Badgers Open Home Season vs. Western Illinois

The Wisconsin football team (1-0) plays its first home game of the 2006 season this afternoon, hosting Western Illinois (1-0). Kickoff is scheduled for 2:30 p.m. and the game will be televised by ESPNU. Dave Armstrong and Randy Wright will handle the commentary.

The game will also be televised on a tape-delay basis by Wisconsin Public Television. Mike Heller and former Badger Scott Nelson will handle the commentary. The game will be shown statewide beginning at 10:30 p.m.

Fans can listen to the game on the 53station Wisconsin Radio Network. Locally in Madison the game can be heard on WIBA (1310 am/101.5 fm). Matt Lepay and Mike Lucas are on the call.

The Badgers opened the season last Saturday with a 35-14 win over Bowling Green in Cleveland Browns Stadium

UW received a solid all-around effort in the victory. In his first game as a Badger, redshirt freshman P.J. Hill carried the ball 22 times for 130 yards and a touchdown. Quarterback John Stocco was 9-of-15 for 124 yards and a TD.

On the defensive side of the ball, line-backers Mark Zalewski and Jonathan Casillas both had big games. Zalewski recorded a career-high 14 tackles (including 10 in the first half) while Casillas blocked a punt and recovered it for a touchdown to go with his personal-best 12 tackles.

Western Illinois, picked third in the Football Gazette I-AA Mid-Major Preseason Poll, kicked off the season with a 31-6 win at home over Morehead State.

The Leathernecks forced five turnovers in their season-opening. WIU is led by senior quarterback Steve LaFalce, who ranked 10th in the country in pass efficiency rating last year.

Today is Hall of Fame Day at Camp Randall Stadium. At halftime, the newest members of the Wisconsin Athletic Hall of Fame will be recognized. Those new members are: Marc Behrend - hockey, Paul Gruber - football, Duane Kleven - wrestling, Pam Moore - track and basketball, Ken Siebel - basketball and Don Voss - football and track.

Today's Game at Camp Randall

Notable, Quotable and Promotable Our top 10 items for this week ...

Redshirt freshman running back P.J. Hill rushed for 130 yards and one touchdown on 22 carries vs. Bowling Green. His 130 yards were the second-most in UW history by a freshman in his first game. Anthony Davis ran for 147 yards vs. Virginia on Aug. 25, 2001.


Wisconsin head coach Bret Bielema became just the second UW coach in history to win his debut away from Madison. The only other coach to do so was Herb Alward whose 1891 Badgers defeated Beloit on the road. Bielema will attempt to become just the second UW head coach to win his first two games since Clarence Spears did so in 1932. Dave McClain won his first two games in 1978.

Wisconsin is 17-1 in its last 18 regular-season non-conference games. That includes wins in the last nine straight against non-Big Ten foes. UW's only loss during that 18-game stretch was a 23-5 setback to UNLV in Madison on Sept. 13, 2003. UW is also 24-2 in its last 26 non-conference home games.

Today is Wisconsin's 2006 home opener. The Badgers are 94-19-4 all-time in home openers and have not lost a home opener since 1995 against Colorado (43-7).

UW head coach Bret Bielema and Western Illinois coach Don Patterson coached together at Iowa from 1994-98. Patterson was also Bielema's first position coach at Iowa. Bielema was a tight end early in his college career before moving to defensive line.





Sophomore linebacker Jonathan Casillas was named Big Ten co-Special Teams Player of the Week after blocking a punt and recovering it for a touchdown against Bowling Green on Saturday. It was Casillas' third blocked punt in 13 career games as a Badger.

Tight end Andy Crooks, tight end Travis Beckum, wide receiver Luke Swan, running back Dywon Rowan and fullback Bill Rentmeester all recorded their first career receptions vs. Bowling Green. With three receptions on Saturday, Beckum is now the career leader in catches among active players on UW's roster (Marcus Randle El also has three career receptions but is likely out for the season with a knee injury).

Sophomore linebacker Jonathan Casillas was named Big
Ten co-Special Teams Player of the Week after blocking a
punt and recovering it for a touchdown in the second
quarter vs. Bowling Green. It was the third blocked punt for
Casillas in just his 13th game as a Badger.

Wisconsin carries a 16-4 record in its last 20 games at Camp Randall Stadium into the 2006 campaign. That includes an 11-1 mark over the past two seasons.

Casillas and fellow linebacker Mark Zalewski recorded career highs in tackles vs. Bowling Green. Zalewski made 14 total stops (including 10 in the first half), the most of any Big Ten player last week. Casillas had 12 tackles, including a team-high 2.5 tackles for loss.

Quarterback John Stocco has started every game for the Badgers in the last three seasons (26 straight). UW has a 20-6 record in games started by Stocco. He has started every game while Bret Bielema has been on Wisconsin's coaching staff.

P.J. Hill rushed 22 times for 130 yards and a touchdown in his Badger debut last week vs. Bowling Green.

Bielema and Patterson were on the same coaching staff at Iowa from 1994-98 ... the last time UW played a Div. I-AA team was a 24-6 win over Western Kentucky on Sept. 29, 2001, a game that was rescheduled following the Sept. 11 terrorist attacks.



Trending Upwards

Only 11 NCAA Division I programs have won at least 19 games during the past two seasons and Wisconsin is one of them. In fact, the Badgers' 19 victories in 2004-05 are more than any other Big Ten school.

Among Big Ten schools, only Wisconsin, Ohio State and Michigan have been to bowl games in 11 of the past 13 seasons. Wisconsin has a better bowl winning percentage (.727) during that time than either the Buckeyes (.583) or Wolverines (.538).



Linebacker Mark Zalewski, in his second year as a team captain, recorded a career-high 14 tackles vs. Bowling Green.

Tidbits

- Wisconsin has scored at least 30 points in nine of its last 14 games. The Badgers have won eight of those nine games (their only loss was at Northwestern, 51-48, on Oct. 8, 2005).
- In the last three seasons, while Bret Bielema has been on Wisconsin's coaching staff, the Badgers have given up fewer than 20 points in a game 13 times. The Badgers are 13-0 in those games.
- Wisconsin committed just two penalties (for 15 yards) against Bowling Green. That was the fewest penalty yards against for any Big Ten team in the opening weekend of play. UW's two penalties were its fewest in a season-opener since committing one penalty against Colorado on Sept. 2, 1995.
- UW has won its last 11 games in the month of September and is 18-1 over the past five years in games played before Oct. 1.
- The Wisconsin record for most victories by a first-year Badger head coach is seven by William Juneau, whose 1912 team was 7-0, and Phil King, whose 1896 club went 7-1-1.



Chancellor John D. Wiley





hancellor John D. Wiley has more than four decades of experience with the University of isconsin–Madison, having been a gradute student, a professor, and an administrator during his illustrious university areer. Assuming office on January 1, 001, he is the 27th person to lead the niversity since its founding in 1848.

As UW-Madison's chief executive offier, Wiley is responsible for the overall vision and direction of the university. He represents the institution for a variety of constituents, including alumni groups, chambers of commerce and service clubs, the state legislature and governmental bodies, the UW System Administration, and the UW System Board of Regents. A prominent figure in higher education, he chairs both the Big Ten Council of Presidents and Chancellors and the board for the Council on Higher Education Accreditation, and is a member of the National Security Higher Education Advisory Committee. He also serves on several local and community boards, including the William T. Evjue Foundation and the Greater Madison Chamber of Commerce. He also has been deeply involved in fundraising from individual and corporate donors and charitable foundations.

From 1994-2000, Wiley served as UW–Madison's provost and vice chancellor for academic affairs. In this role as the university's chief operating officer and deputy chancellor, he worked closely with deans, faculty, academic staff, and student committees in the exercise of shared governance and the overall management of the institution. Prior to becoming provost, he was dean of the Graduate School and the university's senior research officer, and from 1986-89, he served as associate dean for research in the College of Engineering.

Wiley received his bachelor's degree in physics from Indiana University in 1964. He attended graduate school at UW-Madison as a National Science Foundation Fellow, receiving master's and doctoral degrees in physics in 1965 and 1968, respectively. He joined the technical staff of Bell Telephone Laboratories at Murray Hill, N.J., from 1968-1974, and then spent a year at the Max Planck Institute in Stuttgart, Germany as an awardee of the Alexander von Humboldt Senior U.S. Service Award for Research and Training.

Joining the UW-Madison faculty in the Department of Electrical and Computer Engineering in August 1975, Wiley began a productive career in teaching and research, focusing on topics related to semiconductors and other materials and processes important to the electronics field. He is a co-founder of several highly successful research centers, including the Center for X-ray Lithography and the Engineering Research Center for Plasma-Aided Manufacturing. From 1982-86, he chaired the Materials Science Program, a graduate-level, interdepartmental-committee program for master's and doctoral degrees.





Director of Athletics Barry Alvarez





arry Alvarez is in his third year as UW Director of Athletics, but his first without the additional title of ad football coach.

For 16 years (1990-2005), Alvarez ided Wisconsin's football fortunes. He noted the Badgers to three Big Ten onference and Rose Bowl titles (including ock-to-back in 1998-99) en route to coming the winningest football coach in shool history (118-73-4 record).

Alvarez was just the 10th coach in Big Ten history to win 100 games at one conference institution. His 8-3 (.727) record in bowl games with the Badgers is the best in college football history (among coaches with at least 11 bowl appearances). The 2004 AFCA Region 3 Coach of the Year, he also was the 1993 national coach of the year, a two-time Big Ten coach of the year and a finalist for ESPN's coach of the decade (1990s) honor.

In 2004-05, Alvarez served as athletic director and football coach and has been at the forefront of the revival of the Badger athletic program during his entire tenure in Madison.

He is a 1969 graduate of Nebraska, where he played linebacker and went on to earn his master's degree. He received a Distinguished Alumnus Award from his alma mater in 2003.

Alvarez and his wife, Cindy, are the parents of three children, Dawn (Mrs. Brad Ferguson), Stacy (Mrs. Mike Delzer) and Chad (wife Stephanie). Barry and Cindy are grandparents to Joe and Jake Ferguson. Grace and Jackson Delzer, and Scarlet Alvarez.

- Grew up in a small mining town (Langeloth) in western Pennsylvania. He played all sports as a kid and idolized former Pittsburgh Pirates outfielder Roberto Clemente.
- Babcock Hall, which houses the UW's nationally acclaimed dairy school, developed an ice cream flavor in honor of the Badger head coach in 1994. It was named Berry Alvarez, and the flavor was a mixture of raspberry, strawberry and blueberry.
- Helped honor former Chicago Cubs' announcer Harry Caray by singing "Take me out to the ballgame" during a seventh-inning stretch in May of 1999
- A finalist for ESPN's College Football Coach of the Decade Award in 1999. He was one of 18
 coaches named to a new position in 1990 and was the only one still at the school that hired
 him when he retired in 2005.
- Got his college coaching start with Hayden Fry at Iowa in 1979, one season after leading Mason City High School to the 4A state championship.
- Named one of the "100 Most Influential Hispanics" by Hispanic Business in October of 2001
- Alvarez and his wife, Cindy, gave \$100,000 to support the opening of Gilda's Club of Madison, a free support center for families dealing with cancer.
- Numerous former Alvarez assistants at Wisconsin have gone on to success on the
 professional level, among them Bill Callahan (former Oakland Raiders head coach, now head
 coach of Nebraska), Brad Childress (Minnesota Vikings head coach), Jay Hayes (Cincinnati
 Bengals defensive line coach) and Jay Norvell (former Oakland Raiders tight ends coach,
 now with Nebraska)



Head Coach Bret Bielema

Pret Bielema is in his first year as head football coach at the University of Wisconsin. The second-youngest head football coach in the Division I-A ranks, he brings a remarkably strong background to the position.

Bielema was Wisconsin's defensive coordinator in 2004 and 2005, a period in which the program produced a 19-6 record under former head coach Barry Alvarez. The 2004 Badgers were sixth nationally in scoring defense and ninth in total defense. The 2005 club, which earned Wisconsin's first shutout since 1999, finished its 10-win season with a 24-10 victory over No. 7 Auburn in the 2006 Capital One Bowl; UW limited the

high-powered Tigers to just 236 yards of total offense.

. . .

During Bielema's two years guiding the Badger defense, two players (DE Erasmus James and DB Jim Leonhard) earned first-team All-America honors and two others (DT Anttaj Hawthorne and DB Scott Starks) were firstteam All-Big Ten selections. While coaching the Badgers' linebackers, Bielema developed Mark Zalewski and Dontez Sanders, both of whom earned honorable mention all-conference acclaim.

Bielema was co-defensive coordinator at Kansas State under former head coach Bill Snyder from 2002–03. The Wildcats were 22-6 during Bielema's time there and finished in the top 10 nationally (in both 2002 and 2003) in scoring and total defense. The Wildcats won their first Big 12 title in 2003. Among Bielema's standout players at Kansas State were first-team All-American Josh Buhl, 2003 NFL second-round draft pick Terry Pierce and second-team All-Big 12 selection Bryan Hickman.

Prior to his years at Kansas
State, Bielema spent nine seasons
as an assistant coach at his alma mater,
Iowa, where he worked for head coaches
Hayden Fry and Kirk Ferentz. The 1997
Hawkeyes posted three shutouts and
ranked No. 4 nationally in scoring
defense. Bielema coached Fred Barr
(first-team All-Big Ten), Vernon Rollins
and Matt Hughes (both honorable mention All-Big Ten) at Iowa.

Head coaches for whom Bielema has worked—Alvarez, Snyder, Ferentz and Fry—have combined to win 547 games and guide their teams to 41 bowl games, so the first-year Badger mentor has learned from some of the best in the business.



Bielema earned four letters (1989–92 after joining the Iowa football program as a walk-on. He was a member of Iowa's 1990 Big Ten championship team. A starter as a junior in 1991, he was a team co-captain as a senior. Bielema signed a free agent contract with the Seattle Seahawks and later completed his playing career with the Milwaukee Mustangs of the Arena Football League. Bielema has participated in 10 bowl games as a player or coach.

A 1992 graduate of Iowa with a bach elor's degree in marketing, Bielema was born in Prophetstown, Ill., on Jan. 13, 1970.



Six Inducted into Wisconsin Athletic Hall of Fame

Five former student-athletes and one former coach were inducted into the University of Wisconsin Athletic Hall of Fame last night in a ceremony held in GAR Park, located just east of the Camp Randall Memorial Sports Center (Shell). There are now 148 members of the UW Athletic Hall of Fame.

Here is a look at the six newest inductees:

Marc Behrend

Hockey (1980-83)

Originally a walk-on for the Badgers in 1980, Marc Behrend holds the UW record for best career winning percentage by a goaltender with his 49-8-3 record.

Behrend led the Badgers to their 1981 and 1983 NCAA Championship victories, earning tournament MVP both years.

Behrend remains one of the best goalies in Wisconsin history as he ranks third on UW's season list for save percentage (.920) and goals against average (2.23). After graduating from UW, Behrend joined the 1984 U.S. Olympic hockey team before going on to play parts of three seasons in the NHL with the Winnipeg Jets.

Paul Gruber

Football (1984-87)


A four-year standout for the Badgers from 1984-87, Paul Gruber is considered by many to be one of the best offensive linemen to come out of Wisconsin, Gruber came to the Badgers from Sauk Prairie High School. When he arrived on campus in 1983 he thought he would be playing tight end and defensive line. Early in his freshman year coaches moved him to the offensive line where he would become an anchor for the Badgers. As a senior captain, Gruber was listed at 6-4 and

291 pounds. His size, coupled with his strength to bench 450 pounds and squat 675 pounds along with his ability to run a 4.8 second 40-vard dash made him one of the most talented offensive linemen in the country. In 1987 he was named first-team All-Big Ten and was named an All-American by The Sporting News. One year later, with the fourth overall pick in the 1988 NFL draft, Gruber was selected by the Tampa Bay Buccaneers. That was the highest any lineman has been drafted in school history. Gruber had a successful 12-year NFL career, starting 183 games and earning three trips to the Pro Bowl. **Duane Kleven**

Wrestling Coach (1970-82)

A graduate of the University of Wisconsin, Duane Kleven was named UW's 12th wrestling coach on Aug. 21, 1970. In his first season at Wisconsin, Kleven guided the Badgers to a 13-4 record, which tied a school record for most wins in a season. Kleven led Wisconsin to nine top-three Big Ten finishes in 12 seasons. Nationally, his teams ranked in the top-seven six times. He also coached nine NCAA champions and 25 All-Americans. In 1976 Kleven was recognized as the United States Wrestling Federation's Coach of the Year. He was

awarded the same honor by the NCAA one year later. After retiring from coaching Kleven remained in the UW Athletic Department, serving many positions such as the director of the Camp Randall Memorial Sports Center, Associate Athletic Director and later, director of special events. In 2002 the athletic department awarded him with the Pat O'Dea Award.



Paul Gruber is one of only 11 Badgers to be picked in the top 10 of the NFL draft.

Pam Moore

Track (1978-81) Basketball (1978)

Madison native and two-sport letterwinner Pam Moore had an amazing athletic career for the Badgers. Moore came to campus on a basketball scholarship and led the team in scoring and rebounding as a freshman. To this day Moore still holds six freshman records, including highest scoring average (15.7 ppg) and rebounding average (8.7 rpg). It was after her freshman year that she decided to concentrate solely on track and field. The two-time All-American won 11 career Big Ten titles in addition to her record-setting 400-meter NCAA championship in 1981. In 1992, Moore was inducted into the Wisconsin Track and Field Hall of Fame as well as the Madison Sports Hall of Fame in 2000.

Ken Siebel

Basketball (1961-63)

Known by his head coach as a "complete player" Ken Siebel made an immediate impact on the Badgers. In his first two seasons on the varsity he led the team in scoring and field goal percentage. Siebel was a three-year starter for the Badgers from 1961-63. In all three of those seasons he was voted team MVP. A two-time second-team All-Big Ten selection, Seibel was recognized nationally in 1963 when he was selected to play in the East-West All-Star College Game.

Don Voss

Football (1951-52) Track (1952)

Two-sport athlete Don Voss was a member of the famed 1951 "Hard Rocks" defensive unit that led the country, allowing just 6.6 points per game. As a member of that team, Voss blocked and recovered two punts and was named a first-team freshman All-American by United Press International. He also helped guide the Badgers to the 1952 Big Ten Championship as a defensive end. In his sophmore year, Voss was named to the 1952 Look Magazine All-American team and helped lead Wisconsin to the 1953 Rose Bowl.

Bob Bostad Tight Ends

Bob Bostad (pronounced BO-stad), a state of Wisconsin native who coached the offensive line at New Mexico from 1999-2005, is in his first season as an assistant football coach at Wisconsin.

Bostad coaches the Badgers' tight ends.
Bostad's 2005 offensive line featured a
pair of first-team all-conference selections,
including center Ryan Cook and guard
Robert Turner. New Mexico averaged 200
yards per game on the ground in 2005. Cook
was a second-round draft choice of the
Vikings, while tackle Terrance Pennington
was a seventh-round pick of the Bills.

During Bostad's tenure at New Mexico, 14 Lobo offensive linemen earned all-conference mention. Among the players Bostad coached at New Mexico were: tackle Claude Terrell, a third-team A.P. All-American and fourth-round draft choice of the St. Louis Rams (he started as a rookie for the Rams in 2005) and tackle Jason Lenzmeier, who became the first offensive lineman in conference and school history to earn MWC offensive player of the week honors in 2003.

Bostad was offensive line coach (1997-98) and offensive coordinator (1998) at San Jose State prior to his years at New Mexico.

Bostad coached the offensive line at Cal State Northridge in 1995-96 and spent three seasons (1992-94) as an offensive line graduate assistant at Minnesota under head coach Jim Wacker.

Bostad got his coaching start at his alma mater, UW-Stevens Point, where he coached the offensive line from 1990-91.

Bostad graduated from UW-Stevens Point in 1989 with a degree in physical education. He was a four-year starter as a linebacker for the Pointers and earned all-conference mention each year. Bostad earned a master's degree in kinesiology from Minnesota in 1994.

Bostad, 39, is a native of Pardeeville, Wis. He and his wife, Cara, have three daughters: Rachel, Bryn and Annika, and a son, John Robert.

Paul Chryst Off. Coordinator / QBs

Paul Chryst is in his second consecutive season at Wisconsin and his third overall as an assistant coach for the Badger's.

Chryst, UW's co-offensive coordinator and tight ends coach last season, is now the program's offensive coordinator and quarterbacks coach.

Chryst, the Badgers' tight ends coach in 2002, returned to Wisconsin in 2005 and his impact on the UW offense was immediately evident. The 2005 Badgers set school records for points scored in a season (446) and for season scoring average (34.3 ppg). The Badger passing game was much improved, with QB John Stocco setting school season records for passing yards, passing TDs and pass completions.

Chryst was offensive coordinator and quarterbacks coach at Oregon State in 2003-04. He helped the Beavers rank No. 6 nationally in passing yardage per game and 10th in total offense in 2003. The 2003 Beavers became the first team in Division I history with a 4,000-yard passer, 1,500-yard rusher and two 1,000-yard receivers.

Chryst came to Wisconsin in 2002 after serving as an assistant coach with the San Diego Chargers, where he developed Freddie Jones into one of the NFL's top tight ends.

Previously, Chryst was an assistant coach at Oregon State (1997-98), the Saskatchewan Roughriders (1996), Illinois State (1995), the Ottawa Rough Riders (1994), UW-Platteville (1993) and the World League's San Antonio Riders (1991-92). He was a graduate assistant at West Virginia (1989-90).

Chryst was a three-time football letterwinner at Wisconsin, where he earned a degree in political science in 1988. He added a master's degree in educational administration from West Virginia in 1990. Paul's late father. George, was a longtime head coach at UW-Platteville and a former Badger player and assistant coach.

Chryst and his wife, Robin, have three children: Katy, JoJo and Danny.

Kerry Cooks Defensive Backs

Kerry Cooks, defensive backs coach at the University of Minnesota last season, is in first year as defensive backs coach at Wisconsin.


Cooks comes to Wisconsin after one year coaching the Golden Gophers' second ary. Minnesota qualified for the Music Cip Bowl last season, while Cooks' unit allow opponents to complete just 56.8 percent their passes (fourth-best in the Big Ten). That figure dropped to 55.3 percent in conference games, tied for second in the leag with Penn State.

Prior to his year at Minnesota, Cooks coached defensive backs and assisted on special teams for one season (2004) at Western Illinois. Under Cooks' direction, by Leathernecks limited opponents to a Gateway Conference-best 157.2 passing yards per game; held opponents to the longest completion percentage (45.4) in the conference; and finished second in the league with 17 interceptions.

Cooks was a four-year letterwinner two-year starter as a strong safety at low from 1994-97. He was a team captain as senior and earned All-Big Ten honors an spot in the East-West Shrine Game. A fif round draft choice of the Minnesota Viki in 1998, Cooks also played for Green Ba Atlanta and Jacksonville before retiring the NFL in 2001. He also played for the Chicago Enforcers of the XFL in 2001.



The Jayhawks, who routed Houston. 2-13, in the 2005 Fort Worth Bowl, led the ig 12 Conference and ranked No. 3 nationly in rushing defense (83.3 ypg) this past eason Kansas also was No. 2 in the Big 12 nd 11th nationally in total defense (303.3 g). KU linebacker Nick Reid was a twone, first-team All-Big 12 selection, a thirdam A.P. All-American and was the Big 12 lensive Player of the Year in 2005.

Doeren went to Kansas after spending o seasons as the secondary coach at ontana. The Grizzlies won the NCAA vision I-AA title in 2001. Doeren coached en all-conference defensive backs at ntana, including two who earned Allnerica honors.

Prior to his time at Montana, Doeren s a two-year (1998-99) graduate assistant Southern California and started his colcoaching career as an assistant at ke from 1995-97.

Doeren began coaching at Shawnee ssion (Kan.) Northwest High School in 94. A graduate of Bishop Miege High 100l in Shawnee Mission, Doeren was a r-year letterwinner at Drake and earned ademic All-America honors as a senior.

The 34-year-old Doeren, who has ched in three bowl games and two lional championship contests, is a native Shawnee Mission, Kan. He and his wife, a, have three sons: Jacob, Luke and nnor (born in April of 2006).

Mike Hankwitz **Defensive Coordinator**

Mike Hankwitz is in his first season as Wisconsin's defensive coordinator.

Hankwitz spent the past two seasons as defensive coordinator and outside linebackers coach at Colorado. He served as the program's interim head coach for the Buffaloes' 2005 Champs Sports Bowl appearance against Clemson. Hankwitz went to Colorado after serving as Arizona's defensive coordinator (and later interim head coach) in 2003.

Prior to his stint at Arizona, Hankwitz was the defensive coordinator and outside linebackers coach at Texas A&M (1997-2002) where he guided the Aggies' famed "Wrecking Crew" defense. Among Hankwitz's standout players at Texas A&M was Dat Nguyen, who won the Lombardi and Bednarik Awards, as well as being named Chevrolet Defensive Player of the Year.

Hankwitz spent two seasons (1995-96) as defensive coordinator and inside linebackers coach at Kansas after enjoying a highly successful 10-year run as defensive coordinator at Colorado from 1985-94. Colorado put together the nation's fifth-best record (58-11-4) from 1989-94, including a national title in 1990, three Big 8 titles, two appearances each in the Orange and Fiesta Bowls and six national top-20 rankings (including three top-five finishes).

Hankwitz was defensive coordinator at Western Michigan from 1982-84 and outside linebackers and punting coach at Purdue from 1977-81. Prior to his time at Purdue. Hankwitz was the outside linebackers and secondary coach at Arizona from 1973-76.

Hankwitz began his coaching career as a graduate assistant (1970-72) at his alma mater, Michigan, under head coach Bo Schembechler.

The 58-year-old Hankwitz is a native of Ludington, Mich. He was a three-year football letterwinner for the Wolverines and started on the 1969 Big Ten championship squad. Hankwitz earned a B.S. in education in 1970. He and his wife. Cathy, have a son. Jacob. 12.

Henry Mason Wide Receivers / Assistant Recruiting Coordinator

Henry Mason is in his 12th season coaching wide receivers at Wisconsin.

Under Mason's guidance, Wisconsin has consistently produced some of the nation's best pass-catchers since the mid-1990s.

Mason's most recent standouts were Brandon Williams and Jonathan Orr, both of whom were selected in the 2006 NFL Draft. Williams, a 2005 second-team All-American. finished his career ranked first in receptions (202) and second in yards (2,924) at Wisconsin. Orr is third all-time at UW with 19 touchdown catches and eighth in school history with 1,824 receiving yards.

Mason also coached Bedford, Ohio. products Lee Evans and Chris Chambers. Evans, a 2001 Biletnikoff Award finalist and first-team All-American, is UW's career leader in receiving yards (3,468) and touchdowns (27) and was a 2004 first-round draft choice of the Buffalo Bills. Chambers, a second-round draft pick of the Miami Dolphins in 2001, is fourth on the school's list for career receiving yards with 2,004.

Early in Mason's career at Wisconsin. Tony Simmons and Donald Hayes developed into standout receivers and eventual NFL draft picks.

Prior to coming to Wisconsin in 1995. Mason coached receivers at Western Michigan from 1991-94. Mason was head coach at Smith-Cotton (Mo.) High School from 1982-90. His 1988 team became the first in 13 years at the school to post a winning record. Mason also was an assistant coach at Baker University (1981) and was an assistant coach at Lexington (Mo.) High School (1979-80).

Mason, who has coached in nine bowl games with the Badgers, is a 1979 graduate of Central Missouri State, where he lettered in football and baseball. He was drafted by the Baltimore Colts and played one season with the St. Louis Cardinals.

McCray earned a bachelor's degree in mmunications from Appalachian State in ⁹¹ and a master's degree in higher educan from South Carolina. A native of nroe, N.C., McCray and his wife, Michelle, re a son, Matt (4).

Bob Palcic Offensive Line

Bob Palcic, an assistant coach in the National Football League from 1994-2005, is in his first season as Wisconsin's offensive line coach.

Palcic coached tight ends for the New Orleans Saints from 2000-05. Prior to that post he was offensive line coach for the Cleveland Browns (1999), tight ends coach for the Detroit Lions (1997-98) and offensive line coach for the Atlanta Falcons (1994-96).

Palcic went to Atlanta after spending 19 of the previous 21 seasons coaching offensive linemen at seven different universities, including Wisconsin. He coached the 1993 UCLA offensive line that matched up against the Badgers in the 1994 Rose Bowl, Palcic tutored the Southern California offensive line in 1992 and helped the Trojans to a Freedom Bowl appearance. He was offensive line coach at Ohio State from 1986-91.

Arizona's offensive line was under Palcic's direction from 1984-85 (the Wildcats played in the Sun Bowl during that time). A two-year stint (1982-83) with the Canadian Football League's Toronto Argonauts (1983) Grey Cup title) was preceded by a four-year (1978-81) stop as Wisconsin's offensive line coach under head coach Dave McClain.

Palcic was Ball State's offensive line coach in 1976-77 (he went to Wisconsin with McClain, who was Ball State's head coach) and Dayton's linebackers/offensive line coach in 1974-75. He got his college coaching start guiding Ball State's linebackers as a graduate assistant in 1973.

Palcic, 58, is a native of Gowanda, N.Y., and has a bachelor's degree in education (1971) and a master's degree in education (1974), both from Dayton. He was a linebacker for the Flyers from 1968-70. He and his wife, Theresa, have three children: Joe (currently the defensive coordinator at Indiana): Amy (an assistant in the Cleveland Browns media relations office) and Monica, who is married to Philadelphia Eagles LB Mark Simoneau.

John Settle is now in his first season as running backs coach at Wisconsin. Settle most recently served eight seasons as running backs coach at Fresno State, where he tutored six 1.000-vard rushers, including Wendell Mathis, who rushed for 1,313 yards and 15 touchdowns along with making 19 catches for 156 yards and a TD for the Bulldogs last season. Rodney Davis set the school rushing record with a 1,586-yard campaign in 2002. Settle also developed Derrick Ward, the 1999 team rushing leader. freshman All-American and current New York Giant. In addition, Settle coached 1998 WAC Pacific Division Offensive Player of the Year Jamie Kimbrough.

Settle went to Fresno State after a three-year stint (1995-98) as an offensive assistant with the Cleveland Browns/ Baltimore Ravens franchise under head coaches Bill Belicheck and Ted Marchibroda. Settle began his coaching career at his alma mater, Appalachian State, where he assisted with running backs in 1994.

Settle was a four-year letterman (1983-86) as a running back at Appalachian State. Settle finished as the school's career rushing leader with 4,409 yards (then third-most in NCAA Division I-AA history) and 43 touchdowns. He was the Southern Conference Player of the Year as a senior after rushing for 1,661 yards and 20 TDs.

Settle signed with the Atlanta Falcons as a free agent and played a total of six seasons in the NFL, four with Atlanta (1987-90) and two with the Washington Redskins. He accumulated 1,594 yards of total offense in 1988, becoming the first free agent in NFL history to rush for 1,000 yards in a season. He was named to the Pro Bowl and the All-Madden Team in 1988. He also played for the Redskins' Super Bowl championship team in 1991.

A 1989 graduate of Appalachian State with a degree in criminal justice. Settle and his wife, Karen, have three children: Jonathan, Leighton and Devynn.






bers (and sometimes even players) jump to the 1990s hip-hop tune by House of Pain. The stadium rocks and rolls and shakes and bakes!

Badger fans are also loyal. Camp Randall Stadium has witnessed crowds of at least 70,000 for 81 consecutive home games and 71 of them have been sellouts. The stadium record was set at the 2005 lowa game when 83,184 fans packed the facility for former head coach Barry Alvarez's final game. 





Badger Nickname

The nickname "Badgers" was borrowed from the state of Wisconsin, which was dubbed the "Badger State." The name didn't come from the animals in the region, but rather from an association with lead miners in the 1820s. Without shelter in the winter, the miners had to "live like Badgers" in tunnels burrowed into hillsides.

Bucky Badger

Although badgers in various forms had been the University of Wisconsin mascot for decades, the version that is currently known as Bucky, sporting a

cardinal and white sweater, was first drawn in 1940 by professional illustrator Art Evans. In 1949, a student wore a badger outfit with a papier-mâché head at the homecoming game. A pep rally was held to determine the mascot's name—Buckingham U. Badger.

Bud Song

An integral part of any Wisconsin band performance is the playing of the Bud song. The tune is a spinoff of the song "You've said it all," a jingle with words and music originally written by Steve Karen for Budweiser beer commercials. The song has become legendary at the UW because of its polka-like rhythm.

Fifth Quarter

The Wisconsin band has become nationally famous for its post-game celebration called the Fifth Quarter. Win or lose, fans sing, dance and cheer the band as it plays traditional favorites like "On, Wisconsin" and the Bud song.

On, Wisconsin

The tune was composed in 1909 by William Purdy, with the words written by UW alumnus Carl Beck, who rewrote them in 1951. Some 2,500 schools and colleges have adopted the music and changed the words to suit their needs.

Hall of Fame

The UW Athletic Hall of Fame was established in 1991 to recognize and honor former student-athletes and staff for their exemplary athletic achievement and contributions to the University of Wisconsin Athletic Department.

Camp Randall Stadium

35 AMECHE 33 DAYNE

ne of college football's finest facilities – Camp Randall Stadium – completed a four-year, \$109 million renovation prior to the 2005 football season. The improvements are plentiful: new FieldTurf, new suites and club seats, new video scoreboards, new offices, increased seating capacity and better fan amenities like concession areas, restrooms and traffic flow.

The enhancements have not detracted from Camp Randall's charm but rather the stadium's character has been enhanced greatly by the improvements, ensuring that future generations of Badger fans will have a first-rate facility at which to watch the Badgers play on Saturdays.

Camp Randall was originally used as a Civil War training site. In fact, some 70,000 soldiers trained at the camp, which also included a hospital and a prison for Confederate soldiers on its grounds. Named for Alexander Randall, the state of Wisconsin's first wartime governor, Camp Randall Stadium opened in 1917 and was officially dedicated when the Badgers defeated Minnesota, 10-7, on Nov. 3.





Senior Associate Doug Beard



Senior Associate Shawn M. Eichorst






Associate Director Terry Gawlik

ret Bielema has come full circle. The 36-year old head coach of the Badgers is the second-youngest in Division I-A. But age is just a number. His 12 years in the collegiate ranks have been under four coaching legends – Iowa's Hayden Fry and Kirk Ferentz, Kansas State's Bill Snyder and his predecessor at Wisconsin, Barry Alvarez. Now Bielema is using what he learned from his former mentors to form his own coaching philosophy and keep the tradition alive in Madison.

Bielema grew up in Prophetstown, Ill., on the family farm with two older brothers who also played football. Sundays were spent watching NFL games on television. Without cable, it was the only thing on.

Late in his high school career, Bielema soon realized there would be some college offers. He received letters from all divisions, the first one he remembers from the Air Force Academy.

"I thought for sure that is where I was going to go," Bielema said.

But that changed after Bielema attended a high school camp over the summer.

"I remember being at camp and there were some guys getting some pretty good attention from the coaches," he said. "It upset me. I knew I could do everything those guys were doing. Going into my senior year, it served as motivation for me."

Although Bielema did not earn a scholarship out of high school, he chose to walk-on at the University of Iowa. His first year as a Hawkeye was a little overwhelming. On the first day of practice he weighed just 193 pounds.

"I had never been up against that stiff of competition. But I dug in. I distinctly remember other coaches grabbing me after practice to go against other guys for additional reps."

The staff knew no one worked as hard as the kid from Prophetstown.

Bielema redshirted his first year at Iowa. During his redshirt freshman season, he played in every game and earned a scholarship in the second semester. He later would serv as team captain.

After his senior year, Bielema continued to work out, never knowing if he was going to get a shot to play professional football. On the day of the draft, after the last pick had been mad. Bielema received a call from the Seattle Seahawks to be a free agent.

But his dream of running out in a NFL uniform never happened. After his physical,

team trainers informed him additional tests were needed and by the end of the day, Bielema was sent back home. Even though he tried to hide it, the trainers discovered he no longer had his ACL. He had torn the ligament and had it removed in college.

"I came home pretty crushed," Bielema remembers.

That is when Hayden Fry came calling. Fry asked his former team captain to return to his alma mater as a graduate assistant coach. Bielema also worked part-time in the fundraising department. His experience there taught him a lot about what goes on inside an athletic department, knowledge he uses more than a decade later as a head coach.

And so, in 1994, Bielema began his rise in the coaching ranks. He took a little something from each boss and now has his own way of doing things. "Coach Fry is a master of the game. He got kids to buy into anything. He really embodied something each year. When he stepped down, I went through a big learning curve without even knowing it."

Kirk Ferentz replaced the legend Fry, and with that came with ups and downs and inevidable comparisons with Fry. For Bielema to be on that staff, to see exactly how it was handled, is something he was able to use making the transition himself.

"Kirk has great vision. He is able to take people further than they ever thought they could go," Bielema said.

After a total of eight seasons with his alma mater, Bielema saw the opportunity to get experience in another conference, with a program known for its defensive tactics.

Enter Bill Snyder and Kansas State. Bielelma spent two sea-

sons as the co-defensive coordinator and linebackers coach with the Wildcats.

"Coach Snyder really believes in hard work and out-working your opponent. He over-emphasizes the task at hand, making sure it is done over and over again, to get better each time."

Ultimately Bielema came to Madison to join the staff of Barry Alvarez, whom he says is the culmination of the coaches he

"Coach Alvarez is a great motivator with his players. He always has great themes and messages. He has a great vision, obviously, to take this program from where it was to where it is today."

Early in his transition during spring ball, Bielema quickly relayed his most important message to his players. His philosophy is a simple one. He teaches his student-athletes the three areas of ownership.

"First you have ownership in your athletic performance," Bielema pointed out "That is easily measured by what you do on the football field. Equally important is your academic responsibilities and ownership to the university, to remain eligible and earn a degree. The third issue of ownership is what you do on a day-today basis, your social values and what you do away from the

As a young coach, Bielema knows he needs to outwork a lot of people. He also knows if he and his coaching staff can get done what needs to be done on a day-to-day basis, without skipping a step, they will have success.

And the circle will continue.



The Life of a Specialist

I am the punter and the job isn't that glamorous. When the offense doesn't get the first down you don't hear many people say "Yay, we're gonna punt" unless you're sitting by my family. So when I go out there it's usually a bit of a let down, yet everyone wants to be a specialist, especially after a tough practice. We specialists seem to have the easy job. In the words of Joe Thomas, "... all they do is take a knee on the sideline, tell jokes, and drink Powerade during practice," which is true to some extent, but we usually drink water on the sideline.

All jokes aside we specialists put a lot of work in but most of it is neither with the coaches nor with the rest of the team. It is during the off-season that we change things that need to be changed and make our improvements so when the season comes we can just focus on fine tuning things. Much of our work is during the summer with just the kickers, punters, and snappers. We try to focus on the "three T's." We focus on our timing, our technique, and our tan. I am not sure who made the most improvement on timing and technique

but I would have to say Taylor Mehlhaff made the biggest improvement on the third "T."

During practices in camp and inseason we come out about an hour before practice to stretch, warm up, and kick. When the rest of the team comes out we usually don't get more than five

> or six kicks with the team. So when our kicks with the team are done we usually go to another field, usually the McClain indoor field. That is when we work on what needs work. However, kicking and punting are different than most other things in football. More repetitions don't always equal improvement. We must be careful as to not wear out our legs with over-kicking. So when we are taking a knee on the sideline during practice we are actually doing it for the good of the team.

Each week during the season, junior punter Ken DeBauche will give fans an inside look at the Badger football team. DeBauche, a Ray Guy Award candidate, is in his third season as the Badgers' punter. He averaged a school-record 44.8 yards per punt last season and owns a career punting average of 43.4, just slightly behind the school record of 43.5 held by Kevin Stemke.

First Punt Jitters

The first punt of the season is always a tough one and might be the toughest punt of the season for me. There is all of the anticipation and nerves that have been building up to that first game and there is no amount of practice that can get rid of those first-game nerves. I admit that that first punt nervousness was there for me in our first game against Bowling Green in Cleveland and the nerves did make it a tougher punt than it should have been.

However, I would have to say that the toughest punt of my career so far wasn't the first punt of a season and wasn't even in a game. It was in warm ups of my first game as starting punter two years ago against UCF. One of our pre-game rituals is to have everyone on the team line up behind the punt team at the 50 yard line, I then punt it, and then we all run into the locker room and meet before we come back out for kickoff. I was so nervous and anxious that when I caught the snap and took my steps to punt, I tripped and the ball fell to the ground. At this moment my mind started to race because I had been told that I was going to be the starting punter only two days earlier. I thought that they'd never let me punt in a game if I couldn't even punt it in warm ups. But I picked the ball up and punted it and ran in the locker room.

Nobody really said anything to me until we came back out to the field and Coach Alvarez called me over. He asked me if I was alright because he had seen my mishap in warm ups and I said I was, even though I probably wasn't. Then he put his hand on my shoulder and said, "Just keep punting like you have been all camp and you'll be fine." Believe it or not those couple words of encouragement really helped, and on my first punt of the game I wasn't nearly as nervous as before the game.







A number of former Badgers have changed teams since the end of last season. Former Heisman Trophy winner Ron Dayne was cut by the Denver Broncos on Saturday but signed by the Houston Texans on Monday. Houston was looking for help at running back after placing last year's leading rusher, Domanick Davis, on injured reserve.

Dayne's backfield teammate with the Badgers, quarterback Brooks Bollinger, also recently had a change of address. The former Big Ten Freshman of the Year is moving closer to Madison, having been traded from the New York Jets to the Minnesota Vikings on Aug. 31. Bollinger will compete for the backup role behind Vikings' starter Brad Johnson.

Another August trade landed former Pro Bowl running back Michael Bennett in Kansas City. Bennett had signed with the New Orleans Saints in the offseason but

the Saints selected former Heisman Trophy winner Reggie Bush in the first round of the NFL draft. Bennett was traded to the Chiefs on Aug. 2 for an undisclosed draft choice. He is currently listed as Kansas City's No. 2 running back behind Larry Johnson.

After four seasons with the New York Giants, linebacker Nick Greisen singed with the Jacksonville Jaguars in the offseason. He started 13 games for the Giants last season and is penciled in as the Jaguars starting outside linebacker heading into the season-opener.

Rookies Catch On

All five former Badgers selected in the 2006 NFL Draft made the rosters of the teams that chose them in April. Running back Brian Calhoun was selected in the third round by the Detroit Lions. Wide receiver Brandon Williams also went in the third round, to San Francisco. Tight end Owen Daniels was a fourth-round pick of the Houston Texans while fellow tight end Jason Pociask was a fifth-round choice of the New York Jets. Wide receiver Jonathan Orr went in the sixth round to the Tennessee Titans.

Daniels is listed as the co-starter on the Texans' latest depth chart while Williams is listed as the 49ers' top punt returner.

very great program is built on the shoulders of outstanding players. It is no different at Wisconsin. With the remarkable success of the football team in recent years has come national recognition for a number of Badger players.

The most well-known of those players is former running back Ron Dayne. The NCAA's all-time leading rusher, Dayne won the 1999 Heisman Trophy in a landslide, outdistancing runner-up Joe Hamilton of Georgia Tech by more than 1,000 points. As a senior, Dayne also won the Maxwell, Walter Camp and Doak Walker Awards.

Dayne was the second Heisman Trophy winner from UW as Alan Ameche took home the award in 1954.


In recent years, Badger players have been fixtures on national award lists. UW players have been finalists for the

Rimington Trophy (best center), Outland Trophy (interior lineman), Lombardi Award (lineman), Chuck Bednarick Award (defensive player), Bronko Nagurski Trophy (defensive player), Ted Hendricks Award (defensive end), Fred Biletnikoff Award (receiver), Lou Groza Award (placekicker), Mosi Tatupu Award (special teams) and Ronnie Lott Trophy (defensive player).

In addition, Badger players walked away with two major awards in 2000. Cornerback Jamar Fletcher earned the Jim Thorpe Award as the nation's best defensive back while Kevin Stemke won the inaugural Ray Guy Award, given to the nation's best collegiate punter.

This year a number of UW players are in contention for major awards. Offensive tackle Joe Thomas, a preseason *Playboy* All-American, can be found on both the Lombardi Award and Outland Trophy watch lists. Punter Ken DeBauche was a second-team All-American last year and is one of the top candidates for the Ray Guy Award. QB John Stocco is on the Maxwell Award watch list and DE Matt Shaughnessy is on the


Ted Hendricks Award watch list.

Conduct Code

In order to keep Wisconsin football games as enjoyable as possible for our fans and their families, we ask that you respect others around you. If a ticket holder's conduct endangers or disrupts players, coaches, officials or other patrons, the University reserves the right to remove the ticket holder from the premises. No refund will be made in such cases. Stadium violations (body passing, throwing objects, and possession of alcohol) and object passing may result in a \$181 fine.

Smoke-Free Facility

Sn oking is prohibited in all state-owned buildings, including Canp Randall Stadium. Designated smoking areas are located within the stadium perimeter.

Entry / No Re-entry

Ple se enter the gate printed on your ticket to allow for the most efficient entry to the stadium. Gates open 90 minutes prior to kick off. Fans may not leave the stadium and then re-enter during the gar ie. If an emergency arises, check with gate security.

Alcohol

No alcohol may be brought into the Stadium. Possession may result in police arrest and a fine of \$181. The fine for first offense for underage possession/consumption of alcohol is \$243.

Guest Services Center

For general game day information, visit the Guest Services Center located under Section YZ, in the south end zone concourse.

Emergencies

In the event of a medical emergency, immediately notify a security guard, usher, police officer or paramedic in your area. UW Health First Aid Stations are located in the upper deck at Section FF, in the 5th level concourse behind Section T, and under Section YZ in the south end zone concourse.

It is possible to contact a patron during a game if you know their exact seat location by calling (608) 265-8676. No announcements will be made over the stadium sound system.

If you lose an article on game day, please go to the Guest Services Center located under Section YZ, in the south end zone concourse, or call (608) 265-8676. For lost-and-found inquiries on non-game days, please call or visit the Camp Randall Welcome Center in Kellner Hall (608-262-1866).


Items Not Permitted

What's Happening on Campus

A New Place to Call Home

For the first time in more than 40 years, there's a new hall in town. Newell J. Smith Hall, a new, state-of-the-art facility on the corner of Johnson and Park streets, officially opened its doors Aug. 30, UW-Madison's freshman move-in day.

With six floors and 425 beds, the hall features numerous innovations, such as resident kitchens on every floor, central air conditioning in each room and a delistyle café located on the first floor. First floor classrooms, a tutoring room and ad ising offices create an environment ge red toward helping students succeed act demically. In addition, two study rooms are located on each residential floor.

Smith Hall also boasts an advanced security system with cameras at building ent ances, card-access entry and alarms det cting when doors have been propped open. A bike path and pedestrian mall, including a tunnel under nearby train traks, connect the residence hall to campus.

University Housing Director Paul Evens and other staff members surveyed UW students and toured residence halls across the country to incorporate ideas for the new hall, the first major residence built on campus since Ogg Hall was constructed in 1965. Setting the building apart from other university housing, rooms in Smith are grouped together in "clusters" of three — two double rooms and one single room — with a common bathroom in each set of rooms.

"We're excited about this new facility," says Evans. "We have a beautiful, state-of-the-art building to offer to UW-Madison students."

The hall is named for Newell J. Smith, who served as Housing director from 1955-83. During his tenure, enrollment at UW-Madison almost doubled, and the number of residents in University Housing nearly tripled. In addition, the building's 10 houses, or wings, are named for distinguished individuals who played a role in the history of housing on campus.

"Today, we are very proud of the programs and services we provide the students who live on campus," Evans says. "In large part, they can be traced back to the things Newell started and the standards he led and lived by."

Smith Hall was one of the mostrequested residence halls for the 2006-07 academic year. The students who now call the building home pay an additional \$750 for room and board.

Rolling Out the Red Carpet

The "Rolling Out the Red Carpet" initiative was launched to build a fan-friendly atmosphere at UW sporting events in the wake of complaints about fan conduct during the 2003 football season. The award-winning, student-led campaign is a partnership between the Division of Intercollegiate Athletics and University Communications and aims to fight a growing national problem of aggressive fan behavior at athletic events.

The campaign succeeds by the joint effort of students, athletes, staff and alumni in promoting positive sportsmanship while maintaining the energy and excitement of game day. Most notably, more than 200 students volunteer as Fan Ambassadors. Dressed in green vests, the ambassadors distribute stadium information and giveaways and welcome opposing and Badger fans alike. "We want to make Madison and Camp Randall destinations that fans want to return to time and again," says Chancellor John D. Wiley.

"Rolling Out the Red Carpet" runs on private funds and has the support of several local business groups, including the Greater Madison Chamber of Commerce, Downtown Madison Inc., and the Greater Madison Convention and Tourism Bureau. The effort has garnered positive feedback from visiting fans, who say they feel more comfortable at UW sporting events.

"Both the fans and the ambassadors find the program fun and rewarding," says John Finkler, guest services director for athletics. "We're trying to make game day great by welcoming fans to the stadium and making them feel at home."



Sept. 21, 1974 - Wisconsin 21, No. 4 Nebraska 20

An electrifying 77-yard pass from quarterback Gregg Bohlig to flanker Jeff Mack with 3:29 left in the game gave Wisconsin a stunning upset over fourth-ranked Nebraska in the 1974 home opener. The margin of victory, in fact, was Vince Lamia's extra point following the Badger touchdown. A Steve Wagner interception gave the Badgers the ball back with 2:40 and UW was able to run out the clock. "This is my biggest win ever at Wisconsin," UW coach John Jardine said after the game. "But I had so little to do with it - the assistant coaches and players did the work.'

Wisconsin trailed the entire game and found itself down 17-7 entering the final quarter. The Badgers outscored the Huskers 14-3 in the fourth quarter that started with a Billy Marek 1-yard run early in the period. Bohlig threw for 242 yards on 14-of-21 passing and also had two touchdowns. Mack finished the game with four receptions for 132 yards.

Sept. 12, 1981 - Wisconsin 21, No. 1 Michigan 14

In Wisconsin's first victory over Michigan since 1962, the Badgers rolled up 23 first downs compared to just eight for Michigan in this stunning 21-14 upset over the No. 1 team in the country. After a scoreless first quarter, the Wolverines were first on the board with a 7-0 lead, but UW tacked on two scores to lead 14-7. After UM tied the game, a 71-yard pass from Jess Cole to John Williams would give the Badgers a 21-14 advantage, which proved to be the winning score.

Wisconsin running backs scampered for 257 yards on the ground, led by Dave Mohapp's 87 and Chucky Davis' 71 yards. Cole threw for 182 yards in the air, including one touchdown.

Sept. 3, 2005 - Wisconsin 56, Bowling Green 42

In the grand re-opening of historic Camp Randall Stadium and head coach Barry Alvarez's final home opener as the Badger mentor, Wisconsin defeated Bowling Green 56-42 in an offensive showdown. The Badgers, who trailed 13-0 after the first quarter, rallied back for 35 points in the second stanza alone, the most points in any quarter during the Alvarez era. Badger fans also were introduced for the first time to running back Brian Calhoun, who tied a school record with five rushing touchdowns against the Falcons.



Virginia scored on its very first possession with a field goal, but Wisconsin responded with 10 points in the second quarter and would never trail again.

Anthony Davis made his Badger debut, carrying the ball 24 times for 147 yards. Wide receiver Lee Evans also caught a pair of Jim Sorgi touchdown passes, including a 78-

yarder, and finished the game with 135 yards receiving.

Oct. 26, 1928 - UW 22, Notre Dame 6



Wisconsin, underdogs coming in, limited the famous Knute Rockne offense and took advantage of every mistake. The Badgers scored three touchdowns and also tacked on a safety.

Breaking through on a Notre Dame punt, William Ketelaar gave Wisconsin its first score of the day, taking the ball in the endzone for

two points. A fumble that resulted in another blocked kick by Milton Gantenbein gave UW its first touchdown of the game in the third quarter. Another Irish turnover set up a 40-yard score by Frank Cuisinier, who caught the pass from quarterback Sam Behr.



Bowling with the Badgers

ver the last 13 seasons, no team in the country has won more bowl games than Wisconsin. The Badgers' eight bowl victories over that span ties them with Boston College, Nebraska and Ohio State. UW has participated in 11 bowl games over the past 13 seasons, a mark matched by only Ohio State and Michigan among Big Ten teams. During that time, the Badgers have made seven appearances in January bowl games, including three Rose Bowl wins.

Last season, Wisconsin played in its second consecutive January bowl game, trouncing seventh-ranked Auburn 24-10 to capture the Capital One Bowl. That contest marked the final game in the head coaching career of Barry Alvarez.

It was fitting that Alvarez's last game was a bowl victory since he led UW to an 8-3 (.727) record in bowl games. That is the best bowl winning percentage in NCAA history among coaches with at least 11 bowl appearances.

Bowl games with the Badgers are also a big hit with Wisconsin's renowned fans. In the past decade, thousands of fans have traveled to watch the Badgers in prime winter destinations like California, Florida, Arizona and Texas.


Wide receiver Jonathan Orr skies to catch a two-point conversion pass during the 2005 Outback Bowl against Georgia.



Badgers Give Back



In appreciation for that support, many student-athletes volunteer frequently in community service projects. Every season, the football team works together on a community service project to give back to Madison.



ACADEMIC HALL OF FAMERS


Two former Badger gridiron stars (Alan Ameche and Pat Richter) have been inducted into the CoSIDA Academic All-America Hall of Fame.


Robert Butler (elected in 1972) was a three-year letterwinner at tackle and won all-league (1912-13) and All-America (1913) lau-



Pat Harder (elected in 1993), an All-America fullback, was the Big Ten's scoring and rushing champion in 1941.




Dave Schreiner (elected in 1955), the two-time All-America end, was the Western Conference MVP in 1942.



The Big Ten Conference

This is the Big Ten Conference

The Big Ten Conference is an association of 11 world-class universities whose member institutions share a common mission of research, graduate, professional and undergraduate teaching and public service. Intercollegiate athletics has an important place within the mission.

Founded in 1896, the Big Ten has sustained a comprehensive set of shared practices and policies that enforce the priority of academics in student-athletes' lives and emphasize the values of integrity, fairness and competitiveness. Big Ten universities provide in excess of \$89 million in athletic scholarship aid to more than 8,400 men and women student-athletes who compete for 25 championships, 12 for men and 13 for women. In 2005-06, the Big Ten distributed over \$117 million in revenues to its 11 member institutions. Conference institutions sponsor broad-based athletic programs with more than 270 teams.

 Big Ten Universities are members of the nation's only conference whose constituency is entirely composed of institutions that are members of the AAU, a prestigious association of major academic and research institutions in the United States and Canada.

- Big Ten Universities have more than four million living alumni and over 300,000 undergraduate students attending Big Ten universities.
- Big Ten Universities house on their campuses nine of the nation's 30 largest academic libraries. Conference libraries hold more than 66 million book volumes and institutions freely share their materials with other league members.
- Since 1992, the Big Ten has created in excess of 2,000 new opportunities for women student-athletes and established 28 new women's teams.
- Based on the federal graduation rate average for the 1995-98 freshman classes, Big Ten student-athletes graduated at 70 percent compared to 62 percent for all Division I student-athletes. As a conference, student-athletes tend to graduate at rates consistent with the general student body (71 percent). In 2006, the NCAA also introduced a new calculation– the Graduation Success Rate (GSR) that accounts for transfer student-athletes. The Big Ten's GSR was 81 percent compared to the Division I average of 76 percent.

- The Big Ten recognized 1,992 Academic All-Big Ten honorees during the 2005-06 academic year, the highest total in the last decade. Over the past five years, the Conference has annually acknowledged nearly 1,700 student-athletes as Academic All-Conference honorees
- The Big Ten has claimed at least four team national championships in seven of the last nine full seasons, including six national titles during 1999-2000 alone, the most for the conference in more than a decade. Big Ten national champions in 2005-06 included Northwestern women's lacrosse and three national crowns for Wisconsin in men's cross country and men's and women's ice hockey.
- The Big Ten showcased more than 300 events that were televised nationally, regionally and locally last year, representing over 600 hours of programming.
- Big Ten Conference schools are among the national attendance leaders in football, men's and women's basketball and women's volleyball. During 2005-06. more than 8.2 million fans attended Big Ten home contests in those sports.

BIG TEN INSTANT REPLAY FACTS

Beginning with this season, all Division-I conferences and independent institutions will have the option of using a version of instant replay standardized by the NCAA – a system based upon an instant replay model created by the Big Ten Conference three years ago.

The objective of football instant replay is to allow for specific types of officiating mistakes to be immediately reviewed and corrected during games. Only specific plays are reviewable, and only those plays where the absolute standard of indisputable video evidence is met can a play be overturned. The replay system will not guarantee that all officiating mistakes are identified and corrected.

Head coaches may now utilize a timeout to request a review of a play no more than once per game. A coach initiates this challenge by taking a timeout before the ball is in play and informing the official that the ruling on the previous play is being challenged. If the ruling is overturned, the timeout will be returned to the team. If the ruling is not overturned, the team will lose that timeout. A team must have a timeout in order for the coach to challenge a play and a coach can only challenge one play per game. Head coaches may not challenge a ruling in which the game was stopped by the Technical Advisor and a decision has already been made on that specific ruling. If a head coach requests a timeout to challenge a ruling and the play is not reviewable, the team will lose that timeout. The Technical Advisor will continue to examine all reviewable plays during a game.

The Technical Advisor serving as the review official for the game can initiate reviews throughout the game. The head coach can initiate one review per game by calling a timeout. Game officials may not ask for a review.

NCAA Guidelines





What Every Badger Fan Should Know

With increasing numbers of NCAA rules governing outside intervention in recruiting, coaches cannot afford to have any extra "help" in recruiting elite studentabletes to the University of Wisconsin. The penalties are too severe.

Here are some tidbits of information concerning you and Badger athletics ... You are a "representative" of the UW's athletics interests (i.e., booster) if any of the following apply:

a) you are an alumnus of the University of Wisconsin;

b) you have ever made financial contributions to the athletics department, to an athletic booster organization of the UW, or to a UW athletics program;

 c) you have ever helped to arrange employment of enrolled student-athletes and/or National Letter of Intent signees;

 d) you have ever been involved in any way promoting the Badger athletic program.

Once an individual is identified as an 'athletics representative/booster," the person retains that identity forever, even if that person no longer contributes to or supports the athletics program.

MCAA Bylaw 13.01.5 states: In Division I, a representative of the UW's athletics interests is prohibited from making in-person. on-or-off campus recruiting contacts, or written or telephonic communications

with a prospect or the prospect's relatives or legal guardians.

A prospect is any student who has started classes for the ninth grade. In addition, any student younger than ninth grade could become a "prospect" if they receive any benefits from an institution or a booster. Student-athletes enrolled in preparatory school or two-year colleges are also considered prospective student-athletes.

What Can You Do?

If you know of a high school or junior college student-athlete who might want to attend the UW, the only permissible activity for a representative is to call the appropriate UW coach.

Extra Benefit Rule

A representative of UW athletics interests cannot provide an "extra benefit" to a prospective or enrolled student-athlete. An extra benefit is any special arrangement by an institutional employee or a booster to provide for a student-athlete or a student-athlete's friend or relative not expressly authorized by NCAA legislation. Some examples of prohibited activities are:

a) providing gifts or reduced cost services:

 b) providing a loan, or arranging for or co-signing a loan;

 c) employing relatives or friends of a prospective student-athlete as an inducement for the enrollment of the prospect; d) providing use of an automobile;
 e) providing rent-free or reduced-rent housing;

f) providing tickets to an athletic, institutional or community event;

g) entertaining or contacting a prospective student-athlete or a prospective student-athlete's family on or off campus;

h) promising to provide any of the above;

According to NCAA rules, the University of Wisconsin Athletic Department reserves the right to withhold any benefit or privilege associated with their athletic department (i.e., booster clubs, ticket privileges, etc.) from individuals that are involved in a violation of NCAA legislation.

Employment

NCAA rules are such that opportunities for your interaction with student-athletes are very limited. One of the best opportunities for alumni or friends of the program to assist student-athletes financially and provide them with a valuable internship experience is through employment. A representative of athletics interests is permitted to provide employment for student-athletes under the following conditions:


 Compensation can't include any remuneration for value or utility that the student-athlete may have for the employer because of the publicity, reputation, fame or personal following that he or she has obtained because of athletics ability;

Compensation for only work actually performed; and

Compensation at a rate commensurate with the going rate in that locality for similar services.

With more than 700 student-athletes competing at the UW, the Department of Athletics encourages businesses to hire Badger student-athletes. What's Happening on Campus

Engineering Solutions

UW engineering students are leading the way in nationwide efforts to lower fuel costs, reduce carbon emissions and find alternative energy sources.

In June, a group of students presented one of the cleanest and most fuel-efficient SUVs in North America at "Challenge X: Crossover to Sustainable Mobility." The team received second place in the contest, which challenged 17 colleges across the U.S. and Canada to revamp a Chevrolet Equinox to meet environmentally friendly standards while maintaining vehicle performance. The competition pushed students to enhance their SUV's fuel efficiency by 50 percent and decrease tail-pipe emissions.

The UW team spent three years building their hybrid creation, nicknamed "Moovada." Moovada's unique design uses the engine to power the front wheels while an electric motor controls the rear wheels. The vehicle gets 35 miles per gallon — 20 mpg more than the average SUV.

A second group of UW engineering students collaborated with students at Madison Area Technical College to build a new biodiesel fuel reactor, which produces motor fuel blended from waste vegetable oil and methanol. The reactor can purify cooking oil recovered from a restaurant's deep fryer and convert it into a fuel that operates a diesel-powered vehicle without engine alterations or damage to the environment.

"Because the oils used to make biodiesel come from agricultural crops,

combustion of the fuel has zero net carbon dioxide emissions," says UW-Madison grad student Stephanie Britton. "This reduces greenhouse gases and helps address global warming."

The reactor will educate students on the use and quality control of biodiesel fuels in a larger effort to promote the use of renewable energy sources across the state. With the capabilities of the new reactor, students have the opportunity to test various feedstocks, catalysts and processing temperatures to find the best methods of production.

New Welcome Center Opens

Park Street is one of the most often-used gateways to UW-Madison's campus. Unfortunately, it's also one of the least friendly, marked by sparse signage, heavy traffic and almost no parking.

At least some of that is changing this fall, with the opening of a new campus welcome center at 21 N. Park St., just south of the new Newell J. Smith residence hall. Operated by the UW's visitor and information programs, the office was created to give visitors a one-stop resource for exploring campus. Much like the information center in the Red Gym, the new welcome center will have staff on hand to distribute information and answer questions, but it also focuses on promoting the campus and broader community as a destination for tourists and guests.



"Our goal is to really wow everyone who comes in the doors," says assistant director of visitor and information programs Nancy Sandhu '96, MS'03. "If they didn't know UW-Madison before coming in, we want them to leave having a wonderful first impression of the institution."

Around Campus

- U.S. News and World Report ranked UW-Madison the seventh-best public university in the country and 34th out of 234 national doctoral universities in its annual release.
- The College of Agricultural and Life Sciences created a new master's program in agroecology, a field focusing on the interaction between agriculture and broader society and the environment.
- UW's International Learning Community, housed in Adams Hall, has added Arabic to its language residential program, which allows students to hone their language skills by living among fellow speakers.
- The new Mechanical Engineering Building, with classrooms equipped with tools designed specifically for industrial and systems engineering students, opened this fall.
- UW-Madison remains the fourth-largest research university in the nation as measured by the amount of money spent on research and development, according to a National Science Foundation.



Excerpts from "Don't Flinch"



Spar y and Our Gang? Not quite. But that's me (lower right) and the fellows chowing down during the middle of two-a-days my sophomore year of high school. Our Burgettstown booster club payed for the lunches at a restaurant that was walking distance of the practice field. My best friend, Jim Nicksick, is on my right.

You could say I was a product of my environment in western
Pennyslvania. That part of the state was once a melting pot for Europeans and a spawning ground for a generation of football coaches. And there was a correlation.

Many immigrants came to the United States to work in the coal and zinc mines and steel mills. Although they lived and worked in different towns, up and down the rivers in western P-A, they all had the same interest in sports and the same focal point.

Their kids.

That's why Friday night football was so big. The games were played for entertainment and bragging rights among all those miners and mill workers in those little communities.

I never wanted to set foot in the mills. Nobody working there seemed happy. I just didn't want any part of that life. So I ended up being a student of the game.

I tried to learn as much as I could. And I absorbed everything that I was taught. I never lost that foundation, either. And that's one of the common threads between all of us who grew up that way in western Pennsylvania and went on to coach football.

(Bill Cowher, Kirk Ferentz, Dave Wannstedt, Marty Schottenheimer, Marvin Lewis, Mike Ditka and Chuck Knox, among others.)

We all coached the game the same way.

Each week the Badger Football Gameday Program will print an excerpt from "Don't Flinch - Barry Alvarez: The Autobiography written by UW Director of Athletics Barry Alvarez with Mike Lucas of the Capital Times. Football is a tough, physical, hardnosed sport and there are no shortcuts. That was ingrained at an early age.

My dad, Anthony Alvarez, was born in Springfield, Ill. When he was 10, the family moved back to Spain. With the outbreak of the country's second civil war in the late '30s, my dad declared as a loyalist and refused to fight for dictator Francisco Franco. As a result, he was impisoned in a POW camp for his political beliefs.

His older brother negotiated with the American consulate and they exchanged my dad for a French prisoner. He was released on French soil. Being an American citizen, he had no interest whatsoever in returning to Spain.

Anthony — Tony — worked his way back to the United States and, eventually, settled in Pennsylvania. My mother, Alvera, was born in Langeloth, a true company town.

While I was growing up, Tony worked seven days a week as a groundskeeper at Williams Country Club in Weirton, West Virginia. Alvera worked as a waitress. My parents always showed support. They were always there for me.

By the time, I was a senior, I weighed between 215 and 220 pounds. That's pretty big for a linebacker. I wasn't very fast. But I was athletic enough and big enough to play.

I'll never forget my last high school game. We played Hopewell, the same school that produced Tony Dorsett and Penn State linebacker Paul Posluszny.

We lost, and I cried like a baby.



I was crushed and I couldn't stop crying. We had a dance that night at the school and I cried through the whole dance. I was emotional. Not because it was my last game as a senior; I was emotional because we had lost.

That's how I learned to play. Football became my life, my livelihood.

It became me.

Now, you can imagine the reaction to a guy showing up in Burgettstown wearing a red felt hat with a feather on it. That was Nebraska's Bob Devaney. And my high school coach, Pat McGraw, still talks about Devaney wearing that damn hat. There was a magnetism about Devaney. That was undeniable.


One of Devaney's assistants was John Melton, who was from Slovan, a neighboring community to Langeloth and Burgettstown. He went to high school with my mom and knew my uncle John. He recruited four or five players from western P-A every year.

My mom trusted him. So did I.

Nebraska was my choice. I wanted to leave the area because I thought that was part of growing up. That's just what you do — you get away from home.

A week or so before I was scheduled to leave for Lincoln, I was jogging around our high school practice field when some guy challenged me to my face. I think he was someone who had worked in a steel mill all his life.

I remember him saying, "Now we'll find out how tough you are, Alvarez. Wait 'til you get there with all those big guys. We'll find out ..."

two goals and two assists.


