



Jane Albright-Dieterle Head Coach Fifth Year at Wisconsin

BadgerBall and Coach Jane Albright
Dieterle burst on the scene in 1994,
setting attendance records and bringing Wisconsin into the national limelight
with three NCAA appearances and two
top-10 national rankings.

The revitalized Wisconsin program posted a school-record fourth consecutive winning season last year at 21-10, but bowed out of the NCAA tourney in the first round. Returning to the tournament and progressing further appears a goal well-within reach in this fifth season under Coach 'A'.

Since 1994, Wisconsin has tied the most wins in school history (21) twice, last year securing a 21-10 record including its third NCAA tournament bid under Albright. It was just the fourth NCAA tourney bid in school history, and the fifth 20-win season, three of which have come under Albright-Diteterle.

In Big Ten Conference action, Wisconsin was sixth in the conference with an 9-7 record. The Badgers have led the Big Ten in attendance the past three years posting a UW record 10,455 per game, third best in the nation in 1998.

Returning Starters

Despite the graduation of two starters including leading scorer and all-Big Ten first team guard Katie Voigt, the Badgers have a good pool of returning talent and newcomers that should provide a challenge for conference leadership.

Among the starters returning is Big Ten Freshman of the Year **LaTonya Sims** (Racine, WI). The 6-3 forward returns as Wisconsin's leading rebounder (6.9) and third leading scorer (12.6 ppg). She was invited to the Team USA National Basketball Development Camp this past summer after starting 27 of 31 games and earning all-Big Ten honorable mention honors.

Wisconsin's 1998 recruiting class has been ranked 10th in the nation and first in the Big Ten.

Tanisha Boston (Milwaukee, WI) a 6-0 senior forward starter, averaged 7.1 points and 4.5 rebounds. Juniors Dee Dee Pate (Milwaukee, WI) and Kelley Paulus (LaCrosse, WI) shared starting duties last season and both accompanied the Big Ten all-Star team on its European tour in 1998. Paulus, a 5-11 shooting guard, earned all-Big Ten Freshmen team honors in 1997, and improved to 9.3 points per game. Pate is a quick 5-5 point guard who averaged 2.9 assists.

Top Returnees

Senior, 6-5 **Amy Wiersma** (Randolph, WI), returns having played just 19 games averaging 3.9 points after a hand injury

sidelined her the first part of her junior season.

The Badgers most improved player, **Missy Konieczny** (Portage, WI) earned quality minutes last season and should continue to improve with increased playing time along with sophomores 6-3 post **Krista Bird** (Owatonna, MN), and 6-0 guard **Rachel Klongland** (Sun Prairie, WI).

Newcomers


Wisconsin's 1998-99 recruiting class is the best in the Big Ten and ranks 10th in the nation according to the May issue of Basketball Times. The rankings, produced by the Women's Basketball Journal, cite a versatile unit paced by Minnesota Player of the Year **Tamara Moore** (Minneapolis, MN). A second team Parade all-American and WBCA/Nike Prep all-American, Moore averaged 24.6 points, 11.2 rebounds, 6.5 assists and 5.7 steals and hit 63 percent from the field her senior season.

Joining the top-10 class is **Jessie Stomski**, a 6-2 forward from Tartan High

School in Oakdale, MN. She was the dominant center in the state averaging 28.1 points and adding 12.7 rebounds, 3.5 assists, and 3.1 steals.

Kyle Black of Indianapolis earned all-State honors for the second year while setting all-time school records in scoring with 1425, steals (245) and assists (274). She averaged 17.9 points, 6.0 rebounds, 2.8 steals and 3.0 assists while shooting 54 percent from the floor and 74 percent from the line as a senior.

Sarah Jirovec, a 6-4 center from Stevens Point, Wis., earned first-team all-conference honors while averaging 11.5 points and 8.5 rebounds and hitting 50.3 percent from the floor.

Sims led the Badgers in rebounding with 6.9 per game.

1997-98 Q & A WITH COACH A



Wisconsin continued to have record-setting crowds for the fourth consecutive year ranking third in the nation with 10,455 per game. The BadgerBall faithful purchased over 7,000 season tickets last year assuring that Wisconsin maintained its position atop the Big Ten in attendance a third-straight year. You've completed four years of revitalizing a program that had just one winning season in 10 years. How do you describe the foundation you have laid, and where you are in your timetable for success?

Coach A: We're very excited about where we feel we have been as well as the vision we feel we have created for the future. A lot of things have to go right to have a successful basketball program. We said all along that there are differences between a successful team, and a successful program. Now, with our complete sports staff and the support that the university and community have given us, we are adding more of the elements of a successful program and not just having a good record.

When I took over this program I had no idea our success would come this quickly. I was on a five-year plan. Fortunately, if you combine the kids and the community, it's put us way ahead of schedule. We still aren't where I want us to be. We have to do the fine tuning of what my vision is for a program.

Four straight winning seasons has never before been accomplished at Wisconsin. How does it feel to be the first coach to sustain success here?

Coach A: Consistency is one of the things I would strive to have in a program particularly with the level of schedule we are playing. To have consistently had winning seasons is something we're very excited about. I feel very fortunate to have had an opportunity to come in where there were so many elements pointing to

the potential of a good program and be able to capitalize on them.

Your 1995 recruiting class was ranked 8th in the country, and your 1998 class is ranked 10th. To what do you attribute your success in attracting the nation's top recruits?

Coach A: It's the total package we have to offer here as far as a degree from one of the top academic schools in the country; the top-rated place to live in the country; the fan attendance; and a complete sports staff. It's being able to show a student-athlete that we can truly develop her as a person, as a student and as a basketball player, and she can reach her full potential if she works hard. I think the staff is very important, because it all boils down to people as the most important thing. The people that I have surrounded myself with make the athletes feel very much like family-from my assistants to our trainers to our fans.

Early on, who will be the leaders of this team? How do you expect to replace leading scorer and all-time three point shooter, Katie Voigt? Who do you expect to step up?

Coach A: Leadership will be an important challenge for this team. After losing two four-year starters to graduation, leadership will be a very high commodity.

We have more potential leaders but less experience at leadership and that will be the key ingredient to our success.

As far as the scoring, LaTonya Sims and Kelly Paulus have proven to be scorers in the games before. Although I think our seniors have the potential to become scorers if we need them too. You can look at the statistics from the freshmen we signed and they are all scorers. Regarding three-point shooting, Kyle Black, Rachel Klongland and Kelly Paulus are certainly capable scorers from there.

Wisconsin seems to have gathered some important depth at guard. What kind of changes will we see in the BadgerBall backcourt?

Coach A: At the guard position you can expect to see more of an open-court game. That will begin with the ability to play pressure defense. The biggest change in our guards will be defensive pressure. I think we have the ability to pressure the ball better than we ever have. and I think that will lead to scoring opportunities. We've got a high amount of flexibility at guard from three-point shooters to penetrators to the outside jump shot. All the elements of a successful backcourt exist in somebody. Whatever we need, we we have personnel to put on the floor because they are so different. From ballhandling to shooting to passing the ball to the post to defense to three-point shooting, penetration, all of those elements we have somewhere,

and the ability to blend that will help us match up with opponents.

With such a highly touted recruiting class, expectations may exceed their experience. How will you handle the freshmen and can you project what their roles will be this season?


Coach A: The blend of personality and talent that we have in this freshmen class is phenomenal, not to mention the success that each of them had in her high school and the AAU arena of competition. Exciting is the one word I would use to explain them. The good thing is that the fans expectations for them will not be any higher than their own individual expectations. They have a lot of pride in being what people perceived as the top recruiting class in the Big Ten, and I think that that motivated them to really work over the course of the summer. They're marked, and they want a target on themselves. I think that it's a very good pressure but there's not going to be one of them that has to shoulder it by herself. It's going to be several of them and they've got a great supporting cast of other people that are very glad they're here. I have a lot of confidence in them and would not hesitate to start them if they're deserving of that. With their versatility, I would expect to do that sometime early.

What do you anticipate are the team's strengths?


Coach A: That they have the potential to be the best defensive team that I've coached here, and hopefully that will get us some easy points. Another strength will be enthusiasm. They're very excited from top to bottom, to be here playing for me, in the new arena, in a Wisconsin uniform. With the high expectations that everybody has put on them in the last four years, we've got a group that matches those expectations. That is why they came here. I sat in their living rooms and talked about Big Ten Championships and high expectations, and they wanted those. Team unity, versatility, speed, strength, height, quickness, skill and the ability to play defense are going to be our main strengths.

What do you identify as certain weaknesses to begin the season?

Coach A: We start another year knowing that we've only won one game in the Big Ten Tournament and coming off a poor showing in the NCAA Tournament. That either makes you hungrier and want to get better at the fine tuning aspect, or it makes you wonder why that's happening.


Weaknesses would also be a lack of experienced scorers. Everybody wants to score until they are the ones that people are counting on to score. Katie (Voigt) and Ann (Klapperich) scored a lot of points for us. We've had people be excellent role players but now they've got to change from role players to carrying the load,

and that's a much different burden. I have a lot of confidence that they'll be able to do that but we don't know how long that will take. By the end of the year I'll be very surprised if we don't prove that we are ready for that challenge.

UW's strength of schedule ranked among the top 20 in the nation last year. What do you try and accomplish from playing a tough schedule and how would you rate this year's agenda?

Coach A: This year's schedule keeps up with the philosophy that we have in our program of bringing the best of collegiate basketball to compete here in Madison for our fans and for my team to compete against. This year we were able to schedule more home games than we've ever been able to schedule, and I think that for a young team that will be very important. We feel like we've got a good mixture of top 10 and top 20 programs and intrastate rivals, and those are the teams we like to bring in.

The Big Ten Conference has attracted the top attendance in the nation for the past six years. To what do you attribute the fact that the Big Ten continually outdraws other conferences?



The 'victory balls' tossed to the fans after home wins were plentiful last season as the Badgers posted one of the best program records in school history with 11 wins and one loss at home. The 21 overall wins tied the school record for most wins in a season (21-10).

Coach A: The fans and the tradition of sports in the Big Ten cities and the states that house the Big Ten institutions have proved to love women's basketball and come out consistently to support and recognize the high level of play and the great coaching in the Big Ten.

Wisconsin had a break through at last year's Big Ten Tournament winning its first game since the tournament was inaugurated 3 years ago. What was different about last year?

Coach A: We were a more confident team when we went. We had a higher degree of success. Throughout a tough schedule we had been successful—early success, middle success. Just the flow of things was better. Rhythm was better, the team unity at that point of the year was exceptional and it had gotten stronger every game. It didn't feel like the end of February. It felt very much like the beginning of the season.

You have said being ranked third in the nation in attendance "paints a picture that no other words can describe". That was before you averaged 13,000 plus at the Kohl Center. Can you add to that description now? Do you have any new traditions at the Kohl Center?

Coach A: That description is like when you're a kid and it's Christmas morning and you open all your gifts and have everything on your list that you've asked for and then all of a sudden

somebody gives you a pony or something that's beyond. There is really not a way to describe how it has just gotten better and better. The first night when we were in there, no one thought it would be loud enough, but it's very overwhelming. It gives me energy every day to go in there. It has a lot of personality. People ask me very



regularly how we did it (attendance). I'm very humbled in the fact that it's just very mystical and magical, I don't know how else to describe it.

We've really been excited about the locker room that we've been able to decorate. One of the traditions we will start is a signing wall for our graduates. It's called the Wall of Honor. And we have the tradition of hitting the Badgerball when we go out (of the locker room).




Dee Dee Pate shared the point guard duties with Katie Voigt last season starting 21 games. She averaged 3.8 points, 2.9 assists, and 1.3 steals. That's kind of a fun little thing that was carried over from the Field House.

You moved into the new Kohl Center (cap. 17,142) for the last seven games in 1998. Can you describe its impact on your program in this short while?

Coach A: Certainly the opportunity to work on our mental toughness. It presented us that opportunity because we lost the sellout with the first game there and then we were able to rebound and come back and win the rest of our games. I think we got a good start on understanding what it's like to be very territorial in your place and have a high degree of ownership. That's a hard thing when you don't know how it's going to feel but I think the mental toughness that the young ladies displayed really attached them emotionally to the floor and the arena. I think bigness tends to scare people away. I'm normally a person of pretty good vision but never in my wildest dreams did I think we would sell the first game out. I thought that would be something that would take awhile. So doing it nearly three times was nothing short of phenomenal.

In regard to recruiting, there is not any way that you can come watch a game here with that many people, and not seriously look

at our program. You take that, with the addition of a state-of-theart facility like the Kohl Center and it just continues to get better and better.

You have three Wisconsin players and one former NIU player playing in the professional ranks. What do you think that says to others about the Wisconsin program?

Coach A: We're doing the right things, we're going in the right direction, we're developing our players, we're keeping them in love with the sport of basketball, we're giving them opportunities to compete and follow their dreams.

Wisconsin celebrates its 25th anniversary of women's sports this year. What are the biggest changes in the game of basketball in the past 5 years, and how has that affected the Wisconsin program? Coach A: The biggest changes is, one, the level of play. You used to have one or two areat players on a team and now the depth on teams is a very, very big change. That and the fact that the players aren't all going to the same institutions. They're spreading it out and going to different ones throughout the country. I think the coaches have gotten better offensively. They've developed offensive philosophies that we've taken from the men's pro league but we're not trying to duplicate them. We're adjusting them to the personnel-still playing below the rim, still fundamental basketball. And the women have developed more physically in the last five years. They are much more physically advanced with the addition of full-time strength coaches and the conditioning we do now.

What do you hear other coaches saying about Wisconsin?

Coach A: I hear people saying that they like the way we're doing things, that we care about our kids and they all seem to be having fun when they see them playing. That they have very good composure on the court, that they're very confident and that they look like they're having a lot of fun when people are watching them. They ask me about the attendance, regularly. They ask us about community service. They admire our commitment to helping other people.

isconsin concluded the season at 21-10 earning its third NCAA at-large bid in the last four years under Jane Albright-Dieterle, and just the fourth bid in UW history. The No. 6 seeded Badgers were ousted in the first round of the NCAA tournament with a 64-75 loss to Atlantic 10 tourney champion and #11 seeded Virginia Tech (22-9) at the subregional in Gainesville, FL. Wisconsin was 9-6 against the 1998 NCAA Field (6-1 vs. non conference teams).

The 21-10 record is the fifth best record in the 24-year history of the program.

Other Highlights


- Wisconsin (21-10) concluded its regular season with a 20-8 record, the third 20-win season in the last four years under Jane Albright-Dieterle. Wisconsin won eight of its last 12 games to close out the season and was 1-2 in post season tournament play.
- With its first-round Big Ten tournament win, the first under Jane Albright-Dieterle, Wisconsin tied a school best record at 21-8 and tied the record for most wins set by the 1995-96 team (21-8) and 1981-82 (21-13). The final record of 21-10 is the fifth-best in school history.
- Best non-conference record in program history at 11-1: Wisconsin claimed an 11-1 school best non-conference mark with an 80-66 win over Western Kentucky to close the UW Field House at 5-0 January 11.
- Best start in school history at 9-0: After starting 9-0, the Badgers lost three straight including the first two Big Ten games, before stopping the streak by beating No. 17 Georgia in overtime, 74-64, in Athens Jan. 4 in its network debut on CBS television.
- Best home record: At 11-1 (.917), the Badgers paralleled the best home record on the books 12-1 (.923) set in 1983-84.
- · Wisconsin met and defeated two of


- three 1997 NCAA Final Four semifinalists beating Stanford in the home opener, 90-82, and beating Notre Dame 89-77. The Badgers lost to two-time defending champion and top-ranked Tennessee, 87-66.
- The Badgers played 13 of the first 18 games on the road (13-5). Wisconsin finished with seven of its last 10 games at home (7-3), all played in the new Kohl Center arena (Capacity 17,142). Wisconsin averaged 13,261 in attendance at the new arena.
- The Badgers had a 3-3 record in all games decided by five points or less, (2-3 conference record).
- The Badgers set school records for best three-point percentages at .355 (120-338) and for fewest turnovers averaging 17.8/game.

Record-Breaking Attendance

Wisconsin set school and conference attendance records:

- **CUMULATIVE RECORD:** cumulative attendance totals and average of 125,464/12 = 10,455 breaking last years school average by 1,919 per game (1996-97-102,426/12 = 8,536/game).
- CONFERENCE RECORD: 99,797 in eight Big Ten only games for 12,475 average breaking Ohio State's conference only games mark of 80,777 in nine home games set in 1993–94 for an 8,975 average. This marks the third straight year Wisconsin has led the Big Ten in attendance and the second year UW was third nationally.
- Big Ten Single Game Record Attendance: UW set a Big Ten attendance record of 16,329 vs. Northwestern on February 1.
- Record Season Ticket Sales: Set all time record of 7,136 season tickets sold, surpassing last year's all-time record of 5,486.





Five Earn Academic All-Big Ten Honors

Wisconsin again had the third most athletes named to the Academic All-Big Ten team this year with four earning the honor. The recognition is reserved for non-first year letterwinners (not freshmen or first-year transfers) who maintain a cumulative grade point average of 3.00 or better.

Seniors Katie Voigt (mathematics education) and Michele Burkholder (industrial engineering) made their third academic team while juniors Emily Ricter (special education) and Amy Wiersma (social welfare) were second-year members. Ricter was the Athletic Board Scholar for earning the highest GPA on the team.

All-Big Ten Honors

Three Wisconsin players earned all-Big Ten athletic honors led by Katie Voigt who became just the fifth Badger to be named first team all-Big Ten. LaTonya Sims was the Freshman of the Year in both the coaching and media panels, and Ann Klapperich earned second team all-Big Ten by a vote of the media.

Sims, UW's leading rebounder with 6.9 boards and 12.3 ppg, also earned all-Big Ten honorable mention honors. She is the third Badger to be named Freshman of the Year. Preceding her were Kay Fredrickson in 1988, and Barb Franke in 1992.

Kohl Center Opens



HEAD COACH JANE ALBRIGHT-DIETERLE

ell on her way to becoming UW's winningest coach, Jane Albright-Dieterle begins her fifth year with the University of Wisconsin women's basketball program. In her tenure, the Badgers have had four consecutive winning seasons for the first time in school history, including three 20-win seasons and three NCAA bids.

Under Coach "A", the UW women's basketball program has been revitalized. She took over a program that had just one winning season in the previous 10 years (102-176 record).

She responded by taking her first teams (1995 and 1996) to the NCAA tournament, and returned to the Big Dance in 1998. The 1996 team tied for the most wins and posted the best record in school history at 21-8, a winmark that was tied in 1998 with a 21-10 finish. Albright-Dieterle has posted eight 20-win seasons in the past 10 years, and has taken her team to its seventh NCAA tournament in the last nine years (at Wisconsin and Northern Illinois).

In her inaugural season at Wisconsin, the team posted a 20-9, and went to the 1995 NCAA tournament's second round for the first time before losing to fifth-ranked Texas Tech in Lubbock. She was named the 1995 Big Ten Coach of the Year by her peers when Wisconsin placed third in the Big Ten Conference with an 11-5 record, improving from ninth place in 1994. She achieved her 200th win during that season, and was an Associated Press and WBCA National Coach of the Year finalist.

Winning and attending the NCAA tournament is the rule rather than the exception for



Badger Coach Jane Albright-Dieterle has led Wisconsin to four consecutive winning seasons for the first time in program history (78-38).

Albright-Dieterle, who left Northern Illinois in 1994 with a decade of accomplishments to her credit. The all-time winningest basketball coach at NIU, she held a 188-110 (.631) mark, and was 140-48 (.744) her last six years, which included five 20-win seasons and four NCAA tournament appearances.

Her last two teams at NIU finished with 24-6 records, and were Mid-Continent regular-season or tournament champions. Both teams

attended the NCAA tournament

A four-time conference coach of the year in the Big Ten and both the North Star and Mid-Continent Conferences, Albright-Dieterle began her coaching career in 1981 under one of the game's best in Pat Summitt at Ten-

nessee. While a graduate assistant under Summitt, the Volunteers were NCAA Final Four participants in 1982, and NCAA quarter-finalists in 1983

In 1983, she joined the University of Cincinnati coaching staff as an assistant coach and recruiting coordinator. A year later she assumed the head coaching position at Northern Illinois where she established a program worthy of national recognition.

Albright-Dieterle has coached five players who have earned seven Kodak District IV all-America honors, two Olympic Festival athletes, four professional team members, and two USA team participants. She earned Women's Basketball Coaches Association (WBCA) District IV "Coach of the Year" honors in 1995 and 1990.

Active in USA Basketball, she was the head coach of the 1996 USA R. Williams Jones Cup team which won the gold medal in Taipei, Taiwan, with a perfect 9-0 mark. In 1993, she was the assistant coach for Team USA which earned a bronze medal at the World University Games with a 6-2 record.


Albright-Dieterle helped direct the 1992 USA Junior National team to a 4-1 record and silver medal performance in the Pan American Confederation World Championship in Mexico, and qualifying the United States women for the 1993 Junior World Championship. A year earlier, she was the head coach of the gold medal-winning 1991 U.S. Olympic Festival South squad.

As the coach of a nationally recognized program, Albright-Dieterle was selected to vote in the WBCA/USA Today weekly poll, and was appointed to a two-year term on the WBCA Board of Directors in 1998.

The Graham, N.C., native graduated cum laude in health and physical education from Appalachian State University in 1977, where she was a letterwinner in both basketball and volleyball. She taught high school for four years in Spartanburg, S.C., prior to pursuing her coaching career at Tennessee where she earned a master's degree in physical education with emphasis in sports psychology in 1983.











The Big Ten Conference attendance leader for a third year, Wisconsin has set school attendance records for four consecutive seasons and in nine of the past 12 years. The Badgers set a Big Ten single game mark of 16,329 and demolished all other conference attendance records while aiding the Big Ten Conference to lead the nation in attendance for the sixth straight season.

The Badgers set cumulative and conference-only games attendance marks with a record average 12,474 in eight Big Ten games to set a new Big Ten season mark.

Big Ten attendance leaders the last three years, UW bettered its own mark of 8,536 set a year ago for its first five-figure average of 10,455. Wisconsin ranked third in the nation in attendance for the second year, and accounted for 21 percent of the Big Ten's all-time national record attendance of 604,356 fans (a record 4,139/game).





Number 21 Retired

Theresa Huff, who played at Wisconsin from 1979–83, is the only woman player to have her jersey retired. Although only 5-11, the lithe center/forward became the school's all-time leading scorer and rebounder completing her career with 1,879 points and 1,201 rebounds.


Robin Threatt broke her 11 year-old scoring record with 1,901 points in 1993, and Barb Franke surpassed both Huff and Threatt completing her career with 1,994 points in 1996. But very few individuals will ever reach Huff's incredible 1,201 rebounding mark. Michele Kozelka ranks second in career rebounding with 916.

A Milwaukee native, Huff's career spanned the transition period from the AIAW to the NCAA governance. She led Wisconsin to its first post-season appearance reaching the quarter-finals of the AIAW National Championship, and she was a member of the first official Big Ten Conference team in 1981-82.

She ranks first in career field goals made and attempted, and is tied with her sister Janet, and Faith Johnson for most career games played with

Huff distinguished herself as Wisconsin's first professional woman basketball player and was also the first American chosen to play in Spain in 1983–84. She was inducted into the University of Wisconsin Athletic Hall of Fame in 1998.

ne of the premier athletic leagues in the nation, the Big Ten Conference is proud of its leadership in the area of women's athletics.

Big Ten women's athletics programs lead the nation in basketball attendance, and rank second in volleyball attendance. In addition, the league receives more television exposure than any conference in the nation. More than 200 Conference athletic events are televised each year on national and regional networks.

Begun in 1895, the Intercollegiate Conference of Faculty Representatives (popularly known as the Big Ten) has changed little from its original philosophy of faculty control of athletics with emphasis on the student-athlete. Comprised of 11 institutions in eight states, the conference has long set the national standard for athletics and academics. As a whole, league institutions graduate student-athletes at overall rates between 10 and 22 percent higher than their peers at other Division I conferences. The conference celebrated its centennial anniversary during the 1995-96 season.

Women's athletics programs became affiliated with the Conference officially in 1981, although unofficial conference championships had been held among the member institutions since 1972. Penn State became the 11th university to join the conference in 1991.

Big Ten women athletes compete in conference championships in basketball, cross country, field hockey, golf, gymnastics, soccer, softball, swimming and diving, tennis, indoor and outdoor track and field, and volleyball.

The Big Ten Conference began its conference basketball tournament that decides the automatic qualifier for the NCAA Championship in 1995. Penn State was the winner of the initial tournament, and successfully defended its title in 1996. Iowa surprised the league by winning the tournament title in 1997. No. 5 seed Purdue became the lowest seeded team to win the tournament in 1998.

The league title is based on the final regular season conference standings. All teams play a total of 16 games. Schools play six teams twice, and four teams once.

The 1998 Big Ten Conference tournament will be held on Friday-Monday, Feb. 26-March 1 in Indianapolis, Ind. The tournament is a four-day single elimination playoff with all 11 teams participating. The top five seeds (as determined by conference standings) receive a first-round bye. The other six teams play each other in the first round, with the winners participating in the quarterfinals on Saturday.

The conference champion has earned an automatic bid to the NCAA tournament since 1981. Ohio State and Iowa advanced to the Final Four in 1993, and Purdue qualified for the NCAA semifinals in 1994.

In addition to its athletic success, the Big Ten Conference has led the nation in basketball attendance for sis consecutive years. Seven schools finished in the top 25 in attendance, and overall the league averaged a national record 4,139 spectators per game. Wisconsin led the Big Ten for a third year and ranked third nationally with 10,455 spectators per game.

KOHL CENTER BadgerBall's New Home



A replica of the crest on the UW Field House was installed on the front fascia of the Kohl Center. The 10,000-pound crest welcomes fans to the 17,142-seat facility that also serves the university and the community with special events. The Kohl Center conveniently houses all aspects of BadgerBall including offices, locker and training areas, and practice and competitive facilities.

THE KOHL CENTER



Wisconsin's new "BASKETBALL FIRST" multipurpose athletic center is state-of-the-art with a capacity of up to 17,142 seats. BadgerBall's tipoff was Jan. 20, 1998, with Wisconsin averaging 13,260 in seven home games. With the facility, the University will be able to host many NCAA events, including the 1998 Division I Women's Volleyball Championship in December of 1998.

The Kohl Center is the happy home for the UW Women's Basketball team having had its inaugural opening Jan. 20 with a declared sellout vs. the University of Iowa. At the current pace of success established by the women hoopsters, the Kohl Center could very well become the home of the first Wisconsin women's basketball Big Ten championship team.

Since opening, the building has met with much success. Areas specific to the UW women's program were designed by the Wisconsin coaches with the women's program in mind. From computers to lounge areas to audio/video systems, the Kohl Center provides a competitive floor, practice and study areas all in one place. The coaching offices are also located at the Kohl Center.

"The Kohl Center represents a tremendous advantage for University of Wisconsin basketball. It provides us with a state-of-the art facility right on campus and convenient for our studentathletes and fans. The interior structure and proximity of the crowd to the court are particularly pleasing in duplicating the exciting atmosphere we had at the UW Field House. This building has helped ensure our basketball program will take its place among the nation's elite."

The Kohl Concourse is the main entry to the lower seating bowl and the suites. 'The Mendota Wall', a glass sculpture created by Dale Chilhuly and valued at over a million dollars, is shown above the crowd at the main entrance to the Kohl Center.

MAJOR BENEFACTORS

The building is named for U.S. Sen. Herb Kohl (D-Wisconsin), a 1956 graduate of the UW-Madison, who donated \$25 million to the project. Kohl's gift is the single largest private donation in University history. Kohl earned his Bachelor of Science degree in American Institutions from Wisconsin-Madison.

Former all-Big Ten basketball player Albert "Ab" Nicholas and his wife, Nancy Johnson Nicholas, pledged \$10 million toward the project. The facility's practice gymnasium is named the Nicholas-Johnson Pavilion and Plaza. Nicholas received his B.S. and M.B.A. degrees from the UW-Madison.

The Kellner family-Jack F. and his sons, Ted and Jack W. of Milwaukee gave \$2.5 million. All three Kellners received degrees from the University of Wisconsin-Madison.

CAPACITY

The Kohl Center will seat 17,142 for basketball. That figure includes 7,500 seats in the lower seating bowl and 4,500 in each of the two balconies. The unique design of the Kohl Center (with two overhanging balconies) guarantees that all fans will be close to the playing floor with excellent site lines. The facility is expected to seat approximately 14,000 for hockey, and between 15,000 and 17,000 for concerts.

SPACIOUS LOCKER ROOMS

The Kohl Center includes lockers for UW men's and women's basketball and hockey. Four other locker rooms (for visitors or multiple teams during WIAA tournaments) also are in the arena.

The 2,200 square-foot, state-of-the-art locker areas have been designed with the needs of student-athletes in mind including team organizational meetings, an athletes' social area, and study carrels. The athletes have a lounge area with sound system, video room, computers available in the study room, and, of course, a spacious dressing and shower area complete with multiple outlets and lighted mirrors.

AUXILIARY GYM

The Nicholas-Johnson Pavilion will house three full-size basketball courts to be used for practice sessions when the Kohl Center is booked for other events. Pre-game booster club functions will be scheduled in the gym.

NCAA VOLLEYBALL '98

Already established as one of the nation's attendance leaders in women's basketball, Madison (and the Kohl Center) will welcome the return of the NCAA Women's Volleyball Championship in 1998.

Wisconsin estab-



lished itself as the attendance record-holder for the NCAA Division I Women's Volleyball Championship when it played host to the 1993 NCAA Volleyball Championship held in the UW Field House. That championship attracted the greatest number of spectators to the tournament final with 11,155. Combined with the 9,930 at the semifinals, the Wisconsin venue set the NCAA record with 21,085 fans.

The 1998 NCAA Women's Volleyball Championship returns December 17 and 19. With the increase in spectator seating and viewing and fan comfort, Wisconsin's all-time attendance record is expected to be reset in a grand manner.

CHECK LIST OF AMENITIES

- For the Athletes: Huge lockerrooms that include attached lounges, video/meeting rooms, and study areas with practice facility attached.
- For the Coaches: Spacious offices with westward views of the campus including the Field House and Camp Randall Stadium.
- For the Support Areas: Sports medicine, sports information, concessions/catering, and physical plant have ample and convenient work areas. The UW ticket office has totally relocated to new offices in the Kohl Center.
- For the Fans and Suites: A state-of-the-art sound system has been implemented in the Kohl Center and TV monitors (capable of showing replays) are wired to the suites and above concessions stands throughout the building.
- For the Fans: Extra-wide concourses (two), a number of food courts on both levels, numerous restrooms and merchandise outlets.
- Also For the Fans: The cantilever design replicates the overhang effect of the Field House without the obstructions. Sightlines are tremendous from every seat. At center court, you can look up at three ascending, cheering spectator areas—an awesome and intimidating sight for our opponents.

The \$76 million Kohl Center opened in January of 1998. The arena is located on campus and has become a major showcase for Madison's cultural and sporting events. Shown below is the women's locker room and (left) the auxiliary practice facility.



BADGERS MAKE THEIR WORLD MARK




Members of the BadgerBall family have made their mark on the world of basketball. In 1996, Jane Albright-Dieterle returned victorious from Taiwan where she was the gold medal winning head coach for the Jones Cup team. Other members of the UW team have taken world tours as Big Ten all-Stars visiting such countries as England, Denmark, Japan, Sweden, Austria, Hungary, Australia, Slovakia and the Czech Republic. The Wisconsin team participated in the Northern Lights Invitational in Anchorage, Alaska in 1997. Wisconsin will take its second foreign tour this spring to Australia visiting the Sydney Opera House, touring the 2000 Olympic venue, diving at the Great Barrier Reef, and competing in four games in a 14-day tour May 16-29, 1999.

adgerBall mania has swept the State of Wisconsin and the world. Members of the Wisconsin team have participated in a number of world basketball tours. Current team members Amy Wiersma, Kelley Paulus, Dee Dee Pate and Tanisha Boston were members of the foreign-touring Big Ten all-Star teams. Wiersma went to Austria, Slovakia and the


Czech Republic, Paulus and Pate visited Denmark, and Boston was in Sweden. Since its first tour in 1992, the Big Ten all-star team has also competed in Australia, Hungary, Sweden, Denmark, and Japan.

A communications graduate of UW-Stevens Point in 1989, Posick became the play-by-play announcer for the national champion Pointer hockey team. He arrived in Madison in 1991, and lobbied the station to catch up with the public's enthusiasm for BadgerBall. He begins his third full season as the play-by-play announcer for both home and away games.

A World-Class University

The University of Wisconsin-Madison, one of the nation's leading institutions of higher education, is dedicated to the support of academic freedom.

Founded in 1848, the first class of 17 students enrolled February 5, 1849. Today, UW-Madison ranks as the nation's seventh largest university with 40,196 students. It is one of the nation's largest and most productive institutions of higher learning and the student body is one of the most diverse in the country with students coming from every state. Wisconsin also ranks fourth in the nation for foreign student enrollment.

More than 4,546 courses and 13,122 sections are offered in UW-Madison's 13 schools and colleges. Majors are available in 146 undergraduate, 169 master's, and 125 doctoral and professional degree programs.

Award-winning research spanning the academic disciplines has earned UW-Madison a place among the world's elite institutions of higher education. Wisconsin has ranked among the top 10 universities in the United States in many scholarly reputational studies since 1910. The quality of its undergraduate, graduate and research programs is recognized around the world.

UW-Madison undergraduate academic programs ranked third among public universities in 1996 according to U.S. News & World Report. The business and engineering programs were tied

for 11th best in the nation while the business school's real estate program was ranked first.

UW-Madison faculty or alumni have won 14 Nobel Prizes and 23 Pulitzer Prizes. Forty-four faculty members have been awarded the National Science Foundation's Early Career Development awards, 10 have won the National Medal of Science, and four are Searles scholars. Forty-six professors are members of the National Academy of Sciences, 18 are members of the

National Academy of Engineering, three are in the National Academy of Education and 50 are fellows in the American Physical Society.

UW-Madison is one of the nation's first land-grant colleges, establishing a tradition of research in agriculture and the life science. The founders of the university developed the "Wisconsin Idea" ensuring "the beneficent influence of the university available to every home in the state."

UW-Madison is the largest institution in the University of Wisconsin System. It has the only public law and medical schools in the state as well as the only school of veterinary medicine.

A Scenic Campus

One of the most picturesque college campuses in the country, UW-Madison covers 932 acres along the beautiful shores of Lake Mendota.

One mile from the capitol, traveling down historic State Street, the city was designed so the University and state would be linked, signifying the interrelated nature of the academic and political life of Wisconsin.

Madison's lakes, rolling hills, architecture, parks and arboretum have enhanced UW-Madison's reputation for scenic beauty.

Tree-lined Bascom Hill features a bronze statue of Abraham Lincoln, one of the University's most famous landmarks. Others include North Hall, the first building on campus; the Carillon Tower in front of the Social Science building; Library Mall, with its clock tower and fountain; and Picnic Point, which lies at the end of a 129-acre peninsula complete with hiking and biking trails—one of the most romantic spots on campus. Camp Randall Stadium is a fun place to be on a Saturday afternoon, especially during the infamous Fifth Quarter after a football game when the band entertains. The newly opened Kohl Center is home to the UW basketball and ice hockey teams as well as a regular concert stop

A favorite area for UW students to gather is the Memorial Union and its lakeside terrace. Here students can study or socialize against a backdrop of sailboats, canoes, sailboards, kayaks and swimmers, while enjoying the sunshine and breezes from Lake Mendota.

The Student Body

Over 40,000 students populate the UW campus, including more than 10,700 graduate and professional students in numerous fields.

Although a UW Board of Regents policy limits undergraduate enrollment from outside the state to 25 percent, the University still maintains one of the nation's most diverse student bodies.

Students hail from every county in the state and every state in the nation, as well as from 119 foreign countries. UW-Madison ranks fourth in the nation for total foreign student enrollment.

A greater effort is also being made to recruit and retain minority students and faculty. In the fall of 1997, African-Americans, Hispanics, Native Americans and other minority groups accounted for more than nine percent of the student body.

The Community

Madison, located in southern Wisconsin, is not only pretty to look at but fun to be in. Draped around five lakes, "Mad City" is the home of the University of Wisconsin and the state capital.

With a diverse population of 200,814, Madison offers the "big city" spheres of politics, arts and entertainment, as well as the attributes of a small town. It is a family and actionoriented community that promotes participation "Wisconsin-Madison is a world-class American university located in a world-class college town. With over 800 campus organizations, 14,000 works of art, and even a nuclear reactor to call their own, the nearly 30,000 undergraduate students at Wisconsin would be hard-pressed not to find something to do."

Madison was named the best place to live in America in 1996 by Money magazine. Again, in 1998 Money magazine rated Madison the best mid-sized city in the Midwest. The July 1995 issue of Outside magazine called Madison a "Dream Town." The magazine also rated Madison as one of the top 15 "great sports towns" in the country. U.S. News and World Report named it one of the country's 10 Hottest Cities. Madison was also featured on the front page of the Life section of USA Today on July 12, 1995.

WHERE WISCONSIN RANKS

Since 1910, the University of Wisconsin has ranked on the top 10 lists in every objective national faculty reputational survey. The quality of Wisconsin's undergraduate, graduate and research programs is recognized worldwide.

The 1997 Fiske Guide to Colleges, the best-selling guide to colleges, gives the UW-Madison its highest academic ranking. In fact, UW-Madison is one of only eight public institutions in the country to receive the five-star rating. In 1998, U.S. News & World Report listed UW-Madison as eighth for academic reputation among public universities and 38th among all universities.

In 1996, UW-Madison's undergraduate reputation was rated third among public universities according to U.S. News & World Report. In 1995, the National Research Council placed 16 UW-Madison doctoral programs in the nation's top 10 and another 35 programs in the top 25.



Funding and Support

- ► Federal Grants: UW-Madison received over \$242 in federal awards in 1997.
- ➤ Research and Development Funds: UW-Madison ranked third in the country for research and development expenditures in 1996, with \$423 million, according to the National Science Foundation.
- ➤ Tuition: Over the last 10 years, tuition for resident undergraduates at the UW-Madison has been consistently lower than the average for public Big Ten schools. The UW-Madison has the second-lowest resident undergraduate tuition and the third-lowest nonresident undergraduate tuition of the public Big Ten institutions.
- ▶ **Private Support:** With private gifts totally \$212.5 million in 1997, Wisconsin ranks first among all public institutions and fifth among all institutions.
- ▶ Alumni: The Wisconsin Alumni Association has a network of 116 chapters around the world helping to serve some 300,000 alumni. The chapters have raised \$3.5 million in scholarships.
- ▶ Internet: UW-Madison was named one of the 100 Most Wired Colleges by Yahoo! Internet Life magazine.

- ► **Graduates:** Standard & Poor's 1996 survey lists the Wisconsin as one of the nation's top producers of corporate executives, ranking second in producing BA degree winners who go on to become corporate executives.
- ▶ **Doctoral Degrees:** UW-Madison is a national leader in number of doctoral degrees awarded ranking third in 1996. Between the school's founding and 1997, the University of Wisconsin-Madison awarded 32,785 doctoral degrees.

Departmental Academic Rankings

- ▶ Liberal Arts: In its ranking of graduate programs in the liberal arts in 1998, U.S. News & World Report sited UW-Madison's sociology department as tops in the country. The magazine also ranked education eighth; social work ninth: economics 10th, psychology 12th and political science 14th; and history 11th.
- Science Programs: According to U.S. News and World Report's annual graduate school ratings, published in 1997, six UW-Madison science programs ranked in the top 10: computer science, 10th; chemistry, 10th; and nursing, 18th.
- ▶ Education: The School of Education is the nation's best according to a survey by the University of Illinois released in 1994. The UW's educational administration and elementary education programs ranked second.
- ➤ College of Agricultural and Life Sciences: In 1993, the College of Agricultural and Life Sciences was ranked one of the top

- 10 agricultural schools in the country according to Farm Futures magazine
- ▶ Film and TV: The College Finder ranked UW-Madison as one of the top 35 schools in the nation for studying film and television in 1997.
- ▶ Libraries: The UW-Madison has the 14th largest university library collection in the United States, with more than 5.8 million books in 45 libraries across campus.
- ▶ **Business:** The School of Business' undergraduate program ranks seventh in the nation according to *U.S. News & World Report* (1996). The MBA program ranks in the top five percent and the real estate program ranks third

. Business Week ranked the school among the top 50 business schools in the nation.

Computerworld ranked the business school's Information Systems program as one of the top 25 in the nation.





UW-Madison Sets the Pace

- with the oldest Scandinavian studies (1875), psychology (1888), agricultural economics (1909), genetics (1910) and wildlife management (1939) departments in the United States
- ➤ in establishing the nation's first magnetic observatory (1876)

- ▶ in the synthesizing of genes. Former biochemistry professor Har Gobind Khorana synthesizes the first gene. He received the Nobel Prize in 1968 for his work in genetic coding.
- ▶ in finding which wavelength of ultraviolet light produces skin cancer (1941)
- in synthesizing the anti-cancer drug, fluorouracil (1957)
- ▶ as Elizabeth and James Miller, UW Medical School professors of oncology, were the first to identify characteristics among chemicals that cause cancer (1950s, 60s)
- ▶ with launching the Orbiting Astronomical Observatory, the world's first true observatory in space (1968)
- ▶ in revolutionizing brain surgery, as Dr. Manucher Javid, UW Medical School professor of surgery, became the first neurosurgeon to use a solution from the compound urea to relieve pressure during brain surgery on a human (1956)
- ▶ in laying the foundation for the U.S. Food and Drug Administration's adoption of Sun Protection Factor (SPF) on sunscreens (1960)
- ▶ the National Organization for Women is founded in Madison by UW political scientists Kathryn Clarenbach and Betty Friedan (1966)
- ▶ in developing new techniques to measure bone-tissue loss, known as osteoporosis
- ▶ with the Biotron, the first research building where environmental conditions for experimental purposes can be controlled
- with bone-marrow transplants. Using techniques developed at UW-Madison, the first bone-marrow transplant in the U.S. was done at



UW Hospital. A UW team also discovered how to predict the success of bone marrow transplants by matching genes

- ➤ in finding evidence linking cancer in laboratory animals with saccharin and cyclamates
- ▶ in finding that the anti-estrogen drug tamoxifen can prevent breast cancer from recurring in certain women who have had cancer (1980)
- ► as UW Hospital and Clinics develop the nation's first Mobile Critical Care Unit, which duplicates facilities of a hospital intensive care unit and laboratories
- with the first medical physics department in the nation to exist within a medical school
- ➤ as UW-Madison researchers describe the atomic structure of a common cold virus (1985)
- ▶ with the establishment of the Center for Dairy Research, the nation's first such center to be established at a university (1986)
- ▶ in organ preservation breakthroughs. In 1987, Dr. Folkert Belzer and biochemist James Southard used a cold storage preservation solution to preserve dog livers up to 36 hours and dog pancreases up to 72 hours. Clinical use of this new solution decreases the need for emergency transplantation, increases the number of



livers and pancreases available to people who need transplants, and improves organ sharing among transplant centers

- ▶ in improved world map projection developed by professor Arthur H. Robinson (1960s)
- with the development of the world's first genetically altered trees that are resistant to Dutch Elm disease
- ▶ in Hector F. Deluca, discoverer of a "super vitamin-D" compound, and continuing techniques for synthesizing the compound
- ▶ with access features for disabled people in everyday computer programs designed by the UW's Trace Research and Development Center



David Ward



David Ward was named chancellor of the University of Wisconsin-Madison in June 1993.

Ward has provided strong leadership for efforts to improve the quality of undergraduate education. Changes inspired by Ward include enhanced student advising, particularly for freshmen and sophomores; expanded course access; a core curriculum; and increased opportunities for undergraduates to conduct research.

Ward chairs the Board of Trustees of the University Corporation for Advanced Internet Development and also serves on the Board of Directors of the National Association of State Universities and Land-Grant Colleges and chairs the Big Ten Council of Presidents/Chancellors.

The chancellor was born in Manchester, England, and received bachelor's and master's degrees from the University of Leeds. He earned a Fulbright Travel award to the United States in 1960 and received a doctorate from UW-Madison in 1963.

He served as chair of the geography department from 1974 to 1977 and as associate dean of the Graduate School from 1980 to 1987. He became vice chancellor for academic affairs at UW-Madison in 1989, and in 1991, was also named provost, chief deputy to the chancellor.

Jim Hoyt



Jim Hoyt, a professor in the UW's School of Journalism and Mass Communication, has served as the chair of the UW Athletic Board and as a UW Faculty Representative since 1991.

As the chair of the Athletic Board, Hoyt oversees the governing body that supervises the day-to-day running of the athletic department. As a faculty representative, he serves on a number of committees of the NCAA, Big Ten Conference, and Western Collegiate Hockey Association.

A UW professor since 1973, Hoyt was the director of the School of Journalism and Mass Communication from 1981 to 1991. He teaches courses in the school's broadcast news sequence and has conducted extensive research on the effect of cameras in the courtroom. A former producer and editor for NBC News in Washington, D.C., he now consults for NBC News and a number of local televsion stations throughout the country.

Hoyt received his bachelor's, master's and Ph.D. from Wisconsin.

Pat Richter



Pat Richter, a former UW studentathlete, professional football player, and successful businessman, was the perfect choice to become Wisconsin's athletic director in December of 1989.

An all-America tight end for Wisconsin's 1963 Rose Bowl football team, Richter had a distinguished career with the National Football League's Washington Redskins from 1963-71. He was inducted into the National Football Foundation College Hall of Fame and the Rose Bowl Hall of Fame.

Richter earned his bachelor's degree in landscape architecture from the UW in 1964, earning Academic all-America honors in 1962 and was named Wisconsin's Big Ten Medal of Honor recipient in 1963. He received his law degree from the UW in 1971. In 1995, he was inducted into the GTE/CoSIDA Academic Hall of Fame, and was honored as an NCAA Silver Anniversary Award winner for post-college achievements.

After employment with a Madison law firm, he joined the Oscar Mayer Foods Corp., and worked his way up to vice president of personnel.

Al Fish



Al Fish begins his 10th year as the administrative officer for the division overseeing facility planning, event management, technical services, equipment services and the University Ridge Golf Course. He also begins his first year of supervising the sports of football and men's and women's rowing.

Fish has been instrumental in the development of the Kohl Center and Fetzer Academic Center. Future projects under his direction include the Goodman Softball Complex, a new swimming facility, and expanded rowing facilities.

Fish came to the division in 1989 after three years as director of Policy and Budget for the Department of Health and Social Services. He worked as a liaison for Governor Tony Earl to the State Assembly, a budget analyst for the State Budget Office, and as a program evaluator for the Legislative Audit Bureau. A 1973 graduate of Luther College, Decorah, Iowa, Fish was a four-year letterwinner in golf.


Cheryl Marra

Jamie Pollard



University of Wisconsin Athletics

he University of Wisconsin-Madison offers its student-athletes one of the premier intercollegiate athletic programs in the country.

As a member of the prestigious Big Ten Conference, Wisconsin offers its student-athletes the best in education, athletic opportunities, coaching and on-field competition at the NCAA Division I level.

With a number of sports begun more than 100 years ago, Wisconsin men's teams compete in basketball, cross country, football, golf, ice hockey, rowing, swimming and diving, soccer, tennis, track and field, and wrestling.

Established July 1, 1974, the 12-sport women's athletic program offers basketball, cross country, golf, lightweight rowing, rowing, soccer, softball, swimming and diving, tennis, track and field, and volleyball. Ice hockey will begin its first season of intercollegiate competition in 1999-2000.

Wisconsin has ranked among the top 35 NCAA Division I programs for the past four years. In 1997–98, Wisconsin finished 34th in the Sears/National Association of Collegiate Directors of Athletics Directors Cup competition, which recognizes the best Division I college sports programs in the nation.

Fifteen of Wisconsin's 22 sports qualified as teams or individuals for their respective national championships in 1997-98. The men's and women's cross country teams both finished fith at the NCAA Championships while the women's volleyball team advanced to the elite eight of the NCAA tournament and ended the season ranked fifth. Badger athletes earned 53 all-American honors during the year.



The Wisconsin football team takes to the field for a home game. The Badgers have participated in four bowl games in the last five years winning three times including the 1994 Rose Bowl.

Qualifying for post-season competition as teams or individuals were women's basketball, men's and women's cross country, men's and women's rowing, men's and women's swimming, men's and women's tennis, men's and women's track and field, volleyball and wrestling.

Wisconsin finished second in the 1997-98 Big Ten Conference composite rankings. The Badgers crowned two Big Ten team champions in women's cross country and volleyball while second-place finishes were earned by men's cross country, men's and women's indoor track, and men's and women's outdoor track.



The Badger volleyball team won the 1997 Big Ten Conference championship and ended the season ranked fifth in the national poll.

Big Ten Conference composite rankings are not sanctioned by the conference office. Points are awarded for each school's finish in 12 men's and 10 women's conference championships. The first-place team receives 11 points while the 11th-place team receives one point. The total points are divided by the number of sports in which each school participates.







The Wisconsin women's swimming team had a record year in 1997–98 finishing 14th in the NCAA Championship and picking up 20 all-American honors.

Two Badger coaches were named the Big Ten Coach of the Year in their respective sports while two athletes were named the Big Ten Athlete of the Year and one was named the Big Ten Freshman of the Year. Wisconsin athletes also claimed 20 Big Ten individual titles. A total of 55 all-conference honors were earned during the season.

Academic honors also came in with three athletes earning Academic all-American honors and 138 athletes earning Academic all-Big Ten honors.

NCAA Championships

In the last six years, the University of Wisconsin has played host to five NCAA Championships.

The Badgers have played host to the NCAA Men's Ice Hockey Championship in 1993 and 1997. The 1993 event sold out in three months, the fastest sell out in NCAA hockey history.

Wisconsin will also play host to the NCAA Women's Volleyball Championship for the second time in 1998. When the Badgers first hosted the championship in 1993, the attendance records for the championship match and two-day event were both shattered.

The UW was also the site of the 1998 NCAA Women's Golf Championship. The event was the first national championship held at University Ridge Golf Course and the first women's championship shown live on national television showcasing the Ridge.



The mission of the Academic Affairs Office is to provide student-athletes with the maximum opportunity for academic and athletic excellence. University of Wisconsin athletes have a history of academic success and much of the credit for that impressive record is due to the advising system available to the student-athletes.

Director Alan Zussman supervises a staff of six advisors which conduct the program offered to the nearly 700 student-athletes. The advising staff of Mary Weaver-Klees, Craig Hudson, Chris Butler, Doug Tiedt, Liane Kosaki and Jerry Darda have a comprehensive understanding of academics at Wisconsin, and a permanent line of communication with all university departments. The staff renders quality academic and personal support to student-athletes and assists coaches in providing the best possible collegiate experience.

For those student-athletes who request assistance, advising sessions are offered on a one-to-one basis at a time appropriate for the athlete. Wisconsin athletes are degree-oriented while allowing for the flexibility to explore different areas. The advising staff takes a personal approach to each athlete in determining his or her individual needs, personal or academic.

Student-athletes at Wisconsin receive recognition for outstanding academics in a number of ways. The Big Ten Conference honors scholar-athletes with Academic all-Big Ten honors while the UW Athletic Board recognizes Athletic Board Scholars for the highest grade point average in each sport. In addition, student-athletes may be nominated for Academic All-America honors through the sports information office.

Fetzer Student Athlete Academic Center

Opened in the spring of 1997, the Fetzer Student Athlete Academic Center is the newest aid to Wisconsin student-athletes in achieving their academic goals.

The 15,000 square-foot, state-of-the-art facility serves the needs of all men and women student-athletes. The Center features an open area with carrels that can accommodate up to 30 students. There are 11 study rooms of differ-

ent shapes and sizes including a 55-seat auditorium. A computer room houses 22 PC's while the entire Center is wired with voice/data jacks and power ports.

Student-athletes can drop in before practice or between classes to study or meet with the advisors and grant-in-aid staff whose offices are also located in the center.



The Fetzer Student Athlete Academic Services center, a state-of-the-art facility located in the lower level of the McClain Center, opened in 1997. The \$2.1 million center is one of the best of its kind in the nation and includes 11 study rooms, a computer room, and a 55-seat auditorium.



Scholarships

UW-Madison is proud to offer to its prospective student-athletes one of the most comprehensive athletic scholarship programs in the nation. As a Division I member of the National Collegiate Athletic Association (NCAA), scholarships are awarded to athletes on a one-year renewable basis if scholastic and athletic commitment are maintained.

Scholarships are available in all varsity sports with the exception of men's rowing, which does not grant scholarships. Full scholarships include the cost of room and board in addition to tuition and fees. The selection of scholarship recipients is based on athletic ability and projected academic success at the University of Wisconsin-Madison.

Sports Medicine

The goal of the sports medicine staff is to provide all University of Wisconsin student-athletes with high quality health care. Wisconsin's Sports Medicine program features state-of-theart facilities and the services of leading sports medicine and health care professionals.

The sports medicine staff consists of team physicians, dentists, athletic trainers, and other medical and allied health professionals. The day-to-day care, prevention, and treatment of injuries to Wisconsin athletes is supervised by a staff of eight full-time and three graduate assistant N.A.T.A.-certified athletic trainers. Under the direction of head athletic trainer Dennis Helwig, the Sports Medicine program focuses on injury prevention. Staff members Chuck Hart, Jan Helwig, Mike Johnson, Barb Pearson, Henry Perez-Guerra, Heidi Stettler, and Andy Winterstein utilize functional measures, provide dietary analysis, measure physiological capacity and outline programs to improve flexibility.

The Sports Medicine facility in the McClain Center features an extensive collection of therapeutic and rehabilitation equipment including a 50-foot, two-lane-rehabilitation pool, and an on-site x-ray facility. Considered one of the nation's finest, the McClain Sports Medicine Center offers an environment conducive to expedient care, and a healthy return to competition.

Should an injury occur, athletes are seen immediately by team physicians affiliated with the world-renowned UW Hospitals and Clinics.

Medical director **Dr. Ben Graf** is responsible for all services provided to our student-athletes. Orthopedic care is directed by team physician **Dr. John Orwin** while general medical care is directed by the head of primary care, **Dr. Greg Landry**.

In addition to the headquarters in the McClain Athletic Facility, auxiliary athletic training rooms are located in the Stadium, Natatorium, UW Field House and Kohl Center. All training areas are equipped with the finest therapeutic modalities and rehabilitative apparatus.

Sports Information

Directing the communications for the 23 sports in the Division of Intercollegiate Athletics is the responsibility of the University of Wisconsin Sports Information Offices.



WISCONSIN SPORTS FACILITIES



The McClain Athletic Facility offers indoor practice facilities for football, soccer and track and field. A 90-yard newly resurfaced artificial turf practice area is contained in the 76,380-square foot main floor. The lower level houses the Fetzer Student Academic Center, the headquarters of the Badgers Sports Medicine staff, a fully-equipped weight room and locker rooms for football, men's and women's track, softball and men's and women's soccer.







Top: UW golfers have the opportunity to compete on one of the finest courses in the Midwest—University Ridge. The facility features a par-72, 18-hole course, 15,000-square foot practice green and 5,000-square foot chipping green. It was the site of the 1998 NCAA Division I Women's Golf Championship.

Left: The Camp Randall Memorial Sports Center or Shell features a 200-meter Martin rubber track surrounding four basketball/volleyball courts that double as throwing and jumping areas for indoor track meets. The Shell, which has a seating capacity of 2,500, will be the site of the 1999 Big Ten Conference Indoor Men's Track & Field Championship.

Bottom Left: The Kohl Center, which opened in January of 1998, is the home of the Badger basketball and hockey teams. One of the finest on-campus athletic facilities in the nation, the \$76 million facility includes a separate practice gym, locker rooms and lounge areas, and coaches' offices.



Weight training areas in the McClain Center and Camp Randall Stadium feature free weights and stereo music in spacious, carpeted rooms. Four full-time and two part-time weight training instructors monitor and advise all Wisconsin student-athletes.

The Wisconsin Field House, which seats 9,500, is the practice and competitive facility for the Badger volleyball team as well as the competitive facility for the wrestling squad. It features four locker rooms, and an athletic training area.



The Wisconsin tennis teams have the competitive advantage of playing year-round at one of the best college facilities in the United States—the Nielsen Tennis Stadium. The stadium features 18 tennis courts (12 indoor and six outdoor), five squash courts, one squash doubles court, and seats 1,500 spectators.



The swimming and diving teams have two pools for practice and competition—the Natatorium and Southeast Recreational Facility. The "Nat" contains an eight-lane, 25-yard pool equipped with an automatic Colorado Timing System and digital readout score board. The 50' x 40' diving well is fitted with three one-meter and two three-meter Dura (Maxi) Flex boards. The SERF (pictured above) features an indoor long course pool with movable bulkheads that more than double the program's training space.



Ground was broken at the Goodman Softball Complex on the west end of the UW campus in June of 1998. The facility, which will open during the spring of 1999, will have an NCAA-regulation, natural grass field with a centerfield distance of 225 feet, and left and right field foul line distances of 200 feet. The facility will include dugouts, locker areas, players' lounge, grandstand seating for 1,600 and media facilities.

Wisconsin Traditions

Badger Nickname

The sports program's nickname "Badgers," was borrowed from the state of Wisconsin. The territory was dubbed the "Badger State," not because of animals in the region, but rather by an association with lead miners in the 1820's. Prospectors came to the state looking for minerals. Without shelter in the winter, the miners had to "live like Badgers" in tunnels burrowed into hillsides.

Bucky Badger

Although badgers in various forms had been the University of Wisconsin mascot for decades, the version that is currently know as Bucky, sporting a cardinal and white sweater, was first drawn in 1940 by professional illustrator Art Evans.

The original badger mascot was too vicious to control. On more than one occasion, the live badger escaped handlers before a sideline hero recaptured the animal. It was decided in the interest of fan and player safety that Wisconsin's mascot would be retired to the Madison zoo.

In 1949, a student in the university's art department, Connie Conrad, was commissioned to mold a paper-mache badger head. Gymnast and cheerleader, Bill Sagal of Plymouth, Wis., was directed by homecoming chair Bill Sachse, to wear the outfit at the homecoming game. A pep rally was held to determine the mascot's name. The rally committee opted for its own name: Buckingham U. Badger. The name is said by some to have originated in a line from "On, Wisconsin" that exhorts the UW to "buck right through that line."

On Wisconsin

The tune was composed in 1909 by William Purdy of Chicago, with the words written by UW alumnus Carl Beck, who rewrote them in 1951. The song was an instant hit at the Wisconsin campus and soon spread throughout the world, being very popular with military bands. Some 2,500 schools and colleges have adopted the music and changed the words to suit their needs.

Varsity

The traditional arm waving that comes at the end of the song "varsity" was the 1934 brain-child of then-UW band leader Ray Dvorak. He had originally gotten the idea from University of Pennsylvania students who waved their caps after a losing game. Dvorak later instructed UW students to wave as a salute to UW President Glenn Frank.

Fifth Quarter

The Wisconsin band has become nationally famous for its post-game celebration called the Fifth Quarter. Win or lose, fans sing, dance and cheer the band as they play traditional favorites like "On, Wisconsin" and the Bud song. Originally, the post-game concert was designed to give fans something to listen to on their way out of the stadium, but it developed into a post-


game party as the band built in audience participation.

Bud Song

An integral part of any Wisconsin band performance is the playing of the Bud song. The tune is a spinoff of the song "You've said it all," a jingle with words and music originally written by Steve Karen for Budweiser beer commercials. Copyrighted by Sandlee Publishing Corporation in 1970, the song has become legendary at the University because of its polkalike rhythm. Band director Michael Leckrone said the song's popularity got started at a 1975 hockey game. "The crowd wanted to hear a polka," he said. "I didn't have any polkas. Just by accident, we had this beer commercial in the tunes we play. I told the band if we substituted the word 'Wisconsin' for 'Budweiser' it would work."

Leckrone said the song became a football tradition after a 1978 come-from-behind victory over Oregon. "Wisconsin was behind by three touchdowns, and the crowd was really dead. I played the song to get everyone pepped up. About 20 seconds after that, Wisconsin scored a touchdown. I played it again, and Wisconsin scored another touchdown. From then on, the band could never play enough 'Bud.'"
