The Secretary presented the following communications from Andrew W. Hopkins, Secretary of the Hoard Memorial Committee:

"The Board of Regents, The University of Wisconsin, Madison, Wisconsin

Gentlemen:

Because of his leadership in dairying and his contribution to the field of education, friends of the late Governor W. D. Hoard subscribed to a fund with which to memorialize his life, work, and influence. Subscriptions were received from practically every state in the Union.

A committee consisting of the late Dr. Harry Faville of Illinois; the late Mr. W. W. Marsh of Iowa; the late Mr. D. D. Aitken of Michigan; Mr. H. H. Wing of New York; Mr. M. D. Munn of Minnesota; and Mr. Charles L. Hill of Wisconsin, had charge of the project and engaged the Borglum Brothers as the sculptors. Andrew W. Hopkins served as secretary and treasurer of the committee.

Before the memorial was started Mr. Solon Hannibal Borglum died leaving Mr. Gutzon Borglum to work out and complete the statue. In due course of time the memorial was completed and located at the head of the agricultural mall on the campus of the College of Agriculture of the University of Wisconsin. After paying the sculptor and meeting the necessary expenses incident to raising the fund, there is left a balance of \$4,000.

The members of the committee have voted to present to the University of Wisconsin this money to be set aside as a <u>trust fund</u> to be known as the Hoard Memorial Scholarship fund, the income of which is to be expended in a Hoard Memorial scholarship in dairy production, dairy manufacture, or marketing, at the University of Wisconsin. This scholarship is to be awarded from among applicants holding bachelor's degrees from colleges in this country who have shown unusual proficiency in some phase of dairying. The prime objective of this Hoard Memorial scholarship will be to promote scientific development in dairying.

The funds are now invested as follows: -- \$3,100 in Anchor Savings Building and Loan Association and \$900 in a savings account in the First National Bank of Madison.

It is the wish of the committee that this money be made a part of the University trust funds and be handled in such a manner as to safeguard the scholarship.

In our communication, offering to support Hoard Memorial scholarships out of the balance in the Hoard Memorial fund, we included possibilities for work in dairy production, dairy manufacture, and dairy marketing.

We would like to have it understood that this award would also be open to graduate students wishing to do special work in dairy journalism. The same qualifications would apply in this as in the other phases of study covered by the provisions of the scholarship. If consistent with your rules, please make this addition to your records in order that it may be possible for candidates interested in this field to be considered for the award.

You will recall that the late William Dempster Hoard, for whom the memorial was created, was very much interested in dairy journalism and saw in a well edited press a force of wide influence in dairying.
