

HISTORY OF CAMP RANDALL STADIUM

They call it Camp Randall.

That's important.

Every now and then some hurried out-of-town sports announcer will call it "Randall Field," but he is corrected quickly.

The University of Wisconsin is proud that its sports center is more than just an athletic field—and that the drama and excitement of football seasons are set against a backdrop of colorful Wisconsin history.

In its 76 years of ownership, the University has expanded the facilities there until they include a large stadium, fieldhouse, memorial practice building and football practice fields.

But the University didn't name it. The name was decided long before that by veterans of the Civil War who knew it was a great military camp named for a wartime governor. When the University took it over they insisted that the name be preserved forever as a memorial to their fallen friends.

In the days before the Civil War, the site was owned by the State Agricultural Society whose yearly state fairs attracted holidaying throngs there. With the outbreak of the war, however, the society turned the place over to the government to become the state's major training center.

The display halls were transformed into white-washed barracks and the hall used for flower shows became a hospital. A total of 70,000 troops was drilled—usually about 7,000 being stationed there at a time—and 500,000 relatives and friends came to visit them.

Later in the war part of the camp became a prison where a group of sick Confederates, captured by Gen. Pope at Island No. 10 in the Mississippi, was brought. Many died in the drafty prison hospital on the knoll and were buried in what is now Confederate Rest at Forest Hill cemetery.

The land again became the state fair grounds when peace returned and when Gen. U. S. Grant visited it 15 years later he hailed the transformation as "a symbol of beating the spears of war into the plowshares of peace."

Other visitors to the grounds were Gens. Sherman and Sheridan and Pres. Hayes. When the state fair was moved to Milwaukee and a few years later even the Dane County Agricultural society stopped using it for fairs, the Civil War veterans were furious to learn the land was to be sold for building lots.

Blasting the "sordid sacrilege," they urged the legislature to buy it and in 1893 the state presented it to the University as a memorial athletic field.

When the question of a name arose, the veterans promptly carried the day for "camp" instead of "Field."

Intercollegiate athletics had been started at Wisconsin in 1881 and the University has had a football team since 1889. The school won its first great victory in 1894, defeating Minnesota 6-0 in a game on the lower campus that part of the crowd watched from fringed surreys. The great teams of '96, '97, and '01 were among the first to play at the new field.

Charles Van Hise, who became president of the University in 1903, was a sports enthusiast as well as a great president and he used to ride his horse nightly out to watch the football practice. Games were played before the old wood fairstand and many Madison business and professional men still boast of the holes they found as boys to insure a free look at the fun.

The University had a "real" stadium by 1913 but its stands were still wooden. The legislature declined to pay for concrete—and consequently, was promptly blamed when a large section collapsed Nov. 21, 1915, at the climactic Wisconsin-Minnesota game.

Twenty people were injured, some seriously, and only the fact that the seats fell slowly prevented more casualties among the 1,800 in the area.

So in 1917 the present stadium—following completion of the past year's addition—was started with a grant of \$15,000 from the legislature. The rest of the money was earned by athletic events and the stadium, which now seats 77,280, is the only one in the Big Ten to "pay its own way" that way. Permanent dormitories were built, housing 150 men, but this space now is used as athletic department offices and training quarters.


The first game to be played in Camp Randall Stadium was the 1917 homecoming game against Minnesota's Golden Gophers. The Badgers won the game 10-7 to hand the Gophers their only Big Ten loss, relegating them to second place in the final conference standings. A week later, Ohio State visited Camp Randall and inflicted a 16-3 defeat on the Badgers: the Ohioans won the title that year with an unbeaten record. Wisconsin placed in a tie for third place with Northwestern.

The fieldhouse at the open end of the stadium horseshoe was built in 1930 for almost \$500,000 and has a seating capacity of 13,800 for basketball games and other events.

The original capacity of the stadium when first utilized in 1917 was 10,000, with permanent seats being added in stages to increase seating capacity.

The current construction project is the third since the end of World War II which began with the completion of the horseshoe at the north end in 1950 and 1951.

The running track was eliminated in 1958 expansion which saw the playing field of Camp Randall lowered by ten feet to add almost 12,000 seats to the stadium capacity which grew to 63,435 at that time.

Hirsch Guides Wisconsin Athletic Program

Elroy "Crazylegs" Hirsch is dynamic, enthusiastic, direct, forceful, and a practical leader.

His successful "Operation Turn-Around" is now in its third year and he's accomplished the task of leading Wisconsin's athletic program back into a position of national prominence.

Elroy accepted the athletic directorship on February 28, 1969 and was the overwhelming choice of Badger alumni and fans for the job. He's the seventh man to serve as athletic director in the school's history.

His boundless energies have taken him into every area of the State of Wisconsin and the nation in the past year meeting high school coaches, administrators, athletes, fans and followers on their home grounds. "Operation Turn-Around" carried the Badger leader into over 60 communities encompassing over 80 high schools personally visited.

He is a living legend to followers of Wisconsin football and to sports fans and people throughout the entire state even though he played just one season — as a sophomore in 1942 — for the Badgers.

His career has been one of success.

Wisconsin fans, especially the older generation, remember him as the great triple threat halfback on Harry Stuhldreher's 1942 football team that won eight games, lost only to Iowa, and tied Notre Dame.

He played at Michigan in 1943, as a Marine trainee, and he not only played football, but basketball, track and baseball. He won his "M" in each sport, the only athlete ever to accomplish such a feat at Michigan.

He had a successful professional football career, first as halfback with the Chicago Rockets of the post-war All-America Conference, and later with the Los Angeles Rams for nine seasons as one of the all-time great ends.

He was a successful executive with the Rams, first as general manager of the team, and later as assistant to the president of the team, a job he relinquished to accept the job as Wisconsin athletic director.

How did Elroy Hirsch receive the nickname "Crazylegs"?

It happened in the Wisconsin-Great Lakes game at Chicago in October, 1942 as Hirsch reeled off a 61 yard scoring run. Francis Powers of the Chicago Daily News coined the phrase which was to remain with him throughout his career in the press box that afternoon.

As Hirsch recalls, "One of my feet was going one way, the other one in another direction on that run. I must have been a sight running down the sidelines."

And now that Elroy Hirsch is Wisconsin athletic director, does he prefer to be called Elroy or "Crazylegs"?

He answered that question easily for a reporter at a press conference when accepting the job: "Any name is better than Elroy."

Hirsch's play as a 19-year-old sophomore on Wisconsin's 1942 football team carried the Badgers to the brink of the national championship

that season. Only a 6-0 defeat by Iowa at Iowa City deprived the Badgers of Big Ten and national championships. The Wausau native rushed for 766 yards on 141 carries — his best was 174 yards on 22 attempts vs. Missouri — and his overall contribution added 226 yards passing, 390 yards on receptions and runbacks of punts, kickoffs, and interceptions plus eight touchdowns, five by rushing and three by passing.

His play on Michigan's 1943 football team helped the Wolverines to a 6-0 conference record and a share of the Big Ten title with Purdue. The team's only loss was to Notre Dame and again the team he played for was ranked No. 3 in the final Associated Press poll behind Notre Dame and Iowa Sea-hawks.

Hirsch signed with the Chicago Rockets of the All-America Conference after the war, but the three years he spent carrying the ball for the Rockets — 1946-48 — were not happy ones. Hirsch suffered a fractured skull, a back injury, a badly torn right leg ligament, and enough other aches and sprains to keep him immobilized on the bench or in the hospital for the major portion of his three years with Chicago.

Hirsch broke with the Rockets in the summer of 1949 and signed with the Los Angeles Rams. Because of his injury-weakened right knee, Clark Shaughnessy, then Rams' head coach, put Hirsch on a daily running routine, dreamed up a special headguard to protect Hirsch from further injury, and switched him to an end position.

It was at end that "Crazylegs" was to attain new heights in his career. The Rams, in transition to the modern passing game, often split him wide as a receiver and finally moved him permanently to end — establishing him as the first flanker.


Hirsch was one of the athletes — like Otto Graham and Sam Huff and Gino Marchetti — who brought special talents to the sport in the 1950's as it changed from two-way players to offensive and defensive specialists under free substitution.

The flankers have done much to provide glamor for the sport, their lithe bodies racing rapidly downfield to haul in a pass, and Hirsch's talents insured his place in that development.

In 1951, Hirsch displayed all his talents as he put together one of the finest seasons in National Football League history. He gained 1,495 yards on receptions, an all-time record approached only by Bobby Mitchell of the Washington Redskins (1,436 yards in 1963) and Hirsch had only twelve weeks to set the record, not 14, like Mitchell!

That same season Hirsch caught 17 touchdown passes to tie the league record set by Don Hutson of the Packers in 1942. He also caught at least one touchdown pass through 11 consecutive games over the 1950 and 1951 seasons.

Hirsch grabbed 343 passes for 6,299 yards and 53 touchdowns during his career with the Rams.

He retired in 1957. He was named into the Wisconsin Hall of Fame in 1965 and to professional football's Hall of Fame at Canton, Ohio in 1968.

More recently, he was honored by being named to the all-1950's team commemorating the National Football League's 50th anniversary season and subsequently, to the all-time All-Star NFL team as selected by designated voters in cities holding NFL franchises.

"Crazylegs" also proved himself a talented actor — he made three movies: Zero Hour, Unchained, and the famed *Crazy Legs*, released in 1953, in which Hirsch played himself.

Hirsch joined the Union Oil Company in 1957 as director of sports and special events. He left Union Oil to accept the position of general manager of the Los Angeles Rams in 1960. When the club was sold to Daniel F. Reeves in 1963, Hirsch became his assistant.

As general manager, Hirsch was responsible for budget, negotiation of all contracts with players and coaches, supervision of the scouting system and college draft, and all other club business.

Elroy was married to the former Ruth Stahmer on June 27, 1946. The couple has two children — Win Stephen, 21, and Patricia Carolina, 13.

John Jardine Heads Wisconsin Football Program

Football Coach

John Jardine is Wisconsin's 23rd head football coach; he came to Wisconsin from a highly successful assistantship at UCLA where he was offensive line coach under Coach **Tommy Prothro** for five seasons, a period in which UCLA posted an overall record of 35-13-3.

In his first season as head coach Jardine guided the Badgers to an overall 4-5-1 record and a fifth place tie finish in Big Ten play.

The 36-year-old Jardine prepped at St. George High school in Evanston, Ill., playing in the tough Chicago Catholic League where he lettered in football, basketball and swimming.

He pursued his collegiate athletic career at Purdue, and, although weighing just 186 pounds, **John** was a good, tough guard for the Boilermakers in 1955, 1956 and 1957 and was a starter in both his junior and senior years.

John began his coaching career at Central Catholic High school in Lafayette, Indiana, in 1958 and then moved into the head coaching job at Fenwick High school in Oak Park, Illinois, where in five seasons his teams won 51 games, lost 6 and tied one. He guided Fenwick into Chicago Catholic League title games in 1959, 1960 and 1962, winning in 1959 and 1962. His 1959 team lost to Lane Tech in the Chicago city championship game, but his 1962 team compiled an unbeaten record and blanked Schurz High school 40-0 in winning the Chicago city title.

He left the prep ranks following the 1963 season to join Purdue's football staff under **Jack Mollenkopf** as offensive line coach, where his assignment covered working with the guards and centers and he was also assigned to recruit the Chicago area.

After spending 1964 at Purdue, he joined **Tommy Prothro** at UCLA in 1965.

The native Chicagoan is the son of **James Jardine**, the city's water commissioner; his brother **Len**, head coach coach at Brown, also played football at Purdue. **John** is married to the former **Janice Ensign** of River Forest, Illinois, and they have four children—two sons and two daughters.

From the moment the new Badger head coach arrived in Madison he was heralded as somewhat of a mixture between **Vince Lombardi** and **Zorro**—a man who in the eyes of most fans could perform the miracle of bringing Wisconsin football back to respectability. An enormous amount of pressure was created by enthusiastic fans talking about winning football, and Rose Bowl, and one local sportswriter seeing him as a young **Knute Rockne**.

Coach Jardine, however, remained more "down to earth" than most of the Badger backers. He emphasized that he is no miracle worker; that it will be a long tough climb toward the top. The following are some of **John Jar-**

dine's comments on the task ahead, the Wisconsin team and his philosophy on how athletics pertain to college life.

ON ACCEPTING THE JOB AT WISCONSIN—"I actively sought the position at Wisconsin. I went after it with reckless abandon, so to speak. I wanted it and I didn't care if I was first choice or ninth choice. I'm not the least bit interested in the past. I'm interested in the future. I'm not interested in how things were, I'm interested in how things are going to be. I said we'd win. I didn't say how many games we'd win, but I sure hope I never go into a season thinking it's going to be a losing season."

ON STYLE OF FOOTBALL—"We will place the emphasis on speed and quickness rather than weight. That's one thing we're bringing from UCLA. We will probably go overboard on speed as much as anything. After seeing Wisconsin films our coaches told me we have to quicken up. We plan to put the ball in the air quite a bit, but I would love to find a running quarterback."

ON RAPPORT WITH PLAYERS—"I hope my athletes will confide in me with their non-athletic problems as well as athletic problems. It's been that way everywhere I've been. I demand respect. I want to get to know my players' problems and I want them to know I'm interested in helping them solve them. I don't plan to make an issue over long hair, because that's the style today among youngsters. The only thing I've said is that the helmet should fit close to the head for safety."

ON ATTITUDE—"The most important thing in football is mental attitude. The team with the great mental attitude and concentration is going to win. We made the policy that nothing will interfere with the football program." **Coach Jardine** indicated he will be a disciplinarian on the field but the players will be given more latitude off the field. "We hope it is such that the kids have pride and live like athletes. As long as they don't do anything to bring disgrace on the University and football team, they can do anything they want."

ON RECRUITING—"We feel there are fine football players in the State of Wisconsin and these are the boys we are going after. Naturally we are interested in the so-called blue chip athlete wherever he is in the United States, but we aren't going to spin our wheels waiting for him to make up his mind about coming to Wisconsin. Our plans are not to talk about any other school, but to talk about our own university. I think it's taken for granted that it's a fine academic institution. Our only thought in selling a boy on coming here is that this is going to be an exciting era at Wisconsin and we want him to be part of it. We believe we are going to be a winning football team and we'd like them to be a part of something new and exciting. I think this appeals to young men, to be in on the groundwork, so to speak, of a rejuvenation."

WISCONSIN FOOTBALL OUTLOOK FOR 1971

Wisconsin football fortunes were on the upswing in 1970 in **John Jardine's** first season as Badger head coach and there are plenty of reasons to be optimistic that the upswing will continue in 1971.

The Badgers finished 1970 with a 4-5-1 record, best since a 5-4 mark in 1963, and their 3-4 record in Big Ten play was good for a tie for fifth place in the conference. Wisconsin outscored its ten opponents for the first time since 1963, by a 198-195 margin, and the Badgers' 148-144 edge over conference opponents was the first since 1962.

Back-to-back wins over Illinois 29-17 and Minnesota 39-14 in the final two games of the season marked the first time since 1963 that the Badgers had won two games in succession and road victories over the Illini and by 30-12 over Indiana were the first away from home since 1966.

The other Badger win was a 29-16 upset of a tough Penn State team in Camp Randall and was **Jardine's** first victory as a head coach. The Badgers also tied Texas Christian 14-14, and battled hard before losing to Oklahoma 21-7, Iowa 24-14, Northwestern 24-14, Michigan 29-15 and Ohio State 24-7.

The upswing on the gridiron was reflected in increased attendance as Wisconsin set single game and season attendance marks. Successive record crowds of 72,389 and 72,758 at Camp Randall for the Michigan and Ohio State games, respectively, helped to establish a school record 377,335 total attendance for six home games, an average of 62,889. Wisconsin rose from 19th among NCAA schools in total attendance and 20th in average attendance in 1969 into the top ten in the nation in both categories in 1970.

Many of the Badgers who played key roles in the 1970 season will be back for 1971, particularly on offense. In fact, nine 1970 starters, including all regular receivers and backs, are among the 23 returning lettermen expected to see action in 1971.

Heading the list of offensive returnees is the explosive passing combination of quarterback Neil Graff and tight end Larry Mialik. The two, both seniors, combined for completions 33 times in 1970, producing 702 yards and 7 touchdowns, including scores of 68, 64, 52 and 50 yards. The average length of those seven touchdown passes was 40.4 yards.

Graff was the Big Ten's leading passer in 1970 and he set a school record with 1561 yards in total offense. His total of 11 scoring passes was one shy of the school record set by **Jim Haluska** in 1952 and his two-year total of 18 is only two short of **Haluska's** career record of 20.

Graff is also well on his way toward career school records for attempts, completions, passing yardage and total offense. In 1971 he will also have his two starting wide receivers back to throw to—seniors split end **Terry Whittaker** (15 catches for 242 yards) and flanker **Albert Hannah** (10 catches for 156 yards).

Three juniors who performed well in the spring intra-squad game—flanker **Tim Klosek** (6 catches for 79 yards), split end **Mike Haas** (4 for 34) and tight end **Tom Lonnborg** (3 for 23)—provide depth among receivers.

Backing up **Graff** will be senior **Rudy Steiner**, who completed 10 of 12 for 110 yards in the spring game, junior **Dan Baron**, and sophomore **Larry Clawson**.

The Badgers are also deep in running backs, where junior tailback **Rufus 'Roadrunner' Ferguson**, with 588 yards and six touchdowns, and senior fullback **Alan 'A-Train' Thompson**, with 455 yards and five touchdowns, return.

Thompson had a sensational sophomore year, gaining 907 yards on the ground and scoring nine times, but played with a nagging knee injury in 1970. An operation cleared up those problems and the "A-Train" should be ready to improve on his number four position in school history in career rushing (his present total of 1362 places him behind **Danny Lewis'** 1460) and his number eight position in career scoring (with 86 points).

Ferguson is a compact (5'6", 186 pounds), speedy runner who can go inside or out. He had scoring runs

of 65 yards, vs. Indiana, and 47, vs. Northwestern, in 1970 and he gained over 100 yards in a game twice last year.

The Badgers will also operate frequently from the Wishbone-T formation, bringing in **Lance Moon** at tailback, replacing the flanker. **Moon**, a senior, has size and speed and was impressive in spring drills. Also impressive was junior fullback **Gary Lund**, who held down the number one spot in **Thompson's** absence, and further depth is provided by senior fullback **John Krugman** and junior tailback **Tim Austin**.

Up ahead of the running backs, the right side of the interior line will be manned by two returning regulars—senior guard **Roger Jaeger** (6-2, 225) and junior tackle **Keith Nosbusch** (6-2, 232)—reversing the positions they held in 1970.

Competition for the remaining three offensive spots is close. Junior **Mike Passini** (6-2, 209) holds a slight edge over sophomore **Mike Webster** (6-1, 218) at center; junior **Bob Braun** (6-3, 224) is likely to start ahead of sophomore **Mike Becker** (6-2, 225) at left guard; and at left tackle senior **Mike Smolich** (6-4, 232) has a good shot at displacing two-year regular **Elbert Walker** (6-4, 285).

The Badger defense gave up 195 points in 1970, a tremendous improvement from the 349 points allowed the previous year.

However, many of the key performers from the defensive unit have been lost by graduation. These include three-fourths of the front line—ends **Bill Gregory** and **Ted Jefferson** and tackle **Jim DeLisle**—linebackers **Chuck Winfrey** and **Gary Buss**, and cornerbacks **Danny Crooks** and **Nate Butler**. Only four starters—tackle **Mike Mayer**, linebacker **Dave Lokane**, and safeties **Neovia Greyer** and **Ron Buss**—return.

Sophomores showed great improvement during spring practice and four are likely to start. One of them, 6-3, 210 **Angie Messina**, appears to have beaten **Mayer**, a 6-2, 255 junior, out of the starting right tackle spot, and another, 6-2, 215 **Jim Schymanski**, will play left tackle.

Next to **Schymanski**, at end, will probably be junior **Bob Streck** (6-5, 235) who saw considerable action last year at tackle. Opposite **Streck**, at right end, will be **Bill Poindexter** (6-2, 215) the only senior who will see action along the defensive line.

Lokane, a 6-1, 220 junior, has been moved to the middle from right linebacker and should step into the shoes of **Winfrey**, last year's MVP. Flanking him will be two sophomores—**John Hoffman** (6-1, 210) on the right and **Todd Nordwic** (6-3, 215) on the left.

Also in the running for a linebacker spot will be juniors **Dave Schrader** (6-3, 194), a 1970 letterman and **Mike Levenhagen** (6-1, 206) and sophomore **Brian Harney** (6-1, 215), with senior **Ed Albright**, a 1969 starter who missed last season, hoping to make a comeback.

Greyer, at weak safety will be the only senior on the defensive squad who started in 1970 and will be looked for to provide leadership. He had nine of the Badgers' 22 interceptions last year, ranking him third in the nation, and has 13 for his career. Both figures are school records and **Greyer** will be out to extend those marks and should be in the running for national honors in the process.

Returning at strong safety will be **Ron Buss**, who ranked sixth on the squad in tackles last year with 69, four more than **Greyer**. **Buss** also had four interceptions, the same number that **Greyer** had in his rookie campaign.

There's a major problem with the departure of both regular cornerbacks, Crooks and Butler. Both had three interceptions in 1970; Butler led the team in passes broken up (10) and touchdown saves (3); while Crooks was the leading punt and kickoff returner, running back one of each for a touchdown to become the first Badger to accomplish such a feat in a single season.

Senior **Greg 'Grape Juice' Johnson**, who had a frustrating year as a running back in 1969 and was ineligible last year, has been switched to defense and is the likely

where he was a three-sport letterman and captained the football team during his senior year. He received a master's degree in physical education from North Dakota University in 1962.



After graduating from Morgan Park in 1958, Chuck turned down an offer to sign with the Chicago White Sox and enrolled at the University of Colorado. He won



Dick Teteak, 33, joined Wisconsin's coaching staff in 1970 after serving the previous two years as head coach at Beloit College.




Assistant Coach — 2nd Season



candidate for the starting right corner spot in 1971. **Johnson** is still learning and will make mistakes but has enough sheer speed to recover from most miscues.

At the other corner junior **Milt Habeck**, number two man behind **Crooks** last year, appears to have the edge. Pushing him for a job will be sophomore **Chris Davis** while junior **Randy Freis** will be waiting to step in if **Johnson** does not accomplish the task adequately.

The Badger kicking game will again be strong in 1971, as **Jaeger** and **Krugman** return to placekicking and punting duties, respectively. In two years **Jaeger** has converted 34 of 39 extra points and has made 12 of 20 field goals attempts for a total of 70 points. In 1969 he scored 46 points by kicking to set a school record and he also has a modern record 48 yard field goal to his credit. **Krugman** punted a school record 63 times last year for a 39.5 yard average and had a long of 55 yards.

The Badgers have scheduled 11 games for 1971, eight of them against Big Ten foes. They will open at home September 11 against Northern Illinois and after traveling to Syracuse the following week-end will return home to face powerful Louisiana State to close out the non-conference schedule.

The Badgers will also make appearances in Camp Randall against Indiana, Michigan State, Purdue and Illinois, meeting the Spartans for the first time since 1968 and the Boilermakers for the first time since 1966. The Badgers will also see road action at Northwestern, Ohio State (on regional television), and Iowa and will close out their 1971 schedule in Minneapolis against traditional rival Minnesota.


Join Badger Staff
