VOTED, That the minutes of the regular meeting of the Board of Regents  
of the University of Wisconsin System held on May 7, 1976, be approved as sent  
out to the Regents.

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REPORT OF THE PRESIDENT OF THE BOARD

Vice President Neshek assumed the Chair.

Vice President Neshek stated that the Chair will receive nominations for  
the office of President of the Board.

Regent Fish nominated Bertram McNamara as President of the Board of  
Regents, and the motion was seconded by Regents Lavine and Zancanaro.

Regent DeBardleben moved that the nominations be closed and that the  
Secretary be instructed to cast a unanimous ballot for Bertram McNamara for  
President, the motion was seconded by Regent Hales and Sandin, and it was voted  
unanimously.

President McNamara resumed the Chair.

President McNamara announced the floor was now open for nominations for  
the office of Vice President.

Regent Lavine nominated Milton Neshek as Vice President of the Board.

Regent Pelisek moved that the nominations be closed and that the Secretary  
be instructed to cast a unanimous ballot for Milton Neshek for Vice President,  
the motion was seconded by Regent Hales, and it was voted unanimously.

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President McNamara announced that the floor was now open for nominations for the office of Secretary of the Board and the Board's Trust Officer.

Regent Sandin nominated Joseph Holt as Secretary of the Board and Trust Officer, and the motion was seconded by Regent Lavine.

Regent Pelisek moved that the nominations be closed and that a unanimous ballot be cast for the election of Joseph Holt as Secretary of the Board and Trust Officer, the motion was seconded by Regent Fish, and it was voted unanimously.

Regent Pelisek nominated Robert Winter for the positions of Assistant Secretary and Assistant Trust Officer and Charles J. Stathas as Assistant Trust Officer, and the motion was seconded by Regent Erdman.

It was moved that the nominations be closed and that a unanimous ballot be cast for the election of Robert Winter as Assistant Secretary and Assistant Trust Officer, and Charles J. Stathas as Assistant Trust Officer, the motion was seconded, and it was voted unanimously.

At the request of President McNamara, Regent DeBardleben reported on the Higher Educational Aids Board meeting. Regent DeBardleben referred to the report, dated May 28, 1976 (attached as EXHIBIT A), which had been previously circulated. Regent DeBardleben stated that the report speaks for itself, except in respect to the first paragraph, where it says the approval of the procedure setting in motion the WHEG II and the Federal Basic Educational Opportunity Grant Program is of especial interest to the University of Wisconsin System.

Regent DeBardleben moved adoption of the following resolution, the motion was seconded by Regent Pelisek, and it was voted:

Resolution 1249: That the following appointments to the Board of Visitors for terms ending June 30, 1980, be approved:

The members of the Board concurred in Regent DeBardleben's suggestion that meeting dates for the six months following June of 1977 be approved in December or January.

President McNamara reported that he, Regent Neshek and Regent Lavine had met with the staff of the Legislative Audit Bureau, which had conducted discussions and informal audits on six of the campuses and held discussions with Central Administration. He stated that the meeting was most harmonious and their questions and concerns seemed to be proper, legitimate and within the bounds of legislative responsibility and within the confines of the Board's concerns about academic freedom. He stated that the relationships in the conduct of the operation under the direction of State Senator McKenna had been quite good. He noted that before the Audit Committee meets with any of the University divisions, Senator McKenna sends a letter indicating their areas of interest, the most recent being the University Hospital. He reported that Senator McKenna made six requests, all of them dealing with financial matters and all perfectly proper. He concluded that it appeared the work of the Legislative Audit Bureau is proceeding in a proper fashion, that the concerns of the University are being met, and at the same time they are looking into what all of us would agree are proper matters for the Legislature and the State government to investigate. Regent DeBardeleben stated that he assumed that the scope of the operation of the Legislative Audit Bureau will continue to receive attention on the part of Central Administration and of the Board.

President McNamara recognized Michael DeLonay, President of the United Council of Student Governments. Mr. DeLonay stated that he noted improvements in the relationships between the United Council and Central Administration and introduced his successor, Ms. Elizabeth Wright.

(Regent Barkla entered the meeting at 9:20 A.M.)

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#### REPORT OF THE PRESIDENT OF THE SYSTEM

President Weaver's report relating to state support for higher education, biennial budget working groups, Central Administration performance report, University System executives and American Council on Education President's Institute, and the status of the Legislative Audit Bureau survey of System policies is attached as EXHIBIT B.

Regent DeBardeleben stated that he felt it is well that Central Administration is making an analysis and presenting to us these recent reports. With respect to the support of public higher education in the United States, he stated that he was certain that the Governor and the Legislature will be interested in these results and felt confident that in making the analysis they will be made on a relative basis, rather than comparing one period of time with another period of time. He continued that he assumed they would be made in a discriminating manner so as to segregate the support of the institutions in the University Cluster from the institutions in the Doctoral Cluster. He stated it had been his feeling that a lot of confusion arises because observers are not comparing the same kinds of institutions with other institutions of the same kind and that he shared President Weaver's feeling that no one in the state should be hasty in judging these things without a complete analysis. He stated we must not only have such reports for our consideration but also they are necessary in order that we can make a full and frank disclosure to the Governor and the Legislature of areas in which we may have done very well, and areas in which there are deficiencies. He stated there is a real honest concern on the part of the government of this state that this institution fulfill the needs of the people.

Regent Pelisek moved adoption of the following resolution, the motion was seconded by Regent Zancanaro, and it was voted:

Resolution 1250: That the Report of Non-Personnel Actions by Administrative Officers to the Board of Regents and Informational Items Reported for the Regent Record be received for the record; and that actions included in the report be approved, ratified and confirmed. (EXHIBIT C, attached)

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#### REPORT OF THE EDUCATION COMMITTEE

The report of the Education Committee was presented by Regent Lavine.

Regent Lavine reported that in the Committee meeting on the previous day Chancellor Alan E. Guskin, UW-Parkside, and Professor William J. Murin, Chairman of the University Committee, UW-Parkside, presented a report containing an overview of the major characteristics of the University, an overview of the composition, process, conclusions, and recommendations of the Task Force on Academic Reform, and a summary and forecast of what the University will be doing and where it will be by 1981.

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Regent Lavine reported that in the Committee meeting on the previous day Senior Vice President Donald Smith reported on activities involving the System Academic Affairs staff as follows:

Workshop for Extended Degree Program Directors and Learning Resource Coordinators

Academic Program Audit and Review Workshop

Medical Technology Audit

Mini-Report--Broadcasting Activities in the UW System

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Regent Lavine reported that in the Committee meeting on the previous day Associate Vice President Adolph Wilburn made the following statement about Chapter IV, Analysis Paper 7.2 (Revised) - Ethnic/Racial Minority Students in the UW System:

"For the past 15 months we have been actively concerned with the identification and refinement of the policies in the document." ". . . we have solicited and received the insights, strong feelings, beliefs, considered judgment and wisdom from more than a hundred individual citizens, many concerned groups as well as from students, faculty and academic staff from the several institutions of our System.

"We have on file four volumes of testimony received at five Regent hearings. Members of the Central Administration staff have studied the hundreds of pages to glean from them the needs and aspirations of the people so that the policy document could also reflect these realities, needs, and priorities.

"I would say that as difficult as has been the search for appropriate prose for the adumbration of what we believe to be a desirable future for the System, we recognize that this is but the beginning of beginnings.

"The most difficult phase of the transformation which this document advocates will require the continued dedication of these students and their families, of the faculty, and of Wisconsin citizens generally."

Regent Lavine moved adoption of the following resolution, and the motion was seconded by Regent DeBardeleben:

Resolution 1251: That, upon recommendation of the President of the UW System, (Policy-Revised) the Regents approve Chapter IV, AP 7.2 (revised), as amended. (EXHIBIT D, attached)

Regent Erdman questioned the inconsistency in the report of the use of the words "should" and "shall". Senior Vice President Donald Smith responded that to the best of his knowledge the words had been used deliberately in each case. Regent Erdman stated that under "objectives" nothing is said about graduate students and yet under "institutional requirements" there is a required setting of institutional goals for graduate students. She stated that since we don't have an overall objective and since we are finally addressing graduate students in the document, she wondered if this was an afterthought under institutional goals. Regent Lavine responded that this is not being added as an afterthought and that there are some specific problems in addressing the subject of graduate students which would mitigate in letting the campus come back with their suggested goals. He noted that federal funding is a very large factor in that area, and is at this point a question mark, so that obviously it will have to wait until we get some idea of that support for graduate students in that area, and the second problem is the amount of Advanced Opportunity Program funding. He continued that we do have in hand the knowledge of the present number of minority students involved in graduate education throughout the System, so that when we get that from the campuses in the future, we will have a backdrop to compare it with, and that will give us some benchmark and allow the necessary time factor into some of the unknowns that at this point make that a much more difficult goal to set than the undergraduate goal. He stated it is simply a matter of funding and timing.

The question was put on Resolution 1251 and it was voted.

Regent Lavine reported the Committee received an informational report on academic changes approved by Central Administration in 1975-76, (attached as EXHIBIT E). He noted that one change, not appearing in the original list reads "UW-Oshkosh: From College of Continuing Education to Terminated".

Regent Lavine moved adoption of the following resolution, the motion was seconded by Regent Sandin, and it was voted:

Resolution 1252: That, for their many years of dedicated service on the faculties of institutions in the University of Wisconsin System, the Board of Regents commends and extends good wishes to those members who have been granted emeritus status by the President and the Chancellors. (Copy of Emeritus Designations on file with the papers of this meeting.)

Regent Lavine moved adoption of the following resolution, the motion was seconded by Regent Sandin, and it was voted:

Resolution 1253: That, upon recommendation of the President of the UW System and the Chancellor and faculty of UW-Milwaukee, the following new academic program be approved with an effective implementation date of Fall, 1976:

B.A. in Ethnic Studies, UW-Milwaukee

Regent Lavine reported that the Committee next considered the first reading of Academic/Fiscal Planning Paper No. 2 (LR Series) - The Demographic, Economic and Societal Trends Affecting the Planning Context for the UW System. He noted the importance of securing wide campus faculty involvement in developing the document and it will therefore be brought to the July meeting for interim action by the Board. He noted that after the September enrollments are in, the document is to be returned to the campuses for a thorough review and recommendations before being brought back to the Regents later in the Fall for final action. In its present form the document has been reviewed and reacted to by faculty senates, campus administrators, the Interim Faculty Consultative Council, and a special faculty/administrative advisory committee.

Regent Lavine moved adoption of the following resolution, the motion was seconded by Regent Sandin, and it was voted:

Resolution 1254: That, upon recommendation of the President of the UW System (Policy-New) and the Chancellor of UW-Extension, Chapters 1 through 7 of the UW-Extension faculty policies and procedures be approved as required under UWS 2.02.

Regent Lavine reported that Vice President Smith informed the Committee of the first place won by the UW-Platteville Collegiate Soils Team in the 16th Annual National Collegiate Soils Contest held April 23, 1976.

The Committee was informed of the re-accreditation of the UW-Whitewater baccalaureate Social Work program by the Council on Social Work Education.

Vice President Smith reported the receipt of a grant of \$140,500 from the Lilly Foundation to the University of Wisconsin-Oshkosh to assist in the evaluation and expansion of its faculty development program.

Regent Lavine announced the Agreement of Cooperation between the Center for Lake Superior Environmental Studies (UW-Superior) and the Lake Superior Basin Studies Center (University of Minnesota-Duluth).

Regent Lavine moved adoption of the following resolutions, the motion was seconded by Regent Pelisek, and they were voted:

- Resolution 1255: That, upon recommendation of the President of the UW System and the Chancellor of UW-Green Bay, authorization to recruit for a Dean for Academic Affairs at UW-Green Bay is approved.
- Resolution 1256: That, upon recommendation of the President of the UW System and the Chancellor of UW-Oshkosh, authorization to recruit and appoint a Dean of Libraries and Learning Resources at UW-Oshkosh is approved.
- Resolution 1257: That, upon recommendation of the President of the UW System and the Chancellor of UW-Parkside, authorization to recruit for a Vice Chancellor/Dean of Faculty at UW-Parkside is approved.

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#### REPORT OF THE BUSINESS AND FINANCE COMMITTEE

The report of the Business and Finance Committee was presented by Regent Hales.

Regent Hales reported that in the Committee meeting on the previous day, Vice President Lorenz reviewed the current year's activity indicating the total federal support of the System increased approximately 8.5 million dollars, with 10.5 million dollar increase in student aid, and an increase of 5.2 million dollars in the miscellaneous category, but with a reduction of 6 million dollars in research and a reduction of 1.7 million dollars in instructional support.

Regent Hales moved adoption of the following resolution, the motion was seconded by Regent DeBardeleben, and it was voted:

- Resolution 1258: That, upon recommendation of the President of the System, the gifts, grants and contracts presented at this meeting (copy filed with the papers of this meeting) be accepted, approved, ratified and confirmed; and that, where signature authority has not been previously delegated, appropriate officers be authorized to sign agreements.

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Regent Hales stated that the late Edward W. Morehouse, of Littleton, New Hampshire, made a bequest of a \$1,000 United States Series H bond in memory of his deceased wife, Anna Ely Morehouse, for the University's general purposes.

Regent Hales moved adoption of the following resolution, the motion was seconded by Regent Sandin, and it was voted:

- Resolution 1259: That the bequest of the late Edward W. Morehouse, Littleton, New Hampshire, to the University of Wisconsin be accepted by the Board of Regents of the University of Wisconsin System in accordance with the terms and conditions of the Last Will and Testament of Edward W. Morehouse, Deceased; and that the Secretary or Assistant Secretary be authorized to sign a receipt on behalf of the Board of Regents of the University of Wisconsin System for this bequest, and to do all things necessary to effect the transfer of this bequest to the University of Wisconsin-Madison.



Regent Hales stated that the late E. Romaine Rowe made an unrestricted bequest of \$1,000 to the University of Wisconsin, Madison Campus.

Regent Hales moved adoption of the following resolution, the motion was seconded by Regent Walter, and it was voted:

**Resolution 1260:** That the bequest of the late E. Romaine Rowe, Washington, D. C., to the University of Wisconsin be accepted by the Board of Regents of the University of Wisconsin System in accordance with the terms and conditions of the Last Will and Testament of E. Romaine Rowe, Deceased; and that the Secretary or Assistant Secretary be authorized to sign a receipt on behalf of the Board of Regents of the University of Wisconsin System for this bequest, and to do all things necessary to effect the transfer of this bequest to the University of Wisconsin-Madison.

In response to Regent Barkla's inquiry, Vice President Percy advised that consideration of policy on discriminatory gift and grants will hopefully be considered by the Board in July.

Regent Hales noted that when a state agency decides to change its public depository, an approving resolution of the governing board is required. The present bank has been the depository for the past ten years and the predecessor bank had the account for thirty years. He stated it was the Chancellor's feeling that a change was appropriate at this time, and that he preferred an unspecified period, but anticipated that it will be from two to four years.

Regent Hales moved adoption of the following resolution, the motion was seconded by Regent Pelisek, and it was voted:

**Resolution 1261:** That, upon recommendation of the Chancellor of UW-La Crosse and the Vice President and Controller, the State Bank of La Crosse, La Crosse, Wisconsin, qualified as a public depository under Chapter 34 of the Wisconsin Statutes, shall be and is hereby designated, effective July 1, 1976 until further action, a public depository for certain moneys coming into the hands of employees of the Board of Regents of the University of Wisconsin System for deposit to the appropriate account, and

That withdrawal or disbursement from said depository shall be only by check, as provided in Section 66.042(6) of the Wisconsin Statutes, and that all checks be signed by one of the persons certified by the Secretary of the Board of Regents of the University of Wisconsin System as having been authorized by the Vice President and Controller to make deposits to or sign checks drawn on the University of Wisconsin-La Crosse accounts held by the above bank.

Regent DeBardeleben inquired what had become of the proposal that these accounts in the various communities be consolidated so that the University would be getting the benefit of the float from these funds. Vice President Lorenz responded that this is still subject to legislation and that unless some other

provisions come forth, they will again propose legislation in the next session. He stated it was not passed at the last session because there was an alternative possibility that the balance could be combined with the state bank, which beginning July 1 will be the First Wisconsin National Bank of Milwaukee, and could be used as a compensating balance. In response to Regent DeBardleben's question, Vice President Lorenz stated that to his knowledge there had been no banking interest or association opposition of the legislation.

Regent Hales moved adoption of the following resolution, and the motion was seconded by Regent Lawton:

Resolution 1262: That, as recommended by the Chancellor of UW-Milwaukee and the Vice President and Controller, the Board of Regents adopt the following resolution relative to the use of facsimile signatures on checks drawn on the University of Wisconsin-Milwaukee Contingent Account held in the First Wisconsin National Bank of Milwaukee:

RESOLVED: That the First Wisconsin National Bank of Milwaukee as a designated depository of the Board of Regents of the University of Wisconsin System be and it is hereby requested, authorized and directed to honor checks, drafts or other orders for the payment of money drawn in this corporation's name on its University of Wisconsin-Milwaukee Contingent Account, including those payable to the individual order of any person whose name appears thereon as signer thereof, when bearing or purporting to bear the facsimile signature of any one of the following:

M. J. Rupp  
R. Drozewski

and the First Wisconsin National Bank of Milwaukee shall be entitled to honor and to charge this corporation for such checks, drafts or other orders, regardless of by whom or by what means the actual or purported facsimile signature thereon may have been affixed thereto, if such signature resembles one of the facsimile specimens duly certified to or filed with the First Wisconsin National Bank of Milwaukee by the Secretary or other officer of this corporation.

Regent DeBardleben noted that the resolution provides that the bank is entitled to honor checks if the facsimile signature resembles one of the facsimile specimens on file with the bank and inquired who bears the loss if the bank makes a mistake. Regent Pelisek stated that the University would bear the loss.

The question was put on Resolution 1262 and it was voted.

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#### REPORT OF THE JOINT BUSINESS AND FINANCE AND EDUCATION COMMITTEE MEETING

The report of the Joint Business and Finance and Education Committee meeting was presented by Regent Hales.

Regent Hales stated the Education Committee and the Business and Finance Committee met in a special joint session to hear a presentation on Book B of the 1976-77 annual budget dealing with budget-related personnel actions for which the President or Chancellors have final approval authority and to review personnel actions which require individual review and approval by the Board of Regents.

Regent Hales moved adoption of the following resolution, and the motion was seconded by Regent Neshek:

Resolution 1263: That the budget-related unclassified staff personnel actions delegated to the President and Chancellors including promotions, changes of status, and salary adjustments as presented in Book B, Summary Report on Budget-Related Personnel and Salary Actions, be confirmed, and other unclassified personnel and salary adjustments for 1976-77 be approved.

In response to his inquiry, Regent DeBardleben was advised that the resolution covers the material distributed in Book B and also Supplement #1 and Supplement #2 to Book B. Regent DeBardleben made the following statement:

"I expressed concern yesterday in the closed session, and I renew it here, about the inflexibility which is imposed upon this Board by the State Executive Pay Plan arrangement. I note that the salaries of the Chancellors in the University Cluster under the recommendation here proposed exceed the average salaries of full professors in the University Cluster by over \$17,000. I think this is an unreasonable discrepancy. We are told there isn't anything we can do about it, even if others and myself happen to agree that this is unreasonable, because the Chancellors are under the Executive Pay Plan. I am not going to vote against the resolution because, if we don't have any discussion, I guess you are not voting against anything, although I find it rather mystifying that we are asked to take action on something that we don't have much, if any, discussion about. I would request that in connection with making up the biennial budget recommendations for the next biennium, there be presented to this Board as an alternative, things that we may request or recommend, the option of voting to take the University System out of the Executive Pay Plan, so that this Board of Regents will have discretion in terms of fixing salaries of administrators in relation to salaries fixed for faculty. I am not asking that we pass on that question at this time, but that that alternative be given to us when the biennial budget recommendations are brought in so that we can then consider it in depth and decide whether or not we should make such a recommendation."

Senior Vice President Percy stated that it was the intention to present the alternative once again and recalled that we argued for exclusion of administrators from the Executive Pay Plan at the outset and were unsuccessful. He noted it presents constraints on the ability to recognize merit and we will present it and recommend the alternative in our biennial budget presentation.

The question was put on Resolution 1263, and it was voted.

Regent Hales moved adoption of the following resolutions, the motion was seconded by Regent Lavine, and they were voted:

Resolution 1264: That, upon recommendation of the President of the System and the UW-Madison Chancellor, the status of Robert R. Borchers be changed from Associate Dean of the Graduate School and Professor, Department of Physics, to Vice Chancellor-Academic Affairs and Professor, Department of Physics, effective June 11, 1976 at an annual salary of \$43,000.

Resolution 1265: That, upon recommendation of the President of the System and the UW-Madison Chancellor, the status of Orrin L. Helstad be changed from Acting Dean and Professor, Law School, to Dean and Professor, Law School, effective July 1, 1976 at an annual salary of \$45,700.

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#### REPORT OF THE PHYSICAL PLANNING AND DEVELOPMENT COMMITTEE

The report of the Physical Planning and Development Committee was presented by Regent Fish.

Regent Fish noted that the leases covered by the next resolution are all either renewals or replacement with lower square footage and there are no increases in cost in any of the leases.

Regent Fish moved adoption of the resolution relating to leases of space - UW Center System, UW-Milwaukee and UW-River Falls (attached as EXHIBIT F), the motion was seconded by Regent Zancanaro, and it was voted.

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Regent Fish moved adoption of the following resolution, the motion was seconded by Regent Sandin, and it was voted:

Resolution 1267: That, upon the recommendation of the Chancellor, UW-Madison and the President of the University of Wisconsin System, authority be granted to lease the following property:

Approximately 1,334 square feet of additional space located at: 1900 University Avenue for the period 7-1-76 through 6-30-78

Edward C. Schuman, Lessor 1900 University Avenue, Madison, Wisconsin 53705

The annual lease cost is \$6,000 annually (\$500 per month), (\$4.50 per square foot). (This amends the lease approved by the Board on June 6, 1975 and brings the total area leased for the Wisconsin Clinical Cancer Center Regional and Public Information Unit in this building to 2,874 square feet.) (Center for Health Sciences.)

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Regent Fish moved adoption of the following resolution, the motion was seconded by Regent Sandin, and it was voted:

Resolution 1268: That, upon the recommendation of the UW-Madison Chancellor and the President of the University of Wisconsin System, the concept and budget report for the Biochemistry Building Remodeling Project, UW-Madison be approved and authority be granted to plan, bid and construct the project at an estimated total cost not to exceed \$674,300, which is to be financed from General Obligation Bonds.

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Regent Fish reported that in the Committee meeting on the previous day Mr. Tom Sadowski, a member of the Hoofers Sailing Club, described the club's activities, present facilities and problems, and a proposed lakefront development project at UW-Madison. Mr. Sadowski noted the existing docks and boat ramps are located at the end of Park Street and run along the waterfront westward from the Memorial Union to the Limnology Lab. This area is continually subjected to erosion caused by windswept lake water being driven against the shoreline and by the pressures from the ice in the winter. The development plan proposes to halt the erosion, beautify the area, and provide the Sailing Club with facilities that are not so vulnerable to weather damage. The plan includes construction of a seawall that would be based upon the existing rock wall, installation of a breakwater, construction of bike and pedestrian paths, and extensive landscaping. The Sailing Club members would construct and maintain the piers. Mr. Sadowski said that the cost of the total project is estimated at \$250,000. The Hoofers Club has a special fund of \$30,000; UW-Madison has included \$75,000 GPR in the 1977-79 biennial budget request; and the balance will be solicited from friends of the University. Subsequent operating costs would be borne by the Hoofers.

Regent Fish reported that Mr. Edsall, Director of UW-Madison Planning and Construction, confirmed that the lakefront is in need of erosion control and that it will have to be done soon, regardless of whether this project is undertaken. His staff has assisted in the planning of this project; and the Campus Planning Committee believes that the development will be an asset to the campus and has endorsed the concept.

Regent Fish emphasized that the matter was presented for information, and the item will be debated at the time the next biennial budget is determined and comes before the Board.

Regent Fish reported that the Committee reviewed the Report of Leases by Unit as of June 1976 (EXHIBIT G attached).

Regent Fish stated there was nothing unusual to report in the Status of Projects, Building Commission Actions, and Contracts over \$25,000. He stated that Vice President Winter reported that a systemwide task force under the chairmanship of Assistant Chancellor McIntosh of UW-Green Bay has been appointed to explore all aspects of the energy conservation practices and policies.

#### UNFINISHED AND MISCELLANEOUS BUSINESS

Chancellor Baum, UW-Milwaukee, reported the appointment as Dean of the School of Allied Health Professions of Dr. Alan J. Weston effective July 1, 1976.

Regent Neshek moved adoption of the following resolution, the motion was seconded by Regent Sandin, and it was voted:

Resolution 1269: Whereas, James G. Solberg of Menomonie has completed eight years of service on the governing boards of the Wisconsin State Universities and the University of Wisconsin System, and  
(Continued)

Whereas, he brought to these boards of regents valuable experience and knowledge gained as a city attorney, president of the Menomonie Board of Education, a director of the Wisconsin Association of School Boards and chairman of the state Merger Implementation Study Committee, which drafted the charter for the present statewide University System,

Be It Resolved, that his colleagues who served with him on the Board of Regents commend James G. Solberg for his truly important contributions to Wisconsin citizens, grant him the status of Regent Emeritus and extend heartfelt good wishes to him and his wife, Virginia.

Regent Lawton requested clarification regarding the emergency room at University Hospitals. He stated that it was confusing that the decision to cease funding of the emergency room from segregated fees was based on financial grounds, and that it was indicated that over 70% of the students indicated that they were covered by health insurance. He inquired if anyone investigated to see whether their health insurance covered emergency rooms' services--it would be most unusual if it did. He stated that he felt that students deserve an on-campus emergency room service that apparently they are not going to get if they can't pay for it and that this is a financial barrier to the students affected. Chancellor Young stated that he would investigate and report on this particular aspect.

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The Board recessed into Executive Session to consider trust fund matters at 10:40 A.M.

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The Board arose from Executive Session at 11:45 A.M. President McNamara announced adoption of the following resolution:

Resolution 1270: That, subject to necessary State of Wisconsin approvals, the Endowment Management and Research Corporation, Boston, Mass., be employed to furnish investment counselling services for the University of Wisconsin System trust funds, with authority to purchase and sell securities on a discretionary basis, subject to guidelines furnished by the Business and Finance Committee, for the period July 1, 1976, to June 30, 1977, at a cost of no more than 0.5% of assets managed.

The meeting adjourned at 11:47 A.M.

The Higher Educational Aids Board met in Madison on May 21, 1976. Regent members of HEAB present were Mr. DeBardleben and Mr. Lavine.

Of special interest to the UW System was the approval of a procedure which sets in motion the Wisconsin Higher Educational Grant Program (WHEG II) and the Federal Basic Educational Opportunity Grant Program (BEOG) for Wisconsin public institutions. Approved were maximum WHEG II grants of \$1,250 and \$990 for the UW and VTAE Systems, respectively. The exact amounts to be paid each recipient depends on the student's need and the BEOG award. Amounts were reserved for supplemental payments to disadvantaged students and for handicapped students. A procedure was approved which sets forth acceptable reasons for adjusting WHEG II awards after a student's application for an award has been approved.

In discussing the program, Regent Lavine questioned the staff about the application form and whether there would be any testing of its validity. The staff assured the Board that this was already in process. He also questioned the staff as to the application process and the provision that latecomers would not be denied access to WHEG II awards. The staff replied that a rolling application procedure is provided for and that financial aid officers would be reminded that late applications are to be accepted. Mr. Lavine emphasized that financial aid clerks and receptionists are critical to the system and they must know what the rules are on late applicants.

The College Scholarship Service was selected again as the service agency responsible for processing the applications and providing support services to both the WHEG II and Tuition Grant programs during 1976-77. The American College Testing Service chose not to submit a bid to provide the service.

Although UW students receive no funds from the Tuition Grant program, it is of significance that HEAB approved a procedure under which grants to be made to Freshmen in 1976-77 under that program would be calculated using the same need analysis methodology as that used in the WHEG II program. The Legislature chose to phase-in the new procedures rather than to require it of all recipients for 1976-77.

With respect to the State Loan program, HEAB approved a basic private lender purchase agreement and other procedures to implement a program under which blocks of student loans would be offered to private investors starting July 1, 1976. The \$5 million to be sold to private lenders would be used for further lending to students. In addition, following approval of the policy by the annual review session of the Legislature, initial discussions have been conducted by the staff of HEAB with the Board of Commissioners of Public Lands to set in motion possible purchase of student loan notes by the Commission.

A dental education contract with Marquette University was approved for 1976-77 which for the first time specifies the credits which must be earned by a student and the period of time over which a payment can be made on behalf of a given student. Mr. DeBardeleben asked that the HEAB staff submit a report to the Board for consideration and approval showing the procedures it intends to use in enforcing statutorily required contractual provisions which: (1) require that the funds be used only for the dental program; (2) prohibit religious instruction in the program; (3) require preference among students be given to Wisconsin residents; and (4) prohibit discrimination in selecting students on account of race, religion, color, national origin, and sex. The staff director agreed to submit such a report.

In discussing the audit by the Legislative Audit Bureau of the dental program, Mr. Lavine moved, and it was voted, that policy responses by the staff not covered by Board policy be brought to the Board before being submitted to any outside agency. In addition, it was requested that HEAB policies be summarized and brought together in a loose-leafed document for ready reference. The HEAB Board also passed a motion saying that it did not believe that HEAB ought to audit the quality of dental education at Marquette as suggested in the LAB audit report, but that such judgments ought to be made by independent accrediting agencies.

Mr. Lavine reported on the matter of the UW System's consideration of a requirement for measurable academic progress for continued receipt of student financial aid. He said he would bring the UW policy to the Board at its next meeting.

State Support for Higher Education

I am sure some of you share my confusion over the rather widely conflicting findings of three recent reports on the relative effort among the fifty states in support of postsecondary education. A portion of this confusion can be explained by the time periods covered by each report and by the different methodologies and data bases relied upon.

Before commenting on these recent reports briefly and individually, I want to observe and be on the record that this Board of Regents and this Administration have always recognized the uncommonly high priority Wisconsin citizens do give, and traditionally have given, to postsecondary education, including university and vocational technical education. Our citizens have determined that support for educational opportunity and quality is a wise public investment. No one needs to be apologetic or defensive, and certainly not unappreciative of this fact.

What concerns me about some recent news reports is that they lead people to the determination that the investments of the past and present have been out of proportion and that Wisconsin is somehow indefensibly out of line in this regard. A major difficulty with the latest report lies in the fact that its conclusions are tied to trend data from 1968 to 1973--a period in which Wisconsin responded with admirable and strong resolve to rapidly increasing enrollments. It was also the period immediately preceding a series of retrenchment actions which were unprecedented in their magnitude and the clear result of changing state priorities and a severe economic strain on the commonwealth's economy.

Three recent reports, each receiving widespread attention in the press, emanated from the National Association of State Universities and Land Grant Colleges, the National Institute of Education and the Carnegie Foundation respectively. We are doing an in-depth analysis of each report, but I can offer the following preliminary observations based on what is already clear to us:

1. The Land-Grant Report contains the most recent data on state appropriations for higher education. It reveals what most of us know--that the 1973-75 increase in state appropriations represented a two-year gain of 10% in Wisconsin, which ranked 46th among the states. That certainly will not sustain a relative position attained in the earlier half decade between 1968 and 1973.
2. The NIE or Halstead Report indicates that we rank 23rd in state and local tax revenue per full-time equivalent student in public institutions; this report indicates that we are 22nd in state and local tax appropriations to higher education as a percentage of total revenue collected. Halstead offers some nine indices reflecting relative state effort. His data range from 1971 through 1974.
3. The most recent Carnegie Report, and the one given the most publicity, unfortunately, uses the oldest data of the three. . . relying on 1973-74 U. S. Office of Education data. Its twenty-plus tables include one which ranks Wisconsin as 1st in relative tax effort and fourth in per student support. The latter places Michigan and Illinois well down in the rankings, while the Halstead report ranks them well above Wisconsin.

One example will serve to demonstrate our confusion and concern: One report using 1973-74 data shows Illinois per student support at \$1836, while another using data from the same year lists a figure of \$2726. I guess the main point I would draw from that is, you have to be a little careful how quickly you accept the figures of any given table.

One is tempted to quote one of the standard maxims about "statistics", but I will resist that temptation because I feel we owe it to this Board and to the citizens of the state to explain just what the various reports do and do not say. My request is a simple one: Please give us and our VTAE colleagues an opportunity to review these reports in real depth and report to you on them before you reach any substantive conclusions from the data that has already been provided.

Some members of the Board will recall an earlier study by a writer for Forbes Magazine in which relative state support rankings were advanced. We discovered that the basic data included all state and local appropriations for VTAE, but divided those dollars by the relative small number of students in the VTAE college parallel programs only. This grossly incorrect per student amount was then averaged in with public university figures for a combined postsecondary student support figure that bore absolutely no relationship to existing reality. In short, give us a chance to really work with these data, and we will then inform you as promptly as we can of what their real meaning and validity seem to be.

Just a word about our biennial budget working groups:

Our ten biennial budget working groups with systemwide representation are hard at work developing a documentary base upon which we can build our 1977-79 biennial budget request. We will be limiting our proposal to these ten areas covered by the working groups and to a staff compensation request. It is our goal to have the proposal in your hands by September with Board actions scheduled for October on all but the compensation items.

A word about Central Administration performance report:

While we will be shifting to an annual report format for each Chancellor to review the performance of his Institution, the Central Administration will continue its practice of presenting a separate report on its own performance relative to prior year objectives and its new objectives for the coming year. We hope to have that report to you sometime in July.

I might simply mention in passing that I will be hosting a periodic meeting of the chief executives of major public university systems later this month here in Madison. This regularly-scheduled meeting group includes my counterparts from the state university systems of New York, North Carolina, Illinois, Missouri, Texas and California. We find our 36 hour gatherings to informally exchange information and views extremely useful. Concurrent with that meeting, the American Council on Education has selected Madison as the site for its Presidents' Institute--a week-long developmental conference for some forty institutional heads, Presidents and Chancellors, who have been in their jobs for less than four years. A number of our Central staff will be serving as "faculty" for the Institute. Don Percy has been one of their faculty regulars for each of the past seven years.

I would like to say a word too about the status of the Legislative Audit Bureau Survey of System Policies:

I am informed by Vice President Smith that the Legislative Audit Bureau team has completed its survey, involving visits to six campuses of the System, and is currently preparing its report. Next Tuesday, June 15, the LAB team will meet with the System Faculty-Administrative Advisory Committee to discuss the findings of its Report. The Advisory Committee members will have a period of ten days to provide advice to the LAB team concerning the substance and form of the findings. Thereafter, the team will make its report to the Audit Bureau, and the processes usual to dissemination of such reports presumably will follow.



In terms of procedure, I would like to confirm the observations the Board President has made that this review process has appealed to us as an enlightened one at every step. The visitation has gone well primarily because there was a clear identification of the scope of the inquiry being undertaken, and therefore an absence of some of the kinds of friction and misunderstanding which often surround such inquiries. As a result more and better information has been exchanged than is often the case.

We are not yet certain whether or not the LAB will propose a follow-up survey or audit on any area covered in its initial survey. Our agreement, as the Regents will recall, is that if such a follow up is proposed, there will be discussions pursuant to the definition of its purposes, scope, and procedures, and that these discussions will involve the Regents if there is any unresolved question between LAB and the University about the appropriateness of any subsequent audit.

That, Mr. President, concludes my report.

A Software Agreement has been signed between Western Electric Company, Inc., and the University of Wisconsin, effective as of March 1, 1976, providing for royalty-free use by the Department of Computer Sciences, UW-Madison, of computer software. (Agreement signed by the Associate Vice Chancellor.)
- B. An extension of the "VIBROSEIS" SYSTEM license agreement between the UW-Madison Department of Geology and Geophysics and Continental Oil Company has been signed by the Assistant Secretary of the Board. This extends the agreement to March 5, 1978.
- C. An agreement between the Board of Regents and Dr. Jeanne A. Griffith to provide medical service to UW-Whitewater students under the Student Health Services Program has been signed. This service covers the period through May 19, 1976 at a cost of \$9,600, to be paid from student fees.
- D. An agreement between the Board of Regents and Dr. Poderoso G. Prado to provide medical service to UW-Whitewater students under the Student Health Services Program has been signed. This service covers the period through May 19, 1976 at a cost of \$150 per day.

IV. Planning Improved Services by the UW System and its Institutions for American Racial and Ethnic Minority Students, 1976-1981

- A. Principles
- B. Objectives
- C. Implementation guidelines
- D. Monitoring guidelines
- E. Guidelines for the Allocation of Funds

In this document definitions of the terms "ethnic and racial minority student groups" and "educationally disadvantaged students" are those which were provided in the Report to the Board of Regents of the University of Wisconsin System from the Regent Ad Hoc Committee for Minority and Educationally Disadvantaged Students, June, 1972.

"For the purposes of this report we concentrate on three minority groups in Wisconsin: Native Americans, Blacks, and Latinos (Mexican-Americans, Chicanos, Puerto Ricans and Cubans). We define the educationally disadvantaged as those who have the potential and motivation for University education, but face serious difficulties due to economic deprivation, inadequate elementary and secondary school preparation or cultural differences."

A. Principles

General

1. The UW System and Institutions continue to place high priority on the implementation of Regental policy in vigorous pursuit of attainment of our goal of equality of educational opportunity by seeking increased numbers and percentages of ethnic/racial minority students among students enrolled, and increased academic success rates and graduation rates for these students. In implementing policies and procedures implicit in enrollment targets resulting from fiscal constraints, campuses are expected to recognize and respond appropriately to the high priority placed by the Board on the attainment of equal access and equal opportunity. At the same time, the UW System and Institutions will accordingly continue to seek resources essential to maintain enrollment targets at levels which assure access and opportunity for all students.
2. The Board believes that fostering the increased participation in this system of public higher education by students who are educationally disadvantaged members of minority groups is justified as investment in the development of vital human resources required to meet compelling state, national and international needs. The Board believes that returns from such investments will not only accrue to the minority students who through this effort receive an education but these returns will also serve to improve the quality of life for all citizens of Wisconsin.

3. The long range objective of the UW System is to achieve the goals of equality of access and of opportunity. The achievement of these goals might be inferred from the attainment of a condition in which entry rates, academic success rates, graduation rates and distribution of educational and professional choices by minority students would more closely resemble those characteristic of all students of the UW System. Goals set for 1976-81 should emphasize those actions which are more immediately possible as steps which lead toward the ultimate achievement of a more equitable distribution of the responsibilities and benefits from full participation in the affairs of this society. To achieve this target many more minority students will have to complete undergraduate programs at a level of competency sufficient to prepare them for effective participation in graduate and advanced professional programs as well as in the world of work.

#### Admissions Standards, Academic Progress and Graduation Standards

4. While faculties of the several Institutions will be encouraged to continue to set flexible admissions requirements for minority and educationally disadvantaged students in pursuit of the Board policy for increased access, degrees awarded to such students shall continue to represent academic attainment by those students of the same educational criteria for graduation applied to all students by the degree granting institutions. Lowering academic standards for educationally disadvantaged students would only withhold from these students the educational resources they need to lead successful lives as full participants in this society.
5. The UW System and Institutions will focus appropriate attention not only on the needs of educationally disadvantaged students, but also on promoting the continued academic progress of ethnic/racial minority students who on entry meet the regular admissions standards. Attention should be paid to providing these students with counseling and academic support to promote their continued academic success and graduation.
6. Institutions of the UW System should carry out continuous study of the relationships of recruitment and admissions policies, support services available and provided, and academic success rates of minority students to the end that no student admitted shall be without those supportive services requisite to a reasonable probability of academic success, given reasonable student effort. The faculty have responsibility for making the professional judgments of what is reasonable in this area.

#### Collaboration with Other Educational Institutions

7. The UW System and its Institutions recognize that the societal goal of equality of educational opportunity for achievement by individuals from ethnic/racial minority populations is attainable more efficiently as the joint product of efforts and initiatives by the elementary and secondary schools, vocational-technical schools, and colleges and universities. To this end, the UW System and its Institutions should emphasize initiatives seeking to make the resources of the System more available, on a cooperative basis, to other educational agencies of the state.

### Faculty Participation

8. The faculties of the several Institutions of the System have the major responsibility for the maintenance of the quality of academic programs. They are, consequently, in an excellent position to certify the educational value of special academic support programs for educationally disadvantaged students. In meeting System obligations to develop effective programs, faculty at all levels in each Institution should be encouraged to be active participants in the design, implementation and evaluation of such efforts.
9. When faculty members are involved on a regular basis with academic support programs for minority/disadvantaged students, such work should be viewed as a part of their official workload.

### Financial Aid

10. The UW System will work with HEAB to study ways of providing financial aid to educationally disadvantaged students which would reduce the development of high debt levels by minority/disadvantaged students. Further, recognizing the participation of the UW System in state and nationwide equal opportunity purposes, and in the exchange of talent and opportunity with other states, the UW System will seek state authorization to increase substantially the number of nonresident tuition fee remissions available to the institutions, for the purpose cited in this report.

### Teacher Education

11. The UW System and its Institutions recognize that many educationally disadvantaged minority students are admitted to the University after twelve years of association in primary and secondary schools with teachers who were trained, initially, by the member institutions of the System. In meeting the System's obligations to collaborate in efforts to improve the quality of primary and secondary schools, special attention will be given to the improved preparation of teachers who work in these schools.

### B. Objectives

1. The UW System should promote conditions conducive to a substantial increase in minority student enrollments. Through these efforts, the UW System seeks to achieve an overall minority student enrollment of 9,000 by 1981.

Similarly, the System should promote conditions that improve the likelihood that minority students will earn baccalaureate degrees. Through these efforts, the UW System seeks by 1981 to grant 800 to 1,000 baccalaureate degrees to minority students annually.<sup>1</sup>

As stated in A.1. preceding, these goals should be undertaken in full recognition of the high priority placed by the Board on the attainment of equal access and equal opportunity.

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Footnote 1 is on following page.

2. By 1981, substantial progress shall have been made in the attainment by minority students enrolled of the same level of academic success as is the general case for students of the UW System. Academic success may be evaluated by such measures as persistence in study, course grades, and degrees achieved.
3. By 1981, substantial progress shall have been made in the distribution of minority student enrollment and graduation among the several disciplines and professional schools in patterns more nearly approximating the distribution of students in general. In particular, this means exerting more effort to increase enrollment of minority students in mathematics and the physical and life sciences, and in the broad range of professional departments, schools and colleges.

#### Institutional Goal Setting

4. By January, 1977, Institutions should develop contingency plans for the period 1976-81 expressing their response to this statement of System goals. These plans should be updated after the building of the 1977-79 biennial budget and should include procedures for further change in response to annual budgets and annual analyses of experience. The plans should include statements of enrollment goals, academic progress goals, and for degree granting institutions, goals concerning graduation rates. They should also describe the programs, projects, and services to be provided in support of the achievement of the stated goals. Goals should be consistent with institutional academic standards. Such goals should be stated for both undergraduate and graduate enrollments, and, when feasible, for major professional schools and colleges.

1. (a) In fall, 1975, 5,505 of the System's enrollment of 143,740 (3.8%) were minority group members. Reaching a target of 9,000 by Fall, 1981, would require a 64% increase over a five-year period, an average annual increase of about 13% per year. Between Fall, 1971 and Fall, 1975, minority enrollment increased about 73%, at an average annual growth of (18%). The actual annual growth rates were: Fall, 1971 to Fall, 1972 (+30%); Fall, 1972 to Fall, 1973 (+20.5%); Fall, 1973 to Fall, 1974 (+18%); Fall, 1974 to Fall, 1975 (-6.4%).
- (b) Between July 1, 1974 and June 30, 1975, minority group students received 423 of the System's 17,388 bachelor's degrees (2.4%). The attainment by minority students of 800 baccalaureate degrees by 1981 would represent an 89% increase over the five-year period, or about 18% per year. There was a 23% increase in the number of bachelor's degrees won by minorities in fiscal 1974-75 over fiscal 1973-74.
- (c) Finally, the annual output of minority students from Wisconsin secondary schools should not be viewed as the limiting factor in the attainment of these goals. It became evident from testimony received during the recent Regents hearings that there are many older minority citizens who should be seen as potential students in the UW System.

### Financial Resources Needed

5. In setting these quantitative goals, the UW System and the Board of Regents recognize that such goals are, in part, contingent upon the availability of the financial resources requisite to their attainment. While additional funding for student assistance, and for support services for the educationally disadvantaged will not in and of itself assure success, the absence of such funding could require delay in the achievement of the targets stipulated. In this sense, the System goals have been established as socially and educationally desirable objectives for which the requisite levels of fiscal support will be sought from state government, and as available from the federal government and private donors.

### C. Implementation Guidelines

#### Faculty/Staff Training

1. Improved distribution of information about exemplary practice in the management of recruitment, admissions and support services for minority students should begin to be achieved in 1976-77 and thereafter should be shared through workshops arranged by Central Administration in collaboration with sponsoring institutions.
2. Institutions shall arrange appropriate training sessions for faculty and academic staff (including financial aid officers and their staff) on effective human relations with minority students and on M/D program development.

#### Collaboration with Department of Public Instruction and School Districts

3. The System and its Institutions should establish a continuing exploration with the Department of Public Instruction and the several school districts of Wisconsin with substantial minority enrollment on the ways in which collaborative initiatives by Institutions of the System could encourage improved academic success rates for minority students at the elementary and secondary levels, and improved identification and development of academic talent among minority youths. Such collaborative efforts should include an explication by DPI and the school districts of what they are now doing to improve academic success among ethnic/racial minority students.

#### Statewide Counseling Service

4. Central Administration, the several degree granting institutions, the Center System and particularly the UW-Extension, should foster development in collaboration with VTAE and HEAB of a statewide network of community based educational counseling and advisory services to improve the identification of appropriate educational objectives and services for adult members of minority communities and non-minority communities whose education might with profit be enriched through knowledge of minorities.

### Setting Institutional Goals

5. Institution goals should take into account the System goals, but should vary from those in terms of the demographic characteristics of the population served by the Institution and the program opportunities it might make available. Goals should be discussed with Central Administration prior to final action to determine their relationship to System goals. In its annual report on the status of minority students for the Board of Regents, each Institution will state its actual enrollment, success rate and degree achievements during the past year, and include comparisons with previous years. An analysis of these data in relationship to programs and projects implemented and goals previously set and future goals will be provided.

### Policy for Financial Aid

6. It is the right of the faculties of the several Institutions to set academic standards and it is their obligation to see to it that such standards are maintained. In no case shall academic standards of progress or grades for state or federal financial aid funds (other than those which may have been specified by the donor) be established by anyone other than the faculty. All students considered eligible for enrollment or continued enrollment according to standards set by the faculty shall be considered eligible for financial aid. In allocating aid funds received from state or federal sources, financial aid officers shall adhere to all state and federal policies concerning the administration of such funds, including priority to be assigned to the most needy eligible applicants, and the standard of measurable academic progress established by the faculty of the Institution for determining continuing eligibility. For campus discretionary funds, policy for allocation shall be set by the Institution.
7. Institutions should seek maximum improvement in the process by which financial aid applications are administered:
  - (a) Reducing to a minimum the time delays in processing aid applications and in delivering aid packages to students, and
  - (b) Identifying alternative sources of support available to minority students and making these known.

### American Ethnic Studies Courses

8. Though it is by no means viewed as central to the provision of equality of educational opportunity, the purposes of minority and majority populations in Wisconsin can be better served by the development of effective courses of instruction and research in American Ethnic Studies. The faculties of the several Institutions should be encouraged to develop such courses and research activities. Courses should reflect the same quality of academic excellence characteristic of the other intellectual offerings at the sponsoring Institution. These courses serve the generality of the student population and must be established, where feasible and desirable, through the initiatives of the faculty of one or more institutions. As indicated in the Report of the System Task Force on American Ethnic Studies, efforts aimed at appropriate development

of American Ethnic Studies programs and research should be expedited, and campus initiatives within the guidelines set for such studies should be solicited.

D. Monitoring Guidelines

1. Institutions shall, after appropriate discussion, report approved institutional contingency plans and goals for the period 1977-81 by December 1, 1976.
2. Institutions shall report annually in September on the preceding academic year's enrollment rates and academic success rates, and, for degree granting institutions, graduation rates. The Institution should also provide an analysis of its successes and problems in implementing its established institutional goals and plans for minority students, and should state such changes in its goals and plans or method of implementation as may be indicated by its analysis.
3. Institutions shall maintain studies aimed at identifying progress, or lack thereof, in appropriate fit among recruitment and admissions practices, academic support services, and academic success rates, and shall identify problems revealed by such studies and describe the measures being undertaken to solve such problems.
4. Institutions shall maintain information on efforts taken to improve academic success rates through activity in any or all of the following categories: (a) innovations in academic support service procedures; (b) in-service programs designed to improve the human relations climate of the institution; and (c) steps taken in cooperation with the community. Periodic evaluation of the student selection process should be conducted to assure that all those with a reasonable probability for academic success are being identified.

Fiscal Control

5. Institutions shall maintain a fiscal analysis showing the totality of resources assigned to programs and services for minority students, and the sources of funding for such resources. Allocations received through the special state appropriation for support services for minority students shall be shown as a separate item in such analysis, showing both the magnitude of such funds and the uses made of them. Such funds shall not be reallocated to purposes other than support for programs and services for minority/disadvantaged students nor reduced without specific Board approval.

E. Guidelines for the Allocation for Funds

1. Institutional uses of funds allocated in 1976-77 under the legislative appropriation for development of support services for minority/disadvantaged students shall be limited to the following uses:
  - (a) Pre-collegiate summer programs for minority students designed to provide counseling and advising, and academic programs likely to enhance academic success rates for the students thus serviced.



- (b) Tutorial services, student recruitment, program planning, academic advising, financial and personal counseling services for educationally disadvantaged students of all ethnic groups but with particular attention to the availability and use of such services by minority students.
  - (c) Advising and counseling services for regularly admissible minority students aimed at improving academic success rates, and broader distribution of educational objectives.
2. The UW System shall develop Decision Items stating goals and objectives for additional allocations to support services for minority students, and should seek additional support in the 1977-79 biennium for those service expansions judged to be essential to the fulfillment of System and institutional goals; within which there may be emphasis on expansion of cooperative efforts with other primary and secondary system's section of the state's educational system.
  3. The UW System must seek additional funding for the Advanced Opportunity Grant program in 1977-79 in order to maintain the flow-through of graduate students supported by this program at levels projected from the number of first entry students assisted by the program.
  4. The System will seek development by one or more Institutions of the System of a continuing research capability directed at the study and analysis of the academic experience and success rates of minority students in the System and the factors affecting such conditions.

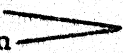
