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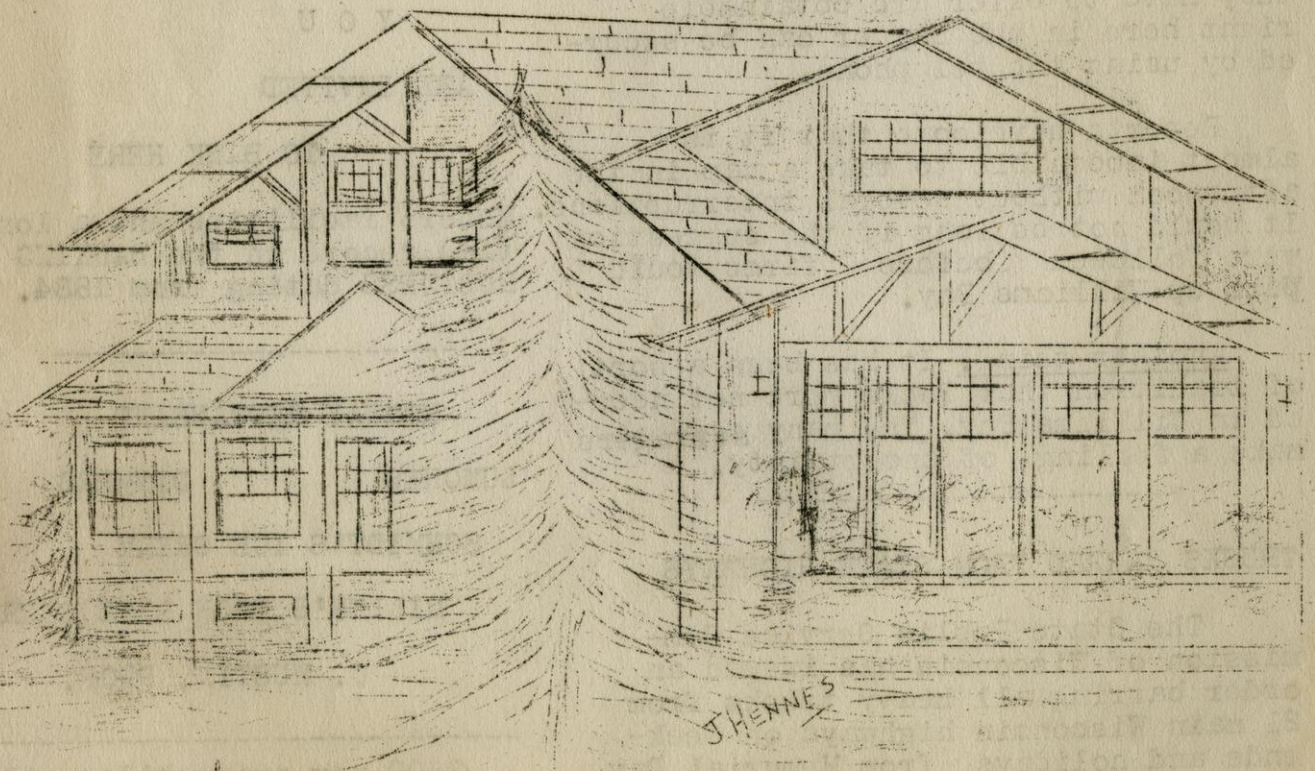

A COMPREHENSIVE COUNTY PLAN FOR  
WALWORTH COUNTY

At a recent meeting of the Walworth County Park Commission held at the Court House in Elkhorn, proceedings were commenced which may have a widespread and beneficial effect on Walworth County. At this meeting, which was attended by all of the seven members of the Commission, the Park Commission voted to make a formal request to the Wisconsin State Planning Board to lay out and propose a comprehensive plan for the future development of Walworth County. This plan will show a system of proposed County parks, a comprehensive system of future streets and roads; suggestions for a more accurate and more economical division of the County into rural school districts, a comprehensive plan for the future use and development of the land in the county for those purposes for which the several parcels of land are best suited, and many other interesting features.

The citizens of Walworth County will be interested to know that the State Planning Board is pleased with Walworth County as the location for setting up a demonstration of what is being done by that Board for the benefit, pleasure and future welfare of Wisconsin citizens. ( Cont.)

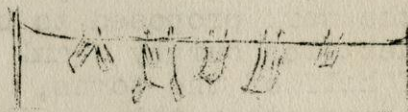

A COMPREHENSIVE COUNTY PLAN  
FOR WALWORTH COUNTY.

( Continued )

and as an exhibit of what it is hoped will be later accomplished for the benefit and beautification of other parts of the State. Mr. J.M. Albers, Areal Planning Engineer for the State Planning Board, and other representatives of that Board attended the meeting of the Walworth County Park Commission. Mr. Albers expressed the opinion that the request of the County Planning Commission for the assistance and co-operation of the Wisconsin State Planning Board will be cheerfully granted by that Board. The representatives of the State Board presented to the Park Commission an impressive amount of information relative to our county and relative to the work already done and the work proposed to be done. A detailed survey and mapping of half of the towns, showing, among other things, the location of all highways, streams, schools, residences, and the use which is being made of each parcel of land, has already been completed. It is expected that this phase of the work will be completed as to the remainder of the county within the next six weeks. Needless to say, the work of surveying and mapping the whole county and of laying out the comprehensive county plan will be done by the State Planning Board without cost or expense to Walworth County.

Walworth County is fortunate in its selection by the State as a site for the development of a county plan. It was partly because Walworth County was sufficiently forward looking several years ago to establish a County Park Commission that this county was chosen for this work, because in the performance of work of this character it is necessary that the State Planning Board have the co-operation of a County Park Commission in order to carry into effect its program.

Much credit is due to the Walworth County Regional Planning Council, a volunteer organization of public-spirited Walworth County citizens, for its patient and effective work in presenting to the State Planning Board the many advantages of Walworth County as a location for this important work. This is a citizens body which has been in existence for some time and is organized for the purpose of aiding in the development of a Walworth County Plan. It has held numerous meetings with representatives of the State Planning Board and committees have been organized to study the various phases of the work and such recommendations as may be made in connection therewith. Its membership is open to any Walworth County citizen.

The Walworth County Park Commission was created pursuant to the provisions of Chapter 37 of Wisconsin Statutes and held its first meeting on March 1, 1938. It consists of seven members, appointed by the Chairman of the County Board. The personnel of the Board at present consists of Riley S. Young, Darien, Chairman; James G. Allen, Lake Geneva; John C. Brennan, Linn; John F. Henderson, Whitewater; Lawrence A. Hollister, Williams Bay; John E. Shanahan, Delavan; and Charles E. Wilson, Elkhorn, Secretary.

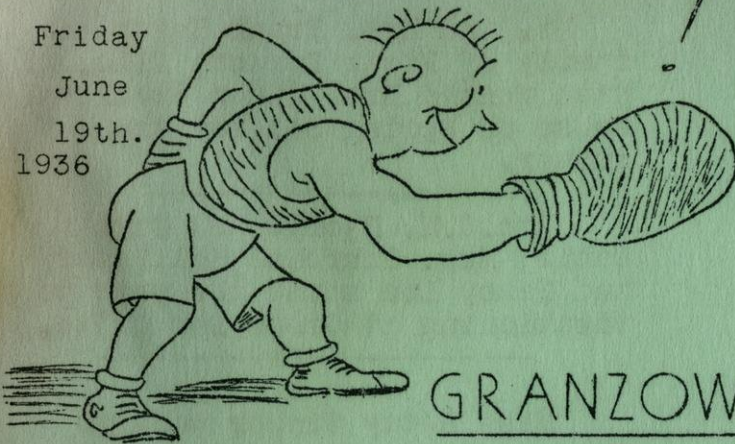

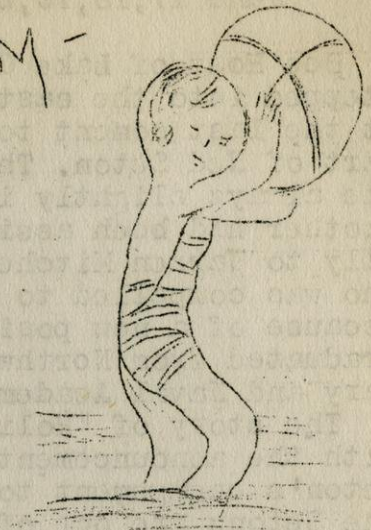

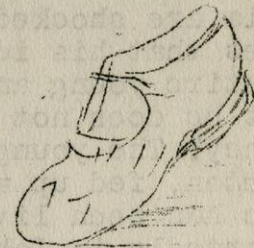

TRIM ORNAMENTAL TREES AND  
SHRUBS NOW

"If they are to be maintained in good condition, early flowering varieties of ornamental trees and shrubs will soon need their annual pruning out of dead wood and excess branches". So says Max Fuller, garden specialist, of Univ. of Ills.

"Goldenbell, or forsythia, should be pruned immediately, for in another six weeks buds will be set. Bridal-wreath, lilacs, syringa, or mock orange, Japanese quince, and the deutzias, will need to be pruned in a few weeks after bloom!"
