
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



Mrs. Ira I Thompson was the person most responsible for our Professional Yome Economics Loronity be coming an organization on our campus. A group of seven very close friends were invited to her home at 1325 Randall Court for a luncheon. Her daughter, Louise was one of the seven. The others were then Keator, Sarah Wiemer, Mangaret Fix, Marjorie Chase, Betty Byrns and Elsie Hodgson. This was in the late spring of 1921. The idea of a sorority just grew and with Mrs. Thompson encouragement and guid ance, and with Miss Marlatt's and Sean Mardins approval, we became an enthusiastic group.

Mrs. Thompson wrote our Ritual and Installation of Reficers services and spent countless hours with ms on our plans, problem constitution and by-laws writing; and through the months she was a constant inspiration and guidance in our plansand hopes. I he Thompson home was always open to us; the dining room was the scene of many meeting; and Dr. and Mrs. Thompson haperoned many parties, mostly dancing to records, always held in heir home. Always Mrs. Thompson was lending herself to us with her home. The was a real mother to each of us and to we group. Not only to the ariginal groups, but as our seventy new, Mrs. Thompson was 'our mother'. Each Mother's Day whe received a coreage with a note which she loved. This cantinued until after the fire which destroyed the records and then the later girls did not know so much of her interest in the group.

alpha Chapter of gamma alpha Epsilon was founded in the fall of 1921, The Junior year of the original group of seven. The TAE stook for greek words meaning The Best Type of Woman: The colors were the rainbow colors, each representing a virtue; Honor, accuracy, Fidelity, Hope, Equality, Industry, Love and white the union of all colors was the symbol of Purity. The hearth for the symbol of the home was a final thought in the initiation ceremony.

Our pin was designed by Miss Cowles. The circle represents The home circle, with the letters FAE meaning Best Type of Woman.

an attempt was made to maintain a house but after a few years this was given up entirely. Our first house was at 1715 Kendall are. We rented it from Feb. 1923 through the sum season of that year. The charter members all graduated in July 1923, and one of the seven, marjorie Chase was married to merle Rich that same afternoon at the Chapter house with the other six of when being her brideemaids. This may show the close relationship a this group.

The next year a house was operated at 6 40 M. Francis Sh., with alie Kinslow as House mother.

In 1925 the G. a. E. sorority became affiliated with the national Phi Upsilon Omicron as hu Chapter.

Other houses were uperated at 612 Howard Place 1925-1928; at 18 Mendota Court 1928-1931; and an Lake St. - 1931-1932.





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
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A MESSAGE FROM MISS ZUILL

CONSTITUTION

ARTICLE I Nome

The name of this organization shall be Nu Alumnae Chapter of this Upsilon Omicron.

Anliche if Purpose

The purpose of this organization shall be to establish and strengthen bonds of friendship, to promote the moral and intellectual development of its members, and to advance and promote Home Economics.

AntiCLE III

Former members of an active chapter, and honorary members of the fraternity shall be known as alumnae members. These may become active or associate members of alumnae chapters.

ARTICLE IV

section 1. The elected officers of Na Alumnee Chapter shall be chosen by ballot from a slate of two condidates nominated for each office by a nominating committee and shall serve a term of one year. The nominating committee shall be chosen by the president and the advisory council. The election shall take place in the spring.

section 2. The elected officers shall be:

- a. resident
- b. 1 st. Vice President (program chairman)
- c. 2 nd. Vice President (scheduling meeting places and hostesses)
- d. kecording becretary
- e. Corresponding secretary
- f. Candle Editor (also newsletter editor)

Section 3. The treasurer shall be appointed by a nominating committee composed of members appointed by the president and the advisory council, prior to the chapter elections. 
Early in January, you received a letter from Lucile Reynolds regarding the project, "Recruitment of well-qualified young women for home economics careers."

Only a small proportion of the alumnae to whom we sent the letter have written to say that they would like to cooperate in this project. But even if you have not replied, we assume you would like to assist in this undertaking. Here are the suggestions we promised to send you to help you in conferring with graduating high school seniors and other interested persons. These suggestions were compiled by a small committee of Phi U's in Madison with varying backgrounds in home economics.

A. IF YOU ARE A HOMEMAKER

- 1. Assist your home economics teacher and other members of the teaching staff with the program for "Career Day" or guidance day, provided the school has one. 1 Offer to help the teacher acquaint the girls with the possibilities of a home economics career. The "Career Wheel" and other folders enclosed will give you ideas. Have you observed new fields of interest since you last investigated the scope of the profession?
- 2. Help the home economics teacher locate successful career girls in your own or a near-by community who have majored in home economics, or college majors in home economics who are home for the holidays. Doubtless these young women would be glad to meet with the graduating seniors. See B.1. below.
- 3. Help the home economics teacher plan discussion groups on careers, including both fathers and mothers if possible. Remember, it is the parents who usually wield the strongest influence and it is Father who pays the bills! 2
- 4. Assist the home economics teacher and other members of the staff in enlisting the cooperation of organizations in the community concerned with publicity on careers. (For specific examples, see Item 3 below.)



He said Mr. Kennedy "has been taken from us by an act which outrages decent men everywhere."







MISS HULDA STETTLER Naples, Italy

In October 1952 a notice appeared in Advance calling for "dedicated voluntary workers" to serve in the Italian Service Mission of the Congregational Christian Service Committee in Naples, under the leadership of Teofilo Santi, M.D. The chief requisites were "ability to adjust to austere living and a thoroughgoing capacity for teamwork." Miss Hulda Stettler answered that call, and was appointed. In the nearly three years she has been in Naples (she sailed early in 1953) she has more than lived up to all these requirements and has won high praise for her truly exceptional service.

Miss Stettler was born and educated in Wisconsin. She received her B.S. degree from the University of Wisconsin in 1938, her M.S. from the same university in 1944. In between, she worked for the Farm Security Administration four years. From 1944 to 1950 she was with the Michigan Department of Health, than held a business position from 1950 to 1953.

Earle Ballou, Executive Secretary of the CCSC, after visiting the Service Mission in Naples, wrote this about Hulda Stettler: "The first thing that struck me about her was the remarkable command of Italian she has acquired, and in such a short time. 


