



Head Coach Jane Albright-Dieterle

ane Albright-Dieterle begins her first year with the University of Wisconsin women's basketball program after a successful 10-year tenure at Northern Illinois University.

Albright-Dieterle leaves NIU just two games short of the 300 mark with a decade of accomplishments to her credit. The all-time winningest basketball coach at NIU, she holds a 188-110 (.631) career mark, and is 140-48 (.744) the past six years including five 20-win seasons and four NCAA tournament appearances.

Her last two teams finished with 24-6 records, and were Mid-Continent regular-season or tournament champions. Both teams attended the NCAA tournament before losing in first-round action. She was honored this past season by the Illinois Basketball Coaches Association with her third "Coach of the Year" title in the past four years

A three-time conference coach of the year in both the North Star and Mid-Continent Conferences, Albright-Dieterle began her coaching career in 1981 under one of the game's best in Pat Head Summitt at Tennessee. While a graduate assistant under Summitt, the Volunteers were NCAA Final Four participants in 1982, and NCAA quarter-finalists in 1983.

In 1983, she joined the University of Cincinnati coaching staff as an assistant

coach and recruiting coordinator. A year later she assumed the head coaching position at Northern Illinois where she established a program of national recognition.

She has coached three Kodak District

IV all-Americans, two Olympic Festival athletes, and one USA team participant in Basketball Writers' Association all-American E.C. Hill. She earned Women's Basketball Coaches Association (WBCA) District IV "Coach of the Year" honors in 1990, and in 1993, was the assistant coach for Team USA which earned a bronze medal at the World University Games.

In 1992, Albright-Dieterle helped direct the USA Junior National team to a silver medal performance in the Pan American Confederation World Championship in Mexico. She was also a U.S. Olympic Festival coach for the South team which won the gold medal in 1991.

The Graham, N.C., native graduated cum laude in health and physical education from Appalachian State University, where she was a letterwinner in both basketball and volleyball. She taught high school for four years in Spartanburg, S.C., prior to deciding to pursue her coaching career at Tennessee. Albright-Dieterle earned a master of science degree in physical education with emphasis in sports psychology from Tennessee in 1983.

Jane Albright became Albright-Dieterle with her marriage to Dave Dieterle on August 17, 1991. Dieterle is the Executive Director of the Illinois Council on Economic Education at Northern Illinois University.

Assistant Coaches



Sue Semrau

Sue Semrau begins her first year at Wisconsin and her fourth year as the first assistant coach and recruiting coordinator working with Jane Albright-Dieterle. Semrau arrived at Northern Illinois in 1991, and has contributed to NIU's three straight NCAA tournament appearances.

Prior to her appointment at NIU, she was the head basketball coach at Occidental College in Los Angeles for four years. She compiled a 51-47 record at the Division III institution while concurrently serving as the assistant athletic director.

At Occidental, Semrau also coached two seasons of soccer while assuming her regular administrative responsibilities for recruiting, scheduling, fundraising and promotions. She served on the NCAA regional selection committee and chaired the Southern California Intercollegiate Athletic Conference for women's basketball.

Before coaching at Occidental, Semrau worked as the public relations and promotions director for the L.A. Heat professional soccer team from 1986–87, and served as the public relations director for the Seattle Storm soccer team the previous year. She was the assistant basketball coach at Santa Monica High School in 1986–87.

As a player, Semrau graduated from Shorecrest High School in Seattle, Wash., while earning all-conference honors as a guard her senior year. She attended the University of Puget Sound two years, earning Freshman of the Year honors. In 1984, Semrau transferred to the University of San Diego where she ranks 13th in all-time scoring, and fourth in all-time assists in just two years. She graduated with a bachelor's degree. in communications from the University of California-San Diego in 1985, and earned her masters degree in athletic administration from the University of Southern California in 1988.

"I think my staff is an exciting blend of people, both personally and professionally. I believe that they understand where I want to go with the program. I'm excited about the experiences they've had at different levels of the game, and think they will add to the individual player development, recruiting, and the total team atmosphere."




Bridgett Bonds Williams

Bridgett Bonds Williams begins her first season with the University of Wisconsin women's basketball staff and her first year under Jane Albright-Dieterle.

Williams played power forward at Southern Illinois-Carbondale from 1984–88, where she earned Kodak All-America District V honors and was the Gateway Conference most valuable player in 1987. As the Saluki's leading rebounder, she led SIU to unbeaten seasons in Gateway Conference play and league crowns in 1986 and 1987. The Salukis qualified for back-to-back appearances in the NCAA tournament those same years. A SIU career top-10 record holder in points, rebounds, blocks and assists, Williams was inducted into the SIU Athletic Hall of Fame in 1993.

The St. Louis native received both her bachelor's degree in advanced technical studies in 1988, and her master's degree in vocational education studies in 1990 from SIU. She has been the assistant coach at her alma mater the past two years, and served as the head girls basketball coach at Lincoln Junior High School in Carbondale from 1990–92. She also assisted two years at John A. Logan College in Carterville, IL.

Angelia Y. (Angie) Johnson begins her first year as the restricted earnings coach with the University of Wisconsin women's basketball program.

She has served as the assistant basketball coach at the Paul G. Blazer High School in her hometown of Ashland, Ky., the past three years. She was also the head coach for the George M. Verity Middle School one year where her seventh and eighth grade teams combined for a 35-5 record, and coached the Crabbe Elementary school grade school girls.

Johnson was a scholarship player at the University of Louisville from 1987–91. A 5-11 center, she still ranks among the top 10 in career records at Louisville in rebounds and games played with 621 caroms in 120 games played. She led her team as a junior in rebounding with 7.1 per game, and in free throw accuracy hitting .750 percent.

A biology major, she was honored as the Ed Kallay Senior Award winner in 1991, and was a Woodford R. Porter Scholar from 1987–91.

1994-95 Preview — The Dawn of a New Era

he Badger women's basketball team will take on a new look this season—both on the sidelines and on the floor.

New coach, Jane Albright-Dieterle presents BadgerBall, an up-tempo, in-your-face defensive style that's guaranteed to entertain fans and hassle opponents.

While at Northern Illinois University, Albright-Dieterle's teams used such an oppressive defense in combination with a potent offense to lead the nation in 1990 with 94.5 points per game. The 1993 team ranked fifth in the country in scoring with 84.7 points per contest.

The following discussion gives an overview of the the new coach's outlook prior to Albright-Dieterle working with her new team.

"I think the goal of every team in the country is to get to the NCAA tournament.

I don't mind saying that to anybody because no matter where you finished the year before, everybody wants to play in the NCAA tournament."

Why the move to Wisconsin after a successful 10-year tenure at Northern Illinois?

"There was just something inside of me that wanted to try something else. After 10 years, you begin to do the same things year after year. You need a new challenge in a new league."

Wisconsin has not had a tradition of success in women's basketball. What are your first-year goals at Wisconsin, and ultimately, what is the long-term potential of this program?

"Our first-year goal is to make sure that the players have a positive experience within the course of what we're doing whether we're traveling, playing or practicing. That's the foundation. You have to be doing all those things to get in the recruits that you want to get and prove that it's going to be a positive experience for them.


"It's hard to evaluate other first year goals because I haven't seen the team play. But I think every team in the country's goal is to get to the NCAA tournament. I don't mind saying that to anybody because no matter where you finished the year before, everybody wants to play in the NCAA tournament.

Barb Franke has been a member of two USA Junior National teams. What will be her role in this rebuilding process?

"She'll definitely be a strong inside force for us and a major cog in our system. To have an inside-outside tact will be what we strive to have, and from her stats from last year and from the experience she's gained in USA basketball, you add that up and you have a great combination. Anytime you can play in the summer on teams that are that competitive, and everybody else is just playing in pick-up gyms, you have an advantage."

What do you know about the Wisconsin program and its remaining roster of players? What are your concerns going into this year?

"I know very little about the team. We recruited several of the players, but never having played Wisconsin while at Northern, it's not a program that we've really studied a lot. The top players I am aware of from recruiting, but I'll be learning as we go. It's hard to tell about the recruiting class, not having seen most of them play."





"I have also not viewed the team on video. With all the different experiences these players have been through, I thought that



they needed a situation in which they could work really hard over the summer and come in on equal ground. So I told them I wouldn't watch any video. One of the questions in my mind is depth because I haven't seen a number of the players play. I do know that the teams in the Big Ten that are of Final Four caliber have a tremendous amount of depth. I know that is the key when you play a team like lowa. My other concern is the turnovers. It's a bit of an oxymoron to say you lead the Big Ten in shooting percentage but you lead in turnovers, too. So you're not gaining anything if you can't maintain possession and get the shot off. I don't have any tricks up my sleeve accept that the offenses that we put in are not going to be complicated. They're going to be very simple. We're going to play an uptempo run-and-gun kind of basketball. We're going to shoot a lot of times before we have a chance to turn the ball over, I hope."

What style of play will you bring to Wisconsin? Describe "BadgerBall."

"It's an up-tempo type of offense—looking for a good shot and having the freedom to take it. The catalyst for that will be rebounding and defense—being able to control the boards and playing an in-your-face, half-court defense; pressure defense; try to force a lot of turnovers,

steal the ball and capitalize on our defense."

What assets does Wisconsin have from a recruiting standpoint?

"Tremendous untapped potential. The location—it's near Chicago, Milwaukee. The campus is one of the most beautiful I've ever seen. The academics—it's a top academic institution. And just being

involved in an athletic department that in the past several years has become very successful. Being a part of that success makes you very enthusiastic and I think anyone would want to be a part of that."

What does being in the Big Ten Conference mean to you?

"Every game's going to be tough. It doesn't matter which team you're going to be playing, you have to be ready to play. There's not a team in the conference that you can consider a sleeper. We're going to be playing the top teams in the country and against the top coaches in the country. The respect I have for all of them is very high. I think I'll learn a lot from them. I'll probably not say a lot for a long time and just watch and learn from them."


What has been your experience with playing schools in the Big Ten?

"Very positive. We've played them home and away, and we've been able to be very

successful at home, but on the road we haven't been. I think that's part of the magic of the Big Ten. You're supposed to win at home. I've found the teams to be very physical, and to be very well prepared for anything you throw at them, and to have a lot of depth."

How do you feel about the inaugural Big Ten tournament?

"For a program like us that's just trying to get off the ground it's tremendous. We probably won't have our best team on the floor in December or even early January. It gives you a later date to shoot for that you want to be prepared for. It's a second chance type of thing. It gives you some more time and an opportunity to peak when you want to peak."



"Going to new gyms and learning the atmosphere of new gyms. The personnel on the teams, the systems. What they're going to do, what they're known for, the coaches' styles. Although I've never been a coach that's changed a lot of what I've done to counteract what someone else is doing, it's good to know that.

"It will also be an adjustment being from a small community with a very visible product, the best in your own little world, and then you expand your world and you're not the best in it.

"To keep confident and keep a vision of what we're going to be long-term rather what we are this one particular day."

Outside of your goals for the basketball team, what are your other aspirations for your program both this year and in the long-term?

"I think we need to have an impact recruiting class. We're going to go after the top players in the Midwest




Senior guard Sharon Johnson is a defensive specialist that can wreak havoc for opponents with her sticks-like-glue playing capabilities.

and pinpoint some others in areas outside of it. We also need to begin an atmosphere where our game is an event—it's the most talked about thing in town. And hopefully we'll have a product that everyone will to come back and see again and again. I'm very optimistic about our potential for attendance. I also want people to respect our players—that they know who our players are, and that we establish our players as role models in the community. That will show we want to give something to the community and not just take from it."

1993–94 Badger Review

isconsin finished a disappointing season at 13-14, and placed ninth in a tight conference race with six wins and 12 losses. Expectations for the season were high with the return of Barb Franke, the 1992 Big Ten Freshman of the Year, who sat out the 1992-93 season with a knee injury. Franke, a 6-2 center, was a major contributor two years ago when Wisconsin attended its first NCAA tournament and finished the 1991-92 season at 20-9.

The Badgers began the 1993-94 season by winning seven of their first nine games including a six-game win streak to complete the non-conference season with a 7-2 record. Wisconsin opened the Big Ten season with a 67-74 loss to then-second-ranked lowa at home, and immediately added two more close losses on the road to Minnesota (84-89) and Michigan State (59-62). Overall, Wisconsin was 9-6 at home, and 4-8 on the road including losing four Big Ten road games by a total of 13 points (three by three points or less).

A major contributor to the close games was Wisconsin's penchant for turnovers. The Badgers set a school

record 42 turnovers against the Penn State press, and had seven games where they had 30 or more turnovers (4-3 record). Wisconsin averaged a school season record of 25.3 errors per game.

Despite the turnovers, the 1993-94 team did make a positive impact on the Badger record books as the best shooting team in Wisconsin women's basketball history. School season records for best field goal percentage and best three-point field goal percentage were set last season with .466 percent from the field, and a .351 conversion rate on three-point goals.

Wisconsin also had its best shooting performance against Big Ten teams with a field goal percentage of .458. A season record for most free throws attempted was also set with 23.8 attempts per game. The Badgers set a single game best in hitting .621 percent in the 108-58 win over UW-Milwaukee, and set a school record for three-point percentage hitting 10 of 15 or .677 percent in the loss at Minnesota. Individual records for shooting were also set.

Highlighting the individual performances was Franke, who returned from knee surgery to lead the Badgers with 19.2

> points and 8.3 rebounds per game. She earned all-Big Ten secondteam honors while leading the Badgers in scoring in 16 games, and in rebounding in 14 games. She made .555 percent of her field goals (317-571) including 21of-62 from threepoint land (.339 percent). She ranked third in the conference in scoring (21.1) and field goal percentage

Long distance shooter, Dolly Rademaker. averaged 10.3 points per game ast season and finished her career as Wisconsin's alltime three-point goal specialist.

rebounding (8.5). Franke had nine doubledoubles and established new single game career highs of 34 points, 15 rebounds, five assists, and four steals this past season. She was selected to play on the USA Basketball Jones Cup team that won a gold medal in Taiwan last summer.

Franke was supported by 6-1 freshman point guard Katie Voigt, who was second on the team in points and rebounds averaging 12.2 points, 6.4 rebounds, and led in assists with 4.6 per game in her inaugural season. Voigt set five freshmen single game records and was second in three freshmen season records. She was a member of the Big Ten All-Star team that was undefeated in six games while traveling in England last June.

Other starters returning include senior forward Camille Williams, who averaged 9.9 points and 4.5 rebounds, and junior forward Tracy Winkler (5.2 pts/4.5 rebs). Williams had a career high 27 points against Utah while Winkler had career highs of 14 points and 11 rebounds last season.

Guard Sharon Johnson and forward Jennah Burkholder each averaged 20 minutes a game in their reserve roles. Johnson, one of only two seniors on the squad, averaged 6.9 points and 2.4 rebounds. Burkholder was third on the team in rebounding with 5.1 per game, and added 8.0 points per game. Burkholder will take a one-year leave of absence under the NCAA hardship waiver following the birth of her child. She will remain in school and on scholarship, and is expected to return for the 1995-96 basketball season. She will have three years of eligibility remaining.

Guards Stacy Riemer, Kesa Dil-Ion and Karie Cattanach, who returned after knee surgery in 1992, played reserve roles last season. Riemer, a freshman point guard, played in 18 games averaging 5.4 minutes. Cattanach played in all 27 games and averaged 2.3 points. Dillon played in 16 games averaging six minutes per game on the season.

Not returning are seniors **Dolly** Rademaker and Rebecca Leet. Leet received a medical discharge because of post-concussive syndrome from injuries received in during the 1992-93 season Rademaker graduated as Wisconsin's alltime best long-distance shooter. She averaged 10.3 points per game and finished her career as Wisconsin's all-time three-point goal specialist with 173-480 career threepoint goals and attempts for a .360 career percentage.

The Big Ten Conference was the national leader in fans attending men's and women's basketball games, and set national records for both attendance and per-game average, according to the NCAA.

The Big Ten women set a new standard for total attendance for the second straight year with 427,136-up 47,718 from 1993-and became the fourth league in women's history to average more than 2,000 per game (2,926).

Wisconsin has set attendance records in five of the past eight seasons, including averaging over 3,000 fans per conference game in 1992.



he University of Wisconsin benefits from the interest and media exposure associated with the Big Ten Conference, one of the premier athletic conferences in the nation. Big Ten women's athletics programs take pride in leading the nation in basketball and volleyball attendance and in receiving more network and cable television exposure than any conference in the nation.

Begun in 1895, the Intercollegiate Conference of Faculty Representatives (popularly known as the Big Ten) has changed little from its original philosophy of faculty control of athletics with emphasis on the student-athlete.

The women's athletics programs became affiliated with the Conference officially in 1981, although unofficial conference championships had been held among the member institutions since 1972. Penn State became the 11th university to join the conference in 1991.

As a Big Ten school, Wisconsin women athletes compete in conference championships in basketball, cross country, golf, swimming and diving, tennis, indoor and outdoor track and field, and volleyball. A conference women's soccer championship will be added in 1994.

For the first time in 1995, the Big Ten Conference will have a conference tournament that will decide the automatic qualifier for the NCAA Championship. As in the past, however, the league titlist will be

based on the final regular season Conference standings. All teams play a total of 16 games playing six teams twice and four teams once.

The 1995 Big Ten Conference tournament will be held on Friday-Monday, March 3-6, at Hinkle Field House on the Butler University campus in Indianapolis, IN. The inaugural tourney will be a four-day single elimination playoff with all 11 teams participating. The top five seeds (as determined by conference standings) will receive a bye. Winners from the first round game will participate in the quarterfinals on Saturday, followed by the semifinals on Sunday, and finals on Monday.

The conference champion has earned an automatic bid to the NCAA tournament since 1981. Five Big Ten schools have represented the conference in the past two NCAA Championships with Ohio State and lowa advancing to the Final Four in 1993, and Purdue qualifying for the NCAA semifinals in 1994.

In addition to its athletic success, the Big Ten Conference has led the nation in basketball attendance for two consecutive years. Four schools finished in the top 15 in attendance, and overall the league averaged 3,200 spectators per game. Ohio State led the nation with 8,411 spectators per game while lowa was sixth with 6,457, Purdue 14th with 4,487 and Penn State 15th with 4,420. Wisconsin averaged 1,770 spectators in 1993–94.







The Wisconsin Experience

A World-Class University

he University of Wisconsin–Madison, one of the nation's leading institutions of higher education, is dedicated to the support of academic freedom.

Established in 1848, the first class of 17 students enrolled February 5, 1849. Today, UW–Madison ranks as the nation's fifth largest university with 40,924 students. The student body is one of the most diverse in the country with students coming from every state in the country. Wisconsin also ranks fourth in the nation for foreign student enrollment.

More than 4,470 courses and 12,832 sections are offered in UW–Madison's 12 schools and colleges. Majors are available in 151 bachelor's, 191 master's, and 123 doctoral and professional degree programs.

Wisconsin has ranked among the top 10 universities in the United States in every scholarly reputational study since 1910. The quality of its undergraduate, graduate and research programs is recognized around the world.

One survey rated 49 different undergraduate programs at UW-Madison among the top 10 in the nation. Among those ranked include sociology, German, chemical engineering, geography, statistics, plant pathology, molecular biology, biochemistry, Spanish, Portuguese, zoology, political science, chemistry, economics, mathematics, and history.

UW–Madison faculty or alumni have been awarded 12 Nobel Prizes and 20 Pulitzer Prizes. There are 44 faculty members who are winners of Presidential Young Investigator awards, 10 winners of the National Medal of Science, and four Searles scholars. Forty-four professors are members of the National Academy of Sciences, 12 are members of the National Academy of Engineering, and three in the National Academy of Education. The university also ranks fourth in the nation in research and development expenditures.

UW-Madison is one of the nation's first land-grant colleges, establishing a tradition of research in agriculture and the life science. The founders of the university developed the "Wisconsin Idea" as making "the beneficent influence of the university available to every home in the state."


UW-Madison is the largest institution in the University of Wisconsin System. It has the only public law and medical schools in the state as well as the only school of veterinary medicine.

ne of the most picturesque college campuses in the country, UW-Madison lies along the beautiful shores of Lake Mendota.


One mile from the capitol, traveling down historic State Street, the city was designed so the University and state would be linked, signifying the interrelated nature of the academic and political life of Wisconsin.

Madison's lakes, rolling hills, architecture, parks and arboretum have enhanced UW–Madison's reputation for scenic beau-

ty. The city of Madison is frequently listed among the top five best places to live in the nation.

Tree-lined Bascom Hill, which features a bronze statue of Abraham Lincoln, is one of the University's most famous landmarks. Others include North Hall, the first building on campus; the Carillon Tower in front of the Social Science building; the Library Mall, with its clock tower and fountain; and Picnic Point, a 129-acre peninsula complete with hiking and biking trails—one of the most romantic spots on campus.

A favorite area for UW students to congregate is the Memorial Union and its

The Student Body

Imost 41,000 students populate the 900-acre UW campus, including more than 10,372 graduate students in numerous fields.

Although a UW Board of Regents policy limits undergraduate enrollment from outside the state to 25 percent, the University still maintains one of the nation's most diverse student bodies.

Students hail from every county in the state and every state in the nation, as well as from approximately 115 foreign countries. UW–Madison ranks fourth in the nation for total foreign student enrollment.

A greater effort is also being made to recruit and retain minority students and faculty. In 1993–94, African-Americans, Hispanics, Native Americans and other minority groups accounted for 8.3 percent of the student body.

The Community

ocated in southern Wisconsin, Madison is the home of the University of Wisconsin and the state capital. Considered one of the Midwest's most vibrant communities, it offers an endearing quality of life for full-time residents and students.

With a diverse population of 194,591, Madison offers the "big city" spheres of politics, arts and entertainment, as well as the attributes of a small town. It is a family, action-oriented community that promotes participation in government, education, the arts, sports, and recreational activities.

The May 1989 issue of *Outside* magazine rated Madison as one of the top 15 "great sports towns" in the country, based on quantity and quality of outdoor activities, the surrounding environment, and the participation of its population in various sports and recreation.

Madison was also listed as the second most livable city in the nation in a 1993 *Money* magazine survey.



Where Wisconsin Ranks

since 1910, the University of Wisconsin has ranked on the top ten lists in every objective national faculty reputational survey. The quality of Wisconsin's undergraduate, graduate and research programs is recognized worldwide.

The Fiske Guide to Colleges 1994, the best-selling guide to colleges, gives the UW–Madison its highest academic ranking. In fact, UW–Madison is one of the few public universities to receive the five-star rating.

One recent survey rated 49 undergraduate programs at the UW–Madison among the top ten in the nation. The university has also ranked fourth for the last several years in research funding among the nation's universities.

Academic, financial, and other rankings are summarized below to offer a flavor of the quality at the University of Wisconsin–Madison.



Funding and Support

- ➤ Federal Grants: UW–Madison ranked ninth nationally in 1991, receiving 1.2 percent of the federal budget for research.
- ➤ Research and Development
 Funds: UW-Madison ranked fourth in the
 country for research and development
 expenditures in 1993, with \$372.4 million,
 according to the National Science Foundation.
- ▶ **Tuition:** Over the last 10 years, tuition for resident undergraduates at the UW–Madison has been consistently lower than the average for public Big Ten schools. The UW–Madison has the second-lowest resident undergraduate tuition, behind the University of lowa, and the third-lowest nonresident undergraduate tuition of the public Big Ten institutions.
- ➤ **Private Support:** UW–Madison ranked fifth in the nation, and first among public institutions in 1992–93 by receiving \$164 million in private support.
- ➤ **Alumni:** UW–Madison is the number one ranked independently financed alumni group in the Midwest and the second largest in the U.S.

Research

- ➤ Research Activity Index: A productive, public research university, Wisconsin ranks fourth among all institutions in research and development expenditures.
- ➤ **Doctoral Degrees:** UW-Madison is a national leader in number of doctoral degrees awards. Between the school's founding and 1993, the University of Wisconsin–Madison awarded 29,628 Ph.D.s.

Departmental Academic Rankings

- ▶ **Liberal Arts:** In its first ranking of graduate programs in the liberal arts in 1992, *U.S. News & World Report* listed UW-Madison's sociology department as tops in the country. The magazine also ranked psychology 12th, history ninth, political science 10th, economics 11th, and engineering 12th.
- ▶ **Education:** The School of Education is the nation's best according to a survey by the University of Illinois released in 1990. The UW's educational administration and educational policy studies rank second.
- ▶ College of Agricultural and Life Sciences: In 1993, the College of Agricultural and Life Sciences was ranked one of the top 10 agricultural schools in the country according to Farm Futures magazine
- ➤ Journalism and Mass Communication: The faculty at the School of Journalism and Mass Communication was

- rated first in the nation in research productivity in 1988 by *Journalism Quarterly*.
- ▶ **Science Programs:** According to *U.S. News and World Report's* annual graduate school ratings, published in March 1993, six UW–Madison science programs ranked in the top 12: computer science, tied for eighth; biology, tied for ninth; chemistry, 10th; nursing, tied for 11th; health-sciences administration, tied for 12th; and engineering, 12th.
- ► **Libraries:** The UW–Madison has the 13th largest university library system in the United States, with more than 5.4 million books in 40 locations across campus.
- ▶ **Graduates:** Standard & Poor's 1992 survey lists the University of Wisconsin as one of the nation's top producers of corporate executives, ranking second in undergraduate degrees and fourth in undergraduate and graduate degrees.



UW-Madison Sets the Pace

- ▶ with the oldest Scandinavian studies (1875), psychology (1888), agricultural economics (1909), genetics (1910) and wildlife management (1939) departments in the United States
- ▶ in discovering Vitamins A and B
- ▶ with the oldest radio station in the nation—WHA—which began broadcasting in 1917
- ➤ as the Memorial Union became the first public university union to serve beer in 1933
- ▶ in finding in 1937 that niacin supplementation prevents pellagra, a deadly disease that killed 5,000 people a year
- ▶ with the nation's first department of wildlife management in 1939
- ▶ in the synthesizing of genes. Former biochemistry professor Har Gobind Khorana synthesizes the first gene, for which he later receives the Nobel Prize in 1968
- ▶ in finding which wavelength of ultraviolet light produces skin cancer
- ▶ in discovering the anti-cancer drug, fluorouracil
- ➤ as Elizabeth and James Miller, UW Medical School professor of oncology and professor emeritus of oncology, were the first to identify characteristics among chemicals that cause cancer
- ▶ with launching the Orbiting Astronomical Observatory, the world's first true observatory in space
- ▶ in revolutionizing brain surgery, as Dr. Manucher Javid, UW Medical School professor of surgery, became the first neurosurgeon to use a solution from the age-old compound area during brain surgery on a human
- ▶ in developing tests for phenylketonuria (PKU), a congenital disease of children
- ▶ as UW-Madison researchers describe the atomic structure of a common cold virus
- ▶ in developing new techniques to measure bone tissue loss, known as osteoporosis
- ▶ with the Biotron, a research building that can control environmental conditions for experimental purposes
- with bone marrow transplants. Using techniques developed at UW–Madison, the first bone marrow transplant in the U.S. was done at UW Hospital. Today, more than 10,000 transplants are performed yearly, giving new hope to patients with leukemia and immune deficiency diseases



- ➤ in finding evidence linking cancer in laboratory animals with saccharin and cyclamates
- ▶ in finding that the anti-estrogen drug tamoxifen can prevent breast cancer from recurring in certain women who have had cancer previously
- ▶ as UW Hospital and Clinics develop the nation's first Mobile Critical Care Unit, which duplicates facilities of a hospital intensive care unit and laboratories



- ▶ with the first and only medical physics department in the nation to exist within a medical school
- ▶ with the establishment of the Center for Dairy Research, the nation's first such center to be established at a university
- ▶ in organ preservation breakthroughs. In 1987, Dr. Folkert Belzer used a cold storage preservation solution to preserve dog livers up to 36 hours and dog pancreases up to 72 hours. Clinical use of this new solution decreases the need for emergency transplantation, increases the number of livers and pancreases available to people who need transplants, and improves organ sharing among transplant centers
- with Dr. Howard M. Temin (deceased) of McArdle Laboratory and his coworker discovering reverse transcriptase (Independently discovered by Dr. David Baltimore). This enzyme explains how retroviruses cause cancer and AIDS. Temin's work in this field led to his selection as a co-recipient of the 1975 Nobel Prize in Medicine.

Athletics at the UW

he University of Wisconsin–Madison offers its student-athletes one of the premier intercollegiate athletic programs in the country.

A member of the prestigious Big Ten Conference, Wisconsin offers its studentathletes the best in education, opportunities, coaching and on-field competition at the NCAA Division I level.

With a number of sports begun more than 100 years ago, men's teams compete in basketball, cross country, football, golf, ice hockey, rowing, swimming and diving, soccer, tennis, track and field, and wrestling.

Established July 1, 1974, the nine-sport women's athletic program offers basketball, cross country, golf, rowing, soccer, swimming and diving, tennis, track and field, and volleyball. Wisconsin will be adding fast-pitch softball in 1995–96 and lacrosse in 1996–97.

Wisconsin has ranked among the top 25 NCAA Division I programs for the past two years. In 1993–94, Wisconsin finished 12th in the Sears/National Association of Collegiate Directors of Athletics Directors Cup competition, which recognizes the best Division I college sports program in the nation.

In 1993-94, 18 of Wisconsin's 20 sports qualified as teams or individuals for their respective national championships.



The University of Wisconsin women's golf team won its first Big Ten Conference championship in 1994 and also qualified for its first NCAA tournament.


The Badger football team won the 1994 Rose Bowl while the women's soccer finished among the top eight teams in the NCAA soccer tournament. Other teams qualifying for NCAA post-season appearances were men's basketball, men's and women's cross country, men's and women's golf, ice hockey, men's and women's rowing, men's and women's soc-




Left: The women's soccer team finished among the top eight teams in the nation in 1993. Women's soccer will become a Big Ten Conference sport for the first time in 1994.






Associate Director Cheryl Marra


Associate Director Joel Maturi


Associate Director Alan Zussman


Cademic excellence is emphasized at Wisconsin. Much of the credit for the impressive academic record behind many Badger athletes is the counseling system available to the student-athletes.

The counseling staff takes a personal approach to each athlete in determining his or her individual needs, personal or academic.

Student-athletes may receive academic honors in a number of ways. The Big Ten Conference honors scholar athletes with Academic all-Big Ten honors while the UW Athletic Board names Athletic Board Scholars for the highest grade point average in each sport. In addition, student-athletes may be nominated for Academic All-America honors through the sports information office.

Scholarships

UW-Madison is proud to offer to its prospective student-athletes one of the most comprehensive athletic scholarship programs in the nation. As a Division I member of the National Collegiate Athletic Association (NCAA), scholarships are awarded to athletes on a one-year renewable basis if scholastic and athletic commitment are maintained.

Scholarships are available in all varsity sports with the exception of rowing, which does not grant scholarships. Full scholarships include the cost of room and board in addition to tuition and fees. The selection of scholarship recipients is based on athletic ability and projected academic success at the University of Wisconsin-Madison.

Sports Medicine


he care, prevention, and treatment of injuries to Wisconsin athletes is supervised by a staff of six N.A.T.A.-certified athletic trainers. Wisconsin's Sports Medicine program features start-of-the art facilities and the services of leading sports medicine and health care professionals.

Under the direction of head athletic trainer **Dennis Helwig**, the Sports Medicine program focuses on injury prevention. Staff members **Chuck Hart**, **Jan Helwig**, **Mike Johnson**, **Barb Pearson**, **Henry Perez-Guerra**, and **Andy Winterstein** utilize Cybex strength-testing devices, provide dietary analysis, measure physiological capacity and outline programs to improve flexibility. Should an injury occur, athletes are seen immediately by team physicians affiliated with the UW Hospitals and Clinics headed by **Dr. Ben Graf**.

In addition to the headquarters in the McClain Athletic Facility, auxiliary training rooms are located in the Stadium, Coliseum, Natatorium, and UW Field house. All training areas are equipped with the finest therapeutic modalities and rehabilitative apparatus. Other medical specialists assigned to iathletics also assist in the diagnosis and treatment of the athletes.

Strength & Conditioning

he Wisconsin strength and conditioning program is a sophisticated blend of science, technology and one-onone attention to each athlete.

Weight training areas in the McClain Center and Camp Randall Stadium feature Nautilus equipment, free weights, and stereo music in spacious, carpeted rooms. Four full-time and one part-time weight training instructors monitor and advise all Wisconsin student-athletes. Head strength and conditioning coach John Dettman along with assistant coaches Robert Hackett, Steve Myrland and Laura Graf along with part-time assistant Stieg Theander work with the individual sport coaches to develop programs specific for that sport.

The UW also offers a sports nutrition program to assist athletes in meeting their nutritional demands and body composition goals.

Sports Information

irecting the communications for the nine women's sports in the Division of Intercollegiate Athletics is the responsibility of the Women's Sports Information Office. This office utilizes a variety of communications systems to provide student-athletes the opportunity to be recognized for their athletic endeavors.

The office provides and maintains many resources such as records, fact sheets, photographic files, statistics, media guides and event programs in meeting the information requests of the media, coaches, administrators, opponents and the general public.

Women's Sports Information Director **Tamara J. Flarup**, associate director **Diane K. Nordstrom** and intern **Debbie Rosenfeld** maintain close contact with local, regional and national media as well as the athlete's hometown media in providing information. The office prepares news releases, designs sports brochures and media guides, covers all women's sports, and provides post-event results for print and electronic media

Wisconsin Sports Facilities

A thletes at the University of Wisconsin benefit from outstanding sports facilities. From practice and competitive areas to athletic and weight training, Wisconsin offers modern and well-equipped facilities for its athletes.

The Wisconsin Field House, which seats 11,500, is the practice and competitive facility for the Badger basketball and volleyball teams. It is also used as a competitive arena for wrestling. The Field House features four locker rooms, an athletic training area and state-of-the art scoreboard, sound and lighting systems.

The Camp Randall Memorial Sports Center or Shell, located next to Camp Randall Football Stadium, is a multi-purpose facility used by all students. A 200-meter Mondo rubber track surrounds four basketball or volleyball courts that double as throwing and jumping areas for indoor track meets. With a seating capacity of 2,500, the Shell is the site of numerous track meets including the 1992 Big Ten Men's Track Championship.

One of the most versatile buildings is the McClain Athletic Facility. Over 76,000 square feet of artificial turf offers the ideal indoor practice facility for football, soccer and track. The lower level features the headquarters of the Badgers Sports Medicine facility and a fully-equipped weight

room. Locker rooms for football and men's and women's track are also located on the lower level.

The Wisconsin tennis teams have a competitive advantage to play year-round at one of the best college facilities in the

United States—the Nielsen Tennis Stadium. The stadium features 18 tennis courts (12 indoor and six outdoor), five squash courts, one squash doubles court. and seats 1,500 spectators. The stadium is named for Arthur C. Nielsen, founder of the Nielsen television rating system. Nielsen captained the Wisconsin men's tennis team from 1916 to 1918 while a student in electrical engineering.

The newest facility at Wisconsin is the outdoor track and soccer complex located at the west end of campus. The Dan McClimon Memorial Track, named for the former UW men's coach, features a newly resurfaced 400-meter, Martin rubber track. The track, which was the site of the 1994 Big Ten Conference Outdoor Track Championship, surrounds the Olympic size, natural grass soccer field. The facility, which is fully lighted, was completed during the fall of 1993. Building permanent seating with locker rooms and a media facility is scheduled to begin in the near future.

The swimming and diving teams have the luxury of two pools for practice and competition—the Natatorium and Southeast Recreational Facility. The "Nat" contains an eight-lane, 25-yard racing pool equipped with an automatic Colorado Timing System and digital readout score board. The 50' x 40' separate diving well is fitted with three one-meter and two threemeter Dura (Maxi) Flex boards. The SERF facility features an indoor long course pool





The Wisconsin Field House, home to the Wisconsin basketball and volleyball teams, was the site of the 1993 NCAA Division I Women's Volleyball Championship.

with movable bulkheads that more than double the program's training space.

Situated between five lakes, Madison is the perfect location for a rowing program. The Badger crews are headquartered in the boat house, situated on Lake Mendota. The boat house provides the Badger crews with an indoor rowing tank during the winter season. During the warm months, crews can often be seen on any one of the five Madison lakes.

With the opening of University Ridge in 1991, UW golfers now have the opportunity to compete on the new UW golf course. The par 72, 18-hole course was designed by Robert Trent Jones Jr. The facility also features a 15,000 square foot practice green and 5,000 square foot chipping green.





