



Chorus



Class History

The first year the ship traveled safely over the rough waves, but when the ship started the second year La-Vern Hamilton and Gerald Omoen had failed to report to the captain. It was during this year that William Hainer first reported to spend part of his time on our ship. The following year another classmate, Margarete Thmoms, stepped on board, but Catherine Conley and Glenn Christopher withdrew.

In our Junior year we put on a three act play, "The Whole Town's Talking", and we presented the senior class with a prom. At the opening of our senior year Fern Strang had transferred to another ship, and during the year John Theobald discontinued his travels.

While on this ship we have had many members on the basketball and baseball teams each year, and many of our class have taken part in the band, chorus, and all the forensic activities.



Compiling identical records of 11 wins and one defeat by which it won undisputed titles in 1935 and 1936, Barneveld high school's basketball team won its third straight championship and copped all team honors this year in the Iowa County league; it again failed to produce the individual scoring champion. Final scoring statistics released today show that league records were never endangered.

Bob Benish, black-thatched Highland forward, won individual scoring honors for the league by amassing 91 points, six more than Eldon Temby, Rewey forward, could must-

ter. In winning the individual scoring crown, Benish brought that honor to his school for the second successive year. Joe Egan, forward, won the crown in 1936 with 94 points.
