

## MR 2 reports by Ernest Kuhn – Xieng Khouang. 1967/1970

[s.l.]: [s.n.], 1967/1970

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The situation in the north remained relatively stable during the month of January. Most significant were the two Viet Minh attacks on Na Khang (LS 36) and Nong Khang (LS52). Both attacks resulted in decisive defeats for the Viet Minh. Body count showed 31 Vietnamwse killed at Na Khang and 23 killed at Nong Khang, in addition to 2 prisoners, one Thai Dam and one Vietnamese. Neither attack produced any refugee movement. However the Nong Khang attack prevented, or has at least delayed, the evacuation of more Lao and Lao Thung from the area to Houei Hin Sa (LS 215). Small enemy probes were made during the month at Fha Thi, (LS 85), Moung Son (LS59), Houei Sa An (LS 127), Nhot Fhad (LS 179), Houei Thom (LS 27) and in the area of Fha Hang (LS 205). None of these moves produced and refugee movements. The areas to the south and west of Lima Sites 201 and 206 remain critical following the loss of Ban Vieng (LS 89) and Phu Se Bott (LS 82) in December.

The areas north-east, east and south-east of Sam Thong (LS 20) have remained stable and calm with the exception of Khang Kho (LS 204) 18 miles east of Sam Thong. Increased shelling ad mortaring of friendly positions has been reported the past 2 weeks. The Thom (LSII) and was reoccopied in Tate Noved Tha Vieng (LS 13) was reoccopied in as was Tha Thom (LS 11) in Late November. The situation at Tha Thom is at a critical stage mow. The local villagers in the Tasseng, 1670 people from 16 villages, are threatening to leave Thathom for Paksane. The soliders there are on the whole worthless as is shown by their actions when Tha Thome was lost in late November. As reported earlies friendly soliders systematically looted Tha Thom before the villagers

returned. Relations between the military and the viliagers is growing worse. Many people are threatening to move to Paksane. This would be bad for several reasons. One, it would create a problem for Paksane. Two, it would leave void a very fertile rice-producing area. Three, it would be extrememy bad publicity for the RLG if the area were evucated. Four, it would create a vaccuum in the stragetic south-east approach not only to Long Thieng (LS 98) and Sam Thong, but to the might also affect the very successful resettlement program we have east of Tha Thom. I think that serious consideration should be made, ASAP, to putting any experience Forward Areas Team in Tha Tham. Certainly its location, a hub for both ground and river travel for Paksane and Sam Thong area, should warrant immediate attention in Vientiane as to the seriousness to the problem.

During January STOL sites in the naturer we north were opened at Phu Vai (LS 219; UH 2303), Phu Pha Louam (LS 220; UH 9116), and Houei Moun (LS 221; UH 5843.

During January more refugees from the Ban Vieng (LS89) and FMu Se Bott (LS 82) areas continued to drift into Houei Soong (LS 206). There are 1366 Ban Vieng people at Phu Sam Soun (UG 8290) three kilometers from the Houei Soong airstrip. There are an additional 516 refugees huddling around the airstrip who came from 7 villages near Ban Vieng. Many of these people have been living in the forest for several weeks and are not in the best physical condition.

January 17-19 Pha Poun received 203 new fefugees from the ThamHok-Ban Tha area (UG 6779). For security reasons, and to due to the lack of good fields, it is hoped that these people came be moved to Pha Poun (LS 219), a few days walk from Pha Poun. Phu Vai now has a population

of 908 people (208 dependents, 520 relugees and 180 people who are partiall self sufficient). With any luck at all, Phu Vai and Pha Poun should be self-sufficient next year.

At Housei Hin Sa (LS 215) refugee commodities were distributed to 884 people. 202 people were evacuated from Nong Khang (L52) in early January, to Houei Kha Moun (LS 111) and then to Houei Hin Sa. The additional 682 are Neo who are perhaps typical of the way the people in the north have had to move around. In late 1965 these people were forced to leave Hong Non (LS86) to Den Din (UH 7961). In 1964 they fled to Pha Thi (LS 85). Since then they have been to Houei Ma (LS 107) and thento Phu Tia (LS 185). Finally they have been relocated an Housei Hin Sa where they should be secure and free to clear rice fields.

On January 21 seven Lao Thung refugees came into Ngod Phat (LS 179)

from Ban Houei T3, 3 kilometers north of the enemy-held Houa Moung (LS55)

More people are plan ing an escape attempt but it is not know how many
people might be involved, in any. (A short paragraph is added to this
report with concerning a brief conservation with these 7 people.)

IN mid-January relugee commodities were distributed to 124 refugees

(20 Lao Thung and 4 Meo families) at Houei Tong (LS 156). Houei Tong

now has a population of approximately 2405 people. (Another paragraph is

added to this report concerning a talk with a refugee from Ban Mok Kha

(TH 658) which has been under PL cotrol for the past 6 years.)

One of the most encouraging events of the past few months occurred on January 27 when Companies 12001 and 12033 launched "Operation Linkup" from Houei Tong (LS 196). The objective of this operation is secure the area

between the Nam Seng and Nam Ou in eastern Luang Prabang province, which would in effect "linkup" eastern Luang Prabang and western Sam Nuea. As of this time, February 1, these ADC's have crossed the Nam Seng at Ban Tha Vane (TH 7758). 30 men went upstream to Ban Se (6964) and have occupied the immediate area. The remaining 170 men proceded from BanTha Vane to Phu Louam (TH 6864) where they have spread out to secure the area. The ADC's have suffered & KIA, and have captured 8 "PL" in addition to getting 6 defectors with weapons and ammo. While this operation should not produce any influx of refugees, it would be to our advantag to show some interest in these people, particularily the Lao people along the Nam Seng. In early January surrender passes and leaflets from the Chaw Moung of Moung Hiem (LS48A) were dropped along the Nam Seng. These were obtained through the co-operation of USIS. Further plans are under way, with the help of USIS, to further provide this area with papers, posters, pamphlets etc. The area commander of Houei Tong, S/Lt. Blea Yang Mous, has asked for newspapers and pictures of the King for his mento pass out as they enter new areas. Projected plans call for the complete operation to procede to Ban Sop Van (TH 5580) on the Nam Ou, if possible. This area contains several thousand Meo and Lao Thung who have expressed a desire to come under RLG protection and control fighting a line engle of the one north, we might at wort held at head

The following is the result of a conversation with 7 Lao Thung "refugees" ( 1 woman, 2 men and 4 young teemagers) who walked into Yhod Phat from Ban Houei To, 3 kilometers north of Hua Moung (LS58). The villagers in this area have remained in their area, both PL and RLG control When control of this area waovered between PL and RLG control the people stayed in their village and continued their farming. There are 64 houses with about 300 people.in Houei To. When the PL really consoladated their hold 2 years ago they each family rice, cooking pots, salt and one suit of clothes per family. Under PL control the village has had no school and no dispersary. There is one readio owned by a villager. There are 6 Viet Minh living in Houei T who have contact with outside areas by courriers only. Every 4-5 days 10-20 Viet Minh are reported to pass from Ban Moung ) to Ban Keo Boon ("location unknown) generally carrying rice. There are 2 real PL cadres, local villagers, who activity support the PL and have weapons. No local villagers have ever been conscripted as coolies and the refugees say that the PL do not trust the local, although this may have been for my benefit, nor have the PL ever confiscated rice from the local people. Whenasked why the villagers never tried to go to Hua Moung when RLG forces occopied the village in September - December 1965, one man said he didn(t know the path! (This obvious fabrication produced round of laughs from everyone, including the refugees themselves.) However, their real motive for coming to Mhod Phat seems to have been economic. Theu said that they had used up thier money reserves, their animal stock was depleted and they cou were afraid to work in their rice fields because of air strikes in the area. So, on January 19, 17 people made an attempted escape from the village late in the evening. Early in the morning of the 20th they were attacked in the village of Ban Keo. They sispect that the 2 local Ban To PL informed the Viet Minh who waited to ambush the group. At first the Viet Minh only shot in the air to stop the people. However, as they began to run, they shot at individual people. Of the organized 17, only 7 escaped. It is not known exactly what happened to other 10 whether they were killed or captured. The "spokesman" for the group has requested that Nhod Phat help liberate the remaining people in Ban Houei To. As of this time no action has been taken.

The following is the result of a talk with a refugee, o on January 21, at Houei Tong (LS 196). Ba Phan, aged 20, came to Houei Tonk from Ban Mok Kha ( TH 8738) which has been under PL control for about 6 years. Ba Phan, clong with came to Houei Tong in November 1966 when ADC patrols entered the Ban Mok Kha area bringing out dependents of ADC's at Houei Tong. In the Mok Kha area there about 4-500 Lao Thung in 5 villages. When the PL first came to Mok Kha they conscripted many young men into the army. Most of these men were sent to the Nam Ou - Nam Bac areas. Several have returned to Mok Kha and hwe refused to fight as PL soliders again. No local villagers have been conscripted as coolies. The people are fairly free to move about as a travel permit from the Nai Baan is needed only for travel of more than 10 days! Most of the travel is made to areas under RLG control, primalriy to the east towards Pak Seng (TH5831) . Individuals band together in groups of 4-6 people and go to buy txeixxxxx go ds for themselves, and return to Mok Kha, where some of the merchandise might be sold to other villagers. Money, both "Mang Le" and the Vientiane RLO variety, is obtained from selling opium and rice. PL patrols come through Mok Kha 4 Or 5 times a month. They Tray only stay one night and move on. While they are there the villages are required to feed the patrol. Sometimes they promise to returnand pay for the food, but never do. No food is taken by the patrol to eat after they leave the village. Each villager gets to gep 70% of his rice crop and the Nai Baan takes the remaining 30% and puts it into a central warehouse. for use by visiting PL if the local rice supply is not sufficient. No rice is sent away to other areas. Mok Kha has a village school of children under 15 years old. The teacher is a local man who receives no salary but goes to Pak Seng to buy school supplies

which he sells to the students. The subjects are the normal ones taught in any

vil age school. No propaganda is taught in the schools.

#### February Report

The general calm in the north continued through February. There were no major refugee movements, however 29 people, mostly old men and young woman and children, went to Pha Hang (LS 205) you the 40th. They are mow being moved from Na Khang (LS 36) to Phone Sai (LS 211) where they have relatives.

Another 109 people from Moung Peum have moved to Phu Pha Louom (LS 220)

Moung Hiem (LS 48A) The resettlement program in Moung Hiemis progressing very well under the direction of the Chaw Moung. Paddy and up-land rice fields have been distributed to 449 families. Hill fields will be cleared this month and as will paddy. Distribut on of ducks will be made next month and the Chaw Moung is preparing the first fish ponds in the area. This, along with the 24 water buffaloe promised by USAID, is a big first step in getting these people back on theer feet.

Ban Se ( TH 767) "Operation Link-up" suffered a temporary setback when bad weather, which prevented supply drops to the foward areas, forded the ADC's to pull back to Ban Se from thier positions as peported last month. Two companies have moved north to the Nam Mi area(appox. TH 7970). A special 15 man team is moving back to the Phu Thi Phung-Phu Loung area ( approx, TH 6763) to contact friendly Meo and Lao Thung groups. At this time 533 Lao formerely fro have moved into Ban Se. They formerely lived These people, 208 from Ban Se, 135 191 from Ban Tha Vane (TH 7758) and 134 from Ban Bom Vang ( TH 7969), were forced by the Pathet Lao to leave their villages in 1963. Since then they have been living in the woods or near the Nam Mi, somethimes forced to move 6-7 times per year. Two days after Ban Se was occupied I was able to go in Since then I have spent much time there working with the people, In 22 weeks the villagers built a 950 x 95 foot airstrip. LO4 men have volunteered for the military and are already being used on patrols with the Meo/Lao Thung ADC's. A USAID medic was sent in immediately to treat the villagers-suffering

primarily from chronic colds and coughs. Many of the younger children show signs of severe vitaman deficency. Through the co-operation of USIS packets of posters and magazines, including Lao flags, the constitution, maps of Laos, and most popular, color photos of the King, were distributed to every family. Even though most people are repairing their old houses of building new ones, they are most enthustiastic about future plans for the village. 6 Buddhist monks have re-opened the beautiful little wat.and Three men with teaching experience Plans are being made to rebuild the school -the old school was torn down to complete wi h matal roofing sheets was torn down to build the airstrip- and three men with teaching experience have been contacted. with the help of Kirk Dimmit vegetable seeds were distributed to the first 330 refuges and semi-marsh land had been picked to start the first garden. A site has been picked to put in fish ponds but this will take some ti at the present time the villagers are to busy to undertake this project. It is hoped that the people can get in a partial rice crop this year, Due to the presence of the PL they cannot return to thier old fields and bring in rice and the security now is not good enough in the surrounding areas to make "hat" to far from the village.

As Tas The program at Ban Se is one that USAID and the RLG cannot afford not to support. Here we have nearly intact viktages, complete with local leaders, to work with. I have noticed a big wahnge in the attitude of the people in the past month as they gained confidence in both themselves and in the first initial projects by the Chaw Moung, the local area commander and USAID.

Adequate, but not overdone, support of Ban Se will be a big psycological boost for the RLG.

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


