THE ARMY-NAVY PRODUCTION AWARD

In 1906, the Navy instituted in the Fleet an award for excellence which has been known ever since as the Navy "E." First awarded for excellence in gunnery, it was later extended to include outstanding performance in engineering and communications. It was an honor not easily won nor lightly bestowed, and has remained a matter of deep pride to the men in the service who receive it.

With the rising tide of war in Europe a premium was placed on the production of war equipment and the Navy "E" was extended to embrace those plants and organizations which showed excellence in producing ships, weapons, and materials for the Navy.

Then came Pearl Harbor and, as the fighting forces and American industry became partners in our struggle for freedom, the Navy "E" grew to the Army-Navy Production Award in joint recognition of a grim resolve to work and fight together for Victory. The Award stands for exceptional performance on the production front . . . it typifies a determined, unbeatable American spirit which can be satisfied only by achieving today what yesterday seemed impossible.

E. P. HAMILTON came to the company in 1919. He received his preliminary training in nearly every department in the organization before succeeding to his present responsibility in 1941.


H. G. EVANS came to the company in 1923. In addition to being Vice-President, his duties also include the general direction of the company's selling activities.

★ BRIGADIER GENERAL GEORGE F. LULL U. S. Army

Brigadier General George F. Lull, a native of Pennsylvania, was born in Scranton on March 10, 1887. After receiving his early education, he entered Jefferson Medical College, receiving his M. D. degree in 1909.

A military career was chosen as his profession in September, 1912, when he entered the U.S. Army Medical Corps. Here he has served continuously through all grades, from First Lieutenant to Brigadier General.

Brigadier General Lull has seen action in France during World War I and has served also in Panama and the Philippine Islands. He received his C. P. H. degree from the Harvard Technology School of Public Health in 1921, and a Dr. P. H. degree from the University of Pennsylvania.

At present, Brigadier General Lull is the Deputy Surgeon General of the U. S. Army at Washington, D. C.



LIEUTENANT COMMANDER T. H. JONES U. S. N. R.

Lieutenant Commander T. H. Jones, U.S.N.R., is a veteran of World War I. He entered the United States Naval Reserve in 1917, served as Head of the Department and Instructor in Navy Regulations at the Naval Officers school, Pelham Bay, N. Y., and later, in the Cruiser and Transport Force and the Naval Overseas Transport Service.

From 1920 to 1929 he commanded the 3rd Battalion of the U. S. Naval Reserve and also organized and enlisted the first group of Minneapolis Naval Reserve Cadets for aviation training. He retired with the rank of Lieutenant Commander. He wears the Victory medal together with the Naval Reserve medal with Star.

In 1941, while on the staff of the J. G. White Engineering Co., New York, constructors of the Navy Gun Plant at Louisville, Ky., he was recalled to active duty and assigned to Naval Officer Procurement. He is now Senior Patrol Officer, Navy Shore Patrol, Milwaukee Area.



This is a great honor and is one which less than 3% of the plants engaged in the manufacture of war material have received up to this time.

You have done an excellent job in making it possible for the Hamilton Company to do its full share in the war effort. However, we cannot stop here, the war is not yet won. This Award is given to us for a period of the next six months. In order to keep it we must equal or better or past performance.

We have plenty of work on which to perform.

The management has absolute confidence in your ability
and willingness to do in the future and until the war
is won, what may seem impossible now, just as what seemed
impossible a year ago resulted in your achieving this
extraordinary honor.
