

UNION AWARD

The Wisconsin Union deserves a round of applause. The Association of College Unions presented the Union with its "75th Anniversary Award." The Association was founded in 1914 with the goal of helping college unions improve programs and services and effectively contribute to individual growth and development. This award was in recognition of the Union's role as one of the founders of this association while continuing to "provide leadership and commitment to this region and the College Union Profession."

Corky Sischo, assistant director of the Union in accepting the award, credited the Union's excellence to Porter Butts and his vision starting in 1928 when the Memorial Union opened. Porter kept the Wisconsin Union in a leadership role with many firsts in the Union field, here are a few:

- THE FIRST UNIVERSITY UNION ART GALLERY (1928)
- THE FIRST OUTDOOR RECREATION PROGRAM IN A UNION (1931)
- IN 1932, THE FIRST COLLEGE NIGHT CLUB
- THE FIRST UNION IN THE U.S. TO SERVE BEER (1933)
- FIRST THEATER AS PART OF A UNION BUILDING (1939)
- THE FIRST CRAFTSHOP HOUSED IN A UNION BUILDING (1939)

The list goes on and will continue to do so with the Union's leadership and innovation. Congratulations to all who strive to make the Union what it is today including Union members.
