REGULAR MEETING OF THE BOARD OF REGENTS

Madison, Wisconsin

August 6, 1924, 10:30 A. M.

President Kronshage presiding.

Communications were received from Regents Bachman, Cashman, Casperson, Fasst and Mahoney, in explanation of their absence. Regent Casperson advised the regents while on their inspection trip that he would be unable to be present at this meeting.

Upon motion of Regent Waters, seconded by Regent Seaman, it was

VOTED, That the reading of the minutes of the last meeting of the regents be dispensed with and that they be approved as sent out to the regents.

President Birge reported that the State Board of Vocational Education would not distribute funds to institutions giving instruction in the manner in which it had prior to July 1, 1924; that in the future salaries would be paid to individuals doing teacher training work.

President Birge presented a communication from Professor W. H. Peterson, offering \$500 from himself and Mrs. White for the furnishing of one of the sun parlors in the State of Wisconsin General Hospital as a memorial to his wife, Mary White Peterson.

Upon motion of Regent Seaman, seconded by Regent Nace, it was VOTED, That the gift be accepted and that the Secretary write Professor Peterson expressing the appreciation of the regents.

VOTED, That an invitation be extended to the members of the Association of Governing Boards to visit the University of Wissonsin at methat time.

Upon motion of Regent Waters, seconded by Regent Schmidtmann, it was

VOTED, That the regents go into EXECUTIVE SESSION.

The business manager read two letters from F. S. Webster, district representative of the Ku Klux Klan, requesting the use of the stock pavilion for a meeting.

Upon motion of Regent Seaman, seconded by Regent Grady, it was VOTED, That the request be denied.
