deviates more than one-half percent, budgetary adjustments for both revenues and expenditures will be necessary. BUSINESS AND FINANCE COMMITTEE

Resolution 1474:

Whereas, the Board of Regents of the University of Wisconsin System has not yet received its unclassified staff salary appropriation or the Secretary of Administration's recommendation for that purpose for the fiscal year commencing July 1, 1977;

Whereas, Section 36.09(1)(j), Wis. Stats., requires that the Board shall establish salaries for persons not in the classified staff prior to July 1 of each year, and shall designate the effective dates for payment of the new salaries; and

Whereas, the Board of Regents has delegated salary-setting responsibility for most unclassified staff to the President of the System and Chancellors:

Now, Therefore, the Board of Regents of the University of Wisconsin System designates July 1, 1977 for annual basis employees and the start of the academic year pay period as the effective dates for payment of the new salaries for its unclassified staff and affirms the delegated authority of the President of the System and the Chancellors to establish individual salaries for 1977-78. Salary change effective dates for persons with appointment periods commencing or renewed at times other than July 1 and the academic year may be set by Chancellors as appropriate. Salary actions will be reported to the Board when appropriate as a part of the annual budget documentation.

The President and Chancellors shall proceed to establish provisional salaries for persons in the unclassified staff by July 1. Total funds to be distributed should equal 9% of the salary payroll base; not less than 3.5% nor more than 4.5% of the payroll base shall be assigned in recognition of individual merit. Payment of these salaries is subject to approval of the state compensation plan. Should the terms of the state compensation plan require alteration of salaries established by the President and Chancellors, the Executive Committee of the Board is authorized to approve a procedure to modify salaries appropriately.

The President shall take further steps in behalf of the Board to establish provisional salaries for personnel above the Group 5 maximum according to the procedures applicable to other unclassified personnel, subject to normal Board review and state executive compensation policies.

EXHIBIT G

#### **RESOLUTION** 1476: (Policy-New)

That on recommendation of the System President, the Report of the Systemwide TDA Committee dated December 12, 1976, as amended below, serve as the basis for Central Administration's implementation of the authority granted under s. 36.11(15), Wis. Stats., to enter into or continue agreements to effect the purposes of section 403(b), Federal Internal Revenue Code relative to tax deferred annuities (TDA's):

1. New Preface to Criteria Listing (Insert on page 14 at end of Part I)

The following definitions apply to terms used in the criteria under II and III:

CONTRACT means insurance contract or any product of the insurance company qualified to be used as a TDA and investment contract to be used as a TDA offered by an investment company as covered under regulations of the Internal Revenue Service.

REPRESENTATIVE means agent, broker, salesperson, solicitor, selling officer, manager and any other titles indicating a seller of a TDA contract.

VENDOR as used throughout this document means investment companies and insurance companies qualified under Internal Revenue Service codes and regulations for this type product.

#### 2. Amended Criteria

#### II. General Criteria

- a. Every TDA vendor and/or contract must meet the regulation requirements of either the Wisconsin Commissioner of Insurance or the Wisconsin Commissioner of Securities, or both where appropriate.
- b. Every TDA vendor must be actively engaged in business in the state of Wisconsin and have been so engaged for at least three years, except where a vendor's contract is new to Wisconsin it may receive conditional qualification by the TDA Review Committee.
- c. Every TDA vendor with resident representatives shall designate <u>one</u> office in Wisconsin as <u>the</u> central administrative office for all tax deferred annuity contracts with UW system employees. Also, one person within that office, designated by the TDA vendor, shall have authority to respond and take corrective action, as necessary, concerning any inquiries about or complaints against the TDA vendor and any representative selling their TDA product to UW employees.
- d. Every TDA vendor with resident representatives shall assure the UW System that its representatives are properly licensed and qualified to sell their respective TDA products.

- e. Every TDA vendor shall provide for calculation of the Maximum Exclusion Allowance (MEA) for individual employees within the limits provided by the Internal Revenue Code and shall provide assurances that the UW System will not be held responsible for calculation errors or tax penalties assessed as a result.
- f. If a TDA vendor provides both fixed and variable annuities, both shall be made available to UW employees.
- g. Only those commercial TDA vendors offering group contracts may participate in the UWS TDA program and, based on initial experience with their products, the Board may opt to limit the number of vendors participating based on price and performance considerations.

#### III. Specific Criteria

For the period of implementation through December 31, 1979 every TDA vendor shall be required to meet the following <u>specific criteria</u> for its TDA product. The TDA Review Committee, with concurrence of the System President and Council of Chancellors may modify the criteria applicable after that date.

- a. The total of all sales charges, load charges or other charges which may be assessed against deposits during the year may not exceed 9% during the first year, 7% during the second through fifth years and 6% thereafter.
- b. The total of all investment, custodial, administrative, transaction, surrender or withdrawal charges, and other charges which may be assessed against the fund balance during any year may not exceed 1.5% of the average fund balance during that year.
- c. For annuity plans that provide a fixed, guaranteed, periodic benefit upon and after retirement, the annuity rate per \$1,000 to be applied in calculating the initial periodic benefit shall be not less than \$5.70 per month assuming that an individual enters into the TDA contract at age 45 or older, and at age 65 selects a single, life annuity with 10 years certain. The current annuity rate per \$1,000 shall be not less than \$7.50.
- d. For annuity plans that provide a fixed, guaranteed, periodic benefit upon and after retirement, the guaranteed fixed annuity interest rate during the accumulation period is to be credited at not less than 3.5%; and the estimated cash surrender value at the end of the year specified, based on current earnings (if the TDA vendor uses the "new money" concept, the average of the "new money" rates for the past five years should be used) and assuming deposits of \$100 per month, shall not be less than \$1,145 at end of year one, \$6,587 at end of year five, \$15,825 at end of year ten and \$47,000 at end of year twenty.

- 3. If initial responses from vendors do not include adequate participation by vendors of specific and categorical products, e.g. mutual funds, the TDA Review Committee may, with the approval of the System President, take steps prior to December, 1979 to encourage such participation provided they do not modify any existing criterion. The Committee may adopt additional criteria or procedures to provide encouragement.
- 4. It is the policy of the Regents to open the campus to solicitation for Tax Deferred Annuities by
  - a. The State Teachers Retirement System
  - b. TIAA CREF
  - c. The best 3-5 insurance companies selected on the basis of bids.
  - d. The best 3-5 Mutual funds selected on the basis of bids.

Central is requested to implement this policy and report back to the Board of Regents with the names of the companies and documents to effect immediate implementation of this program no later than the October Regents' meeting.

SUBJECT: Implementation of Regent-Approved Tax Deferred Annuity (TDA) Policy for UW System Employees

On June 10 the Board of Regents acted to approve an amended version of the TDA Committee Report circulated earlier. A copy of the amended and now final report is attached and will serve as the basis for the following actions:

1. Given Board concurrence in the Committee view that TIAA-CREF (Teachers Insurance Annuity Association-College Retirement Equities Fund) program was qualified to offer its product to UW System employees without further criteria or bid review, we contacted TIAA-CREF representatives on the afternoon of June 13 and will be meeting with them later this month preparatory to authorizing them to proceed in consultation with Institutional officers and representatives.

It would be well for each Institution to identify an appropriate officer or committee with which approved firms can work to establish the ground rules for solicitation and to inform the TDA Committee Secretary, William Hustedt.

- We will initiate the criteria/bid process immediately in order to carry out the Board directive to identify 3-5 commercial companies and 3-5 mutual funds selected under the approved criteria and judged best able to serve the TDA interests of our employees. We are aiming for selection in time for Board review in October.
- 3. In order to move ahead promptly and to make the necessary judgments during bid review, we will expand the existing TDA Committee with additional members as appropriate. Chancellors may suggest nominees for the expanded Committee immediately and send them to Committee Secretary William Hustedt, 1930 Monroe Street, Madison, Wisconsin 53711.

We will use the nominees as the basis for this interim augmentation of the current Committee and again for making selections for the ongoing TDA Review Committee. Please try to provide at least one representative from each of the three employee groups (faculty, academic and classified staff).

#### REPORT OF THE TAX DEFERRED ANNUITY (TDA) COMMITTEE

#### Background and General Information

A tax deferred annuity, or a tax sheltered annuity, is a deferred tax arrangement expressly permitted by sec. 403(b) of the Internal Revenue Code (IRC). Under this arrangement, an employer may purchase on behalf of an employee an annuity contract to supplement the employee's retirement benefits. The source of funds for this purchase are derived from the employee who is permitted to exclude from his income the amount used by the employer for the purchase of the annuity contract. The purpose of the law is to permit an individual to "shelter" a certain amount of his or her income during the employment years. The amounts received at the time of retirement and thereafter are taxed, but the assumption is that the individual will be in a lower tax bracket and that this will therefore be to that person's advantage.

The State Teacher's Retirement System (STRS) has provided a tax deferred annuity program to University of Wisconsin System Faculty for many years. The former Wisconsin State Universities provided a tax deferred annuity program for all employees pursuant to Sec. 403(b) of the IRC up until 1973 when this practice was questioned by the Department of Administration. The former Chapter 37 institutions ceased providing the program in 1974 after passage of the merger legislation when it was determined that only those employees already possessing TDA programs could continue. Since 1974, the only program available to employees who wished to participate but did not have an existing plan has been the STRS program for faculty.

A tax deferred annuity committee was appointed in 1972 in an effort to develop a uniform program for the UW System. That committee met during 1972 and 1973 and reported to the Board in May of 1973. However, because of the concerns raised by the Department of Administration and subsequently the Attorney General's office, no action was taken by the Board at that time. In fact, the merger legislation enacted subsequent to that report permitted only a continuation of existing TDA contracts and did not permit the expansion of the program. However, during this legislative session of 1976, sec. 36.11(15) of the Statutes was revised to permit the Board to enter into new agreements to effect the purposes of Section 403(b) of the IRC. A more detailed history of the previous TDA program and efforts within both the former Chapter 36 and Chapter 37 institution as well as the merged system was provided to the Board at its March, 1977, meeting. Copies of sec. 36.11(15) of Wisconsin Statutes and Section 403(b) of the Internal Revenue Code are attached for information.

#### THE TAX DEFERRED COMMITTEE

The present Tax Deferred Annuity Committee was appointed in July, 1976, by Vice President Winter after sec. 36.11(15) of the Statutes was enacted. The Committee is composed of 11 members and 2 ex officio members. The 11 committee members are Professor Seymour Abrahamson, UW-Madison; Robert Alesch, Central Administration, Personnel; Professor James Egan, UW-Eau Claire; Assistant Vice Chancellor Leila Fraser, UW-Milwaukee; Brad Giles, an actuary in the office of the State Insurance Commissioner; Dennis Huebschman, Personnel Director, UW-Parkside; Bill Hustedt, Central Administration, Director of Risk Management and Staff Benefits; Professor Dale Molander, UW-Oshkosh, Sandy Mocco, Business Services Office, UW-Green Bay; Phil Stephenson, State Teachers Retirement System; and Burton Wagner, Attorney, UW-Madison, Chairman of the Committee. The two ex officio members of the Committee are Mr. Rod Fornetti, Central Administration Risk Management and Staff Benefits Office, and Mr. Robert Nygaard, Payroll Office, UW-Madison. Mr. Alesch, Mr. Hustedt, Professor Molander, and Mr. Wagner served on the original TDA committee appointed in 1972. A complete listing of the committee is attached.

Before any committee meetings were held, an informational memo was sent out to all System employees advising them about the creation of the TDA Committee and soliciting any input they might have in regard to the program. Many responses were received including more than 25 written submissions from individuals relating to various aspects of the program. A recommendation from the Madison faculty committee that followed the progress of the TDA Committee is attached. Specific submissions were also provided by the Wisconsin Association of Life Underwriters. This organization, which represents the majority of insurance annuity providers in the state of Wisconsin, agreed to provide assistance to the Committee and to mediate between the UW System and the insurance industry to avoid the problems of communication which existed and hampered implementation of the TDA program originally recommended in 1973.

The Committee was appointed at the end of July and met four times during the fall of 1976, on September 2, September 27, October 19, and November 30. As its initial meeting, the Committee reviewed the history of TDA's within the UW System and the legal authority for them. In addition, the Committee proposed basic criteria that would be applicable to a TDA program and agreed to develop a disclosure form available to System employees so that they might be provided with the necessary information to make a reasonable judgment about different kinds of TDA products.

The decision by the Committee to establish criteria for all vendors and TDA products was made early in its deliberations. The alternative considered and rejected by the Committee was to solicit bids for a specific TDA product as the previous committee had done. Although many issues were discussed in regard to this particular problem, the necessity of implementing a program as soon as possible, the lack of adequate budget and staff to obtain experts or to go through a formal bid process, and the experience of the prior committee as well as directions from Vice President Winter were the primary reasons for adopting the criteria approach. (In fact, as a result of the criteria ultimately established by the Committee, it is likely that only a limited number of commercial companies will be eligible to solicit TDA contracts within the UW System.)

The Committee meetings were used to debate the TDA recommendations and disclosure form, and to refine these documents into their present format. Specific issues related to particular parts of the recommendation and the disclosure form are discussed below as a part of the analysis. Included where appropriate are those items which were rejected by the Committee and those issues which are pertinent to the program but not included in the recommendation.

#### ANALYSIS OF THE TDA RECOMMENDATION

#### Part I. Declaration of Intent.

This section sets forth the authority for tax deferred annuities provided by the Internal Revenue Code and Wisconsin Statutes. It recommends that commercial vendors of TDA products be required to meet specific and general criteria. The Committee believes that these criteria, when combined with the disclosure information, will enable the TDA purchaser to make an informed decision. Exempt from the stated criteria are contracts purchased from STRS or TIAA or CREF. It also "grandfathers" existing contracts and permits these contracts to be exempt from the general and specific criteria; however, the administrative procedures and the disclosure forms are applicable to these contracts.

The Committee recommends that STRS and TIAA be exempt from the specific requirements of the TDA proposal because of their minimum charges and close association with institutions of higher education. The recommendation to "grandfather" existing contracts was made to preclude an individual employee from suffering a penalty by shifting TDA contracts at this time, unless that is the employee's desire. However, it was felt that even the existing contract vendors ought to provide the employee with a full disclosure so that the individual may make an informed judgment as to whether or not continuation of the particular program is appropriate.

#### Part II. Criteria.

The recommendations which follow are those of the TDA Committee as amended by the Regents June 10, 1977.

A. In preparation for the Regents Meeting it was decided a section should be included on definitions. Since definitions are self-explanatory, no comment is needed further in this section.

#### B. General Criteria

The recommendations contained in B are intended to apply to all commercial vendors and relate to concerns of the System for protection of both the individual employee and the System itself. The emphasis on service and communication is evident in these criteria. The requirement for a TDA vendor to be licensed in Wisconsin by either the Commissioner of Insurance or the Commissioner of Securities insures the System and the employees that some external control mechanism is applied to the vendors and their products.

The requirement for a vendor to be actively engaged in business in the state of Wisconsin for three years was felt to be important in determining the kind of a sales and service history possessed by a TDA vendor. In addition, it gives evidence of the stability of the organization. However, because not all present TDA vendors have always provided that product, it was decided that the requirement not specify that the vendor be engaged in TDA business in Wisconsin for the last three years.

The requirement for the designation of a single office and a single responsible individual capable of addressing problems and correcting inequities was considered to be essential. The Committee was concerned that an individual employee not be required to go through several different layers of an organization in order to resolve problems. Also, it permits the administrative coordination of the program to be facilitated. The Committee recommends that every salesperson be properly licensed and qualified to sell the product. The Committee's concern in this regard was to assure that only those persons who were fully trained and qualified would participate in the solicitation of TDA business.

The requirement for the calculation of the maximum exclusion allowance by the TDA vendor and the assurances in regard to liability for errors in calculation should properly rest with the TDA vendor. The Committee was advised that the liability for providing erroneous information and thereby over-excluding taxable income remains the responsibility of the individual employee and cannot be guaranteed. However, the Committee recommends the requirement for a release of responsibility for the System in regard to errors which may result in penalties to the System.

The requirement for a TDA vendor to provide both fixed and variable annuities, if both are available, was a source of some concern by the Committee. The Wisconsin Association of Life Underwriters recommended that only TDA providers offering both fixed and variable annuities be permitted to solicit contracts within the UW System. Initially the Committee recommended that where both kinds of annuities are available, the specific commission paid to the salesperson soliciting the business ought to be identical. To achieve this result the Committee included a requirement for not more than a 1 percent differential between the salespersons' commissions applicable to fixed versus variable annuities. However, this latter condition was dropped at the last meeting of the Committee because of the potential problem that might exist for mutual funds. The problem for mutual funds relates to the possibility of a salesperson selling a "no load" mutual fund without commission and a "load" mutual fund at any percentage. The argument is that by restricting the comparability of commission rates to within 1 percent, the effect would be to prohibit the sale of "no load" mutual funds. The Committee was persuaded by the argument and the 1 percent restriction was rejected.

Another general criterion considered by the Committee and rejected was the concept of "brokerage." The Wisconsin Association of Life Underwriters has recommended that any duly qualified agent be permitted to sell any product available to UW System employees. This would have permitted an agent to sell any product regardless of whether or not that agent worked specifically for the vendor selling the particular product. It would have prohibited individual companies from selling products exclusively through their own agents. The Committee voted to reject this concept because it would eliminate from the TDA program those companies with excellent products that only sold through their own agents.

#### C. Specific Criteria

This part is recommended by the Committee as a temporary and regularly revisable section. The percents and dollars specified in these criteria reflect what the Committee believes to be an excellent basis for obtaining tax deferred annuities today. However, because new products are being developed every day and because the economic conditions may change substantially, it was determined that the specific criteria ought to be able to keep pace with these changes. In order to review and revise these criteria, the Committee has also recommended the creation of an ongoing TDA committee. Discussion of that recommendation is set forth below under Part III.

The recommendation for maximum sales or loading charges assessed against deposits is specified. The charges are higher during the early years and decrease thereafter. This permits the organizations to recover their initial costs, and as additional sums are invested in the annuity contracts, to permit any savings to be passed on to the individual employees. The Committee recognized that by specifying these percentages and reducing the allowable amount periodically it would eliminate those companies that charged a level rate above 6 percent. However, the Committee determined that there would be sufficient good TDA products available within the stated percentages and greater latitude should not be permitted.

The recommendation for maximum charges against the fund balance is intended to permit those products with significant earnings to obtain an appropriate return based on performance.

The specific criteria for calculating the initial periodic benefits are based on available data and assume specific fact situations. The rates included are reasonable.

The specific requirements related to fixed guaranteed annuities are also derived from current data and are reasonable in light of present conditions.

#### Part III. The Revision of Criteria.

The Committee at an early stage of its deliberation recognized the temporary nature of the proposed specific criteria for TDA contracts. The Committee also acknowledged the necessity of monitoring the TDA program and the performance of specific vendors within it. Because of these concerns, the Committee has recommended that the specific criteria set forth in C be reviewed and revised at least every two years. Initially, the Committee intends that the criteria established now be effective only until December, 1979, unless modified before that time. To assure that the criteria will be reviewed and revised, the Committee has recommended that this action take place not later than June 30, 1979. The time lag between the revision and the expected implementation date is set at six months based upon information provided by the Fringe Benefits Office in regard to the time needed to make modification, to alert contract vendors, and to provide further information to the employees. Further, because these criteria are highly technical in nature and require specific application of industry-wide data, it was determined that a committee with sufficient technical expertise ought to make these decisions. Therefore, the Committee has recommended that the revised specific criteria be reported to the Board for information. The Board agreed that with concurrence of the System President and Council of Chancellors the specific criteria may be modified.

The Committee, however, determined that the general criteria relating primarily to the service and quality aspects of the TDA program should be submitted to the Board for consideration and approval. Therefore, any changes in B, General Criteria, are intended to be recommended to the Board for approval prior to implementation.

The Committee has recommended the creation of an ongoing TDA committee with adequate staff and budget assistance to facilitate its operation. This committee is to be appointed by the President of the UW System and is to have the following authority and specific responsibilities: 1) authority to investigate the possibility of seeking, through a bid process, a single, or very limited number, of TDA vendors; 2) responsibility to review and evaluate the performance of the program and the individual TDA vendors and to have authority to withdraw a particular vendor's right to solicit within the System; and 3) authority to prescribe specific dates for the implementation of any new or revised criteria.

The Committee recommends that the proposed continuing TDA committee be broad-based, deriving membership from all parts of the UW System. Although it may not be possible to represent each and every unit within the System, it is the recommendation of the Committee that all categories of employees within the System be specifically represented; in particular, the classified staff, the academic staff, and the faculty. In addition, the Committee recommends that experts or technicians from appropriate state agencies or departments be requested to sit with the Committee to provide appropriate input. In particular, a representative from the office of the Commissioner of Insurance, or the Commissioner of Securities, and the Employe Trust Funds area ought to sit with the continuing committee. Moreover, the Committee strongly endorses the need for sufficient budget and adequate staff to meet the needs of the continuing TDA committee. The Committee also recommends that each person appointed to this committee serve a minimum of four years to assure continuity and further recommends that the terms of the various University people be staggered to permit sufficient continuity of membership. Finally, the Committee recommends that no person with responsibility for administration of the TDA program be appointed as a member of the committee. It is expected that these

people would attend committee meetings and provide information and staff assistance to the committee.

#### Part IV. Guidelines for Administrative Procedures

The Committee recommends that the Central Administration office of Staff Benefits be permitted to develop any necessary forms or procedures or related documents required for the implementation and processing of the TDA program. Further, the Committee has developed a specific disclosure form which is to be required from every TDA contract vendor. The Committee also recommends that comparable data for STRS and TIAA be provided to interested employees so that they may compare these plans with the commercial products. Revision or redrafting of the disclosure form is delegated to the Central Administration Staff Benefits Office and the proposed continuing TDA committee. It is the expectation of the Committee that individual commercial contract vendors will duplicate the disclosure format and submit it along with their standard documents to the employees and the processing offices.

Several additional procedural concerns were considered by the Committee and actions are recommended although they are not included in the TDA recommendation itself. The Committee recognized the need for better communication with employees about all TDA programs. It recommends that educational material be provided to all employees and that educational sessions be held on all campuses. Better information about STRS is considered to be particularly important because no effort is made by STRS to acquaint employees with its programs.

The Committee also recognized the diversity which exists within the UW System and recommends that each institution promulgate its own rules for solicitation of TDA contracts. Each unit would have to stay within the general guidelines and would have to meet the procedural requirements for processing TDA agreements. However, when, where, and how often solicitation would take place are considered to be decisions that can only be made by the institutions after considering their capabilities and needs.

#### TDA DISCLOSURE FORM

The Committee recommends the particular disclosure form attached to the recommendation as a starting point for the proposed TDA program. The form itself requires that it be completed by a representative of the TDA vendor and if the employee purchases a contract from that vendor, the form must also be signed by the individual employee prior to processing by any UW System payroll unit. In particular, the form asks for information relating to charges, current interest rates, and guaranteed interest rates. The Committee decided that this information would be most useful to the greatest number of employees. The specific criteria in regard to expected yield, guaranteed annuity rates, and the like was determined to be too technical for most employees to understand. Moreover, the individual TDA vendor agent will provide that specific information in an effort to distinguish his/her product from the other products on the market. However, comparative costs will provide individual employees with a sound basis to determine what is available for investment and potentially for annuity purposes. A comparable disclosure form listing the same data for STRS and TIAA will be made available to employees by the Central Administration Staff Benefits Office.

#### FINAL RECOMMENDATION

The Committee recognizes that its initial effort to recommend a method of implementing a TDA program for all employees of the UW System is only a first step. The Committee has recommended criteria and general guidelines for implementation. It further recommends that the report and recommendation be submitted to the Council of Chancellors for review and comment before submission to the Board of Regents.

When the TDA proposal is finally presented to the Board, the Committee is prepared to assist in the presentation and to discuss or clarify any of its recommendations.

#### TAX DEFERRED ANNUITY (TDA) RECOMMENDATION

#### Part I. Declaration of Intent.

Pursuant to section 403(b) of the Internal Revenue Code of 1954 as amended and section 36.11(15) of Wisconsin Statutes, and at the specific request of an employee of the Board of Regents, the Board will purchase an annuity contract on behalf of that employee from any TDA vendor that meets the criteria set forth below in B and C, or from STRS or TIAA or CREF. Any TDA vendor that wishes to participate with the Board in providing these benefits must also agree to conform to those administrative procedures and policies needed for implementation of this program and promulgated by the UWS Central Administration in accordance with Part IV, below. Those employees with existing annuity contracts that conform to s. 403(b) of the Internal Revenue Code may continue their contracts without regard to the criteria listed in B and C, except that the disclosure requirements and administrative procedures applicable to new contracts shall also apply to these contracts.

Part II. Criteria.

Below are the TDA recommendations as amended by the Board June 10, 1977.

#### A. Definitions

The following definitions apply to terms used in the criteria under B and C.

1. CONTRACT means (1) insurance contract or any product of the insurance company qualified to be used as a TDA; and/or (2) investment contract to be used as a TDA offered by an investment company as covered under regulations of the Internal Revenue Service.

2. REPRESENTATIVE means agent, broker, salesperson, solicitor, selling officer, manager and any other titles indicating a seller of a TDA contract.

3. VENDOR as used throughout this document means investment companies and insurance companies qualified under Internal Revenue Service codes and regulations for this type product.

B. General Criteria

1. Every TDA vendor and/or contract must meet the regulation requirements of either the Wisconsin Commissioner of Insurance or the Wisconsin Commissioner of Securities, or both where appropriate.

2. Every TDA vendor must be actively engaged in business in the State of Wisconsin and have been so engaged for at least three years; except where a vendor's contract is new to Wisconsin, it may receive conditional qualification by the TDA Review Committee.

3. Every TDA vendor with resident representatives shall designate one office in Wisconsin as the central administrative office for all tax deferred annuity contracts with UW System employees. Also, one person within that office, designated by the TDA vendor, shall have authority to respond and take corrective action, as necessary, concerning any inquiries about or complaints against the TDA vendor and any representative selling their TDA product to UW employees.

4. Every TDA vendor with resident representatives shall assure the UW System that its representatives are properly licensed and qualified to sell their respective TDA products.

5. Every TDA vendor shall provide for calculation of the Maximum Exclusion Allowance (MEA) for individual employees within the limits provided by the Internal Revenue Code and shall provide assurances that the UW System will not be held responsible for calculation errors or tax penalties assessed as a result.

6. If a TDA vendor provides both fixed and variable annuities, both shall be made available to UW employees.

7. Only those commercial TDA vendors offering group contracts may participate in the UWS TDA program and, based on initial experience with their products, the Board may opt to limit the number of vendors participating based on price and performance considerations.

#### C. Specific Criteria

For the period of implementation through December 31, 1979, every TDA vendor shall be required to meet the following specific criteria for its TDA product. The TDA Review Committee, with concurrence of the System President and Council of Chancellors, may modify the criteria applicable after that date.

1. The total of all sales charges, load charges, or other charges which may be assessed against deposits during the year may not exceed 9 percent during the first year, 7 percent during the second through fifth years, and 6 percent thereafter.

2. The total of all investment, custodial, administrative, transaction, surrender or withdrawal charges, and other charges which may be assessed against the fund balance during any year may not exceed 1.5 percent of the average fund balance during that year.

3. For annuity plans that provide a fixed, guaranteed, periodic benefit upon and after retirement, the annuity rate per \$1,000 to be applied in calculating the initial periodic benefit shall be not less than \$5.70 per month assuming than an individual enters into the TDA contract at age 45 or older and at age 65 selects a single, life annuity with 10 years certain. The current annuity rate per \$1,000 shall be not less than \$7.50.

4. For annuity plans that provide a fixed, guaranteed, periodic benefit upon and after retirement, the guaranteed fixed annuity interest rate during the accumulation period is to be credited at not less than 3.5 percent; and the estimated cash surrender value at the end of the year specified, based on current earnings (if the TDA vendor uses the "new money" concept, the average of the "new money" rates for the past five years should be used) and assuming deposits of \$100 per month, shall not be less than \$1,145 at end of year one, \$6,587 at end of year five, \$15,825 at end of year ten, and \$47,000 at end of year twenty.

#### D. General

1. If initial responses from vendors do not include adequate participation by vendors of specific and categorical products; e.g., mutual funds, the TDA Review Committee may, with the approval of the System President, take steps prior to December, 1979, to encourage such participation, provided they do not modify any existing criterion. The Committee may adopt additional criteria or procedures to provide encouragement.

2. It is the policy of the Regents to open the campus to solicitation for tax deferred annuities by (1) The State Teachers Retirement System; (2) TIAA-CREF; (3) the best 3-5 insurance companies selected on the basis of bids; and (4) the best 3-5 mutual funds selected on the basis of bids.

3. Central is requested to implement this policy and report back to the Board of Regents no later than the October Regents' meeting with the names of the companies and documents to effect immediate implementation of this program.

Part III. Revision of Criteria.

A. The specific criteria set forth in C shall be reviewed and revised as needed but not later than June 30, 1979, and not less than every two years thereafter. Industry-wide data for the various types of products available shall be used in setting new criteria after considering the particular needs of the UW System employees.

B. The general criteria set forth in B shall be reviewed and revised as needed. Recommendations for changes in these criteria shall be submitted to the Board for approval before implementation.

C. The President of the UW System shall appoint a continuing TDA committee with adequate staff and budget assistance to review and revise the TDA criteria. This TDA committee shall: (1) Be provided with authority to immediately investigate the feasibility of a TDA program for the UW System with only a single or limited number of TDA vendors; (2) be responsible for evaluating the performance of the System TDA program and the specific performance of individual TDA vendors, and shall have authority to withdraw from any vendor the privilege of soliciting TDA contracts in the UW System; and (3) be provided with authority to set dates for the implementation of any new or revised criteria.

Part IV. Guidelines for Administrative Procedures.

A. The UWS Central Administration shall develop any necessary forms, formats, and procedures for the implementation of this program.

B. The UWS Central Administration shall specify a uniform disclosure form for the use of every TDA vendor to provide necessary information to the employees in accordance with the criteria specified in C and to permit a comparison of benefits. A separate document listing the comparable STRS, TIAA and CREF data shall be made available to employees. The disclosure form must be completed before a TDA contract is processed.

# UNIVERSITY OF WISCONSIN SYSTEM---SALARY REDUCTION AGREEMENTS

#### CHAPTER 400, LAWS OF 1975

#### **ASSEMBLY BILL 786**

An Act to amend 36.11(15) of the statutes, relating to authorizing the board of regents of the university of Wisconsin system to continue and enter into new salary reduction agreements with its employes pursuant to the internal revenue code and to purchase annuities thereunder.

The people of the state of Wisconsin, represented in senate and assembly, do enact as follows:

36.11(15) of the statutes is amended to read:

36.11

(15) The board • • • may continue all salary reduction agreements with its employes pursuant to section 403(b) of the internal revenue code. The board may enter into new salary reduction agreements with its employes pursuant to section 403(b) of the internal revenue code or other applicable federal law and may purchase annuities for its employes pursuant to these agreements from such annuity providers, both public and private, as the board deems appropriate.

Effective June 12, 1976.

#### [Sec. 403(b)]

(b) TAXABILITY OF BENEFICIARY UNDER ANNUITY PURCHASED BY SECTION 501 (c) (3) ORGANIZATION OR PUBLIC SCHOOL.—

(1) GENERAL RULE-If-

(A) an annuity contract is purchased-

(i) for an employee by an employer described in section 501 (c)(3) which is exempt from tax under section 501(a), or

(ii) for an employee (other than an employee described in clause (i)), who performs services for an educational institution (as defined in section 151(e)(4)), by an employer which is a State, a political subdivision of a State, or an agency or instrumentality of any one or more of the foregoing,

(B) such annuity contract is not subject to subsection (a), and

(C) the employee's rights under the contract are nonforfeitable, except for failure to pay future premiums,

then amounts contributed by such employer for such annuity contract on or after such rights become nonforfeitable shall be excluded from the gross income of the employee for the taxable year to the extent that the aggregate of such amounts does not exceed the exclusion allowance for such taxable year. The employee shall include in his gross income the amounts received under such contract for the year received as provided in section 72 (relating to annuities).

#### Caution: Code Sec. 403(b)(2), as amended by P. L. 93-406, is effective for years beginning after 1975.—CCH.]

(2) EXCLUSION ALLOWANCE .----

(A) IN GENERAL.—For purposes of this subsection, the exclusion allowance for any employee for the taxable year is an amount equal to the excess, if any, of—

(i) the amount determined by multiplying 20 percent of his includible compensation by the number of years of service, over

(ii) the aggregate of the amount contributed by the employer for annuity contracts and excludible from the gross income of the employee for any prior taxable year.

(B) ELECTION TO HAVE ALLOWANCE DETERMINED UNDER SECTION 415 **RULES.**—In the case of an employee who makes an election under section 415(c)(4)(D) to have the provisions of section 415(c)(4)(C) (relating to special rule for section 403(b) contracts purchased by educational institutions, hospitals, and home health service agencies) apply, the exclusion allowance for any such employee for the taxable year is the amount which could be contributed (under section 415) by his employer under a plan described in section 403(a) if the annuity contract for the benefit of such employee were treated as a defined contribution plan maintained by the employer. (3) INCLUBILE COMPENSATION.—For purposes of this subsection, the term "includible compensation" means, in the case of any employee, the amount of compensation which is received from the employer described in paragraph (1)(A), and which is includible in gross income (computed without regard to sections 105(d) and 911) for the most recent period (ending not later than the close of the taxable year) which under paragraph (4) may be counted as one year of service. Such term does not include any amount contributed by the employer for any annuity contract to which this subsection applies.

(4) YEARS OF SERVICE.—In determining the number of years of service for purposes of this subsection, there shall be included—

(A) one year for each full year during which the individual was a full-time employee of the organization purchasing the annuity for him, and

(B) a fraction of a year (determined in accordance with regulations prescribed by the Secretary or his delegate) for each full year during which such individual was a part-time employee of such organization and for each part of a year during which such individual was a full-time or part-time employee of such organization.

#### In no case shall the number of years of service be less than one.

(5) APPLICATION TO MORE THAN ONE ANNUITY CONTRACT.—If for any taxable year of the employee this subsection applies to 2 or more annuity contracts purchased by the employer, such contracts shall be treated as one contract.

(6) FORFEITABLE RIGHTS WHICH BECOME NONFORFEITABLE.—For purposes of this subsection and section 72(f) (relating to special rules for computing employees' contributions to annuity contracts), if rights of the employee under an annuity contract described in subparagraphs (A) and (B) of paragraph (1) change from forfeitable to nonforfeitable rights, then the amount (determined without regard to this subsection) includible in gross income by reason of such change shall be treated as an amount contributed by the employer for such annuity contract as of the time such rights become nonforfeitable.

#### Caution: Code Sec. 403(b)(7), as added by P. L. 93-406, is effective as of January 1, 1974.—CCH.]

#### (7) CUSTODIAL ACCOUNTS FOR REGULATED INVESTMENT COMPANY STOCK .--

(A) AMOUNTS PAID TREATED AS CONTRIBUTIONS.—For purposes of this title, amounts paid by an employer described in paragraph (1)(A) to a custodial account which satisfies the requirements of section 401(f)(2) shall be treated as amounts contributed by him for an annuity contract for his employee if the amounts are paid to provide a retirement benefit for that employee and are to be invested in regulated investment company stock to be held in that custodial account.

(B) ACCOUNT TREATED AS PLAN.—For purposes of this title, a custodial account which satisfies the requirements of section 401(f)(2) shall be treated as an organization described in section 401(a) solely for pur-

poses of subchapter F and subtitle F with respect to amounts received by it (and income from investment thereof).

(C) REGULATED INVESTMENT COMPANY.—For purposes of this paragraph, the term "regulated investment company" means a domestic corporation which is a regulated investment company within the meaning of section 851(a), and which issues only redeemable stock.

#### President McNamara presiding

President McNamara introduced and welcomed to the Board of Regents Marilyn Fitzgerald, Platteville, and David E. Beckwith, Milwaukee.

PRESENT: Regents Barkla, Beckwith, DeBardeleben, Erdman, Fish, Fitzgerald, Gerrard, Grover, Hales, Johnson, Lavine, Lawton, McNamara, Neshek, Thompson, Walter

ABSENT: None

Upon motion by Regent Lavine, seconded by Regent Hales, it was VOTED, That the minutes of the meeting of the Board of Regents of the University of Wisconsin System held on April 15, 1977, be approved as sent out to the Regents.

### A. REPORT OF THE PRESIDENT OF THE BOARD

1. Regent Neshek moved adoption of the following resolution, the motion was seconded by Regent Lavine, and it was voted:

Resolution 1453: WHEREAS, Caroline T. Sandin of Ashland is leaving this Board after serving for nine years as a Regent of the University of Wisconsin and of the University of Wisconsin System, and

> WHEREAS, in addition to the valuable contributions she has made as a member of these governing boards and as a member of the Education Committee of this board, Mrs. Sandin took time from her responsibilities as the wife of a physician and mother of seven children to serve the cause of education as president for eight years of the Ashland Board of Education and on committees of the Wisconsin School Boards Association and the State Department of Public Instruction,

BE IT RESOLVED, that the Board of Regents expresses appreciation to Caroline T. Sandin for her wise counsel, commends her for her devoted and distinguished service to the citizens of Wisconsin, and grants to her the status of Regent Emerita.

2. Regent Neshek moved adoption of the following resolution, and the motion was seconded by Regent Beckwith:

Resolution 1454: WHEREAS, Frank J. Pelisek of Milwaukee served eight years as a Regent of the University of Wisconsin and the University of Wisconsin System, and

> WHEREAS, he had a leading role in the establishment and early direction of the University System, serving as a member of the statutory Merger Implementation Committee, as chairman of a special committee which drafted the implementation law, as vice president of the new Board of Regents and as the Board's second president, from 1973 to 1975, and

WHEREAS, his experience and skill as an attorney, state government adviser and civic leader contributed much to the rise of this Board and University System to national prominence in higher education,

BE IT RESOLVED, that his fellow Regents thank and commend Jack Pelisek for his dedicated and outstanding service and leadership on the governing boards of the former University of Wisconsin and the present University of Wisconsin System and grant him the status of Regent Emeritus.

Regent DeBardeleben made the following statement: "I too would like to join in the second of this, and I suspect there are many other members of the Board who would. I think that this resolution really does not do justice to the contributions that Jack Pelisek has made to the University of Wisconsin System and the State of Wisconsin. I've been on this Board with many differing viewpoints on things from those held by Jack Pelisek, and I continued to differ with him on many things throughout the time that we served together. I came to respect him as a person of extraordinary ability and dedication, and I would like to have these remarks made a part of the record."

The question was put on Resolution 1454, and it was voted.

3. Vice President Neshek assumed the Chair.

President McNamara moved adoption of the following resolution, the motion was seconded by several Regents, and it was voted:

Resolution 1455: That in recognition of his countless and immeasurable contributions to the people of this State as the first president of the University of Wisconsin System, the members of this Board salute, commend and thank John Carrier Weaver for his devoted and courageous leadership during a period of historic transition in higher education administration in Wisconsin, and hereby authorize and approve his change of status from System President and Professor to President Emeritus and John H. Lathrop Professor in the UW System, together with continuance of his professorships at UW-Madison, UW-Milwaukee and UW-Green Bay. The Regents further grant him a leave of absence for academic year 1977-78. 4. Vice President Neshek called for nominations for the office of the President of the Board of Regents. Regent Walter nominated Bertram N. McNamara, and the nomination was seconded by Regent DeBardeleben and Regent Fish.

Regent Gerrard nominated Edward E. Hales, and the nomination was seconded by Regents Lavine and Grover.

The vote by secret ballot resulted in nine votes for Regent Hales, seven votes for Regent McNamara, and Regent Hales was therefore declared President of the Board effective July 1, 1977.

President McNamara resumed the Chair.

President McNamara called for nominations for the position of Vice President of the Board of Regents of the University of Wisconsin System.

Regent DeBardeleben nominated Joyce Erdman for Vice President, and the nomination was seconded by Regent Walter.

Regent Grover nominated Milton Neshek, and the motion was seconded by Regents Lawton and Fish.

The vote by secret ballot resulted in ten votes for Regent Neshek and six votes for Regent Erdman. Regent Neshek was declared Vice President of the Board for the term beginning July 1, 1977.

5. President McNamara called for nominations for the positions of Secretary and Trust Officer; Assistant Secretary and Assistant Trust Officer; and Assistant Trust Officer. Regent Lawton nominated Joseph Holt for the positions of Secretary and Trust Officer, Robert Winter for the positions of Assistant Secretary and Assistant Trust Officer, and Charles Stathas for the position of Assistant Trust Officer, the nominations were seconded by Regent Gerrard, and they were voted unanimously on a voice vote.

6. The report of the Higher Educational Aids Board meeting held on May 13, 1977, was received for the record. (EXHIBIT A, attached)

7. President McNamara referred to the material sent to the members of the Board relative to the change in status and role of the Board of Visitors and described the types of similar organizations on the various campuses.

Regent Neshek moved adoption of the following resolution, and the motion was seconded by Regent Erdman:

That previous resolutions relating to the establishment, composition and duties of the Board of Visitors be rescinded; and, that each Chancellor be authorized to appoint an appropriate Board of Visitors.

After extensive discussion, the details of which will be found in the full minutes on file in each campus library, Regent DeBardeleben moved that the resolution be tabled, the motion was properly seconded, and it was voted.

The remarks of Anthony Brewster, President of the Board of Visitors, and the discussion which followed relative to the above matter, will be found in the full minutes on file in each campus library.

8. President McNamara confirmed that the next meeting of the Board would be held on July 22, 1977.

9. President McNamara advised the Board that there are two potential vacancies on the University Hospitals Council of Trustees as the terms of Ex-Regent Pelisek and Mr. Thomas Shropshire will expire on August 15, 1977.

10. President McNamara offered sincere and warmest congratulations to Regent Hales on his election as President of the Board and stated that in his judgment Regent Hales would make an outstanding President, and that he would give his complete support to Regent Hales in his new office.

B. REPORT OF THE PRESIDENT OF THE SYSTEM

1. Regent Lavine moved adoption of the following resolution, the motion was seconded by Regent Johnson, and it was voted:

Resolution 1456: That the Report of Non-Personnel Actions by Administrative Officers to the Board of Regents and Informational Items Reported for the Regent Record be received for the record; and that actions included in the report be approved, ratified, and confirmed. (EXHIBIT B, on file)

2. President Weaver called upon Chancellor Lee Sherman Dreyfus for a report on University of Wisconsin-Stevens Point. Chancellor Dreyfus' report consisted of an audiovisual presentation explaining the campus, its faculty, students and mission.

C. REPORT OF THE EDUCATION COMMITTEE

The report of the Education Committee was presented by Regent DeBardeleben.

1. Regent DeBardeleben moved adoption of the following resolution, and the motion was seconded by Regent Walter:

That, upon recommendation of the President of the UW System and the Chancellor of UW-Superior, the UW-Superior faculty policies and procedures document, except for Section UW-Superior 3.06(4), be approved as required under UWS 2.02.

Considerable discussion ensued relating to the Section UW-Superior 3.06(4) portion of the document dealing with extension of the period for granting tenure. The details will be found in the full minutes on file in each campus library.

With the consent of the maker of the motion and of the second, the resolution was amended to read as follows:

Resolution 1457: That, upon recommendation of the President of the UW System and (Policy-New) the Chancellor of UW-Superior, the UW-Superior faculty policies and procedures document, except for Section UW-Superior 3.06(4), which is tabled for consideration at the July 22 meeting of the Board, be approved as required under UWS 2.02.

The question was put on Resolution 1457, and it was voted.

2. Regent DeBardeleben stated that in the Committee meeting the previous day there had been a presentation by the Urban Corridor Consortium (Parkside, Milwaukee, Oshkosh, and Green Bay).

3. Regent DeBardeleben stated that Senior Vice President Donald Smith had made reports to the Committee as follows:

- (1) Progress Report on System Planning Study of Professional Performing Arts Programs (BFA/MFA/BM/MM)
- (2) Progress Report of the System Advisory Committee on American Ethnic Studies
- (3) Information Report on Academic Changes Approved by Central Administration, 1976-77

Two corrections in the above report were made, as follows:

The indicated change of the UW-Milwaukee Department of Religious Studies to a Department of Comparative Study of Religions is an error. The Department of Religious Studies stands. A new coding for a program in Comparative Study of Religion has been established and should be noted.

At UW-Platteville, the College of Industry and College of Business and Economics are combined into a College of Business, Industry and Communications--not Business, Industry, and Economics.

- (4) Resolution Commending Professor William T. Lenehan, UW-Madison, by the College Writing Association/Wisconsin Association of Departments of English
- (5) Appointment of Basic Skills Task Force
- (6) Information Reports on:

Regent DeBardeleben pointed out that the following changes in the list were noted:

Professors Clarence E. Johnson and David A. Stuiber were deleted from the Madison list since they are also listed under UW-Extension.

The name of Edward F. Obert (UW-Madison) was removed from the Emeritus list since he will not retire this year.

4. Regent DeBardeleben moved adoption of the following resolution, the motion was seconded by Regent Walter, and it was voted:

Resolution 1458: That, upon recommendation of the President of the UW System and the UW Pigeon Lake Field Station Consortium, Resolution #400 (2-9-73), approving the Articles of Agreement of the Clam Lake-Pigeon Lake Field Station Consortium be rescinded, and that the Articles of Agreement forming the basis for the consortium of UW institutions to administer academic programs and operate physical facilities at Pigeon Lake Field Station, be approved. (Copy of agreement on file with the papers of this meeting.)

5. Regent DeBardeleben moved adoption of the following resolution, the motion was seconded by Regent Lavine, and it was voted:

Resolution 1459: That, upon recommendation of the President of the UW System, (Policy-New) Academic Planning Statement #3.1 (ACPS-3.1), Implementation Guidelines for Faculty Development and Renewal, dated May, 1977, be approved. (Copy on file with the papers of the meeting)

6. Regent DeBardeleben moved adoption of Resolution 1460 relating to acceptance of Proffer by Trustees of the William F. Vilas Trust Estate for support of scholarships, fellowships and professorships (<u>EXHIBIT D</u>, attached), the motion was seconded by Regent Beckwith, and it was voted.

7. Regent DeBardeleben moved adoption of the following resolutions, the motion was seconded by Regent Beckwith, and they were voted:

Resolution 1461: That the Board of Regents of the University of Wisconsin System gratefully accepts the gift by the Trustees of the William F. Vilas Trust Estate (copy dated April 25, 1977, on file), of \$16,000.00 for the academic year 1977-78, for the encouragement of merit and talent, or to promote appreciation of and taste for, the art of music, in connection with University instruction therein, to be used for the following purposes:

- At the University of Wisconsin-Madison, School of Music, six master classes and lectures by eminent American performers, music historians, and music critics (\$8,500.00)
- 2. At the University of Wisconsin-Milwaukee, Music Department, for a proposal entitled "The Tanglewood Symposium Revisited" (\$7,500.00)

D. REPORT OF THE BUSINESS AND FINANCE COMMITTEE

The report of the Business and Finance Committee was presented by Regent Hales.

1. Regent Hales recalled that most of the members of the Board had been present at the Committee meeting on the previous day and participated in the discussion and vote on the matter of the UW System investments in South Africa. A summary of the comments made at the meeting prepared by Senior Vice President Donald Percy is attached as <u>EXHIBIT</u> <u>E</u>.

Regent Hales moved adoption of the following resolution, and the motion was seconded by Regent Lawton:

That the University Administration develop and implement a plan for prudent divestiture of any existing holdings in companies doing significant business in South Africa and that it develop guidelines for assuring compliance with s. 36.29(1), Wis. Stats., in future investment activities.

Regent DeBardeleben moved that the above resolution be tabled until the October 1977 meeting of the Board, and the motion was seconded by Regent Johnson. The motion to table failed on a roll call vote, with Regents DeBardeleben, Erdman, Fish, Johnson, Neshek and Thompson voting "Aye" (6), and with Regents Barkla, Beckwith, Fitzgerald, Gerrard, Grover, Hales, Lawton, McNamara and Walter voting "No" (9), and with Regent Lavine absent.

Extensive discussion followed, the details of which will be found in the full minutes on file in each campus library. The matter was deferred until after the recess for lunch and other matters considered. Following the recess for lunch Regent Hales moved adoption of the following substitute resolution, and the motion was seconded by Regent Beckwith:

# Resolution 1469: That the Central Administration develop and present to the Board:

- 1. A plan for prudent divestiture of any existing investments in companies doing significant business in South Africa
- 2. Guidelines to assure compliance with s. 36.29(1), Wis. Stats., in future investment activities
- 3. An assessment of UW System or investment counsel capability to make necessary determinations regarding discriminatory policies or practices of companies and discriminatory laws of the countries in which they do significant business.
- 4. An assessment as to whether compliance with s. 36.29(1), Wis. Stats., impacts in such a way as to effectively preclude investments in the commercial securities market
- 5. A statement of the steps necessary to achieve clarification or amendment of s. 36.29(1), Wis. Stats.

Following a short discussion, the question was put on Resolution 1469, and it was voted unanimously.

2. Regent Hales moved adoption of Resolution 1470 relating to the 1977-78 budget request for University of Wisconsin Hospitals, (attached as  $\underline{\text{EXHIBIT}}$  F), the motion was seconded by Regent Lawton, and it was voted.

3. Regent Hales noted that the late Enid Pomeroy McTaggart bequeathed the "rest, residue and remainder" of her estate to the Department of Medical Research at the University of Wisconsin. The estate is estimated at approximately \$100,000.

Regent Hales moved adoption of the following resolution, the motion was seconded by Regent Lavine, and it was voted:

Resolution 1471: That the bequest of the late Enid Pomeroy McTaggart, Janesville, Wisconsin, to the University of Wisconsin be accepted by the Board of Regents of the University of Wisconsin System in accordance with the terms and conditions of the Last Will and Testament of Enid Pomeroy McTaggart, Deceased; and that the Secretary or Assistant Secretary be authorized to sign a receipt on behalf of the Board of Regents of the University of Wisconsin System for this bequest, and to do all things necessary to effect the transfer of this bequest to the University of Wisconsin-Madison.

4. Regent Hales reported that the late Ruth M. Rowland bequeathed to the University of Wisconsin-Oshkosh her limited editions library.

Regent Hales moved adoption of the following resolution, the motion was seconded by Regent Lavine, and it was voted:

Resolution 1472: That the bequest of the late Ruth M. Rowland, Oshkosh, Wisconsin, to the University of Wisconsin be accepted by the Board of Regents of the University of Wisconsin System in accordance with the terms and conditions of the Last Will and Testament of Ruth M. Rowland, Deceased; and that the Secretary or Assistant Secretary be authorized to sign a receipt on behalf of the Board of Regents of the University of Wisconsin System for this bequest, and to do all things necessary to effect the transfer of this bequest to the University of Wisconsin-Oshkosh.

5. Regent Hales moved adoption of the following resolution, the motion was seconded by Regent Lavine, and it was voted:

Resolution 1473: That, upon recommendation of the President of the System, the gifts, grants and contracts presented at this meeting (copy filed with the papers of this meeting) be accepted, approved, ratified and confirmed; and that, where signature authority has not been previously delegated, appropriate officers be authorized to sign agreements.

6. Regent Hales moved adoption of Resolution 1474 relating to salaries for unclassified staff (attached as <u>EXHIBIT</u> <u>G</u>), the motion was seconded by Regent Erdman, and it was voted.

7. Regent Hales reported that the Vice President and Controller had presented reports in the Committee meeting on the previous day relating to the transfer of collection and billing procedures for NSDL accounts to the HEAB as of July 1, 1977; the quarterly report of State Investment Fund earnings on Auxiliary Operation balances for the quarter ending March 31, 1977, and the monthly report on year-end balances, which show a projected free balance of \$347,000.00 as of the end of May.

8. Regent Hales moved adoption of the following resolution, the motion was seconded by Regent Lawton, and it was voted:

Resolution 1475: That, subject to necessary State of Wisconsin approvals, the Endowment Management and Research Corporation, Boston, Mass., be employed to furnish investment counselling services for the University of Wisconsin System trust funds, with authority to purchase and sell securities on a discretionary basis, subject to guidelines furnished by the Business and Finance Committee, for the period July 1, 1977, to June 30, 1978, at a cost of no more than 0.4% of assets managed. 9. Regent Hales moved adoption of Resolution 1476 relating to implementation of authority to enter into or continue agreements to effect the purposes of section 403(b), Federal Internal Revenue Code, relative to tax-deferred annuities (TDA's) (attached as <u>EXHIBIT H</u>), the motion was seconded by Regent Erdman, and after a short discussion it was voted.

The meeting recessed for lunch at 12:24 P.M. and resumed at 1:30 P.M., with all Regents present.

By voice vote the members of the Board approved the recommendation of the President that the request for appearances relative to the South African investment matter made by Katherine Hoffman, appearing for herself, and a representative of the Revolutionary Student Brigade be denied.

10. Regent Hales moved adoption of the following resolution, and the motion was seconded by Regent Thompson:

Resolution 1477: That, upon the recommendation of the respective Chancellors and the President of the System, the University of Wisconsin System's operating budget for the fiscal year July 1, 1977, through June 30, 1978, for Auxiliary Enterprises and Segregated Fee Operations, including user charges and other items reflected in Book C, 1977-78 Annual Budget Documentation, dated May 20, 1977, as presented to the Board and on file with the records of this meeting be approved. Any new programs to be funded by the segregated fee or user charge are subject to review and prior approval by Central Administration; and that Central Administration, together with the campuses, be authorized to revise and approve budgets in accordance with actual enrollment experience for the first semester 1977-78, or other significant economic factors which necessitate a budget change.

A person who attempted to address the members of the Board relative to the South African investment matter was ruled out of order and escorted from the room.

After a short discussion the question was put on Resolution 1477, and it was voted.

11. Regent Hales moved adoption of the following resolution, and the motion was seconded by Regent Neshek:

Resolution 1478: That, upon the recommendation of the President of the System and in response to the resolution of the May meeting of the Council of Chancellors, Resolution 1146 be rescinded so that, consistent with the general Regent policies, each University of the System will be responsible for determining its own intercollegiate athletics program and budget level, subject to appropriate Central Administration policy and budget guidelines, and consistent with the institution's internal decision making processes.

Following extensive discussion, the details of which will be found in the full minutes on file in each campus library, the question was put on Resolution 1478, and it was voted on a roll call vote, with Regents Erdman, Fish, Gerrard, Grover, Hales, Johnson, Lawton, McNamara, Neshek and Thompson voting "Aye" (10), and with Regents Barkla, Beckwith, DeBardeleben, Fitzgerald, Lavine and Walter voting "No" (6).

E. REPORT OF THE PHYSICAL PLANNING AND DEVELOPMENT COMMITTEE

The report of the Physical Planning and Development Committee was presented by Regent Fish.

1. Regent moved adoption of the following resolution, the motion was seconded by Regent Lavine, and it was voted:

Resolution 1479: That, upon the recommendation of the UW-Platteville Chancellor and the President of the University of Wisconsin System, authorization be granted to plan, bid and construct the 1977 Student Center Movable Partitions Repair Project at UW-Platteville for an estimated total project cost of \$34,500 from Program Revenues.

2. Regent Fish moved adoption of the following resolution, the motion was seconded by Regent Hales, and it was voted:

Resolution 1480: That, upon the recommendation of the UW-Stevens Point Chancellor and the President of the University of Wisconsin System the name "Schmeeckle" be transferred from the presently named residence hall and that the following described area on the UW-Stevens Point campus be named the Schmeeckle Reserve in honor of the late Fred J. Schmeeckle:

> All property between North Point Drive on the north and Maria Drive on the south, with the exception of the site of the Maintenance/ Stores Building, totalling approximately 186 acres

and that the name "Steiner" be transferred from the resident hall on Fremont and Clarke Streets on the UW-Stevens Point campus to the building presently known as Schmeeckle Hall, to continue to honor the late Herbert R. Steiner.

3. Regent Fish moved adoption of the following resolution, the motion was seconded by Regent Erdman, and it was voted:

Resolution 1481: That, upon the recommendation of the UW-River Falls Chancellor and the President of the University of Wisconsin System, the Vice President for General Services be authorized to sign an extension of the agreement with the Tri-County Council on Alcoholism and Drug Abuse (Dunn, Pierce, and St. Croix Counties) from August 1, 1977 to July 31, 1978, with two one-year renewal options. This agreement provides for continued use of a residence hall on the campus of UW-River Falls as a Half-Way House facility.

4. Regent Fish moved adoption of the following resolution, the motion was seconded by Regent Johnson, and it was voted:

Resolution 1482: That, upon the recommendation of the UW-Milwaukee and UW-Stout Chancellors and the President of the University of Wisconsin System, authorization be granted to plan, bid and construct the following two projects, at the budget level and from the funding sources indicated:

#### UW-Milwaukee

Emergency Exiting Provisions and Screening, Campus Elementary School Day Care Center, at a cost of \$23,500 from State Building Trust Funds.

#### UW-Stout

Tainter House Restoration Project, at a cost of \$74,950 from Louis Smith Tainter House Restoration Fund (\$48,004) and Federal Historic Preservation grant (\$26,946)

5. Regent Fish moved adoption of Resolution 1483 relating to authorization for leases of space, UW Center System, UW Extension, UW-Madison and UW-Superior (attached as <u>EXHIBIT I</u>), the motion was seconded by Regent Fitzgerald, and it was voted.

6. Regent Fish moved adoption of the following resolution, the motion was seconded by Regent Erdman, and it was voted:

Resolution 1484: That, upon the recommendation of the President of the University of Wisconsin System, the <u>Report of the University of Wisconsin</u> <u>System Task Force on Energy Budgeting</u>, dated March 1977, be adopted. (Copy on file with the papers of the meeting)

7. Regent Fish reported that the Committee received the annual report on leased space in the UW System. His summary of the report will be found in the full minutes on file in each campus library.

8. Regent Fish moved adoption of the following resolution, the motion was seconded by Regent Grover, and it was voted, with Regent DeBardeleben voting "No":

Resolution 1485: That, upon the recommendation of the President of the University of Wisconsin System and the UW-Stevens Point Chancellor, and in response to the letter from Representative Michael Early addressed to President Weaver, the Regents reaffirm the action taken by the Board at its April 15 meeting, when a request to the State Building Commission for release of advance planning funds for the renovation of the center portion of the Old Main Building was approved, and affirm that request now with specific reference to the issues posed in Representative Early's letter: namely, the present estimate of \$1,830,000 as the cost to renovate the basement and first and second floors of the center section of Old Main and, secondly, the program uses proposed for Nelson Hall upon the completion of the Old Main renovation.

9. Regent Fish reported that the Committee had received a report on the status of the Clinical Sciences Center project.

Regent DeBardeleben moved adoption of the following resolution, and the motion was seconded by Regent Fitzgerald:

Resolution 1486: That the Board recess into closed session to consider personnel matters as permitted by Section 19.85(1) of the Wisconsin Statutes.

The resolution was voted on a roll call vote, with Regents DeBardeleben, Erdman, Fish, Fitzgerald, Gerrard, Grover, Johnson, Lawton, McNamara, Neshek, and Thompson voting "Aye", and with Regents Beckwith and Hales and Lavine entering the meeting following the vote. Regents Barkla and Walter absent.

The meeting recessed into Executive Session at 2:35 P.M.

The meeting resumed in open session at 3:15 P.M.

President McNamara reported that the following actions had been taken during the closed session:

Resolution 1487: That, upon recommendation of the President of the UW System and the Chancellor of UW-Extension, Marvin T. Beatty be appointed Dean, Division of Community Programs, UW-Extension, effective July 1, 1977, salary to be determined in the 1977-78 annual budget.

Resolution 1488: That, upon recommendation of the President of the UW System and the President-Designate of the UW System, the Board approves continuation of the appointment of Leonard Haas as Chancellor of UW-Eau Claire through the year 1978-79.

The meeting adjourned at 3:17 P.M.
