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

College Camp Jubilee Has
a Fine Ending

The close of the College Camp Jubilee celebration ended this week with a very large attendance at the Sunday Services.

Dr. Paul B. Jenkins gave the Address entitled "The Dawn of a New Era". It was a masterpiece and was a fine survey of the happenings of the last half century. It was shown how the period had changed due to so many inventions. As the material world changed so did the social and religious conceptions change. Now it is a New Era that this generation has to face and they will no doubt keep on making progress as did the last one.

Dr. Frank H. Burt, president of Y.M.C.A. College for a score of years, presided. Dr. Warren P. Behan, for many years on the faculty, and now acting president of the College at Emporia College, Kansas, read the scripture.

In the evening at the Vesper Service, Mr. Ralph W. Cooke, Secretary in charge of Y.M.C.A. Hotel, Chicago, was the leader and several talked on the theme "Visions at Lake Geneva."

On Saturday evening an impressive service was held on the Lake Shore at the relighting of the dedicatory bonfire on the spot where on August 12, 1886, the original dedicatory fire was lighted. Only one person was present who was at the original fire, and that was Dr. Paul B. Jenkins, who was then a boy of fourteen years.

Dr. Burt gave a picture of the growth of the camp and College. W. O. Lewis, a business man from Chicago, presided. Mr. J. S. Hotton offered the prayer. At the close of the service from the firebrand with which Dr. Jenkins kindled the fire, candles were lighted by those on the platform and from their candles, spread to all in the group which numbered about three hundred. It was a very pretty and impressive sight.


