

INTRODUCTION.

In presenting the following volume to the public it seems proper that I should explain the causes which led to its compilation.

The following resolution was adopted at the prelimi-

nary meeting of Our Association in February, 1898:

Resolved, That a book be procured to register the names of the pioneers of this county, including the date of their birth and the time they settled in this county; when and whom they married; the names and date of the birth of their children, their occupation, and place of their present residence. Also if a soldier in the war, the time

they served and in what regiment and company.

A book was procured and at our annual festival of 1898 a lady pioneer was detailed to superintend the registration. The President invited all pioneers present to come to the Superintendent's desk and register. They were only asked to register their names and the date of their birth and the year they came to this county, as there was not time then for a more extended registration. One hundred pioneers responded to the invitation and registered that day.

I saw the interest manifested in said registration that day and concluded to give the book a general circulation and register all the pioneers I could find. As the result I have registered over 1200 names, including the children of

the pioneers.

Such records, in time, may become almost invaluable in settling estates, as many people are very neglectful in keeping their family records. While circulating the register many persons expressed a desire for a copy, which induced me to get it printed.

C. A. ABBOTT AND WIFE.

Mr. Charles A. Abbott was born in the town of Freedom, Outagamie county, Wis., in 1845. He was a soldier in the war of the Rebellion, and served two years in Company I, 32d Regiment, Wisconsin infantry. He was married to Miss Mary A. Izzard in 1869; she was born in 1848. Their children are: Gertie Abbott Stevenson, born in 1870; Willard Abbott, born in 1877; Orlow Abbott, born in 1878. Residence on section 15, town 21, range 17, in Grand Chute.

Eland B. Abbott, father of Charles A. Abbott, was born in Connecticut in 1812, and died in 1874. He came to Outagamie county in 1843, and located on section 11, town 22, range 18, in the town of Freedom. He was a soldier in the war of the Rebellion and served one year. His wife, Ellen Webster Abbott, was born in New York in 1815 and died in 1886. They have had thirteen children, seven boys and six girls; three boys and two girls are now living.

E. L. ANDERSON

Was born in 1852 and came to Outagamie county in 1861.

C. G. ADKINS

Was born in Traxton, Cortlandt county, New York, Oct. 1, 1822, came to Outagamie County, Wisconsin, May 3, 1853. Merchant. Married to Elary L. Woodward January 12, 1847. Children, Lillie H. Adkins now residing at Syracuse, New York; C. V. Adkins, born Feb. 25, 1850; married, now resides at 738 Lawrence street, Appleton.

A. ASPINWALL

Was born in England in 1821 and came to Outagamie county in 1849.

ALFRED F. BOUNDS

Was born at Ravensthorp, England, March 4, 1848; came to Outagamie county in 1872; married May 26, 1878, to Hulda M. Spencer, who was born at Menomonie Falls, Wisconsin, August 2, 1851. Children, Guy Leroy, born May 10, 1879, died June 16, 1879; Florence E., born Oct. 3, 1882; Hattie D., born Nov. 25, 1884; residence corner of Spencer street and Whitman avenue, Appleton, Wisconsin. Occupation, fruit grower.

SAMUEL BOYD


Was born Nov. 1, 1836, came to Appleton in the year 1852, to attend Lawrence University. Graduated in June, 1859, opened a law office June, 1861, in Appleton and has not been absent from the county a whole year since 1852.

HERMAN BISSING

Was born in Germany, Oct. 13, 1831, came to Appleton in 1863. Engaged in the shoe business. Children, Frank Bissing, born in Waukesha in 1859; Henry Bissing, born in Waukesha, 1863; Benjamin H. Bissing, born in Appleton, 1872; Mary Bissing Berenger, born in Waukesha county, 1857; Elizabeth Bissing, born in Waukesha county, 1861.

WILLIAM W. BRIGGS.

William W. Briggs was born at Buckfield, Me., Aug. 12, 1823. His father, Daniel Briggs, was a soldier in the war

of 1812, after which he, with his wife, Pheba Thomas Briggs, and seven children settled at Monson, Me. The subject of this sketch spent his boyhood as a pioneer in northern Maine, his mother dving when he was but fourteen years of age. He was engaged in lumbering on the rivers St. Johns, Penobscot and Kennebec, which means the hardest kind of work, for lumbering then had no conveniences as now. In 1851 William W. Briggs was married to Mary E.

Page, and the year following they came to Wisconsin, first stopping in northern Illinois. They traveled by team from Beloit, Wis., to Hortonville, the men walking when it was rough and poor roads, which was most of the way. They had two children, Eben P. and Eliza M. Briggs.

Mr. Briggs was engaged in the milling business there for about eighteen years, when he moved with his family to Appleton, where he has lived ever since. In 1874 he built the "Briggs House" and engaged in active hotel life for four years.

Mr. Briggs with Ira Hersey and H. B. Sanborn built the first grist mill at Hortonville, which is now considered the oldest one in this county.

HENRY L. BLOOD.

Henry L. Blood was born Dec. 27, 1813, in Oxford county, New Hampshire; was married to Miss Catharine South-

mayd, of Jay, N. Y., April 25, 1838; they had three children, E. J. Blood, born April 10, 1846, married to Miss Laura Washburn; had two children, both dead; E. J. Blood died in 1885. Second son, Fred Blood, born Aug. 6,1848, married to Miss Lillian Curtis on Oct. 18, 1875; they have four children, three boys and one girl, and now live in Appleton. F. H. Blood is engaged in the wood and coal business. Kitty Blood was born May 4, 1851, married to George M. Miller in 1872; they have had two child-

ren, one boy having died and the girl now living; Mrs. Miller died in Lawrence, Kan., Dec. 28, 1874. Mrs. H. L. Blood died Jan. 11, 1855. Mr. Blood was married to Miss Mary Brown, Jan. 5, 1859; they have two children now living, Frank L. Blood, born June 15, 1862; married to Miss Benito Fuller; they have two children, a boy and a girl. May Blood, born July 31, 1865, married to C. W. Jarvis Sept. 16, 1891; they now live in Ishpeming, Mich.

Mr. H. L. Blood moved to Mackinaw Island in 1844; in 1846 he moved to Oshkosh and kept the first hotel; in 1847 moved into the Astor House, Green Bay; in 1849 moved to Appleton; he was agent for Lawrence University and built the First College Building; he built the first shanty in Appleton in 1848, and hired John F. Johnston and wife

to move into it to board the men who worked on the first college building. Mr. Blood kept a hotel for several years in Appleton and was a prominent citizen. He died Feb. 21, 1888.

JOHN HENRY BOTTENSEK

Was born in Hanover, Germany, in 1806; he came to Wisconsin in 1847; he came to the town of Dale in 1854 and settled on a farm on Sections 14 and 23, T. 21, R. 15, where he cleared his land and established a home where he resided until his death in 1865; He married Sophia Remmers in 1846; they have two sons and one daughter now living. The oldest, John, born in 1850, married to Ella Buck of Appleton; they have one daughter. John Bottensek is a graduate of Lawrence University; is practicing law in Appleton and is now district attorney. The second son, August, born in 1852, married to Marietta H. Scott in 1875; they have three sons and two daughters; they now live on a farm in Dale. Their daughter, Lena, born in 1858, married to Edward Wege; they have four daughters; they now live in Ellington. John Henry Bottensek's widow now lives in Appleton.

D. B. BAILEY

Was born Nov. 9, 1837, at Jefferson, Ohio; came to Outagamie county, March, 1863; commenced mercantile business in Appleton, April, 1867. Children, Quincy A. Bailey, born at Menomonie Falls, Wis., May 26, 1864; Ralph W. Bailey, born at Appleton, Dec. 3, 1866; Andrew Spencer Bailey, born at Appleton, Sept. 23, 1868; Dwight B. Bailey, born at Appleton, Sept. 21, 1870; Ruthie Adelia Bailey, born at Appleton, June 21, 1876; Charles H. Bailey, born at Appleton, May 16, 1880. Children of Adelia Spencer Bailey, wife of D. B. Bailey, born in Butler, June 22, 1841; came to Wisconsin, 1845 and to Appleton in 1853; died Nov. 22, 1884: Hallie Pazzant Bailey, born Nova Scotia, March 8, 1849, came to Appleton, 1862; Nellie May Bailey, daughter, born May 1, 1888.

KARL BREITERICK.

Carl Breiterick was bron in Prussia in 1821; he came to America in 1849 and settled on Sec. 2, T. 21, R. 16, now in

Greenville. In 1855 he removed to Ellington and settled on Section 35, T. 22, R. 16, where he cleared a farm and established a home where he resided until his death in April. 1891. He married Wilhelmia Herman in 1849; they have two sons and three daughters. son, Albert, born in 1852, was married to Bertha Sauberlich in 1876; they have four sons and two daughters; they live on Sec. 35, T. 22, R. 16 now in Ellington. Second son, Charles, born in 1864, unmarried and lives on his father's homestead. First

daughter, Minnie, married to Edward Saecker; they have one daughter and now live in Appleton. Second daughter Rosa, is married to Charles Mory; they have one son and four daughters; they now live on a farm in Cicero. Third daughter, Caroline, was married to Wm. Lohrence in 1895, and lives on Sec. 27 in Ellington.

FRANK BERNARD


Was born in 1821 and settled in Outagamie county in the year 1852.

Smith several years and later on went into real estate business which he followed up to the time of his death. Mr. Ballard was a prominent member of the Congregational church in Appleton, also Mason and Knight Templar and thoroughly interested in educational work. The names of his children are Irving M. 

Their oldest son, John Brill, born in 1844, has been sheriff of this county four years and now lives on a fine farm on sections 22 and 23 in Buchanan, is married and has six daughters living. Second son, Mat. Brill, born in 1846 and now lives in Appleton. Third son, Peter Brill, born in 1848, died in Jan., 1885. Fourth son, Joseph Brill, born in 1852, now drives a hack in Appleton. Fifth son, Robert Brill, born in 1854, is married and has three

children; he now lives in Kaukauna. Sixth son, William Brill, born in 1859, is married to Harriett Geenen, a niece of Everet Saunders; they now live with Mr. Saunders on his homestead. They have four children.

J. W. BEDELL


Was born in Plattsburg, N. Y. in the year 1828, April 14; came to Wisconsin in 1857; came to Outagamie county in 1872.

REV. PHILO S. BENNETT.

Rev. Philo S. Bennett was born in Pulaski, Oswego county, New York, March 13, 1817. He was educated for

the ministry at a seminary at Mexico, N. Y., and ordained in 1837. He was married June 13, 1838, at Pulaski, N. Y., to MissCalphurnia Chase, a relative of Secretary Chase. She was a remarkable woman. It is quite safe to say few Methodist itinerants have been favored with a helpmate who in all respects was the equal

of Sister C. C. Bennett. He was occupied with various charges in New York State until 1850, when he came to Wisconsin. He was stationed first at Platteville and afterwards at Beloit; meantime he continued his studies and received a degree from Beloit College in 1854. He afterward held various charges in the State, including Milwaukee and Racine, and in 1861 he came to Appleton, where he has since resided. For the past eight years he has not been engaged in active work, but being of an energetic temperament has occupied himself to a great extent with literary work and lecturing as well as frequent pulpit work, Since the death of his estimable wife seven years ago, after a happy married life of nearly half a century, he has

made his home with his only daughter, Mrs. L. Briggs where his last days were happily spent, made pleasant by the loving care of children and grand-children. Bennett died April 5, 1895.

Present occupation postmaster at Appleton, Wis. Children, Attie Mayette Baer, born 1868; Charles Otho Baer, born 1873, died 1898, in the army; Edward Sherman Baer,

born 1879; John Miller Baer, born 1886. Charles Otho Baer, Corporal Co. G 2d Reg't Wis. Vol. died August 11 at Fortress Monroe, Va.

JOHN BOTTENSEK

Was born in Waukesha county, Wis., January 4, 1850; came with his parents to Dale, Outagamie county in 1855; remained on the farm until 1873; is now district attorney for Outagamie county and resides at 584 College avenue. Elsie M. Buck Bottensek was born in Appleton, January 14, 1854, and has resided here ever since; married to John Bottensek Sept. 26, 1878; they have one child, Elsie S. Bottensek.

PAUL H. BEAULIEU

Emigrated from Canada in 1812 on his way to the then unexplored regions of Lake Superior. He encountered countless privations and hardships, peculiar to early pioneer life. A notable event was his detention at Fort Malden and compulsion to serve in the British army for the space of four months, in which time he participated in many skirmishes amongst which was the memorable battle of Lake Erie, classed in history as Perry's Victory, after which he was allowed to continue his journey and after having successfully followed the fur trade for twenty-one years he started with his family (his wife, one daughter and one son) for Green Bay, where he arrived Aug. 16, 1834, residing there until the fall of 1835 he moved to Kaukaloo or Kaukauna and settled on the Buchanan side of the river where he had previously purchased lots 5, 6, 7 and 8 on Sec. 21, T. 21, R. 18, on which was situated a grist and saw mill. He resided here up to the time of his death which occurred Oct. 15, 1841. The property then reverted to his only son and heir (the daughter having died), Bazil H. Beaulieu and more familiarly known as B. H. Beaulieu, who was almost continuously connected with the affairs of Brown and afterwards Outagamie county until 1876 when he sold out and removed to White Earth. Becker county, Minn., where he resided until his death a few years ago. B. H. Beaulieu has held satisfactorily the offices of justice of the peace, assessor, clerk and supervisor, which latter office he held fourteen years, during which he introduced to the board a bill for the division of the then town of Kaukauna, setting off all that part lying south and east of Fox river and organizing the present town of Buchanan. Mr. Beaulieu raised a large family of children, but I am unable to give their names, the above sketch of the Beaulieu family was extracted from a letter of greeting sent from White Earth, Minn., by Theo. H. Beaulieu, a son of H. B. Beaulieu, to the Outagamie County Pioneer Association to be read at their annual festival in 1885.

CAPT. D. J. BROTHERS.

Capt. D. J. Brothers was born in Canada. He came with his parents to Rochester, N. Y., when quite young, and in May, 1861, came to Appleton. In 1862 he enlisted and belped organize Co. I of the Thirty-second Regiment, Wisconsin Volunteer Infantry, in which he was for two years second and first lieutenant. He was in the famous march to the sea, and from the capture of Atlanta to the close of the war he held the responsible position of assistant chief commissiary of subsistance of the seventeenth army corps on the staff of Gen. F. P. Blair. After the close of the war, in 1865, he came to Kaukauna where he has resided ever since. He was twice elected county superintendent of schools and has served several terms as supervisor and alderman; in 1876 he engaged in the real estate and insurance business, which he has continued ever since. In 1894 he built the Hotel Brothers, now the leading hotel in Kaukauna, and is now proprietor of the same.

CHARLES F. BROWN

Was born in Brattleboro, Vt., in 1843 and came to Outagamie county in 1855.

WALTER H. P. BOGAN

Was born Dec. 28, 1815 at Burlington, N. J.; moved to this county April 28, 1853 and located on Sec. 16 in the town of Grand Chute; married Mary Ann Gillett Oct. 3, 1840. One son, Cyphant G. Bogan, was born in Delaware county, Ohio, Oct., 1852.

JOHN BLEICK.

Section 10, farmer, born Dec. 24, in Mecklenburg-Schwerin, Germany; married in 1854 and came to Milwaukee in 1859, to Appleton in 1860; wife's name, Louise Brockmann. Children, Wilhelmia, Charles, Ida, Louise, Augusta, Herman, Ferdinand.

THEODORE W. BRIGGS

Was born in Ogdensburg, N. Y., in 1842 and came to Appleton in 1853; he was married to Leona S. Dane who was born in Nova Scotia in 1843 and came to Appleton in 1860. Their children were: Eugene Briggs, dead; Cornelia Briggs, Fred J. Briggs, dead; May E. Briggs, Carrie H. Briggs, Jay Briggs, dead; Theo. L. Briggs, Theo. W. Briggs, state agent Home Insurance Co., residing at 779 Lawrence street, Appleton.

They located in Shelby township, Jefferson county, Indiana, where John's people had preceded him. Here he took a quarter section of unimproved very heavily timbered land and subdued it into a modern farm of that date and here their family was born: James, Matthew, John, Janet, Margaret, Alexander and Nancy.

At the time the boys had reached manhood and wished to establish homes for themselves, Wisconsin territory was in the boom, and March 22, 1848, John, accompanied by his son Matthew, started on a land-seeking expedition. They went by an Ohio river boat to Cincinnati, from there by canal boat to Toledo, then by railroad sixty-five miles to the terminus, then by stage to St. Joseph, Mich., from there by boat to Sheboygan, Wisconsin territory, where they arrived at the earliest possible moment, which was April 4, and from here they proceeded on foot, finally holding up at Green Bay where, April 14, they bought in the Government land office three hundred and eighty acres of land, being that upon which members of the family now reside in the town of Greenville.

Matthew at once built a cabin and was the first settler in Greenville. His father, after remaining with him several weeks, returned to his home in Indiana, where Matthew joined the family in November. The next spring, accompanied by his brother James, moved with team and wagon to the pioneer home, where they were joined by John Jr. in 1850 and Alexander in 1855.

In 1854 their mother, Margaret, died, and their father, selling his farm, moved to Wisconsin in 1858, accompanied by Margaret and Nancy. March 6, 1851, Matthew took for a partner in life Hannah, daughter of Enos Otis. John was married Dec. 8, 1852, to Miss Esther Prentice; James March 18, 1860, to Abbey Wickwire, and Alexander to Sylvina Perry, April 15, 1869. Their father, John, died Dec. 7, 1877, and was buried in the Greenville town cemetery.

JOHN B. CAREY



Our trip was continued on a schooner across Lake Ontario, then through the Welland canal in Canada to Detroit, Mich. My father spent about two weeks looking through Michigan, then we took passage on a schooner for Wisconsin, landing in Milwaukee on or about the 18th day of June, 1837; lived in Milwaukee most of that summer, then my father moved out to his farm in the town of Muskego Lake, Wisconsin. At that time Wisconsin was one of the most beautiful countries the human eye ever beheld—one vast field of flowers, red, white and blue and all colors; the

country was more than alive with game of all kinds. I was well acquainted with Solomon Juneau. He would come out to my father's with his wife and stay there for a week at a time. He was one of the most sociable and the best company of any man I ever visited with. I was also acquainted some with Byron Kilbourn and George Walker. They were very pleasant men to meet. I lived at Muskego with my father (with the exception of two years that I lived in Milwaukee) till 1846; then I got married to Betsey Nichols of Monroe county, N. Y., and moved out to Dodge county and went to farming. April 22, 1872, my wife died leaving me with two children, F. H. and E. J. Dean. My niece kept house for me for one year, then I was married, in the spring of 1873, to Olive G. Harris. Lived there on the farm till 1876, then sold my farm and in 1877 moved to the then village of Seymour, Outagamie county, and went into the hardware business with my two boys, F. H. and E. J. Dean. I have one son by my second wife, Charles Dean, living with me now.

In 1878 and 1879 we built a branch store at Bonduel, in the town of Hartland, Shawano county; we carried on the store there for four or five years when it burned up; we rented a store for a year, then sold out. I then bought out my two boys F. H. and E. J. Dean in the store at Seymour and ran it for one year, I then sold out the store. My present business is loaning money and real estate business. I have represented the First ward of the city of Seymour as supervisor on the county board for eleven years; have been justice of the peace for eight years, hold that office at the present time; also have been president of the Seymour Fair and Driving Park Association for two years; am now in my seventy-fifth year; my health is good and must say I do not feel very old. My father, Henry H. Dean, was born in England, May 5, 1784; he was drafted into the English army in the war between England and France; he was a soldier for twelve years; he was in Lord Wellington's army; he was in most of the heavy battles of that war. He was in the army that took Joseph Bonaparte and

his army prisoners; he was wounded four times in one day; he came with his regiment to Canada very near the close of the war of 1812. In the spring peace was declared and he came across to the American side and became an American citizen; he lived to be 90 years and six months old; he lies buried on Prospect Hill, in Waukesha, county, Wisconsin. My mother, Betsy R. Dean, was born Sept. 6, 1799, in Connecticut. She lived to a good old age. She lies buried in Lewis county, state of New York.





AUGUSTIN GRIGNON.

Augustin Grignon was born in Green Bay, June 27, 1780. About the year 1800, he came as agent of the American Fur Trade company to Kaukauna, then called Kockaloo and bought the log house built by Dominic Ducharm in 1790. Ducharm was the first white man who settled in what is now Outagamie county. He commenced clearing land and making a farm and trading with the Indians. where the city of Kaukauna now stands. He bought of the Indians, 1550 acres of land fronting 99 chains, about 11/4 miles, on the river and part of it running back in a northwest direction nearly three miles. He numbered his claims No. 1, No. 2 and No. 3. He afterwards sold his Indian titles to John Lawe, of Green Bay, the father of Geo. W. Lawe, of Kaukauna, to whom he was indebted for his goods, to trade with the Indians. The claim passed to said John Lawe's heirs, mostly to George W. Lawe, now of Kaukauna. Augustin Grignon bought of the Indians 1520 acres of land fronting on the river seventy-one chains and fifty links wide, and running north forty degrees west nearly at right angle with the river two hundred and seventeen chains and fifty-eight links. The United States government afterwards gave him a patent for the same land.

The above described land covered a large part of the lands formerly bought by Ducharm of the same Indians and patented to him. The title to some of the land is now in litigation.

Augustin Grignon built an addition to the log house bought of Ducharm and resided in it and traded with the Indians until his death. His son, Charles A. Grignon was born in said house (which was standing in 1894) June 15, 1808, and after his father's death he continued the business, buying furs of the Indians, until the United States bought all the remaining land of the Indians and removed them to a reservation in Shawano county. He also built a nice frame house where he died, which is now the residence

of his widow and children. Charles A. Grignon married Mary E. Mead, a sister of Mrs. Geo. W. Lawe, and also of M. J. Mead of Kaukauna. They have three sons, named Augustin, Ross and Charles, and five daughters named Fanny, Maggy, Lydia, Mary and Emelia.

Augustin Grignon was descended from the famous DeLanglade family. His mother was Domitelle DeLanglade, a daughter of the famous Charles DeLanglade, whose mother was a sister of the head Ottoway chief, King Nessowa-quet, of Mackinaw. Charles DeLanglade became a famous leader of all the western Indians, it was he who planned and executed the famous battle known in history as the defeat of Gen. Braddock in 1755; he was also with Gen. Montcalm in the battle before Quebec in 1759, which resulted in the surrender of all the Canadas to the British; he was also engaged in most of the battles in the French and Indian War from 1755 to 1760.

The children of Augustin Grignon were: Margaret, who married Ebenezer Childs; Charles A., born in Kaukauna, June 15, 1808, Alexander and Paul, and Sophia, who married Louis B. Porlier, and Louis Grignon.







On June 2, of that year he was married to Sarah Boynton and two days later they left for the territory of Wisconsin. A wagon ride of twenty miles took them to Keesville where they stopped for the night. They were joined the next morning by Adaline Finch. A shorter ride brought them to Port Kent. From there they went by steamboat to Whitehall, and by canal boat to Buffalo. They found some old acquaintances on the canal boat and made some new ones; among the latter Dr. Foote, his sister, Mrs. Richmond, and her husband from Oneida county, N. Y. They stopped in Buffalo over Sunday, and on Monday, having to wait for the boat, went to Niagara Falls and spent the day. From Buffalo they took the steamer Missouri to Chicago, stopping at Mackinaw where they were met by James Blood and taken to his uncle's, Capt. Lavaque's, an old townsman of theirs. From Mackinaw they went direct to Green Bay by the Astor, a small steamer owned by Mr. Goodell. The Bay was very rough and the boat finally stopped at Beaver Island to wait for calmer weather. At Green Bay they were guests of Dr. Ward and there they found old neighbors in the persons of Henry Blood, his wife and sister. Staying there one day, they next went by wagon to what

is now Wrightstown. That week Mr. Murch selected his land and the next Monday, June 30, 1846, entered it at the land office in Green Bay. They lived in a small house in Wrightstown until November.

[Extracts from Memoranda kept by Mrs. Murch.]

Nov. 6, 1846. Mr. Murch left to-day with a small load of boards, some bedding and a week's provisions. Nov. 9, crossed Wright's Ferry just as the sun rose, with a load of things for our future home. A little before twelve the load stuck fast in the ravine (now the west line of Appleton city. I walked on till I found my home to be, and sent Mr. Murch to the relief of the horses and driver. Found some potatoes roasting in the ashes and some water boiling in the coffee pot and soon had dinner ready. The log pen was not high enough to allow me to stand upright on the lowest side so another tier of logs must be added; so we slept that night in the board shanty open on the front where a fire was kept blazing. On Saturday Mr. Crafts our neighbor, just across the county line, helped put on another course of logs, I set the glass and chinked between the logs. At sundown the roof was on, the floor down, a pig pen built, and the stove up, so we got tea by it. After tea the door was made and fastened up with two nails. It was Saturday night and we were in our own house, on our own land, and though we had neither chair, table nor bedstead, we were comfortable and happy. Monday, we finished the shanty. It was twelve by fourteen feet inside. The rest of our things came and at eight o'clock we opened our boarding house, we had from one to five boarders for the next three weeks and frequent calls from travellers sometimes for meals and lodging, but oftener to enquire for the road. That last we didn't have. There was only an Indian trail along the river. In one week from trees that were growing in the woods, and from boards that had to be hauled seventeen miles, with one day's help from Mr. Crafts, our house had been made. For five weeks I never saw a woman, our nearest neighbors were in Neenah. About the last of December our

flour gave out and Mr. Murch went to Neenah and as a special favor, got six pounds of flour and six of beef, paying a big price for them. He then went to Green Bay and I stayed alone two nights. He had not been at home ten minutes when the wolves began to howl. We lived in this shanty one year, then we moved into an unfinished frame house. In this house our four children were born and lived until they were grown up. George H., our oldest, was born Dec. 9, 1847, the first white child born of American parents in the county. The old farm was sold to Mr. Carter about 1882, and Mr. Murch bought a place in Green Bay where he lived several years, then came to Appleton to spend his last days. He died Feb. 20, 1891.

JOHN MONTGOMERY

Came from Ireland, where he was born December 25, 1840. He settled in Outagamie county when twenty years old and four years later married Christiana Smith, who was born in Canada. She came to this county in 1860. Children, Geo. H., Elmer I., and Effie H. Present occupation, county clerk. Residence, 928 North Division street, Appleton.

MARTIN COONAN

Was born in Holland in 1840; came to America four years later and settled in the town of Buchanan in Outagamie county. In 1866 he married Catherin Verstage, who was also born in Holland in 1849. 





This was destroyed by fire July 7, 1878, and while the new depot was being built, a box car on a side track was improvised for an office for two months. On the completion of the new depot, Mr. Towsley continued as station agent until his appointment, Aug. 1, 1881, as cashier of Reuter Bros., a private bank. On Sept. 1, 1883, this bank was incorporated under the banking laws of Wisconsin and became known as the Bank of Kaukauna. The present officers are, Peter Reuter, president; Otto H.
