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ANNUAL MEETING OF THE BOARD OF REGENTS

Madison, Wisconsin

Saturday, June 20, 1931, 9:45 A.M.

President Faast presiding

PRESENT: President Frank; Regents Berger, Callahan, Clausen, Drexler, Eimon, Faast, Gundersen, Mead, Richardson, Runge, Schmidtmann, Sholts, Waters, Wilkie.

ABSENT: Regents Backus, Ullsperger.

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Upon motion of Regent Callahan, seconded by Regent Berger, it was VOTED, That the minutes of the meeting of the board held on April 22 be approved as sent out to the regents.

Regent Wilkie stated that a personality matter was to be considered, whereupon the board went into executive session. At 10:15 A.M. the board resumed the regular session.

Regent Clausen as chairman of the finance committee presentthe budget for 1931-32, totaling \$8,439,277, and stated that this at was \$275,328 less than the budget for 1930-31; that the finance tee of the regents, assisted at times by other regents, had our days and one evening on the budget and had made net reducom the budget as submitted to them of \$8,375. This list of ts was read to the regents.

Regent Clausen stated that at the meeting of the committee tole held on June 19, 1931, the following further amendments

at \$5,000 be restored in the budget for the operation of on.

That the compensation of Professor Voss for the emeritus teaching appointment in the Department of German for 1931-32 be placed at \$2,500.

That the compensation of Professor Julius E. Olson for the emeritus appointment for advisor to the Scandinavian Department and administration of Student Loans be placed at \$2,500.

That the \$2,000 cut in the budget of the Department of Agricultural Journalism devoted to Radio be restored in view of the restoration of Radio in the budget and that Kenneth M. Gapen be appointed assistant in Agricultural Journalism at a salary of \$2,000.

✓ That the matter of the expense of operating the Alumni Records office be held open awaiting action of the Alumni Board and that the expense of carrying the office for the present be provided from Regents Unassigned.

V Regent Clausen stated that after making all the corrections the amount in LA Regents Unassigned is \$63,161, including \$5,800 for Agricultural Economics, and moved that the <u>budget for 1931-32</u>, as amended, be adopted by the board. The motion was seconded by Regent Mead. Called vote was taken, all regents present voting and voting "Aye".

President Frank reported that an additional sum of \$7,500 would be received for the geological survey for the lake work of Emeritus Professor Birge and Professor Juday, and that further negotiations for funds to support the work of the Natural History and Geological Survey were pending.

Upon motion of Regent Schmidtmann, seconded by Regent Richardson, it was

VOTED, That the President and Business Manager be authorized to complete the 1931-32 budget and incorporate the financial support for the Natural History and Geological Survey, as finally determined, in the final printed copy.

Regent Clausen presented the following resolutions of the finance committee:

1. That the Business Manager be directed to report to the Regents the possible savings to be effected by centralizing all printing-contract negotiations and routine proof-reading in the office of the University Editor.

Upon motion of Regent Clausen, seconded by Regent Schmidtmann, adopted.

2. / That pending the administrative reconsideration, recommended by the faculty, of the duties of Dean of Men and Dean of Women, specific approval of these budgets be withheld and an amount not to exceed \$20,000 be tentatively allocated to the support of this work, Regent action to be taken on these budgets when the reconsideration of this work has been completed and the revised program of student counsel and guidance presented to the Board. 3. That the following actions of the University faculty be confirmed:

- Agriculture
 - a. That the present regulation concerning thesis for four-year students in Agriculture be abandoned, and that the question concerning whether a student should prepare a thesis be left to the major professor and the student.
 - b. That for one year, the thesis in Home Economics be optional with the student. That as a substitute for a thesis, the student be required to take four credits, to be chosen from a list of courses selected by a thesis committee, or from a course or courses suggested by the and approved by that committee.

Engineering

That the professional degree in Mining Engineering be <u>Engineer</u> of <u>Mines</u> in the future as in the past. (In June, 1930, in revising the wording of degrees in order to secure uniformity, the professional degree of Engineer of Mines was changed to Mining Engineer.)

REPORT OF THE SPECIAL COMMITTEE ON THE ORGANIZATION OF THE UNIVERSITY'S SYSTEM OF STUDENT COUNSEL AND DISCIPLINE

Your committee recommends the revision of existing disciplinary and counseling arrangements at the University of Wisconsin. It does not present a scheme to absolve the University from disciplinary obligations or to rid the campus of disciplinary agencies. We believe that parents and students have a right to expect a reasonably controlled environment no less conducive to growth of character than to growth of knowledge and intellectual power.

The recommendations offered represent a shift in emphasis. In dealing with cases of misconduct and in supervising student activities we believe that there should be wider opportunity for counsel and for contact with stimulating leadership. In large part such counsel and leadership will always operate, as in the past, informally through unofficial conference between the interested student and the interested instructor. Yet the committee is of the opinion that the University can and should supply additional and essential leadership through especially gifted men and women in officially designated positions.

In the reorganization of the agencies dealing with student affairs there are decisions, both of theory and practice, which must be left to administrative officers, since only they have the necessary background of experience and since they must carry out the plans and bear the responsibilities. The scope of our recommendations has, however, been subject to a further and a drastic limitation. The committee's hands are tied by complications involving personnel. In the present complex situation it is, as a practical matter, impossible to separate personnel from certain questions of policy and organization.



RECOMMENDATIONS

2.

(I) The Committee recommends that the Dean of Men and the Dean of Women have no connection with the punitive aspects of discipline cases. Initial complaints shall continue to be received by the Deans, and they shall decide whether the case should be passed on to the Committee on Student Conduct, or whether the problem can be more constructively dealt with by informal treatment not involving punitive discipline. Once a case has been turned over to the Committee on Student Conduct, the Dean of Men and the Dean of Women shall, as a matter of normal procedure, have no further connection with the case. The Deans may, however, appear before the Committee when requested by the students involved; and the Committee may, in special cases when it seems advisable, call the Deans into consultation.

(II) The Committee recommends that the Dean of Men and the Dean of Women continue to act as chairman and vice-chairman, respectively, of the Cormittee on Student Life and Interests.

(III) The Committee recommends that the Administration (including the Deans) review all activities*of a "social traffic" nature now being administered by the Deans of Men and Women, with a view of relieving these officers of certain routine duties which require much of their time, which are often a source of friction, and which in our judgment now provent them from utilizing to the best advantage their opportunities for leadership and counsel. Some of these duties seem to us to be unworthy of the Deans' attention, and others to be detrimental to their more important functions. There is an obvious advantage in the "social traffic" activities of the Deans in that these activities afford opportunities for contacts with students. It is our opinion, however, that such advantage may be outweighed by the disadvantages just mentioned.

*In this category we would include: inspection, supervision, and

listing of available lodgings; planning and recording of calender of activities; statistical information of scholarship averages of groupings of students; supervision of student elections; eligibility certification for student activities; regulation and registration of social functions; ruling on individual exceptions to non-academic regulation and other activities.

These three recommendations are based upon our belief that the Deans' opportunity for service to the normal and wholesome aspects of student life will be enhanced by a lessening of their active connection with formal discipline cases and with routine social traffic control. Such activities by their very nature deflect public attention from the constructive phases of their work.

The committee is not under the impression that it has found a final solution for the problem, but believes that the procedure recommended, which is not without precedent elsewhere, is worth trial as an adjustment to changing conditions of student life.

CHANGES IN THE CURRICULUM OF THE SCHOOL OF JOURNALISM

The faculty of the College of Letters and Science recommends the following changes in the curriculum of the School of Journalism, to take effect at the beginning of the academic year 1931-32:

- 1. That students in the Journalism-Advertising Group be required to take a one-semester three-credit course in news writing and reporting (Journalism 22) in place of the present six-credit year course in reporting and correspondence (Journalism 2).
- 2. That students in the Journalism-Advertising Group be required to take Journalism 3 for three credits in the first semester only, and to take Journalism 4 for one credit in the second semester.
- 3. That students in the Journalism-Advertising Group be required to take Economics 6 for two credits in place of Journalism 2, three credits.
- 4. That only such students as receive grades of Fair or higher in Economics 1a, 1b, and 15 shall be permitted to enroll in the Journalism-Advertising Group.
- 5. That the foreign languages in which students may take attainment tests be limited to Latin, Greek, French, German, Spanish, Portuguese, and Italian, except by special permission of the Executive Committee of the College.
- 6. That only such students as have a grade point average of 1.5 in English la and 1b be admitted to Journalism 2.
- 7. That only such students as have a grade point average of 1.5 in Journalism 2 be admitted to the School of Journalism.

Approved by Letters and Science Faculty April 20, 1931.
