## Wisconsin Union's Aquatic Parking Lot Buoy Now—Save Later

As ice-bound Lake Mendota gives way to the spring thaw, sailors are longing to get their boats in the water. The Wisconsin Union mooring field offers sailors Madison's most inexpensive mooring service for the 1986 boating season.

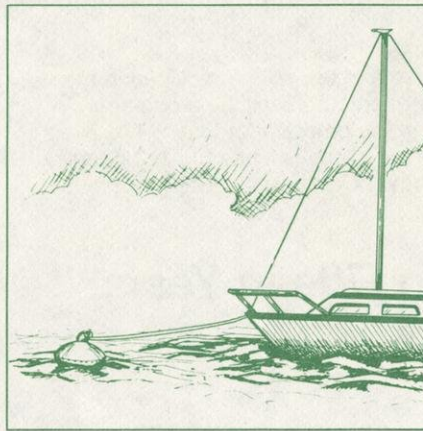
Thirty-five buoys are available for rental on a first-come, first-served basis. Located immediately behind the Memorial Union, the mooring field's boundaries are marked by Lake Street on the east side and the UW Limnology building on the west. As in previous years, earlier sign-up allows preference in east, west or central locations. Requests are honored as closely as possible based on the size and weight of the boat.

The cost for Union members to rent a mooring is \$182 for the full contract season. Information on monthly or weekly rates can also be obtained.

To sign up for the Union's aquatic parking lot, stop by the **Outdoor Program Office** in Memorial Union's lower level. You should be prepared to pay your rental fee and provide proof of insurance

as well as the following information about your boat: registration number, hull and deck color, length, draft, weight, class or type, and its name.

In addition to the mooring (which includes a buoy, cable and anchor), the fee also entitles renters to use of rowboats



and dories for shuttling back and forth to the mooring from the Union waterfront, and short-term use of the Interlake pier located in front of the boathouse. However, you must provide your own lines for tying your boat to its moorings.

Moorings can be used after May 1 in the east and central portions of the field. Moorings in the west end will not be available until after May 15 because this area has been designated a spawning area by the DNR. The rental season runs through early October.

After the rental agreement has been signed, a packet will be sent specifying the location of the buoy and general information on rental policies, Hoofers, UW lifesaving, various helpful hints and telephone numbers.

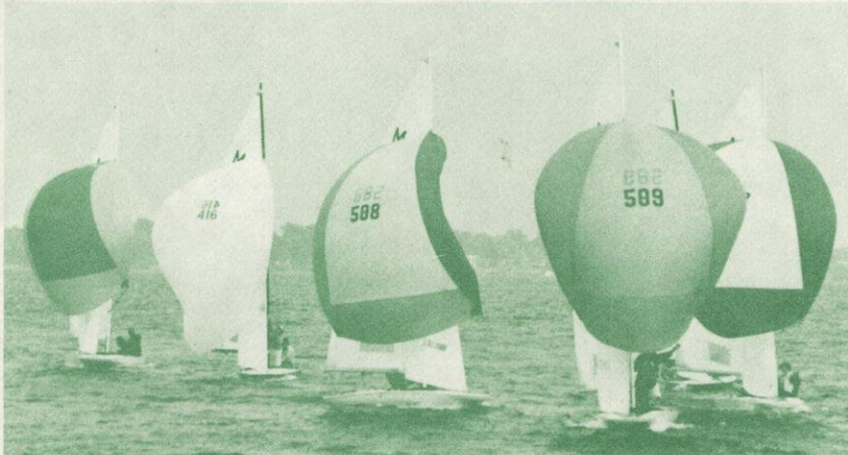
Club membership includes lessons on

Make your reservation to be with us next year as we raise the curtain on excitement and excellence in the **Wisconsin Union Theater!**

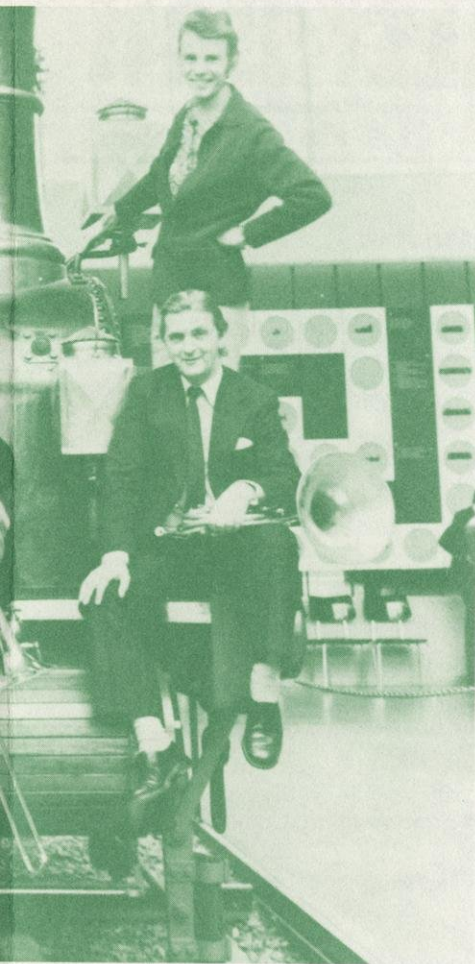

## Construction Update

The **Helen C. White parking ramps**, located on Park Street across from the Union Theater, will be **closed for repair** from April 15 to October 1. Very limited metered space is available between Memorial Union and the Red Gym, so the most feasible parking alternatives will be the Lake Street ramp and Lot 46, with an entrance on Lake Street between Johnson St. and University Ave. (Note: Portions of Lake Street ramp will also be closed for repair this summer.)

"What's the dust? Tell me what's happening . . .". Union Theater's superstars won't easily "bring the house down" once the new **theater roof** is finished. The entire roof will be replaced this spring, and construction will be finished by the time the curtain goes up on the 1986-87 season.

## A Kiosk For Your Information

The next time you visit Memorial Union, you may notice an addition to the facility. A new **lighted kiosk** on the corner of Park and Langdon Streets now serves as an information point for this key campus crossing.

Four bulletin boards display campus maps and information about parking, buses and Union events . . . all to assist visitors in the area. The **kiosk** also contains six telephones—two are free campus phones with numbers posted for campus and Union information, and four are pay phones. A plastic dome provides shelter in rainy weather, and a planter adorns each end.

The **kiosk** is a 25th anniversary re-union gift from the classes of 1953 and 1954 with funding also provided by the Memorial Union Building Association and the UW Parking and Transportation Office.
