REGULAR MEETING OF THE BOARD OF REGENTS OF THE UNIVERSITY OF WISCONSIN

Madison, Wisconsin

Held in the President's Office

Saturday, February 17, 1951, 10:05 A.M.

President Sensenbrenner presiding

PRESENT: Regents Arveson, Campbell, Gelatt, Grady, Jones, Kleczka, Sensenbrenner, Werner.

ABSENT: Regents Laird, Watson.

Regent Laird, whose appointment to the Board was not confirmed by the State Senate until February 15, 1951, was absent from the state; and Regent Watson was also absent from the state.

Upon motion of Regent Kleczka, seconded by Regent Campbell, it was VOTED, That the minutes of the regular meeting of the Board held on January 13, 1951, be approved as sent out to the Regents.

President Fred, in recommending acceptance of the gift of the late Professor Banner Bill Morgan's library, made the following statement:

"At this time I would like to transmit to the Regents, and recommend acceptance, of a gift to the University which, in its magnitude, is great and generous.

"Last September 8th, one of our young and very promising professors, Banner Bill Morgan, who had, at the age of thirty-five, become an internationally recognized authority in the field of parasitology, died.

"In that death, Wisconsin lost a great teacher and scientist. But I am grateful to report that his wife, Mary, has now presented us with Professor Morgan's own technical library of books and journals, which will carry on for generations of students, some of the knowlege Professor Morgan gave the students who were fortunate enough to work with him during his life.

"These ninety-five books and journals would make a fine addition to our University library, and I recommend their grateful acceptance."

Upon motion of Regent Campbell, seconded by Regent Gelatt, it was VOTED, That the gift of the late Professor Banner Bill Morgan's library of technical books and journals to the University by his wife, Mary, be gratefully accepted.

Upon motion of Regent Kleczka, seconded by Regent Jones, actions 1 to 3, inclusive, listed under the Report of the Vice President of Business and Finance (I. Report of Actions Taken) were approved.

II. Confirmation of Contract Awarded by Committee Action

1. That a contract in the amount of \$5978.12 be awarded to the Refrigeration Equipment Company, Madison, low bidder, for the furnishing of all labor and materials required to complete the installation of an air conditioning system in the Psychological Laboratories in Bascom Hall on the Madison campus of the University, in accordance with plans and specifications prepared by the Bureau of Engineering, dated December, 1950; that the Vice President of Business and Finance be authorized to sign the contract; and that the cost of the work be charged to the funds allotted by the Regents on February 11 and October 14, 1950.

(Confirming written approval by the Executive Committee.)

Upon motion of Regent Werner, seconded by Regent Campbell, recommendation No. 1 listed under the report of the Vice President of Business and Finance (II. Confirmation of Contract Awarded by Committee Action) was adopted.

The Secretary presented the following recommendation for the amendment of the By-Laws of the Board of Regents, which, upon motion of Regent Grady, seconded by Regent Gelatt, was unanimously approved:

That the By-Laws of the Board of Regents be amended to provide that regular meetings shall be held on the Saturday following the first Monday in each month, except the month in which the annual meeting is held, when the regular meeting shall be held on the day before the annual commencement.

The Secretary reported that the appointment of Mrs. Melvin R. Laird, Marshfield, Wisconsin, to the Board of Regents for the balance of the term of Walter J. Hodgkins, resigned, ending May 1, 1959, had been confirmed by the State Senate. President Sensenbrenner announced the appointment of Regent Laird as a member of the Educational Committee of the Regents.

The Secretary reported that the Legislative Banquet would be held in Madison on the evening of March 21, 1951, and that all Regents planning to attend the banquet should advise the Secretary.

Regent Gelatt presented the report of the Educational Committee. Upon motion of Regent Gelatt, seconded by Regent Werner, it was

VOTED (a) That, upon recommendation of the University Faculty, the present regulations which read as follows relating to membership in the University Faculty, be rescinded:

4.10 MEMBERSHIP.

- 4.111 The University Faculty shall consist of the President of the University; all deans and directors, professors, associate professors, assistant professors, acting professors, lecturers on regular appointment, the mistresses of the women's halls, the superintendent of agricultural institutes, librarian and assistant librarians, and the high school inspector. Instructors and assistants may attend the regular meetings of the faculty and have the right to be heard, but not the right to vote. Instructors are eligible to membership on University faculty committees. Student assistants, fellows and scholars are not members of the faculty, and are not expected to attend meetings.
- (b) That, upon recommendation of the University Faculty, the following Rules Governing Membership in the Academic Staff and in the University Faculty, be approved:

4.10 MEMBERSHIP.

4.111 ACADEMIC STAFF. The academic staff shall consist of all persons who are appointed to their positions by the Regents, except (a) employees appointed to classified civil service positions, (b) students employed on an hourly parttime basis, (c) undergraduate scholars and recipients of undergraduate scholarships and awards, (d) individuals who

are recipients of graduate scholarships and fellowships which provide only for remission of tuition or fees and who do not hold other appointments which are included in the academic staff classification, and (e) temporary appointees for special administrative duties on special contract.

- 4.112 UNIVERSITY FACULTY. The University faculty shall consist of the President, professors, associate professors, assistant professors, and such other persons as may be designated in their appointments as having University faculty status. It would be expected that academic staff members with training, experience, and responsibilities comparable to those in the professorial ranks would be designated as having faculty status.
- 4.113 EXECUTIVE SESSIONS. The University faculty shall be empowered to meet in executive session.
- 4.114 All faculty members, and all full-time members of the academic staff, have the right to attend faculty meetings and to speak, but only members of the University faculty who are on active duty have the right to vote.
- 4.115 All members of the academic staff are eligible for membership on faculty committees.

Regent Gelatt stated that the revised rules were descriptive of the actual procedures being followed at present and included members of the staff and faculty at Madison and elsewhere in the state.

Upon motion of Regent Gelatt, seconded by Regent Kleczka, it was VOTED, That, upon recommendation of the Medical School, nonresident applicants for admission to the Medical School, who otherwise fulfill the qualifications, may be accepted in a number not to exceed 5% of the total first-year class for the given year.

Upon motion of Regent Gelatt, seconded by Regent Arveson, it was VOTED, That the President of the University be authorized to sign applications for the establishment of five Reserve Officers Corps Units at the following University Extension Centers:

Milwaukee, Racine and Kenosha, Sheboygan and Manitowoc, Green Bay and Menasha, and Wausau.

Upon motion of Regent Gelatt, seconded by Regent Arveson, it was VOTED, That, upon recommendation of the Administrative Committee, the following recommendation of the University Administration to supplement and implement the specific statements of policy approved by the Regents and the Faculty pertaining to outside activities of faculty members, be approved:

The Regents of the University of Wisconsin, on October 14, 1950, approved in principle Faculty Document 942 relating to outside activities of faculty members, approved a supplementary statement which was made a part of their action on this subject, and directed the University administration to present an appropriate statement of policy to implement the policies approved by the faculty and the Regents. Consideration is being given to a proposal for a study of policies relating to outside activities of faculty members which are in effect in Universities throughout the country. Pending the development of a statement of policy based on the findings of such a study, the University administration recommends the following procedures to supplement and implement the specific statements of policy approved by the Regents and the faculty pertaining to outside activities of faculty members:

- (1) A member of the faculty employed on a full time basis, who engages in or plans to engage in gainful activities of an extensive, recurring or continuing nature outside of his broad institutional responsibilities during any period of full time employment by the University, shall report in writing the nature and scope of such activities to the chairman of his department for the approval of the department.
- (2) All approvals of such activities shall be reported by the departmental chairmen to the appropriate deans or directors, who shall consult the President of the University in such cases as they deem should be brought to his attention. Specifically, the President should be consulted concerning all cases involving major sums of money, extensive time, or work which is related to matters of public policy and concern.
- (3) If a request for approval of such activities is disapproved by the department or dean, the faculty member shall have the right of appeal to the President of the University.
- (4) The President of the University shall refer appeals of cases which he has disapproved to the Regents for final action.
- (5) In general, University facilities, equipment and supplies are not to be used by the staff for purposes other than carrying out their institutional responsibilities.

If for any reason a faculty member deems it essential to use such facilities for personal activities, appropriate arrangements shall be made in advance with University authorities.

(Copies of Faculty Document 942 and Regent Action of October 14, 1950, attached)

Regent Jones presented the report of the Business and Finance Committee. Upon motion of Regent Jones, seconded by Regent Kleczka, it was VOTED, That the 5-C Intercollegiate Athletic revolving fund budget for 1950-51 be increased \$10,000 chargeable to additional receipts, and distributed as follows:

New Construction Salaries and Wages \$5,000.00

Upon motion of Regent Jones, seconded by Regent Campbell, it was VOTED, That the 16-B Federal Funds research budget of the College of Agriculture for 1950-51 be increased as follows:

(a) On account of additional appropriations received:

Extra Labor \$ 2,800.00 Supplies & Expense 11,154.00 Equipment 2,000.00 New Construction 10,000.00 \$25,954.00

(b) On account of balances carried forward from 1949-50:

Supplies & Expense

\$ 4,503.02.

Upon motion of Regent Jones, seconded by Regent Kleczka, it was VOTED, That the Vice President of Business and Finance be authorized to sign renewal leases for the following properties in Milwaukee needed for the work of the Milwaukee Extension Division:

(a) Renewal of lease with the Wisconsin Tower, Inc., for the second floor of the Wisconsin Tower Building for a period of two years commencing July 1, 1951, with the option of cancellation by the lessee after the first year of the lease on six months written notice, at an annual rental of \$20,158.60.

(b) Renewal of lease with the Plankinton & Wells Company for the premises now occupied by the Extension Division in the annex of the Brumder Building for a period of two years commencing July 1, 1951, with the option of cancellation by the lessee after the first year of the lease on six months written notice, at an annual rental of \$16,200.

Upon motion of Regent Jones, seconded by Regent Werner, it was VOTED, That, upon the recommendation of the Steering Committee of the University Campus Planning Commission, the preliminary plans for remodelling the Mome Economics Building and for the construction of a proposed Nursery School Addition be approved, and that authority be granted to complete the plans and specifications.

Upon motion of Regent Jones, seconded by Regent Campbell, it was VOTED, That, in order to carry out the intent of the donor, a claim be filed against the Estate of Lelah Starks, deceased, for the payment of a check dated December 30, 1950, in the amount of \$5,000, which the University of Wisconsin had received from Miss Starks as a gift to be used to improve the seed potato industry of Wisconsin and which had not been deposited at the time of her death on January 10, 1951.

Upon motion of Regent Jones, seconded by Regent Gelatt, it was VOTED, That \$8,500 be transferred from the \$100,000 previously allotted by the Regents for capital equipment to Buildings and Grounds for remodelling Temporary Building No. 7 to accommodate it for use in the Lakes Investigation Program.

Upon motion of Regent Jones, seconded by Regent Kleczka, it was VOTED, That, upon recommendation of the Registrar, the full refund of tuition and feet paid by Mrs. Mary E. Wolter for the second semester of the 1950-51 academic year be approved.

Upon motion of Regent Jones, seconded by Regent Werner, it was VOTED, That the Executive Committee be authorized to act for the Board in the following matters relating to the construction of the Chemical Engineering Building and the Intern-Residents Dormitory:

(a) Approval of methods of financing;

(b) Approval of schedule of costs;

- (c) Approval of leases, mortgages and other documents necessary in connection with financing these projects through the Wisconsin University Building Corporation:
- (d) Award of contracts.

Regent Grady requested that he be reported as voting "No" on item (d) of the above recommendation if it involves the awarding of any contract to other than the lowest bidder and if it involves the awarding of any contract on a costplus basis.

Regent Werner presented the report of the Regent-Faculty Conference Committee. Upon motion of Regent Werner, seconded by Regent Kleczka, it was VOTED, That the Regents approve and support Bill No. 75,S which amends Section 42.49(5) of the statutes, relating to teachers employment restrictions while receiving retirement benefits, and which has been introduced in the 1951 Legislature.

Upon motion of Regent Werner, seconded by Regent Campbell, it was VOTED, That the Regents approve and support Bill No. 78,5 which repeals and recreates Section 42.45(1) and creates Sections 42.33(1)(d) and 42.55 of the statutes, relating to state deposit formula for teachers retirement, and which has been introduced in the 1951 Legislature.

Regent Kleczka reported that he had been advised that a hearing has been scheduled for February 22, 1951, on Bills 148,S and 133,A, in regard to the creation of the Lakeshore Area College of the University in Milwaukee. He stated that he understood there would be a joint hearing before the Senate and Assembly Educational Committees and asked permission to state on the record what his position has been in the past and is now in regard to the Lakeshore Area College. Regent Kleczka made the following statement:

"Being a consistent supporter of the proposal to establish a four-year liberal arts college in the lakeshore area, I never-theless was not in the past nor am I now in accord with the recommendation of the majority members of the joint Boards of Regents that such a college be set up and controlled by the Board of Normal School Regents.

"My reasons for opposing the proposal of the joint Boards of Regents are as follows:

"First, the type of work to be done by this lakeshore college, if it is to fully serve the youth of that community, is University-type work and not the type which is traditionally carried on by a teachers college, however excellent that institution might be.

"Second, the experience of the Milwaukee Extension Division of the University and the Milwaukee State Teachers College during the past fifteen or twenty years indicates very clearly that the young men and women of the community want and, I believe, have the right to University training rather than teachers college training.

"Third, if the proposed college is under the University of Wisconsin, the University can monitor the quality of the preprofessional training, thus assuring the students who intend to enter the Medical School, Law School, or other professional schools that they are fully prepared for this objective, and that the quality of the work which they have taken towards this objective will be unquestioned.

"Fourth, students who graduate from a branch of the University of Wisconsin will have a professional advantage in the world of business and industry and in the professional world over students who might graduate from a relatively new institution or an institution which has been known for many years primarily for its teacher training function.

"All of these advantages can accrue to the students of this lake—shore college without any additional cost to the taxpayers of the State; that is, the cost of providing this educational opportunity under the aegis of the University will not be any greater than the cost of providing it under the Board of Normal School Regents."

Regent Kleczka asked that the statement be made a part of the records, and, there being no objection, the request was granted by President Sensenbrenner.

Regent Jones made the following statement:

"Two bills are pending in the Legislature - one in the Senate and one in the Assembly - and it is my understanding that both bills will be the subject of a public hearing on Wednesday or Thursday of this week. The object of each bill, the measures being identical, is to establish a liberal arts college in Milwaukee, the liberal arts program to be integrated with that of the Milwaukee State Teachers College, and each measure provides that the new institution, as set up, shall be under the control and

direction of the Board of University Regents. According to my understanding, the effect of either bill, if enacted into law, will be this - that the first step in the dismemberment of the excellent teachers system in Wisconsin will have been taken - and in that connection I wish to offer the following motion:

That it be the consensus of this Board that any move by the Legislature to dismember the State Teachers College system would be contrary to the public interest."

The motion was seconded by Regent Arveson and approved unanimously with Regents Kleczka and Werner qualifying their affirmative votes as follows:

Regent Werner stated:

"I cannot agree that the adoption of Bill No. 148,S, or the Assembly bill similar to it, simply because it provides for the taking over by the University of the present functions of the State Teachers College in the Milwaukee area, need necessarily lead to the dismemberment of the state teachers college system. I am just as much opposed to that as any other member of this Board. I think the state teachers college system is serving a useful purpose and is doing it well in the State of Wisconsin but I do believe that the situation in the Milwaukee area is unique - it is unique in that it is centered in a location where there is an unusually large proportion of the population of the state. second place, it is the only place in the State of Wisconsin where there exists both a University of Wisconsin Center and a State Teachers College and I suppose it can be said the only place in the state where there is direct competition between to public educational systems in the state. In so far as Mr. Jones' motion seeks to avoid the dismemberment of the state teachers college system, I vote 'Aye': in so far as it opposes and rejects the idea included in Bill 148,S, I would vote 'No'."

Regent Kleczka stated that his position was identical with that voiced by Mr. Werner.

Upon motion of Regent Jones, seconded by Regent Kleczka, it was VOTED, That the Secretary transmit copies of the above motion to the Chairmen of the Educational Committees of the State Senate and Assembly and to the Governor.

The meeting adjourned at 11:10 A.M.

MASTER OF ARTS DEGREE IN RUSSIAN

The Department of Slavic Languages expects candidates for admission to studies for the Master of Arts degree in Russian to have preparation equivalent to an undergraduate major in Russian at the University of Wisconsin. A candidate with deficiencies in such preparation will be expected to remove them by taking the appropriate course or courses.

The departmental requirements for the degree are a minimum of twenty (20) credits including the following:

- 1. Oral proficiency in the language. (Oral proficiency examinations are held once a semester, and students are urged to satisfy this requirement as early as possible.)
- 2. One seminar course numbered above 200 (4 cr.)
- 3. Training either as graduates or as undergraduates corresponding to the following courses:
 - a. Russian 150 (2 cr.);b. Russian 151 (2 cr.);c. Russian 190(2 cr.);d. at least 10 credits in literature coursesnumbered above 100.
- 4. A thesis completed under the course Russian 200 (individual research).

In the final oral examination of one hour, candidates will be expected to show a general familiarity with the periods of Russian literature and a first hand knowledge of the most significant works of the great writers. Part of the examination will be conducted in Russian.

Extract, Regular Meeting of the Board of Regents of the University of Wisconsin, October 14, 1950

Regent Gelatt presented the following recommendation of the Educational Committee:

The Educational Committee recommends to the Board of Regents that it approve in principle the Faculty Document 942 relating to outside activities of Faculty members and that the following statement be made a part of the Regent action on this subject.

"The Regents are confident that the University faculty members recognize that they have broad institutional responsibilities as well as responsibilities in the narrower field of their specialization. In addition to their classroom work, the faculty of the University of Wisconsin is well known for the part it has played in the general educational program of the State. Service to the State has been and should continue to be one of the phases of the work of the University of Wisconsin faculty. In view of this the Regents believe that the phrase 'beyond their line of duty' in item 6a should be broadly interpreted.

"The Regents have confidence in the good judgment of the faculty of the University with respect to the amount and type of outside activities in which faculty members have and will engage. The Regents, however, cannot escape the responsibility of taking appropriate action in the event that they believe that poor or bad judgment is exercised in such matters by a faculty member.

"The Regents believe that the University should move as rapidly as possible toward the objective stated in item 6d but recognize that budgetary limitations may make it impossible to make all the necessary adjustments at once."

The University administration is directed to present an appropriate statement of policy to implement this report.

Upon motion of Regent Gelatt, seconded by Regent Kleczka, the recommendation of the Educational Committee was adopted.

Document 942 - April 3, 1950 COMMITTEE ON OUTSIDE ACTIVITIES OF FACULTY MEMBERS

Your committee appointed to examine certain problems which have arisen in connection with outside activities engaged in by faculty members hereby begs leave to submit the following report for your consideration and for discussion and approval by the University of Wisconsin faculty.

Your committee has considered information relating to four different classes of outside activities:

- (a) Services performed for the University Extension Division by faculty members not holding regular appointments in that division.
- (b) Expert services rendered to the local, state or federal government.
- (c) Consulting or other professional services rendered to private individuals or organizations.
- (d) The conduct of business enterprises.

GENERAL OBSERVATIONS

Your committee is of the opinion that members of the University of Wisconsin faculty must have freedom to decide how they are to spend time not required for the performance of the duties relating to their teaching, research, and other University activities. It is convinced that their privilege of self-regulation of time and of efforts in serving the University is rarely abused. Moreover, the willingness of faculty members to serve the University beyond their line of duty without extra compensation is amply demonstrated when in vacations and other leisure periods they engage in research, read doctoral dissertations, participate in examinations for higher degrees, advise students, and perform various other tasks of benefit to the institution.

In surveying the outside activities of faculty members, your committee has given special attention to questions connected with the employment by the Extension Division of faculty members not on its staff. Occasions arise when the Extension Division requires expert services not available on its regular staff and which cannot be obtained except at considerable expense or over-staffing of the Division. In such cases the faculty member in doing extra work is actually saving the State money and deserves compensation for the time devoted to such additional services.

Your committee appreciates that the special knowledge, training, and capabilities of members of the faculty may be used properly by various agencies which serve the needs of the State of Wisconsin and the federal government as well as by private interests. It recognizes further that such services and contacts may enhance the value of the work of faculty members as teachers and scholars. Service to the public, enhancement of professional capacity, and financial reward are considerations which in varying degrees provide the incentives for undertaking outside duties. Of course, outside work, even when it contributes to scholarship and professional skill, is not necessarily of greater benefit to academic attainment and to the University than an equal amount of time and energy devoted to study, research, and student contact on the Campus.

Having considered various aspects of this question, your committee wishes to emphasize that the net effect of outside activities on the performance of University duties should be the primary factor in judging the desirability of these activities.

This principle applies also to members of the teaching staff in the professional schools and colleges of the University, for whom it may be not only desirable but necessary that they be allowed to practice their skills and maintain their outside contacts.

Your committee believes, that provided his obligations to the University are duly performed, it is proper for a faculty member to accept outside work and to receive compensation for it.

An individual faculty member is entitled to spend his leisure time as he sees fit. It is, however, reasonable to assume that the conduct of a separate business enterprise of any significance, whether alone or with others, may detract from the energy and attention required for effective performance of full time duties. The possibility that conduct of such an enterprise may impair the participant's services to the University should, in the opinion of your committee, be subject to review by the proper administrative authorities.

Your committee believes that it would be unwise to attempt a rigid classification of outside activities and to adopt detailed rules for their control. Ordinarily, specific regulations can be adopted and applied most effectively in the smaller units of departments, schools, and colleges. However, in the interest of the University as a whole and for the guidance of individual faculty members and the administrative authorities, your committee submits the following statement of policy and recommends its approval by the University Faculty.

PROPOSED STATEMENT OF POLICY

- 1. The Faculty recognizes that its members should abstain from engaging in activities, whether paid or unpaid, which impair the instructional, scholarly, and other services which they must render in the nature of their/employment.
- 2. It is assumed that each member of the faculty is capable of judging the extent to which occasional outside activities may interfere with his obligations to the University. In case of doubt, the matter should be presented to his department and, if necessary, to the dean of the college or school concerned and to the President of the University.
- 3. A member of the faculty should not engage in private business or accept regular salaried appointments or regular consulting engagements without informing the appropriate University authorities.
- 4. The conditions under which faculty members might properly be placed on a parttime basis vary so widely that no general rule can be established.

A staff member placed on such a basis should be so designated in the budget and in the staff directory. The arrangements made concerning his duties to the University should be communicated in writing to the members of his department.

5. Whenever a faculty member renders professional or other expert services, it should be on such terms as not to impair confidence in his integrity.

- 6. In cases where the Extension Division needs the services of faculty members not on its staff, the following policy is recommended:
 - *a. Lecturers participating in special institutes or adult education programs beyond their line of duty should be paid honoraria and expenses. The honorarium should be recorded as part of the actual salary paid to the lecturer for services rendered to the University. If the honorarium is paid from fees collected, this fact should be so recorded.
 - b. Appointments for the preparation of correspondence courses and other special assignments should be made at the time of agreement, with compensation computed on a monthly basis but with payment deferred until the work has been completed.
 - c. Appointments as readers of correspondence study papers should follow the customary procedure with monthly salary approved by the proper University authorities.
 - d. A member of the resident University faculty whose qualifications make him especially valuable for regular appointment by the Extension Division and who wishes to serve in that division should be appointed to the various sections of the University which he serves and his salary pro-rated accordingly. Only in an emergency should an extension class be added to a faculty member's normal teaching load.
- 7. Absence from classes or other regular duties to fulfill an outside engagement should be cleared with the proper administrative authorities. Care should be taken to avoid a concentration of class hours detrimental to effective teaching.
- 8. University facilities should not be used by faculty members for outside activities of a commercial character without prior arrangements with the appropriate University authorities.

*During the year 1948-49, 50 faculty members not on the staff of the Extension Division gave 109 lectures under its auspices at a total cost, including expenses, of \$3,043.80 of which \$980.00 came from University funds.
