





Badgers Open Season vs. Bowling Green

Wisconsin (0-0) hosts Bowling Green (0-0) today at 80,321-seat Camp Randall Stadium (Field Turf). Kickoff is set for 11 a.m. CDT. The game will be televised live by ESPN (Mark Jones, Chris Spielman and Rob Stone).

The game also can be heard live on the 45-city Wisconsin Radio Network (Matt Lepay and Mike Lucas). WIBA (1310 AM, 101.5 FM) is the rightsholder in Madison. Wisconsin Public Television (Mike Heller and Scott Nelson) will air its tape-delay telecast of the game statewide at 10:30 p.m. on Saturday.

Today marks the grand re-opening of Camp Randall Stadium. The facility first opened in 1917 and has undergone a \$109 million renovation.

Wisconsin is coming off a 2004 season in which it went 9-3 (6-2 Big Ten) and played in the Outback Bowl against Georgia. The Badgers have been to a bowl game in 10 of the past 12 seasons.

Bowling Green, under the direction of head coach Gregg Brandon, was also 9-3 overall and 6-2 in conference play. The Mid-American Conference school defeated Memphis, 52-35, in the 2004 GMAC Bowl.

UW-Bowling Green Series Info

Wisconsin won its only meeting with Bowling Green, 39-18, on Sept. 19, 1992 ... the Badgers have five Ohio natives on their roster (LB Dontez Sanders of Bedford, DB Shane Carter of Troy, DB Prince Moody of Columbus, DL Brandon Kelly of Bedford and DL Jason Chapman of Bedford Heights) ... Bowling Green graduate assistant coach Russ Kuhns played at Wisconsin and lettered in 2000, 2001 and 2002 ... the Badgers and Falcons will square off on Sept. 2, 2006 at Cleveland Browns Stadium ... Bowling Green coach Gregg Brandon was an assistant at Northwestern from 1992-98 ... BGSU associate AD Scott Seeliger was an assistant coach at Wisconsin under both Dave McClain and Barry Alvarez ... UW is 23-2 all-time vs. the Mid-American Conference. The last MAC opponent to defeat the Badgers was Western Michigan in the 1988 season opener. UW is meeting a MAC opponent for the seventh time in eight seasons.


Opening Day

Wisconsin is opening its 117th season of football today. The Badgers, charter members of the Big Ten Conference, are 88-25-3 in 116 previous season-openers. The Badgers are 11-4 in 15 previous season-openers during the Alvarez era. That includes seven straight season-opening victories (1998-04). UW's last season-opening loss came in 1997 against Syracuse at the Meadowlands in New Jersey.

Wisconsin is 13-2 in 15 previous home openers during the Alvarez era. UW's last loss in a home-opener came in 1995 against Colorado.

B arry Alvarez, the winningest football coach in Wisconsin history, has completed 15 seasons at the head of the program he transformed from a perennial second-division finisher to one that is nationally respected and is a fixture on the postseason bowl scene.

Alvarez, whose overall record with the Badgers is 108-70-4, became Wisconsin's Director of Athletics in April of 2004. He is one of just two people (UAB's Watson Brown) at the Division I level who serves as head football coach and athletic director.

Alvarez's list of accomplishments at Wisconsin is remarkable. Consider just a few of the most notable ...

- winningest coach in school history coached three Big Ten and Rose Bowl champions
- only Big Ten coach ever to win the Rose Bowl in consecutive seasons
- just the 10th coach in Big Ten history with 100 victories at one conference institution
- has coached five national award winners, including Ron Dayne (Heisman, Doak Walker, Maxwell), Jamar Fletcher (Jim Thorpe) and Kevin Stemke (Ray Guy) guided UW to back-to-back Big Ten
- guided UW to back-to-back Big Ten titles in 1998 and 1999 (hadn't happened at Wisconsin since 1896-97) bowl record of 7-3 (.700)



 coached the three winningest teams in school history

When Alvarez arrived in Madison in 1990, Wisconsin had compiled a 9-36 record during the previous four seasons and attendance at Camp Randall Stadium had dipped to an average of 41,734 per game (54 percent of capacity). The program sorely needed a boost and got it when new Director of Athletics Pat Richter hired Alvarez from Notre Dame, where he had been an assistant coach under Lou Holtz.

Alvarez's coaching career began at the high school level. He served as an assistant at Lincoln (Neb.) Northeast High from 1971-73 before taking over as head coach at Lexington (Neb.) High from 1974-75. His last prep coaching stop was at Mason City (Iowa) High where he was head coach from 1976-78 and where his team won a 4A state title in his final year.

Iowa's Hayden Fry hired Alvarez as an assistant coach in 1979. The Hawkeyes played in six bowl games (two Rose Bowls) during Alvarez's eight years in Iowa City, compiling a 61-33-1 mark in the process. Alvarez's standout player with the Hawkeyes was LB Larry Station, a two-time All-American and two-time Academic All-American.

Alvarez left Iowa after the 1986 season to become linebackers coach at Notre Dame. He was promoted (linebackers to defensive coordinator to assistant head coach) by Holtz each of his three seasons as the Fighting Irish went 32-5 and won the 1988 national title. While in South Bend, Alvarez coached All-America linebackers Michael Stonebreaker, Ned Bolcar, Cedric Figaro and Wes Pritchett.

Alvarez grew up in Langeloth, Pa., a small town among the coal mines and steel mills in western Pennsylvania. He starred as a prep linebacker and went on to play at Nebraska (1965-67) for leg-

endary head coach Bob Devaney. Alvarez was the leading tackler for the 1967 Cornhuskers, who led the nation in total defense and created a school-record 40 turnovers. Alvarez played in both the Sugar and Orange Bowls at Nebraska (the Cornhuskers were 25-7 during his three varsity seasons). Alvarez earned his bachelor's degree in 1969 and added a master's degree in 1971, both from Nebraska.

Alvarez's family includes his wife, Cindy, daughters Dawn (Mrs. Brad Ferguson) and Stacy (Mrs. Mike Delzer), son Chad (wife Stephanie), grandsons Joe and Jake Ferguson and Jackson Delzer, and granddaughter Grace Delzer.

- Alvarez set a goal to become a collegiate head coach by his 42nd birthday and was named to the Wisconsin post three days after he turned 42.
- Alvarez added administrative duties to his job description in 2000 when he was named Associate Athletic Director. He became Wisconsin's Director of Athletics in April 2004, operating in a dual role as football coach as well.
- Alvarez grew up in a small mining town (Langeloth) in western Pennsylvania. He played all sports as a kid and idolized former Pittsburgh Pirates outfielder Roberto Clemente.
- Babcock Hall, which houses the UW-Madison's nationally acclaimed

dairy school, developed an ice cream flavor in honor of the Badger head coach in 1994. It was named Berry Alvarez, and the flavor was a mixture of raspberry, strawberry and blueberry.

- Alvarez, a big baseball fan, helped honor former Chicago Cubs' announcer Harry Caray by singing "Take me out to the ballgame" during a seventh-inning stretch in May of 1999.
- Alvarez was a finalist for ESPN's
 College Football Coach of the
 Decade Award in 1999. He was one
 of 18 coaches named to a new position in 1990 and is the only one still
 at the school that hired him.
- Barry Alvarez got his college coaching start with Hayden Fry at Iowa in 1979, one season after leading Mason City High School to the 4A state championship. One of the staffs of which Alvarez was a member featured six men who went on to lead their own college programs: Alvarez; Kirk Ferentz, Iowa; Dan McCarney, Iowa State; Del Miller,

CHANCELLOR JOHN D. WILEY



hancellor John D. Wiley received his bachelor's degree in physics from Indiana University in 1964. He attended graduate school at the University of Wisconsin-Madison and received master's and doctoral degrees in physics in 1965 and 1968, respectively. He joined the technical staff of Bell Felephone Laboratories at Murray Hill, N.J., from 1968 to 1974, and then spent a year at the Max Planck Institute in Stuttgart, Germany, as a recipient of the Alexander von Humboldt Senior U.S. Service Award for Research and Feaching.

Wiley joined the UW-Madison facilty in the Department of Electrical and Computer Engineering in 1975. His esearch and teaching focused on a variety of topics related to semiconductors and other materials, and processes mportant to the electronics field. He is co-founder of several highly successful esearch centers, including the Center or X-ray Lithography and the Engineering Research Center for Plasma-Aided Manufacturing. From 1982 to 1986, he chaired the Materials Science Program, a graduate-level, interdepartmental-committee program for master's and doctoral degrees.

From 1986 to 1989, Wiley served as associate dean for research in the College of Engineering, with oversight responsibility for all aspects of graduate study, grant submission, agency liaison, research infrastructure and centers, and technology transfer. From 1989 to 1994, he was dean of the UW-Madison Graduate School and the university's senior research officer.

Prior to his appointment to the university's top position, Wiley served as provost and vice chancellor for academ-

ic affairs, which carries the responsibility of chief operating officer and deputy chancellor. As provost, he worked closely with deans, faculty, academic staff and student committees in the exercise of shared governance and the overall management of the institution.

Wiley was named UW-Madison's 27th chancellor on January 1, 2001. As chancellor, he has aimed to enhance the university's role in creating a new, more viable economic future for Wisconsin while opening avenues to innovation and learning. He also has worked to amplify the Wisconsin Idea—the belief that the boundaries of the campus are the boundaries of the state and beyond—and to build on the research and teaching strengths that have made the university so rich in accomplishment and tradition.

Wiley has presided over unprecedented growth on the west side of the campus, which is being transformed into one of the nation's great health-sciences centers. He also has mapped an east-side redevelopment that will create a vibrant arts-and-humanities district to anchor the lower State Street area, with an expanded Elvehjem Museum of Art, new classroom buildings and additional music-performance space. Wiley believes that the arts and humanities are an integral component of the research enterprise.

"Nurturing an environment of creativity—encompassing industry, the arts and individual expression—is important for attracting and keeping these very mobile, highly sought, knowledge-based workers within our borders," Wiley says.

The chancellor has been a leader in efforts to expand on-campus student housing to meet demand, stem high-risk drinking and integrate athletics into the mainstream of university life. Wiley has reached out to the private sector by creating the Office of Corporate Relations to serve the increasing needs of the business community and to help build a more prosperous Wisconsin economy.

"The Wisconsin Idea offers a shared medium through which we can help the state achieve its maximum potential as a participant in a world economy that embraces learning and the advancement of knowledge as much as it does material production," he says.

Camp Randall Stadium has the look of a winner, with its updated fan-friendly atmosphere. The stadium is a source of Wisconsin pride, but it is our fans and their rich history of loyalty that makes any Badger sporting event a truly special occasion.

Our student-athletes are also winners – on and off the field. On the playing fields, we've had many victories and championships to celebrate. And in the classroom, 186 Badger athletes registered a grade-point average of better than 3.5. Nearly one-quarter of our student athletes were Academic All-Big Ten honorees in 2004-05.

I am committed to helping ensure that our teams achieve the highest standards of excellence, not just in competition, but also in integrity, values and character.

In addition, athletics offers the university another opportunity to connect with alumni and friends.

GREAT MOMENTS IN CAMP RANDALL HISTORY

CAMP RAN CELEBRA LEGAC

Each week this season, Wisconsin will be celebrating the Greatest Moments in Camp Randall Stadium history as voted on by you, the fans. The winning memories will be depicted on commemorative six-packs of Coca-Cola bottles in stores around the state this fall. One memory will be spotlighted during each home game this season and key figures will be introduced during the game. This week, we remember Sept. 21, 1974 when the Badgers shocked fourthranked Nebraska, 21-20, in their home opener.

To help us look back on this great moment, we have reprinted an excerpt from "Tales From the Wisconsin Badgers," a new book written by UW Director of Athletic Communications Justin Doherty detailing some of the best stories from UW football history.

Shocking The Cornhuskers

Between 1964 and 1977, the Wisconsin football program had just one (1974) winning season, but that campaign was filled with memorable performances and moments. Perhaps none was as thrilling, however, as quarterback Gregg Bohlig's 77-yard touchdown pass to Jeff Mack that beat fourth-ranked Nebraska at Camp Randall Stadium on September 21.

Wisconsin started the 1974 campaign with a 28-14 victory at Purdue and returned to Madison with Coach Tom Osborne's No. 4-ranked Cornhuskers set to visit for the home opener the following weekend.

The two teams played to a statistical draw by halftime, but



Nebraska led 14-7. The Cornhuskers then added a third-quarter field goal for a 17-7 advantage with 10:15 remaining in the period. Late in the third quarter, however, the Badger defense stopped Nebraska on a fourth-and-one try at the Wisconsin 27-yard line.

The Badgers took possession and began their march to victory. Bohlig engineered an eight-play, 73-yard scoring drive that ended when running back Billy Marek crossed the goal line from one yard out with 14:16 remaining

to play in the game. The Cornhuskers added another field goal for a 20-14 lead with only 4:21 left on the clock.

The Badgers took over on their own 29-yard line with 4:13 remaining. Bohlig was dropped for a sixyard loss, setting up what would become one of the most memorable second-and-16 conversions in school history.

Bohlig rolled out and hit Mack, who was bumped by a Nebraska defender while the ball was in the air, at the Wisconsin 45-yard line. Mack, whose son, Jeff, went on to start at linebacker for the Badgers, then finished off the 77-yard scoring strike by racing down the sideline for the touchdown.

"It was one of our normal plays," Badger head coach John Jardine said after the game. "Jeff runs an 'out' pattern and if he's covered tightly, he turns upfield. We practice it every day. My only concern about it was that he might go out of bounds."




Jeff Mack scored on a 77-yard touchdown pass late in the game to propel Wisconsin to a 21-20 win over No. 4 Nebraska on Sept. 21, 1974.

Mack, of course, did not go out of bounds and, after Vince Lamia's extra point, Wisconsin led 21-20 with 3:29 remaining to play. The Badgers got an interception from Steve Wagner with 2:40 left and ran out the clock after that.

Split end Art Sanger said of Mack after the game: "Jeff Mack just keeps on coming back. We were all trying to get to him after the TD, and that's just about the only place you can catch Jeff Mack—in the end zone."

Jamie Pollard Deputy Athletic Director



Jamie Pollard was named Deputy Athletic Director for the UW-Madison in 2003 and in that role serves as the No. 2 administrator in the Division of Intercollegiate Athletics. He is responsible for the overall administration

of the Badgers' 23-sport, \$72 million athletic department. In addition, he represents Barry Alvarez at all national, conference and university meetings when necessary.

Prior to being named Deputy Athletic Director, Pollard served as the division's Chief Financial Officer and Senior Associate Athletic Director. He developed a comprehensive strategic financial plan ("Keeping Big Red in the Black") that increased the division's operating reserve to \$7 million and allowed the university to move forward on the \$109 million renovation of Camp Randall Stadium. He also assisted with the development of the school's inaugural preferential seating program

that is generating more than \$9 million annually for the athletic program and he helped negotiate a multi-year, multi-million dollar contract for media and marketing rights that is one of the largest collegiate contracts in the country.

Pollard has also been the sports administrator for the men's and women's basketball programs since 2001-02. During that time the men's basketball program won back-to-back Big Ten championships, the 2004 Big Ten Tournament and advanced to the 2005 Elite Eight. He also served as the Tournament Manager when the university hosted the 2002 NCAA Men's Basketball Midwest Regional.

In the fall of 2003, Pollard was selected by *Street & Smith's Sports Business Journal* as a recipient of its "Top Forty Under 40" Award. It is given annually to the 40 most influential and creative individuals in sports under the age of 40. Pollard is the first intercollegiate sports administrator ever honored by the magazine.


Pollard has served as the President for the Collegiate Athletic Business Managers Association (CABMA) and was chosen by his peers as the 2002 Business Manager of the Year.

He was appointed by UW-Madison Chancellor John D. Wiley to serve as the campus chair of the Partners in Giving campaign that benefits more than 300 non-profit organizations. Pollard led the 2004 campaign for the University, which resulted in 4,500 employees donating \$1.46 million. Both the number of donors and donation levels were records for the institution.

His other intercollegiate administration experience came as Associate AD for Administration at Maryland (1994-98) and Associate AD for Internal Operations at St. Louis (1989-94). In both roles, he assisted with balancing budgets and creating reserves while helping implement gender equity plans.

In addition to his role at Wisconsin, Pollard founded Collegiate Financial Services, LLC, a private data research company that provided strategic financial planning and research services to athletic administrators, university presidents and conference commissioners.

Pollard, who was the 1987 NCAA
Division III national champion in the 5,000meter run and a two time Division III AllAmerican, has a B.S. degree in business administration from UW-Oshkosh (1987). He is in
that school's athletic hall of fame. Pollard and
his wife, Ellen, have four children, (Thomas,
Annie, Maggie and James).





THE BARRY ALVAREZ YEARS



Alvarez named UW coach

Notre Dame assistant chosen

MIAMI – The University of Wisconsin, a school searching for daylight in its run toward college football respectability, officially will announce today it has hired Barry Alvarez as its new football coach.

The decision was reached Sunday by Athletic Director Pat Richter and awaits only the approval of final contractual details to become official. It is the fourth decision in two months to determine the fate of a significant figure in the UW Athletic Department.

Alvarez, 43, the assistant head coach at Notre Dame who walked the sidelines in the Fighting Irish's Orange Bowl showdown with Colorado here Monday night, was selected from eight candidates interviewed by Richter.

After watching his defensive unit shine in Notre Dame's 21-6 victory over Colorado, Alvarez was excited when he called Richter's Miami hotel room. "How's that?" he asked his new boss.

When he calmed down some in the locker room at the Orange Bowl, Alvarez said: "I'm just ecstatic for our players, for me, for my family and for the good folks of Wisconsin. This is a fairy-tale ending and hopefully it will mean a fairy-tale start. This is something I wanted all my life."

There had been speculation that West Virginia Coach Don Nehlen was the front-runner, though Nehlen never actually applied for the job nor met with Richter. Richter said Nehlen indicated by telephone Sunday he was unsure of his interest in UW, prompting Richter to rule out the 10-year Mountaineers coach and choose Alvarez.

"I told him that I sensed that there was some reluctance on his part and perhaps the timing wasn't right," Richter said of Nehlen. "It never really got to the point of,

To commemorate the final season under head coach Barry Alvarez, the Badger Gameday Football Program will highlight Alvarez in each of the publications this season. The first installment is a reprint of the front-page story from The Wisconsin State Journal on the day Alvarez was hired, Jan. 2, 1990. It is being reprinted with permission from The Wisconsin State Journal.

'Is Don Nehlen really a candidate?' And Barry Alvarez was the No. 1 candidate in my mind."

Alvarez, who with either Iowa or Notre Dame has coached in a bowl game every season since 1981 (Wisconsin has been to just six postseason bowls in its history), said it was irrelevant whether he was choice No. 1, No. 2 or No. 3,467.

"As long as I'm the man, that's all that matters," said Alvarez, who hasn't held a head coaching post since 1978 when he led Mason City High School to Iowa's Class 4A state title.

"I didn't worry about Don Nehlen or anybody else – I had enough to worry about all week trying to slow down Colorado. I just listened to what Pat had to say and as the process moved along, I became more confident."

A former Iowa assistant coach, Alvarez – who joined Holtz's staff in 1987 and advanced to assistant head coach in just three seasons – succeeds the fired Don Morton in becoming the 27th coach in the UW's 101-year football history.

And though the Burgettstown, Pa., native missed by one day reaching a career-long aspiration of landing a major-college head-coaching job by age 42, Alvarez said he expects to arrive at his next destination – a return to halcyon days at Camp Randall Stadium and perhaps a berth in Pasadena's Rose Bowl – on schedule.

Though all details were not disclosed, Richter said Alvarez will receive a four-year contract with option for a fifth year. Unlike Morton's deal, however, Alvarez's will

not include a reassignment clause and will include a provision for liquidated damages should either party break the contract before 1994.

"Being a head coach is something I always wanted to do and I said it could happen by the time I was 42," said Alvarez, who turned 43 Saturday. "I think the situation at Wisconsin is ripe for success. I've been in the Big Ten (Conference) and I'm realistic. But I think you can start seeing results of one form or another immediately."

Though they participated in three bowl games in the early 1980s, the Badgers stumbled to a 6-27 record in three seasons under Morton, a slide accompanied by an average attendance drop of 27,000 fans per game since 1986.

The UW Athletic Department's major cosmetic surgery began with the forced resignation of Ade Sponberg as athletic director Nov. 13 and was followed by Morton's dismissal Nov. 28 and Richter's appointment Dec. 15.

And Alvarez, who as Iowa's linebackers coach from 1979 to 1986 helped turn the Hawkeyes from Big Ten doormats to title contenders, is prepared to run the anchor leg in what he hopes is UW's race from the ridiculous to the sublime.

"Wisconsin is in a great situation – good things can happen here," Alvarez said. "At Iowa they had 17 straight losing seasons and we managed to change that.

"Sometimes there are pendulum swings in football that if everybody rallies – the community, the students, the faculty, the Athletic Department and the coaches – you can get things done."

Though Alvarez in the past week was interviewed for the coaching vacancies at both Rutgers and Pittsburgh – Paul Hackett took the Panthers' post Saturday – he said the Wisconsin job was always his prime objective.

"I told (Notre Dame Coach) Lou Holtz Friday the Wisconsin job was the only one I was really interested in," Alvarez said. "Although I interviewed in other places, if I didn't get the Wisconsin job, I was going to stay at Notre Dame."

Alvarez, who as Holtz's defensive coordinator was given much of the credit for Notre Dame's 1988 national championship, has been given liberal coaching freedom by Holtz to implement his aggressive defensive philosophies.

A Nebraska graduate, Alvarez has been known as an intense competitor since his days as a Cornhusker line-backer. Yet observers note his flexible personality – after all, he has blended well with both the talkative Holtz and Iowa's sometimes volatile Hayden Fry – and ability to restrain his emotions.

"It's amazing how people are drawn to him," said Richter, who flew here Monday night to get Alvarez to sign a contract. "He's a proven winner who always has his stuff together. That comes from being around winning programs all your life. And I think that's exactly what Wisconsin needs right now."

Richter said Alvarez's background as a successful assistant and recruiter at Iowa and Notre Dame were primary factors in his hiring.

"From everything I can gather, both from players and those around him, he is the person who everyone felt would be the next head coach somewhere," Richter said. "Even the people who were not on his references, all of them speak quite highly of him. He is tough-minded, fair, obviously a winner, and someone who is ready to be a head coach."



In his first season at Wisconsin, Alvarez and the Badgers finished 1-10. Three years later, UW went 10-1-1 and were Rose Bowl champions.





COACHES' CORNER



Each week this season, the Badger Football Gameday Program will take fans inside the UW coaching staff and find out what it's like to try and prepare the Badgers for a game. A different assistant coach will be profiled each game. Hopefully fans can get a glimpse inside the life of the coaches. This week, we sat down with quarterbacks coach Jeff Horton, who is in his seventh season at UW.

What is a typical game week like for you?

Sunday we come in at 9 a.m. and grade the film from the day before. Then we meet with Coach Alvarez and dissect the whole thing as a group. Then we break up on our own because we each have certain responsibilities, like I'm in charge of third downs and red zone. I'll try to come up with some ideas and present them to the coordinators. We watch film the rest of the day on the opponent until probably about 8 or 9 p.m. Then I usually try to make a couple hours worth of recruiting calls Sunday night.

Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday we come in at 7 a.m. and are usually here until 9 or 10 p.m. We do our down and distance situations and formulating the game plan. By Tuesday you want everything in place and Wednesday maybe make a couple subtle changes. Thursday is a lighter day, a lighter practice. We put our 15 openers together, the plays we want to run in the first half. It's a big mental day for the whole team, especially for the quarterbacks. We talk about Thursday being a perfect practice. The coaches then all go home right after practice on Thursday, have a chance to see the family.

On Friday my wife and I always go to breakfast at C's Restaurant in Middleton, right by our house, because the coaches don't have to come in until 11 a.m. And on Friday everything should be done. Like I say, if you don't know it by Friday,

it's too late. If you have to meet a lot or you have to coach a lot, you haven't done your job Sunday through Thursday. I give them the test on Friday. I really don't like to say a whole bunch on Friday. I always sleep good on Fridays because I think I'm tired by the end of the week but also because I always go into a game knowing that we've done everything we can to be prepared and now we just have to go out and play and give our kids the opportunity to win.

What is "the test?"

I joke with them that it's harder than some of the classes they take. There are some things on fronts and coverages, down and distance, tendencies of the defense, when do you think they're blitzing, recognizing when we need to change plays according to different defenses. So I'll give them pictures of the defense and have a play written on there and they either have to change the play or say it's ok. It's usually about seven pages. You want them to have the answers to the test before they take the test. You don't want to find out after the game that they didn't know something.

Do you have any favorite drills?

I think the biggest thing with the quarterback is footwork drills. I think the days of just dropping back in the pocket and being able to sit back there and wait for someone to get open, that doesn't happen too often. I always tell them the sign of a great quarterback is that when things break down around them they can still go make a play, whether it be with their arm or with their legs. I try to do a lot of movement drills with them, a lot of throwing on the run. Trying to simulate game conditions where they're getting flushed and getting pressured and they can

still come out and make a play and turn a negative into a positive.

How much do you have to practice signaling the plays in from the sideline?

We work on it a lot during preseason camp. During practice we'll signal certain segments to stay fresh with it and then they have to carry it over to the game. It's a language all of its own. I help out with some of the signals but for the most part I let the kids come up with the signals. They're the ones using it and I don't think like 20- and 21-year olds anymore. They have a better imagination than I do. On the sidelines we always have a guy that's live and a guy that's fake, two different guys giving in the signals. A lot of our plays are long, there are a lot of words in there. You have fun with the signals because it really takes on a life of it's own. You have fun with the signals because it really takes on a life of its own. We always say we're a game within the game.



WISCONSIN TRADITIONS

Badger nickname

The athletic teams' nickname (Badgers) was borrowed from the state. The territory was initially dubbed the "Badger" state. The reason for the moniker was not because of badgers in this region, but instead because of an association with lead miners in the 1820s. Prospectors came to the state looking for minerals. Without shelter in the winter, the miners had to "live like badgers" in tunnels burrowed into hillsides according to folklore.

Bucky Badger

Badgers in various forms have been recognized as the school mascot for decades. The version currently known as Bucky, sporting a cardinal and white striped sweater, was first drawn in 1940 by artist Art Evans. At that time, the badger went by names like Benny, Buddy, Bernie, Bobby and Bouncey. Art Lentz, the department's publicity director, had the idea to bring the mascot to life.

The original badger mascot was too vicious to control. On more than one occasion, the live badger escaped his handlers. It was decided in the interest

of fan and player safety that Wisconsin's mascot be retired to the Madison Zoo. The Badger Yearbook replaced the live badger with a small raccoon named Regdab (badger spelled backwards) and passed it off as a "badger in a raccoon coat."

In 1949, a student in the university's art department, Connie Conrad, was hired to mold a paper-mache badger head. Cheerleader Bill Sagal, of Plymouth, Wis., was directed by homecoming chair Bill Sachse, to wear the outfit at the homecoming game. A contest was staged to name the mascot. The winner was Buckingham U. Badger, or Bucky. The name came from the lyrics in a song which encouraged the football team to "buck right through that line."

Bucky Badger has persevered through the years, even surviving a threat by then assistant attorney general, Howard Koop, in 1973. He suggested that Bucky be replaced by Henrietta Holstein, a loveable cow. Koop argued that "kids love cows. A generation could grow up supporting the university and Henrietta Holstein." Koop's effort to overthrow Bucky failed.

Bucky even survived a cameo appearance by former Sports Illustrated writer Rick Telander. In preparation for a book about the department, Telander wore the Badger costume at a 1991 volleyball game. Telander overcame "terminal claustrophobia" in his first and only act as Bucky.

Bud song

An integral part of any Wisconsin band performance is the playing of the Bud song. The tune is a spinoff of the song "You've Said It All," a jingle with words and music originally written by Steve Karmen for Budweiser beer commercials.

The song has become legendary at the University because of its polka-like rhythm. Band director Michael Leckrone said the song's popularity got started at a 1975 hockey game. "The crowd wanted to hear a polka," he said. "I didn't have any polkas. We had, just by accident, added this beer commercial to the tunes we play. I told the band if we substituted the word 'Wisconsin' for 'Budweiser' it would work."

Leckrone said the song became a football tradition after a 1978 comefrom-behind victory over Oregon. "Wisconsin was behind by three touchdowns, and the crowd was really dead. I played the song to get everyone pepped up. About 20 seconds after that, Wisconsin scored a TD. I played it again, and we scored another touchdown. From then on, the band could never play enough 'Bud,'" said Leckrone.



Motion W

When Coach Barry Alvarez came to Madison, he decided that the helmet logo needed to be updated to signal a new era. He entertained 15-20 designs in 1990 before Rayovac artist Rick Suchanek developed the "Motion W," which originally included a tail at the back of the logo. Alvarez thought the tail was a bit much, but when it was removed, decided to go with it. The University bought the rights to the design, and the logo has been adopted by all other UW sports.



The Wisconsin band has become famous for its post-game celebration called the Fifth Quarter. Win or lose, fans sing, dance and cheer with the band as they play traditional favorites like "On, Wisconsin" and the Bud song. Originally, the post-game concert was designed to give the fans something to listen to on their way out, but it developed into a post-game party as the band built in audience-participation activities.

"On, Wisconsin"

The school's fight song was originally composed in 1909 by Chicago's William Purdy, and the words were written by Carl Beck. Purdy and Beck had been fraternity brothers at Hamilton College (Clinton, N.Y.) and were roommates in Chicago. Purdy was going to submit the song for consideration to win a \$100 prize that the University of Minnesota was offering for a new football song. When Beck heard the music, he offered to write words and suggested that Purdy offer it to Wisconsin, where Beck had once studied. The song was an instant hit on campus and spread throughout the world.

The music was adapted by Band Director Michael Leckrone in 1969. The original version had been played virtually unchanged since its inception. "I got a

> lot of flak for the change," Leckrone said. "The old version was one you had to wait on. I wanted to generate immediate crowd reaction, so I stepped it up a bit."

Paul Bunyan Axe

The most-played rivalry in Division I-A football continues this fall when Wisconsin and Minnesota meet. The UW-UM series is the nation's oldest and has been played continuously since 1907. The game has alternated sites between the university campuses since 1946. Much prestige was always associated with the game, and the significance was emphasized with its place on the schedule. Between 1933 and 1982, the Wisconsin-Minnesota game was always the final regular-season contest for each school.

winners group, the National "W" Club, presented Minnesota with an axe wielded by Paul Bunyan. He was the mythical giant of midwestern lumber camps. Each vear since, the winner of the annual battle between the Big Ten rivals is presented with the axe, complete with scores inscribed on the handle, for display on its campus.

"Varsity"

The traditional arm-waving at the end of the song, "Varsity," was the 1934 brainstorm of then-band leader Ray Dvorak. He saw Pennsylvania students wave their caps after losing a game. Dvorak later instructed Wisconsin students to salute UW-Madison President Glenn Frank after each game.

Slab of Bacon

The Slab of Bacon trophy was the precursor to Paul Bunyan's Axe as the prize in the Wisconsin-Minnesota football series. Apparently, the trophy was presented to the winning school by a sorority from the losing institution. The trophy was discontinued in the 1940s and was discovered by UW Sports Information intern Will Roleson in a storage room at the UW Department of Athletics in 1994. It is currently housed in the football office at Wisconsin. "We took home the bacon," Coach Barry Alvarez said, "and kept it."

JUNIOR TO NO ONE



he 2005 men's soccer team is in a unique position with no seniors on this season's roster. The team will instead turn to its most veteran players, a core of eight juniors, for leadership. Though called juniors by class standing, this group is certainly junior to no one.

Leading the charge is Middleton, Wis., native Aaron Hohlbein, who will serve as captain 2005. He is the first player in seven years to take a solo role as captain. Backing him up are a compilation of accomplished studentathletes from all aspects of the game. Forwards Matthew Jelacic and Reid Johnson, midfielders William Bagayoko and Frank Iaizzo, defenders Hamid Afsari and Andrew Cardona and goalkeeper Jake Settle will provide a foundation at each position for the rest of the team to build on.

Head coach Jeff Rohrman spoke on the group's tenacity and ability to meet the challenges of leading a team after just two years in the ranks.

"The experiences this group has had in big games, against Top 20 opponents and playing in the Big Ten, where the demand and the expectations are at the greatest," Rohrman said. "They have had to learn quickly with some of the difficult situations they've been in and a lot has been asked of that class in terms of contribution and minutes over their two years. With all that, they are still hungry and they know this is their team and that it will be their leadership that is going to carry it."

In fact, this group has played in a combined 239 games and started 144 of them in the past two seasons. Playing nearly every minute since the first game his freshman year is Hohlbein, who recognizes the uncommon position his team is in this season.

"It's exciting," said Hohlbein. "I don't think a lot of teams have an opportunity like we do. As captain, it is a challenge, and I have more responsibilities this year, but I don't mind doing it. And as the group with the most experience, we try to stick together. That way we are all leaders

for the younger guys. It's not just one guy; it's the whole junior class."

Besides Hohlbein, the seven other players have made significant contributions to the success of the Badgers in the past two years. Goalkeeper Settle was called on in 2003 when three-year starter Eric Hanson was injured. Starting two games in Hanson's place, Settle secured a shutout against Illinois-Chicago and was named the Ben Ten player of the week on Sept. 29, 2004 for his efforts.

A staple on the defense, Cardona notched two assists in a thrilling 4-1 win over Dayton last season. The game not only featured a hat trick by Jed Hohlbein (brother of Aaron) but also marked a milestone in Badger history as the program's 300th win.

In 2003, Afsari assisted Jed Hohlbein on the game-winner against DePaul and later scored his own game-winner in a 3-2 defeat of Valparaiso. Also scoring in the Valpo game was Jelacic, who at 6-4 creates a formidable challenge on the attack. Joining the attack is Johnson, the 2005 top returning scorer with 10 points last season.

Rounding out the class is Iaizzo who assisted on a Johnson goal in 2003 and Bagayoko who brings three assists from his two years.

"There's no question it's going to be a collective effort of all those guys," said Rohrman. "While they are only juniors, they are experienced and have proven themselves capable of great things. I'm excited to have the entire team return next year. Looking at the depth we have, relative to last year, and to think that we are going to add to that and not lose anyone next year is pretty great."







UW'S RETIRED NUMBERS



#40 Elroy Hirsch

Elroy Hirsch played only one season (1942) at UW, but he was one of the most beloved sports figures in school history. Hirsch, nicknamed "Crazylegs," rushed for 786 yards for Wisconsin's 8-1-1 team in 1942. He starred for nine years with the L.A. Rams and later served as UW's Director of Athletics (1969-87).



#83 Allan Shafer

The memory of former quarterback Allan Shafer is continued with the "Living Memorial" Scholarship that is given in his name. Shafer was fatally injured during the 1944 Wisconsin-Iowa game. Shafer is one of two Badgers (Jay Seiler is the other) to die from a football-related injury.



#35 Alan Ameche

Alan Ameche, the 1954
Heisman Trophy winner, was a three-time All-American and ended his career as the NCAA's all-time rushing leader. He led the Badgers to the 1953 Rose Bowl and rushed for 133 yards in that game. The four-time NFL Pro Bowl pick was inducted into the College Hall of Fame in 1975.



#80 Dave Schreiner

Dave Schreiner, the two-time All-America end, was named Western Conference Player of the Year in 1942. Schreiner lettered three years at the UW as an end, both on offense and defense. He is a member of the National Football Foundation and W Club Halls of Fame. He was voted to the UW's all-time team in 1969.

Conduct Code

In order to keep Wisconsin football games as enjoyable as possible for our fans and their families, we ask that you respect others around you. If a ticket holder's conduct endangers or disrupts players, coaches, officials or other patrons, the University reserves the right to remove the ticket holder from the premises. No refund will be made in such cases. Stadium violations (body passing, throwing objects, and possession of alcohol 21 or older) and object passing may result in a \$181 fine.

moke-Free Facility

Smoking is prohibited in all state-owned buildings, including Camp Randall Sadium. Designated smoking areas are located within the stadium perimeter.

Intry / No Re-entry

Fease enter the gate printed on your ticket to allow for the most efficient entry to the

s adium. Gates open 90 minutes prior to kickoff. Fans may not have the stadium and then re-enter during the game. If an emergency arises, check with gate security.

Alcohol

No alcohol may be brought into the Stadium. Possession may result in police arrest and a fine of \$181. The fine for first offense for underage possession/consumption of alcohol is \$243.





Emergencies

In the event of a medical emergency, immediately notify a security guard, usher, police officer or paramedic in your area. UW Health First Aid Stations are located in the upper deck at Section FF, in the 5th level concourse behind Section T, and under Section YZ in the south end zone concourse.

It is possible to contact a patron during a game if you know their exact seat location by calling (608) 265-8676. No announcements will be made over the stadium sound system.

Lost and Found

If you lose an article on game day, please go to the Guest Services Center located under Section YZ, in the south end zone concourse, or call (608) 265-8676. For lost-and-found inquiries on non-game days, please call or visit the Kohl Center Gate B reception desk (608-263-5645).

Items Not Permitted

For the safety and security of all patrons, certain items are prohibited, including, but not limited to: any food or beverage items, cans, bottles, coolers, thermoses, backpacks (gym, duffel and tote), luggage, strollers, laser pointers, banners, flags, signs, noisemakers, weapons, balloons, beach balls or umbrellas. 

CAMP RANDALL STADIUM RENOVATION

NEW LOOK, SAME OLD CHARM FOR CAMP RANDALL

One of college football's legendary facilities-Wisconsin's Camp Randall Stadium-has just undergone a four-year, \$109 million renovation. The improvements are plentiful: new FieldTurf, suites and club seats, new video scoreboards, new offices, increased seating capacity and better fan amenities like concession areas, restrooms and traffic flow.

The enhancements, however, have not detracted from Camp Randall's charm; rather, the stadium's character has been enhanced greatly by the improvements, ensuring that future generations of Badger fans will have a first-rate facility at which to watch their beloved Badgers play on Saturdays in the fall.

Camp Randall was originally used as a Civil War training site. In fact, some 70,000 soldiers trained at the camp, which also included a hospital and a prison for Confederate soldiers on its grounds.

Named for Alexander Randall, the state of Wisconsin's first









In appreciation for that support, many student-athletes volunteer frequently in community service projects. Every season, the football team works together on a community service project to give back to Madison.

Among the projects that the Badgers have participated in recently were landscaping and cleanup days in the Eric Circle, Allied Drive, Vera Court and Harmony Park neighborhoods. The team has also participated in several walk-a-thons to raise funds for charitable causes as well as projects with Habitat For Humanity and Hammer With A Heart. Players and coaches make visits throughout the year to the UW Children's and Veterans' Hospitals, area schools and numerous other charity functions.

Former UW fullback Cecil Martin (left) was named to the American Football Coaches Association "Good Works" team for his community service in 1997 and 1998. He was cited for establishing an offseason program for players to visit the UW Children's Hospital. Martin also served as a mentor at the Southside Community Center, where he tutored and played with children.

Martin continued his charitable support as a member of the Philadelphia Eagles where he won the team's 2000 Ed Block Courage Award.

He also was named an "Unsung Hero" by the NFL Players' Association and was featured on the Fox Sports All-Madden Team as one of the National Football League's "good guys."



THE BIG TEN CONFERENCE

This is the Big Ten Conference

The Big Ten Conference is an association of 11 world-class universities whose member institutions share a common mission of research, graduate, professional and undergraduate teaching and public service. Intercollegiate athletics has an important place within the mission.

Founded in 1896, the Big Ten has sustained a comprehensive set of shared practices and policies that enforce the priority of academics in student-athletes' lives and emphasize the values of ntegrity, fairness and competitiveness. Big Ten universities provide in excess of \$82 million in athletic scholarship aid to more than 8,500 men and women student-athletes who compete for 25 championships, 12 for men and 13 for women. In 2004-05, the Big Ten distributed over \$116 million in revenues to its 11 member institutions. Conference

institutions sponsor broad-based athletic programs with more than 270 teams.

- Big Ten Universities are members of the nation's only conference whose constituency is entirely composed of institutions that are members of the AAU, a prestigious association of major academic and research institutions in the United States and Canada.
- Big Ten Universities host more than 70 Nobel laureates as faculty, students or researchers.
- Big Ten Universities enroll students of whom more than 41 percent have graduated in the top 10 percent of their high school class, while 74 percent graduated in the top quarter of their class.
- The Big Ten showcased more than 300 events that were televised national-



ly, regionally and locally last year, representing over 600 hours of programming.

- Since 1992, the Big Ten has created in excess of 2,000 new opportunities for women student-athletes and established 28 new women's teams.
- Throughout the conference, the Big Ten had more than 8,400 student-athletes playing on over 270 teams in 2003-04. Those student-athletes received in excess of \$82 million in direct financial aid.
- Big Ten student-athletes graduate at a rate of 10 percent higher than all Division I student-athletes.
- The Big Ten recognized 1,952 Academic All-Big Ten honorees during the 2004-05 academic year, the highest total in the last decade. Over the past five years, the Conference has annually acknowledged more than 1,700 studentathletes as Academic All-Conference honorees.
- In the past 10 years (1995-96 through 2004-05), the Big Ten claimed 40 NCAA team championships and 155 individual titles.

BIG TEN CONFERENCE FOOTBALL INSTANT REPLAY FACTS

The Big Ten Conference will begin year two of its college football instant replay program in 2005. In addition, other leagues will also implement their own instant replay system after the NCAA approved the Big Ten's proposal to allow all NCAA conferences and independent institutions to experiment with the use of video replay for the 2005 season.

The goal of the Big Ten's football television replay plan is to: See, Review, Change (if warranted). Only specific plays are reviewable, and only those plays where the absolute standard of indisputable video evidence is met can a play be overturned.

Only the Technical Advisor serving as the review official for the game. Neither the game officials nor the coaches may ask for a review. The Technical Advisor will have the sole authority to change a call, or no call, on the field. Unlike the NFL model, officials working Big Ten games will not have the ability or capacity to view the replay(s).

The Big Ten Conference replay system allows for specific types of officiating mistakes to be immediately reviewed and corrected once the standard of indisputable video evidence is met. The replay system will not guarantee that all officiating mistakes are identified and corrected.

During the 2004 campaign, play was stopped in only 28 of 57 contests (49 percent) for a total of 43 stoppages and 21 overturned calls (49 percent of stoppages). The length of the 57 games utilizing instant replay in 2004 was only three hours and 16 minutes, compared to three hours and 13 minutes in all 2003 contests. Less than one stoppage occurred per game in 2004, as the Big Ten's average length of review was only two minutes and 39 seconds, compared to the National Football League average of three minutes and 20 seconds for its instant replay system.



National Football Foundation College Hall of Fame

These seven former Badgers have received the highest honor the game of football affords. They have been inducted into the National Football Foundation Hall of Fame. They are the greats of the game and their achievements are documented at the College Football Hall of Fame in South Bend, Ind.



Pat O'Dea (elected in 1962), nicknamed "The Kangaroo Kicker," was a two-time All-America fullback and punter between 1896-99. He also was a two-time team captain.



Robert Butler (elected in 1972) was a three-year letterwinner at tackle and won all-league (1912-13) and All-America (1913) laurels.



Pat Harder (elected in 1993), an All-America fullback, was the Big Ten's scoring and rushing champion in 1941.



Dave Schreiner (elected in 1955), the two-time All-America end, was the Western Conference MVP in 1942.



Pat Richter (elected in 1996) was a two-time All-America end and led the nation in receiving as a junior.




Marty Below (elected in 1988), a rugged right tackle, earned All-America praise as a senior.



LEGACY OF CAMP RANDALL



Today's Camp Randall experience is one of boisterous cheering, fan camaraderie and first-class football among a sea of red. This, however, was not always the case. On the same ground that today's young student-athletes do battle on the gridiron, young soldiers-to-be prepared for battle in the Civil War. From 1861 to 1865 the area where Camp Randall Stadium stands served as Civil War training grounds. In this season's game programs this page will be dedicated to the legacy of Camp Randall and its history in its pre-football days.

hen President Abraham Lincoln declared war in 1860 and called for troops from the Unionist states, Wisconsin's governor Alexander W. Randall was one of the first in line to offer troops to the cause. Madison had hosted the Wisconsin State Fair in the area between Monroe Street, Randall Street. University Avenue and what is now Breese Terrace since 1858 and the grounds were outfitted with buildings that could be used as barracks for the soldiers and stables for the horses. The 50-acre field was on the western outskirts of the small city.

The first troops arrived in May of 1861 and their commanding officer immediately dubbed the land Camp Randall in honor of the state's governor. In 1861, Madison was a small but growing town. The majority of the population was connected to the government or the recently started state university, but with each regiment of troops bringing 1,000 new men to town, the area

prospered. Situated in the center of railroad traffic, Madison was a perfect place for the training grounds with easy access to the theater of war.

In the early days of the union, the federal government was not organized to handle the mobilization of the states and offered little direction or guidance in the first year of the war. Luckily for Wisconsin, Governor Randall and other state officials took it in their own hands to deal with many of the problems during that first year. Without the proper supplies and training guidelines from the federal government the outlook for many of the Northern regiments was less than appealing. However, Randall was adamant that Wisconsin's soldiers be prepared for the trials ahead of them. In a speech the Wisconsin legislature he said:

"This legislature must determine for Wisconsin ... the way of arming, equipping and uniforming its own citizens for military purposes, ... by putting them in the shape of regiments, into camps to be drilled, inured to the hardships of soldier life and made skillful in the use of arms before being called upon to face experience armies in battle ... The men sent to war should be soldiers when they go, or there will be few of them living soldiers when it is time for them to return."

For the next four years Camp Randall turned out 71,000 of the 91,000 soldiers Wisconsin provided to the war effort. In 1865, the war ended and just in time to alleviate the animosity between the disenchanted citizens of Madison and the soldiers. It would be 30 more years before Camp Randall became home to the Badger football team. Throughout the many changes to the landscape, the grounds still hold the legacy and memories of the Civil War and the soldiers it molded there.



A fter a highly successful inaugural campaign, UW-Madison will "Roll Out the Red Carpet" for a second time for fans and visitors to Camp Randall Stadium. The campaign was designed to help create a fanfriendly environment at all UW athletics events.

"Last season, I'm proud to say that we made important progress toward our goals," says Chancellor John D. Wiley, who notes that he did not receive a single complaint about aggressive fan conduct during the 2004-2005 academic year.

"Visiting football fans from across the country told us that they were welcomed by Badger fans and had memorable trips to Madison," he says. "Our own fans told us that they appreciated our efforts to make events even more fun. We're hoping that this season will be even better."

Plans are in place to continue to enhance and expand the Red Carpet program, with a special focus on the 2005 home football season.

Wiley himself kicked-off the 2005 campaign with the help of student volunteer Fan Ambassadors, as he greeted fans at the corner of Regent Street and Breese Terrace ahead of today's Bowling Green game.

Last season, more than 200 students from a variety of student organizations participated in the Fan Ambassador program, welcoming tens of thousands of fans to Camp Randall. This year, the Guest Services department of the Athletic Department will recruit additional students to greet fans and conduct giveaways two hours before each home game.

In addition, Badger coaches Mark Johnson, Mike Eaves and Lisa Stone helped deliver the Red Carpet message to UW-Madison freshmen during Wisconsin Welcome and other orientation events. Similar events are taking place across campus this month.

A series of public service advertisements featuring the coaches will be played on the Camp Randall scoreboard during games.

Also as part of the program, the university coordinated its efforts with police and security, local businesses, tourism groups, and the city of Madison.

In recognition of its efforts, the university won a prestigious Silver Medal award from the Council for Advancement and Support of Higher Education for its innovative approach in tackling what has become an issue for colleges and universities across the country.

Student recommendations led to the initiative, which was in reaction to

numerous complaints about aggressive fan conduct during the 2003 football season.

Rolling out the Red Carpet has been funded through the use of private donations to UW-Madison. No taxpayer funds have been used.

New Power Plant Finished

Construction of the West Campus Cogeneration Facility has been completed. The \$180 million plant, a partnership among the university, Madison Gas and Electric, and the state, will provide electricity for the campus and community, plus chilled water for air conditioning and steam for heating the campus. The natural gas-fired plant has an overall net efficiency of 70 percent, which compares to 30 to 35 percent for a typical electric facility. The efficient use of fuel reduces operating costs and produces far fewer greenhouse gases.

Students Grab Top Honors in Food Competition

A group of food science students captured first place in a national product development contest sponsored by the Institute of Food Technologists for "Healthy sTarts," a granola cup coated with strawberry-flavored yogurt and topped with strawberries and blueberries. The first-place prize came with a \$4,000 cash prize. The

team also made several contacts with companies that expressed interest in their product.

Hong Leaves UW-Madison

Luoluo Hong, dean of students at UW-Madison, began a new position as dean of student affairs at the West Campus at Arizona State on Aug. 1. Hong joined UW-Madison in November 2002. Lori Berquam, associate dean of students since May 2003, has been appointed interim dean. Berquam will serve in that position until the position is filled.

Underwood is New School of Education Dean

Julie K. Underwood, associate executive director and general counsel for the National School Boards
Association, has been named the new dean of the School of Education. A former UW-Madison faculty member, Underwood has worked for the NSBA since 1998. She will lead one of the most highly regarded schools of education in the nation. The school's

eight academic departments enroll more than 2,300 undergraduate and 1,000 graduate students each year in a diverse range of programs, which include teacher preparation, art, dance, occupational therapy, rehabilitation psychology, exercise science and athletic training. She succeeds W. Charles Read, who retired after a 35-year career at UW-Madison.

Extraordinary Gift Funds Art Museum

UW-Madison alumni Simona and Jerome A. Chazen gave \$20 million to the university in May to fund a major expansion of the Elvehjem Museum of Art. To commemorate the gift, the university renamed the museum. It has become the Chazen Museum of Art. The Elvehjem name, however, lives on. The present facility will retain its dedication and will be called the Conrad A. Elvehjem Building. The gift represents more than half of the estimated \$35 million needed for an expansion project that includes a new 60,000-squarefoot building across Murray Street east of the existing museum site. Plans call for a dramatic overhead walkway connecting the two buildings.

Interim Provost Named

Virginia Sapiro, associate vice chancellor for teaching and learning at UW-Madison, will become interim provost and vice chancellor for academic affairs when Provost Peter Spear retires in late October. Sapiro, a political scientist and former chair of the Department of Political Science and the Women's Studies Program, has been on the faculty since 1976. She has served as associate vice chancellor since 2002; in that post, she assists the provost and works with deans, directors and campuswide groups to carry out UW-Madison's teaching and learning missions.

NCAA GUIDELINES

What Every Badger Fan Should Know

With increasing numbers of NCAA rules governing outside intervention in recruiting, coaches cannot afford to have any extra "help" in recruiting elite student-athletes to the University of Wisconsin. The penalties are too severe.

Here are some tidbits of information concerning you and Badger athletics ... You are a "representative" of the UW's athletics interests (i.e., booster) if any of the following apply:

a) you are an alumnus of the University of Wisconsin;

b) you have ever made financial contritutions to the athletics department, to an a hletic booster organization of the UW, or to a UW athletics program;

c) you have ever helped to arrange e nployment of enrolled student-athletes a ud/or National Letter of Intent signees;

d) you have ever been involved in any way promoting the Badger athletic program.

Once an individual is identified as an "thletics representative/booster," the person retains that identity forever, even if that person no longer contributes to or supports the athletics program.

NCAA Bylaw 13.01.5 states: In Division I, a representative of the UW's athletics interests is prohibited from making in-person, on-or-off campus recruiting contacts, or written or telephonic communications with a prospect or the prospect's relatives or legal guardians.

A prospect is any student who has started classes for the ninth grade. In addition, any student younger than ninth grade could become a "prospect" if they receive any benefits from an institution or a booster. Student-athletes enrolled in preparatory school or two-year colleges are also considered prospective student-athletes.

What Can You Do?

If you know of a high school or junior college student-athlete who might want to attend the UW, the only permissible activity for a representative is to call the appropriate UW coach.

Extra Benefit Rule

A representative of UW athletics interests cannot provide an "extra benefit" to a prospective or enrolled student-athlete. An extra benefit is any special arrangement by



an institutional employee or a booster to provide for a student-athlete or a studentathlete's friend or relative not expressly authorized by NCAA legislation. Some examples of prohibited activities are:

a) providing gifts or reduced cost services:

b) providing a loan, or arranging for or co-signing a loan;

 c) employing relatives or friends of a prospective student-athlete as an inducement for the enrollment of the prospect;

d) providing use of an automobile;

e) providing rent-free or reduced-rent housing;

f) providing tickets to an athletic, institutional or community event;

g) entertaining or contacting a prospective student-athlete or a prospective student-athlete's family on or off campus;

h) promising to provide any of the above;

According to NCAA rules, the University of Wisconsin Athletic Department reserves the right to withhold any benefit or privilege associated with their athletic department (i.e., booster clubs, ticket privileges, etc.) from individuals that are involved in a violation of NCAA legislation

Employment

NCAA rules are such that opportunities for your interaction with student-athletes are very limited. One of the best opportunities for alumni or friends of the program to assist student-athletes financially and provide them with a valuable internship experience is through employment. A representative of athletics interests is permitted to provide employment for student-athletes under the following conditions:

• Compensation can't include any remuneration for value or utility that the student-athlete may have for the employer because of the publicity, reputation, fame or personal following that he or she has obtained because of athletics ability;

• Compensation for only work actually performed; and

• Compensation at a rate commensurate with the going rate in that locality for similar services.

With more than 700 student-athletes competing at the UW, the Department of Athletics encourages businesses to hire Badger student-athletes. 





However, a number of individuals have gone on to make their mark on the University of Wisconsin football program during the Alvarez era by originally joining the team as a walk-

Below is a partial list of some of the individuals that joined the Badgers as non-scholarship players, only to make major impacts at the UW and beyond.

- Bob Adamov, linebacker: four-year letterwinner; team captain and starter on the Badgers' 1998 Big Ten and Rose Bowl champion squad; Ivan Williamson Scholastic Award winner in 1998; one of nine senior starters named team MVP his final season.
- · Chad Cascadden, linebacker: named the team's Special Teams Player of the Year in 1994; Academic All-Big Ten selection his senior year; letterwinner on UW's 1993 Big Ten and Rose Bowl champion squad: played for the NFL's New York Jets.
- Matt Davenport, placekicker: semifinalist for Lou Groza Award; consensus first-team All-Big Ten in 1997 and 1998; scored 99 points as a senior, the most in school history for a placekicker: career field goal percentage (.868) is No. 1 at UW.
- · Jason Doering, safety: team captain in both 1999 and 2000; led Badger defensive backs in tackles his final three seasons; ranks fourth all-time in career

solo tackles (250); starter on two Big Ten and Rose Bowl champion teams; currently plays for the NFL's New York Giants.

- · Joe Panos, offensive tackle: team captain in 1993; starter on the Badgers' 1993 Big Ten and Rose Bowl champion team; first-team All-Big Ten and second-team AP All-American in '93: played for the NFL's Philadelphia Eagles and Buffalo Bills.
- Mark Tauscher, offensive tackle: three-year letterwinner; member of two Big Ten and Rose Bowl champion squads, including a starter on the 1999 team; helped Ron Davne become NCAA all-time leading rusher; currently a starter for the NFL's Green Bay Packers.
- Donnel Thompson, linebacker: team captain in 1998 and 1999; starter on a pair of UW Big Ten and Rose Bowl champion teams; ranks 10th all-time in career tackles; two-time team-leader in tackles; played for NFL's Pittsburgh Steelers and Indianapolis Colts.
- · Mike Schneck, long snapper: threevear letterwinner at Wisconsin; member of 1998 Big Ten and Rose Bowl champion team; signed free agent contract with Pittsburgh and currently plays for the Steelers.
- · Sam Veit, punter: four-year starter and letterwinner; member of UW's 1993 Big Ten and Rose Bowl champion squad; ranks third all-time in career punts (209) and career punting yards (8,016); three-time Academic All-Big Ten selec-

LEONHARD WAS ULTIMATE WALK-ON SUCCESS STORY

Jim Leonhard's (pictured left) football accomplishments are worth noting all by themselves: three-time first-team All-American, three-time first-team All-Big Ten, holder of several Big Ten and school records for his play as both a defensive back

and punt returner. But that's only half the story.

Leonhard's accolades off the field are just as impressive. A 2004 first-team ESPN The Magazine Academic All-American as selected by CoSIDA, Leonhard was honored in New York as one of 15 National Football Foundation Scholar-Athletes (with that goes an \$18,000 postgraduate scholarship).

The 5-8, 186-pound Leonhard (who once won a team basketball slam dunk competition), a native of tiny Tony, Wis. (pop.

105), will go down as one of the most decorated players (let alone walk-ons) of the Alvarez era.




