Head Coach Jeff Sauer

In 1982-83, Jeff Sauer accomplished what no other first-year college hockey coach has done before. His University of Wisconsin Badgers captured the NCAA Championship, earned the No. 1 ranking in the final poll, and posted one of the school's best records in history with a 33-10-4 mark.

Sauer, who molded the Badgers into the nation's best hockey team over the course of the winter, did have a few anxious moments along the way however. With Marc Behrend and Terry Kleisinger returning, the Badgers could lay claim to the best goaltending duo in the country. But Behrend went down in the season-opening game at Bowling Green and could not get back up. He underwent knee surgery and was lost indefinitely. Just two weeks later, Kleisinger suffered the same ill fate. And during the course of the winter, captain Bruce Driver, forwards Ted Pearson and Todd Lecy and defenseman Jan-Ake Danielson all experienced injury problems that kept them on the sidelines for key games. There was, to be exact, more than one occasion when it appeared Sauer's first Badger team was destined for a less-than-memorable season.

But the UW did manage to finish third in the WCHA regular season standings with a 15-9-2 record, just one point out of second place. The Badgers then went on to beat Colorado College, North Dakota and Minnesota in two-game, total-goal series to claim the WCHA Playoff Championship and gain the No. 1 seed in the NCAA Tournament. And amazingly enough, Sauer's club did it on the road — and in Grand Forks and Minneapolis yet.

Following the Christmas break, Wisconsin compiled a 23-4-2 record and an .828 winning percentage, including two NCAA Quarterfinal wins over St. Lawrence and, of course, the victories over Providence and Harvard in the semifinals and finals that vaulted the Badgers to their fourth national title since 1973.

This past summer, Sauer served as Head Coach of the South team at the

1983 National Sports Festival in Colorado Springs. He is a member of the 1984 U.S. Olympic Hockey Committee, and in '82-83 was Chairman of the WCHA Coach's Committee and served on the NCAA Ice Hockey Rules Committee. He directs his own hockey school in Madison, works with the Stan Mikita Hockey School for the Hearing-Impaired, and is involved with several nationwide hockey clinics in the summer months.

The 40-year-old Sauer had big shoes to fill when he left a comfortable tenure at Colorado College to take over for Bob Johnson in July of 1982. But after the season of 1982-83, Sauer has proved he was, indeed, the perfect choice. And with 13 seasons in the WCHA now behind him, Jeff is now the "Dean" of league coaches.

Sauer came to Madison from Colorado Springs, where he had served as that school's Head Coach since 1971. He won more than 180 games at CC, and was twice named WCHA "Coach of the Year". His first award came following his rookie season in 1971 and the second following the 1975-76 campaign when Colorado College posted an impressive 23-14-0 record and finished third in the final WCHA standings. Sauer also guided his '80-81 Tigers to third place.

Wisconsin hockey fans will probably never forget the almost legendary "Black Sunday" in March, 1981, when Sauer's CC Tigers came back with a miracle 11-4 upset over the Badgers in the Coliseum to claim the two-game, total-goals playoff victory.

Jeff is a 1965 graduate of Colorado College, where he earned a Bachelor's degree in Sociology. During his undergraduate years in Colorado Springs, he competed in both varsity hockey and baseball.

In 1966, Sauer began his coaching career as an assistant to Bob Johnson at Colorado College, and then went to Madison as his assistant when Johnson took over as Head Coach.

Jeff and his wife, Jamie, have two children — Chip, 8, and Beth, 3.

Grant Standbrook

Assistant Coach - 8th Year

Entering his eighth season as assistant coach at the University of Wisconsin is Grant Standbrook. Originally hired by former coach Bob Johnson, Standbrook was retained by present Head Coach Jeff Sauer at the onset of the 1982-83 season.

Standbrook has played an instrumental part in three Wisconsin NCAA Championships—1977, 1981 and 1983. He has had, in addition to his on-ice duties, responsibility for the Badgers' off-ice conditioning program and has served as the program's chief recruiter.

Prior to his tenure here at the UW, Grant was Bob Johnson's assistant coach for three years with the USA National and Olympic Teams. He is a graduate of the University of Minnesota-Duluth (1961), where he lettered in hockey two years and served as an alternate captain in 1960-61.

Standbrook began his coaching career at Churchill High School in Winnipeg in 1961, and then took over as head coach at Greenway High School in Coleraine, MN where his teams posted a record of 56-21-2 from 1963-66.

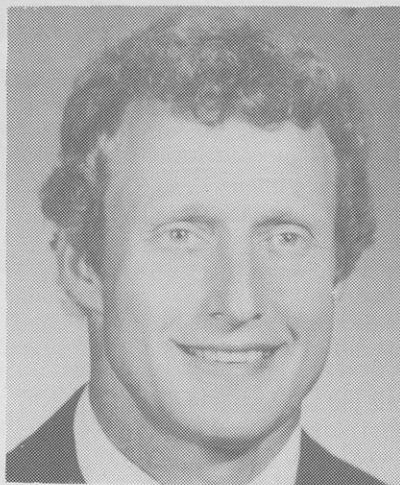
Administrative Assistant

Mike Kemp

Returning to Wisconsin after a year's absence is Mike Kemp, who will serve as administrative assistant to Coach Jeff Sauer. Kemp was an assistant coach at the University of Illinois-Chicago in 1982-83.

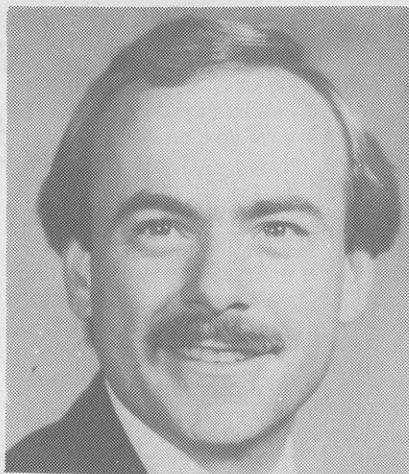
In 1981-82, the 30-year-old Kemp served as administrative assistant under former Badger coach Bob Johnson, but moved on to Illinois-Chicago a year ago. Under Sauer, Kemp will have recruiting as well as a wide range of administrative duties with the Badger program. He will also serve as executive director of the Blue Line Club, of which one of his primary duties will be the publication of the official game program at all home games.

A native of Duluth, MN, Kemp is a 1975 graduate of Gustavus Adolphus, where he majored in public relations and business. After a year of graduate

work at Nebraska-Omaha, he returned to Gustavus Adolphus, where he was the assistant hockey coach as well as the women's golf coach.

Bill Howard

Goaltending Coach

A key to the Badgers' tremendous success at the goaltending position in recent seasons has been Bill Howard, who returns in 1983-84 to once again assist Sauer in this critical area. Howard is credited with helping develop Marc Behrend and Terry Kleinsinger into two of college hockey's outstanding netminders the past three years.

Howard, 38, was a successful high school coach during his ten years at Madison Memorial. His Spartan teams won two state titles and posted an impressive 136-72-1 record.

As a collegiate player, Howard enjoyed a distinguished career at Colorado College, where he performed under former Wisconsin coach Bob Johnson.

In the off-season, Howard is actively



involved in numerous summer hockey camps and seminars, including an intensive goaltending school in St. Louis, MO.

Originally from Grand Forks, ND., Bill and his wife Bonnie have two sons - Troy, 9, and Casey, 8.

Dan Urban

Dan Urban begins his first season as Manager for the University of Wisconsin hockey team. In 1982-83, Urban served as assistant varsity manager, and was manager of the Badgers' junior varsity program in both 1981 and 1982.

A native of Burke, Wisconsin, Dan is majoring in Agricultural Economics at the UW, and will also earn a Certificate of Coaching.



Trainer Jan Tappan

Jan Tappan will serve as trainer for the 1983-84 Badger hockey team. (Dennis Helwig has been granted a leave of absence to serve as the trainer for the 1984 U.S. Olympic Hockey Team.)

Tappan is currently in her sixth season as the head Women's athletic trainer at the University of Wisconsin. She is a NATA (National Athletic Trainers Association) certified trainer and was selected to work with American athletes at the 1980 Winter Olympics in Lake Placid, NY.

In addition to her duties as head of the women's training staff, Tappan has also worked with UW football.



1983-84 BADGER OUTLOOK

'Guarded optimism' could be the watchword of Wisconsin hockey for 1983-84, as the defending NCAA Champions head into their second season under Head Coach Jeff Sauer.

'Guarded' in that Sauer must replace the likes of two-time NCAA tournament "MVP" Marc Behrend, All-American forward Pat Flatley, four-year lettermen Todd Lecy, Pat Ethier and Jeff Andringa, and two of college hockey's truly exceptional defensemen in 1982-83 in Chris Chelios and Bruce Driver. 'Optimism' in that the Badgers return all three forward lines — with the exception of Flatley — that notched the University of Wisconsin its fourth NCAA Championship in the past 11 years and its third consecutive appearance in the NCAA Championship game.

Yes, there is a considerable amount of talent on the campus — including nine players who have made it to the NCAA Championship game two consecutive seasons and six who have played in the national title game three times while at the UW. These were years (1980-83) in which the Badgers posted a sparkling 95-35-6 mark and a winning percentage of .721. There are good athletes at every position; the question is whether there are enough of them from the blueline back. Solid defense has come to be a trademark of past Wisconsin champions.

In senior Terry Kleisinger, Sauer has one of the premier goaltenders in college hockey. And in junior Paul Houck and senior John Johannson, he has two of his top three scorers returning for "encore '84".

Kleisinger has a 36-19-1 record in his three seasons with the Badgers. The past two years, he has posted goals — against averages of 2.65 (1,337 minutes) and 2.82 (1,021 minutes), earning him recognition as one of the top goaltenders in the country. He is already the Wisconsin career leader in shutouts with nine, and is third all-time in save percentage with a mark of .903.

Houck led the UW in almost every offensive category a year ago, including goals (38) and points (71). He also topped Wisconsin in winning goals with eight, power-play tallies with 14, and short-handed scores with five. He was a second-team All-WCHA selection. Johannson, meanwhile, enjoyed his finest year as a Badger, finishing third in team scoring with 22 goals, 41 assists, and 63 points. He also owned nine power-play goals, four short-handed efforts, and three winning goals.

If the Badgers have one position where they might be considered "strongest," it would have to be the center spot. In addition to John Johannson, Sauer returns '82-83 regulars Paul Houston (21-27-48) and Scott Sabo (10-22-32). Both Houston and Sabo more than doubled their offensive totals from the previous year in 1982-83, and both are seasoned veterans in the tough WCHA.

Also back at forward are sophomores Dave Maley, Jim Johannson, Marty Wiitala, Ernie Vargas and Steve Tschipper — all varsity letterwinners as freshman. Maley is expected to pick up where the departed Pat Flatley left off — as one of the best cornermen in the business. He has the size (6-2,



200) and the first-year stats (17-23-40) to back that up. Jim Johansson (12-9-21), Witala (10-8-1) and Vargas will be key players for Sauer this winter, while Tschipper, Tim Sager, Tom Ryan, Mark Edwards, Todd Delveaux and Jeff Nate all figure to battle for regular spots. Returning after a year's absence due to injury is senior Lexi Doner, a talented skater who should add additional strength up front.

Newcomers at forward include Downers Grove, Illinois freshman Tony Granato, whom Sauer feels will step in and help his club right away. Others to watch for are Paul Graveline, Crister Oliviken and Tony Scheid.

On defense, Sauer will have to rely on lettermen Jan-Ake Danielson, Matt Walsh and Eric Faust to provide the nucleus, while several others hope to land a spot in the lineup on the blueline. This group includes Rick Heppner and Jeff White, along with newcomers Gary Suter, Mike McGrath and

Dennis Will. Heppner and White have substantial experience with the Badgers' junior varsity program. Danielson came on in '82-'83 to become one of Sauer's top defensemen by playoff time, and his combination of solid fundamentals and experience and his lack of mistakes could make him a player to watch this Winter. Walsh was one of the biggest surprises a year ago, coming to Wisconsin as a walk-on in September and eventually playing in all but two games. He is a standout hip-checker, a stay-at-home defenseman who keeps the opposition honest. Faust gained valuable experience as a freshman and after a strong summer is expected to earn a regular spot. He is a rugged performer, and along with Walsh, Faust gives Sauer two very physical individuals at defense. Suter, the brother of former Badger great Bob Suter, is a talented player whom Sauer thinks can make an impact on his team in '83-'84.

Great Moments in UW Hockey

March, 1962—Wisconsin Athletic Director Ivan Williamson announced the return of hockey as an intercollegiate sport after a 28 year absence.

December 6, 1963—A rebound goal by Chan Young 5:10 into the sudden death period gives Wisconsin its first modern collegiate win, a 3-2 win over Macalester.

February 22, 1964—Wisconsin concluded its first season of hockey in the modern era with an 8-5-3 record.

December 11, 1964—In an effort to upgrade their program, the Badgers scheduled eight games against WCHA teams. In the first game, Michigan State scored a 9-2 win. The Badgers lost all eight of those games.

February 22, 1966—After 13 straight losses to WCHA teams, the Badgers finally post a victory, a 5-4 overtime win over Minnesota. Jim Petruzates scored on a break just two minutes into the overtime period.

April 1, 1966—Following the retirement of John Riley, Bob Johnson was named head coach of the Badger hockey program.

March, 1968—Wisconsin hockey hit the national spotlight as Bert DeHate, a sophomore center from St. Paul, MN, wins the national scoring title with 77 points on 47 goals and 30 assists. DeHate hits for seven hat-tricks, a Badger record, as the team goes 21-10.

March 30, 1969—After another successful season, including an 11-9-2 mark against WCHA teams, the Badgers were admitted to the league.

March, 1970—Wisconsin places fourth in the WCHA and qualifies for the national tournament, where they post a third place finish. Defenseman John Jagger of Sault Ste. Marie, Ontario becomes the first Badger player to win all-American honors.

March, 1972—The Badgers make their second NCAA appearance in three years, but again they come away with a third place finish.

March 16, 1973—Wisconsin stuns Cornell 6-5 in overtime to advance to the NCAA finals. A goal with five seconds left in regulation time by sophomore Dean Talafous ties the game. Talafous tallies the game-winner with 33 seconds left in overtime.

March 17, 1973—With a 4-2 win over WCHA rival Denver, Wisconsin wins the NCAA championship for the first time in the school's history.

March 25, 1977—After missing the NCAA playoffs for three years, the Badgers make it to the final four again. Les Grauer scored the tying goal against New Hampshire and Mike Eaves won it in overtime 4-3, as the Badgers advanced to the finals.

March 26, 1977—Senior Steve Alley culminated the Badgers' finest season with a goal 23 seconds into overtime to give Wisconsin a 6-5 win over Michigan for their second NCAA title. Wisconsin finished the season at 37-7-1 and was the first team to capture the Big Ten, WCHA and NCAA titles in the same season. Three players were named to the all-American squad, Johnson was named Coach of the Year and his son Mark was named Freshman of the Year.

March 25, 1978—Wisconsin fans took Providence by storm for the NCAA tournament although the team finished fourth, Badger fans were proclaimed the "World's Greatest Hockey Fans". Mike Eaves finished his career as the school's all-time scoring leader, while he and Mark Johnson were all-Americans.

March, 1979—Record crowds saw the Badgers (25-13-3) play as 21 of the 23 home games were sell-outs and the average crowd of 8,654 was just eight short of a sell-out. Mark Johnson closed out his Badger career as the top goal scorer in Wisconsin history. He was named to the all-American squad again and was the college "Player of the Year".

March 27, 1981—Wisconsin returned to the NCAA final four after defeating the best team in the East, Clarkson, 9-8 in a total goal series at Potsdam, NY. After a 5-1 win over Northern Michigan, the Badgers advanced to the finals again.

March 28, 1981—The Badgers regained the NCAA crown with a 6-3 win over Minnesota. The "back door" Badgers proved they were the champions after defeating the #1 teams in the ECAC (Clarkson), CCHA (Northern Michigan) and WCHA (Minnesota). The season also marked the end of the ten-team WCHA, as the three Michigan schools and Notre Dame dropped out to join the CCHA.

March 27, 1982—Badgers finish 2nd in NCAA Tournament, and compile the second best record in Wisconsin Hockey history at 35-11-1. Center John Newberry and Defenseman Bruce Driver receive All-American status.

June 1, 1982—Bob Johnson resigns after fifteen years at Wisconsin. Johnson had guided the Badgers to 3 NCAA Championships and the best attendance of any college hockey program in the country.

July 8, 1982—Jeff Sauer, Head Coach at Colorado College and former assistant to Bob Johnson at Wisconsin, is named as the second full-time coach of the Badgers.

March 5, 1983—Sophomores Chris Chelios and Paul Houck score the tying and winning goals as the Badgers beat North Dakota 6-5 in triple overtime to advance to the WCHA Playoff Championships in Minneapolis.

March 24-26, 1983—After sweeping Minnesota in Williams Arena to gain the WCHA Playoff Championship and the No. 1 seed in the West, first-year Coach Jeff Sauer's team swept St. Lawrence 6-2, 7-1 in the NCAA Quarterfinals in Madison to move to the final four for the third straight year. In Grand Forks, ND, the Badgers claimed their fourth NCAA Championship since 1973 with a 2-0 win over Providence in the semi-finals and a 6-2 victory over Harvard in the finals. Senior goaltender Marc Behrend was named the Tournament MVP for the second time in his career.

The Dane County Memorial Coliseum, one of college hockey's finest arenas, serves as the home of the University of Wisconsin hockey team. With a seating capacity of 8,732, the Coliseum is the second largest college hockey arena in the nation. The ice surface is regulation 85 × 200 feet.

THE NATION'S BEST FANS

The University of Wisconsin hockey program has attracted record crowds to the Coliseum ever since the Badgers joined the Western Collegiate Hockey Association in the 1969-70 season. The UW has set American college hockey attendance records for 14 consecutive seasons, dating back to 1970. In 1981-82, the Badgers drew 240,095 fans for 28 home games to set an all-time NCAA record. The 1978-79 average attendance of 8,654 is both an NCAA and University of Wisconsin record.
