## TWO HUNDRED ATTEND MEN'S BANQUET

To be exact there were 201 who participated in the 21st Men's Annual Banquet. The number of the banquet is a guess. Maybe some reader has the actual number.

Mike Peterson was the Toastmaster, Mr. Kenneth Viste gave the word of welcome for the Village, Kenneth Goodrich of Elkhorn sang several solos, L. Fenton lead in the singing of "GOD BLESS AMERICA", Rev. George Winters of Lake Geneva, said "Grace".

Dr. Alfred T. Swan in his address gave recognition of Lincoln's Birthday and the Birth of the Boy Scout Organization thirty years ago. His theme was "Lincoln, The Youth".

In the address he traced those influences which helped to make Lincoln the man. He illustrated his talk by pictures along the present Lincoln Trail from his birthplace in Hardin County, Kentucky to New Salem, Illinois, including the fourteen years in Indiana.

It was an address which the speaker himself said was to carry the men in the audience back to their youthful days. Many of the young men who had helped serve stayed on to hear the address.

Attendance at the Annual Men's Banquet is one of real interest to men from our neighboring communities. Many were heard to say "I never miss them if I can make it". One who always gets to the banquets is Charles S. French of Lake Geneva. He was heard to remark "You never heard me make a motion to adjourn, either". Frank Lawson of Walworth who has been to a great many of the banquets during the years was there. Judge Drury, who is holding court at Elkhorn was seen along with most of the County Officials.

Arvid Thompson was chairman this year. Next year the job is assigned by vote of the crowd to William (Bill) Burton. It will be done right we are sure. Myron Piehl the official ticket seller had to make a bow. Myron says that it is a real pleasure to sell tickets for the banquet.

## SUMMER RESIDENT OF WIS. BAY WAS IN GEORGIA STORM

Mr. L.H. Hennes, a summer resident of Williams Bay, who with his driver, Bud Allen, were motoring to St. Petersburg, Fla. last Saturday, were guests at the hotel in Albany, Georgia, when a tornado struck the town, causing much property damage and loss of lives. The hotel was demolished, five guests being killed.

When the storm struck, all lights went out in the hotel and five inches of water was on the floors of the rooms in a few minutes. Mr. Hennes and his driver managed to get out with their lives and soaked baggage with the aid of flashlights. All tourist cars in the hotel garage were demolished as the roof was blown in on them. Their car was parked outside and only the windows on one side were broken by a falling beam.

The town of over 14,000 inhabitants was almost completely destroyed and many dead bodies were seen lying in the debris. They consider themselves fortunate to escape with their lives and were happy to reach St. Petersburg at 5:30 p.m. Saturday evening, feeling somewhat shaky, but otherwise no worse for their experience.
