THEATER'S 45TH SEASON BRINGS STELLAR LINE-UP OF PERFORMING ARTISTRY

Julian Bream...Pinchas Zukerman...Claire Bloom... Richard Stoltzman...The Amadeus Quartet...Jean-Pierre Rampal...Philippe Entremont...and the list goes on, as the Union Theater prepares to celebrate its 45th season with a stellar line-up of the world's most renowned performing artists.

In 1983-84, virtuoso musicianship will take the spotlight in the Red and White Concert Series, with a blend of old favorites and new guests marking the Series' 64th year. The Red Series will open October 21 as mezzo-soprano Jan DeGaetani, pianist Lee Luvisi and violist Walter Trampler celebrate Brahms' 150th birthday with an appropriate musical tribute. DeGaetani's artistry, ranging from lieder recitals, early music and chamber ensembles to performances with orchestra and in opera, has made her one of today's most sought-after vocalists. Luvisi, who has performed with all of the major American and European orchestras, is also acclaimed for his chamber music collaborations with the Juilliard, Guarneri and Cleveland Quartets and the Chamber Music Society of Lincoln Society. A founding member of the Chamber Music Society, Trampler is widely regarded as the most eminent violist of our time.

The Red Series will continue November 17, as legendary guitarist-lutenist Julian Bream makes his eighth Union Theater visit. February 3 brings the Union Theater debut of cellist Zara Nelsova, artist-teacher at the University of Cincinnati Conservatory of Music and a performer whose credits include appearances as soloist and with orchestras in the world's major concert halls.

"A total mastery of the instrument" was among the critical praise offered when pianist Janina Fialkowska made her Madison debut in the 1979 Red Concert Series. The Canadian pianist, who includes the top prize in the first Arthur Rubinstein International Piano Competition among her credits, will return February 17. The Red Series will conclude March 9 with another return engagement featuring the renowned Amadeus String Quartet. Members of the famous Quartet have been making music together for more than 36 years in a partnership praised for "splendid musicianship and ensemble rapport."

The Union's White Concert Series will again celebrate the marvelous vitality which has marked the revival of chamber music. The 1983-84 series will welcome back the Saint Paul Chamber Orchestra for two performances. On September 21, the ensemble will perform with music director Pinchas Zukerman as conductor and violinist and pianist Yefim Bronfman as guest artist. The season's second Saint Paul performance is scheduled for January 28, with Zukerman again performing as both conductor and soloist.

On October 20, the Vienna Chamber Orchestra will make its Madison debut, with internationally-renowned pianist Philippe Entremont as conductor and soloist. The 1983-84 season marks the Orchestra's fourth American tour, with U.S. audiences and critics joining in the international acclaim which has greeted the ensemble's development in its three decades of performance. The concert marks the third Union Theater appearance for Entremont, who has been music director of the Vienna ensemble since 1976. The dynamic TASHI ensemble will make its Union Theater debut in the final White Concert Series event. Officially named "TASHI: Clarinet and Strings," the ensemble features the acclaimed clarinetist Richard Stoltzman, violinist Ida Kavafian and cellist Fred Sherry, with guest artists Theodore Arm, violin, and Toby Appel, violist.

The Theater's Great Performance Series, now in its seventh year, will again explore the diversity of creative expression. To open the series, renowned actress Claire Bloom will present a solo performance, "These Are Women: Shakespeare's Heroines." The London-born actress, who began her career at age 16, has earned an international following for her superb dramatic portrayals in live theater, film and television. Recent credits include the role of Lady Marchmain in the adaptation of Evelyn Waugh's "Brideshead Revisited" on PBS.

The New Swingle Singers, a captivating choral ensemble, will demonstrate their mastery of classical scat or "mouth music" on November 3. Praised for "impeccable technique and precise harmony," the Singers offer a repertoire ranging from Bach and Mozart to Cole Porter, Scott Joplin and the Beatles. The ensemble's recent engagements include performances with the Chicago Symphony, the Pittsburgh, Denver, San Francisco and Minnesota orchestras, at La Scala and Lincoln Center and with the Boston Symphony at Tanglewood. The Great Performance Series continues March 7, with the return engagement of London's New Vic Theatre, which earned enthusiastic reviews this past February for a lively rendering of Chaucer's "Canterbury Tales." The troupe's second visit brings "Dracula," or "A Pain in the Neck," a production which director Michael Bogdonov describes as "entertainment you can really sink your teeth into."

The 1983-84 Great Performance Series will conclude April 3 with a duo-recital by virtuoso musicians Jean-Pierre Rampal, flute and Alexandre LaGoya, guitar. Rampal, making his eighth visit to the Union Theater, is universally acclaimed as one of the world's greatest musicians and is credited with influencing a worldwide renaissance in flute playing. The duo-recital marks the first Union Theater performance for LaGoya, who is praised as "one of the supreme masters of the guitar."

GET AWAY FROM IT ALL WITH TRAVEL ADVENTURE SERIES

From the sunny Caribbean to beautiful Rhine River vistas, would-be globetrotters can explore the world in six fascinating excursions planned as part of the Union Theater's 1983-84 Travel Adventure Film Series.

The season's itinerary gets underway October 10 and 11 with "Caribbean Holiday." Veteran filmmaker Philip Walker is the guide for this film, which highlights the full circle of the Caribbean islands, celebrating the unique history and traditions of each. Sweden is the destination November 14 and 15. In "We Swedes," Ed Lark first offers a tourist's view and then takes a look behind the scenes, presenting the country through the eyes of the Swedes themselves.

What better place for a winter get-away than the Paradise of the Pacific? On December 5 and 6, Fran Reidelberger is the guide for "Dateline: Fiji," spotlighting the ancient customs and breathtaking beauty of this colorful and intriguing country. January 30 and 31 brings the fast-paced adventure of "Kayaks Down the Nile," as John Goddard and two French explorers make an unprecedented journey. The trio travels 4,000 miles down the steaming Nile from its source in the heart of Africal all the way to the Mediterranean, an epochal, 10-month expedition.

From remote rainforests to futuristic cities, Clay Francisco explores the amazing contrasts of the world's fifth largest country in "Brazil in a Nutshell," slated for February 13 and 14. Examining the diverse cultures which have created modern Brazil, Francisco's fascinating film spans centuries of tradition and the equivalent of four continents. For the season's final film, the Rhine River is the route on March 5 and 6. Following "The Majestic Rhine," filmmaker John Roberts offers a look at life along one of the world's busiest waterways. You'll visit bustling cities and small villages, complemented by beautiful vistas boasting vineyards, windmills and ancient castles.

All of the series films are current releases, with the Caribbean, Brazil and Rhine films premiering in 1983-84. As always, the filmmaker-guides will be on hand to narrate each journey. Mail orders for the 1983-84 Travel Adventure Film Series are now being accepted at the Union Theater Box Office. Patrons may select a Monday Series or Tuesday series for the films.

1983-84 SEASON INCLUDES CZECH PHILHARMONIC'S MADSION DEBUT

Spotlighting a musical tradition which dates back more than 80 years, the Union Theater Arts Area and the Madison Civic Center will cooperate next spring to present the Madison debut of the Czech Philharmonic, one of Europe's most distinguished orchestras.

The Czech, under the direction of Vaclav Neumann, will perform April 13 at the Madison Civic Center. Mail orders for the concert are now being accepted at the Union Theater Box Office.

The Czech tradition began in 1896, when composer Antonin Dvorak conducted the orchestra's first concert. Since then, music's most eminent figures, including Gustav Mahler, Richard Strauss, Bruno Walter, George Szell and Rafael Kubelik, have been associated with the orchestra's progress into the top ranks of the world's orchestras.

Neumann, at one time a member of the Czech's viola section, was appointed chief conductor of the orchestra in 1968. Complementing his work with the Czech, Neumann is in demand as guest conductor throughout Europe, including collaborations with the Prague Symphony, Berlin's Komische Opera and the Stuttgart Opera.

1983-84 marks the Czech's fourth North American tour.



RAMBLING WITH THE UNION TRAVEL CENTER

Wisconsin Union members will have a number of chances to travel with the Badger football team this fall. Sager-Wilson Travel Agency, in Memorial Union, has planned two trips to the Minnesota game, one by bus for \$99 and another by air for \$149. Both packages include accommodations at the Downtown Holiday Inn where the band is staying, a buffet breakfast on Saturday, a pep rally, a victory celebration, tickets to the game and all transportation. The bus trip will leave Madison Friday afternoon and return Sunday, the air package will depart Saturday morning and return Sunday morning. Sager-Wilson is also working on a possible trip to the Ohio State game. Please check with them at 263-8810 for details.

Conventions Plus is offering a third option to the Minnesota game. This deluxe tour departs Saturday morning and includes one night at the Marquette Inn in the IDS Center on Nicolet Mall, as well as a continental breakfast, a guided city tour, participation in the pre-game Badger Huddle, and tickets to the game. On the return trip, a stop is planned in Red Wing for an early supper at the elegantly restored Victorian St. James Hotel.

But that's this fall. Highlightling the Travel Center's summer offerings are two wilderness canoe trips to Wabakimi, Ontario, and a Tour for Peacemakers to the Soviet Union. The canoe trips will be leaving Madison July 15 and August 5 for the beautiful and virtually untouched Canadian Shield country of northern Ontario. The cost is \$300 per person, and includes round trip transportation, all equipment except sleeping bag, pad and personal gear, meals on the water, a professional guide and lodging enroute.

The Soviet Tour, offered in conjunction with Amity Tours of California, will depart August 8 from New York for 17 days including the cities of Moscow, Volgograd and Leningrad. The \$1665 price includes all transportation, three meals a day in the Soviet Union, first class hotel accommodations, theater visits and much more. The emphasis of this tour will be person-to-person communication with the people of Soviet Russia through meetings set up by the Soviet Peace Committee and the USSR/USA Friendship Society.

The Wisconsin Union Travel Center is a complete travel advisory service, and has available International Student ID Cards, Eurail and Britrail Passes, passport photos and more, including tickets for Alco bus service from Madison to O'Hare International Airport. New this year: the Travel Center is able to offer tickets for the Trailways bus System. Fare information and schedules are available from the Travel Center on the 2nd floor of Memorial Union, or by phone at 262-6200.

Sager-Wilson Travel, on Memorial Union's first floor, is a full-service travel agency serving the needs of the campus community. The Travel Center and Sager-Wilson together can fill virtually all travel needs, so the next time you're contemplating a ramble, stop in or give a call.

UNION AWARDS GIVEN TO STUDENTS AND PROFESSOR

The winners of the Wisconsin Union's four awards were announced at the 1983 Wisconsin Union Directorate Recognition Banquet on Thursday, April 28.


The Porter Butts Creative Arts Award, given to a student or staff member who has expressed outstanding artistic talent through or in connection with the Union, is shared this year by Prof. Ron Wallace of the Department of English faculty and Erin Sanders, a junior majoring in English and a current editor of *State of the Unions*.

Wallace has been insturmental in coordinating the Fiction and Poetry series and the annual creative writing contest with the Union. Sanders is a founder of Underdog Productions which has mounted two productions in the Fredric March Play Circle this year, one of them an original play by Sanders entitled "Sparks."

Winners of the Henry B. Herman Award for this year are Daria Schmidt and Lynda Williams. The Herman Award is given to undergraduates at the UW who come from greater metropolitan New York City and demonstrate qualities of concern through community service, innovative programming, or an appropriate single deed. Ms. Schmidt is a sophomore in the pre-medical technology program; Ms. Williams is a junior in United States Institutions.

The Union Trustee Leadership Awards are given to Directorate members who have demonstrated outstanding leadership qualities. Those honored this year are Tim Bahr, MU Social Chair; Michelle Couturier, Ideas & Issues Chair; Andrew Flaherty, Art Chair; Georgia Geisser, Art committee member; Terence Gilles, Ideas and Issues committee member; Joy Goberville, Vice-President for Personnel; Bill Peters, Campus Community Services committee member; Chris Robaidek, Hoofers; Mark McDougall, Film committee member; and Jeff Van Fleet, Travel committee member.

The newest Union award is the Association of College Unions-International Award, given to one graduate and one undergraduate student who have demonstrated an ability to balance academic and volunteer activities based on grade point and involvement with Directorate. This year's undergraduate winner is Ann Reider, a member of the Cross Cultures interest area. The graduate winner is Mark Zimmer, a member of Union South Social area.
