



2004-05 Season Outlook

aving set the program's mark for season wins, closing out the 2003-04 season ranked fifth in the nation and the bitter taste of just missing the NCAA Frozen Four competition, Wisconsin's youngest program is ready to pick up where it left off. Though suiting up 13 underclassmen, the Badgers return 17 letterwinners with the prowess and experience that breeds champions.

"I think there should be a lot of excitement coming off of last season espcially with a lot of experienced players coming back," said head coach Mark Johnson.

Leading the way for this talented group is captain Carla MacLeod and her fellow seniors—Molly Engstrom (assistant captain), Jackie Friesen (assistant captain), Amy Vermeulen and Nicole Uliasz. Each provides an integral element for the team's success.


"We have good leaders; they work hard and are committed to what they want to do as far as the team is concerned," said Johnson. "It makes our job as coaches a little bit easier because they can lead by example both on the ice and off the ice. They are good, solid players, solid citizens and great role models for our younger players to follow."

Engstrom is a fierce blue liner and the team's top point-scoring defender last season. Her efforts have garnered her the top prize in women's hockey, a spot on the 2004 U.S. National Team. In addition to the gold medal won at the 2003 World Championships in Halifax, Engstrom boasts distinction as the WCHA's 2004 Defensive Player of the Year and the only Badger named to the All-WCHA first team.

The most veteran on the team, Uliasz provides the experience of a fifth-year senior after redshirting the 2002-03 season. Last season, her skills translated into 11 points (3-8=11) as well as helping the defense earn eight shutouts.

MacLeod earned ACHA All-America honors as well as appearing on USCHO.com's Defensive Player of the Week twice. MacLeod enters her fourth season within striking distance of Megan Hunter on the UW's all-time plus/minus list. Last season's plus-31 was second highest on the team and reflected her value on the ice.


Engstrom, MacLeod and Uliasz have proven a consistent force on the blue

line. Adding in sophomores, Bobbi-Jo Slusar and Kristen Witting, rounds out a five-deep defense. Mikka Nordby and Emily Morris are the newcomers hoping to contribute this year as well.

"We brought in two young defensemen this year, we had two young defensemen last year and both played very well," said Johnson. "The big question mark will be where Bobbi-Jo (Slusar) is going to be when she gets on the ice

after her injury last year. She's been through rehab and seems to be doing great. If she's 100 percent, that's going to make the blue line that much stronger."


Veteran forward Jackie Friesen enters her final season with the Badgers and is expected to remain a solid contributor on offense. Her hat trick against Bemidji State last season was the second of her career and just three of her 14 goals for 2003-04. Playing with the Canadian U-22 national team, Friesen has excelled in international competition as well.

Also returning for the Badger offense is Sara Bauer, the WCHA Rookie of the Year and the conference's top freshman scorer. Joining her is Lindsay Macy, who in her debut season registered 18 goals including a hat trick over Niagara and the UW's fastest goal to start a game (00:11) against Minnesota State.

"When you lose Meghan Hunter, your all-time leading scorer, and Steph Millar, who was very consistent during my two years here, there are big shoes to fill as far as consistency and leadership skills," remarked Johnson. "That's the cycle of this business; the next group that comes up has to take over."

In goal, Johnson has a coach's dream—three outstanding goaltenders, all ready to play.

Horras certainly has made an impression. Last season she was named the WCHA's goaltending champion with the

league's lowest goals-against average, the WCHA defensive player of the week, twice; to the All-WCHA second team and she competed with the U-22 U.S. national team over the summer. In Wisconsin history, Horras surpassed Jackie MacMillan in goals-against average with a conference-topping 1.45. She is closely followed by Dufour who posted a 1.49 goals-against average in her first season.

As if the two returning net minders wouldn't provide enough competition in the position, Johnson pulled in local standout Jessie Vetter to round out his goalie roster.

"(Vetter is) a very good goaltender, too," said Johnson. "If everyone keeps a real good attitude, I think it could be a really healthy situation."

Adding to the experience of the team, the Badgers return four skaters from recent national U-22 competition in the United States and Canada. The excitement of playing with the countries' top skaters is just one of the benefits for the Badgers as their athletes return to campus.

"It is good from a player's standpoint because they go into those high-level competitions where they're playing against the best female players and teams of countries around the world," said Johnson. "It just gives them confidence and makes them better players when they come back to us."

A change in the WCHA this season is the eighth team in the league, North Dakota. With a fantastic facility and highly competitive men's program, North Dakota's women's squad will make for an interesting conference season.

"The addition of (North Dakota) helps solidify our league and makes it stronger," remarked Johnson. "It will be very competitive. They will be a great addition and should make for a real competitive season."

Overall, the team looks strong and ready for the challenges of WCHA and NCAA competition.

"It's a good situation," explained Johnson. "In all our positions we have some key people with some experience and have shown that they can play at a real high level. I think everyone should be excited about what we can do this year."




Head Coach Mark Johnson

In only two seasons as Wisconsin's head coach, Mark Johnson has established himself and Badger women's hockey as pillars in the hockey community. Creating a program with a strong foundation and the makings for greatness, Johnson and the team are poised to pick up where they left off last season.

In 2004 he was inducted into the U.S. Hockey Hall of Fame for his individual accomplishments. In 2003 he was inducted as a member of the 1980 U.S. Olympic hockey team. Vince Lombardi Charitable Funds also honored Johnson's volunteer work by presenting him with the 2004 'Award of Excellence'.

Named the 2003 WCHA Co-Coach of the Year and also one of eight finalists for the American Hockey Coaches Association Division I Coach of the Year, Johnson guided Wisconsin to a 22-8-5 overall and 14-6-4 WCHA record that season.

In the 2003-04 season the Badgers outdid themselves, winning a program-record 25 games (25-6-3), and their .779 winning percentage was a UW record. Finishing the season just shy of the NCAA Frozen Four, the Badger finished ranked in a tie for fifth nationally.



Leadership

The third head coach in the program's history, Johnson joined the staff after serving as an assistant coach with the men's program from 1996-2002.

During that time, he helped the team to a WCHA regular-season title during the 1999-2000 season, as well as a WCHA Final Five championship in the 1997-98 campaign.



Prior to his time with the Badgers, Johnson coached professionally, directing the expansion Madison Monsters to a 37-30-7 mark in the 1995-96 season and earning Colonial Hockey League Coach of the Year honors.

He also led a pair of area high schools, serving as the head coach of Verona for 1994-95 and as the assistant coach for Madison Memorial for 1993-94.

Johnson served as an assistant coach with the 2002 U.S. Men's National Team that competed in the 2002 International Ice Hockey Federation World Championship in Gothenberg, Jonkoping, and Karlstad, Sweden. He had previously served in a similar capacity for the 2000 World Championship in St. Petersburg, Russia.

Most recently, he spent time in Lake Placid coaching at the 2004 USA Hockey 17/18-year-old Player Development Festival.

In September 2001, he served as an on-ice assistant coach at the U.S. Olympic Men's Ice Hockey Orientation Camp in Colorado Springs, Colo., featuring 38 of the top American players in the National Hockey League.

On the Ice

In his playing career, he helped Wisconsin to the 1977 national championship during his freshman campaign. The first Badger ever to win WCHA Rookie of the Year honors, he went on to become the school's second all-time leading scorer with 256 points on a school-record 125 goals and 131 assists in just three seasons.

The 1978-79 WCHA MVP, Johnson was a two-time, first-team All-WCHA pick and a two-time All-American. In 19xx he was also selected as one of the WCHA's "Top 50 Players in 50 Years."

Johnson has represented USA Hockey as a player in 13 international tournaments, with his most recent appearance as part of the U.S. national team at the 1998 IIHF (A-Pool) World Championship Qualification Tournament in Austria. Most notably, he led the 1980 U.S. Olympic Team's gold medal-winning effort with 11 points, including two goals in the "Miracle-On-Ice" against the Soviet Union and an assist on the game-winning goal against Finland in the final contest.

The team attended the opening ceremonies of the 2002 Olympic Winter

Games to light the flame and was honored by *Sports Illustrated* as giving us the 'Greatest Sports Moment of the Century.'

The Next Level

Following his Olympic experience, Johnson embarked on a successful 11year NHL career. He began his pro tenure with the Pittsburgh Penguins (1980-82), before moving onto the Minnesota North Stars (1982).

He also enjoyed stints with the Hartford Whalers (1982-85), St. Louis Blues (1985) and New Jersey Devils (1985-90). Over his 669 career NHL contests, the forward collected 203 goals, 305 assists and 508 points, highlighted by his 87-point season as captain of Hartford in 1983-84. He also tied an NHL All-Star Game record with three assists that season.


A Hockey Family

A 1999 inductee into the International Ice Hockey Federation Hall of Fame, Johnson is the son of legendary Wisconsin men's head coach Bob Johnson (1966-82) and brother of former men's assistant coach Peter Johnson (1987-91).


One of Wisconsin's most decorated athletes in any sport, Johnson was inducted into the State of Wisconsin Athletic Hall of Fame in 2003 and is also a charter member of Wisconsin's National W Club Hall of Fame.

Johnson, 47, earned his bachelor of science degree in kinesiology from Wisconsin in 1994.

He resides in Verona, Wis., with his wife Leslie and his five children: Douglas, Christopher, Patrick, Mikayla and Megan.

Assistant Coaches

Tracey Cornell

Ashton, Ontario, native Tracey Cornell begins her sixth season at Wisconsin. She has been with the program since the drop of the first puck and has done everything from recruit to co-coach the team during her tenure.

The energetic Cornell came to Madison after spending the previous year as girls' hockey head coach at Cushing



Academy in Ashburnham, Mass. Cornell led Cushing Academy to a 24-4-2 mark, the most successful season in the history of the program. Her team captured second during the regular season and advanced to the NEPSAC Championship. Most recently, Cornell volunteered as a Team Leader at Canada's Under-22 Selection Camp in August 2004.

Cornell's playing experiences include four years at Cornell University, as well as one year as a professional in Switzerland for the SC Reinach Lions. While at Cornell, she co-captained the hockey program her senior season earning Academic All-Ivy honors both her junior and senior years. Cornell helped the Big Red to the Ivy League hockey title during the 1995–96 season and served as assistant captain during the title run. The one-time Cornell Rookie of the Year also earned team honors as most inspirational player as a sophomore and senior.


Her stay with the SC Reinach Lions was also successful. The Lions placed second overall in the top Swiss hockey league and were crowned Zurich Cup Tournament Champions during her 1997–98 season.

Cornell earned her bachelor of science degree in marine ecology from Cornell University in 1997. In the fall of 2004 Cornell began pursuing her M.B.A. in the graduate program at Wisconsin. In addition to her time with the hockey program, Cornell played forward for a year with the Big Red women's soccer team.

Dan Koch

Dan Koch enters his fourth year with the women's hockey program. The assistant helped lead the team as co-coach during the second half of the 2001-02 season, proving his value to the Badgers.

Koch (pronounced Cook) came to Wisconsin following two seasons as an assistant coach with the women's hockey program at St. Mary's (Minn.)



University working with the forwards and goaltenders. Also a third-grade teacher at Franklin Elementary School in La Crosse, Wis., Koch helped lead the Cardinals to a Minnesota Intercollegiate Athletic Conference title during the 1999–00 season and a third-place finish at the national tournament in the 2000–01 season.

Before his St. Mary's experience, Koch was the head coach of the La Crosse Logan/Central High School boys' ice hockey team from 1996–99. He coached all-conference and all-state players during his three-year stint. Koch also coached various ice hockey teams from 1986–95 at all youth levels including park and recreation leagues and travel squads. He also coached soccer in the Madison area as an assistant varsity girls coach at Madison La Follette and as an assistant for the boys team at Monona Grove High School from 1986–90.

Koch earned his master's degree in education, teaching and learning in 2001 from St. Mary's University after earning his bachelor of science degree in elementary education in December of 1991 from the UW. He is a 1985 Madison La Follette High School graduate.

Koch and his wife Jody, a school psychologist, have sons Connor, Jacob and Malik.

Hickman, a native of Oakton, Va., spent three seasons as a student equipment manager with the program prior to his full-time position. A former

Reston Raiders goaltender in Reston, Va., his duties include coordinating team travel, purchasing and maintenance of equipment. Additionally, he worked as the 2003 U.S. Women's Under-22 Team's equipment manager during a three-game series against Canada. Hickman is a third-generation Badger; his father Jack and grandfather John both graduated from the UW. Grandfather John Hickman also holds a master's degree and Ph.D. from Wisconsin and is a UW Hall of Fame member and former Associate Athletic Director.

2003-04 Season Review

n five short years of existance the Wisconsin women's hockey team now stands tall on the national scene.

The Badgers finished the season with an all-time best 25-6-3 overall and 18-5-1 in Western Collegiate Hockey Association play. The 25 wins set a new mark for most wins while the .779 winning percentage also tops the all-time list.

Wisconsin finished second in the WCHA during the regular season and third at the 2004 WCHA Women's Final Five, held at Ridder Arena in Minneapolis.

A Near Miss

Despite posting the program's best-ever season the fifth-ranked Wisconsin women's hockey team was edged out of the selection pool for the 2004 Frozen Four in Providence, R.I.

The Badgers were ranked fifth nationally by both U.S. College Hockey Online and *USA Today*/American Hockey Magazine.

25 and Counting

One journalist called the women's hockey team the "UW's Great Anonymous Team" this season.

Despite being one of Wisconsin's quieter sports, the women's hockey Badgers' 25-win mark ties men's basketball for the best record among all UW athletic teams for the 2003–04 season.

The men's basketball team's winning percentage of .781 (25-7 overall) squeezes past the women's hockey mark of .779 (25-6-3 overall).

Let's Talk Hardware

Despite finishing 1-1 at the WCHA Final Five, Wisconsin's talented team racked up 11 of 25 league honors at the annual awards banquet to outdistance every other WCHA school.

Leading the way for Wisconsin, Molly Engstrom, a UW junior, was selected by a vote of the league coaches as the Defensive Player of the Year and also named to the All-WCHA First Team and the WCHA's Final Five All-Tournament Team. Frosh Sara Bauer was named Rookie of the Year and to both the All-Rookie Team and the All-WCHA second team.

Sophomore goaltender Meghan Horras was crowned as the league's Goaltending Champion with the lowest goal-against average, in addition to joining Bauer on the All-WCHA second team.

Rounding out the honors, senior right wing Karen Rickard and junior defender Carla MacLeod earned All-WCHA Second-Team honors, while defender Bobbi-Jo Slusar and goaltender Christine Dufour were also selected to the All-WCHA Rookie Team.

Excellence

Vince Lombardi Charitable Funds selected head coach Mark Johnson as the volunteer organization's Vince Lombardi 'Award of Excellence' honoree for 2004.

Named after the legendary head coach of the Green Bay Packers, Vince T. Lombardi, who died from intestinal cancer in 1970, the award is presented annually to a person that the Lombardi Funds "determines has made a 'Hall of Fame' contribution to a sport, profession, business or community in a manner that exemplifies the highest qualities of leadership, positive influence and an appreciation of God, country, family and self – not only to the sport, profession or business involved – but to the men, women and children whose lives are enhanced by striving to emulate those standards".

As the newest honoree, Johnson joins an elite list of Lombardi Award winners including General H. Norman Schwarzkopf, Dan Jansen, Bob Hope and former President George H. Bush.

Smart Skaters

In addition to the Badgers' competitive awards, six Wisconsin skaters – Nikki Burish, Sharon Cole, Kathryn Greaves, Steph Millar, Nicole Uliasz and Amy Vermeulen – were selected to the All-WCHA Academic Team.

Demonstrating Wisconsin's additional talents off the ice, all six Badgers acheived at least a 3.0 cumulative grade-point average to be selected.

Polls

Starting the season ranked sixth in the nation by U.S. College Hockey Online, Wisconsin fell just one spot to seventh during the season for its lowest poll position overall.

However, the Badgers climbed to fourth, on Jan. 19, and remained a constant force at the No. 5 ranking for the second half of the season.

Additionally, both the UW women and the UW men ranked among the nation's top-five teams during the week of Dec. 15 for the first time in school history.

National Teams

Wisconsin's Molly Engstrom was selected to the U.S. women's national team roster, while teammate Carla MacLeod participated in Canada's national team camp.

Engstrom played for the U.S. at the 2004 International Ice Hockey Federation Women's World Championship in Halifax, Nova Scotia, March 30 – April 6, 2004 earning a silver medal. Friesen, Mikkelson and Slusar also played for Canada's U-22 national team at the 2004 Europe Air Canada Cup in Germany, Feb. 5-7.

Senior Meghan Hunter (Canada U-22) and junior Nicole Uliasz (U.S. Senior and U-22) also earned national team experience in the 2001–02 season.

WCHA Players of the Week

Straight off the first weekend of women's hockey action, this season's Badgers began earning league and national weekly honors for their strong performances on the ice.

In total, Wisconsin earned 14 WCHA weekly awards, lead by six Rookie of the Week honors.

Five Badgers were twice honored this season by the league, including back-to-back rookie honors for frosh center Sara Bauer for the weeks of Feb. 2 and Feb. 9.

National Honors

Team captain Carla MacLeod, a UW junior, and sophomore goaltender Meghan Horras were named USCHO.com's Defensive Players of the Week this season.

MacLeod earned the national distinction twice (Nov. 18 and Feb. 10), while Horras garnered nation-wide honors on Jan. 20.

MacLeod also earned distiction as an All-America honoree. She is the third All-American Badger in program history.

Badger Bits & Bites

Sophomore goaltender Meghan Horras ended her season ranked second nationally with a 1.40 goals-against average ... frosh goaltender Christine Dufour ranked fourth with a 1.49 GAA ... Horras also finished third in the nation with a .935 save percentage ... Wisconsin finished its season tied for second nationally for team defense with a 1.47 goals-allowed per game and sixth for team offense with 3.59 goals -scored per game ... the Badgers also lead the WCHA in team defense and least goals allowed ... UW center Sara Bauer led all WCHA frosh in overall scoring, while classmate Lindsay Macy tied for second in overall scoring among WCHA frosh ... defenders Molly Engstrom and Carla MacLeod ranked third and fourth, respectively, in overall defensive scoring among the league's blueliners



WCHA Women's League



WCHA Women's History

The Western Collegiate Hockey Association, or WCHA, is the oldest of the Division I college hockey leagues recognized by the NCAA.

It was formed in 1959 as an outgrowth of two earlier western college associations, the Midwest Intercollegiate Hockey League and the Western Intercollegiate Hockey League.

After 10 distinguished years as the guiding force behind the success of the WCHA, Otto Breitenbach retired as commissioner at the end of the 1993–94 season. Named as his successor was Bruce McLeod, a major contributor to the league over the years, and a former Minnesota-Duluth hockey player.

The 1999–2000 season marked the first year for the WCHA-Women's League. Bemidji State, Minnesota, Minnesota-Duluth, Minnesota State, Ohio State, St. Cloud State and Wisconsin made up the charter membership.

Sara Martin was hired in June of 1999 to serve the league as the Associate Commissioner. Martin, who earned college degrees from Wisconsin and Minnesota State, served the WCHA as tournament director for the 1994, 1996 and 1998 WCHA Final Five Playoff Championships, and was tournament director for the 1997 NCAA Div. I Men's Ice Hockey Championship.

The women's league has quickly established itself as a force, sending two teams to the four-team national championship in its first season (1999-2000) and having conference runner-up Minnesota take home the national title.

Now five years later, the WCHA women's league has claimed five consecutive national titles.

League-member Minnesota-Duluth won the inaugural NCAA Frozen Four Championship at Mariucci Arena in Minneapolis in 2001 and met President George W. Bush at the White House to help celebrate. The Bulldogs went on to repeat the performance twice more in 2002 and 2003.

At the 2003 WCHA Annual Meeting, the league voted unanimously to admit the North Dakota women's hockey team as a full-time member beginning in the 2004-05 season. The addition of UND will bring the number of the women's conference teams to eight and will mark the first expansion of the league.

The WCHA men's league also counts 10 schools as members: Alaska Anchorage, Colorado College, Denver, Michigan Tech, Minnesota, Minnesota-Duluth, Minnesota State, North Dakota, St. Cloud State and Wisconsin.





Facilities

The Kohl Center

For the first time in the five-year history of the women's hockey program, Wisconsin will play all its 2004–05 home season at the state-of-the-art Kohl Center.

The 15,237-seat arena, the second largest college-owned facility in the country, is named after U.S. Senator Herb Kohl, a 1956 UW-Madison graduate who donated \$25 million to the project.

The \$76.4 million building contains an ice surface 200 feet long by 100 feet wide. The arena is also used for men's hockey, and men's and women's basketball, as well as concerts and other special events.

Artists such as the Backstreet Boys, Shania Twain, Matchbox 20, The Dave Matthews Band, AC/DC and Elton John, among others, have graced the Kohl Center stage.

The Shell

Wisconsin holds practice at the Camp Randall Memorial Sports Center, also know as The Shell, located adjacent to Camp Randall Stadium.

Beginning with the 2002–03 season, the team has had use of a brand new locker room built as an addition to the south end of the practice facility.

Included in the complex is a skate sharpening room, coaches' room, class-


room complete with practice goal and boards, as well as dress down and locker rooms. The new area is part of the expanded Wisconsin Athletic Wall of Fame.

The McClain


The women's hockey team also makes use of the McClain Athletic Facility, just north of the Shell. The McClain houses the 15,000 square-foot Fetzer Academic Center, where student-athletes can take advantage of 40 personal computers, 11 study rooms, open area with 30 study

cubicles, a 55-seat auditorium and a full-time advising staff.

The McClain Center includes a weight room, with more than 50 weight machines and 45,000 pounds of free weights, a 90-yard indoor football practice field and one of the finest sports medicine complexes in the nation.

History of Wisconsin Women's Hockey

n April 17, 1998, the University of Wisconsin Athletic Board unanimously voted to add women's ice hockey to the intercollegiate athletic program.

The sport would be brand new to the athletic department, but it already had a longstanding history at the UW.

A women's hockey club had been on the Madison campus for over 25 years. Founded in 1973 by three women— Marianne (Anderson) Larson, Jill Steinberg and Karen Schwarz—the UW Women's Hockey Club has had hundreds of players take to the ice throughout the years.

The three founders of the club organized a women's scrimmage hour at 10:15 p.m. on Sunday nights at the new campus skating rink dubbed "The Shell."

The trio put up signs throughout campus and recruited players by word of mouth. In the spring of 1975, once they had enough "regulars," they applied for club sport status through the UW's Recreation Sports division.

During the early years, they recruited players by putting up tables during spring and fall registration. In 1976, the group scheduled its first competitive game against the University of Minnesota club team.

By 1981, the number of club members had reached such a height that the club split into two separate squads. The following year, the club became a charter member of the Minnesota Women's Hockey Association, now called the Minnesota Girls' and Women's Hockey Association

One important source on campus provided the critical encouragement and support to the club: men's head coach Bob Johnson.

Johnson was instrumental in getting the club interviewed during radio broadcasts of the men's games. With his support, the club also arranged to play some games at the Dane County Coliseum immediately after the men's team played.

A concerted effort led to a second club expansion for the 1992-93 season. The club split into three teams after putting up posters, having a description of the team in a university recreational sports pamphlet and sitting at tables during annual sports recruiting days at the union each fall.

In 1991, prior to the expansion, peewee girls throughout the city of Madison were skating with boys' teams. All that changed when a new girls' team formed called the Wisconsin Challengers.

Members of the UW Club assisted in the formation of the new organization in an effort to generate more interest in hockey in young girls of Madison. The team soon formed a midget squad as well.

Interest continues to explode each season and the UW Recreation Sports division continues to sponsor three club teams.

The A team travels throughout the Midwest competing against other club programs. The current club teams – A, B, and C – continue to play even with the establishment of the varsity program. In fact, three members of the Badgers' inaugural team made the squad from the ranks of the UW Club.

The first head coach for the varsity Badgers was announced on July 9, 1998, when Julie Sasner was introduced to the Madison media and public.

A former member of the first U.S. National Team in 1990, Sasner came from Cornell University, where she had coached for five years.


The Badgers officially opened their history on October 8, 1999, when 3,892 people watched the Badgers face Minnesota-Duluth at the Kohl Center.

With Olympic gold medalists Cammi Granato, Karyn Bye and head coach Ben Smith, along with Gov. Tommy Thompson in attendance, and the game televised around the state on Wisconsin Public Television, the Badgers finally hit the ice.

The city of Madison is now fortunate to have five rinks and a wealth of enthusiasm for the sport of hockey. Attendance at Wisconsin women's games grows more every year.

The Wisconsin women attracted an average of 1,060 fans to each game during the 2003–04 season, ranking second in the nation behind Western Collegiate Hockey Association rival Minnesota.

The Badgers had at least 1000 fans at seven of 12 home contests, with a season-high 1,823 against Minnesota-Duluth on Jan. 18, 2004.



A World-Class University

The University of Wisconsin, one of the nation's largest and most productive institutions of higher education, is dedicated to the support of academic freedom.

Bascom Hall serves as the centerpiece of the campus. It sits atop the beautiful tree-lined Bascom Hill, which offers a magnificent view of downtown Madison.





Chancellor John D. Wiley

Chancellor John D. Wiley has worked to amplify the Wisconsin Idea and build on the research and teaching strengths that have made the University of Wisconsin so rich in accomplishment and tradition.


Since being named as the UW-Madison's 27th chancellor on Jan. 1, 2001, Wiley has aimed to enhance the university's role in creating a new, more viable economic future for Wisconsin while opening avenues to innovation and learning.

Wiley has presided over unprecedented growth on the west side of campus, which is being transformed into one of the nation's great health-sciences centers.

He also has mapped an east side redevelopment that will create a vibrant arts-and-humanities district to anchor the lower State Street area.

The chancellor has been a leader in efforts to expand on-campus student housing to meet demand, stem high-risk drinking and integrate athletics into the mainstream of university life. Wiley has reached out to the private sector by creating the Office of Corporate Relations to serve the increasing needs of the business community and help to build a more prosperous Wisconsin economy.

Wiley received his bachelor's degree in physics from Indiana University in 1964; attended graduate school at UW-Madison as an NSF Fellow and received master's and doctoral degrees in physics in 1965 and 1968, respectively.



Athletic Director Barry Alvarez

Barry Alvarez began his head football coaching duties at Wisconsin in 1990, and in April of 2004 began a dual role when he assumed the responsibility of Director of Athletics.

Alvarez has been at the forefront of the revival of the Badger athletic program during his entire tenure in Madison. He has guided Wisconsin to three Big Ten and Rose Bowl titles (including back-to-back in 1998–99) en route to becoming the winningest football coach in school history (99-67-4 record).

His 7-2 (.777) record in bowl games with the Badgers is among the best in college footbhall history. The 1993 national coach of the year, he is a two-time (1993 and 1998) Big Ten coach of the year and was a finalist for ESPN's coach of the decade (1990s) honor.

Alvarez is a 1969 graduate of the University of Nebraska, where he played linebacker and went on to earn his master's degree. He received a Distinguished Alumnus Award from his alma mater in 2003.

Alvarez and his wife, Cindy, are the parents of three grown children: daughters Dawn (Mrs. Brad Ferguson) and Stacy (Mrs. Mike Delzer); and son Chad. Barry and Cindy are grandparents to Joe and Jake Ferguson, and Grace Delzer.



NCAA CHAMPIONSHIPS


















In the last 11 years, the University of Wisconsin has hosted five NCAA championships and an NCAA men's basketball regional.

The Badgers have played host to the NCAA Men's Ice Hockey championship in 1993 and 1997. The 1993 event sold out in three months, the fastest sellout in NCAA hockey history.

Wisconsin played host to the NCAA Women's Volleyball Championship in 1993 and 1998. The Badgers shattered the attendance records for the championship match and two-day event both years.


The UW was also the site of the 1998 NCAA Division I Women's Golf Championship. The event was the first national championship held at University Ridge Golf Course and the first women's championship shown live on national television.

The NCAA Men's Basketball Tournament came to Wisconsin in 2002 when the Badgers played host to a regional in the Kohl Center.

Wisconsin Traditions



Badger Nickname

The nickname "Badgers" was borrowed from the state of Wisconsin, which was dubbed the "Badger State." The name didn't come from the animals in the region, but rather from an association with lead miners in the 1820s. Without shelter in the winter, the miners had to "live like Badgers" in tunnels burrowed into hillsides.

Bucky Badger

Although badgers in various forms had been the University of Wisconsin mascot for decades, the version that is currently known as Bucky, sporting a cardinal and white sweater, was first drawn in 1940 by professional illustrator Art Evans.

In 1949, a student wore a badger outfit with a papier-mâché head at the homecoming game. A pep rally was held to determine the mascot's name—Buckingham U. Badger.

Bud Song

An integral part of any Wisconsin band performance is the playing of the Bud song. The tune is a spinoff of the song "You've said it all," a jingle with words and music originally written by Steve Karen for Budweiser beer commercials. The song has become legendary at the UW because of its polka-like rhythm.

Fifth Quarter

The Wisconsin band has become nationally famous for its post-game celebration called the Fifth Quarter. Win or lose, fans sing, dance and cheer the band as it plays traditional favorites like "On, Wisconsin" and the Bud song.

On Wisconsin

The tune was composed in 1909 by William Purdy, with the words written by UW alumnus Carl Beck, who rewrote them in 1951. Some 2,500 schools and colleges have adopted the music and changed the words to suit their needs.

WISCONSIN ATHLETICS MISSION STATEMENT


The Division of Intercollegiate Athletics at the University of Wisconsin–Madison dedicates itself to the mission of providing athletic opportunities to a wide range of students and an environment in which all student-athletes can achieve their academic and competitive goals. The Division strives to provide equitable opportunities for all student-athletes and staff, regardless of gender or ethnic background. To honor its academic mission and that of the University, the Division supports the educational aspirations, academic progress and general welfare of the student-athlete. In competition, the Division fosters principles of sportsmanship, respect, fair play and athletic excellence. In all of its activities, the Division insists on integrity, ethical conduct and accountability.

Badgers in the Community

The Madison community is extremely supportive of the University of Wisconsin athletic teams and its many student-athletes. In return for that support, many student-athletes take time out of their busy schedules to show their appreciation and involvement in the city of Madison and Dane County through their community service efforts.

Student-athletes have assisted in a variety of service projects including the AIDS Support Network, Big Brothers and Big Sisters, Habitat for Humanity, Hammer with a Heart, Special Olympics, United Way, Very Special Arts, visiting children in local hospitals with the Amanda the Panda program, and volunteering at local schools in the Bookin' It with Bucky program.

The athletic department also donates a number of tickets and memorabilia to local charities for fund-raising purposes.



NCAA Compliance

As a member of the Big Ten Conference, Western Collegiate Hockey Association, and the National Collegiate Athletic Association (NCAA), the University of Wisconsin must abide by many rules and regulations. Below is general information on how these guidelines apply to prospective student-athletes and representative of athletics interests.

Definitions

A prospective student-athlete is any student who has started classes for the ninth grade. Before the ninth grade, one becomes a prospective student-athlete if a college gives the individual (or his/her relatives or friends) any financial aid or other benefits that the college does not provide to prospective students generally.

A prospective student-athlete is recruited at a particular university when its coach approaches the prospect (or any member of the prospect's family) about enrolling and participating in athletics at that college by any one of the following three ways:

- Providing an official visit to the university's campus;
- Having an arranged, in-person, offcampus encounter with a prospect or the prospect's family; or
- Placing more than one telephone call to a prospect or any other member of his/her family.

A representative of the UW's athletics interests ("booster") is anyone who . . .

- is an alumnus of the UW
- has contributed to a Badger athletic program
- has helped arrange employment of enrolled and prospective UW student-athletes
- has been involved in any way promoting the Badger athletic program.

The Recruiting Process

Institutional staff members have very specific recruiting guidelines that vary by sport. The major areas are: telephone calls, contacts, evaluations, campus visits, correspondence, and highlight films/videotapes.

In addition to general recruiting regulations, no booster can be involved in recruiting (e.g., no phone calls, letters, or inperson contacts).

Eligibility

Prospects who intend to participate in Division I intercollegiate athletics must register with and be certified by the NCAA Initial Eligibility Clearinghouse. Please contact your high school counselor for more information on this process, especially regarding the requirements to be eligible.

Extra Benefits

By NCAA definition, an extra benefit is any special arrangement by an institutional

employee or a booster to provide a studentathlete or a student-athlete's relative or friend a benefit that is not expressly authorized by NCAA legislation. This is prohibited. If the benefit is demonstrated to be generally available to ALL UW STUDENTS or their relatives or friends determined on a basis unrelated to athletic ability, it is not a violation of NCAA rules.

Extra benefits are also not permissible for prospective student-athletes. They are called offers and inducements, and include any benefit such as cash, clothing, cars, improper expenses, transportation, gifts or loans to encourage you to sign a National Letter of Intent or attend an NCAA university. UW Compliance On-Line Training Program Compliance Rules and Regs is a compliance training program available on the Internet. Student-athletes, coaches and designated athletic department staff are required to complete the program, while boosters are encouraged to participate. Fetzer Student-Athlete Academic Center

The Fetzer Student-Athlete Academic Center has been helping Wisconsin student-athletes to achieve their academic goals since 1997.

The 15,000-square-foot, state-of-theart facility serves the needs of all studentathletes. The center features an open area with carrels that can accommodate up to 30 students. There are eight study rooms of different shapes and sizes, including a 55-seat auditorium. A state-of-the-art computer lab, under coordinator Jim Eisenmann, is networked to allow access to email, the libary system's electronic catalog and the web while the entire center is wired with voice/data jacks and power ports.

Associate Athletic Director David Harris supervises a staff of five advisors, four learning specialists and a tutor coordinator who conduct the academic services offered to the more than 700 studentathletes. The advising staff of Tom Browne, Chris Butler, Jerry Darda, Mary Weaver-Klees and Alan Zussman as well as tutorial coordinator Jill Hadfield work along with learning specialists Doug Tiedt (assistant director), Dan Ott, Maryellen Rock and Nancy Gatyas to render quality academic and personal support to student-athletes and assist coaches in providing the best possible collegiate experience. The staff, including program assistant Nancy Kreklow, has a comprehensive understanding of academics at Wisconsin, and a permanent line of communication with all university departments. Study groups, tutors and a variety of academic and career planning are available throughout the year.

Student-athletes can drop in before practice or between classes to study or meet with the advisors and learning specialists whose offices are located in the center. Sessions are offered on a one-to-one basis at a time appropriate for the student-athlete. Athletes are degree-oriented while allowing for the flexibility to explore different areas. The staff takes a personal approach to each student-athlete in determining his or her individual needs, personal or academic.

Student-athletes at Wisconsin receive recognition for outstanding academics in a number of ways on the national, conference and university level. The annual Student-Athlete Academic banquet recognizes student-athletes off the field of play.

Sports Medicine

The sports medicine staff provides all University of Wisconsin student-athletes with high quality health care. Wisconsin's Sports Medicine program features state-of-the-art facilities and the services of leading sports medicine and health care professionals.

The sports medicine staff consists of team physicians, dentists, athletic trainers, and a full-time nutritionist. The day-to-day care, prevention, and treatment of injuries to Badger athletes is supervised by a staff of 12 full-time and two graduate assistant National Athletic Trainers Association (NATA) certified and State of Wisconsin licensed athletic trainers.

Under the direction of head athletic trainer Dennis Helwig, the Sports Medicine program focuses on injury prevention. Full-time athletic trainers Karen Bloch, Beth Cranley, Greg Ehlers, Chuck Hart, Jan Helwig, Andy Hrodey, Mike Moll, Henry Perez-Guerra, Kristen Walker, Laura Walluk, and Ian Wood as well as graduate assistant trainers Holli Schaible and Nicole Gehrich utilize functional measures, measure physiological capacity and outline programs to improve flexibility.

Full-time nutritionist Jeremy Isensee provides dietary analysis and supervises training table meals to enhance the performance of the student-athletes.

The Sports Medicine facility in the McClain Center features an extensive collection of therapeutic and rehabilitation equipment including a 50-foot, two-lane-rehabilitation pool and an on-site x-ray facility. Considered one of the nation's finest, the McClain Sports Medicine Center offers an environment conducive to expedient care and a healthy return to competition.

Should an injury occur, athletes are seen immediately by team physicians affiliated with the world-renowned UW Hospital and Clinics. Medical director Dr. Ben Graf, an orthopedic surgeon, is responsible for all services provided to student-athletes. Orthopedic care is also provided by team physician Dr. John Orwin and Dr. Lee Kaplan. General medical care is directed by the head of primary care, Dr. Greg Landry, and he is joined by Dr. David Berhardt, Dr. Tom Best and Dr. Kathleen Carr.

In addition to the headquarters in the McClain Athletic Facility, auxiliary athletic training rooms are located in Camp Randall Stadium, Natatorium, UW Field House, and the Kohl Center. All training areas are equipped with the finest therapeutic modalities and rehabilitative apparatus.

Strength & Conditioning

The Wisconsin strength and conditioning program is a key component in all of the Badger teams' success on the playing field. The program's goal is to increase the overall performance of each student-athlete, prevent injuries and help athletes reach their potential.

Strength and conditioning coordinator John Dettmann along with assistants Brian Bott, Ben Herbert, Scott Hettenbach, Bryan Miller, Mike Potenza and Jim Snider work with the UW coaches to develop training programs to enhance each athlete's performance.

Badger athletes work on their strength programs in weight rooms in the McClain Center, Kohl Center and Camp Randall Stadium.

The McClain Center weight room is the largest of the facilities and features more than 45,000 pounds of free weights and more than 50 weight machines. The room has seven squat racks, eight bench press stations, eight flat-to-incline benches, six Olympic lift platforms and numerous other free weight stations.

The Kohl Center weight room is equipped with five custom-built free weight power platforms and 4,000 pounds of free weights. The room has nine pieces of cardiovascular equipment and three Vertimax jump trainers.

The Badger Den has five power stations with each station consisting of a platform for Olympic style lifting as well as a squat rack, bench press, incline bench press, pull-up station and a dip station. There are three lat-pull machines and seated row machines, a complete set of dumbbells and a complete set of plyometric boxes.









Madison: A Great College Town


A progressive, cosmopolitan city of more than 200,000 people, Madison possesses both small town charm and an urban sophistication usually found in much larger cities.




