On the eve of our departure from Hawaii, we were told by Lt. Lowrey that each of us had to his credit at least fifty **tollars.** This amount included money seized at the time of arrest and that received by Lt. Lowrey subsequently in our name. We were assured that this money was to accompany us to our destination. Also, on the same transport that conveyed us to San Francisco, our baggages containing our warm clothing were stored in the ship's hold. This fact was told us by Capt. Benson who excorted us to Fort McDowell at Angel Island.

Almost three weeks have elapsed since our arrival at Camp McCoy. Our 60-ordinator assures us that your honor is doing his best to track down the whereabouts of the undelivered baggage and funds. Each of us realized the situation. Yet, having been acclimated to a milder climate for decades, this cold is penetrating to us, and although mild there are numerous cases of upper respiratory infection on account of inadequate protection. The lack of spending money is inconveniencing us most severely. We cannot even have our daily cigarettes to say nothing of necessary toilet articles and stamps to communicate with our families.

Such being the circumstances, we representing the Japanese Internees from Hawaii, hereby submit our names petitioning to your honor that you will redouble your efforts and hope you will turn out fruitful in the quest of our baggages and money.

#### MEMORANDUM

The Legation of Switzerland in charge of German interests begs to refer to a visit made by a representative of the Legation of Switzerland to the Alien Enemy Internment Camp, Camp Forrest, Tennessee, on October 5, 1942.

During this trip, the Legation's representative was approached by the following internees who were previously held at Camp McCoy, Wisconsin, and transferred on July 27, 1942, to Camp Forrest:

Kurt J. PieperStiller, BrunoSchomburg, Karl H.Wieland, GustavWimmer, JacobSass, Heinrich Fr.Vogelsang, Wwald H.Schmalstieg, Rudolf K.Boege, Theo. L.Weiler, Rudolf K.

It appears that these men were asked to perform labor outside and within the enclosure of Camp McCoy, such as painting the officers' quarters, improving roads, constructing a workshop, and other work of various kinds. At the same time they understood that they would be compensated at the rate of \$21.00 per month. However, when leaving Camp McCoy, non of these men received any remuneration for their work. They addressed a letter to that effect to Lieutenant Colonel H. Rogers at Camp McCoy on August 13, 1942, but received no reply.

The Legation would appreciate it if the Department of State would look into this matter with a view to having the compensation due the aforementioned internees transferred to their present place of con-



#### memorandum

The Legation of Switzerland in charge of German interests begs to refer to a report made by one of its representatives upon his visit of the Alien Internment Camp in Stringtown, Oklahoma on September 21st and 22nd.

It appears that a canteen fund surplus of approximately \$ 700.-- existed at the time at the Alien Internment Camp McCoy, Wisc. and is still being held there in spite of the fact that the whole group which was formerly at said camp has been transferred in the meantime to Camp Stringtown.

The Legation is informed that this money has and will be used for purchases of books, musical instruments and other articles for entertainment.

Inasmuch as this surplus has arisen through profits made on purchases effected by internees, the Legation would appreciate it if the Department of State would take such steps as to have the balance of the aforementioned account transferred to Camp Stringtown, Oklahoma.

> The Legation of Switzerland in charge of German interests begs to refer to a memorandum from the Depart-ment of State dated November 17 with regard to the surplus of the centeen fund which is believed to have existed of corman nationals was transferred to the Stringtown Internment Camp.

The contents of the communication mentioned above have been transmitted to Mr. Seorge C. Mind, who was in charge of the conteen at Camp McCoy; and it is now stated that to the best of his knowledge the books showed as of June 15, 1942, a net profit of approximately 3400.00 and fully paid stock worth approximately 300.00.

To sustein this statement, the Legation now wishes to submit original operating statements such as were drawn up monthly by the exchange accountant, from which statements it becomes evident that between March 22 and may 24 a net profit of 501.52 was realized. Sis state-ment as of June 15 is not available, but it is believed that the camp authorities of Camp McCoy certainly have in their files the originals of the monthly reports turned in to them.

the Legation is now submitting this evidence in order that the entire question may be taken up once more, particularly since the internoes at tringtown insist that they should rightfully regain possession of the profit and proceeds of the stock which resulted from their canceed activity and cattroly from transpositions used with their own money.

1. It is desired to take a record of conversations receitly held by this office with Licutemant Colonel Bryan and others who are on duty connected with energy cliens.

2. As it is the right of every Commandia : Officer to create on Exchange for the benefit of his personnel, the Communing Officer of an elien carp may establish an Exchant for the Service of Filitary personnel. Under the Prisoner of Mer Regulations, tores must be operated for the service of prisoners of wer and the mofile there from are to be spent for the betterment of such prisphers of ver. It is uncerstood that there is a mutual agreement between the Secretories of Mar one of State that energy aliens are to be treated th the same category as prisoners of war. Hence, it will be the outy of the Commencing Officer of an encay alien camp to operate stores for the service of such aliens. The Army Exchange Service sugged is that the local Commanding Officer set unlist Exchange organization is such a very toot there be a central office and some warehousing facilities, that one broach or his operations be that of runnia. Exchanges for Hilitary serional and that mother branch of his operations be that of running stores for the aliens. It is suggested that the overhead incident to running the Headquarters Office and the warehousin facilities be equitably provated between the Ercian es and the stores. The booldecoing overstions in the Hendeur sters Office will necessitate separate commutations as to the nat profits of the Exchanges as distinguished from the net rofits of the stores. This matter of keeping two records is not difficult. In this way, the profits from the stores may thus be momenty applied to the velfare of the dilung. Dear Sirs:

The Provost Marshal General has directed me to reply further to your communication dated February 19, 1943, SD 740.00115 European War 1939/5567 concerning canteen fund surplus at Camp McCoy Internment Camp, Camp McCoy, Wisconsin.

According to information furnished by the Commanding Officer, Camp McCoy Internment Camp, there was a total cash profit on hand as of June 30, 1942, amounting to \$253.07 which had accumulated between March 22 and June 30, 1942. During this period the exchange had been patronized by two Military Police Escort Guard Companies and Japanese and Italian internees in addition to the German prisoners of war. Based upon average strength, the German prisoners of war were entitled to 21.76% of the \$253.07, or \$55.07.

In lieu of distribution of profits, it was agreed that a dinner should be sponsored, the cost of which, together with other community expenditures, amounted to \$40.54. The difference of \$14.53 was not distributed because, if divided by the average for the German group for the period, each individual would have received less than fifteen cents. Consequently, it was reserved for community benefits.

Apparent profits, other than cash on hand, consisting of stock is not distributable because Army Regulations authorize distribution of profits only from cash available. Hen the exchange was opened, the stock was purchased on credit established with local merchants. upon the personal guarantee of Lt. Colonel Fred L. 0 38

profits has not relieved the contigent liability, and the stock cannot be considered as profit available for distribution.

The Commanding Officer, Camp McCoy Internment Camp, has stated further that the operating statements which were attached to the memorandum of the Legation of Switzerland dated December 19, 1942, are not official records of the exchange, but are statements prepared by and for an unauthorized council composed entirely of internees without representation of the United States Army. These statements fail to take into consideration either an equitable distribution of profits among all personnel using the exchange or the cash available for distribution.

Inclosed are copies of exhibit "A", Analysis of Distribution of Funds, based on total cash assets as of June 30, 1942, and exhibit "B", statement of expenditures of the major part of the cash profit of the German internees.

TO: The Commanding General, Sixth Service Command, Civic Opera Building, 20 North Wacker Drive, Chicago, Illinois.

FOR THE ATTENTION OF: The Commanding Officer, Camp McCoy Internment Camp, Sparta, Wisconsin.

1. Prior to a transfer of interned civilian enemy aliens to the Department of Justice, it is requested that the commanding officer provide for an adjustment with the transferees of any canteen dividends which have accrued to their benefit.

2. The method of adjusting the accrued canteen dividend to benefit the civilian internees responsible for the accumulation is within the discretion of the internment camp commander. The following methods are suggested:

<u>a</u>. Declaring a cash dividend as of the date of transfer for the group as a unit and transferring the cash available for distribution to the canteen at the Immigration and Naturalization Service Alien Internment Camp to which the group is being transferred.

<u>b</u>. Distribute accrued dividends in the form of merchandise on an individual basis.

c. Sponsor a dinner or some other entertainment or group activity enabling the group of transferees as a whole to benefit from their accumulated dividends.

3. For purposes of future references, it is further requested, that an itemized record be kept of any adjustments made.



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

1. Reference is made to the five internee letters named in the basic communication. One of these letters by Anton Zimmerman, ISN-10-12-G-107-CI, Spokesman, makes complaint to the Legation of Switzerland regarding outgoing mail, claiming that it takes approximately three weeks to arrive at destination.

2. Examination of the five letters shows that one of them was dated January 8; 3 of them February 3, and the other letter, February 8, whereas letter of transmittal was dated February 10, 1943. None of these letters had internment serial number of writer on the letterhead or on the outside of the envelope.

3. Letter dated December 9, 1942 SPMGA (10) 311.7, Subject: "Internee Mail", paragraph I provides: "No item of incoming or outgoing mail should be held by the internment camp commander for more than 24 hours. The date of dispatch or arrival at camp will be stamped on the outside of each item of mail. Outgoing mail which bears a date at variance of more than forty eight hours from the time of such stamping will be returned by the camp commander to the writer for correction." Likewise, letter dated September 17, 1942 SPMGA (10) 311.7, Subject: "Internee Mail", paragraph IV provides: "All internees should write their letters on internee stationery W.D. PMG Form No. 4." These five letters indicate that either they were held before forwarding or that they were improperly dated.

Dear General Bryan:

Receipt is acknowledged of your letter of March 18th stating that a spokesman for the German Internees at Camp McCoy, Wisconsin has complained that outgoing mail from the internees frequently is in transit as much as three weeks before delivery to the addressees.

In reply, you are advised that there has not been any delay in the censorship of Prisoner of War mail in the New York Station for more than two months. Whatever delay has occurred, therefore, is not due to a lack of prompt handling by Censorship.


We know of no good reason why the Postal authorities have refused free postage privileges to packages addressed to internees at Camp McCoy, after such packages had been identified as Prisoner of War or Internee mail.

A more comprehensive investigation can be made, if the complaining internees would cite one or more instances where free privileges were denied, giving the names and addresses of the senders as well as the names of the internees at Camp McCoy.

Upon receipt of further advices, it will give us pleasure to request the Postal authorities to investigate the complaint.

This office has requested information of the Commanding Officer of the Camp McCoy Internment Camp and the Office of Censorship. The Commanding Officer has replied that Internee Zimmerman, who originated these complaints with the Swiss Legetion, was interviewed concerning this matter, and stated that his letter to the Legation of Switzerland was written some time ago and that at the present time the conditions complained of do not exist. The Commanding Officer reports that no internee mail is held at the camp over twenty-four hours.

The Office of Censorship has replied that prior conditions in delay of the censorship of internee mail have been alleviated, that all internee mail is now censored and forwarded promptly, and that no reason appears why postal authorities should refuse free postage privileges to small packages addressed to internees after the packages hay identified as internee mail.
