## President Hales presiding

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The Secretary requested that the following corrections to the October 6, 1978, minutes be incorporated therein:

Page 6 - Report of the Education Committee The report was presented by Regent Lawton - not Regent Lavine.

Page 7 - At the end of the first paragraph relating to the report of the discussion in the Education Committee on Public Radio in Wisconsin, add the following sentence: "There was agreement that these questions would be followed up on a year from now.".

Upon motion made by Regent Lavine, and properly seconded, it was VOTED, That the minutes of the regular meeting of the Board of Regents of the University of Wisconsin System held on October 6, 1978, be approved as amended above.

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REPORT OF THE PRESIDENT OF THE BOARD

President Hales referred to the report of the Higher Educational Aids Board meeting held on October 13, 1978, copy attached as <u>EXHIBIT</u> A. There were no comments, and the report was ordered placed on file.

President Hales announced the appointment of the following Regents to the Regent Committee for the Search of a Dean of the School of Social Work at the University of Wisconsin-Milwaukee: Regents Lawton, McNamara, and Fitzgerald, Chairperson.

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REPORT OF THE PRESIDENT OF THE SYSTEM

Regent Lavine moved adoption of the following resolution, the motion was seconded by Regent DeBardeleben, and it was voted:

Resolution 1769: That the Report of Non-Personnel Actions by Administrative Officers to the Board of Regents and Informational Items Reported for the Regent Record be received for the record; and that actions included in the report be approved, ratified, and confirmed. (EXHIBIT B, attached)

President Young stated that during a recent visit to the University of Wisconsin-Parkside he was impressed with the library and the library activities there. He said they have received grants to do pioneering work in bibliographic material and recently the University of Wisconsin-Parkside Library Learning Center had been named the Library of the Year, and the Director had been presented with the Wisconsin Library Association Special Service Award. He said it is a very impressive operation and the competition is very keen, as we have very good libraries throughout the System and the State.

President Young noted that during visits to the various campuses he was made aware of the concern of the faculty, students, and others relative to the pressures we are under to keep down permanent appointments. He said we have to recognize that in the long pull we have problems when we have to appoint people to nonfaculty-track positions. He continued that he felt the Chancellors are working very hard to plan ahead so that we do not come to a day when we will have to lay off large numbers of tenured people. Because they are doing that in a variety of ways, they are under considerable criticism. He continued that this is a problem which is very difficult and there is no easy answer to it. He said he found this is a matter that concerns both faculty and administration the most. He stated we are at a time when we are not adding to our permanent staff and at the same time there are many young people who are brought along as System professors, academic staff, lecturers, etc., for whom there is no longterm future. It means we are not building at the bottom for the long pull and for new ideas. It is difficult for students also in that we are not being able to recruit more. It is not a problem peculiar to our university-it is a national problem and a troublesome one.

REPORT OF THE EDUCATION COMMITTEE

The report of the Education Committee was presented by Regent Lawton.

Regent Lawton moved adoption of the following resolution, the motion was seconded by Regent Lavine, and it was voted:

- Resolution 1770: That, upon recommendation of the President of the UW System and the Chancellor of UW-Stout, a previously approved Entitlement to Plan at UW-Stout be renamed and approved for planning as follows:
  - M.S. Personnel Training and Development to M.S. Personnel Training and Manpower Development

Regent Lawton reported that in the Committee meeting on the previous day Vice President Smith made brief comments about current procedures for submitting institutional proposals for entitlements to plan to the Board of Regents and noted that eight proposals were being presented for a first reading with Regent action scheduled for the December meeting. He also included a number of applications that had not been submitted to the Regents. Regent Lawton reported there had been discussion on each of the proposals separately:

# (1) UW-Milwaukee, B.S. Allied Health Sciences

Regent Lawton reported he inquired as to the significance of the Health Science Advisory Council's 6-3 (with 3 abstentions) vote in recommending approval of the proposed entitlement to plan. He stated it was his concern that this might indicate more opposition than was apparent. He said it was explained that the abstentions were related to possible conflict of interest considerations of the Council members who were recorded as abstaining from voting.

# (2) UW-Milwaukee, B. A. Afro-American Studies

Regent Lawton reported Regent Lavine stated his concern that students might be encouraged to complete the major in anticipation of employment opportunities that may not exist in view of the limited job market. He expressed the hope that course work in the program might be arranged in such a way as to enable the student to qualify substantially for a second major.

## (3) UW-Oshkosh, B.A./B.S. Study of Religion

Regent Lawton reported Chancellor Edward Penson and Dean William Leffin responded to questions relating to the qualifications of faculty for the proposed program. The Committee was assured that the faculty had the ability to teach about Asian religions and was satisfied that this program should go forward.

#### (4) UW-Parkside, Master of Public Service Administration

Regent Lawton reported it was pointed out that a similar program is presently offered by UW-Oshkosh.

(5) UW-Parkside, Contemporary Industrial Culture (Extended Degree).

Regent Lawton reported there were no questions and no discussion.

## (6) UW-Stevens Point, Bachelor's in General Studies

Regent Lawton reported UW-Stevens Point Acting Chancellor John Ellery stated the new program would be designed to give degree opportunities to persons who had earned an Associate Degree at a VTAE institute and who had had at least one year of full-time work experience after their Associate Degree. Provision would be made for possible transfer of credit from the VTAE institute with no more than 45 credits being accepted in transfer from any combination of two-year postsecondary institutions. Regent Lawton reported there were several concerns and questions raised by Regents and university persons present, including:

That the program would contribute to the blurring of the distinction between the VTAE and UW System missions;

That the presence of the proposed program at Stevens Point would likely lead to requests for similar programs at other System institutions such as Parkside and Stout, and in a time of decreasing enrollment might be an unfair advantage over the Centers and other cluster institutions;

That the program opportunity would result in encouraging college parallel course development in VTAE institutes other than those presently authorized to offer college parallel programs (Madison, Milwaukee, and Nicolet);

That some of the functions in the proposed program may be in conflict with the extended degree program which the Center System has previously been authorized to plan;

The fact that the program builds specifically upon the VTAE Associate Degree should be re-studied.

Regent Lawton reported Senior Vice President Smith observed that in view of the stated concerns and others he had received since the distribution of the planning entitlement documents, he now recommended that the Bachelor's in General Studies entitlement to plan proposal be withdrawn to permit further discussions involving Stevens Point, Center System, and System Academic Affairs staff and other appropriate and/or affected institutions and persons.

Regent Lawton moved adoption of the following resolution, the motion was seconded by Regent Lavine, and it was voted:

Resolution 1771: That the proposal for an Entitlement to Plan for a Bachelor's in General Studies at UW-Stevens Point be referred back to Vice President Smith's office for whatever action is appropriate.

(7) UW-Stout, Industrial Technology (Extended Degree)

Regent Lawton reported there were no questions and no discussion.

(8) UW-Whitewater, Production/Operations Management.

Regent Lawton reported there were no questions and no discussion.

Regent Lawton reported Vice President Smith briefly recounted activity by the System Vice Chancellors to recommend revision of Academic Information Series #1 (ACIS-1), the Regent document describing academic program development procedures relating to new majors and new degrees. He reported Vice President Smith noted that the primary effect of the new process is to establish a single point when the Regents might act to approve or deny authorization to an institution to proceed with the development and implementation of a new program in place of the present "double step action" in which Regents at one time act on the entitlement to plan and at another time act on the completed program proposal. He pointed out defects in the present "double step action", namely that the entitlement to plan action is undertaken in the presence of minimum information, and that the Regent final action comes so late, i.e., after complete and detailed planning has taken place, that a negative action by the Regents would pose a serious disappointment to the faculty and institution involved in the planning -not only a disappointment, but a great waste of time and effort.

Regent Lawton stated Dr. Smith then described the proposed four-stage process which selects a single point in time when the System and Regents can have sufficient information to make an informed judgment on authorizing planning and implementation, but early enough to avoid excessive commitments of institutional planning time should the judgment be negative. Regent Lawton reported that Regent DeBardeleben was advised, in response to his question, that Chancellors would have the right to appeal an adverse System Administration decision in the request for preliminary entitlement to develop a proposal. Regent Lawton reported Regent Lavine stated his concern that in the five-year review and evaluation, non-content factors as well as content factors in programs should be assessed. Non-content factors would include such elements as faculty size, number of students, and the employment market.

Regent Lawton advised that the Revised ACIS-1 will be returned for discussion and possible action in December. The Revised ACIS-1 will incorporate the proposed change in academic program development procedures relating to new majors or new degrees as well as a number of technical changes throughout the document.

Regent Lawton moved adoption of the following resolution, the motion was seconded by Regent Lavine, and it was voted:

Resolution 1772: That, upon recommendation of the President of the UW System and the Chancellor of UW-Platteville, UW-Platteville is authorized to recruit for a Dean of the College of Education.

REPORT OF THE BUSINESS AND FINANCE COMMITTEE

The report of the Business and Finance Committee was presented by Regent Grover.

Regent Grover reported that all Regents were invited to attend the Committee meeting on the previous day to consider the first reading of the 1979-81 biennial operating budget. He stated President Young told the Board that it had been developed with two basic emphases: (1) the preservation of quality in System programs and (2) the preservation of access. He said President Young pointed out several areas which require special emphasis: reducing costs to students; expansion of minority/ disadvantaged student services; bringing into higher education programs some individuals not presently included; needs relating to medical education as well as placing in operation the Center for Health Sciences. Regent Grover reported each of the eight elements comprising the proposed adjustments for 1979-81 was explained for the committee, with opportunity provided for questions. Regent Grover reported that during the discussion there was consideration of whether a decision item narrative should be added to the 1979-81 operating budget which would provide specific GPR funding for continuation of the North Central Association and its accrediting function for elementary and secondary schools as a part of the UW-Madison School of Education. In the past funding has come from the School's instructional budget, but North Central has been advised that this would be phased out during the 1979-81 biennium. He reported a motion to defer this item to the December meeting to allow preparation of an analysis of the present program as well as more detailed explanation of the alternative approaches failed on a tie vote. He stated the Business and Finance Committee then voted the following resolution:

That Decision Item Narrative 901, Continuation of State Support for North Central Accreditation Association, be added to the 1979-81 UW system operating budget as presented for first reading.

Regent Grover reported that the Committee then recessed to Room 1920 Van Hise Hall, with Regents Beckwith, Erdman, Fitzgerald, Grover, Hales and Neshek present.

Regent Grover reported the Committee considered the Nonresident Tuition Report (attached as <u>EXHIBIT</u> <u>C</u>). He reported that Vice President and Controller Lorenz, in reviewing the report, stated that System Administration staff has consistently stated that keeping the cost to students at its lowest level has always been a high priority consideration. This concern extends to non-residents as well as residents. One way in which costs can be kept down for the resident students is to have full utilization of the existing facilities, which can be aided by having increased numbers of non-resident students.

Vice President Lorenz continued that the System's studies have shown that the UW System's non-resident tuition is one of the highest in the country. The result of numerous discussions as to ways in which the System could increase its non-resident enrollment, and particularly at those border universities where the increased non-resident tuition has had its greatest impact, was the development of a series of Experiment Models. Regent Grover reported the three experimental models and supporting documentation for each were reviewed by the Committee.

The Committee cited several reasons why it was felt that the pilot program should be limited to UW-Platteville:

(1) The program should be conducted under controlled circumstances with limited variables, a condition which would be more difficult to maintain if it were extended to more than one university.

(2) Its location places it very near the borders of <u>two</u> states. This also provides a very limited area of the state from which it can draw its resident students.

(3) Its Engineering, Criminal Justice and Agriculture programs are unique in relation to offerings available at other universities; so a reduction in its non-resident tuition rate should not divert students to Platteville who might otherwise enroll at other locations.

The Committee also felt there was more wisdom in advancing a program which was considered salable to the legislative and executive branches of government as well as one considered most likely to be successful. Positive results from a program at Platteville could be the basis for requests to extend it to other universities facing similar declines in non-resident enrollment.

The consensus of the Committee was that the request be developed on the basis of the 60% figures contained in Table 7 of the report.

Regent Grover moved adoption of the following resolution, and the motion was seconded by Regent Neshek:

Resolution 1773: That System Administration staff be authorized to prepare a Decision Item Narrative for inclusion in the 1979-81 operating budget requesting authorization to implement Experiment Model 1 at UW-Platteville at the 60% of cost level.

Regent Lawton stated it appears there is an overlap of nonresident Illinois people with our Rock County Center. Regent Grover responded that the matter was discussed and also the matter of nonresident tuition at Milwaukee, Parkside, and Whitewater. He stated there are only thirteen nonresident students in Rock County at the present time and that if the experiment starts to expand, it will become so large that we will not be able to have a really controlled experimental situation so we can see if it can have some meaningful fiscal impact. Therefore the Committee felt that containment and focus was important at this time and the next step would be under proper analysis to extend it to other border campuses.

Regent Grover continued that the reason the UW-Platteville Campus was selected was because it was felt it has the drawing power of a unique curriculum in Agriculture, Engineering, and Police Science, and is uniquely located in a corner of the State. Also important is the fact that it is one of the campuses experiencing declining enrollment, and all of these factors weigh heavily in determining which specifically designated campus should be selected in order to achieve the desired results. He pointed out that the cost to implement the proposed model, if no additional nonresident students come in, is \$373,317, and we need 251 nonresident students to offset the possibilty of that loss. He said the Committee felt that kind of risk was salable and any additional expansion at this time would be difficult.

Regent McNamara stated that he supported the motion and felt the idea of experimenting is excellent. He said he had a personal interest in the matter because his district covers the part of Illinois involved and he was familiar with the educational needs of that area. He pointed out the nearest university is Northern Illinois University, DeKalb, Illinois, which is approximately one hundred miles east of the Mississippi River, and Platteville offers to the people of northwestern Illinois and eastern Iowa a unique and natural opportunity. He said if the experiment works, he would ultimately like to see LaCrosse brought into this program because from personal experience he knew that a great many students in Illinois liked the UW-LaCrosse. He said he recognized the soundness of the Committee's approach that we ought to do it on an experimental basis first, and in order to make the experiment meaningful, shared the view that it should be limited to a single campus. Regent DeBardeleben stated he understood why there is a distinction between Platteville and Superior, River Falls and LaCrosse, which are on the Minnesota border, but did not understand the basis for selecting Platteville as against UW-Parkside.

Regent Grover responded that UW-Parkside had a growth of approximately 100 students this year, whereas Platteville has not. UW-Parkside is not the most problem-oriented campus in declining enrollment. In addition Parkside has not been drawing very heavily from out of state, perhaps because they were pre-empted by the high cost of tuition. When you look at where we do have the potential excess space, and unique curricula offerings that could have drawing power, Platteville stands out, and if we want to make this thing work, it appears that most logically that is the campus to do it on. He said that he felt ultimately this should be extended to UW-Parkside, but if you make the experiment too large to begin with, the idea will not sell. Two years from now we will have a model and some data which may indicate how we should proceed in the whole southern tier.

Regent DeBardeleben agreed that Platteville does have a unique mission and wondered if we are unduly circumscribing the possiblities or probabilities of success of the program by limiting it. Regent Grover responded there is some risk, but felt the risk is really that it might well work at Platteville and fail on another campus. He said we will not know until we try.

Regent Fitzgerald stated she felt Platteville has a more salable item. They compete with only three schools in Dubuque, which is only thirty-five minutes away, and are Liberal Arts Schools and do not cover Agriculture, Business, Engineering, or Criminal Justice. She pointed out there are no schools in the top part of Illinois that we are competing with. She noted Grant County is the tenth largest county in the state areawise, but populationwise it is only thirty-first, and she felt we have drawn from the area as many students as we are going to get. She continued that if you are going to utilize this plan to the fullest and keep your quality education, you have to fill it with some kind of students and that it is logical to see if we can get 250 students from this area.

Regent Fish stated that he would like to be persuaded that this actually would have an economic gain to the state and the eventual losers won't be the resident students who will wind up paying higher costs. He noted that is why we are going into the experimental thing - to find that out, but would hope that the evaluation would not be done on the basis of justifying it just for the sake of enrollment, but on the true economic evaluation. Regent Fish stated he was also concerned that we are getting into the same thing that states often get into in other areas such as gasoline taxes, etc., and inquired if anyone had checked out what any other state will do. He said he could not imagine that Illinois and Iowa would be overjoyed that we are making a market for their students at a lower price. Any student we get is potentially a student that they are not going to get and are we then going to end up with Northern Illinois at DeKalb and the University of Iowa, etc., changing their out-of-state requirements to attract Wisconsin students.

Regent Beckwith referred to Table 2 of the Exhibit, noting that the tuition level of Northern Iowa will be direct competition, and that we will be somewhat under the level of Illinois. He said he was hopeful that a salutary result would be to persuade the states of Illinois and Iowa that it is in their self-interest to enter into the type of contract we have with Minnesota and avoid having this kind of competition so the students can flow in both directions. If we do get such compacts, and our experience with those states is the same as Minnesota, we will be a net gainer for a good many years. He said he shared Regent Fish's concern and did not want to get into a fee-cutting contest with the other states, but a logical result would be the initiation of discussions on compacts.

President Young observed that if it led to compacts so that students could flow freely back and forth, the great gainers would be students, and the net costs to the states would not be any greater. If Illinois would take twenty or one-hundred of our students in exchange for one-hundred of theirs, it cannot cost anybody any more and the students have that much more choice. If it results in a slower increase in tuition in general, he would not cry. Regent Lavine noted that the result of the compact with Minnesota is primarily of benefit to the students of both states, and referred to the experiment on fees and tuition at the Centers which had the same result. He said we are not talking about necessarily doing this forever but are saying that we don't have the answers to the kinds of questions being asked at the table. He said he felt that if the program is too expensive, the Legislature will not approve it, and therefore it is necessary to have an experimental program to find out what the cost will be. Regent Erdman noted that it is a gambling situation because we are not at a competitive advantage with in-state, Illinois or Iowa students in Platteville. It will still be much cheaper for those students to go to schools in their own state rather than pay 60% of our tuition. She continued that we are hoping that the special missions and quality of UW-Platteville will attract their students. She stated that there was a tradition of Illinois and Iowa students going to Platteville before merger -- there were 800 nonresident students who came primarily from those two states, and that has now dropped to close to 25% of that figure.

Chancellor Guskin agreed there is a strong argument for UW-Platteville, but felt there is also a strong argument for UW-Parkside, noting there are 400,000 people in a neighboring county in Illinois and only one public twoyear college there. Chancellor Fort stated he would have the same attitude as Chancellor Guskin in relation to the Platteville Campus. He said he would suggest that the University system define very carefully special considerations such as how soon down the line it would be possible for us to reassess the situation so as to include more add-ons such as Parkside and/or the Rock County Campus. Regent Gerrard stated it was his understanding that we are going to go for one campus with talk of expanding it. He noted we had just had an election and it was pretty loud and clear that people don't want to spend any more money than we have to to increase this over one campus. He said he felt we ought to vote on the experiment for one campus, see how it works, and then worry about it from there. If we increase this to too many campuses, it is going to be dead completely. President Hales noted for the record that UW-Whitewater was also interested --they had a representative at the Committee meeting and made a pitch for their campus too.

The question was put on Resolution 1773, and it was voted.

Regent Grover reported that the Committee heard a presentation by Judge Douglas Moodie and Attorney Jack DeWitt requesting a transfer of funds to the UW-Superior Foundation. Under conditions of the Beecroft and Haugsrud Wills, bequests were made to the benefit of UW-Superior. However, because the Foundation was not specifically identified by the donors, the funds are by statute required to be administered by the Board. Although the Committee was supportive of the position of the Foundation, there was concern as to whether it had legal authority to assign the funds to it. The conclusion of the discussion was that efforts should be directed through probate court to determine whether the intent of the donors can be established to its satisfaction. If so, this would allow the trust proceeds to be assigned to the UW-Superior Foundation. Regent Grover reported the Committee stated there was no objection to contacts being made with System legal counsel and the Atorney General to determine the legality of such a transfer, if the effort through the courts is not successful.

In answer to his question, Regent DeBardeleben was advised that the bequests have been presented to the Board for acceptance, but no money has flowed. Regent Beckwith stated it was his understanding they want us to designate the UW-Superior Foundation as our investment agent so they will have investment power over those funds and would include them in their foundation report. Regent DeBardeleben stated he was disturbed about the Chairman's comments that the Committee was supportive of these ends of the Superior people. He said it appeared that if this subject is open, this Board has an obligation to oppose diversion of these funds to the UW-Superior Foundation. He said the will names the UW-Superior as the beneficiary and he did not feel it is proper for this Board to make appeal with somebody else whereby we are not going to go in and assert our rights. He said if that is what the Committee's action or non-action means, he did not agree with it and felt it requires review and discussion. Regent Beckwith stated that he felt the Committee agreed with Regent DeBardeleben's position. He said it was in no sense the sentiment of the Committee that these funds, which are now properly part of the Regents' responsibility, were going to be turned over to the Foundation. He said there was a request on the part of the representatives of the UW-Superior Foundation for an opportunity to discuss these matters with our legal counsel, and it seemed to be a reasonable thing to let them do, and it does not bind us to any action.

Regent Grover reported that Vice President Lorenz, in discussing the Gifts, Grants, and U.S. Government Contracts, stated that receipts were approximately \$2.5 million higher at a comparable period last year, with all of this reduction in the Student Aid area; however, with the substantial increase in the Basic Educational Opportunity Grants, the System is expected to end the year at a higher level.

Regent Grover moved adoption of the following resolution, the motion was seconded by Regent Erdman, and it was voted:

Resolution 1774: That, upon recommendation of the President of the System, the gifts, grants and contracts presented at this meeting (copy filed with the papers of this meeting) be accepted, approved, ratified and confirmed; and that, where signature authority has not been previously delegated, appropriate officers be authorized to sign agreements.

Regent Grover reported that the Committee next considered the first reading of the Basic Health Module Recommendations. He reported that the Board was represented in the development of the document by Regent Erdman and Regent Lawton, who worked closely with System Administration staff over the past several months. He said there also has been input from the Vice Chancellors, Directors of Student Services, Health Directors, Chancellors, and student government representatives. Regent Grover reported that Vice President and Controller Lorenz reviewed the informational reports on projected year-end balances, a schedule showing the UW System's sources of disbursements for the fiscal years 1973-74 through 1977-78, and commented that the 1977-78 report of auxiliary operations was a very positive statement, with the System's auxiliary operations being in sound financial shape.

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REPORT OF THE PHYSICAL PLANNING AND DEVELOPMENT COMMITTEE

The report of the Physical Planning and Development Committee was presented by Regent Gerrard.

Regent Gerrard noted that all the projects covered by the next resolution have previously been authorized by the Regents and this resolution authorizes the funding to proceed with design and construction of the five projects.

Regent Gerrard moved adoption of the following resolution, the motion was seconded by Regent Fish, and it was voted:

Resolution 1775: That, upon the recommendation of the UW-Madison, Platteville, Stout and Superior Chancellors and the President of the University of Wisconsin System, the concept and budget reports be approved and authority be granted to plan, bid and construct the following projects, at the costs and from the funding sources indicated:

#### UW-Platteville

Science Building/Remodeling for Arts and Sciences Project, \$1,661,780 - General Obligation Bonding - GPR,

and authority to combine with the

Brigham-Royce-Warner Halls Handicapped Accessibility Project, \$440,000 - General Obligation Bonding - GPR, for a total project cost of \$2,101,780.

#### UW-Stout

Mechanical and Electrical Monitoring Project, \$263,000 -General Obligation Bonding - GPR

#### UW-Superior

Mechanical and Electrical Monitoring Project, \$215,000 -General Obligation Bonding - GPR

#### UW-Madison

E. B. Fred Hall Remodeling/Addition and Electrical Substation Project, \$2,341,177 - General Obligation Bonding - GPR Regent Gerrard reported that the resolution relating to release of advance planning funds for major project requests, 1979-81 biennium, UW-Madison, Milwaukee, River Falls and Stout, had been withdrawn due to the Bureau of Facilities Management's inability to have a recommendation prepared for State Building Commission action in November.

Regent Gerrard stated the next resolution is the request to lease 2,000 square feet of storage space to be used by University Housing to store off-season grounds equipment, refrigerators, spare parts, etc., for Family Housing operations for 100 apartments. The space which was formerly used has been sold by the University, and no other storage space is available within University Housing or elsewhere in the University.

Regent Gerrard moved adoption of the following resolution, the motion was seconded by Regent Fish, and it was voted:

Resolution 1776: That, upon the recommendation of the UW-Madison Chancellor and the President of the University of Wisconsin System, authorization be granted to lease the following property:

> 2,000 square feet of space located at 2210 Evergreen Road, Middleton, Wisconsin, for the period November 1, 1978 through October 31, 1979

Mr. Robert Marschke, Lessor Golf Green Storage Incorporated Middleton, Wisconsin

The annual lease cost is \$2,700 (\$1.35 per square foot) (Non-GPR)

Regent Gerrard reported that at the March 10. 1978, Board meeting, the UW-Madison Campus was authorized to continue negotiations to develop a final agreement between the United States Department of Agriculture and UW-Madison for the lease of a site for the North Central Dairy-Forage Research Center, to be constructed and operated by the USDA. The site selected is on the western end of the campus adjoining existing agricultural facilities. The research lab to be developed will comprise approximately 65,000 gross square feet of laboratories and greenhouses, at an estimated cost of \$6.5 million (federal funding). Under terms of the agreement the site will be leased to USDA for a fifty-year term, with a renewal option for an additional fifty years, and will include a reversionary clause.

Regent Gerrard moved adoption of the following resolution, the motion was seconded by Regent Barkla, and it was voted:

#### Resolution 1777:

That, upon the recommendation of the UW-Madison Chancellor and the President of the University of Wisconsin System, the President or Vice President and Secretary or Assistant Secretary of the Board of Regents of the University of Wisconsin System be authorized, as permitted under s. 36.11 (1)(b), Wis. Stats., to execute a 50-year lease, with one renewal option for an additional 50 years, for 1.56 acres on the UW-Madison campus to be used as a site for the North Central Dairy-Forage Research Center to be constructed and operated by the United States of America (U. S. Department of Agriculture).

The legal description of this parcel is as follows:

A parcel of land located in the SE 1/4, SW 1/4 and the SW 1/4, SW 1/4 of Section 15 and in the NE 1/4, NW 1/4 and the NW 1/4, NW 1/4 of Section 22, all being a part of T7N, R9E, City of Madison, Dane County, Wisconsin, more particularly described as follows:

Commencing at the NW corner of said Section 22;

Thence S 89<sup>0</sup> 55' 10" E, 143.00 feet to a witness corner for said NW corner, the witness corner being marked by a City of Madison Brass Cap concrete monument;

Thence along the arc of a 45.60 foot radius curve to the right whose long chord bears S  $16^{\circ}$  37' 35" W, 25.26 feet;

Thence S  $32^{\circ}$  42' 15" W, 31.56 feet to a point of curve;

Thence along the arc of a 43.22 foot radius curve to the left whose long chord bears S  $23^{\circ}$  46' 35" W, 13.41 feet;

Thence S  $14^{\circ}$  50' 55" W, 29.08 feet to a point of curve;

Said described parcel contains 68,000 square feet or 1.56 acres.

Regent Gerrard moved adoption of the following resolution, and the motion was seconded by Regent Fish:

Resolution 1778: That, upon the recommendation of the UW-Eau Claire and Superior Chancellors and the President of the University of Wisconsin System, authorization be granted to construct the following minor projects, at the cost and from the funding sources indicated:

UW-Eau Claire

Service Road and Parking Area Repair and Improvement Project (\$26,560, State Building Trust Funds-GPR and \$31,165, Program Revenues, Parking Receipts - Non-GPR \$57,725

**UW-Superior** 

Temperature Control Modifications Project, Program Revenues, Student Center, Arena and Residence Halls Reserves - Non-GPR

77,300

\$135,025

In response to his question Regent DeBardeleben was advised that the cost for temperature control modification in the Arena at the UW-Superior was approximately \$1,530. In response to her question Regent Barkla was advised by Vice President Winter that profits from the Wessman Center flow to the University, not to the City.

The question was put on Resolution 1778, and it was voted.

Regent Gerrard stated the UW-Green Bay campus development plan is virtually unchanged from previous plans approved by the Regents except that any additional land acquisitions would have to be funded from gifts and grants rather than from GPR-supported state funds. He said the Committee was concerned that approval of a location for future housing could be interpreted as indicating Regent support at this time for a student housing project at UW-Green Bay. The Committee was assured by

Regular Board 11-10-78

Chancellor Weidner and System staff that consideration of possible future student housing will be based on need and the financial plan for funding the project at the time a request is submitted. He stated the Committee was also informed that the Regents approved, in the 1977-79 capital budget, a student housing project for UW-Green Bay to be supported 1/3 by Program Revenue supported bonding and 2/3 by gifts and grants.

Regent Gerrard moved adoption of the following resolution, the motion was seconded by Regent Fish, and it was voted:

Resolution 1779: That, upon the recommendation of the UW-Green Bay Chancellor and the President of the University of Wisconsin System, the Campus Development Plan, as updated, be approved to document physical facilities and campus boundaries for UW-Green Bay.

Regent Gerrard reported that the Waukesha County Board took final action authorizing the construction of Phase I of the UW-Center-Waukesha project, which provides for expansion of the library and improvements of the interior of other parts of the library and adjoining buildings. He stated that Phase 2 which provided for the construction of a Fine Arts Building and Phase 3 were denied.

Regent Gerrard reported that the Committee was informed that System Administration and the UW-Center System are proceeding with the sale of the Sherman property assigned to the Center System by Regent action in October. Vice President Winter stated the Center System would like to use the proceeds from the sale of the property for the operation of the farm as a biological field station for the campus at Waukesha.

Regent Gerrard reported the first parcel in the next resolution was appraised at \$66,000 and \$66,600 in September 1978, and an option had been secured for \$66,000. The second parcel was appriased at \$33,600 and \$35,000 and an option has been secured for \$33,600. He reported the total estimated cost in acquiring the two parcels, including appraisal and closing costs, is \$100,750.

Regent Gerrard moved adoption of the following resolution, the motion was seconded by Regent Barkla, and it was voted:

Resolution 1780: That, upon recommendation of the UW-Platteville Chancellor and the President of the University of Wisconsin System, authorization be granted to purchase two improved parcels of land, more fully described as:

## Parcel 1

West 1/2 of Lot 3 and Lot 4 and N 40' of Lot 5 and N 40' of the West 1/2 of Lot 6, Block D, Rountree's Western Addition, City of Platteville, Wisconsin, at the option price of \$66,000 - Advanced Land Acquisitions Funds

#### Parcel 2

Lot 2 and E 1/2 Lot 3, Block D, Rountree's Western Addition, City of Platteville, Wisconsin, at the option price of \$33,600 -Advanced Land Acquisitions Funds

Regent Gerrard reported that the next resolution requests authorization to grant easements to four City of Eau Claire property-owners to provide access through a University parking lot upon receipt of quit claim deeds transferring their portion of the vacated alley to the Board of Regents. The alley is part of the parking area development.

Regent Gerrard moved adoption of the following resolution, the motion was seconded by Regent Barkla, and it was voted:

Resolution 1781: That, upon the recommendation of the UW-Eau Claire Chancellor and the President of the University of Wisconsin System authorization be granted for the President or Vice President and Secretary or Assistant Secretary to execute an easement to the owners of Lot 4, Block 24; Lot 5, Block 24; Lots 27 and 28, Block 24; and Lots 34 and 35, Block 24, in the City of Eau Claire, providing access through a university parking lot to said lots, upon receipt of quit claim deeds transferring their portion of the vacated alley to the Board of Regents of the University of Wisconsin System.

Regent Gerrard moved adoption of the following resolution, the motion was seconded by Regent Barkla, and it was voted:

Resolution 1782: That, upon the recommendation of the UW-Eau Claire Chancellor and the President of the University of Wisconsin System, authorization be granted to plan, bid and construct the 1978 North Campus Parking Area project at a total project cost of \$102,000 from Program Revenues (Parking Receipts ) - Non-GPR Funds.

Regent Lavine moved adoption of the following resolution, the motion was seconded by Regent McNamara, with Regents Barkla, Beckwith, DeBardeleben, Elliott, Erdman, Fish, Fitzgerald, Gerrard, Grover, Hales, Lavine, Lawton, McNamara, and Neshek voting "Aye", and with Regents Thompson and Walter absent:

Resolution 1783: That the meeting recess into closed session as permitted by Sections 19.85(1)(c), 19.85(1)(f) and 19.85(1)(g) WIS. STATS. to consider personnel matters, personal histories of specific persons, and to confer with legal counsel with respect to litigation in which it is or is likely to become involved, respectively.

The meeting recessed into closed session at 10:30 A.M.

The Board arose from closed session at 11:55 A.M.

President Hales announced that the following resolutions had been approved in the closed session:

- Resolution 1784: That, upon the recommendation of the President of the UW System, the Board of Regents approves continuing the leave of absence without pay for Chancellor Lee S. Dreyfus through December 31, 1978, and effective January 1, 1979, the date his term as Governor of the State of Wisconsin commences, accepts his resignation as Chancellor of the University of Wisconsin-Stevens Point.
- Resolution 1785: That, upon recommendation of the University of Wisconsin-Superior Chancellor and the President of the University of Wisconsin System, the following appointments to the Board of Visitors, University of Wisconsin-Superior, be approved. Terms of appointment for the initial members of the Board will be for one, two, or three years, as assigned at the initial meeting of the Board of Visitors.

nead meeting of Uctober 13, 1978 SUBJECT:

The Higher Educational Aids Board met in the Governor's Conference Room, State Capitol, Madison, on October 13, 1978. Regent member Herbert Grover was present.

1979-81 Biennial Budget Decision Issues

The Board continued deliberations, begun in July, of budget decision issues for its 1979-81 Biennial Budget.

#### Wisconsin Tuition Grant-Maximum Grant

At the July meeting the staff recommended that the Board seek approval to set the maximum grant for the Tuition Grant program "annually at the level of the instructional subsidy paid on behalf of students enrolled at UW-Madison." The Board deferred action and requested the staff to provide information detailing the effect that cost of living indexing would have on increasing the maximum grant. The staff presented data on the effect of using the Consumer Price Index, Higher Education Price Index, and a weighted average tuition increase index which suggest that use of an index would raise the maximum Tuition Grant to at least \$1,800 in 1979-80 and \$2,000 in 1980-81. However, the staff again recommended to the Board their original recommendation which, using UW-Madison fees as the base, would raise the maximum Tuition Grant to \$2,350 for 1979-80 and \$2,550 for 1980-81. To implement the staff recommendation would cost an additional \$1,644,000 in 1979-80 and \$2,100,000 in 1980-81.

E. Kaplan opposed the adoption of the staff recommendation stating that it would be poor public policy to establish the maximum grant at a level larger than the incremental funding level used in the University of Wisconsin System enrollment funding formula.

H. Grover indicated his opposition to the staff recommendation was based on practical considerations rather than philosophical reasons. He suggested that the Board attempt to increase the opportunity to obtain state governmental support by requesting a portion of what was being requested rather than risk getting none by seeking the total package. He moved to substitute the "instructional subsidy" for the University Cluster for the recommended UW-Madison "instructional subsidy."

Chairman Madison agreed that HEAB had not succeeded in obtaining funding for similar requests to date, but stated that adoption of the Grover motion would be a move away from previous Board policy. Reverend Raynor indicated his desire was not to seek utopia but equalization which has been Board policy. H. Grover then moved that the maximum Tuition Grant for students at Marquette University be set at the Doctoral Cluster level and that the University Cluster "instructional subsidy" become the maximum Tuition Grant for students at the other independent institutions. D. Bell, Executive Director, Wisconsin Association of Independent Colleges and Universities, spoke against the motion indicating that it would result in a major reduction in dollars available to the student. He reported that a number of alternatives had been discussed by WAICU but they had voted unanimously to ask for the Board's continuing support of the HEAB staff recommendation. J. Jung stated that even if the CPI would have raised the level to \$10,000, the staff recommendation would remain as stated.

The motion to amend proposed by H. Grover was passed 6-5, but the vote on the motion as amended failed 6-4, thus leaving the Board without any recommendation to advance to state government regarding a change in the level of maximum Tuition Grant. Later in the meeting a move to reconsider the motion was made by E. Wright on the basis that a position of not having a recommendation advanced by the Board relative to increasing the maximum Tuition Grant would constitute a change in its policy and that the issue had not been directly addressed by the Board in its previous action. The Board approved reconsideration of the motion.

H. Grover moved, seconded by E. Kaplan, to amend the resolution to require that the Tuition Grant question be further researched to determine the comparative long-range effects of (1) the cost of living index, (2) his previous recommendation, and (3) the staff recommendation. E. Wright supported the original staff recommendation, stating that although the UW-Madison level was arbitrary, it was less so than others proposed; the Tuition Grant only goes to undergraduates so the existance of Ph.D. programs at an institution was not relevant; and if the Grover alternative was implemented, most students would go to Marquette because others with higher tuition would have less subsidy. H. Grover argued that referencing the Tuition Grant to the UW System involved tying it to an institutional framework and should not be used as a basis for determining a subsidy to students. He noted that the program display at UW-Madison included agriculture, engineering, and nursing, which are higher cost than liberal arts programs, and more state support is needed as costs are averaged across all programs. Institutions with only liberal arts programs would be expected to have lower costs. He further noted than in the absence of the state having cost control and program efficiency requirements enforced by accounting and audit procedures at independent institutions, it did not seem to be good state policy to tie state support for individual students to some fraction of an institution's support base. The Board turned down the motion to defer and approved the staff recommendation to annually set the maximum Tuition Grant at the level of the UW-Madison "instructional subsidy."

## Wisconsin Higher Education Grant-Maximum Grant

At the July meeting the Board requested the staff to review the applicability of price indexing for setting the WHEG maximum grant. The present maximum grant was set at \$1,500 in 1975-77. The maximum grant of

the federal Basic Educational Opportunity Grant program was expected to be increased to \$1,800 in 1979-80. The staff prepared data indicating that a tie between a price index and the maximum grant would increase the level to about \$1,800, but because the Board had earlier decided to recommend sum sufficient funding for the WHEG program, the staff suggested that the Board recommend a specific WHEG maximum grant. The Board accepted the staff recommendation to request that WHEG maximum grant be increased to \$1,800.

#### Wisconsin Higher Education Grant-Level of Funding

In light of a Board request for sum sufficient funding for WHEG, it was necessary to establish limiting factors to use in expending grant funds. The Board approved the staff recommendation that a request be made for sufficient funding for the WHEG program to allow dependent equity levels to be set at  $\frac{2,125}{1,910}$  in 1979-80 and  $\frac{2,175}{1,960}$  in 1980-81 and the independent student equity percentage to be set at  $\frac{36\%}{1000}$  in 1979-80 and  $\frac{38\%}{1000}$  in 1980-81. The estimated cost of these recommendations is  $\frac{1,200,000}{10000}$  in 1979-80 and  $\frac{2,800,000}{10000}$  in 1980-81.

Total state support for WHEG program in 1978-79 was \$12,591,100.

#### Wisconsin Higher Education Grant-TIP Level of Funding

The Board approved a staff recommendation that the level of state support for Talent Incentive Program initial awards under the sum sufficient appropriation for WHEG be increased by \$112,000 in 1979-80 and \$233,000 in 1980-81. This increase reflects a 7.5% inflationary increase over the level of expenditure for TIP initial awards in 1978-79.

#### Indian Student Assistance Program-Maximum Grant

The Board approved a staff recommendation to request that the maximum Indian Student Assistance Grant be increased to \$1,800. The present maximum grant was set at \$1,500 in 1971-72.

#### State Direct Student Loans-Health Professions Student Loans

The Board postponed consideration of a state loan program for health professions students until the 1980 Annual Budget Review. At that time the Board will review the success of the new Health Education Assistance Loan program now being implemented by the Office of Education.

#### Contract for Dental Education-Level of Support

The Board approved a staff recommendation that it seek GPR funding for the contract with Marquette University for dental education at the per capita support levels of \$4,200 in 1979-80 and \$5,200 in 1980-81. The additional costs of the contract resulting from this recommendation are \$375,000 in 1979-80 and \$500,000 in 1980-81. In 1978-79, the contract for 500 full-time Wisconsin residents was \$3,450 per capita.

#### Agency Administration

The Board approved the staff recommendation that it request five additional positions to meet audit and program accountability and service needs related to the administration of the Wisconsin Guaranteed Student Loan Program. A motion by Kaplan, seconded by Grover, to delete the proposed position of Director, Bureau of Program Relations, because it was inadequately justified was not supported by the Board.

As a result of rating agency concerns about cash liquidity of the Revenue Bond Accounts, \$150,000 of the Special Allowance Revenues are set aside annually. The Board's position is that Special Allowance Funds should be available to meet ongoing agency expenditures. On recommendation of Executive Secretary Jung, the Board approved, as a matter of principle, that a request be made for an annual GPR supplement of \$150,000 to offset the Special Allowance Revenue which was set aside for the Revenue Bond Accounts. A total of \$450,000 will be requested for the years 1978-81.

The Board approved the staff recommendation that it include a request for eight additional positions for administration of the Bond portfolio to assure proper audit accountability.

After some debate, the Board approved the staff recommendation that GPR funds be sought for the Educational Opportunity Program amounting to \$335,400 in 1979-80 and \$371,600 in 1980-81 and that consideration of adding eight new positions be postponed until the 1980 Annual Review. Several Board members expressed concern that this specific request for GPR makes the EOP program subject to the vagaries of the legislature at a time when the climate may not be good for Talent Search.

The Board approved, with some opposition, the staff recommendation that the Lender Servicing program continue into the 1979-81 biennium with a comprehensive cost/revenue analysis to be prepared for the 1980 Annual Review. The Board will request six additional permanent positions and seek reauthorization of 2.5 project positions.

The Board approved the motion by H. Grover establishing a "partnership" approach for implementing the NDSL program which would combine the efforts of both HEAB and an institutional or private vendor to provide specific services, particularly in the billing and data processing areas. This approach will provide time to develop a plan satisfactory to both HEAB and institution concerns relative to the NDSL servicing program.

#### Meeting Dates

The Board scheduled the remainder of its 1978-79 meetings for the following dates: January 26, April 27, and July 13, 1979.

#### Wisconsin Higher Education Grant Program-Current Status

Staff reported that the commitment level of WHEG had reached 95% of the targeted level as compared to 80% at this date last year. More financial aid applications, a 25% increase in the independent student award average grant, more eligible WHEG filers, less than expected BEOG awards, and a decrease in the feedback activity were identified as contributing to this year's higher commitment level. It appears, however, that this present commitment level overstates the actual program situation because all students applying for BEOG are now required to use the Financial Aids Form, whereas last year 6,000 BEOG applicants were not included in the data.

Consequently, the staff requested and received Board approval for authorization to implement, upon concurrence of the Board Chairman, a WHEG award adjustment procedure, if necessary, prior to the second semester of the 1978-79 academic year.

The Board adopted a list of evaluation criteria to use in selecting a need analysis service agency for 1979-80. The Board also received a report on difficulties faced in the Talent Incentive program and efforts being made to improve program management.

#### Educational Information Centers (EIC) Program

The Executive Secretary recommended: (1) that a Policy Committee and an Operational Committee be established, involving HEAB, UW, VTAE, WAICU, and DPI representation, to implement a state EIC program; and (2) that a single staff person, to be selected with concurrence of the Policy Committee, be authorized for the EIC program for the current fiscal year. H. Grover called attention to the letter from J. Lavine in which he, as Chairperson of the HEAB Personnel Committee, urged the Board to authorize only the staff to engage in planning for the project. The Board's attention was called to the current position freeze, the potential for non-extension of the federal funds, and the need to complete the planning process before a determination of staffing requirements is made. J. Jung indicated that his agency would continue the effort whether the position was present or not because they had been asked to plan the EIC project. E. Kaplan, expressing concern about the addition of another program and the overextension of management staff, stated that she thought a grant of \$45,000 was not worth HEAB's attention for a program peripheral to its main charge. She moved, Grover seconded, that HEAB withdraw its approval and participation in the EIC program. The Board defeated the motion and supported the recommendation of the Executive Secretary.

#### UW System Resolution

The Board requested the staff to develop a response to the October 6, 1978 resolution of the Board of Regents which requested the HEAB to consider five recommendations of the UWS 1979-81 Biennial Budget Working Group on Holding Down Student Costs.

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# DISCUSSION PAPER -- NONRESIDENT TUITION

#### INTRODUCTION

The costs to the student of securing a higher education continues to be a serious concern. Other materials prepared for the November 9-10 Regents' meeting present proposals for holding down costs to all students--undergraduate and graduate students, residents and nonresidents. This paper discusses issues related to nonresident tuition, and discusses alternatives especially designed to hold down costs to nonresident students.

#### Background

Decisions as to whether a potential student will enroll in some sort of higher education institution, and if so, at which institution, depend on a host of influences and pressures. While all of the items listed in Tables la and lb are important, this paper is focused exclusively on certain students--nonresidents, and one important factor--nonresident tuition. From among all the things which influence college participation, especially by nonresidents in UW institutions, tuition is a key target for public policy decisions. This is true generally because tuition is one of the few factors over which the state and the UW-System can have some direct influence. Secondly, nonresident tuition at UW-System institutions is clearly out of line with other comparable institutions. While this situation already places the UW at a clear disadvantage in attracting out-of-state students, this disadvantage may well be intensified during a period of general declines in enrollments across the nation, with concurrent efforts by other states and system of institutions to retain more of their own residents. Where the state was previously a net importer of students, as of 1975 it was a net exporter.

# 1. Comparison of UW Nonresident Tuition to Other Public Institutions

Nonresident tuition at UW institutions remains high relative to comparable public institutions. In 1978-79 twenty-two midwestern universities charge nonresident undergraduates an average of \$1,812 in tuition and fees for the academic year. UW University Cluster institutions charge \$2,637 or 145% of the group average. (See Table 2.) While data on University Cluster comparable institutions are limited, the National Association of State Universities and Land-Grant Colleges annually provides fairly comprehensive data for Doctoral Cluster comparable institutions. NASULGC data indicate that, in 1967-68, tuition and fees in the Doctoral Cluster were 135% of the median of such charges for state universities and land-grant colleges with doctoral programs (Table 3). By 1978-79, UW-Madison tuition and fee charges to nonresident undergraduates were 170% of the median of such charges, with the comparable percentage for UW-Milwaukee being slightly higher (171%). In fact, in 1978-79 UW-Milwaukee and UW-Madison ranked fourth and fifth respectively in undergraduate tuition and fees for nonresidents. (See Tables 4 and 5.)

#### 2. Trends in the Migration of Students

In 1968, the state of Wisconsin was a net "importer" of students. In that year, almost 14,000 more students came to Wisconsin than left this state to attend postsecondary institutions. By 1975, (the latest year for which data are available) Wisconsin had become a net "exporter" of students, with 2,000 more students leaving the state than coming in to attend school. Halstead (1974) provides measures of both the ability of public institutions to retain resident students and the ability of such institutions to attract nonresidents. The data have been updated to include 1975 (see Table 6) and suggest the following. First, Wisconsin's public institutions have continued to strengthen their ability to retain residents. Among the 50 states and the District of Columbia, Wisconsin tied for rank 18th through 21st place in 1963. By 1968, Wisconsin had increased its standing to a tie for 15th through 16th place. In 1975, Wisconsin tied for 7th and 8th place in retaining resident post-secondary school undergraduates within the state.

Unfortunately, Wisconsin has not fared so well in continuing to attract nonresidents. In 1963, Wisconsin public institutions tied for ranks 31 through 33 in attracting nonresident undergraduates. By 1968, Wisconsin had risen in the standings to a tie for 18th through 21st place. However, the trend stops here. By 1975, Wisconsin public institutions had fallen into a tie for 37th through 39th place.\* Thus, by two measures Wisconsin public institutions have markedly less success in attracting nonresident undergraduates.

#### 3. Benefits from Attracting Nonresident Students

Clearly, the UW System does not have the strength it once did in attracting nonresident students. This is due at least in part, to the large increase (in absolute dollar amounts as well as in the percent share of cost) in nonresident tuition since 1968.

Apart from these demographic facts, there are several strong reasons for charging nonresidents less than their current (100% for undergraduates; and 70% for graduates) shares of cost.

First, this state is economically better off for the presence of nonresidents. If each nonresident brings \$5,000 into the state, and this \$5,000 is subject to an economic multiplier effect within the state as a whole of 2, then each nonresident adds a boost to the state's economy of \$10,000. In 1968, when there was a net inflow of 14,000 students into the state, the net effect on the state's economy was \$140 million (14,000) \* (\$5,000 \* 2)). In 1975, when 2,000 more students left the state than entered, there was a net economic loss to the state of \$20 million.

\*While public institutions include the UW and VTAE Systems, it is likely that this data accurately reflects the UW's ability to attract nonresidents.

<u>Second</u>, during a period of anticipated enrollment decline, it is desirable to fully utilize prior investments (sunk costs) in plant, other capital, and existing faculty strengths. Retaining and/or increasing nonresident enrollments would help to fully utilize these capabilities and contribute to covering costs which have already been incurred.

<u>Third</u>, resident fees will increase less dramatically during the enrollment decline period if nonresidents can be attracted and pay a share in the fixed costs associated with a UW education.

Fourth, nonresidents add a heterogeneous/cosmopolitan element to the student bodies of UW institutions. Such contact with persons of differing outlooks and backgrounds is a valuable part of a university experience.

#### 4. The Relationship between Tuition and Enrollments

Any of the options discussed on the following pages will require additional state funds unless the enrollment response is substantial. What economists call the price elasticity of demand measures just how responsive is quantity demanded (in this case as measured by enrollments) to changes in the price of the particular good (in this case as measured by the total cost of attending a UW institution as changed by a reduction in nonresident tuition). Estimates of price elasticities give the percentage change in enrollments which will result from a given percentage change in price, all other things the same.

In addition to providing some basis for estimating enrollment response to reductions in tuition, the price elasticity with regard to tuition also defines the fiscal break even point for the System. Simply put, if a given percentage decrease in tuition does not result in an increase in enrollments at least as large in percentage terms, then total revenue collected from nonresidents will fall.\* Thus, for revenue collections from nonresidents to remain constant, a 1% decrease in tuition must result in a 1% increase in enrollments. This implies a price elasticity with respect to tuition of 1.

From the student's point of view, however, tuition represents slightly less than half the cost of attending a UW institution. Thus, for the System to break even in revenue collections, a 1/2% reduction in total cost to the student must result in an increase in enrollments of slightly more than 1%. This implies an elasticity of roughly 2 with respect to the full cost to the student. A quick perusal of some of the relevant literature indicates that such enrollment responsiveness is unlikely. Hoenack's study (1967) and the Carnegie Commissions's own study done by Radner and Miller (1975) both find that, with the exception of low income and lower ability students, price elasticities with respect to the total cost to

\*This is strictly true only for very small changes in price (tuition). For the larger changes in price which usually result from changes in public policy, elasticities must be measured over the arc of the demand curve. This requires a slightly different calculation formula. The concept, however, remains the same. the student of attending higher education institutions are in the range 1 to 0, or far from the break even point.

#### 5. Impact of Other 1979-81 Biennial Budget Proposals on Nonresident Tuition

President Young's budget proposals for 1979-81 include several measures for holding down costs to students. One of the most important of these is the Prior Year Cost Base proposal for setting fees. If this alternative is phased in over two years, being fully implemented first in 1980-81 the benefits to students would be as illustrated below:

Under this plan, when fully implemented, nonresidents would receive substantial benefits, ranging from \$225 to \$262 per academic year for undergraduates, and from \$231 to \$321 for graduates by 1980-81. Thus, the alternatives discussed below would provide relief to nonresidents in addition to the amount proposed under the prior year cost base plan. President Young is also recommending that the one course remission for nonresidents living in and primarily employed in Wisconsin be reinstituted along with the GPR necessary to fund this policy.

Additional Methods for Reducing Costs to Nonresidents

#### 1. Considerations in Evaluating Alternative Nonresident Tuition Policies

When considering the tuition alternatives which follow it is important to keep in mind several points.

First, the possibility for discrimination among institutions, among students based on geographic origin, or student level must be avoided. Some institutions or students should not be advantaged at the expense of others.

<u>Second</u>, the impact which any lowering of nonresident tuition may have on the Minnesota compact must be carefully evaluated. (i.e., if nonresident tuition is substantially lowered, will Minnesota continue to find it attractive to have a separate agreement with Wisconsin, especially given the future enrollment environment?) <u>Third</u>, are the enrollment effects from lowering nonresidents likely to be substantial enough to help fill existing (and potential future) unused capacity within the System?

Fourth, is the particular alternative simple to administer?

Fifth, will a reduction in nonresident tuition result in a loss of federal financial aid monies? (At present grant maxima, preliminary evidence is that this is not a problem. However, if these maxima are increased, a loss in such federal funds is likely.)

and <u>Sixth</u>, what is the GPR cost of the alternative, and given that cost how important is the objective of lowering costs to nonresidents relative to holding down costs to residents?

2. <u>General Objective</u>: To bring UW System nonresident tuition into line with charges to nonresidents at comparable institutions.

If the UW System is to improve its success in attracting nonresident students, the costs of attending a System institution must be brought into line with costs of attending comparable institutions. This paper focuses on the contribution of tuition to such costs because tuition is the primary policy variable over which the state and the UW System have some control. There are two main approaches to reducing tuition charges to such students:

- 1. reduce the costs of education;
- 2. seek additional GPR support for some portion of costs now charged to nonresidents.

(A third alternative, increasing resident fees to cover a tuition reduction, was considered. This alternative was rejected by the Administration.)

3. Alternative Approaches

#### Method 1: Reduce the Costs of Education

The UW System has been effective in holding the line on costs, in fact cuts have been sustained during the retrenchment years of the 1970's, and enrollment growth has been managed with little growth in real resources. Efforts to maintain and improve fiscal management are discussed in LR 3.4. Obviously, the costs of nonresident education cannot be reduced without cutting the costs of educating residents, and at this point without adversely effecting quality. Further, there is no evidence that the differential in nonresident tuition between the UW System and comparable institutions in other states is due to differentials in the cost of education. Rather, different states have different policies for setting fees and tuition, and for defining educational costs.

#### Method 2: GPR Support for Lowering Nonresident Tuition

At present, nonresident undergraduates are charged tuition equal to 100% of cost-per-student. Nonresident graduate students are charged tuition based on 70% of cost-per-student. From the background section of this paper, it is clear that nonresident charges in the UW System are significantly higher than such charges at other comparable institutions. If System nonresident tuition were reduced to levels competitive with such other institutions\* the following tuition levels and percents of cost-per-student would result:

\*If the percent of cost sharing for nonresident undergraduate students were reduced from 100% to within the range 58% (NASULGC median comparable) to 69% (comparable to the average for 22 Midwestern Universities), the percent sharing would approximate the systemwide average variable cost proportion for undergraduates. If these same comparative guidelines were followed for graduate tuition, tuition would be less than the system average variable costper-student, since the variable cost proportion for graduate education is estimated at roughly 70%.

#### Implementation: Nonresident Tuition Experiment(s)

Policies for making nonresident tuition competitive with charges at comparable institutions can be developed from the general approach outlined under Model 2 above. Each of these variants could initially be experimented with at one or more institutions, or the System could seek to implement them on a systemwide basis. The tri-level fee policies of several years ago were implemented systemwide without the benefit of experimentation. This policy was discontinued after one year, and it could be argued that it should first have stood the test of an experiment. On the other hand, while experiments are often valuable aids to discovering which policies are promising and which are not, experimenting with fees may pose special problems. For example, reducing fees to nonresidents at selected institutions for a trial period may not only induce new nonresident students into these institutions, but may also draw students now at or who would have otherwise attended another UW institution to these selected institutions. In addition, although an experiment may only be in effect two years, patterns of attendance may be established, the effects of which remain long after the end of the experimental period. However, should an experiment prove successful after a two year trial, a new tuition policy could be implemented systemwide in the 1981-83 biennium, before substantial declines in enrollment are experienced.

Three experiment models are outlined below. Following each is a brief discussion of advantages and disadvantages.

#### Experiment Model 1: A two year experiment at a single institution

(UW-Platteville). Nonresident tuition for <u>undergraduates</u> would be reduced to a level competitive with other comparable institutions. Table 7 provides fiscal estimates for three versions of this model.

#### Advantages:

4.

- 1. Administration. Since the reduction in tuition would apply to all undergraduates, administration of Experiment Model 1 would be simpler than for models which reduce tuition to some but not all undergraduates.
- Possibilities for Discrimination--among institutions; among students. Experiment Model 1 would not discriminate among undergraduate nonresidents on the basis of student class level (freshman, sophomore, etc.) or geographic origin. Further, by experimenting at a single institution, the possibility for drawing nonresidents from other System institutions is minimized.

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#### **Disadvantages:**

- Minnesota Compact. Any experiment with nonresident tuition may raise questions about the future of the Minnesota compact. Under any experiment, it is presumed that Minnesota would be "billed" at the lower experiment tuition rate for students at the experimenting institution.
- 2. Generalization of Experiment Results. It is possible that an experiment at one institution may yield results which cannot reliably be generalized to the System as a whole.
- Experiment Model 2: A two-year experiment at four institutions (UW-Platteville, UW-Whitewater, UW-Parkside, and UW-Center-Rock County). Nonresident tuition would be reduced to a level competitive with other comparable institutions. The new lower tuition would apply to freshmen in 1979-80, and to freshmen and sophomores in 1980-81. Table 8 provides fiscal estimates for three versions of this model.

#### Advantages:

1. Generalization of Experiment Results. Testing an experimental fee policy at several institutions may provide a better picture of its likely impact if implemented systemwide.

#### Disadvantages:

- Administration. Since the reduction in tuition would not apply to all undergraduates, the administration of Experiment Model 2 would be more difficult than under Experiment Model 1.
- 2. Possibilities for Discrimination -- among institutions; among students. Although this Model would not discriminate among students based on geographic origin, it would require assessment of different tuition charges depending on student level. Further, by expanding the experiment to four institutions, there is a substantially increased possibility of attracting nonresidents from other System institutions.
- 3. Minnesota Compact. See Experimental Model 1, Disadvantage 1, above.

Experiment Model 3: A two year experiment at a single institution (UW-Platteville). Nonresident tuition would be reduced to a level competitive with other comparable institutions. The new lower tuition would apply to freshmen in 1979-80, and to freshmen and sophomores in 1980-81. Table 9 provides fiscal estimates for three versions of this model.

#### Advantages:

- 1. GPR Request. Experimenting at a single institution for two years, with lower tuition to freshmen in the first year and to freshmen and sophomores in the second would significantly reduce the cost of the experiment.
- 2. Possibilities for Discrimination--among institutions. Unlike Experiment Model 2, this Model is likely to minimize the possibility of attracting nonresidents from other System institutions.

#### Disadvantages:

- 1. Administration. Since the reduction in tuition would not apply to all undergraduates, the administration of Experiment Model 3 would be more difficult than under Experiment Model 1.
- 2. Possibilities for Discrimination--among students. Although this Model would not discriminate among students based on geographic origin, it would require assessment of different tuition charges depending on student level.
- 3. Minnesota Compact. See Experimental Model 1, Disadvantage 1, above.
- 4. Generalization of Experiment Results. See Experiment Model 1, Disadvantage 2, above.

#### RECOMMENDATION

Experimentation: It is recommended that if experimentation is seen to be desirable, that Experiment Model 1 be chosen. Such an experiment would minimize the potential for inequitable treatment among students and among institutions and would hold the fiscal risk to a more modest level.

The higher education participation decisions made by students in the traditional college going age group (18 year olds) are influenced by:

- A. Student's ability.
- B. Expected return from investment in education.
- C. Income foregone during schooling.
- D. Financial resources -- parents', student's, and spouse's income and available assets.
- E. Total cost of attendance -- minimum for tuition/fees, books, transportation, room and board.
- F. Eligibility for and availability of financial aid -- grants, scholarships, work, and/or loans.
- G. Peer/family expectations and pressures.
- H. Other factors.

For non-traditional students, the decision to enroll will probably be influenced by the factors listed above as well as several others:

- I. Demands of family responsibilities.
- J. Demands of job responsibilities.

Factors Influencing the Decision to Enroll at a Particular Institution For students in the traditional age group, the following factors are likely to influence the choice of a particular institution: Α. Total cost of attending a specific institution relative to other institutions (depends on tuition/fees -- obviously classification as a nonresident is important -- books, travel expense, and room and board). Here the student is not interested so much in absolute amounts, but rather in the cost of attending one specific institution relative to others. D. Availability of financial assistance -- the aid package of a specific institution relative to others. E. Institutional prestige/status. F. Proximity to family. While many of the things outlined above may well apply to non-traditional students, other factors are likely to be of equal or greater importance.
