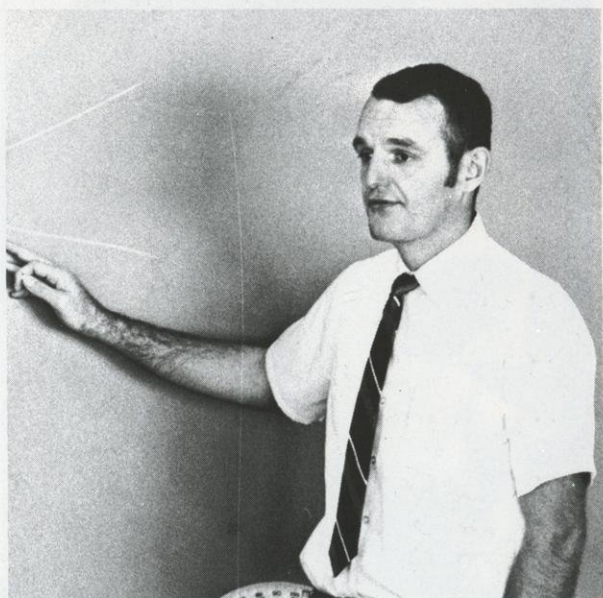
Mathematics — A "Variable" Situation

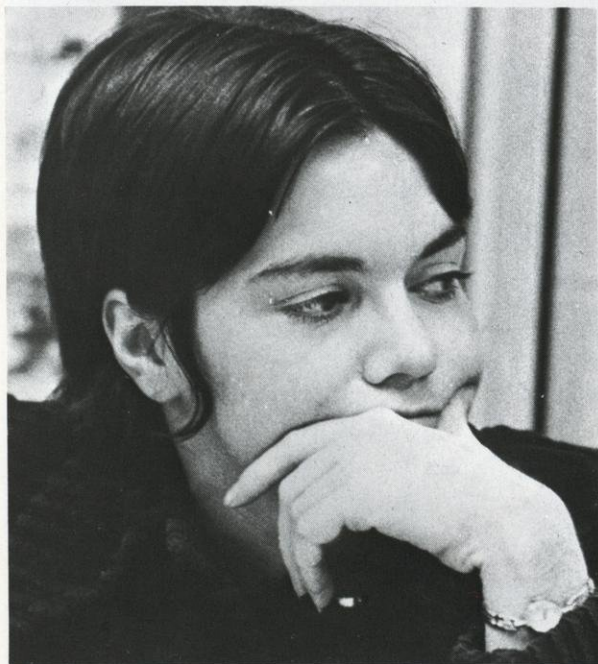
As one grows, one develops new skills or improves on old methods. The business courses offered to students this year have helped develop these skills and methods.

When we were small, we all learned how to write, and since that day have writer's cramp. But with the ability to type and the knowledge of shorthand the pain of writing has been lessened.

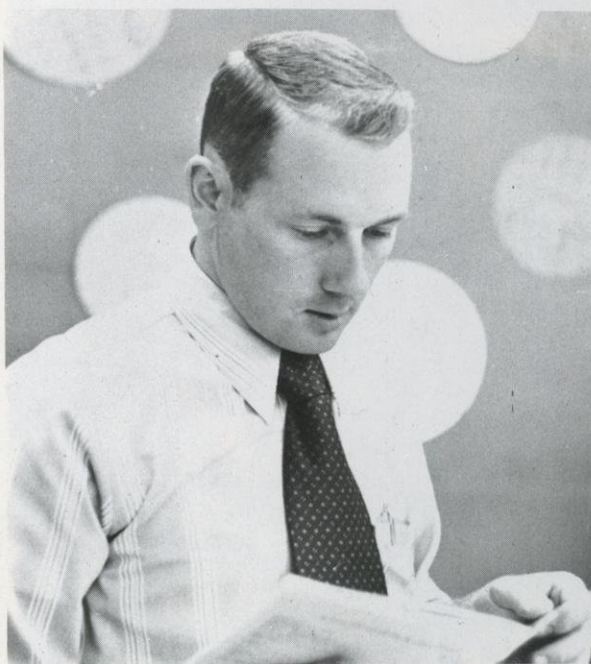
Businesses will be run a little more smoothly now that students have the knowledge of bookkeeping and the ability to use office machines correctly. This was all changing and becoming part of the business world.

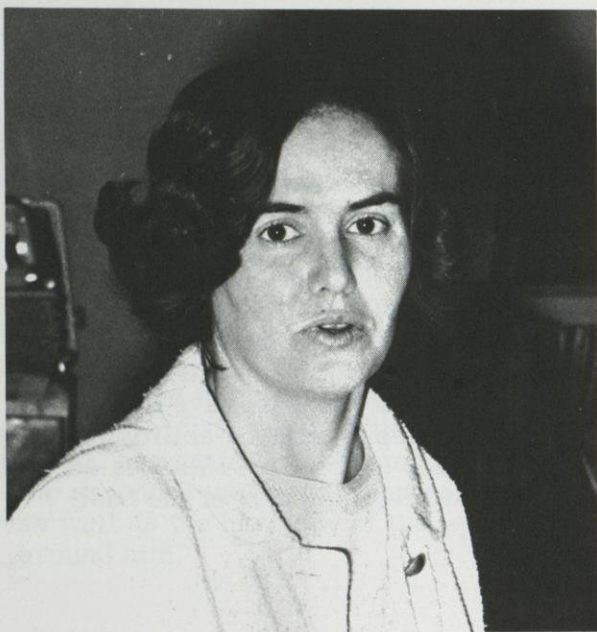

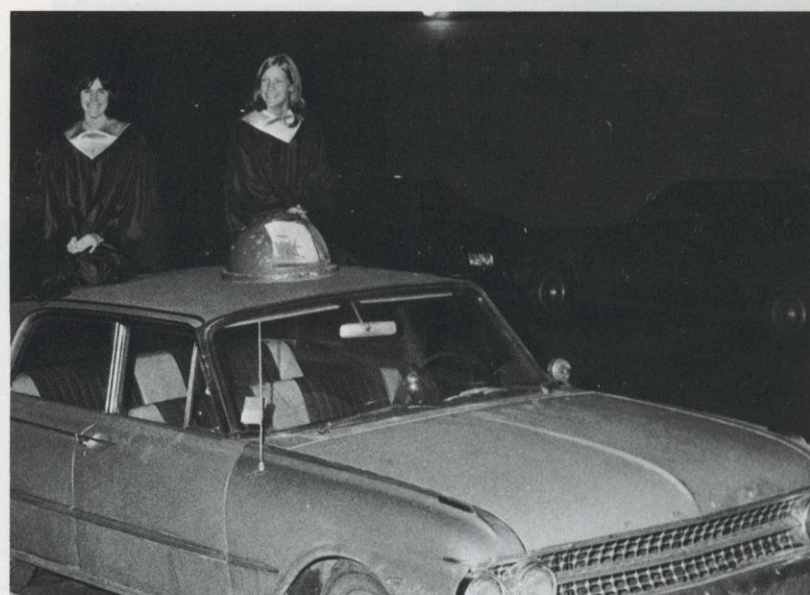
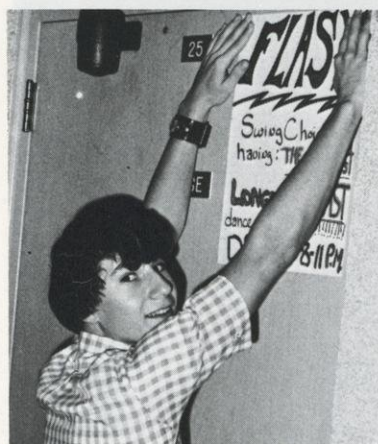
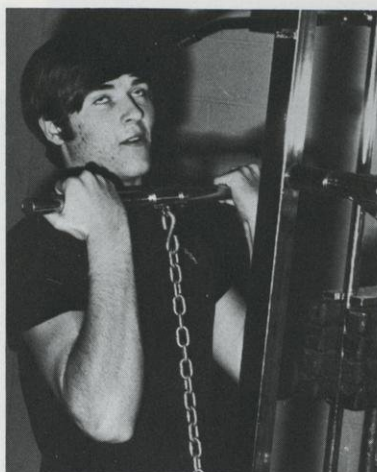
Like it or not, we change from day to day and year to year. We grow up and out, and inside too. We can't always agree with everyone--so we grow in understanding of what we are and can be.

These things we, the Class of '72, leave with you. Never forget us--we are the beginning of a new era--hopefully an era of peace... and justice for all men.

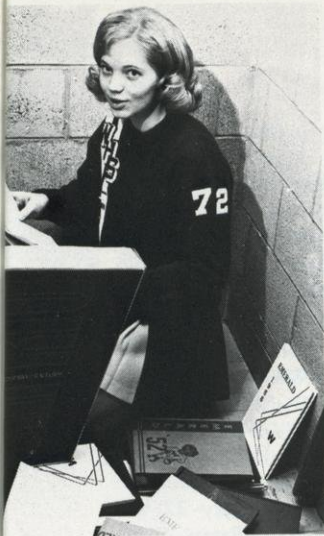
