All of the wares or services that they have to offer are obtainable right here in the Bay or can be secured by using the telephone.



At a recent meeting of the Walworth County Park Commission held at the Court House in Elkhorn, proceedings were commenced which may have a widespread and beneficial effect on Walworth County. At this Sunday Dinners meeting, whoih was attended by all of the seven members of the Commission, the Park Commission voted to make a formal request to the Wisconsin State Planning Board to lay out and propose a comprehensive plan for the future development of Walworth County. This plan will show a system of proposed County parks, a comprehensive system of future streets and roads; suggestions for a more accurate and more economical division of the County into rural school disttricts, a comprehensive plan for the future use and development of the land in the county for those purposes for which the several parcels of land are best suited, and many other interesting feat-

Needless to say, the work of surveying and mapping the whole county and of laying out the comprehensive county plan will be done by the State Flanning Board without cost or expense to Welworth County.

Walworth County is fortunate in its selection by the State as a site for the development of a county plan. It was partly because Walworth County was sufficiently forward tooking several years ago to establish a County Park Commission that this county was chosen for this work, because in the performance of work of this character it is necessary that the State Planning Board have the cooperation of a County Park Commission Federal Deposit Insurance Corp. in order to carry into effect, its

program.

Much credit is due to the Waltorth County Regional Planning Council, a volunteer organization of public-spirited Walworth County citizens, for its patient and effective work in presenting to the State Planning Board the many advantages of Walworth County as a location for this important work. This is a citizens body which has been in existence for some time and is organized for the purpose of aiding in the development of a Walvorth County Plan. It has held numerous of the State Planning Board and committees have been organized to study the various phases of the work and such recommendations as may be made in connection therewith. Its membership is open to

any Walworth County citizen. The Walworth County Park Commission was created pursuant to the provisions of Chapter 37 of Wisconsin Statutes and held its first meeting on March 1,1928. It consists of seven members, the Board at present consists of James G. Allen, Lake Geneva, John C. Brennan, Linn, John F. Henderson, Whitewater, Lawrence A. Hollister, Williams Bay, John E. 
