
# Union Members enjoy 10% discount on buoy rentals

As a special offer during the 1985 boating season, any member of the Wisconsin Union is eligible for a 10% discount on the cost of renting a mooring behind the Memorial Union. To receive this discount, simply bring this issue of the Quarterly to the Outdoor Programs Office in the Memorial Union. You should be prepared to pay your rental fee and to provide the following information about your boat: registration number. hull and deck color, length, draft, weight, class or type, and its name.

There are 30 buoys available in the field, all of which will be rented on a first-come, first-served basis. The discount rate for Union members will be \$160.00 for the season. Information on monthly or weekly rates can be obtained by calling the **Outdoor Programs Office** at 262-6898.

After your contract has been signed, you will be assigned a mooring based on the size and weight of your boat. The Wisconsin Union will try to honor preferences for east, west, or central mooring locations. In addition to your mooring (which includes a buoy, cable and anchor), your rental fee also entitles you to use of the rowboats and dories conveniently located on the Union waterfront, and limited use of the Interlake Pier immediately in front of the Boathouse. However, you must provide your own lines for tying your boat to its mooring.

The Union mooring field is located immediately behind the Memorial Union. Its boundaries are marked by Lake Street on the east side and the UW Limnology Building on the west. Sometime



in March, after the rental agreement has been signed, an information packet will be sent specifying the location of the buoy and general information on rental policies, Hoofers, UW lifesaving, various helpful hints and telephone numbers.

Moorings will be available for use after May 1 in the east and central portions of the mooring field.

Moorings in the west end will be available after May 15. Boats may not be placed in the west end prior to May 15 because this area has been designated a spawning area by the DNR. During the season, the Wisconsin Union reserves the right to move any boat, should the need arise. In the event a boat must be moved, the owner will be notified as soon as possible.

### Travel is the word for spring and summer 1985

Tired of the same old vacation?
Why not try one of the Wisconsin
Union Travel Center's great adventure trips!

The first adventure, Germany By Bicycle, is scheduled from May 25 to June 15. The \$899 tour price includes: hotel accommodations, daily continental breakfasts, two dinners, train transfers, all maps, and the services of two experienced guides who are fluent in German. One guide is a German citizen, and the other guide earned a bachelor's degree in German.

Bicycle touring experience is not needed for the trip. The tour is self-paced, and going by bicycle you will see parts of Germany that most tourists don't see. It is an ideal country for bicycling becaues a diversity of regional styles can be covered in relatively short distances. The guides give an insider's viewpoint—showing areas of interest, which bakeries have the best pastries and stopping along the way for coffee, beer or wine in the local Gasthaus.

If you'd rather paddle than peddle, then the **Escape to Wabikimi** Canadian canoe trips are for you.

Scheduled for June 7 - 16, July 12-21, and August 9 - 18, the trips range in price from \$289 to \$369 depending on the itinerary. Set in the Canadian shield country of Northern Ontario, the trips include round trip transportation from Madison, all equipment (except sleeping bag, pad and personal gear), meals while on the

water, lodging enroute and a guide with 28 years of experience canoeing Ontario's wilderness areas.

Those who join the trip will come back with skills in map reading, ecological interrelationships, wilderness cooking, fishing and whitewater canoeing.
