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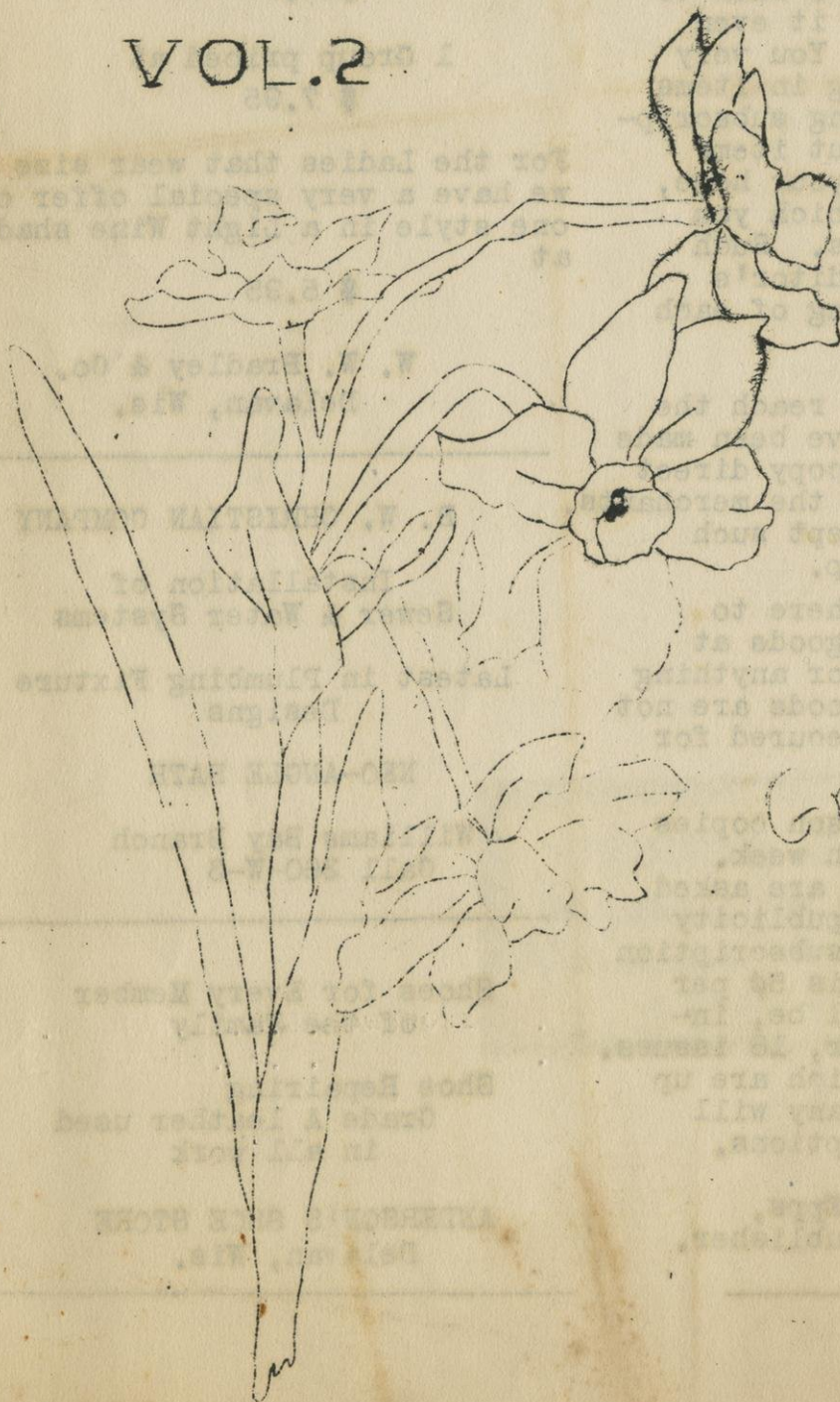

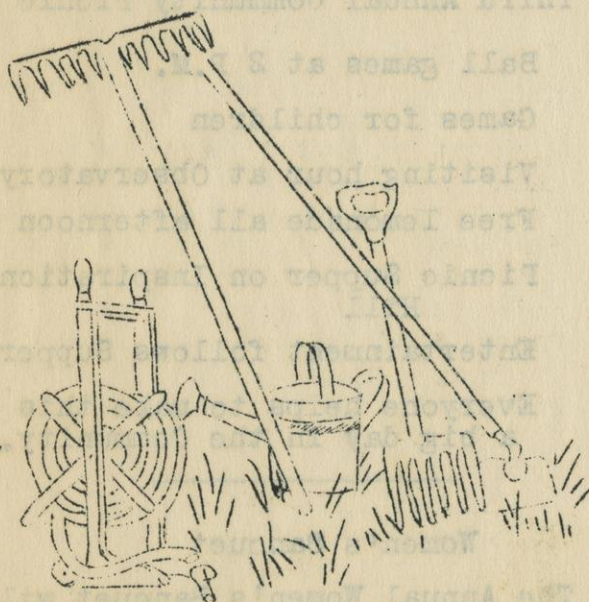

Who was First in Walworth
County?

The first white child born
in the county was Geneva Van
Slyck, whose parents were the
first to settle at what is now
Fontana.

The first claim to land was
made by John Brink, Reuben and
William Ostrander and John Hodg-
son, a party of surveyors who
saw the possibilities at the
foot of Geneva Lake while staking
out the section lines in 1835.

The first to come for actual
settlement was Christopher Payne
to the outlet of Geneva Lake in
February, 1836. He had with him
two companions, Mosher and
Trinble. In March, 1836, they
started a cabin.

Every week additional first
events in the county will appear
in this column. They are gleaned
from a study preparatory to the
compilation of "The Tales of
Walworth County", a history of
the first hundred years, by F.M.
Van Epps, Williams Bay. If you
