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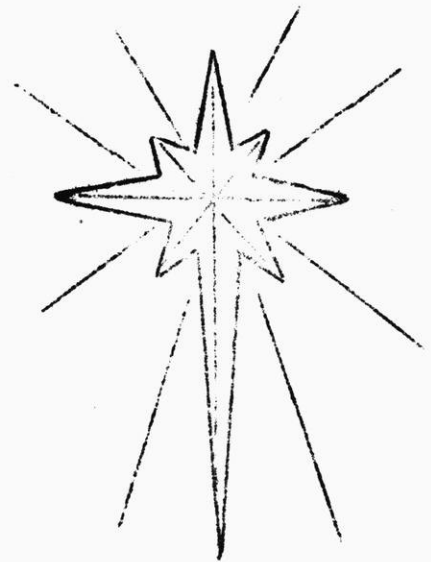
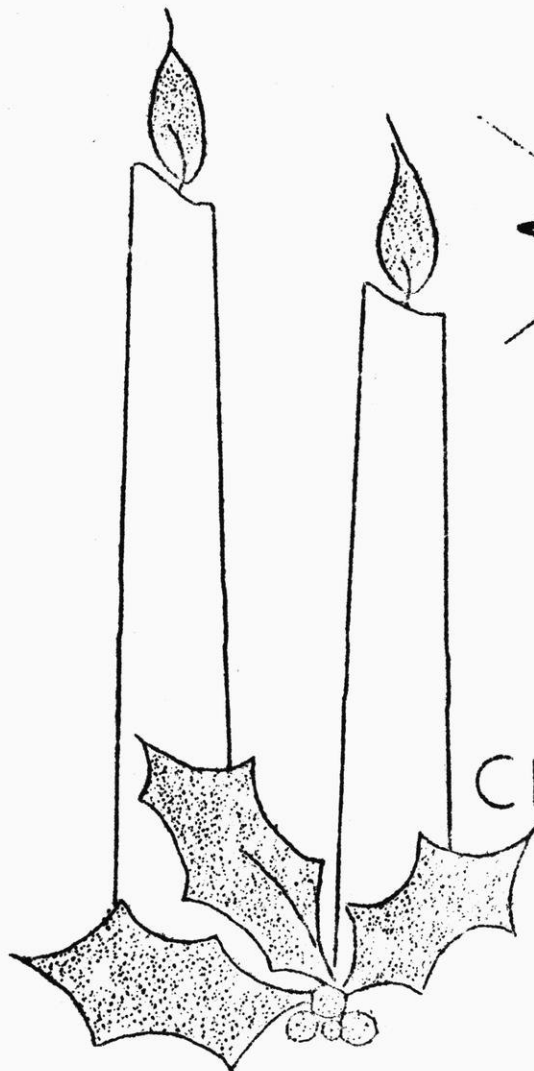
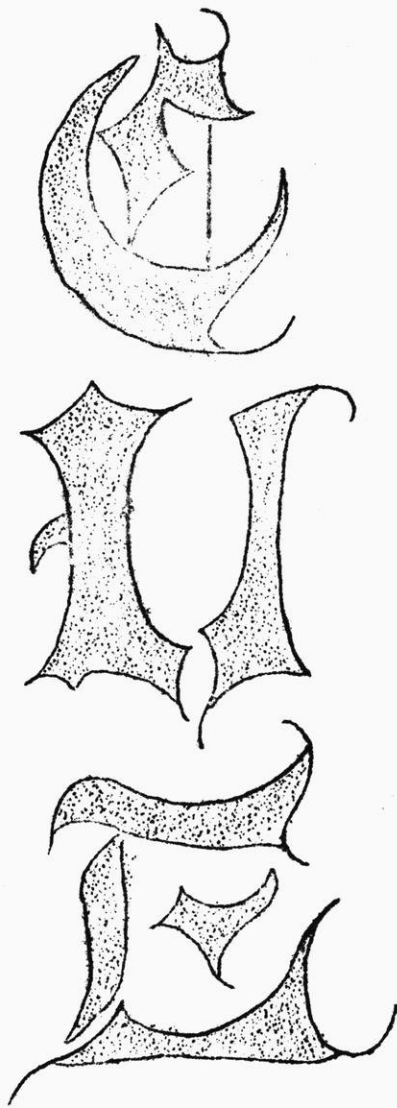

CHRISTMAS MESSAGE

Christmas effects are a vision. It makes us look backward in time, farther than just last week, last month or last year, and makes us look farther ahead in time than just next week, next month or next year. The tragedy of the Christmas season is that it ends. The promise of Christmas is that it regularly recurs. The hope of Christmas is that some day it will continue without an end and without a need to recur. One place to begin that process of continuing would be here; one person to begin with might be each of us.

Editorial

CHRISTMAS IN THE HOSPITAL* ...a contradiction in terms...for what does Christmas mean? The feast has come to symbolize not only the coming of Christ but many extensions of His coming: Warm relationships, and gay spontaneous associations, mutual giving and forgiving. On this we agreed... Christmas is a time of love, both in giving and receiving.

Let us look next at the connotation of HOSPITAL, the second of our terms. Typically, we associate with hospitals the passive role of being sick and taking medicine and shots, following rules to govern the minutiae of daily living conforming to doctors' and nurses' orders looking expectantly toward recovery and a freer mode of behavior.

Do we, in fact, find a contradiction between these two, the spirit of Christmas and the daily living out of hours and days in the hospital setting? So long as human interaction is present, there is the opportunity for everyone, patients and staff, to experience genuine encounters with others and so express his or her love in the manner of Christ.

Why not approach Christmas 1971 with this goal in mind, exerting opportunities for love in the hospital setting? No one can identify these opportunities for... they are all around, but you must find them yourself.

It is in this spirit that the CUE extends good wishes for all in the hospital community. The wishes are two fold: First, that we all share abundantly in the graces of Christmas, and second, that we have the courage to accept the challenge to extend Christmas (the coming of Christ), through Relationships with one another. THAT IS CHRISTMAS IN THE HOSPITAL!

Chaplain's Message

"Do not be afraid. Listen, I bring you news of great joy. A joy to be shared by the whole people. Today...a Savior has been born to you: he is Christ the Lord."

With these words the gospel of Luke announces the cause for celebration every Christmas. And every Christmas most of us celebrate. But do we understand the cause for celebration or do we just use the season for an excuse to party, and to be as kind and considerate to one another as we'd really like to be the rest of the year? If we understand, then why does the "Christmas Spirit" die so quickly? Why has it seemed to dwindle in intensity as time has gone on?

"Do not be afraid!" If we were not afraid -- of ourselves, of each other, of death, even of life itself sometimes -- we could much better appreciate ourselves and the people and the things that God has given us.

"A child is born -- A son is given." God was not afraid to become man. He was not afraid to enter the world as a helpless child, just as we were once. He was not afraid to limit Himself with a frail body, to struggle with human growth and learning, with human frustration and death which comes in so many ways. He wasn't afraid because He looked and "saw that it was good." The Maker trusted what He had made and so became a part of it.

This is "good news of great joy" because if He trusts, if He thinks it is worth while, how much more we? It is "to be shared by the whole people" because God does not discriminate. To Him, life is beautiful in all the colors and conditions. He invites all to share life boldly with him; to take the risks involved in living it, trusting that life, in the end will not betray nor condemn, but really fulfill.

A Savior has been born to you, and He saves you by telling you something that you really have known all along but perhaps didn't recognize: that human life is good when it is LIVED.

The focus of Christmas, of the Gospel, is the good news about human life: That God is "Emmanuel" -- That "God is with us."

WHAT YOU SHOULD KNOW

LIBERTY HOURS

Although it is true that in the winter months liberty ends at 6:00 p.m., liberty can be extended to 8:00 p.m. for canteen use by patients if the patient's doctor approves.

Past experiences have proved it necessary though, to have all liberty patients check in at 6:00 p.m. and then get the special permission for the additional two hours.

Since there seems to be continuing confusion about this hospital procedure, it might be worthwhile that all ward areas have this policy posted for the convenience of their patients.

USE OF HOSPITAL TELEPHONES AND PAY PHONES BY PATIENTS (Effective 11-15-71)

All patients may make phone calls using the pay phones unless there is a written order to the contrary by the physician, program director, or O.D. Those patients not on liberty will be escorted to and from the pay phone booth by hospital personnel.

Even in those very special instances where phone calls are restricted, all calls addressed by a patient to the Governor, Attorney General, Judges of Courts of Record, District Attorneys, the Department, or licensed attorneys shall be permitted without examination.

As a general rule, patients cannot be permitted to make calls using the hospital or ward telephones. However, exceptions to this rule can be made by the attending physician and/or Program Director, or the O.D. Obviously, liberty patients have access to pay phones as they so choose.

Incoming calls for or about patients: Calls in regard to patients' condition are to be referred to the individual patient's physician, program director, or social worker. Calls by relatives should not be permitted to be made directly to the ward units. Questions regarding home visits, release, etc. will be directed through the Nursing Service Center.

NON-CENSORSHIP OF PATIENTS' MAIL (Effective 11/15-71)

Patients' mail is not censored. The only exception to this rule is the highly individualized case where censorship is judged to be absolutely essential for the best welfare of the patient, and this will be the judgment made by the treating physician and/or Program Director.

Even in those very special instances where mail is censored, obviously, in keeping with Statutes, Sec. 51-35, all communications addressed by a patient to the Governor, Attorney General, Judges of Courts of Record, District Attorneys, the Department, or licensed attorneys shall be forwarded at once to the addressee without examination. Communications from such officials and attorneys shall be delivered to the patient. All letters addressed to the Superintendent, Clinical Director, or Assistant Clinical Director will be delivered unopened, if sealed.

There is no censorship of patients' incoming mail.

(The CUE received the above information from the office of Dr. Kelley, Clinical Director.)
