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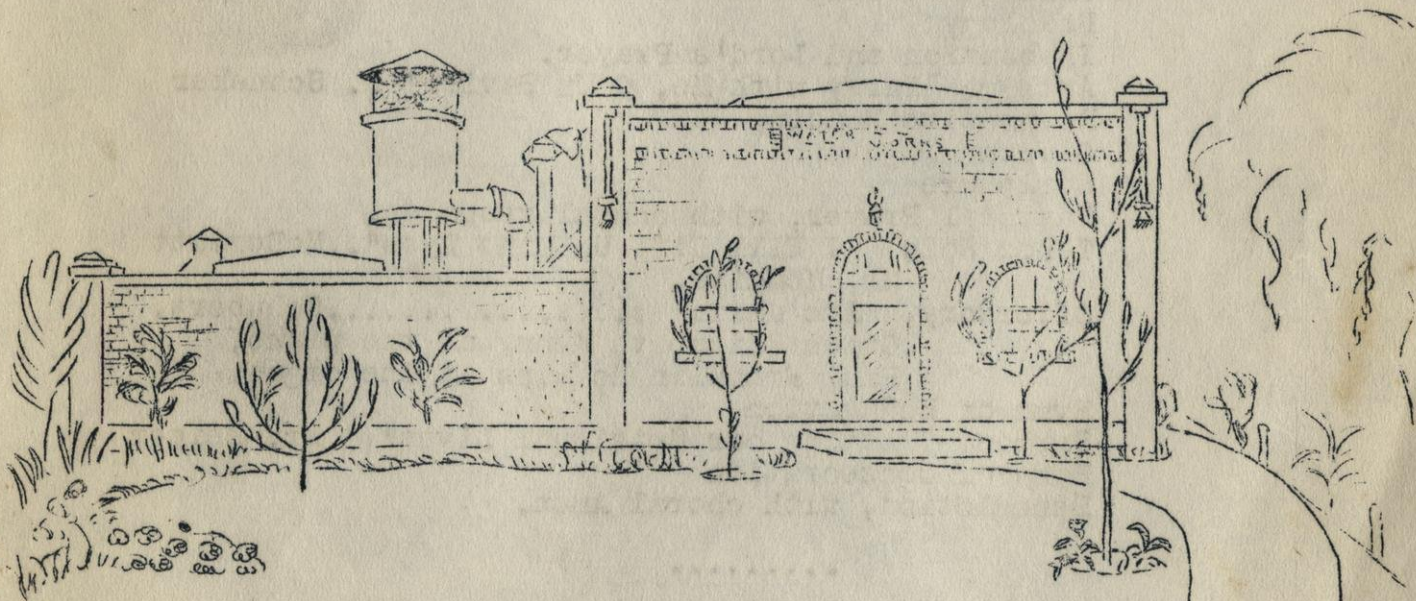

## Lake Geneva "Y" Fifty Years Old

Foundations of the Lake Geneva Y.M.C.A. were laid fifty years ago. It came as a result of a meeting June 4, 1883, where the pastors & young men, some thirty of them, came together to discuss such an organization. Like most associations the start was made in rented upstairs quarters in the center of the block between Broad and Center Streets on the south side of Main Street.

The first President was Frank Johnson. The first General Secretary was George W. Britt, who served as janitor, secretary, Physical Director. He placed a water tank on the sidewalk for persons to get the only decent cool drink in the business section. During a typhoid epidemic in 1890 he served as night nurse from 10 to 4 for five months. In order to be impartial denominationally, he sang in the choir of the Episcopal Church in the morning, taught a class in the Baptist Sunday School at noon, attended the Christian Endeavor at the Congregational Church at 6 p.m. and attended the Methodist evening service.

The present building, which as remodelled a few years ago, came from a legacy of \$10,200 left by Mrs. Sarah M. Reed. It took several years for some one to take the initiative in starting a building campaign. Five thousand was pledged in fifty minutes at a meeting in the Opera House, and \$20,000 was added to the fund by Lake Shore residents.

The first secretary in the new building was Ralph R. Wolf, a graduate of the Institute and Training School of Y.M.C.A. in 1904. This school later became Y.M.B.A. College. The building was taxed to its capacity from the start. R.E. McNally who has been secretary for many years has kept the work on a high plane and is recognized as a successful secretary by the Association movement.

The Association Building is a real community center for all of those forces contributing to the best things in Lake Geneva. May it have many more birthdays.

Son of A Pioneer

Albert Hollister was born on a farm a little over two miles North of Williams Bay now occupied by the Goodrich family. In 1837 two friends from New York state who had heard the call of the West took a boat at Buffalo and landed at Kenosha. They were Edward B. Hollister and John Whiteman, both only kids of seventeen. They walked over to Lake Geneva and decided to look for some government land. They picked out farms North of the present Williams Bay.

In order to get their deed from the government they had to walk to Milwaukee. Money was scarce so he had to work out for whatever he could get and occasionally was hired at 50¢ per day by Wm. Hollingshead, his nearest neighbor over near Delavan Lake, a distance of four miles, which he walked both ways. His next nearest neighbor was at Fontana.

Milwaukee was the nearest market for grain, and it took three days to make the round trip with an ox team. As a rule the first night was spent at Hales Corners, and then a daylight trip to Milwaukee, then a night at Hales Corners and home the next day.

Albert Hollister was born in 1854 on the farm. He went to school at Elkhorn and graduated from High School in 1874. Albert says that bands of Indians were roaming around these parts every Summer. They had a permanent Camp on Lake Koshkong and three of four hundred came down to Delavan Inlet and Duck Lake (now Como) for Summer. The children had no fear of them as they were kind to them. They occasionally begged for food.

After teaching school for four years about four miles North of Elkhorn, he went to Juneau County and taught for another four years. His interest in lumber came about during a year in Denver where he worked in a lumber yard. He came to Delavan and engaged in business and married Elda Sheldon. His first

venture in lumber business was at Ionia, Iowa. In those days no delivering was required and he worked alone at the yard, unloading cars of lumber by shoving a bunch off the car and then getting out and piling it up. He prospered and began establishing lumber yards in other communities in Iowa and Western Illinois until at one time he had twelve yards in operation. In order to supply the yards, Mr. Hollister spent much time in buying lumber out in Oregon and the Northwest and had an office in Minneapolis. In 1892 he contracted for and disposed of 400 cars of cedar shingles under the name of the Dubuque Red Cedar Co.

In 1910 he had a chance to sell out his yards and came to Delavan to live, retaining one yard in Belvidere. In 1911 the lumber yard in Williams Bay was purchased, and Edward and Lawrence came to make their home here.

Mr. Hollister as well as the sons have always taken an active part in the Masonic Lodge.

Mr. Hollister has been a fisherman and a big game hunter and engaged in this sport until four years ago when he shot a big Moose up in Canada. All his friends in Delavan and vicinity had moose steaks, also those at a banquet at the Congregational Church.

Nearly every morning Mr. Hollister calls at the office of A. Hollister and Sons in Williams Bay.
