- Gifts and Grants -

1. That the following gifts and grants be accepted; and that the Vice President of Business and Finance be authorized to sign the agreements:

GIFTS

(a) \$ 1,100.00 - Mrs. Anne W. Stimple, Blacksburg, Virginia, for the establishment of a scholarship to be known as the David Stimple Memorial Scholarship. The principal of this fund is to be placed in trust and the income used to provide a scholarship each year that the total accumulated income equals or exceeds \$50. The committee on scholarships and fellowships of the Graduate School is to award the scholarship to a graduate student who

(a) is majoring in American History, or, should there be no such applicant, in Modern European History; who has broad interests including philosophy and religion, and is a firm exponent of the ideas expressed in the "sifting and winnowing" plaque on Bascom Hall; who is a capable scholar, without regard to high grade point average, and who has need of financial help; except as provided in paragraph (b), preference is to be given to a male student who is married; second preference is to be given to an unmarried male student; and third preference is to be given to any graduate student who otherwise qualifies.

(b) If any of the children of David and Anne W. Stimple attend the University of Wisconsin, they are to be placed at the top of the list of applicants if they are doing graduate work in the indicated fields and are found to be otherwise qualified.

The donor reserves the right to change the terms of the award during her lifetime and to provide additional funds to be added for the scholarship. (Trust Fund)

- (b) \$ 300.00 - Oscar Mayer & Company, Madison, Wisconsin, for the renewal of the scholarship program in the Farm Short Course. Four "Oscar Mayer & Company Farm Short Course Scholarships" of \$75 each are to be awarded to farm boys from southern Wisconsin during the period November 10, 1951 to March 15, 1952. (Fund 15-160)
- (c) A gift of a projection screen, including installation, for use in one of the classrooms in Babcock Hall by the Food Technology Club composed of students majoring in the Department of Dairy and Food Industries in the College of Agriculture. *Ray 204*
- (d) 200.00 - Consolidated Badger Cooperative, Shawano, Wisconsin, for the renewal of the "Consolidated Badger Cooperative Scholarship" during the 1951-52 academic year. This scholarship is to be under the jurisdiction of the College of Agriculture and is to be awarded to the outstanding junior majoring in the Department of Dairy Industry. The Dean of the College of Agriculture and the Department of Dairy Industry will select the recipient of the scholarship. (Fund 15-119).
- (e) 600.00 - The Sears-Roebuck Foundation, Chicago, Illinois, for the establishment, during the 1951-52 academic year, of three scholarships of \$200 each to be available for three Wisconsin farm girls enrolling in home economics. The scholarships are to be known as "The Sears-Roebuck Foundation Scholarships in Home Economics". (Fund 15-481).
- (f) 3,575.00 - Sears-Roebuck Agricultural Foundation, Chicago, Illinois, for the renewal during 1951-52 of the Sears-Roebuck Agricultural Foundation Scholarships consisting of twenty scholarships of \$150 each to freshmen in the four-year or two-year course in agriculture, five scholarships of \$75 each to first-year students enrolled in the Farm Short Course, and one sophomore scholarship of \$200. (Fund 15-180).
- (g) 400.00 - University of Wisconsin Foundation, a gift from the Wisconsin Cannery and Allied Industries for the purpose of furnishing extra or special equipment for the Food Industries Laboratories in Babcock Hall. (Fund 15-540).
- (h) 500.00 - National Academy of Sciences Committee on the Joseph Henry Fund, Washington, D.C., for research on the development of vision in the Cisco (Whitefish) in the Department of Zoology. (Fund 15-82).

- (i) University of Wisconsin Foundation, a gift from Mr. and Mrs. John S. Sensenbrenner of 100 shares of Kimberly-Clark Corporation common stock for cancer research in the Medical School. (Cash value as of August 17, 1951 — \$4,893.75) The donors have expressed the desire that this gift be held in the Regents' investment folio with the dividends to be made available for the designated purpose. However, the retention of the stock is not a binding condition and the Regents may convert the gift to cash or other securities.
- (j) 150.00 - A contribution to be added to the Anonymous Scholarship Fund of the School of Commerce. (Fund 15-791).
- (k) 3,272.72 - The Rockefeller Foundation, New York City, for the purpose of providing funds to employ a playwright for the Wisconsin Idea Theatre during the period October 1, 1951 through November 30, 1952. \$3,000 is allotted for salary and \$272.72 for travel. Any unexpended balance as of the termination date will revert to the Foundation. (Fund 15-776).
- (l) 3,000.00 - The Fund for the Advancement of Education, New York City, for the establishment of two graduate fellowships during the 1951-52 academic year. The fellowships are to be awarded to potential teachers who are "able graduate students in the humanities and social sciences who are in sight of their doctor's degrees". (Fund 15-85).
- (m) 3,600.00 - Parke, Davis and Company, Detroit, Michigan, for the establishment of a graduate fellowship in the School of Pharmacy during the period September 1, 1951 through August 31, 1952. The person selected under this fellowship is to be known as a "Parke, Davis & Company Fellow in Pharmacy." He will receive the sum of \$1,320.00 in twelve equal installments of \$110.00 each. The balance remaining after the payment of the scholarship may be used for the purchase of such equipment as is necessary for the study of fundamental research problems in the School of Pharmacy. (Fund 15-71).
- (n) 2,500.00 - University of Wisconsin Foundation, for the A. J. Horlick Fellowship in the History of Pharmacy during the period September 1, 1951 through August 31, 1952, in the School of Pharmacy. This represents the fourth allotment from a gift of \$25,000 by the late A. J. Horlick, Racine, Wisconsin. (Fund 15-868).

- (v) 200.00 - Dr. Donald R. Kindschi, Palo Alto, California, to be used by the Department of the History of Medicine in the Medical School for books, equipment and miscellaneous needs of the department. (Fund 15-90)
- (w) 1,500.00 - John Morse Memorial Foundation, Chicago, Illinois, to be added to the John Morse Memorial Foundation Scholarship Fund in Engineering. Scholarships of \$500 each are to be awarded to three Junior engineering students for the 1951-52 academic year. (Fund 15-626).

President Fred presented the following report on the present status of  
the study being made of the teaching of American History:

At the October 6, 1951, meeting of the Board of Regents, Regent  
Gelatt presented a statement reporting the background and pres-  
ent status of the study being made of the teaching of American  
History and American Institutions at the University. This state-  
ment was made a matter of record and included in the minutes of  
that meeting.

Committees in the various schools and colleges have been at work  
on this subject. Reports have been made by the committees in  
several of the colleges. The committee in the College of Letters  
and Science has made a report to the College of Letters and Science  
faculty and that faculty has referred the question back to the com-  
mittee with the request to hold an open hearing, to confer further  
with the American History section of the History Department, and to  
bring the report back to the faculty of the College of Letters and  
Science. As soon as final action is taken on this subject by the  
College of Letters and Science faculty and the reports of the other  
college faculties are all in, the reports will be taken to the  
general faculty for action and recommendation to the Regents.

Therefore, Be It Resolved, That The Regents of the University of Wisconsin inform the Mayor and the Common Council of the City of Madison and the Chairman of the State Highway Commission that the University desires to cooperate with the City and the State in the study and development of plans for relieving the traffic congestion on University Avenue, and that the Campus Planning Commission and the administrative officers of the University be and they hereby are directed to offer their services to the City of Madison and the State Highway Commission in any way that they may be of assistance in the aforementioned study.

Be It Resolved Further, That this resolution be incorporated in the minutes of this meeting and that the Secretary be directed to transmit copies to the Mayor of the City of Madison, the President of the Common Council, and to the Chairman of the State Highway Commission.
