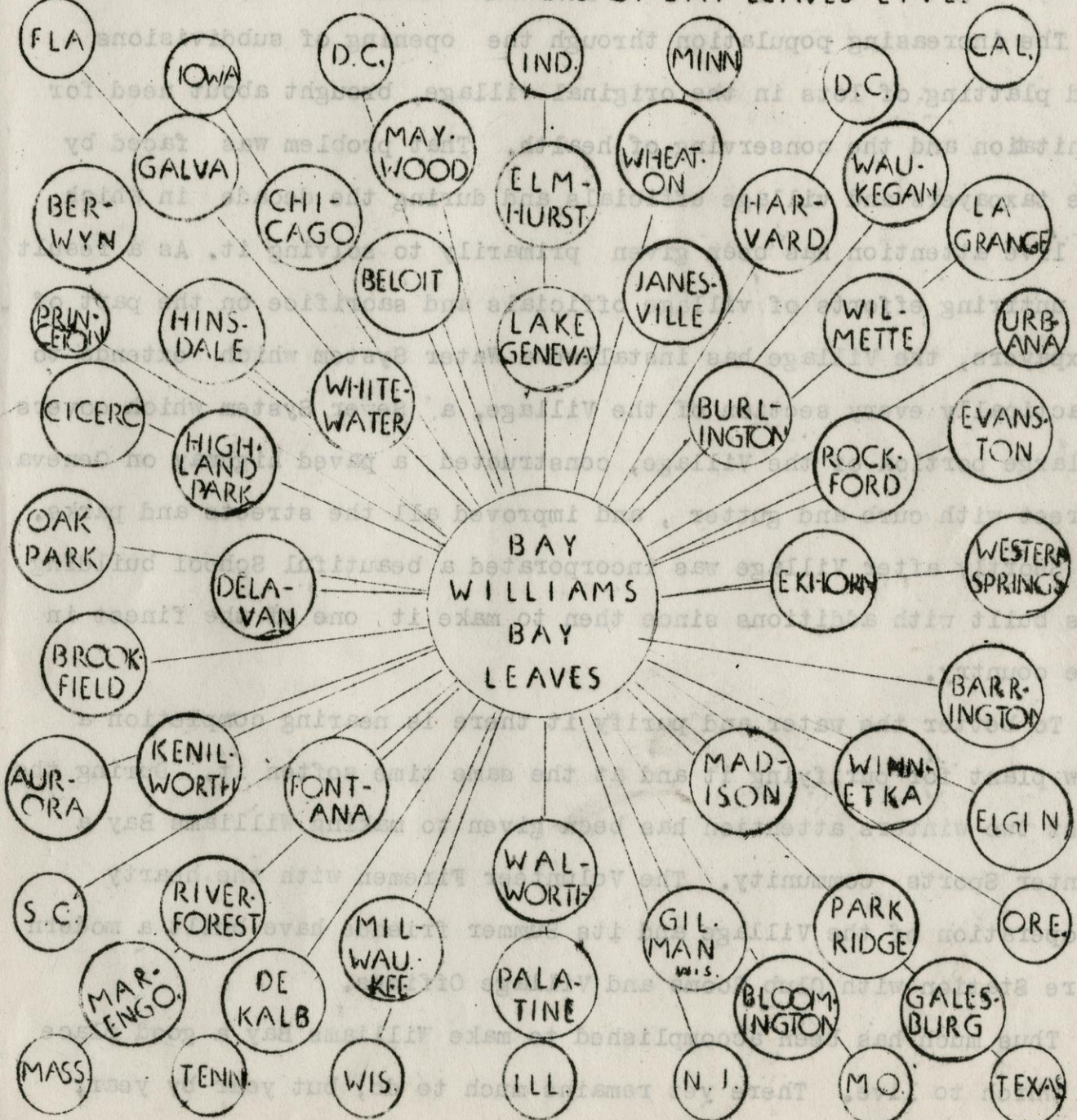

YOU CAN RECOMMEND WILLIAMS BAY.

During the decade ending with the census of 1930 Williams Bay showed the largest increase in population of any of the communities in Walworth County. During the eight years since then the Bay has had a steady growth and will show a marked increase for this decade.

The Village was incorporated in late 1919 and during the decade following made rapid strides in developing its streets, placing of street lights, securing land for park on the lake shore, etc.

The increasing population through the opening of subdivisions and platting of lots in the original village, brought about need for sanitation and the conserving of health. That problem was faced by the taxpayers and village officials and during the decade in which we live attention has been given primarily to solving it. As a result of untiring efforts of village officials and sacrifice on the part of taxpayers, the Village has installed a Water System which extends to practically every section of the Village, a Sewer System which covers a large portion of the Village, constructed a paved highway on Geneva Street with curb and gutter, and improved all the streets and parks. Shortly after Village was incorporated a beautiful School building was built with additions since then to make it one of the finest in the country.

To better the water and purify it there is nearing completion a new plant for purifying it and at the same time soften it. During the past two winters attention has been given to making Williams Bay a Winter Sports community. The Volunteer Firemen with the hearty cooperation of the Village and its Summer friends have built a modern Fire Station with Club Rooms and Village Offices.

Thus much has been accomplished to make Williams Bay a good place in which to live. There yet remains much to do, but year by year, sees other accomplishments carried to completion.

At present a Project is being carried on for developing for Summer use the Winter Sports Park , by constructing a roadway to the top of the hill so it can be used for picnics and family suppers.. An excellent place for caring for village waste is being made there, so that there is no further excuse for using the land near the beach for dumping. The sore spots along the beach will be covered over and with the cooperation of the railroad will be made spots of beauty.

There is reason to believe that the State and County Highway Departments are planning on completion of the highway along the shore this Fall. Then it is up to future generations to develop our natural resource , the water front.

The natural beauty of the Bay, with the added health and sanitary development, make it easy to recommend the Village to friends. There are six miles of shore line, many lots with shore privileges , and many other lots within a few blocks of the lake, which are available at prices within reach of most every one wishing to get out for a Summer outing or to live for all year.

A study of the present owners shows that most of them came because of the solicitation of friends already here. Those are the types of people we wish to have come and live in our midst. They make good neighbors. Editor.

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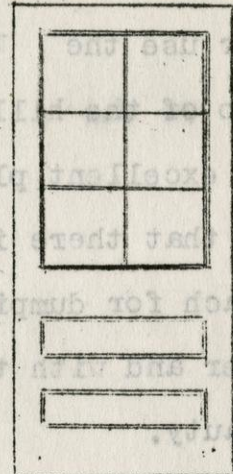

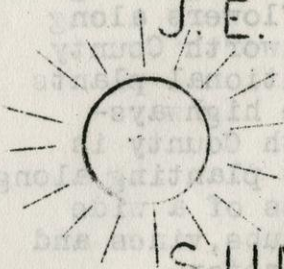
WILDLIFE MEETING HELD AT ELKHORN
